

Establishing a Creamery. The financial side of the question admits of so argument. It is quite clear that the adoption of the creamery system would be of immense advantage to butter makers should gather together and talk mense advantage to butter indicates the matter over.

The way to organize a co-operative creamery association in Ontario is set forth by the bill introduced by Mr. Wood of Hastings at the last session of the Legislature. The way is simply described. Soven or more persons are required to meet and sign an acknowledgment before a justice of the peace that they wish to incorporate themselves. A duplicate of this acknowledgment, together with the rules and regulations they may choose to adopt, shall be filed with the county registrar, and the company is formed. This is all there is about it. Before the association commences operations they must frame rules and regulations on these points; (i) The mode of convening general and special meetings; (2) provision for audit of accounts; (3) power and mode of withdrawal of members; (4) appointment of managers and other officers and their respective duties, and a provision for vacancies caused by death, resignation and other causes.

These rules may look formidable, and the appointment of 'managers," "secretaries" and so forth may agnost the butter makers. But they


