





Public Notice

I am directed by His Excellency the Governor in Council to issue the following notice under Authority of Minute in Council passed 28th February, 1918.

Augmentation of the Pay of Royal Naval Reservists Newfoundland.


The Government of Newfoundland have decided to augment the pay of Newfoundland Royal Naval Reservists so as to place them on the same footing as men of the Newfoundland Regiment.

Under the provision of the War Measure Act, authority is given to the Minister of Militia to deal with the matter of augmentation of pay of the Royal Naval Reservists, Nfld., in consultation with the Senior Naval Officer, St. John's. It is ordered that a sum of 33c. per day be placed to the credit of each Naval Reservist from the time of commencement of the war, in cases where men were then serving, or otherwise, from the time when their services began up to the time of discharge, or of death, or to the 30th of September, 1917, inclusive.

As the rate of pay of Naval Reservists was increased from October 1st, 1917, and as the difference between the amount they receive and that allowed the members of The Royal Newfoundland Regiment is 17c. per day, this difference will also be credited them from that date.

The foregoing amounts will not in any case be made a payment from Admiralty sources. The Minister of Militia, St. John's, Nfld., is solely responsible for the issue of any sums due.

Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve men serving in any of H. M. Ships, including all members of the Trawler Reserve and those in Defensively Armed Merchant Ships etc., are eligible for the pay as set forth, and should be informed of the following alter-

If the Estate does not exceed \$500.00, after the proof of the facts has been obtained the petition can be applied







Civil Servants Hold Successful Meeting

Over 120 Government employees innding representatives of every deent and several deputy heads asabled in the T. A. Armory last night and discussed the high cost of living as compared with the present rate of wages.

Mr. J. T. Meaney, the convenor, briefly outlined the object of the gathering. Mr. Theo. Thompson was apinted chairman and Mr. Alex. ney, Secretary. Mr. Meaney then ted out the situation as to the salaries paid civil servants, who said there were family men in the city today, employees of the Govt. whose onthly wage is not sufficient to obtain the absolute necessaries of life. They are half fed, less than half clothed and during the past winter ore than half cold. The civil servant in St. John's is the worst paid man in Newfoundland. The majority of the family men have not received more than \$50 per year advance in wages since 1914. The increase given last year did not exceed 7 per cent.. to men whose salaries were barely sufcient for their maintenance before the war. Mr. Meaney submitted a tatement showing where the cost of living is approximately 100 per cent. higher than in 1914. He then moved for the presentation to the Government of a resolution setting forth the unfortunate position of the majority of civil servants in this city, asking that their request of an increase of salaries be favourably considered. The resolution was unanimously passed. The forming of a Civil Servants Association was discussed and some excellent speeches made on the subject. It will be further dealt with at a future meeting as it is hoped that by united effort they will obtain their just demands.

Miss Brigden's Address

There was a large congregation at Gower Street Methodist Church last night to hear Miss Beatrice Brigden. A.C.S.E., deliver an address on "The Three Institutions for the Growing Child." In a very striking and convincing manner she impresed upon hef congregation the responsibility of the home, the school and the church in the development of a strong Christian character. The lecturer pointed out that the criminal and immoral class of citizens was easily produced and that the easiest way to offset this condition was to begin with the training of the child, and by careful attention through the medium of an institution of a constructive character it was easy to produce a god-faring, moral and useful citizen.



We may thank God that the greater nations of the World have realised the justice of the Cause; and I believe that every man in Newfoundland will one day be thankful that he was at least asked to face this question-"Is it not my higher duty to go out and save humanity from destruction?"

Remember that your wives, your children, your cottages, your boats, are in positive danger if the German breaks through France. As he is treating the foolish Russians, so he will treat every nation whom he touches-America. Canada. Newfoundland, are to him mere objectives for his greedy brutality. He is entirely evil, he has no sense of right and no feelings of Mercy.

This mass of incarnate selfishness is held back by the strong arm of the Allies in France. Will any man of British race decline to do all he can to defeat and crush it?

At this moment the need is specially great, for the Germans are now desperate. They begin to realise the truth of that dread decree "He that takes the sword, shall perish with the sword". At no horror will they hesitate if they can but escape the punishment that is their due.

Now on every man and woman among us lies the duty to bear a hand in administering that punishment a duty not only to ourselves but to posterity. If age or health prevent some of us from going they do not prevent us from following the greatest example ever set to mankind and making the sacrifice of that which is dearest to our hearts.


You young men I ask to listen carefully to the ap-peals which will once more be made to you in the next few weeks. Believe me that the voluntary act of a man, impelled by the high sense of duty, is far nobler than the mere checking to the sense of duty, is far nobler than the mere obedience to the provisions of a public enact-

Try to realise the sufferings of women and children wherever the Germans come: think of the little children starved in Belgium and slaughtered in cold blood in Armenia. Let your men folk stand out and protect you, for in helping to defeat the Germans they are protecting the bonour and safety of all their dear ones at home.


