## Bloodthirsty Annan Bandits.

Lyons, France, July 2.—Feroocious bandits who torture prisoners held for ransom are not yet extinct, as some modern writers have complained. A thrilling tale of capture, twenty days of torture and death threatened momentarily, has just been brought from Annan, Asia, by Henry Voisin, who has returned here to remain his health shattered as the result of his terrible experience.

M. Voisin, who is employed by a French construction company, was captured nearly a year ago by a bandit and pirate chieftain named Detham, who for years has committed deeds of violence in the French protectorate and is still uncaptured.

Voisin is the only white man who has ever escaped from his clutches. "I was journeying to Hanot to inspect some works," said Mr. Voisin, "and was riding in a 'pushpush' cart when suddenly the coolies propelling the conveyance fled. I grasped my revolver when I saw about thirty armed Annamites with levelled guns. They fired and I answered with my revolver, retaining one bullet as a last resource. The battle was short. I was felled with two blows of a rifle butt and bound. Annamite fashion, with my elbows behind my back, the thong being then passed around my neck.

"There were hundreds of peaceful natives working in the fields nearby, but they did not interfere. I was led to a gate screened with vines, then through a dense bamboo thicket, and finally to a mud-walled fort within which fifty armed men were seated in a circle around Chief Detham. The latter's head, eyebrows, eyelashes and face were shaved. He wore khaki clothes and a broad belt of buffalo skin. I noticed a frail little woman, who was Detham's third wife. She seemed miserable and I pitied her, but before I left the fort she had demanded my head twenty times.

"When the bandits found that I was neither an official nor a soldier they consented to hold me for ransom, but until the negotiations were finished they threatened daily to put me to death, and inflicted indescribable tortures upon me. The mere memory of my terrible experience makes me feel faint."

Since Voisin was ransomed a number of the bandits, including the leader's bloodthirsty wife, have been captured and sent in chains to the French military prison on the island of Cayenne.

## Bloodthirsty Annan Bandits.

Lyons, France, July 2.—Feroocious bandits who torture prisoners held for ransom are not yet extinct, as some modern writers have complained. A thrilling tale of capture, twenty days of torture and death threatened momentarily, has just been brought from Annan, Asia, by Henry Voisin, who has returned here to remain his health shattered as the result of his terrible experience.

M. Voisin, who is employed by a French construction company, was captured nearly a year ago by a bandit and pirate chieftain named Detham, who for years has committed deeds of violence in the French protectorate and is still uncaptured.

Voisin is the only white man who has ever escaped from his clutches. "I was journeying to Hanot to inspect some works," said Mr. Voisin, "and was riding in a 'pushpush' cart when suddenly the coolies propelling the conveyance fled. I grasped my revolver when I saw about thirty armed Annamites with levelled guns. They fired and I answered with my revolver, retaining one bullet as a last resource. The battle was short. ### Kaiser's Disclaimer.

BERLIN, July 12.

The Foreign Office has given out an authorized statement respecting the letter of Emperor William to President Madrid of Nicaragua. Reports have reached Berlin that attempts were being made in America to construe this letter in an endorsement by the Emperor of the Madrid party. The statement follows: "Madrid gave notice of his action upon undertaking the presidency in the usual written form. The customary reply was prepared by the Foreign Office and was not an autograph letter but was simply signed by the Emperor. The address great and good friend was in accordance with official courtesy. Any intimation by Germany in Nicaraguan affairs neither followed nor is intended. Germany neither sought nor designs to seek a cooling state. The designs of Germany's intentions toward the Galapagos Islands are equally without foundation, as are all suggestions that the German Government in any way modified the cultivation of friendly relations toward the United States." The Emperor's letter was dated April 26th, and said: "I am informed by your letter of the 27th December of last year that your Excellency was elected President of the Republic by the merited confidence of your fellow citizens, and that your Excellency entered upon your most honorable duties on the 21st of that month. An expression of the usual diplomatic good wishes and congratulations for the cultivation of good relations between the two countries followed.

### BOMBARD PIRATES.

HONG KONG, July 13.—A Portuguese gun-boat yesterday morning with troops to-day bombarded the Pirate settlement on the island of Colowan destroying the houses and killing many natives. ### EARTH DISTURBANCES.

MUNICH, Bavaria, July 13.—A sharp earthquake was felt here at 9.45 o'clock this morning. The walls of several buildings were cracked. The wavelike movement continued for three seconds thoroughly terrifying the people who fled from their homes and remained in the streets long after the disturbance had ceased.

### FRENCH STANDARD TIME.

### FIVE KILLED IN EXPLOSION OF DIRIGIBLE.

LEICHLINGEN, RHENISH, Prussia, July 13.—The dirigible balloon in which accused and recently refitted for a passenger service was destroyed in midair to-day through the explosion of a benzine tank, and his crew of four men dropped to their death. The bodies of the aviators were frightfully mangled. The gondola was torn to bits and the motor buried itself beneath the surface of the ground.

### BANK AMALGAMATION.

MONTREAL, July 13.—The negotiations which have been in progress for some time looking to the purchase, by the Royal Bank of Halifax have been concluded, and it is now officially stated that the purchase has been effected. The deal is subject to the ratification of the shareholders of both institutions, but there seems little doubt that this will be forthcoming. In due time special meetings will be called to place the matter before them in proper shape the manner in which the Royal will finance the deal and the terms of the purchase have not yet been prepared for public announcement.

### AMERICAN REPUBLICS CONFERENCE.

BUNOS AYRES, July 12.—The fourth International Conference of American Republics was formally opened to-day in this city and will remain in session for 5 weeks. It was marked by a brilliant assemblage of delegates representing the United States and the Latin American Republics. P. C. Knox, the American Secretary of State and Dr. De La Plaza, the Argentine Foreign Minister were named as honorary presidents. The reports of a Latin American Coalition against the United States was the subject of much ridicule. The addresses of welcome was delivered by Dr. De La Plaza, and Hy. White former American Ambassador to France responded in English on behalf of all the delegates. The present conference plans to adopt a series of conventions and resolutions for the good of the various states on the American Continent, subject to ratification by the Governments concerned. In some quarters this gathering is regarded as second only to the great Peace Conference at the Hague.

The house was owned by Mrs. Taylor and we understand that it and its contents were fully covered by insurance.

### Distinguished Airmen Killed.

**BOURNEMOUTH, Eng., July 12.**  
 The first flying tour of the year in England was brought to a tragic close this morning by the death of the most daring and popular British aviator, the Hon. Chas. Rolls, the third son of Lord Llangattock. In the presence of a great crowd, the majority of whom were ladies and children and many personal friends of the young man, the Wright airplane on which he was flying, fell suddenly with terrific speed from a height of 100 feet. It struck the ground close to the crowded grand stand, was smashed into a tangled mass, and before the doctors could reach the spot Rolls was dead. The event for which he was competing was a prize for the man alighting nearest to a given spot. The goal was directly in front of the grand stand, where the spectators were massed. He had risen to a good height, shut off his motor and was gliding in a broad circle towards the mark. Without warning the tail piece of the machine snapped off. The machine gave a sudden lurch and the frame work crumpled up in the air. When it struck the ground it was smashed in splinters. The wreck of the machine surrounded the body so that there was difficulty in extricating him. The flying for the day was suspended. Rolls is the tenth victim of the modern science of aviation.

### Training Teachers.

Upwards of 30 Salvation Army school teachers have been advantage of the opportunity afforded by their Commanding Officer to attend the summer classes which have been inaugurated for the improvement of the teaching staff. Instead of spending their vacation in their homes in different parts of the island, have willingly sacrificed that pleasure in order to improve themselves for more efficient service in the profession.  
 Staff Captain Cave, the Officer in charge of the Educational affairs of the Army on the island, is very anxious to bring his teachers up to the highest standard possible, and in order to do this, have secured the service of several of the teaching authorities on Education to give a series of lectures to the classes. These lectures will include the management of school, teaching of different subjects, the necessity of personal improvement, the responsibility of teachers to the country and Empire, the development of character in order to turn out good citizens, how hygiene should be taught to the young, the first aid to the injured.

On Tuesday morning Mr. Vincent Burke gave a lecture to the class on the management of the young and how to teach some of the subjects. He gave some very practical advice, illustrating it by little incidents which occurred in his own experience, at the close of which the teachers expressed their hearty thanks to Mr. Burke for his kindness in sparing so much of his valuable time to impart to them such valuable instruction.

The return home was made at 2 a.m. to-day.

### News by Glencoe.

Passengers by the Glencoe who came in here by Tuesday night's train say that the Grace is loading new fish at Ross Blanche for Europe and that fish is scarce there at present. They say that two bankers arrived at Burtin Tuesday and that both looked very deep as they sailed into the harbour. Hon. C. Emerson, who came down from Fortune Bay says that all the bankers are doing extremely well. The craft fishing at Peters Bank, especially are taking good fares and will do far better than last season. The lobster fishery about Fortune Bay is an improvement on last year, the pack being larger and the fish larger and of better quality. The cod fishery around the bay is very poor. Fogs are very prevalent and squid are just now striking in. The fishermen hope to do better with this bait.

### Received Injuries.

While working on the s.s. Tobacco at Pitts' premises Tuesday driving the winch, a young man named Stephen Whelan had the flesh cut from his hand when a wire hawser wound round the drum of the winch was hauled taut as he sent it ahead to hoist a "sling" of cargo. His face also was brought down on the winch with great force and he narrowly escaped receiving very dangerous injury. His hand was attended to by a doctor.

### How to Catch a Seal

When the white man and the Esquimaux meet, it is a question which will learn the more from the other. Certain it is that the Esquimaux lays under tribute everything that comes under his observation, turning it to wise account. His method of hunting the seal is a direct 'steal' from the Polar bear. The Esquimaux father takes his son of eight or ten years with him for a long day on the ice and bids him watch the bear kill the seal, telling him that the closer he can imitate the stratagem of that sly

hunter the better. What do the Inuit father and son see in that Polar kindergarten?  
 A seal is on the ice by the side of its hole stretching its flippers luxuriously in the year's first sunshine. The big white bear has sighted his prey from behind an ice hummock at a distance when the seal appears but a black speck. Throwing himself on his side, the bear, himself not much removed from the color of the ice, 'hitches' himself along in much the same fashion, as a baby crawls. The seal at this season takes short cat-naps of twenty or thirty seconds

each, waking up from each one and surveying the landscape o'er. When the seal sleeps, Bruin hitches. As the seal opens his eyes the bear lifts his head and imitates the voice of another seal, the sound being so deceptive that a man's ear cannot detect the imitation. The admiring Inuit calls this 'talking seal,' and bids his little lad practice it in his play-time.  
 This alternate 'hitching' and 'talking seal' goes on until the bear is within striking distance, when a sudden rising to his four feet and a powerful pounce ends the duel of duplicity

on one side and drowsiness on the other. If the seal is quick enough to reach his hole before the hidden umpire of destinies calls 'Strike one,' he makes a home-run and congratulates himself. For those who would bet on the game, it is fair to say that the seal does not succeed one time out of ten.  
 The Inuit, from top to toe dressed in skins, looks even more like a seal than a bear does, and pursues his quarry from a distance in identically the same way, saying that if he could 'talk seal' as well as a bear he would have better success.—Agnes



## The Mongolian Arrived Yesterday.

The S. S. Mongolian arrived here at 6 a.m. yesterday from Liverpool, after a run of 8 days. 
