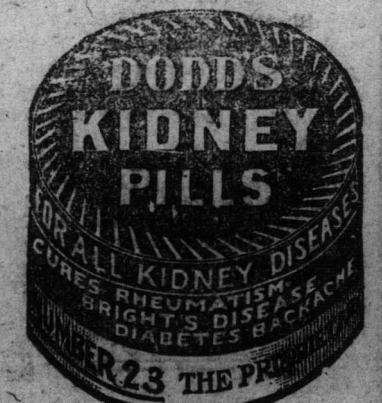
### Your Boys and Girls.

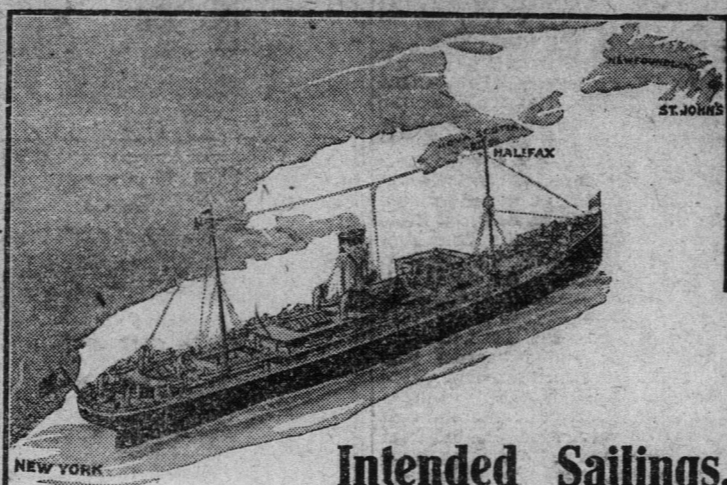
