Retter Tone Exists at Toronto. Among Montreal wholesalers, country collections are a source of serious anxiety. The complaints on this score are not confined to any single line of trade, the calls for renewals being numerous and general. Failures, however, are few, and it is the evident policy to nurse along all deserving customers in the belief that some improvement cannot be far off. Since last week there has not been any noteworthy intomers in the belief that some improvement cannot be far off. Since last week there has not been any noteworthy increase in the movement of merchandise countrywards, the unsettled condition of the roads still impeding the movements of travelers and general traffic. The opening of river navigation is helping the business done with the lower parishes, but the canals are still closed. The trade situation at Toronto still continues to show signs of improvement. The better feeling heretofore noted has acted as a sort of stimulus, and fewer complaints are heard. Dealers generally are encouraged with the stronger tone of the markets, and the outlook is more cheering. The earnings of the railways show improvement, and those of the Grand Trunk since the beginning of the month are ahead of the corresponding period of last year. There is increased activity in drygoods, with orders coming in freely, but they are not for large amounts. The business in hardware and groceries is fair, and payments are a little more satisfactory. A further advance in wheat has taken place, with sales of white at 73c to 75c, Ontario points. The deliveries are very small, giving the impression that supplies are limited, but at this season farmers are very busy seeding, which partly accounts for light receipts. Flour is firmer, but prices are relatively lower than those of wheat.
