King George Suffering From Cold.

Lloyd George to Ask Vote of Confidence-- Actual War Feared in Ireland-- Conditions in Belfast Lamentable.

WILL SEEK VOTE OF CONFIDENCE
LONDON, March 21.
Premier Lloyd George will resume his place in the Commons on April 3, and immediately ask a vote on the Government's policy regarding the Geneva Economic Conference, Austen Chamberlain announced in the House to-day.

KING GEORGE SLIGHTLY ILL.
LONDON, March 21.
King George has a slight cold and sore throat, but there is no cause for anxiety.

CIVIL WAR IN IRELAND.
LONDON, March 21.
The dangers of the situation in Ireland are emphasized by the morning newspapers, several of which take the view that little more is needed to start actual civil war. Sniping between entrenched forces on either side of the border has been going on for several days, and yesterday machine guns were reported to have been brought into action. Reports of murders, incendiarism and other outrages in various districts, where the tension between Protestants and Roman Catholics is most severe, fill a large space in the newspapers. Violent denunciations of each faction against the other suggest that apportionment of the blame in numerous instances, is difficult but they show a fierce state of national feeling which dangerously threatens the general peace. In consequence of continued lawlessness in Belfast itself, carmen of the city are urged to remain in their districts, as they are being insufficiently protected by British troops. James Magee was fatally shot in Hardings Street last night.

U.S. GERMAN AMBASSADOR.
BERLIN, March 21.
Dr. Otto Ludwig Wiedefeld has been appointed German Ambassador to the United States.

CRAIG UNABLE TO CARRY OUT AGREEMENT.
BELFAST, March 21.
Sir James Craig told a deputation of workers who had been expelled from the Belfast industries that it was impracticable at present to carry out the agreement made with Michael Collins, head of the Provisional Government of Southern Ireland, regarding restoration to places of employment. This, he said, was because of the differences arising from the boundary question and the tense feelings created by other causes. The agreement between Collins and Craig at a conference in January provided among other things that the boycott of Belfast in South Ireland be discontinued and the Ulster Premier would undertake to facilitate in every possible way the return of Catholic workmen to the Belfast shipyard.

SOUTH AFRICA'S ESCAPE.
LONDON, March 21.
Every corner of the South African House of Assembly was packed and a great ovation accorded Premier General Jan Christian Smuts when he rose to describe the past week's events. The country, he said, has escaped a tremendous danger. The country was faced with slaughter comparable to the French revolution, the Premier added.

A WRANGLE OVER WRANGLE.
WASHINGTON, March 21.
Canada's claim to Wrangle Island may be disputed by the United States Government. It is understood the Department of State is considering a claim of a number of United States scientists and explorers that the island was taken over in the name of the United States in 1881.

RE-APPOINTED.
OTTAWA, March 21.
Hon. M. McCallum Grant has been re-appointed Lieut. Governor of Nova Scotia for another five years.

NO MONEY FOR HIS SCHEME.
OTTAWA, March 21.
No money will be voted for the St. Lawrence River Canalizations Scheme this year, Finance Minister Fielding told the House to-day.

STRIKE CALLED.
INDIANAPOLIS, March 21.
A formal call for a strike in the bituminous and anthracite coalfields of the United States was issued by the United Miners headquarters to-day.

Fire at Grand Falls.

FOUR HOUSES DESTROYED.
A fire which destroyed four houses at Grand Falls was reported in a message received last night by the Assistant Collector of Customs. The message states that the premises of Boula, Stewart, Temple and Cohen were burnt out with nearly all their stocks. Further particulars received are as follows:—
GRAND FALLS, March 21, 1921.
P. J. Summers, Deputy Minister of Justice. "Destructive fire occurred at the settlement near the Railway Station at four this afternoon resulting in the total destruction of three self-contained business premises and dwelling houses belonging to Edward Boula, Temple and C. G. Stewart. The fire started at Temple's the centre building and quickly spread to those on either side. A moderate wind blowing in a favourable direction contributed to the safety of Railway Station and other buildings. Temple lost everything including a horse in the barn at the rear of the building. Cohen a tenant of Temple lost entire stock boots and shoes. Boula and Stewart saved portion of stock and belongings. Origin of fire at present unknown.

What Really Did Happen at Scapa Flow.

HERE IS REVEALED FOR THE FIRST TIME HOW THE MOST SENSATIONAL GERMAN COUP OF THE WAR WAS WORKED.
By ADMIRAL VON REUTER, Chief of the German Fleet at Scapa Flow.—
In Cassell's Magazine.

PREPARATIONS FOR SINKING VESSELS.

This obstacle could only be removed by reducing the crews. Such a course was impracticable at the moment; we had hitherto retained enough men to enable us to put to sea, a further reduction would make this impossible, and the British would realize that we had given up all idea of taking the fleet home. I thought it wiser to wait and not take undue risks by acting prematurely.

(2) What consequences for the intended fleet might result from negotiations on the peace conditions?

It was possible that the German Government might barter the ships in exchange for some benefit, such as a free hand in the Baltic or some similar concession. We officers should not have liked such a solution, but we would have to make this sacrifice for the welfare of the State. Did the German Government intend to make use of the fleet in some such way? That was the one important question which left me no peace. But all my messages begging for enlightenment remained unanswered. It never entered my head that the fleet might be sold; we did not think that the government would descend to that.

Further, it was possible that the German Government might attach no importance to the question, of the fleet. Both the army and the foreign office intrigued against the navy, and the government was not likely to desert it.

In this case, too, the only course was to wait.

(3) Immediate acceptance of the conditions of peace could be ruled out, as the news from home that reached through the British Press, led us to expect anything but that.

At the end of May I sent a wireless message to the Admiralty in Berlin asking them to send ships to fetch my 2,700 of the crews early in June. This wireless was submitted to the British Admiral and sent with his consent. These men were fetched home on June 15 and 17, and the reduction of the fleet was left to the crews of the five to five on the large cruisers, fifty on the battleships, twenty on the small cruisers; the numbers left on the torpedo boats were determined by the other commanding them.

Early in June I learn that the crews of the torpedo boats were making preparations to sink them. Had these preparations become known to the fleet, the plan to sink them would have been frustrated. I sent for the leader of the torpedo boats and explained to him my doubts and designs. He acquiesced in these and actually succeeded in keeping his preparations secret not only from the British, but also from the rest of the interned fleet. On June 17, when the last of the internees of the crews had been shipped home on German transports, the orders for sinking were sent to the ships. As I feared to attract attention if I sent them by my own hand, most of them were dispatched by the British packets. The order ran as follows:

OFFICERS ONLY!

June 17, 1919.
PERSONAL.
To all captains and officers commanding torpedo boats.
All necessary preparations for the sinking of the ships are to be made at once, so as to make sure that the receipt of an order the ship may

sink as quickly as possible.

2. Final preparations are to be made after the crews have disembarked. Individual captains must decide on their own responsibility to what extent individual members of the crews can help in these preparations and be informed of our intentions without endangering the success of the scheme in any way; such as, for instance, by betrayal to the English.

3. The following preparatory measures are to be taken: All inner doors and hatches, such as passage doors, bunker doors, the doors of longitudinal and transverse bulkheads, ventilators, side windows, etc., are to be kept permanently open. It is left to the discretion of the captain to take the following further steps: Necessary measures to ensure that torpedo tubes, condensers, valves and cocks (except floating cocks) may be opened quickly.

4. Boats, if possible, only one boat—to accommodate the crew—to be cleared for lowering. A white flag is to be held in readiness to take in the boat. The boats with the crews are to make straight for the nearest land; they are to keep close order under the command of their officers.

5. The ships are to be sunk:
(a) In the event of forcible seizure by the British.
(b) On receipt of a special order from me.

6. Additional to 5 (a) The commanding officers must carefully think out what steps to take to ensure the sinking of the ships if the British should attempt to take us by surprise and seize the ships. A demand made by the British without my express consent that the ships should be handed over to them, is to be regarded as a forcible seizure, and the ships are to be sunk in reply.

7. Additional to 5 (b) Orders may be issued (a) to sink the ship at once, or (b) to sink the ship at a certain hour.

8. Signals. In pursuance of 7 (a), if the ship is to be sunk at once, the following signal will be given:
"To all captains and officers commanding torpedo boats. Paragraph Confirm.—Officer in command of interned fleet."
This signal is to be passed on in every possible way. The sinking of the ships is to begin at once.

In pursuance of 7 (b), if the ship is to be sunk at a certain hour, the following signal will be given:
"To all captains and officers commanding torpedo boats. Paragraph Confirm.—Officer in command of interned fleet."
In this signal the first two numbers denote the date, i.e., the 9th, and the last two numbers the hour at which sinking is to begin. Time is to be reckoned from noon to noon (astronomical).

9. Confirmation. The receipt of the signal is to be confirmed as follows:
"To the officer in command of interned fleet. Paragraph—confirm.—Captain, Emden."

10. Since the decision as to whether the conditions of peace shall be accepted or rejected, and whether hostilities shall be renewed, lies in the balance, the next few days will be very critical. From Wednesday, June 18, onward, more careful watch must be kept by day and night, not only so as to observe any unusual behaviour on the part of the British, but also so as to take note of signals from the

Emden. As the crews cannot be considered trustworthy, the officers must keep a look out themselves.

11. It is my intention to sink the ships only if the enemy should attempt, without the consent of our government, to take possession of the fleet. If our government consents to deliver up our ships, they will be handed over to the eternal shame of those who have brought us to this pass.

12. Captains are to keep this communication under lock and key; it must not fall into enemy hands.

(Signed) VON REUTER.

Excepting on two ships of the fleet, we succeeded in keeping our intention to sink the fleet a secret.

On the morning of June 20, the captain of a large cruiser sent word that the crew were watching his preparations for sinking the vessel with great mistrust, and that they dogged his steps wherever he went on the ship. He therefore asked to be allowed to inform the crew of the order to sink the ships, so that he might complete his preparations. My chief of staff urged me to comply, but I decided that I would rather leave this big cruiser out, if the ships were to be sunk, than disclose the secret. Immediately afterwards the captain of a battleship informed me that four petty officers, owing to the preparations he had made, had guessed that I intended to sink the ships; as they did not want to have anything to do with it, they had asked to be sent home at once; if their request were granted they would not disclose the preparations for sinking. If the crews were to learn unofficially of our intentions, i.e., through these petty officers, by the back door so to speak, they would become suspicious and reticent, and would prevent our carrying out our plans. The crews, therefore, had now to be informed of our scheme to sink the fleet, even at the risk of treachery.

Organ Recital Meth. College Hall.

A FOREST OF MUSIC.
A large and appreciative audience gathered on Monday evening at the Re-opening Recital in the above hall. For some time the Organ in the Hall has not been in use, but lately it has undergone thorough repair by Mr. Walter Vey. Over 30 years ago the Hon. C. B. Ayre left an amount to provide an Organ for the College Hall. This instrument was in position for a few years only, when the Hall was destroyed in the great fire of 1892. The Organ was insured, and the Hon. J. B. Ayre, son of the Donor, took the matter in hand of providing an Organ for the new hall. With Mr. Ayre, this was a labor of love, and the present instrument is superior in many ways to the original Organ. Some time ago the Ladies of the College Aid Society decided to provide mechanical blowing for the instrument, and at the same time to have the Organ thoroughly overhauled and put in first class condition. They set to work with a will, and the money was soon raised, and the contract placed in the hands of Mr. Walter Vey, a clever Newfoundlander, who is second to none in ingenuity and skill in all mechanical appliances, and particularly in connection with Pipe Organs. Mr. Vey procured and installed a Kinetic Blower with electric motor which generates sufficient wind for the full Organ and obviates the blowing by hand, which heretofore has been necessary. Mr. Vey took the instrument down, went carefully over each part, cured all defects, re-erected the Organ and tuned it. The work has occupied 6 months, and last night we had an evidence, not only of the grandeur and beauty of the instrument, but also of the splendid work of Mr. Vey.

AUDIENCE CHARMED.
The Organ was under the manipulation of Mr. Gordon Christian, L.R.A.M., the Music Master of the College. His Organ Numbers were well selected, some being of the severe type, and others of lighter character. There was the softness and beauty of string and flute tones, the thunder of the pedal, the life and fire of the reeds, and the majesty of the full Organ. Mr. Christian is a skilled performer, and charmed his audience. The Recital also included instrumental numbers on the Piano, by Miss Oates, L.T.C.L., the Assistant Music Teacher at the College, and by a number of pupils. Miss Oates gave a very fine rendering

the Ballade in A Flat by Chopin, and demonstrated her mastery of the Keyboard. The pupils were from every section of the Music Department, showing just the work that is being done. It was very interesting to hear these performers, making allowance for the natural nervousness, they all acquitted themselves remarkably well. This training in public performance should form a part in the education of students taking instrumental work. There were two vocal numbers by Miss Jean Taylor and Barnes. Both sang well, and deserved the recall which they received.

CONGRATULATIONS DUE.
The Ladies of the College Aid Society are to be congratulated upon the splendid result from their efforts, while Mr. Vey has added another triumph to his already long list. Mr. Christian deserved and received the thanks of the many who were present Monday evening, for it was a delightful Entertainment, free of the encroachment until the last part of the program was reached, and most pleasing in its sincerity and variety. It is proposed to hold these Recitals monthly, and we feel sure that they will not only be of value to those taking part, but also of interest and pleasure to those who attend.

Excessive Taxation Kills Production.
THE RESULT IS DISASTROUS.
Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—Does it not seem to you that the public have grown totally indifferent to the fact that we are settling down swiftly to want and privation, perhaps actual starvation? I have little doubt that you think otherwise. You see so little protest made, so little argument in the press against our present method of procedure that you believe no one cares if we live or die. You are wrong, however. There was a time when most everyone took a turn at protesting against real and imaginary grievances and to-day having outlived the hope of the big promises that were held to be fulfilled the reaction has fallen with such stunning force as to paralyze present thought and action. When you sit down to analyze matters how do you feel? Do you not quickly find that the very magnitude of the task overpowers you? Do you not in your capacity find matters in such an incomprehensible tangle that you fail to understand what is the real definition of matters in their proper order? How then can you expect the lay mind to protest intelligently against mismanagement and get at the root of things only in a way so produce laughter. That is why you hear no more protest. The public have become dumfounded and remain inarticulate with fires of anger burning within.

Mr. Goelting's letter to the Telegram some time ago brings this fact into prominence. He applies very apt language to the situation. His letter is so vividly enlightening that it reveals with perfect clarity the black murky clouds of despair into which we have drifted and into which we are still further drifting and not only criticises but with much wisdom points out the only sane way to delivance. Mr. Goelting has little abuse though the charges are many, predominant amongst which is that of excessive taxation. It is useless to argue that we have not reached the end of the rope in this direction. All that you can get out of any man has been gotten as soon as the charms of compensation have been blotted out and the time is fast approaching when having the inherent incentive to work murdered by oppressive taxation no one will care to work at all.

We are now on the verge of dire poverty and where is the revenue to come from. As it is to-day we have to look back, and looking back find that to keep the treasury stocked we had three classes of labor to fall back upon, namely those who barely existed without Government help, those who lived reasonably independent and those who lived and saved a little money. Partly through the generally poor condition of the world but very greatly through the welter of mistakes and wanton waste of this Government the two lower classes of labor have been thrown upon Government support in toto and our only reserve is fast dwindling revenues of the upper class of labor. The lower class first got down to poverty, from poverty to honest deceitfulness and



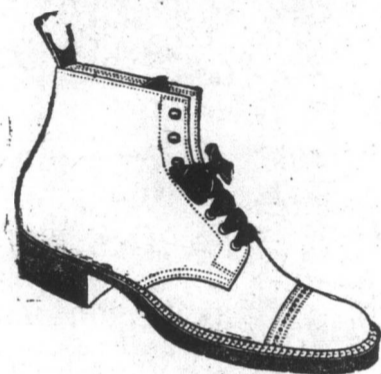

Coaker Says Newfoundland Lost Millions.

THINKS EXPORTERS SUFFER LOSS OF \$2 PER QUINTAL—VIEWS ON FISHERY POLICY OF THE ANCIENT COLONY.
(By COLES MCKAY in Canadian Fisherman.)

Sir Richard Squires, Prime Minister of Newfoundland, in a public statement recently, declared that the results of the fishing season of 1921 had on the whole been far from discouraging, and expressed the view that the worst of the business depression had been passed and that the outlook for the future gave grounds for optimism. Predictions made last spring that the merchants and fishermen of the Ancient Colony would greatly restrict their operations because the prospect was that prices had been very low had not been fulfilled; on the contrary, both merchants and fishermen had actively entered into the prosecution of the industry and the fish catch had been rapidly absorbed by the fish merchants of St. John's and the outports and speedily shipped to foreign markets, Sir Richard said. Exports of fish during October and November had been the greatest in the history of the Dominion; very little fish remained unsold in the hands of the fishermen, and a larger proportion of the catch had been shipped to foreign markets at the beginning of December than in any previous year at the same date for upwards of a quarter of a century.

The Newfoundland Government early in 1921 secured from the House of Assembly authority to borrow \$500,000, and to make advances to merchants and fishermen to enable them to obtain supplies for the fisheries. Up to the present the Government has not given out definite information as to the amounts advanced of the Fisheries Supplies act; but the Prime Minister has stated that in various cases where credits were made available to merchants and others no demand was made upon the Fisheries Supplies Account. According to Sir Richard, the action of the government in making the credits available to purchase supplies had the effect of restoring confidence, and bankers, who in the early spring were wary of making loans came forward with the major portion of the loans necessary to carry on the industry.

Of the effects of the Government's enabling measure, Hop. W. F. Coaker, Minister of Fisheries, said recently: "The spring conditions were very severe, chiefly because of the inability of suppliers everywhere to advance supplies on open account. To enable those unable otherwise to secure supplies to prosecute the codfishery, half a million dollars was placed at the disposal of the District Representatives, which was available in the shape of guaranteed assistance. All who desired secured supplies and more men engaged in the fisheries than had been employed therein for twenty years or more."

According to the Opposition, the Government's making allotments on Fisheries Supplies account, have not been indifferent to considerations of party politics, and there are suggestions that a goodly proportion of the advances will continue indefinitely as a charge upon the public treasury, instead of being paid back. But pending a full statement as to the disposition of the account, the value of conjecture of this character is problematical.

LOSS OF FIVE AND HALF MILLIONS.

While the Government reports that

the total catch of the Newfoundland fishermen was an average one, the Minister of Fisheries observes that the "shore fishery catch was the smallest for a quarter of a century, and thousands of fishermen did not earn sufficient to provide for present requirements." According to Mr. Coaker one of the worst features of the year was the big decrease in the price of fish as paid to the fishermen. Shore fish, which declined from \$11.00 in the fall of 1920 to an average of \$8.50 last fall, or a falling off of \$4.50 on 800,000 quintals of shore fish. Labrador values, Mr. Coaker adds, declined locally from an average of \$8.50 in the fall of 1920 to an average of \$4.50 last fall, or a loss of \$4.00 per quintal on about 450,000 quintals. Thus the Minister figures that the Newfoundland fishermen lost nearly 15 1/2 million dollars through the drop in prices which is perhaps a rather distributing method of bookkeeping.

Mr. Coaker argues that the abolition of the Fish Exporting Regulations last January was a "great blunder," and also contends that the failure to ratify the agreement he made with certain firms in Portugal to handle the portion of the 1921 output required by that country was another blunder. Apparently the Export Regulations, which obliged the shipper to show that he would receive a certain minimum price before he was allowed an export licence, worked well enough during the period of war-inflated prices; but the exporters wanted and obtained a free hand when prices began to fall, and the exchange situation limited the purchasing power of the European markets. As for the Portuguese agreement the exporters claimed that it would establish a monopoly of the fish trade with Portugal, controlled by certain firms in that country and the Minister of Fisheries, who is also the controlling factor in the Union Export Company; and owing to their opposition, the Government would not ratify the agreement. But Mr. Coaker now maintains that "the exporters are being taught a lesson and are reaping what they sowed last January when they lifted the Export Regulations." He adds: "There was not enough fish caught in Newfoundland in 1921 by 250,000 quintals to supply the market properly, and had simply horse sense been exercised by exporters in October and November, prices abroad would have stiffened and been maintained until next year's new fish was ready. But they foolishly rushed a six months' supply into the markets in a few weeks, leaving stocks in this country extremely small, while Portugal, Spain and Italy have been swamped with supplies on consignment, that should now be in our splendid fish-keeping stores."

MAY LOSE \$2 PER QUINTAL.

Mr. Coaker thinks that exporters will lose \$2 per quintal on their consignments rushed to Europe, and argues that if the price-fixing Exportation Board has been functioning, the Exporters instead of being dependent on the consignees would have held the upper hand, because, he says, "the markets have been more favorable to us than at any time during the past twenty-five years."

However that may be it is interesting to note that Mr. A. B. Morine, who has been the principal critic of Mr. Coaker's policies, has recently been advocating an alternative policy which involves some regulation on the export of fish. Mr. Morine has come to the conclusion that co-operation is necessary to market fish abroad with reasonable success, but he wants the co-operation to be of a voluntary kind, with the control resting wholly in the hands of the merchants and fishermen. The government, he thinks, should confine its efforts to encouraging the promotion of voluntary co-operation, and perhaps the supplying of information upon which the co-operative agencies might base their export policies. He opposes Mr. Coaker's plan of a Government Board with power to fix prices and regulate the flow of exports, because it logically leads to nationalization—a Government Board purchasing at home and selling abroad and falling back on the taxpayers if its transactions did not turn out profitably. Mr. Morine, however, agrees with Mr. Coaker that competitive selling abroad by consignment is not calculated to secure the best results, though he holds that Newfoundland cannot afford to abandon altogether the practice of shipping fish on consignment, as to withhold cargoes until contracts to sell at a fixed price have been made, may give foreign competitors an advantage in the markets.

Says Ocean Sinks.

The coral reefs of the South seas may graduate from their position as mere contributors of local color to fiction and take a place in the annals of science as factors in settling the age-old problem of the subsidence of the Pacific ocean.

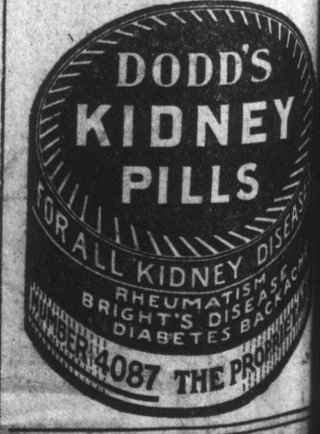
This is the opinion of Dr. W. H. Hobbs of the University of Michigan, who left Honolulu recently on an exploration tour of the South seas, under the auspices of the United States and Japanese governments, with the view of casting light upon the subsidence or sinking of the Pacific bed.

He said that his investigations of the structure and depth of the reefs would seem to prove or disprove the subsidence theories evolved by Charles Darwin and James D. Dana, noted sci-

entists, who toured the world separately in sailing vessels at about the same time years ago. Each arrived at approximately the same theory—that the atolls, or coral islands, rising from the depths of the sea and forming lagoons surrounded by reefs of coral, were built up gradually, while the Pacific bed sank thousands of feet.

Recently Prof. R. A. Daly of Harvard University expressed the theory that when the great glaciers of the ice age covered Europe and northern North America they took so much water from the ocean in the formation of the countless millions of tons of ice that the ocean level dropped about 40 fathoms. Consequently the waves cut cliffs and terraces much lower than those which had existed. When the glaciers melted, the water returned to the ocean, flooded shores and dammed river mouths. These actions are sufficient, Prof. Daly contended,

to account for many evidences of subsidence of the ocean floor.

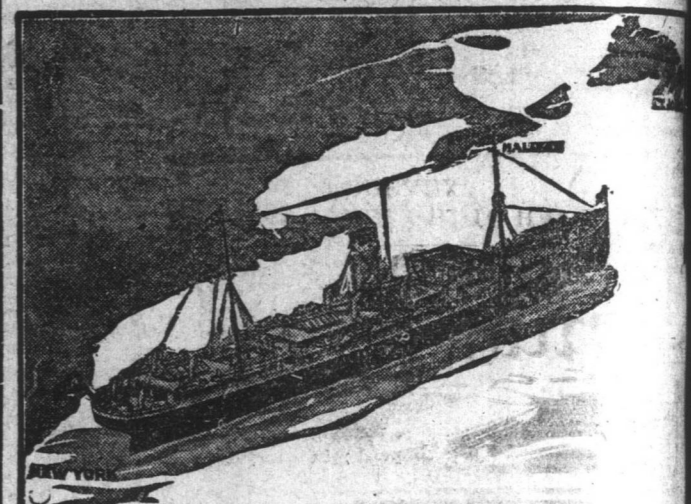
