The disease which, it appears, she contracted while in gaol hore last spring, and for which she was conveyed to the Magdalon Hospital in Toronto, has deprive her of the attractiveness which she no doubt one day possessed; and her appearance this morning contrasted strangely with the photograph, taken last fall, which 1 hangs upon the wall of her former home. She wore a jaunty chip-straw hat, a light lustre cape and a striped brown and without receive. She told how she had remained in Toronto until last Friday week, and how from there she came to Guelph, with the intention of shooting her father, whom she desper-ately hated; how she had gone from here to Hespeler and thence to Beilin, returning to Guelph again on Friday last. She knew nothing of the shooting case till after it had occurred, and regretted that is had not been in Mary Caiver's place, and been killed, as it would be "a happy release." She ex-spressed sorrow for the injured parties, but had not the least sympathy for her father, whom she would kill on the first opportunity. The girl gave expression to the throat. 


