Public Notice.

St. John's Municipal Council.

WHEREAS Rules and Regulations in relation to Cab Fares were published by the Municipal Council in the "Royal Gazette" on Tuesday, April 9th, A.D. 1912;

AND WHEREAS on May 16th, A.D. 1912, a notice was published that the enforcement of the said Rules and Regulations, with the exception of Sections 1 and 2, were deferred until the 30th day of June at the request of the Right Hon. the Premier for the purpose of holding a conference with the Representatives for St. John's East and West in the Legislature and the Officers of the Cabmen's Union;

AND WHEREAS it is desirable that the time for the enforcement of the said Rules and Regulations herein referred to be further deferred for the purpose of holding the said conference;

BE IT RESOLVED that the enforcement of the said Rules and Regulations, with the exception of Sections 1 and 2, be further deferred until the first day of August next.

Sections 1 and 2 herein referred to are as follows:—

1. No person shall ply for hire with any cab without having obtained a License therefor.
2. Every application for a cab License shall be made not later than the 15th day of April in each year.

Any person failing to comply with the provisions of Sections 1 and 2 before referred to shall be liable on conviction before the Magistrate to a penalty not exceeding five dollars (\$5.00), and in default of payment, to imprisonment for a period not exceeding ten days.

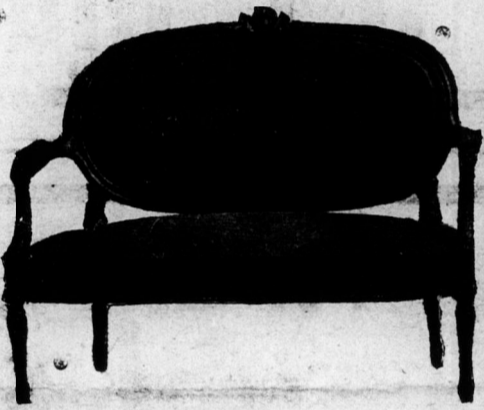

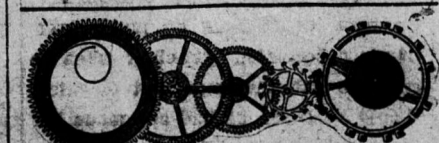

Episcopal Visitation at Bell Island.

On Saturday, June 29th. His Grace Archbishop Howley accompanied by Monsignor Roche, V.G. went to Bell Island to perform the Episcopal Visitation. The occasion was also availed of for the blessing of a new bell and the consecration of an altar, both presided by the good Syrians of the Maronite Rite who form a large portion of the congregation.

The Archbishop and suite went by motor, kindly lent by Mr. Reid. At the Cove the Episcopal Party was met by the Rev. Father McGrath, the worthy pastor of Bell Island, and a deputation of the principal inhabitants of the place. The steamer "Othar" was ready at the wharf with steam up, and under the able guidance of Capt. Sedgman a happy and speedy transit of about twenty minutes landed the party at "The Beach". A large concourse of people lined the pier and landing place, and a most hearty welcome was tendered to His Grace and party. The welkin resounded with cheering and a splendid display of variegated bunting fluttered on every side and made a beautiful picture in contrast with the green fields and russet groves. It was only an hour and twenty minutes from the time the Archbishop left the Palace till he found himself comfortably seated in the hospitable home of the Reverend Pastor of Bell Island. The evening was occupied by the priests preparing the children for Confirmation. On Sunday Morning, June 30th, His Grace celebrated Mass at The Mines, Wabana.

Immediately before the Mass a very interesting ceremony took place, a beautiful illuminated address to His Grace was read by Mr. Joseph Murphy on behalf of the Syrian Community and the presentation was made of the Altar and bell donated by the Maronites. His Grace replied in suitable language. The address and reply appended. His Grace then consecrated the Altar and Tabernacle, and celebrated Mass for the first time on the new altar. The bell was blessed after Last Mass in St. Michael's Church of St. Michael's.

An early Mass had already been celebrated by the Rt. Rev. Monsignor Roche. At the close of the High Mass the Pontifical Blessing was given by His Grace who then proceeded to perform the very beautiful ceremony of the bell. His Grace explained in a few brief words the mystical meaning of the function and the origin and use of the bells in the church. The vast congregation which filled the spacious edifice listened with wrapt attention. The Choir under the direction of Miss Nugent rendered the sacred chants in a very superior manner, especially the music of the solemn entry of the Bishop into the church which was performed for the first time in accordance with the late decrees of the Pope. The congregation were then dismissed with orders to assemble again at 10 o'clock when the Sacrament of Confirmation would be administered.

At 2 o'clock the church was again filled with a vast and interested congregation, among whom were the children prepared for Confirmation. His Grace robed in full pontificals gave a simple and instructive exhortation on the nature and the effects of the Sacrament, which was listened to with great and respectful attention. Then the sacrament was administered to the candidates, 82 males and 72 females.

The function was terminated by the conferring of solemn Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, and so terminated a most impressive and fruitful visitation which will long be remembered and cherished by the devout and fervent people.

ADDRESS OF THE MARONITES To His Grace, the Most Reverend Michael F. Howley, D.D., Archbishop and Metropolitan of the Archdiocese of St. John's, Newfoundland.

The address of the undersigned Assyrians of Bell Island setteth forth. 2.—That as Christians we believe we have watched and taken a part in its industrial growth and welfare and look forward to the future for its further development and expansion.

2.—That a Christians we believe there can be no real growth, no real prosperity, or no solid foundation of civilisation laid without the teaching of the Gospel and an obedience to and communion with the Pope of Rome. 3.—That it is our proud privilege to-day to be able to claim both traditionally and historically that our ancestors had heard and listened to the preaching of Jesus Christ Himself.

4.—That it is also a tradition with us that the Most Adorable Sacrifice of the Mass was first offered in our Language, and that through the special favour of His Holiness the Pope we still have the privilege of offering it according to the Maronite Rite.

5.—That it is unnecessary to remind one so well versed in the history and traditions of Christianity as you, Grace, that we are called Maronites after St. Maro, a French Priest, who in the perturbed times of A. D. 565 came

out to preach to us and fan the embers of faith into a ruddy glow.

6.—That we, the oldest Christians in the world, have, suffered for the Faith that is in us ever since the Hegira down to the present time, but why repeat a story known world wide, or why recall tales of butchery that made a Napoleon land troops in Palestine and called forth the fierce antagonism of the immortal Gladstone.

7.—That in welcoming you to Bell Island we claim that we are lineal descendants of men who heard Christ preach and as a token of the Faith that is in us, we, Your children, Most Reverend Father, ask you to accept of us to bless and dedicate this bell which shall call the faithful to worship, and this Altar upon which shall soon rest the Most Adorable Body and Blood of Jesus Christ Our Saviour.

We are your devoted children as undersigned, and date this address of jubilation this day of June, 1912.

REPLY OF HIS GRACE THE ARCH-BISHOP.

Dear People of Bell Island.—

It is a great joy to me to-day to find myself among you and to witness the signs of material prosperity which I see on all sides. No less, but a great deal more, pleasing is it for me to

know that this material prosperity goes hand in hand with the moral advancement of your community in all branches of life, and that your record is a proud one for sobriety, charity, purity of conduct, and intellectually that you bear your standard high among the ranks of our countrymen. In the presence of your worthy Parish Priest I cannot not say much of a personal character; but I should be lacking in plain and simple justice if I did not say hear to-day that in a great measure is owing to the noble example and wise precepts of your clergyman this high and enviable position which you occupy and embellish, and I am sure I can say the same of the clergyman of other Denominations among you. To our worthy people of the Syrian race and of the Maronite rite who dwell among us I must this day address a special word of congratulation. You are to-day making two beautiful and costly presents to the Church, an altar and a bell. These will, for generations to come, stand forth as monuments of your faith and generosity.

I appreciate fully all you say in your beautiful address, as to the ancient glory of your nation. I have had the great happiness, a few years ago when travelling in those holy places which were once trodden by the footsteps of our Divine Saviour, to visit that portion of Palestine from which you come. The grand City of Beyrouth and fertile slopes of Monte Libano show the industry and progressive character of your people.

I saw the magnificent Church of the founder of your rite, St. Maro, I enjoyed the hospitality of your Venerable Patriarch in his grand Palace of Bekkeri. I met there, among the Bishops and Prelates who formed the Court of His Beatitude, many who have been fellow-students of mine at Propaganda College, Rome. The Patriarch Monsignor Habib Haggi was a saintly and venerable man. His

great boast was that his See is the oldest in the world, he is the successor of Peter as Bishop of Antioch, before Peter came to Rome. The language used in the ritual of the Syrian rite is the same, the Chaldaic, that was spoken by Our Lord Himself when on earth. The Maronite Church retains the proud boast of being the only branch of the Eastern Church which never fell away into schism, but always remained firmly attached to the See of Rome, and the Patriarch declared himself to me as "The brother of the Pope."

Household Notes. To prevent metal teapots taking on a musty odor, put a lump of sugar into the pot before putting it away. If a piece of putty is wrapped in oiled paper and kept in a covered tin can it will keep pliable for a long time. Unbutton all clothing before sending it to the laundry and you will find fewer buttons will be lost or broken. To clean lacquered brass, wash it in hot water, using soap if necessary. Polishes should be applied to unlacquered brass only. Dusty and faded straw hats may be improved in appearance by being well rubbed with a piece of velvet of the same color as the straw. To apply hair tonic to the scalp use a medicine dropper, as it enables you not only to gauge the amount, but to apply it to the spot desired. To turn a cake easily out of a tin set the tin on a wet cloth for a few seconds immediately after removing it from the oven, and then turn it out. To keep gloves shapely press small pieces of absorbent cotton into the tips before putting them away. They will be less likely to rip if they receive this care. Save the stocking legs. There is nothing better for dusting and wiping polished wood. Dampen them in boiled oil and they will give the wood a splendid polish. Tiled vestibules, especially the old-fashioned black and white tiles, may be kept shiny by rubbing once a week with a little linseed oil. Polish with a dry cloth of chamolis. To get the best results in canning fruit, use good, ripe fruit. It is a mistake to think by waiting till fruit is poor and cheap one can get from it just as good results in canning. The next time that you pass a real Japanese store, invest in a bamboo fan holder—not for fans, oh, no, but for the most artistic flower holder that you ever put in your American home. To make candles self-tilting, do not cut the candle, but hold its end for a few moments in hot water. This will soften the wax, and then the candle may be easily pressed down into the candlestick. To banish moths from carpet put powdered borax around the edge of the carpet and work it into the pile where the heavier (and, therefore, less frequently moved) pieces of furniture stand.

Afterward wipe with a clean cloth, wrung out of hot water, in order to remove the smell of the oil. The Police Court.

Nine drunks were discharged. A drunk and disorderly was fined \$5 or 14 days. Two men who pleaded guilty to assaulting citizens and also assaulting the police were fined \$5 and \$10 respectively, and were also ordered to find bonds for future good behaviour. Another who assaulted Joseph Greenslade was fined \$5 or 14 days. A drunk and disorderly was fined \$2 or 7 days. A drunk for the fifth time was fined \$2 or 7 days. A fireman, Peter Goutar, of Russia was up on two charges—(1) assaulting and wounding Geo. Whelan with a razor on his head, (2) assaulting and wounding Henry Hodgkinson. He was not asked to plead to the first charge as the wounded man is in hospital in a serious condition and may not recover. He was convicted on the second count and was remanded pending the recovery or otherwise of the wounded man. A seaman, drunk and disorderly and assaulting the police, was fined \$5 or 14 days, and a drunk for the 7th time was fined \$5 or 14 days. At 12 o'clock a fishery case was up for hearing before Judge Knight. There was a large number of witnesses and at 1 o'clock the case was not concluded. This was a dispute as to a trap berth.

Died at Montreal

To-day Mr. Henry Maunder, shoemaker, had a wire from Montreal informing him of the death there of his son, Henry, who was book-keeper in his uncle's establishment. He was a bright, promising young chap, only 21 years old, and went away about three weeks ago on a holiday. He died at 10 a.m. Tuesday of abscess of the liver. Only a few nights ago another son of Mr. Maunder's was seriously injured while cycling down King's Bridge Road. The parents and relatives of the deceased are deeply sympathized with in their bereavement.

Family Poisoned.

At Black Brook, Labrador, an Eskimo, his son and daughter died on the 10th June after partaking of seal, which it is thought contained some poisonous matter. The wife and mother, who did not eat the food, roared 20 miles to Holy Harbor to tell the people there. Up to date two bodies were left in the hut they occupied in an advanced stage of decomposition and unburied.

At Battle Harbor the fishery is good, and Shannahan at Bolster's Rock has 25 qts ashore. The officers of the ship think that the Labrador fishery when the ice clears off, will be a big one. Capt. Parsons is in along the coast. Her passengers were Mr. Stephany and wife and 3 children, Rev. Mr. Weir and Capt. Marshall.

Back From the Wreck.

The s.s. Fogota got back from the wreck of the Wilhelmina at 5 p.m. Tuesday with 150,000 feet of spruce deals, salvaged from her, and as passengers Hon. M. P. Cashin, W. Crossbie, Tasker Cook and R. B. St. Hill. The Wilhelmina is ashore at Sculpin Cove, 5 miles east of Peter's River, and is a hopeless wreck. The Fogota arrived at the scene at daylight Monday, the water was smooth, and with the aid of Trepassey men the crew had the 10 loads by 10 that night. The Fogota went to Peter's River Tuesday morning to get two of the stranded ship's boats, but they being heavy and no men about to help put them on board, they were left behind. Those who were first at the ship, it is reported by the Fogota, stripped the saloon, took the captain's nautical instruments and personal belongings, and Magistrate Hogan is trying to recover them. The ship has on board 2½ million feet of deals. The Amphitrite is freighting it to Cape Broyle and 40 sail of craft were alongside at salvage work when the Fogota left, and will bring the cargo to Trepassey.

Cable News in Brief.

An attempt was made to assassinate Sir Francis Henry May, Governor of Hong Kong. A Chinese rushed at the Governor near the Post Office and fired a revolver, but the bullet merely perforated the chair on which the Governor was seated without doing further harm. Intense excitement prevails.

Four persons have been arrested at Cairo charged with plotting to kill the Premier of Egypt.

There are rumors of a rupture between the Asquith party and the Labour party over a Government candidate standing at the Hanley bye-election. Forty-four votes are in jeopardy.

Regina is being rebuilt after the tornado. Three thousand are homeless. The Banks are coming to the aid by extending credit and a stream of subscriptions is pouring in. The death list reaches 28.

A great reception is being recorded in London to the Hon. R. L. Borden, Premier of the Dominion. The Times and the Daily Mail lead off in the praises of praise.

The shareholders of the Royal Bank at a meeting yesterday ratified an amendment to consolidate the Royal Bank into one institution, and also authorized a proposed increase of capital.

Diocesan Synod.

July 2—Afternoon Session.
 Adjourned session opened at 3.35 p.m., Lord Bishop presiding.
 Upon reading the minutes a slight error was pointed out in His Lordship's ruling re Rev. G. S. Chamberlain's question as regards the duties of Church Warden. The answer was "No Church Warden can take any action without the consent of the other Warden or of the Incumbent."
 On motion of Canon Smith the Rules of Proceedings were suspended during the remainder of this session.
 Canon Bolt addressed the Synod on the work and objects of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.
 Upon motion of Canon Bolt the House went into Committee on second reading of Bill re Deacons' Stipends. It was proposed to increase the stipend from \$800 to \$900. Sir W. Horwood introduced an amendment to include Priests under 5 years, \$600. At this stage of the proceedings the venerable Canon Pilot entered the Synod and received a hearty welcome. House rose at 5.30.

Evening Session.
 House resumed at 7.30, Lord Bishop presiding.
 Mr. Churchill, pursuant to notice, moved a 25 per cent. increased assessment on parishes and missions. Canons Colley, Noel, White, Smith, Bolt, Sir W. Horwood and Messrs. Withers, LeMessurier and Blackall took part in debate. Mr. Blackall moved an amendment that the Synod be in accord with the Executive Committee in the opinion that the time has arrived for the revision of the assessment of missions.
 Sir W. Horwood moved a substitute motion for the whole that a Committee be appointed to take into consideration the whole question of stipends and assessments. Sir W. Horwood's motion was carried. The following Committee was appointed: Executive Committee, Rural Deans, Revs. Canon Colley, J. T. Hiscock, A. E. Taik, and Messrs. Blackall, Earle, Barnes, Greve and Churchill.
 Canon Smith moved the third reading of the Ordination Candidates' Fund, which was passed.

Mr. Blackall's report to provide boarding accommodation for girls attending Bishop Spencer College was adopted, as well as the four Resolutions appended to the Report.
 Mr. LeMessurier's Bill to amend Chap. 23 of Constitution and Rules, with reference to statistics. After some discussion was not accepted.
 Canon Bolt's motion for the adoption of the four Resolutions in connection with the Report on Education, which were agreed to.

On motion of Canon Smith the House adjourned till 7.30 to-morrow evening. The Bishop pronounced the Benediction.
 July 3—Evening Session.
 House opened at 7.30, Lord Bishop presiding.
 Mr. Barnes presented report of Committee on Stipends and Assessments, which was on motion received.
 Mr. Blackall was not aware that a report from the Committee on Religious Instructions in day schools was expected at this session.
 Canon Bolt moved that a Committee consisting of the Synod Secretaries and Messrs. J. A. Clift and J. A. Winter consider the Constitution and Rules of the Synod, incorporating Acts passed since 1904, &c., and have same published in pamphlet form. Carried.
 Mr. Barnes moved the adoption of Report on Stipends and Assessments, and that the Executive Committee have full power to work along the recommendations and suggestions. Canon Bolt, with consent of Synod, withdrew Bill on Stipends, and moved the House into Committee on Mr. Barnes' Report.
 Sir W. Horwood moved the following as sub-sec. 5, sec. 3: That as soon as funds permit the Executive Committee raise the Priests' stipends irrespective of foregoing scale. Carried.

On motion Committee rose and reported Bill as amended. Bill read a third time and passed.
 Canon Bolt drew attention of the clergy to irregularity of electing lay representatives, and asked them to hold such elections in accordance with the Act.
 Mr. Blackall's motion that the Bishop be requested to invite the Committee appointed to consider the question of securing and training candidates for Holy Orders to continue its work, drew forth a spirited debate, with the result that the motion was lost on division.
 Canon Colley moved that the Synod send its greetings to the Lay Readers and place on record its high appreciation of the good and valuable work rendered by the church in this Diocese by them. The motion was carried by acclamation.
 The Clerical Secretary reported to the Bishop that the Synod had passed during the session certain B.H.s., which His Lordship assented to.
 After several votes of thanks had been passed, the 20th Biennial Session was brought to a close.

Assaulted With Razor

AND BADLY WOUNDED.
A stabbing affray took place on board the s.s. Morwenna between 7 and 8 o'clock last night. Several of the ship's crew had been drinking heavily during the afternoon. They went aboard their ship shortly after the public houses close. Soon after entering the forecastle a series of altercations arose. Suddenly a Russian stoker brandished a razor and used it on a Newfoundland stoker. The latter was badly wounded and now lies in the General Hospital. Peter Goutan was the assailant and the victim was George Whelan, a native of Harbor Grace. He made a charge at Whelan and took him a few inches below the right thigh and drew the razor nearly up to the side, inflicting a nasty wound nearly a foot long. Whelan collapsed on the forecastle floor, where he lay bleeding profusely until the arrival of help from those on shore. Head Const. Starrow, Sheppard, Sergt. Byrne and four policemen were promptly on the scene. Dr. Tait was summoned. He applied ligatures to stop the flow of blood from the wounded man, who was so weak that it was thought death would follow. Later the ambulance as called and Whelan was brought ashore on a stretcher and conveyed to Hospital.

Obituary

Yesterday afternoon Mr. James B. Foot died after a short illness at his residence, Queen Street. Mr. Foot, who was in his 63rd year, was a native of Carbonear, and for years kept an hotel on Queen Street. He was a man of kindly temperament, honest and upright, and a host of friends will bear of his death with sorrow. Besides the widow there are left to mourn him his father, Capt. Foote, Miss Hopkins, of St. John's, and Mrs. Udel, of Carbonear, both sisters of the deceased. Mr. John Taylor, shipwright, is a nephew of the deceased. The Telegram extends its sympathy to the widow and relatives.
