

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### Private F. B. Adey MAKES THE SUPREME SACRIFICE.

Dear Mr. Editor,-Allow me to place n record the death on March 20th of one of our noble boys, Enoch B. Adey, of Marystown, T.B., from wounds re-ceived on the battle front in France. Enoch was the son of Mr J. P. Adey Enoch was the son of Mr J. P. Adey and at the opening of the war he, with his brother Edgar, was working in Canada. Both enlisted in the Second Canadian Division. Enoch was listed as private soldier, 5th Can. Infantry, 25th Battalion, and was serving his fourteenth month in the service and his eighth month on active service in his eighth month on active service in Flanders. He had been through many hard scraps in dangerous positions while serving through the cold and rainy winter months, and had come successfully through it all until the evening of March 7th. With part of his unit he had been working for a few hours behind the front line of trenches and just as the work was finished he was shot through the back, number he was shot through the back, receiving a fatal wound. As soon as possible he was removed to a base hospital, but he could not be saved and died on the morning of March 20th. Here prother Edgar, serving on the staff of the Canadian Field Ar-tillery, 5th Brigade, was with him at the end to cheer and comfort him and the end to cheer and comfort him, and on the 21st he was buried with mili-tary honors, wrapped in the flag for which he had died. The loss to the father, brother and little sister who emain is indeed great, but they are comforted in knowing that he died a "Greater love can no man have than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends." He was a favourite in his unit, was well liked by his offi-To such noble boys, many of whom have paid the supreme sacrifice, we to-day owe our liberty. Let us cher-ich their nemers in our memories and sh their names in our memories and show our appreciation of their sac-rifice by finishing the glorious work they have begun.-Cor.
