## AT YOUR OWN RISK

Last week a sign appeared in the men's cloak-room in the basement of MacDonald Memorial Library which should have made every student stop and think. The sign read, in part,
"Leave your coats here at your own risk. Due to the danger of theft, it will be quite alrigh
take your coat with you into the Library
The disappearance of coats from coat racks and cloakooms has proceeded at a phenomenal rate ever since regis tration this year. Our bulletin boards have been plastered with signs requesting "will the person who took my coat please return it?" In a great many instances a student probably took a coat he thought was his own and only at a
later date realized it belonged to someone else. The person whose coat he had taken, upon coming to the cloak-room and finding his own coat gone, took someone else's just so he would have some replacement for his own, having little hope
of getting his own back. The owner of the coat which he had taken, in turn, took someone else's, and so on, until the mistake made by one person snowballed into a serious condition involving up to a dozen people.

If, on the other hand, there are people at the university who take fellow student's coats deliberately, it is about time Dalhousie for petty thieves, and a kind of F.B.I. should be organized to ferret them out. When the guilty ones are found, they

To further help the situation, a central committee should be chosen to help find missing coats. Every student should mark a name or number in his coat, so that if his coat disappears he can report it to the central committee who will the wrong coat, by mistake, should report its owner's name Dalhousie where here are hundreds of students, no one stuDalhousie where here are hundreds of students, no one stu-
