## SPECIAL SESSION.

# Grand Dibision, S. of C., Noba Scotin,

ROMAN VALLEY, GUYSBOROUGH Co., Tuesday, July 14th, 1868.

The Grand Division met in Special Session this afternoon, on call of the Grand Worthy Patriarch.

A requisition from H. A. Taylor of No. 7, R. M. Barratt of No. 8, A. W. Clark of No. 26, W. E. McRobert of No. 82, Rodk. McLean of No. 268, C. N. Harrington of No. 212, R. Boak, of No. 26, and Saml. Pushee of No. 268, asking the G.W.P. to call this special session, was read.

Your Committee, to whom were referred—by vote at last quarterly meeting—the communications from South Division, No. 159, and Preservation Division, No. 270, respecting loss of their Charters, and frequesting the Grand Division to grant them duplicates, beg to report-

Firstly—That on 24th April, the Grand Scribe received a communication from the Deputy G.W.P. of Preservation Division, dated April 22d, reporting the fact that their Charter had been found. Your Committee would, therefore, recommend that the communications from

this Division be placed on file.

Secondly-The Grand Scribe, on behalf of the Committee, addressed a communication, on June 9, to the Deputy of South Division, soliciting additional information respecting the loss of their Charter. No Treply has yet been received. Your Committee would recommend that, if the G.W.P. and G. Scribe should receive satisfactory information that the Charter of South Division cannot be recovered, the Grand Scribe be empowered to prepare and forward to the Division a duplicate &Charter.

Thirdly-The Grand Scribe has submitted to your Committee a communication from Bro. I. Newton Mack, D.G.W.P. of Prince Albert Division, No. 185, in which he announces that the building in which the Division held its meetings was destroyed by fire on the 3d of April slast, the Division losing thereby its Charter, Ritual, Books and other property. #### AGENCY.

From the report of the Agency Committee you will learn that the services of our Agents and Lecturers will have to be discontinued for a short period, owing to the funds for that purpose being exhausted. By will be perceived by the Grand Treasurer's financial statement that the Agency is now indebted to the general fund \$349.90\frac{1}{2}.

If the Order would put forth the proper effort, there would be redifficulty in obtaining yearly, for Agency purposes, \$1000 or \$1200. It would suggest that an appeal be made to the Divisions, and to member individually, to assist in raising that sum; and also to urge upon the the desirability of contributing, say \$300, to the fund without delay, the order that at least one Agent be engaged not later than the first establishment of the contribution of the members and the same number of Lachd Visitors in each Division would accomplish the work within a few week.

Dear Brother,-The Twenty-fourth Annual Session of the National Division, Sons of Temperance of North America, was held in Nashville, Tennessee, commencing May 20 and closing May 23. Twenty Jurisdictions were represented by eighty Delegates.

The following Amendments to the Constitution were adopted:-

## Constitution for Grand Divisions.

RULE XXII. Add to the form of application for Charter,-"And, in ease this Division shall at any time suspend work,-forfeit

or surrender its Charter,-all its properties, real and personal, shall revert to and vest in the Grand Division granting the Charter."

# Constitution for Subordinate Divisions.

Add to Article III., Section 1, the following words,-

"And provided further, That members between the ages of 14 and 18 may be allowed to vote by By-Law of their Subordinate Division, permission having first been obtained from the Grand Division for the enactment of such By-Law."

## Code of Laws.

Chapter VIII. Section 1. Strike out the words, " provided that it shall not take effect until the expiration of the current quarter; and insert instead, the words, "or notice given that such will be done at that or the following meeting."

The following decisions of the M.W. Patriarch were confirmed:

Grand Division Officers may resign, and their resignations be accepted at a special session.

2. Elections to fill vacancies in office can only take place at regular sessions.

The following Resolutions were adopted:-

Resolved, That the bounds of the jurisdiction of each Grand Division shall be the same as the State, District, Territory, or Province in which it is located, except in such cases as where the jurisdiction shall have been, or may be, divided by this body.

Resolved, That we highly approve of the holding of Temperance Prayer-meetings, and recommend their establishment where practicable. Resolved, That this National Division recognizes the importance and necessity of creating a sound public opinion upon the question of Total Abstinence, which will demand of the Legislatures of the country the enactment of laws which will effectually prohibit the traffic in intoxicating drinks.

There were several recommendations from Committees, on the M.W. Patriarch's report, which were adopted, the substance being as follows:

That Subordinate Divisions take the oversight of the interests of the cause in their respective localities; hold public meetings; circulate the pledge; organize the children into Bands of Hope, Sections of Cadets, Cold Water Legions, or similar juvenile societies; and scatter a Temperance literature.

That all Temperance organizations, of whatever name, who have the good of their fellow man at heart,-all who are laboring with one aim and purpose for the overthrow of a common enemy,-should operate together in union and harmony, combining their strength and concen-

trating heir action against the common foe.

That the National Division, and each Grand and Subordinate Division, appoint Delegates to the National Temperance Convention to be held in Cleveland, Ohio, on the 29th day of July next: the Committee believing that the evils of intemperance can never be eradicated until the traffic in intoxicating drinks is prohibited by positive law.

That Divisions establish Libraries for the use of members; and, to this end, recommend the National Temperance Society, and Publication House and its publications; and that Subordinate Divisions constitute their Worthy Patriarchs ex officio life members of the National Temper-

ance Society, by the payment of twenty dollars.

The Committee on Ladies' Ritual reported in favor of a new Ritual for Lady Visitors, and the M.W.P., M.W.A., and M.W. Scribe were appointed a Committee to have a suitable Ritual prepared for the Initiation of Lady Visitors, and an appropriation was made for the same.

The Committee on Form of Charter presented a design which was

adopted.

The foregoing shows that the position of our Grand Division is one to be proud of.

The number of Grand Divisions reported for 1866, was 37; for 1867,

35-decrease 2.

The admissions of members to the Order for 1866, were 44,038; 1867, 61,014-increase 16,976.

Lady Visitors admitted 1866, 17,586; in 1867, 14,570—decrease 3016. No. of members in 1866, 72,375; in 1867, 92,646—increase 20,271.

#### STOCK &C.

As the quota of Journals of Proceedings of National Division allowed to this Grand Division this year is 150 copies, I have ordered 40 additional, in order that each Subordinate Division in the jurisdiction may be furnished with a copy.

The Stock of Bye-Laws for Subordinate Divisions being exhausted,

I have had a second edition of 3000 copies printed. The first edition has proved a benefit to many of the Divisions.

As there have been several applications for Clearance Cards, I have

#### NATIONAL DIVISION.

The supreme council of our Order, which was held on May 24th, in Nashville, Tennessee, was attended, on the part of this Grand Division, by P.G.W.Ps. Rev. George Christie, and Avard Longley. We are deeply indebted to those brethren for their exertions in representing this Grand Division upon such an important occasion.

The reports of the Most Worthy Patriarch and Most Worthy Scribe contain much wisdom and cheering intelligence. I will note a few extracts from the report of the Most Worthy Patriarch which seem

peculiarly suited to our circumstances.

"Our Order has spread over an entire Continent, is firmly planted and rapidly increasing in other countries, attracting the attention of the

wise and good, rallying the hosts of Temperance, and organizing for the future conflict and final victory. * * * * Many of the old guard yet remain, and we would call upon all who ever joined our ranks to renew their vows and pledges, and march on with us to greater conflicts and greater triumphs.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW.

"The great secret of our success is our sound financial basis. It is the greatest secret of our Order. * * * * I am glad to know that the money now collected is used almost entirely to advance the Cause, to hold public meetings, disseminate a literature &c, and that the system of benefits is fast becoming obselete. The sooner the last vestige of it dies out the better for the Order and the cause of Temperance.

#### DECISIONS.

"Grand Division officers may resign, and their resignations be accepted at a special session. (2.) Election to fill vacancies in office can only take place at regular sessions.

#### SUBORDINATE DIVISIONS.

"Each Subordinate Division should feel full and complete responsibility for the general oversight of the interests of the cause in its locality, to hold public meetings, circulate the Pledge, organize the children in Bands of Hope, sections of cadets or similar juvenile societies; and to scatter Temperance literature.

#### OTHER ORGANIZATIONS.

"The different Societies and Organizations of the great and gathering host of the Temperance army are not antagonistic or conflicting. They are one in aim and purpose, and should be one in spirit and action.

* * * * The Sons of Temperance, Good Templars, Templars of Honor, and other kindred organizations, should form a league of friendship, have a common bond of union and fraternity, and work in unison and harmony wherever they exist."

THE FALSE CRY OF SECRECY.

"We are not a secret Society, but may be denominated a Society with a secret. We transact our business; private when only our own members are present, and in this particular do not differ from banks. and insurance companies, or church organizations. The Order is visible and operative. * * * * It welcomes the Christian, the philan

thropist and the statesman to its ranks, admits females to full membership, and opens its doors to the youth of both sexes at fourteen years of age where all may unite in advancing this just reform.

#### TEMPERANCE LITERATURE.

"The necessity of a sound, able and pure literature in aid of this reform, becomes more and more apparent, when we contemplate the work to be occomplished, and the apathy and ignorance which exists among all classes. There must be a systematic and thorough enlightment of the people. Public opinion must be educated, and the public conscience aroused. Books, tracts, and papers, should be multiplied and scattered, till every household and individual shall receive instruction.

#### CHILDREN.

"* * * * We must organize and pledge the children. If every child could be pledged to total abstinence, and would keep the pledge, it would soon put a stop to the entire drinking business. You all assent to this, it has been said many times before; recommended and resolved about in meetings and conventions every where, and it is time those resolutions were carried into execution."

## DOMINION NATIONAL DIVISION.

Resolutions from the Grand Division of Prince Edward Island in relation to this matter will be laid before you. Your best counsel will, I doubt not, be given upon a subject that proposes extensive changes and devolves such grave responsibilities.

#### INEBRIATE ASYLUM.

A draft or circular will be laid before you, respecting the establishment of an inchriate asylum. It is surely just that the revenues which are raised from the physical woes and mental obliquity of our people should be chargable with the maintainance and protection of the thrust down: and the generous charities of the humane will no doubt extend to any feasible scheme which may be devised to furnish a home for the inchriate. I would respectfully, yet earnestly recommend this Grand Division to take steps to secure the support of the Legiclature and the christian and generous public to this highly desirable object.

#### AGENCY.

I am advised that the agency of our Order must cease at this Session for a time. I trust that it will only be for a short time; and very soon to resume upon a more permanent basis. The labors of the agency committee, onerous and gratuitous as they have been, have taught us useful lessons.

We have been taught practically, how valueable,—how necessary is the Agency of our Order. We have learned that some systematic and stated mode of support must be adopted if the work is not to be interfered with by the changes of the seasons or the fluctuations of trade.

To the Agents we owe a debt of gratitude which we may acknowledge, but which we cannot repay: much of the success in the past depended upon the mere personal popularity of the agents, which we are bound to say has been equal to the task of sustaining the work, until the present time, but such a basis is not to be depended upon. "Prepare thy work

without, * * * * then build thine house."

Brethren, the season instructs us to labor and to hope. If we desire liberal things shall we stand. We have sowed, and often in sadness. And now behold! the fields are whitening to the harvest. Let us go forth rejoicing to secure the golden fruits; for "he that sleepeth in harvest is a son that causeth shame.

Your Committee are aware of the dulness of the times, and the scarcity of money. They however believe, that were each Division as a Division, hand each member and Lady Visitor of our Order to do their duty in 5this matter, our Agency Fund would speedily be replenished, even to boverflowing! and our missionary enterprize could be prosecuted with seven greater vigor and energy, than at any former period of time.

Your Committee would again urgently appeal to those Divisions, and to the kind friends who have given us material aid and comfort in the past, to continue their liberal support; while to those—and they are neither few nor far between—who stand by looking idly on, we would say, "we have a great work to do, come over and help us," give us your helping hand,—aid us by joining in our efforts,—aid us by your prayers,—aid us by your contributions,—for were each to whom our appeal is addressed to perform their share of labour in the Temperance wineyard, our work could be carried on without interruption.

Your Committee know well,—and every observant Son must be aware that much good has resulted to our Order through agency instrumentality; many new Divisions have been organized throughout this jurishiliction,—dead and languishing ones have been restored to activity—stimulated and encouraged to go on with the good work, and strong ones in their manly vigor have been induced to put forth sill greater

effort.

Your Committee would respectfully recommend the payment of arrearages to our Lecturers—and trust the Order generally will take a greater interest in the Agency work of this Grand Division—so that your Committee will be enabled at no very distant day, to resume with a replenished treasury, the work they are now called upon to suspend.

To the G. W.P., and Brothers of the Grand Division of Nova Scotia,-

4 The Grand Division having honoured me with a special appointment tast Delegate to the National Division, which met lately at Nashville, Tennessee, I consider it my duty to inform you that I complied with your invitation and attended said meeting. I have also to add, that it was to me a season of refreshing, and I hope of profit.

The attendance of Delegates was not quite as large as on some former occasions—owing no doubt to the distance of the place of meeting from the home of a large majority of the members. The number present was acidety.

It will not be necessary for me to give an account of the business stransacted, as this has already been furnished to the officers of this Grand Division by the M.W.S., and will be brought forward in its proper place. Some changes have been made in the Constitution, the benefit of which is to my mind extremely doubtful, but we must hope for the best. Others it may be confidently hoped, will prove beneficial. It may say, however, that I am slow to make changes in our Constitution, knowing, as I do, that wherever it has been faithfully worked it has proved satisfactory. Change for sake of change, or to gratify some ambitious member who wishes to see his name on the Journal of the National Division, is alwas to be deprecated. I think also that it is time for such to believe that an organization which has been in existence for nearly a quarter of a Century, and embraces in its membership rentlemen of first rate talent, might by this time be expected to have its Constitution as nearly perfect as most of the works of men.

Judging from the reports of the M.W.P. and the M.W.S., the past year has been one of considerable progress. There are some exceptions to this remark, but as a rule the fact is as I have stated. There are a few places in which our Order instead of advancing has seemed to retrograde. This is not however to be attributed in all cases to the return of the wave of intemperance. In some cases other organizations having the same object in view, have in a measure supplanted the Order of the Sons of Temperance, these having forgotten that our Order so long tried and never found unsuitable, or insufficient had the first claim upon them.

Our late meeting at Nashville was satisfactory and pleasant. A rue brotherly feeling seemed to reign. The names North and South were not heard,—and this along with the presence of Brothers from the British Provinces, seemed to make the Brothers of the neighbouring Republic forget the strifes of the past. I have no doubt the Order has been benefitted in Tennessee, and I hope I may add in the South generally. I hope to see the Southern Divisions revived; they have, in lays gone by been a blessing to our Order, and we cannot afford to part company with gentlemen whose honorable and genteel bearing were so well deserving imitation. But I must not trouble you with too long a letter, and consider that will be the less needed, as I hope that Brother Longley will be at your meeting. I regret very much that I cannot at-

tend myself. The duties of my congregation require that I should no so soon be absent, as I have been in attending the National Division.

I will only add, that the presence of P.G.W.P. Longley at the law raceting of the National Division, was to me a source of great satisfaction. His experience in business, and his devotion to the cause never fail to render him a valuable Co-labourer in the cause of Temperance. We were of one heart and mind in every important question that came before the National Division, and I therefore felt that I had one to share with me the responsibility of the votes given on important subjects,—while our private discussion of questions prepared me all the better for speaking upon the subject when it was before the National Division.

Rev. C. B. Pitblado moved the following, which was seconded by P.G.W.P. McRobert, and unanimously adopted:

That while we feel compelled, from want of funds, to dispense with the valuable services of our agents—Brothers Beattie, McArthur and Barratt—we do so with the greatest regret, believing that our cause will materially suffer until the Agency department is again put in active operation;—and we would take this opportunity of bearing testimony to the good which we believe has been effected to the cause of Temperance, by the faithful and arduous labours of the brethren named—and we would convey to these brothers, on retiring, a declaration of our entire confidence in the manner in which they have laboured in our service.

#### BRO. BARRATT'S REPORT.

REFORT OF MISSION UNDER THE APPOINTMENT OF THE AGENCY COMMITTEE OF GRAND DIVISION, BETWEEN APRIL 23ED, AND JULY 15TH, 1868.

Worthy Brothers,-

During the past term I have labored in portions of the Counties of Picton, Colchester, Hauts, and Halifax, and have much pleasure in reporting the Cause of Temperance slowly but surely advancing, and the Divisions I have visited with one or two exceptions, in a healthy and prosperous state; those in Pictou County are especially so.

I append my usual statistical summary, from which you will learn that the contributions to the Agency have been smaller than at any former period, and in most cases little, and sometimes no effort whatever was put forth to secure a collection from the audience, or contri-

butions from the Order.

By a communication from the Grand Scribe I have received notice that my appointment as Agent and Lecturer will close with this meeting of the Grand Division; and as this will consequently be my final report, I feel myself called upon under the circumstances to to make some reference connected with the work, and consider it due not more to myself, than to my fellow labourers, and the Committee under whom we acted to compare the relative strength of the Order, as reported by the Grand Scribe, at the commencement of the present mission in January 1865, and as reported by that Officer in April, 1868, from which I think it will appear quite evident that the Agents employed during that period had done something for the advancement of the Order; and through all those years the work had to be carried on by your Agents under very trying circumstances, which called for the exercise of great caution, and determined perseverance.
