THE MIRAMICHI AND NASHWAAK ROAD.

We terminated our last article on this subject rather abruptly, but we take up the thread to-day and shall endeavor to make our argument more clear and conclusive. We have shown from the reports of Sandford Fleming, C. E., and Walter M. Buck, C. E., the estimated cost of construction in building both roads—that from Gibson to Apohaqui and that from Gibson to Chatham. In the event, then, of the new Brunswick Railroad, the question arises, which is the shorter, and most advisable route to the sea? Our article has helped to answer that question. Then there is a local feature we have left untouched, and that is the quality of the lands and the forests along the valleys of the Nashwaak and the Miramichi, as compared with those of that region lying between Gibson and Apohaqui. The former contains the most fertile soil of our Province can boast, and is densely timbered with superior spruce. The latter is about the most desolate and tree-begone wilderness in the Province. It runs for a great way through the coal measures above which the soil is good for nothing. Dreary swamps and marshes, and scrubby trees are all, except in a few patches, there is in favor of this road locally considered. These considerations should be weighed in reaching conclusions.

Some say the company will build a bridge across the St. John at Fredericton, at a cost of about \$600,000, and take their freight and travel by the Fredericton Branch and over the St. John and Maine to St. John. We think it is premature to say the company, if in possession of the road, has come to any such conclusion. They no doubt want a route of their own, running through the most profitable regions, and by the shortest way to a salt water port. We think Chatham stands first among the bidding ports, and the Nashwaak and Miramichi Valleys first among the aspiring routes. We shall see further. Now then notwithstanding the apparent disparity in mileage, the odds are greatly in favor of the longer and more direct line to Chatham. When we use the term "longer," it applies to construction and not to travel, as will hereafter be explained. The total quantities of earth, rock and masonry on the Nashwaak, Coal Creek and Apohaqui section, as before given, and not including the one-half mile between Gibson and the Nashwaak, respectively, in cubic yards, are:

Taking these three principal items of construction only, at the the Miramichi estimate, we have:

Again, we have under the head of bridge superstructure, on the first line, 1,427 tons of iron, representing \$80,020. And on the second line, as before given, 35,348 \$50,272.

Total on construction in favor of Miramichi line, \$708,975. Again, we have under the Subsidy Act of 1874, 112 1/2 miles, construction Miramichi Valley, \$562,500. 81 miles, construction, to Apohaqui, 407,500 155,000. Total amount to Credit of Miramichi Valley, \$868,975.

Which at the estimated cost per mile, before given, of 17,222, would be equivalent to a reduction of 50.11 miles of the whole length. Thus the great advantage this route has over that by the head of Grand Lake, to a very distant point from St. John, in point of cost of construction and direct transportation, becomes self-evident from the fair and impartial comparison we have drawn regarding our figures which are unquestionably correct. Now when Apohaqui is reached, one has to double back over the Intercolonial 39 miles, making the running distance from Gibson to St. John 120 miles; and this after performing a great circuit round an obscure coal region, involving heavy earthworks massive rock cuttings, and structures of vast magnitude with costly iron superstructures,—all to reach salt water at St. John, or in an opposite direction at Halifax. In the other case you travel straight ahead and reach salt water and a port on the Miramichi Bay, that had lately 125 full rigged ships taking in their cargoes of lumber up to and above New-Castle; and where every summer season the Gulf Shore Steamers come and go. And should Atlantic steamers come and go, taking New York as a centre, in the distances to Liverpool via Miramichi, Louisbourg and Halifax, passing Cape Clear, Miramichi has the shorter distal, over Louisbourg by 215 miles, and over Halifax by 232 miles.

A Presentation and Address to Post Master Thorne.

On Saturday night the junior clerks of the post office of this city waited on Mr. H. J. Thorne, the retiring Post Master, and presented him with a handsome silver ice pitcher and the address following:

H. J. THORNE, ESQ. DEAR SIR:—We meet you here this evening to tender you our sincere respects and our warmest appreciation we have for you as a kind and intelligent Master, and it is with a feeling of regret that we learn of your retirement from office as Post Master, and also of your removal from our midst as a citizen.

Your Obedient Servants, Wm. R. PHAIR, EDWIN VAYASOUR, ANDREW S. PHAIR. Frederickton, July 24th, 1880.

Presented to H. J. Thorne on his retirement from office as Post Master of Frederickton, by his clerks.

Mr. Thorne replied to the strikingly humble language of the address in a few kind words, telling the clerks and not his clerks, that he was pleased to have been the subject of such a complimentary address.

A New Kind of "Frolic." In country "destricts" it is quite common to have frolics. A frolic is just this: A farmer has a barn to raise, or a large acre of grain to cut down, or several acres of grain to put in.

Now, however, there is another kind of frolic. Several farmers through York and Carleton have had frolics this summer to "pick potato bugs."

St. John Notes. THE "Northampton" had not arrived up to noon to-day. The harbour has been enveloped with thick fog and men of curious tendencies have visited the ship.

It is reported that an excavation will shortly be made in Fort Howe immediately behind the Portland Police office, and a compartment made therein for the better security of prisoners.

If the weather be fine to-morrow look for a local party of excursionists, who go to seek a day of amusement in your city under the auspices of the Carleton Serenade Band.

What his remarks James Fitzgibbon, one of the libelists and one of the most able members of the Band of "we're going to have a high old time and Frederictonians are the boss people."

A PARTY of young men from Portland, went on an exploring expedition to Mt. Nash on Sunday. One of them a prayerful young man who went to church there lingered in the church after the rest had retired and had a narrow escape from being locked up.

3.30 P. M. The fog is clearing and the weather grows brighter. The Irish Friendly Picnic postponed to-day has a fair chance of taking place to-morrow.

How the Mohammedans Treat a Convert. Mr. Marden of Marsh, under date of February 9, gives the following account of a most interesting case which illustrates the attitude of Mohammedans towards Christianity:

"Mustapha, the only true convert from Mohammedanism in Central Turkey, has returned to Marsh, his native city, from which he was exiled some six years. The treatment he has received in consequence of his Christian faith, wherever Turkish law may be, is a fair sample of the extent of religious liberty allowed to Moslems."

"Mustapha was a quiet, industrious man, 'ving in comfortable circumstances, a tanner by trade. Some years ago he became so impressed by the reformation he saw in an Armenian convert to the Evangelical faith that he was led to examine and eventually accept the same faith himself, but soon after, in fear of the fanatical Moslems, he fled to Constantinople and hid himself in the multitudes of the great city. He was at length baptized by one of the American missionaries, and subsequently concealing his faith ventured back to Marsh. It was several years before he durst identify himself with the Christians, but at last he declared himself a Christian and abided the result."

"He abided church but two Sundays when he was arrested and brought before the magistrate. 'What is your religion asked the magistrate. 'I am a Christian,' was the reply. Then the magistrate storms out, 'What! take him to the prison.' An hour later, the son of Mustapha, a frail boy of sixteen, who shared his father's faith was thrust into the same prison. At midnight a party of policemen entered the prison, bound the hands of each behind his back, tied them to each other with a rope, and then, with a rope round the father's neck, led them forth, and then, mousing their horses they rode down through the dark and silent streets in the direction of Aleppo. They are allowed to send no message home, they receive no word of cheer from their friends, nor can they obtain any intimation of the fate that awaits them."

The Eastern Question.

LONDON, July 27. The Council of Ministers in Constantinople on Thursday decided upon a reply to the collective note of various Powers. The reply asked the Powers to agree in the principle that Janina, Larissa and Secco remain in the Turkish possession, and proposes that the Porte shall re-open negotiations with Greece on this basis.

A despatch from Cettinge to Vienna says the Montenegrin Envoy has been ordered to leave Constantinople within a month, in consequence of the Porte's refusal representing to the Powers that the Montenegrins were the aggressors in the fight they had recently with the Albanians.

A Constantinople correspondent repeats on the very best authority his statement that the Porte refuses to comply with the decisions of the Berlin Conference.

Germany has officially explained to the Powers, in a note, the extreme imperativeness of the Porte's engagement of German officers.

Austria is actually prepared to join the naval demonstration in favor of Montenegro. Each Power will contribute two men-of-war, and the two squadrons will be under joint English and French command.

GERMANY. BERLIN, July 26. A despatch says the German Government has expelled from the country some Mormon missionaries who were making proselytes.

Cable Briefs. The ex-Empress Eugenie landed in St. Helena, on the 13th instant, and inspected the house where Napoleon the First died. She visited the tomb in which the remains of the Emperor were first deposited, and afterward embarked for England.

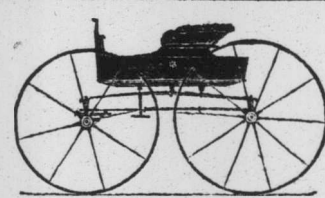
