The Eard. The Eard. In the early spring it is a good plan to arrange the surroundings of the yards and make them look bright and cher-ful for the summer. A very little labor and time will do wonders in transform ing a bare yard into a pretty grass plot and whete burdook and thistles had grown unmolested, substitute sweet flowers and vines. With a garden rake all the dry stalks and autumn leaves straw and manure can be gathered to gether in beaps, piled into a wheelbar row and taken away. Then build up another row of stones, and form them into a shallow dish or tub; fill this with earth, and set out a geranium, heliotrope, or petunia, sow flower seeds in the circles of earth such as mignonetts, sweet alyssum or portulace, and you will have a rockery that will be a delight, not only for one summer, but for many to come. Rustic flower pots can be made of hollow logs

Fill in the cavity with rich mould or earth, and if you have pelargoniums or any other house plants, set them in and they will thrive splendidly; while wan-dering Jew, Kenilworth ivy, or portulaca will form a beautiful fringe to fall over the rough sides of the blocks and glad-en your eyes all summer, and the same logs will answer year after year, and require very little care to keep them in loveliness. 




