CONSERVATIVE CONVENTION
Convention to Nominate a Candidate will be Held in Regina on February 19th
The executive of the Saskatchewan Conservative Association has called a convention for the constituency of Regina to be held in this city on Wednesday, Feb. 19th, for the purpose of nominating a candidate to contest the constituency in the approaching elections. H. W. Laird is president of the provincial association, and W. S. Ball, secretary.
The Regina constituency is about 144 miles from north to south, extending from the international boundary to Strasburg, and is on an average about 55 miles wide, extending from Belle Plain to a point between Balgonie and McLean on the main line of the C.P.R. The Liberals have already nominated W. M. Martin for this constituency, and on the date mentioned the Conservatives will select his opponent.

Teachers to Organise.
All persons interested in education in Saskatchewan will be glad to hear that a new organization is taking place that promises to grow into large proportions. For some time a need has been felt that has been expressed frequently at teachers' institutes and conventions—the need of organization among teachers for discussion along broader lines than can be affected at small conventions. It has also been felt that if trustees and inspectors could get together mutual good would result.
A meeting of those resident in Regina engaged in the different branches of education was held at the beginning of the month. A deputation was appointed to wait on the commissioner of education to impress upon him the value of such a convention. This was done and the department of education had formally expressed its approval of the plan. The commissioner has suggested the middle of May as a suitable time and he has agreed to extend the usual time allowance for which grants will be paid for districts whose teachers attend the convention.
A representative executive committee is being formed of inspectors, high and public school teachers and trustees from all parts of the province and a varied program will be drawn up. It is hoped that the convention will be very largely attended as it will be a suitable time for the formation of a vigorous provincial teachers' association and the making of arrangements for an annual convention such as is held in other provinces.

BURNING FIVE YEARS
Coal on Fire West of Edmonton—Too Expensive to Extinguish.
Edmonton, Jan. 20.—Frank B. Smith, M.E., has returned from a four days' trip to Goose campment, 75 miles up the coal that was on fire in township 50 range 4. The coal has been burning for four or five years. An unsuccessful attempt to extinguish the fire was made last summer by John McDougall, lumberman, who was acting for McDougall

TRADERS BANK STATEMENT
Net Profits for the Year Amounted to Over a Half Million Dollars
For the twelve months ending December 31st last, the net profits of the Traders' Bank of Canada, after making provision for the bad and doubtful debts, amounted to \$522,822.81. Out of this four dividends were paid, \$100,000 was transferred to Rest Account, and a similar amount written off bank premises. Of the assets the Dominion government demanded notes amounted to \$2,503,140.00 and the call and short loans on stock, bonds and other securities, \$1,289,545.91. The bills discounted current came to \$25,000,216.00. The bank premises are valued at \$1,896,003.82. \$5,000. was transferred to the Officers Guarantee Fund, and the same amount to the Pension Fund.
The statement shows an active condition of the business, an increase in Available Assets, an increase in Circulation, and the Rest Account is rounded up to two million dollars. Current Discounts now exceed \$25,000,000. The annual meeting of the shareholders will be held on January 28th.
A detailed statement of the bank's construction affairs will be found in this issue.

& Secord and the C.P.R., both of whom own portions of the property. Mr. Smith was making an examination in the interests of the C.P.R., and he considers it would cost more to extinguish it than any damage which will be done by the fire to the coal or land during the next fifty years. The fire will burn for ever and a day, but it will not consume more than five feet of coal each year. The location of the fire is on the south side of the river near Big Island. For over a mile at this point a fourteen foot face of coal is exposed along the river front.
The coal was ignited by a forest fire some years ago. The smoke from the fire is quite apparent, although the volume is not great. The point where the coal is burning is about twenty feet above the river. The top of the ridge is about 200 feet above the river. The fire covers a distance of 300 feet.
To extinguish the fire it would be necessary to tunnel behind the area burning and thus cut it off from the coal which has not yet been burned. But this would be an expensive operation according to Mr. Smith, and he will advise the C.P.R. not to attempt to extinguish the fire.
The coal lands in the vicinity of the fire are extensive. When mining operations are commenced the tunneling will be done in the same manner as operations which would be necessary to extinguish the burning coal at the present time.

PILFERER CAUGHT
Man Caught Taking Goods from Basement of Star Grocery—Fined \$10.
For some weeks past the Star grocery have been missing goods from their basement in the Darke block. Some nights it would be a box of chocolates, other times canned fruit. Out of a case of canned pineapples, 18 of 24 cans were missed.
Messrs. Carrothers & Wakefield decided on Monday evening to put a watch on. The caretaker of the building, Mr. W. R. Cragg, and Constable Burrows, hid themselves in the basement among the goods about 10:30 in the evening. The plumbers and steamfitters were working in the engine room and suspicion was attached to some of them. The catchers did not have long to wait; about 11 o'clock one of the helpers from the engine room came tip-toeing into the store room, and by lighting matches secured a box of biscuits and brought them into the engine room. Later he came back and secured a can of kippered herrings. This with a can of salmon he put behind a door evidently with the intention of taking them home. Later on in his turn he searches he ran into Mr. Cragg. Then Const. Burrows made his appearance, and the man was taken to the police station and locked up for the night. Next morning he appeared before the police magistrate and was fined \$10 and costs.

LIBERALS OF QU'APPELLE NOMINATED
Liberals of Qu'Appelle Nominated J. T. Brown, M.L.A.
At a convention of Liberals held at Wolseley yesterday, J. T. Brown, M.L.A., for Souris, was nominated to contest the Federal constituency of Qu'Appelle against R. S. Lake, the present member.
The names of R. A. Magee, of Wolseley, E. A. Partridge, of Sintaluta, and J. T. Brown, Moosomin, were placed in nomination. A ballot being taken it was found that Mr. Brown had a clear majority and his nomination was made unanimous.
By being a party to the adoption of a resolution approving the land policy of the Laurier government, Mr. Brown has repudiated his professed principles on provincial rights.

ALBERTA LEGISLATURE

Speech From the Throne Fore- shadows Busy Session

Edmonton, Alta., Jan. 16.—The third session of the first legislative assembly of Alberta was opened here this afternoon with the usual ceremonies.

The following is the speech from the Throne:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:—
I have much pleasure in welcoming you to the third session of the first legislative assembly of the province of Alberta. For the degree of material prosperity which has marked the progress of this province in a year of great stress and storm over the whole civilized world and our exemption from the more severe features of this crisis, our thanks are due to divine providence. An extraordinary severe winter, followed by a rather inclement weather foreshadowed wide spread distress but the beautiful weather of the autumn months, I have learned with pleasure, prevented to a very large extent such a calamity.

As loyal Canadians you will have observed with pride that during the financial disturbance which has spread disaster throughout the world, while there has been a shortage of capital both in Alberta and in the more populous portions of the Dominion, yet the soundness of the financial institutions of the country has once more been present and the forward flow of the trade and commerce of the Dominion has gone on almost unchecked.

My ministers have taken part during the recess, in two conferences, the one imperial and the other international, on education and taxation, which I have no doubt will have an important influence in the administration of these branches of the public service.

Royal commissions have been engaged during the year in the examination of conditions of the two important branches of trade and commerce in the province, the agricultural interests of the province which at present are supreme and are for years likely to remain so, are deeply involved in the conditions under which meat is marketed, and by the appointment of a commission to examine into these conditions, I have endeavored to arrive at the precise knowledge which is the first postulate of amelioration.

The vast coal fields, which after wheat fields, appear to be the largest asset with which Providence has endowed Alberta, have also received at-

tention of a commission with important results.

The report of both these commissions will be laid on the table of the House for your consideration.

The national wealth of the province assisted by the flow of immigration and capital which continues in spite of the temporary checks imposed by exceptional weather and monetary conditions, will, I have no doubt, develop in the course of long-term or shorter period, important manufacturing interests and my ministers have thought it advisable at the outset of this development to take advantage, to the best of their ability, of the experience of the older states by imposing on that industrial development healthy conditions while it is still in its infancy.

A bill will be submitted for your consideration providing for the regulations of the conditions of labor as regards compensation to workmen in case of accidents. I believe that by thus providing on an assured basis for the future the relations between capital and labor in this province will be rendered more cordial.

From the outset it has been admitted in several of the most industrially advanced of the countries of Europe, that the conditions under which the mining industry is carried on render it peculiarly necessary in the interests of all concerned to impose some limit on the hours of labor in this occupation. A bill has therefore been prepared by my ministers imposing regulations in this respect, which I believe will have a happy effect on this most promising of our infant industries.

An act will be submitted for your consideration dealing with the establishment of a government drainage system in the province and providing for the expense incident to important and necessary works of the description, being assessed against the property benefited.

The province has great cause for thankfulness that neither crime nor destitution fills an important part of the social look-out at present but from neither can we hope to be altogether exempt. You will be asked to make financial provision for the establishment of an industrial school for the better care and instruction of a class of boys whose circumstances and character call for special treatment.

Your approval will be asked for a number of bills which experience has shown are necessary for the administration of the affairs of the province as well as for a number of amendments to the ordinances of the North West Territories and Statutes of the province.

The public accounts and estimates will be laid before you at an early date.

Mr. Speaker and members of the legislative assembly:

I feel every assurance that these and other measures to be brought to your attention will receive the most careful consideration and that the same will result in the advancement of the welfare and prosperity of the province.

ORIGINALS TELL TALES

Is That Why Members Cannot See Original Documents of Interior Department

A discussion took place in the House of Commons recently regarding public documents. A case arose in which the opposition desired to see original documents, and moved for them, instead of, as usual, for copies. The government refused the demand, and there you are. The opposition says that the House, or for that matter, any member of the House, has the right of access to all original documents which are not matters of state in the restricted sense of the term. The government says that members have the right only to obtaining copies.

But the facts back of the affair are almost as interesting as the theoretical point involved. The Conservatives are able to say that the original documents were at their service until by using them they unearthed three damaging facts which were not apparent from a perusal of the copies and that then the use of the originals were forbidden. Here are the three facts:

It is customary for the Dominion land agents to report yearly on their work and for their reports to be published in the annual blue-book of the Department of the Interior. Two or three years ago two land agents one at Bathurst, and one in the Dauphin district, reported that there had been a good deal of "fake" homesteading during the year. In each case the

passage was suppressed; the only portions inserted were those which described conditions as satisfactory; and no asterisks appeared to show that there had been omissions of portions of the report. The Conservatives moved in the public accounts committee for papers which included these original reports, and on inspection observed these red pencil marks. Mr. Oliver was greatly chagrined when this fact was sprung on him in a debate on "fake" homesteading.

In the investigation of the Galway Cattle Company lease Mr. Ames was shown the original file by Mr. Cory, the deputy minister of the interior. The original application for this lease bore this date line "Great Falls, Montana, May 26." On the document was the stamp showing the date on which it arrived—the stamp read "May 27." That was rapid travelling; the plain inference was that this document purporting to have been drawn up in Montana, actually was written in or near Ottawa. The copy would not have contained the tell-tale stamp.

The same document afforded another interesting discovery. It was signed "H. P. Brown, per J.D.M." Looking at the original, Mr. Ames noticed that the initials seemed to be in the handwriting of Mr. J. D. McGregor, with which he was acquainted. The copy would never have suggested this identification.

It was after these revelations that access to original documents was denied, whether it was because of them may be left to readers to decide according to their political sympathies.

Perhaps it may be as well to mention the particular circumstance which led to the debate, though it was not mentioned in the course of the discussion. Mr. Ames was looking over certain leases of timber berths in the west. In one case a berth was advertised; a certain lawyer put in a tender; a competitor put in a larger tender; then a client of the first tenderer appeared with a tender still larger; and on being awarded the berth, wrote empowering his lawyer, the first tenderer, to act for him. It is just possible that a sight of the actual documents put in by this agent who tendered two bids might be interesting. Mr. Ames wanted that sight, and was refused it on the ground that Mr. Oliver had forbidden his officers to show documents to M.P.'s. So he moved for them and was given the copies and refused the originals.

TO IMPEACH LIEUT-GOVR.

Socialist in British Columbia Assembly Wants Conduct of Governor Investigated

Victoria, Jan. 16.—By a vote of thirty-three to three the provincial legislature, which opened today, within ten minutes after the conclusion of the speech from the throne, voted against the suspension of the rules for the consideration of a motion in an effort to secure an impeachment of Lieutenant Governor, Dunsmuir. The motion was made by the socialist member for Nanaimo, Hawthornwaite, for an alleged unconstitutional act of the lieutenant governor, in withholding his assent to the Natal act of last session. Hawthornwaite declared that an action of the lieutenant governor, who had previously signed a contract to import 500 Japs for the Wellington Colliery Co., of which he is president, would tend to destroy the confidence of the people in constitutional and responsible government.

Speaker Elberts ruled the motion out of order, it not being customary on the first day of the session to consider a matter unless of urgent public importance. He did not regard this as sufficiently urgent, as the government measure for the introduction of the Natal act is on the order paper for Monday. The socialist member called in vain for the authorities, and then appealed from the

ruling of the house, all but three supported the ruling.

Mr. Hawthornwaite will seek to introduce the motion on Monday, when the government's Natal measure is brought down. His motion requests the House to ask Ottawa to investigate the charges against Mr. Dunsmuir; and if proven to dismiss him. Nearly eight hundred guests were present.

It is understood that it is the government's intention to increase the present \$800 indemnity of the members to perhaps \$1,200, with \$6,000 salaries for ministers and \$8,000 for premier.

While Mr. Fulton remains commissioner of lands and works, another minister of public works is to share the department, and the probability is that Deputy Speaker, Ellison or former attorney general A. E. McPhillips will be appointed.

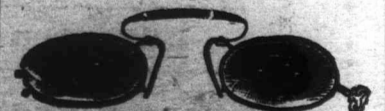

THE GOVERNMENT AND LAZARUS Notorious Immigration Crook Was Joint Agent of the Interior Department--Strike Breaker for Crow's Nest Coal Co.--How the Canadian Labor Market Was Glutted

One of the most remarkable episodes in the history of Canadian immigration matters is that connected with the individual recently known as Louis Leopold, whose right name is Leopold Lazarus.

While the declared policy of the government has always been to encourage no immigrants except those of the agricultural class, the chief commissioner of immigration was apparently for years associated with and giving assistance to Leopold in sending out mechanics and artisans to this country.

Standing Instructions to Preston The policy of the government was announced by the Minister of the Interior in the House of Commons in the session of 1906.

On June 20, 1904, Mr. Sifton was asked if the government was not aware that certain individuals were making fraudulent representations to intending immigrants to Canada by holding themselves out as agents of the Canadian government, guaranteeing positions and committing other frauds.

Seed Grain

In connection with the supply and distribution of seed grain for the farmers of this province it cannot be forgotten that the first mover in this direction was R. S. Lake, M.P., who first brought the subject to the attention of parliament. The principal has been endorsed by the House and it is now a matter of procedure as to the best means of assisting the farmers. The following speech by Mr. Lake, on this phase of the question will be read with interest:

Mr. R. S. Lake, (Qu'Appelle). I have already called the attention of the House to the fact that the crop has been badly damaged by frost in certain portions of the Northwest. In some respects the damage was such as to render the grain which was threshed totally unfit for seed. Now it is well known that frozen wheat which has been badly frosted will grow, and will give good results provided that all the conditions are favorable for the first two or three weeks after seeding. But the risks are very great, and the sowing of frozen grain should be discouraged in every way, not merely frozen wheat which has been specially referred to by the hon. gentleman, but frozen oats as well—I think they are less liable to germinate than wheat. But frozen grain is not to be encouraged, because of the fact that some of it will grow and induce many settlers who have not had much experience to sow grain which is of no use at all.

All are now agreed on the advantage of using only the best seed that can be obtained. As the hon. member for Brandon (Mr. Sifton) has just said, if the financial conditions had been normal I do not think that any intervention by this government would have been called for. The local merchants and banks would, as they have done in the past, in all probability have been able to see to it that no land went uncropped for want of seed and that the seed available was of good quality. But the financial conditions have created conditions which demand some assistance in order to insure that good seed is sown, and that the crop has a fair chance from the outset, and that all the land which is prepared for seed should be sown the coming season. It will be in the memory of the house that the minister of the interior in reply to a question I put to him on the 16th of December last regarding seed grain, stated that the government had the matter under consideration with the government of Saskatchewan, and that applications which he had already received for seed were being investigated by the commissioner of immigration. I trust that he will give the results of that investigation to the House, and I have little doubt that he will find sufficient to justify him in asking this House to put him in a position to see that sufficient seed grain of good quality is placed in the hands of settlers in the Northwest. It was my intention

if the government had not moved in this matter as early as possible to have proposed a resolution that the government make advances of money for this purpose, the amount to be based upon the acreage ready for cropping, suitable precautions to be taken by the government that the money would be used for the purpose for which it was being advanced.

Such advances being certified as necessary, not only by the officers of the government, but by the councils of municipalities, or of local improvement districts which have jurisdiction in the districts concerned, or possibly the executives of the agricultural societies might be utilized, because they are men who have the agricultural interests of their communities especially at heart.

Advances might be made payable in equal annual installments to be collected by the local authorities. In my opinion the money required for this purpose should certainly come from the exchequer of the Dominion, no matter how it should be decided later on to expend it for the purpose for which it was intended. The course I have suggested, of advancing the money itself instead of distributing the grain has many advantages. The distribution of the grain itself sounds badly, because in other parts of the world it conveys something of a charity. It would not be understood in other countries as we understand it here, that the distribution of the grain is merely an advance given against the security of the land which land in itself has already been a free gift to the settler. As the value of the grain becomes a charge against the land, so the advance of money would amount to exactly the same thing, because in either case the lien would stand against the land. If the money be advanced it can be spoken simply of as a business proposition for the purpose of enabling the owner to carry on his operations, the advance being justified by the improvements he has placed upon the land. The advance of money would also have the great advantage that each individual farmer could satisfy himself as to the price and quality of the seed, which cannot be done if the government undertakes the distribution of the seed, he can make his own purchase of seed grain and deal through persons in whom he has confidence. The endorsement in each case of the municipal councils or agricultural societies would ensure that these cases were dealt with on their merits, and that the party in power did not make political capital out of the distribution. This endorsement would also insure in any case where money was advanced that the money would only be used for the purpose of securing seed grain.

The Strikebreakers

The debates in parliament last week resulted in an interesting revelation in connection with the notorious Lazarus the employed immigration crook of the Dominion government who was also the employee of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association and the agent of the Crow's Nest Coal Company to send out strike breakers two years ago. The whole career of this government official centres around W. T. R. Preston and the Interior Department at whose London office he made his headquarters. With the assistance of the government and through the use of money from the Canadian treasury he exploited his schemes.

Who Lazarus is; how he became associated with the government, and what money he received, was all forest out of the Canadian Immigration commissioner in London, W. T. R. Preston, under oath before the public accounts committee in 1906. A few days ago the government's immigration policy was under discussion in parliament, when one of the opposition members, Mr. Cockshutt, moved:

"That in consideration of the great congestion that at present prevails in the labor market in many of the industrial centres throughout the country, it is highly expedient that assisted immigration, with the exception of agricultural and industrial classes should immediately cease, and that no further bounties shall be paid to individual agencies or companies for sending or bringing in such immigrants. Further, that the time has now come for a strict enforcement of the law that requires that only financially, morally and physically fit persons shall be allowed to enter the Dominion as settlers."

The government papers have made a great howl about the way in which the Conservatives discourage immigration, but they have only misrepresented the position taken by the Opposition. We are publishing elsewhere the whole story of Lazarus' connection with the government, and are glad to expose the scandalous way in which \$180,000 profit was made out of the Canadian people in three years by crooked immigration officials, who grafted in every conceivable manner. The government must have got back some of this money through their friends for sure, by they would not have stood for such a haul going to strangers.

When any government paper charges the Conservatives with burbling immigration schemes let them tell the people what those schemes are. We want every member of a labor or labor organization in Regina to read the exposure of Lazarus, the immigration official; manufacturers' agent and strike breaker.

Editorial Notes

Readers of the local government paper would naturally think from the published report of the recent nominating convention that perfect peace and harmony reigned at that gathering and that without any fixing or wire pulling Mr. Martin was the choice of the delegates. Such, however, was not the case. The Soo line delegates came over with J. R. Bunn as their nominee and when it was found that it was cut and dried that W. M. Martin was to be the choice there was muttering of disapproval, and many of the south delegates went home feeling anything but enthusiastic over the nomination. As a man, Mr. Martin is a good fellow, and many people who would like to see someone else sacrificed, will be compelled to vote against him because of his political associations, for Laurierism is certainly repulsive to the better element in this province.

Press Comments

(Winnipeg Tribune.)

Today there are four McLeans in the House. Two of them are Liberals, the member for Lunenburg and the member for Centre York, and two of them are Conservatives, the member for Queens' P.E.I., and the one from South York, who undoubtedly belongs to the same clan even if he does spell his name with an extra "a" and a small "l". With four representatives in the commons at present, the McLeans are easily in the majority there. Next to them comes the Smiths, with three representatives, two Liberal and one Conservative. True there are three Martins, but one of these is French and calls his name "Mar-tan" and so cannot fairly be counted. There are two Borden, two Chisholms, two Hughes two Jacksons, two McCarthys, two

Reids, two Robes, two Washes, two Wilsons and two Weights; and in each case one is a Liberal and the other is a Tory. There are also two Lauriers, two Laverignes, two McIntyres, and two Schells, all of whom are Liberals.

(Moose Jaw News.)

To find fault with the expense accounts of cabinet ministers on their trips to other countries savors somewhat of fault-finding, which is distasteful; and still it is necessary. In their way the watch-dogs of the treasury do as important work as the master mind of the administration. All fares indeed the land in which there are no critics to scrutinize the public expenditure, for the revenues, ample though they be, will soon be inadequate to satisfy the numerous demands of those who would fatten on the public trib. Again the most honest, who would not misappropriate a penny of the country's funds, are not carried away by projects of a dazzling nature, which exhaust the public resources.

So it is with the expense bills of the Hon. Mr. Brodeur, who spent some months in Europe last year at a cost of over \$8,000. Of course a grateful country pays for it, because the minister of marine went on public business. But as everyone knows \$8,000 is a heavy expense bill for a four months jaunt. If Sir John A. McDonald, Sir Charles Tupper, Hon. Geo. E. Foster, or any other of the old guard had presented such a bill, what a protest there would have been? Possibly they belonged to the unprogressive days when persons were economical because they are unprogressive; for today such is the Liberal comment on the days preceding 1896.

This opinion is all very fine in periods when money comes in easily, and on that account may be spent as lavishly; but it was not the opinion of the Liberal party while in opposition, nor will it be popular in the country during the coming election campaign. For the next few years a dollar saved will represent a dollar earned, not by speculators, but by hard handed toilers of the land. By all means then let us commend those critics who, though they seem to be parsimonious, are nevertheless rendering the taxpayer the greatest possible service in these days when dollars are so difficult to procure.

HELP PROBLEM

May be Solved if Race Suicide Question is Settled

Serious alarm has been expressed in many quarters because of the notable shrinking which has occurred in the size of the average Ontario family.

Ideas which are beginning to find lodgment in some minds of the western part of the province, may, if they prove contagious, result in removing the cause of alarm now felt. One correspondent of the Ontario bureau of industries writes from the township of Guelph, in Wellington county to say that the only farmers who are securing satisfactory returns from their operations are those who have large families and who do not require to hire help. The same view is expressed almost in the same language by another correspondent whose home is in Caistor, Lincoln county. Still another, who lives in East Williams, in the county of East Middlesex, is apparently being carried to the same conclusion as his two fellow farmers who have just been quoted. He declares that the domestic service problem will never be solved until the women of today nurse babies, and in reasonable numbers as their grandmothers did.

Are we about to be witnesses of the settlement of a great moral question, on purely material grounds?—Toronto Weekly Sun.

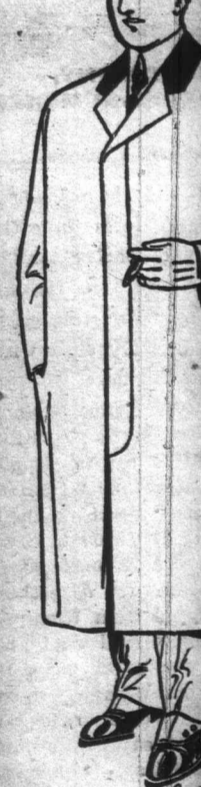

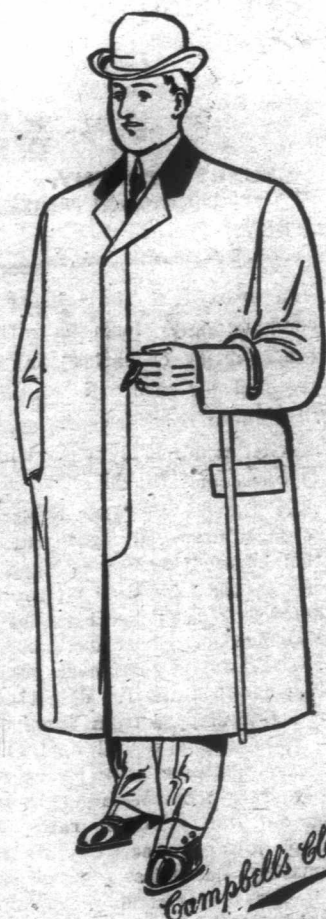

In order that the Canada Milling
company may form an estimate of
the quantity of barley that will be
required for seed, it is important
that those requiring this seed should
specify at an early date what their
requirements will be.

At the present time it is difficult
to state what the cost will be, but
this information can be supplied later.
In the meantime farmers are re-
quested to send direct to the Canada
Milling Co., or through our agents
particulars of how much seed barley
they require, and the date they would
like this shipped from Winnipeg.

This company will apply half its
regular mileage grain rates on such
shipments from Winnipeg to stations
on our line. These rates will be
much lower for carload lots than for
smaller quantities, therefore, if a
number of farmers, who want seed,
will club in together and place or-
ders for a car of, say 1,000 bushels,
the cost of transportation from Win-
nipeg to destination will be consid-
erably reduced. For that reason it is
in the farmers' interests that they
should go in together and make up
a carload.

If this barley is desired to be ship-
ped in sacks the extra cost of the
same will be added. The railway com-
pany's agents will be authorised and
directed to distribute the barley to
each person and collect for the cost
of the same including bags and the
freight charges. Under this arrange-
ment the farmers will be saved the
trouble of remitting to Winnipeg the
cost of the barley.

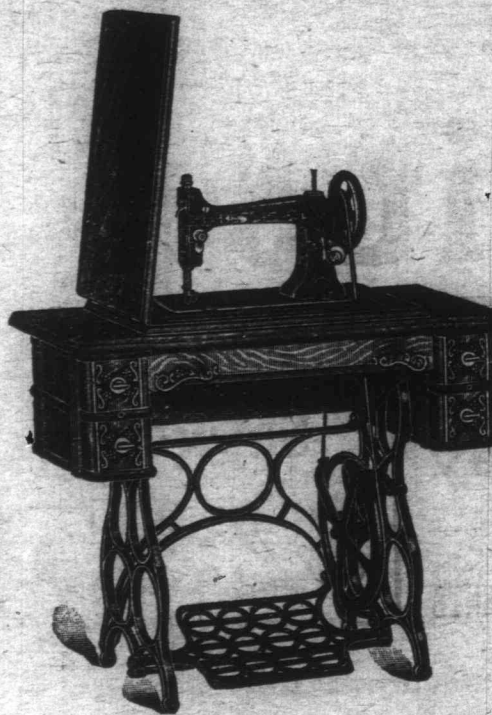

Motherwell of the Saskatchewan government, who arrived here a couple of days ago, are still negotiating with the Dominion government in connection with the seed grain relief for Saskatchewan, but nothing definite has been reached. It is, however, contemplated that through the assistance of the Dominion government there will be no difficulty in obtaining sufficient money advances to those settlers who unfortunately had their crops damaged last year, so as to enable them to secure all necessary seed for the season's operations.

The advances will be made by way of a loan at the usual government rate of interest, repayable in three

years. Nothing official is yet obtainable, but it looks as if something along these lines will be adopted.

FRENCH SETTLEMENT

To be Located South of Moose Jaw—Will Have Their Own Schools and Churches.

Montreal, Jan. 20.—A project to found a distinctly French Canadian province in the heart of the North-West has been inaugurated by a number of Valleyfield people headed by Mr. Allard, vice-general of the diocese of Valleyfield. The idea is to have French Canadian settlers take up a tract of land where they can have their own priests, schools and customs, in other words, where a second Quebec will be established.

An organization known as the West Canada Colonist Society has been formed, and it is proposed to settle them on a large tract of land able to accommodate thousands of settlers that has been selected in the Moose Jaw district, and which is now being surveyed.
