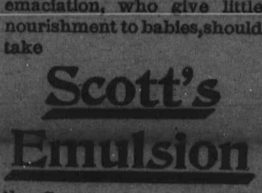

Halifax Notes.

A VISIT TO THE POORS' ASYLUM.

MR. EDITOR.—A brief sketch of our poor's asylum as seen by your correspondent during a recent visit with a friend may interest your readers.

The institution is under the management of Mr. Dow, who for the past twenty years has held the position of engineer but has recently been appointed superintendent...

The infirm and insane are apparently well cared for, while those who are able are required to do the work of the institution.

In the basement the cooking and washing is done. The baking is a matter of cleanliness. A large brick oven is used, about 500 loaves per day being baked.

Large frames laden with the blankets, quilts, and other clothing just washed, fired in grooves, are run into the drying vaults, where the heat from a large number of steam pipes complete the drying process very quickly.

Two large steam boilers generate the steam required for heating purposes and also furnish the power for pumping for should the city water at any time be turned off, there is a pond on the grounds from which the water may be pumped into the building.

The grounds about the building are very pleasantly situated and apart from the loneliness that must come into the life of some bereft of friends or deserted by those they loved, the inmates should feel they are tolerably well situated.

Many and varied were the thoughts that rapidly passed through our minds as we walked these wards and gazed into those faces, not a few of them voluntary wrecks on the avenue of life.

One apartment is fitted up as a church where religious services are held on the Sabbath by visiting clergymen.

A Brazilian Bull Fight.

DEAR ACADIAN,—I have received the following account of a bull-fight, from a correspondent in Brazil, which took place at Sao Paulo on April 15th, last, and enclose it hoping it will interest the reader, of the ACADIAN:

"The sport was held in the Colosseum Paulista, a large amphitheatre fashioned after the Coliseum at Rome and like it devoid of a roof. By three p. m. the time advertised for the fight, the seats were well filled and every one was on the alert for the sport to begin.

I was surprised that the audience was so select, which, in fact, was very much like a assemblage of opera goers, in European cities. The senators and their daughters in their gay apparel, sparkling with diamonds, which are so common here as pebbles, looked enchanting, and one would not suppose by their pleasant innocent faces that they came to see dumb brutes tortured to death.

The band now struck up a lively air, the gates were thrown open and in marched the picadores. They were active-looking, clean-limbed chaps, resplendent in satin tights, and embroidered jackets, as if for a fancy dress ball. After bowing to the president and audience, they received their implements of torture and took their stations around the arena.

The music ceased and a bull rushed through an open door. He was big and gaunt and had undergone a systematic course of training, so that now he was in a perfect frenzy. His horns, long and spreading, were fitted into leather sheaths. After staring for a moment in amazement, he uttered a snort and made for the nearest picadore, who stepped nimbly aside and the bull brought up against the side of the arena with a smash.

He soon recovered himself and seeing a flaming cloth a few yards from him directed his attention to that. As he tore by a picadore thrust two spears into him just above the shoulder blades, one on each side. The hand acknowledged the feat by a salute, the cruel little senoritas clapped their hands and the men shouted. The infuriated bull now became surrounded on all sides and made a charge at first one and then another, receiving numbers of darts in his neck and shoulders, considered the most difficult places to put them.

One of his assailants in attempting to use a spear, was caught by the bull's horns and tossed in the air. The man fell in a heap and the bull started to get satisfaction out of him. Quick as a flash the other picadore sprang to his assistance, and seized the bull by the horns. For a few seconds they were all in a heap, the fallen hero still biting the dust. The audience was as still as death and every eye strained to see the result of the melee.

The bull appeared to be confused at first, but soon collecting his senses, gave a bound that sentering his tormentors in all directions, and charged at a blanket that taunted him across the arena. The unfortunate picadore, his gorgeous raiment torn and soiled with the blood flowing from a cut in his face, arose nimbly enough and amid thunders of applause thrust a spear to the bull's neck. He was considerably hurt, however, and soon limped away. A fresh man took his place. This sort of combat was kept up for some fifteen minutes, until the bull looked like a porcupine or an immense porcupine.

A door was now opened and the poor brutes allowed to escape. Two more beasts were tortured in the same manner, the picadores and blanket bearers intoxicated by the eyes of the audience trying to excel each other in feats of daring and agility. Several times they were knocked down and trampled on, but they appeared to be made of rubber and their mishaps only added to their cruelty.

The fourth bull was to be the event of the day. He was to be hunted on horseback and killed by the sword. After an interval allowed for refreshments, two picadores entered on fine steeds, supported by two more picadores on foot and two blanket bearers. The horsemen were armed with long lances, or picadores. The beginning of the fight was similar to the other, only this time the bull's horns were not muffled but sharpened off to a point and left bare. His assailants were a little cautious now as to come in contact with those horns meant death. The horsemen galloped back and forth, prodding their victim at every opportunity until he bellowed with pain and rage. He charged at him and left, but found nothing to resist him except those tantalizing cloths. At last one of the horses ventured too near; the bull caught it under the side with one of its immense horns, and the next second its entrails were hanging out. The rider leaped off just as the bull made another charge and knocked the horse down, where it lay quivering. The matadore or killer now entered to give the finish, struck the show. He was a powerful man armed with nothing but a sharp, short sword. The other participants remained around the arena, and the matadore advanced towards the centre of the arena. The bull rushed at him again and again, but he merely took a step to one side and the beast rushed by. At last, during one of those charges the matadore saw his opportunity, and, by an almost imperceptible movement, quick as a flash, drove the point of the sword into the bull's head, just back of the horns. Augustus W. West died yesterday morning in the 57th year of his age, after a somewhat protracted illness. He was a well-known West India merchant, and senior member of the firm of J. T. & A. W. West, the surviving partner being Frank S. West. Mr. West was a public spirited citizen and his death will be much regretted. He amassed a considerable amount of wealth and carried \$50,000 life insurance. The funeral will take place on Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock, from his late residence, 84 Morris street.

To those with whom Mr. West was intimately acquainted in mercantile pursuits, the announcement of his death was not wholly unexpected, because the cause of his absence from business circles during the past few months was well known and it has all along been felt that the disease with which his physical system came him. No firm in our streets was more familiar than that of Mr. West. In the north and especially, where he did business and resided for so many years, there was no man better known or better liked. Mr. West was the founder of the late Concord West, the founder of the West firm of West India merchants. In early life Mr. West engaged in the dry goods trade, and for several years carried on a successful business in that line, but embarked his fortunes with his brothers shipping and in trade with the West Indies and other foreign parts. This change on his part turned out to be a wise one, and he, for years, participated

Town Council.

Council met on Tuesday evening. Present: the Mayor and full Council, with the recorder.

Communication signed by G. E. DeWitt, L. E. Wortman, A. W. Sawyer and J. L. Phipps asking that the road known as University Avenue, from Main street extending south as far as the College property and the lands of the Wolfville Fruit Land Improvement Co., be taken over, was read.

Letter read from Prof. A. E. Caldwell offering to make necessary plans of the town.

Resolved that the Revisors be paid five dollars per annum for service.

The following bills were read and ordered paid:—

Resolved that the council expresses its willingness to accept the dedication of University avenue extension, when presented to the Council in accordance with the requirements of the law.

Couns. Davison, Sawyer and Thomson were appointed supervisors of public lands and streets for the town of Wolfville.

Resolved that the clerk be instructed to notify immediately the citizens of the town in reference to the law respecting the dog tax.
