TOPICS OF THE DAY.

A fifth satellite has been added to the four satellites of Jupiter discovered by Galileo in 1610. The discovery was made by Prof. Barnard of Mount Hamilton Observatory, Prof. Burhan, of the Lick Observatory, Cal., says: "The greatest astronomical achievement of the century, and which will mean the addition of another body to the solar system, which is in these days a most stupendous discovery."

Notwithstanding the strenuous methods employed by our neighbors to the south to stay the march of the influenza, which has reached their shores, but little advantage seems yet to have been gained. The Cleveland and Tammany parties have buried the hatchet and smoked the pipe of peace. The Cleveland party feel confident over the deal and now confidently expect to carry New York State. The negotiations which resulted in the uniting of Hill's and Cleveland's forces were opened up between leading Brooklyn demagogues and Senator Hill some weeks ago. The Senator's ominous silence since the set back he received at Chicago was telling severely on the spirit of the party, but now with New York state showing an unbroken front to the enemy, Cleveland party feel confident of victory within his grasp, and the rosters of the party are consequently anything but an unhappy mood. Without doubt Tammany's appetite must in the event of victory perching on Cleveland's banners be generous to Cleveland for their stepping down from the lofty pedestal on which silence had placed it.

There is a vacancy in the House of Commons through the resignation of Mr. C. N. Skinner, M. P. for St. John. It will be remembered that some months ago Mr. Skinner was appointed Judge of Probate for St. John. The resignation was made during the absence of the leader of the government, Mr. Blair. Considerable ill-feeling was engendered among Mr. Blair's supporters over the appointment, as Mr. Skinner claimed to be a conservative in federal politics. When Mr. Blair returned to severance these supporters who expected the premier themselves, became very lively and compelled the premier to notify Mr. Skinner that he must either resign his new office or his seat in parliament. He followed the latter course, and the crisis is therefore supremely happy. The thought of the great drubbing they will receive at the polls in the bye-election necessitated by Mr. Skinner's resignation.

The scenes enacted at Fire Island in New York harbor could scarcely be conceived to be possible in a civilized community, were it not that the American republic has of late years done so much to stifle us out of our dreams of progress in civilization and good government. In the great metropolis of the United States an armed mob of American citizens was allowed to terrorize several hundred men, women and children, and compel them to remain on a children-stricken ship, with difficulty being persuaded to allow such communication with the land as was necessary to procure food and clothing for the emigrants. As observed by a London paper these occurrences are an outrage on humanity, and furnish an example of official incompetency and of anarchy without parallel in any other country. The Fire Island quarantine lawlessness, and the Homestead carnage, show that we need not go to darkest Africa to search for barbarism. "In the midst of our most highly civilized communities the savage mirth breaks at seasons through the gilded pall.—Ottawa Citizen.

QUEBEC, Sept. 16.—A large party of Swedes and Norwegians who came by the Allan liner Mongolia, on route for the Western States, have, owing to the quarantine regulations of the United States, decided to remain in Canada. The Allan refunded the value of the tickets from Quebec to the Western States, and this money will be used to purchase tickets via the C. P. R. and G. T. R. to points principally in the Northwest, where the party will settle.

A "GIANTIC" STEAMER.

LONDON, Sept. 19.—The White Star company has commissioned the great Belfast ship builders, Harland & Wolff to build an Atlantic steamer that will beat the record in size and speed. She has already been named Gigantic, and will be 700 feet long, 65 feet 7 1/2 inches beam and 14,500 horse power. It is calculated that she will steam twenty-two knots an hour with a maximum speed of twenty-seven knots. She will have three screws, two fitted like the Majestic's, and the third in the centre. She is to be ready for sea in March, 1897.

'Tis the Carroll this Time.

The Steamer Carroll, a sister ship of the Worcester and Britannia, has now had her turn in the accident line. World's Fair Souvenir Coins.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 16.—The half-dollar souvenir coins which are to be issued in payment of the appropriation made by Congress for the world's fair, were a subject of discussion today between Director-General Davis, who is here, and Mr. Leach, the director of the mint.
