The system of shorthand used by the ancients probably consisted of contractions of words. The first real shorthand known to this country made its appearance in 1588, when Timothy Bright brought his invention before the public. This system enjoyed considerable popularity, and it is said that some of Shakespeare's plays were transcribed from it,

Many other methods of "secret writing," as shorthand was called in those days, made their appearance within the next few years. One, the work of John Willis, was employed by Samuel Pepys, the famous diarist. After Pepys' death his diary had to he transcribed before it could be pub-
