





Brewin and the Russian, at he latter's request, took off their out-ide garments and a fictic encounter usued. The foreigner is a big burly ellow of unusual physique. The ex-fbition was a manly one but it only asted ten minutes as the St. John's Russian managed to get clear and ran below to his bunk, seized a razor and a hammer. Again he hastened to the deck bent on doing something desperate, while the two weapons that he flourished, terrorized his shipmates Jeremiah Joy, a sailor lad, who was making his first voyage, was slashed in the back with the razor. The avengeful Russian was not satisfied with that, but later on in the night went into the quarters where Brewin was sleeping and struck him in the head with a hammer and knocked him insensible for several hours.
