
CANADIAN MOUNTED RIFLES FOR EGYPT.

Ottawa, Jan. 21.—It is understood that at least three Canadian regi-ments of mounted rifles will be sent to Egypt to join the British, Indian and Australian troops there. A por-tion of the Canadians now in England will probably be sent to Egypt as mounted rifles under command of Colonel Victor Williams, while the balance of a Canadian brigade for Egyptica service will be made up balance of a Canadian brigade for Egyptian service will be made up from the nine regiments of mounted rifles now being formed in Canada in connection with the second expedi-tionary force. The character of the operations in Egypt gives a particu-lar good field for useful work for mounted corps, and Canada can sup-ply, if needed, three or four brigades of mounted rifles for service there.
