

OF THE

SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL,

To the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

We should indeed thankfully receive, if it were offered, a token of sympathy in Missionary work from every member of the Church in your Diocese; but we have no doubt that our claim will be acknowledged, at least by those congregations which are assisted by the Society."



NOTICE.

The Church Society was established in 1842.

Its objects are:

1. A Mission Fund to aid in paying missionaries to strug-

gling congregations.

2. A General Fund to aid in the erection of churches and parsonages, to aid struggling congregations in maintaining schools for their children, and for the general expenses of the Society.

3. A Widows' and Orphans' Fund for the clergy.
4. A Pension Fund for aged and infirm clergy.

5. To provide bibles, prayer books, and religious publi-

cations, either gratuitously or at reduced prices.

6. To receive and transmit contributions towards the Missionary Diocese of Algoma, or towards missions to the heathen in foreign lands.

Its affairs are managed,

1. By the Central Board and its sub-committees.

(a) The Central Board is composed of all the clergy, the Church Wardens, and others elected by the Society.

(b) The sub-Committees are the Finance, the Land and

the Investment Committees.

- 2. By the Clergy Trust Committee, which manages (a) the Episcopal Endowment Fund, (b) the capital arising from the commutation of the clergy reserves, and (c) the endowment funds of the several missions and congregations.
- 3. By the Diocesan Board of Missions, composed of clergymen and laymen elected by the Church Society and by the Synod.

This Board pays all the missionaries of the Diocese, and receives for this purpose (a) the annual grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, (b) the Mission Fund of the Church Society, (c) the contributions or assessment of the congregations served by the missionaries, (d) a grant from the Clergy Trust Fund.

All letters referring to the assessment or contributions of congregations should be addressed to the Rev. A. A. Von Hilland, the Secretary, or to Mr. Edwin Jones, the Treasurer

of the Diocesan Board.

All other letters and contributions should be addressed to Rev. M. M. Fothergill, the Secretary, or to Mr. George Veasey, the Treasurer of the Church Society.

A report from the District Association of St. Francis was also submitted and ordered to be printed.

Mr. Geo. Veasey submitted the accounts of the Clergy Trust Fund, Local Endowment Funds, the Bishopric Endowment Fund, and those of the Church Society, and Mr. E. A. Jones those of the Diocesan Board, which were adopted and ordered to be printed in the Society's journal.

Three gentlemen were elected members of the Corporation.

The Vice-Presidents were re-elected, with the addition of the name of Mr. Geo. Hall, Mr. James Patton, jr., and Mr. James Dunbar.

Sixteen gentlemen were elected to serve on the Central Board.

The members of the Diocesan Board and Clergy Trust Fund were re-elected.

A By-Law for the management of the Pension Fund was introduced and discussed, clause by clause, amended and ordered to stand over for next meeting for final adoption.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CENTRAL BOARD FOR THE YEAR 1878.

Presented to the Church Society, February 5th, 1879.

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In presenting the Thirty-seventh Annual Report of the proceedings of the Church Society, the Central Board desires to render thanks to Almighty God for the many tokens of His favour to the Society.

During the past year, which has been almost unparalleled for severity in a financial point of view, the receipts of the Society have fallen below the amount received in 1877.

The following is the comparative statement of the four principal funds of the Society:

GENERAL FUND.

(To aid in the erection of Churches, Parsonages, Education, Outfits, and for other General Expenses of the Society.)

In consequence of the low state of the fund at the beginning of the year, your Board was obliged to defer all applications for aid except for education and personal grants.

In the month of September last your Board respectfully requested the Bishop to issue a Circular on the condition and requirements of the fund. It is gratifying to find that his Lordship's Circular has met with a general response. The receipts have increased from \$1288.87 in 1877, to \$1626.54, giving an increase of \$337.67. The large and

important District of St. Francis, during the year, contributed \$349.49 against \$123.45 in 1877, giving an increase of \$226.04.

In consequence, however, of the serious deficit at the beginning of the year, and the outstanding grants to Dudswell new Church, the Stoneham parsonage, (which have since been paid,) and the Hatley parsonage, the fund is still barely able to meet the recent applications for a new Church at Grosse Isle, Magdalene Islands, a parsonage for the Mission of Durham and enlargement of the parsonage at Inverness and Church at Maple Grove. Since these applications, another has been received for aid towards the substantial and well built parsonage at New Liverpool.

Your Board trusts that the effort which has been made to raise the financial position of the General Fund, will be vigorously carried on during the year.

MISSION FUND.

(Devoted to the payment of the Stipends of Missionaries in conjunction with the Annual grant from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, assessments from Rural Missions, and a grant from the Clergy Trust Fund. administered by the Diocesan Board.)

Your Board begs to refer to the Report of the Diocesan Board for a full account of the Missionary operations of the Society.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

It is gratifying to notice that the new By-law for the management of this Fund has met with the general approval of the Clergy throughout the Diocese.

The following clergymen have, according to the provisions of the new By-law, made the required number of subscriptions, and are therefore paid up members, viz.:—Revds. Smith, Merrick, Lyster, Ker, Short, Professor Roe, Von Iffland, Kemp, King, sr., Burrage, Woolryche, Vial, Fothergill and Housman.

The following are in course of completing their payments, viz.:—Revds. Ball, Hepburn, Roy, Richardson Dinzey, Chambers, Rawson, Washer, Brock, Boydell, Riopel, Boyle, Thompson, Sykes, jr., Parkin, Debbage, Allnatt, Richmond, Chapman, Foster, Jenkins and Blaylock.

The payments of the Rev. J. S. Sykes, sr., were in course of completion at the time of his decease.

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Twenty-two clergymen of the Diocese are still nonsubscribers; of these, eight are bachelors, and nine incligible.

Another claim has been added to the list in consequence of the lamented death of the late Rev. J. S. Sykes, sr.

PENSION FUND.

(For aged and retired Clergymen.)

There has been a decrease in the receipts for this Fund during the year of \$316.42.

Your Board has carefully considered a By-law for the management of the Fund, which will be introduced at the annual meeting of the Society. The capital of the Fund must, however, reach \$50,000 before any well devised scheme of payments (according to the rules governing an actuary's statement) can be adopted. In the meantime, should pensions be granted, each case must be taken on its merits.

EDUCATION.

The schools aided by the Society are, on the whole, making fair progress. The Inspector reports that the authorities of the various School Districts seem more and more alive to the great importance of a sound education on a religious basis.

More efficient teachers are being secured. The great drawback in many of the schools is a lack of suitable text books and school furniture. It is recommended that strict attention be paid to the rule enforcing uniformity of text books in all the schools aided by the Society.

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he great able text at strict y of text Your Board must again acknowledge with sincere thanks the very valuable aid received from the Colonial and Continental Church Society. This Society has not only granted assistance towards the payment of Teachers, but has also in many instances provided books, maps, &c., for the use of poor schools. The Colonial and Continental Church Society aids twenty-four schools in the Diocese. The Society also grants £50 stg. towards the Missionary's stipend on the Magdalen Islands.

This Society, which expects a corresponding return from the localities benefitted, has unfortunately so far received but a meagre return for the amount of aid extended in carrying on so valuable a work in the cause of education in this Diocese.

ALGOMA DIOCESAN FUND.

It is with very deep regret that your Board has to report that the Secretary, the Rev. George Hamilton, M.A., has been obliged, through ill-health, to relinquish the active duties of his office. Before leaving for Europe he called a meeting of those interested in the work in Quebec, and secured the assistance of active and efficient collectors, whose efforts have been crowned with success.

The regular quota of \$300 for the Episcopal Fund has been paid, and a further sum of \$425.42 forwarded to the Bishop for Missionary use in his Diocese, giving a total of \$725.42 sent through the Treasurer of the Church Society to the Diocese of Algoma, besides several amounts sent by private individuals for special objects.

In the Eastern Townships this Fund for the Canadian Missionary Diocese has been vigorously supported.

Your Board trust that by the blessing of God, the Rev. George Hamilton will be enabled to return during the

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coming summer and again resume his labour of love for the spread of the Gospel amongst our Indian tribes.

JANUARY.—\$107.27 granted to complete payments of the Education Committee. Annual Report. Secretary instructed to print as "small sums" all subscriptions under one dollar. Committee appointed to examine the Clerical Reports and prepare them for the Press. Recommendation of office-bearers for 1878.

Roe permitted to divide the grant to St. Stephen's Church School, (2) Grant withheld from the School at New Armagh, (3) on Mr. Langton's letter. Application from the Rev. J. DeMouilpied for \$100 from the Pension Fund. Grant of \$50 ordered to be paid to the school at Pierreville, St. Francis, when the Secretary of the C. & C. C. In comparing this statement with the account for 1877, your Board regrets to observe one or two points of an unfavourable nature.

In the first place it would appear that the receipts from assessments are \$436 less, although the amount due is \$687 more from increased assessments than in 1877, showing that the missions have fallen over \$1100 in arrears in excess of the arrears due in 1877.

In the next place the receipts from the Mission Fund are \$845 less than last year.

As a consequence of this decrease in two important sources of revenue, the balance in hand with which your Board began operations last year has been almost entirely expended, notwithstanding the fact that in 1878 the funds of the Board were strengthened by a grant of \$1970.40 from the Clergy Trust—more than double the amount lost to the Diocese by the dimunition of the S. P. G. Grant.

The payments for Stipends have been \$801 more than in 1877, a result which cannot fail to give satisfaction, inasmuch as it implies the full resumption of the ministrations of the Church in places unavoidably deprived for a time of a resident elergyman.

As the vacancies in those Missions have only been filled during a part of the past year, and there are still two without a clergyman, your Board anticipates a very considerable increase in its expenditure during the current year.

In referring to the falling off in the assessments received up to December 31st last, and the dimunition from the Mission Fund, it is obvious that, to a certain extent, at least, the same cause accounts for both, viz., the long continued depression in commercial interests of every description, equally affecting the merchant, the manufacturer, and the farmer; but there is this distinction which your Board desires to press upon the congregations receiving its aid that whereas subscriptions to the Mission Fund are entirely voluntary, an obligation rests upon every Churchman in a Mission to pay his subscription towards the assessment. A feeling of honour as an individual member of the Church, a desire to sustain the credit of the Mission to which he belongs and some sense of acknowledgment for the benefits in which he participates, all unite in constituting a strong obligation from which no man can endeavour to free himself without a sacrifice of sound principle.

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ceipts from due is \$687 7, showing rs in excess Your Board would take this opportunity of urging the members of the Church throughout the Diocese to increase their subscriptions to the Mission Fund and bring it up during the current year to the standard of 1877 at least. No increase can be made in the assessments, as a general rule, till 1881, and should the two missions now vacant, Labrador and Stoneham, be filled, of which there is a very good prospect, the expenditure of the Diocesan Board will be considerably augmented. The Mission Fund then must come to our aid or we shall inevitably fall into debt.

Your Board as administrator of the grant S. P. G. desires to urge upon the clergy serving in connection with the Board the duty of compliance with that Society's rule in regard to collections.

The interest taken by the S. P. G. in the Diocese is being gravely imperilled through the neglect of the clergy in this respect. If this neglect is persisted in it cannot fail to promote the views of those who maintain that the time has arrived when the S. P. G. should cease entirely to grant aid to the Diocese.

That any reduction in the Society's aid occasions a pressure which the Diocese can with difficulty bear, the experience of the past year proves conclusively; and the elergy themselves will be the first to exclaim against the hardships which a further reduction would unavoidably entail. Surely, then, it behooves them to give no cause of complaint in this matter, but, on the contrary, to respect the request of the S. P. G., by forwarding regularly those collections which that Society requires as one of the conditions on which aid is granted. Inasmuch as the Board is required to forward annually to the Society a list of the Missions in which collections have been taken up, the Board requests that in all cases they be forwarded through the Treasurer of the Church Society.

It is gratifying to find, that notwithstanding the reduced means from which most people are suffering in these hard times, ample evidence is not wanting to testify that the work carried on by the clergy is full of encouragement.

Full information as to the details of that work will be found in the individual reports of the clergy herewith submitted to the Society.

But few permanent changes have taken place during the past year.

The only appointments made have been those of the Revd. A. J. Woolryche to Bury, removed from Stoneham, and the Revd. G. R. Walters to the Mission of Malbaie—both made in the month of September.

REPORT

OF THE ST FRANCIS DISTRICT ASSOCIATION OF THE CHURCH SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF QUEBEC—DECEMBER 11TH, 1878.

At a public meeting held in the Court House in the Town of Sherbrooke, under the Presidency of the Right Reverend George Jehoshaphat Mountain, then Bishop of Montreal, the Saint Francis District Association of the Church Society was first organized.

There were present at that meeting gentlemen whose names are still cherished by many of us with affectionate remembrance.

Of the clergy who were present at its first meeting we light upon the names of Jackson. Doolittle, Ross, Fleming, Lonsdale, Reid, Roy, four of whom are not and three remain with us unto this day.

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Amongst the laity we find a Morris, a Fletcher, a Felton. a Lloyd, a Hale, a Chapman, and a Bowen; the last two named alone remain the lay representatives of that meeting.

In 1843, the St. Francis Association was the fifth association formed in the Diocese, and comprised three missions. viz., Bury, Melbourne and Hatley.

The first donation to the W. & O. Fund was a contribu-

tion by the Rev. C. P. Reid. The net proceeds from all sources in the district amount-

ed to \$295.

The District of St. Francis now comprises seventeen missions whose net proceeds amount to \$15,000. the fruit of that early organization of the St. Francis Association by the devoted sons of the Church to whom reference has been made. A foundation was then laid with modest hopes for the future. An impetus was then given to earnest Christian zeal which has gradually extended itself to many important branches of the Church's work throughout the Diocese, and by aiding the funds of the Parent Society, has in a great measure met the anticipation of its early formation, by preparing for that crisis when the claims of the Canadian Church upon Foreign aid must give way to those more urgent from new fields of usefulness opened to the Church at home. Let us hope that the members of this Association will keep this important object constantly before them, and so realize the duty of meeting manfully the total withdrawal of all Foreign aid.

The claims of the Church upon the funds of the Parent Society, which is in a measure supported by contributions from the District Associations, are every year becoming more urgent and more numerous, and thus its general fund has been found quite inadequate to meet the demands upon it for the promotion of several needy and praiseworthy un-

dertakings.

Reports have been received from the Missions of Acton. Barford, Coaticook, Compton, Cookshire, Durham, Danville, Drummondville, Hatley, Kingsey, Lennoxville, Magog, Stanstead and Sherbrooke, from which the following summary is made :-

MISSION OF ACTON.

The sum raised in the Mission of Acton falls short of that raised last year by \$285.38, and as there is no reference

made in the Report as to the cause of this deficiency, it may be traced to the absence of those extraordinary efforts which were made last year in the shape of concerts, teas and socials. The Missionary of Acton is buoyed up with the hope that the opening of the South Eastern Railroad will materially advance the interests of the Church in Acton.

BISHOP'S COLLEGE MISSIONS.

Bishop's College Missions are Moulton Hill, Ascot Corner, Westbury, Mitchells, Sand Hill, Milby, Libby's Mills and Island Brook, employing eleven students in the work. The Report of the Professor of Pastoral Theology is full of interest and will appear in the Annual Report of the Parent Society.

BROMPTON.

* No report.

BARFORD.

Barford presents a decrease of \$200.20 this year. The congregation at Norton and Stanhope has been reduced from forty to eight families. At Dixville there is a very promising Sunday School.

BURY.

* No report.

COATICOOK.

The amount raised in Coaticook is \$133.25 over that of last year, though depression has attended almost every public enterprise. A flourishing Sunday School and Church Pay School is reported as being highly appreciated and faithfully doing good work for the Church.

COMPTON.

Compton shews a small increase over the preceding year of \$5.79. Suitable chancel furniture and Church lamps have been provided by the efforts of the Ladies' Sewing Society. The ordinary parochial duties have been regularly performed and the services of the Church and School Houses attended by the usual congregations. Your Secre-

eding year trch lamps es' Sewing been reguind School our Secretary takes the liberty of adding to this modest statement that the Rector of Compton has kindly and successfully held a semi-monthly service in the Mission of Eaton, on the borders of Compton, and it affords him great pleasure to be able to testify to the high appreciation in which those services are held, and to the affectionate regard for the Rector of Compton entertained by the people who attend them.

COOKSHIRE.

During the past year the services have been well attended. A Sunday School is efficiently taught. A Sunday School Library and Hymnals have been procured. \$250 of the Church debt has been paid off. Amount raised over last year, \$125.50.

DURHAM.

The financial statement of the year shows an increase of \$71.60, and a total of \$1,003.71, and represents a contribution from each station to ten objects outside the Mission. A parsonage house has been built during the year and \$350 of the debt paid off. From the Report it may be gathered that the general aspect of the Mission is that of prosperity.

DUDSWELL.

DANVILLE.

Danville falls short of last year's contributions by \$28.46. This pecuniary deficiency is amply covered by the Parochial results of the year, as will be seen in the following statement:

The number of candidates confirmed 26, chiefly married or elderly people. Congregations steadily increasing. Communicants doubling. Responses and singing hearty.

A donation of land for a Church at Kingsey Siding.

The expression of a hope that before the Incumbent is called upon to write another report there will be at Kingsey Siding a neat little church, built, paid for, consecrated and well tilled.

DRUMMONDVILLE.

The Rector of Drummondville represents an actual increase over last year of \$106.69, though the financial state-

ment shows a less sum by \$12.11. This he accounts for by placing \$118.80 to the credit of outside contributions the previous year. He speaks of brighter prospects and of the necessity which exists for increased church accommodation,

HATLEY.

The Mission of Hatley represents an increase of \$241.71. In this Mission the work of the Missionary is represented by 50 baptisms and 30 confirmed. The increased assessment of both Hatley and Waterville were assumed by the congregation at Hatley.

KINGSEY.

The Missionary of Kingsey reports \$193.36 over last year; a willingness on the part of the people to respond to every call; a cheerful compliance in raising the Diocesan Board assessment. The parsonage and outbuildings have been repaired and painted.

LENNOXVILLE.

The Rector of Lennoxville has furnished merely a financial statement by which it appears a less sum was raised this year compared with the last year amounting to \$314.67.

MELBOURNE.

MAGOG AND GEORGEVILLE.

This large Mission appears to be well attended to by its present Incumbent assisted by two of the Divinity students from the staff of the Professor of Pastoral Theology of Bishop's College.

The Missionary occupies the enviable position of having had the late Governor-General and Lady Dufferin at the Parish Church when the Right Reverend Bishop Niles preached and did much to strengthen the Church in the Mission.

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SHERBROOKE.

The Co-Rector of St. Peter's, Sherbrooke, reports an increasing liberality on the part of that congregation; this is evident by the following comparison:

In 1877, the Parish contributed \$482.30 to the Church Society, this year it contributes \$576.30, an increase of \$94. Last year the total contributed to extra parochial objects was \$572.30, this year it amounts to \$851.30, an increase of \$279.

New communion linen has been purchased from St. Matthew's Guild, Quebec, and a handsome solid silver communion service has been procured from England.

STANSTEAD.

In this Mission the great work of the year has been to secure a parsonage—the amount available for that purpose is \$1,000. The Mission has been able to bear its financial liabilities without much difficulty. Several out-stations have benefitted by the regular services of the Church, the Missionary being assisted by students of Bishop's College from the staff of the Professor of Pastoral Theology.

A deficiency of \$240.67 appears as compared with money

raised last year.

A guild is doing good work.

ACTON.

The Rev. L. C. Wurtele reports :-

The attendance at our Church services has been about the same as heretofore. Many families, it is true, have been obliged to seek residences elsewhere, but others have filled their places. Although the French services have not been as well attended as I could wish, they have not been neglected, and every Sunday an opportunity is afforded to all Protestant French in the neighbourhood to hear the Church service read, and the praises of God sung in their own tongue.

On the 19th of May we commenced the envelope system of collecting funds for the Church, and, so far, we have succeeded as well as could be expected; but it will not do to boast, for several in the congregation have predicted it will be a failure, however, our full trust and hope is that they will be agreeably disappointed.

There have been two marriages, three burials and eight

baptisms.

BARFORD AND HEREFORD.

The Rev. A. Stevens reports:—That when the Mission was opened it was good times; money was plentiful and labour high. When our first subscription lists were passed around over \$300 were promised, but before the time for payment came the hard times were upon us, the price of lumber and labour fell, and we could not raise much more than the half of what was promised. The hard times have continued, and our collections have also continued to go down; but we hope, and I think not without reason, that the worst has passed. The Mission is a large and unweildly one, (containing 160 square miles,) the Church people scattered, and all with one or two exceptions very poor.

What I think may be depended on for the next three years is at follows:—Dixville, \$50, Barford, \$50, and Hereford and Perryboro' \$50, making a total of \$150. If we could begin with a clear sheet I think there would be but very little difficulty in raising this amount. At the end of three years it is not unreasonable to predict that \$50 a year

At the end of about six years the Coaticooke and Barford Endowment Fund will be available, and from this we shall receive \$100 more.

I had at one time one hundred children learning the Calvary Catechism, many of whom were too far away to attend Sunday School.

This statement will show you that there is plenty of work to be done.

The regular fortnightly services have been kept up in each of the five stations, and though the congregations have not been large, they were as good as could be expected. At Dixville-we have a very promising Sunday School and the interest in the work seems to increase.

In June the Bishop of the Diocese visited the Mission for the purpose of administering the rite of confirmation; there were 8 candidates. I hope to have another class of 8 or 10 ready for next summer.

The Mission now rejoices in the possession of two churches and a comfortable parsonage, all free from debt.

I wish to take this opportunity of expressing my thankfulness to the ladies of St. Peter's Church, Sherbrooke, for the gift of a large box of clothing for the poor, which was forwarded to me by Miss Beckett.

The Rev. H. C. Stuart reports:-

1. The Church services and Church work of this Mission have been uninterrupted during the past year, by any break in the regular ministrations, or any event of special significance.

During the summer months, in addition to the two regular services on Sunday, services were held daily in the Church at Bourg Louis and fortnightly at Pont Rouge, where Mr. Wm. Parke, with commendable zeal, has built a small chapel attached to his house, and fitted it up in a bright and attractive manner.

2. It affords me much pleasure to acknowledge the great help I have received from the three schools in this Mission, which have been in constant operation during the past three years. The teachers are honestly endeavouring to perform their duty in their positions of responsibility, and their influence for good upon their pupils is already bearing fruit. The schools are mainly supported by the Quebec Church Society and the Colonial and Continental Church Society. Through the generosity of these noble institu-

The importance of bringing up children under proper religious influence, it is impossible to exaggerate.

3. Through the liberality of several Church people, the Parsonage has been made comfortable and habitable during the winter months, and the Church has been enlarged so that we are no longer cramped for want of room. I gladly avail myself of this opportunity of acknowledging the generosity of those who have come to our assistance in the time of our need, especially of an anonymous contribution of eighty-five dollars.

5. From the various occurrences of the year I select three instances of suffering which have had a marked influence upon the lives of my parishioners, deepening apparently their religious convictions, making them more thoughtful and careful, and more contented with their lot.

I. Mrs. McCoombe, a widow, was an instance of cheerful endurance of pain amidst many trying and adverse circumstances. For four years she had been bed-ridden, suffering from a disease, the peculiarity of which consisted in the fact that her bones became so brittle that they would break one after another apparently without cause. Thus her arms and legs were broken three or four times. Her sufferings were extreme, but she was enabled to endure them all with a cheerfulness and resignation most remark. able. Lovingly and carefully was this Christian woman attended by her children throughout her terrible ordeal their unwearied devotion and thoughtfulness formed a picture of filial affection beautiful to behold. suffering life drew to its close. She received the Holy Communion for the last time with joy, and looked forward with eagerness to the time when she should depart and be with Christ. Looking upwards she seemed to be gazing into Paradise. "I see my Saviour beckoning to me, and He smiles," she said, as she stretched out her feeble hands, and tried to raise herself in her bed, "Even so, come, Lord Jesus." With these words upon her tongue, she sank gently back upon her pillow, the light faded from her eyes, and her soul was borne away by the angels. May the example of this suffering woman bear good fruit among those who knew and loved her.

II. Alexander Woods, a boy of fifteen, one of the choir boys of the Mission Church, went to Quebec into service, hoping to earn something for his father who was very poor, with a large family to support. I never knew a better boy—his innocence and gentleness made him to be loved by the whole community. A few days after his departure, he received a mortal injury from the kick of a horse, and only survived a few hours. I shall never forget the heart-rending agony of his poor parents,—it was terrible to witness. He was buried on the afternoon of Whitsunday,—the first anniversary of the festival on which he was confirmed and received his first communion.

III. Lydia McCoombe is a poor girl of twenty, who has been blind for many years. Her father is a widower, suffering from ill-health, old age, and poverty. As he belonged to the Methodist society, I was unaware of his misfortunes until he called upon me to solicit my aid in doing something for his daughter. Through the kindness of the Rev. C. Hamilton she was placed in an hospital where an operation has been performed upon her eyes. We hoped that her sad state would procure her admission into the Protes-

Her relations are all too poor to help her, I am unable to assist her, and I have no right to expect the Rector of St. Matthew's to take charge of the poor people of this Mission in addition to all his own.*

BROMPTON AND WINDSOR.

The Rev. C. B. Washer reports:-

Considering the circumstances of the Mission—that it is young, and of small and scattered population—there are signs that God is with us, and prospering our handy work.

Brompton.—In this division the congregations have been good and regular. The great event of the year has been the visit to the Mission of the Bishop of Quebec and Mrs. Williams. Sixteen persons were confirmed on the 25th June, and on the following Sunday came to first communion. This, with a few additions of the year besides, brings up our list of communicants to thirty. This is the Lord's doing, and our friends everywhere will join in the prayer, that these, our brethren, may be always growing in grace, and may perfect holiness in the fear of the Lord.

The expectations respecting our Sunday-School expressed in my last report, have been realized; the number of scholars has been increased, and praiseworthy progress has

been made in learning.

I wish I could say the prospect of a parsonage was brighter. A building for the purpose was begun in Brompton in the time of my predecessor, on a piece of land of which the deed was not previously obtained. Now the deed is refused until the Church Wardens agree to conditions not originally specified. I have done what I can to put an end to the difficulty, and having failed, leave the matter to others to settle.

Windsor.—While there is evidence of a good work going on here, the progress is very slow. I suppose the average congregation on Sundays would be called pretty good for

the place, yet there is room for improvement; and I trust that ere long those who are now negligent will appreciate fully the value of the means of grace provided by God for them.

· Nine candidates were confirmed on 24th June, of whom six came to first communion. The number of communicants is now sixteen, whom may the giver of all grace help to be regular, and make faithful soldiers and servants unto their lives' end.

The debt of sixty dollars on the Church building has been paid. There is a hundred dollars of mortgage on the Church land, which we shall struggle to clear off this winter. If the gentle reader should think it ought to be no struggle to pay so small a sum, I would solicit a visit to this place, assured that he will not depart without leaving something more than good wishes.

I am sorry our contributions to the various funds of the Church Society are below what I anticipated; but I see good reason to hope for better things by-and-by, and so shall go on expecting.

Lastly, I would take this opportunity of tendering thanks to the Rev. C. P. Reid, Rev. I. M. Thompson, and Ed. J. Harper, Esq., of Lennoxville University, for services kindly done during my three months' absence from the Mission.

CAPE COVE.

The Rev. William Gore Lyster reports:-

The year now drawing to a close has been peculiarly uneventful, if I except two pleasing incidents, namely, the visit of the Lord Bishop in August, and a successful attempt to pay off part of the debt due on our new church edifice.

As to the first, our Bishop's visit was, as it always is, a source of real pleasure and advantage to all of us.

Within the Mission forty-two young persons received the rite of confirmation, and these, with I think one exception, have since been communicants.

Our Cape Cove people were much cheered and encouraged by the Bishop's commendation of their zeal in building a new church; and the admiration of the building kindly expressed by His Lordship was very grateful to all.

Induced by a liberal offer from a kind but unknown friend, I determined in September to endeavour to pay off a portion at least of our church debt. However, it was with no little hesitation that I entered upon the task, for I was well aware that the summer fishery had been almost a failure, and that various causes contributed to a condition of financial depression amongst us, such as I had never known before.

Much to the credit of the congregation, in spite of this depression, nearly all, on my applying to them, gave cheerfully and indeed liberally. Some indeed were, I may say, generous even "beyond their power."

To the agents and clerks of Messrs. Robins and other establishments our thanks are due, for in some "Rooms" every one from the agent to the cook gave according to his "several ability."

In a few weeks I collected \$270, and I was thus enabled to claim \$100 offered by the friend referred to, the condition requiring us to raise \$200 having been fulfilled.

Our debt has thus been reduced from over \$800 to about \$300; pew rent to the amount of \$130 having been previously appropriated to that purpose.

Our Sunday School at Cape Cove has been in operation as usual during the summer and fall months, under the same teachers and with equally good results as last year.

Our three daily schools have, through the kind aid of the two societies—Church Society and Continental—been constantly open. Two of these are very creditable schools and are satisfactory in every respect. The third is badly attended, partly through the removal of children from the place, but chiefly from the insuperable apathy of parents, and is not so satisfactory as the others.

I subjoin amounts collected in the Mission during the year.

COATICOOK.

The Rev. J. Foster reports :-

The services in both the churches in this Mission have been regularly kept up during the current year.

The service at St. Stephen's Church, in the upper village, is very well attended in the morning, but not so well in the evening.

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pper village, so well in I am most thankful to be able to say that the services at this Church have greatly improved in heartiness of late,—nearly every person in the congregation taking part in the responsive parts of the worship.

The service at Christ Church, North Coaticook, is attended by the few church people who still remain there. I have kept up the service in the hope that when the manufacturing interests of the place revive, there may be a return of population sufficiently numerous to ensure, at least, a fair congregation.

The little Church is out of debt, free seated, has a good Cabinet organ, (paid for,) and is very neat and comfortable. We are waiting in hope for a return of such prosperity as will bring us a congregation.

Since 1874 this village, it is thought, has lost nearly one half of its then population,—consequently the Church is numerically weaker now than it was four years ago.

The Lord Bishop held a confirmation in St. Stephen's Church on the 18th of June last, when twenty-four candidates presented themselves for the Apostolic rite, and, on the same day, partook of their first communion.

I cannot speak too highly of the devout earnestness of all the members of this class, evinced during the six months which I spent in preparing them. I have every reason to believe that they will prove themselves to be staunch, conscientious and intelligent members of the Church in this Mission.

I have three full services every Sunday, at two of which the Rev. Andrew Balfour, who resides here, very kindly assists me. The Sunday School is in a flourishing condition, as far as attendance is concerned, but there is a lack of suitable Sunday School books. The old library granted by the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge is completely worn out. I purpose, as soon as possible, taking steps to add a few useful books to our present scanty stock.

The Church school is well attended, and is taught by Miss Young, of the McGill Normal School. Miss Young gives unusual satisfaction to the parents of the children. She also assists in teaching in the Sunday School, where there are three other teachers beside herself.

It requires continual vigilance and a good deal of what may be called Controversial preaching to guard our people in this Mission against the ravages of heresy, of one kind or another, in which this place so plentifully abounds. The Second Adventists and the Universalists are now making great efforts to establish congregations in the place. Well-instructed and staunch Church people are, of course, not at all influenced by any of these religious movements, but there are always a few in every Parish who are weak in the faith, and they are, at all times, liable to be drawn away.

Parish visiting is kept up as usual, and as much time is given to that necessary department of my work as I can

possibly spare.

COOKSHIRE.

The Rev. E. C. Parkin reports:-

During the past year the services of the Church have been better attended than for many years. There is a visible improvement in the religious tone of the congregation, evidenced by a devout demeanour and hearty responses.

The Sunday School is well attended and efficiently taught. A Sunday School library has been procured, and hymnals for the scholars. \$250 of Church debt has been

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efficiently cured, and has been paid off. There have been ten adult baptisms and confirmations, six of the recipients being parents.

Since my last report, Island Brook, which, though not forming a part of my Mission, has been for many years under my pastoral care, has, with my own concurrence, been passed over by the Lord Bishop of Quebec to the hands of the Professor of Pastoral Theology of Bishop's College. I think it my duty to state that Island Brook has received the ministrations of the Church at my hands for seven years, for two years once a month, and for five years fortnightly, with unfailing punctuality.

DANVILLE, TROUTBROOK AND KINGSEY SIDING.

The Rev. H. J. Petry reports:-

I am thankful to say that since writing my last report I have been able to discharge all the duties in connection with these three Missions without any interruption.

The necessity for a sub-division of these Missions is

vearly growing more pressing.

On the 28th November, the Bishop arrived to hold two confirmations; nine were presented at Danville, seventeen at Troutbrook,—the candidates being chiefly married or elderly people.

The congregation at these two places are more than holding their own; they are quietly and steadily increasing. The communicants are doubling in numbers. The heartiness of the services, as evinced in the responding and singing, is a matter of general notice. I am sorry, however, to remark that the offertories are weak; it would be a good thing for the Church at large were the Government to call in all the five cent pieces.

The people belonging to the McKeage Road and Kingsey Siding Mission met the Bishop in conference at Pope's School House, on the 29th November. After a short and appropriate service, the congregation resolved itself into a Consultation Committee, for the purpose of discussing the question of the proposed new church, and to decide upon the site,—Mr. Moyles being willing to give the necessary amount of ground adjoining the School House, distant about six miles from Danville; while Mr. Chadsey offered a handsome two acre corner lot, distant two or three hundred yards from Kingsey Siding station, and about four miles from Danville. It was agreed that the matter should be decided by the Bishop, who, after hearing the pros and cons of the case, accepted Mr. Chadsey's offer. vote of thanks was immediately and unanimously voted to the generous donor. It is to be hoped that before I am called upon to write another report we shall see a neat little church built, paid for, consecrated, and well filled.

During the summer I carried on a missionary service every Friday, alternately at Pope's School House and the Mountain Settlement, two miles south of the Pinacle.

I have to thank my indefatigable warden, Mr. Devey, of Danville, for the manner in which he has discharged his duties. Were it not for his untiring activity and intelligent zeal in all matters concerning the Church, the Shipton Mission would have suffered. His eldest daughter has kindly undertaken to collect for the Church Society, her sister, Miss Lillie, only thirteen years of age, presides most efficiently at the harmonium.

Our Church Society collectors in Troutbrook are Miss

Betsy Thurber and Miss Jane Robertson.

There is a debt on the Parsonage of three hundred dollars, covered by a mortgage at ten per cent.; the interest is paid (as rent) by the Incumbent in charge.

The Registers indicate 18 baptisms, 10 burials, and 2

marriages.

DUDSWELL.

The Rev. T. S. Chapman reports:-

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Up to March last, my Sunday services were divided between St. Paul's, Marbleton, the Good Shepherd, Dudswell Corner, and St. Thomas', Westbury. Since then the services at the last mentioned Church have been supplied by the Rev. Professor Roe and Divinity students. This arrangement has enabled me to concentrate my work nearer home, giving to St. Paul's morning and evening services, and to the Good Shepherd my afternoons with aid in the Sunday schools at both Churches. The congregations have been good. The only material improvements undertaken during the year have been the ornamental planting and fencing of the Church yard and burial ground, and the purchase of a very fine-toned bell, weighing 625 lbs., for the Church of the Good Shepherd. Such a bell is a credit to either town or country. Chandeliers for the more efficient lighting of St. Paul's have been procured. Christmas trees for the children of both congregations have been provided.

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The Model School is doing its work efficiently under the able management of Miss Amy McKee, a graduate of the McGill Normal School. Our numbers are somewhat affected by the influx of French into our little village, who occupy positions formerly held by our own people.

Owing to the continued stringency of the times, our railway debt, and the removal of Westbury from my charge, we are having a pretty hard task to make up our increased assessment. I have good hope, however, that it will be

done.

A font, a communion service, an organ, and a horse shed are necessities yet to be provided for the Church of the Good Shepherd. Faith and hope in no small degree are necessary to buoy one up against the never ending claims that arise for Church work.

DURHAM.

The Rev. G. T. Harding reports :-

I am happy to be able, again this year, to give a good

account of the allairs of our Mission.

The work has gone on prosperously, in very much the same way as stated in my last report. Services were held in all the churches, throughout the year, as usual, with equally as good success, generally, as last year, and in some respects, I am thankful to say, rather better. In L'Avenir,

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for instance, the attendance, which, as will be seen in the last report, was then remarkably good, has not fallen off this year in the least; while in Upper Durham, probably, and in South Durham certainly, some improvement is to be noticed. I have good hopes that the farmers of the latter place will yet become regular Church-goers, duly prizing the means of grace which God has placed within their reach.

Holy Communion has, on the whole, been fairly attended, but no marked increase in the number of regular communicants can be claimed for any part of the Mission. There are many secret causes, connected with the family, personal and worldly affairs, which affect this matter, without sensibly affecting the attendance at ordinary services. It is often difficult or impossible to get at these causes, and I do not think that too much urging is advisable or likely to increase the real spiritual life of our congregations. Indirect influence and work, with prayer and an earnest expectation that God will in his own time and way work with us, is frequently the best way to deal with the matter.

Throughout last Leut I held a special week night service, every week, in each of the three churches, and, generally speaking, was well rewarded for my trouble. We did not have any large congregations, and such was not expected; for, as will be remembered, the spring opened and the roads broke up this year unusually early, so that for nearly the whole Lenten season, it was very difficult to move about. In South Durham and L'Avenir, however, these services were remarkably well attended, considering the unfavorable circumstances, and were altogether very encouraging to myself, for I had the assurance that those who came to them made some sacrifice, and were consequently blessed in doing so.

The Cottage Missions of which I spoke in my last report, and which were so successful the winter before, were, last winter, almost a failure. This was owing, partly at least, to my being absent for a month in mid-winter and the snow leaving us so early in the spring as before noticed. I propose, however, to try them again this year, and have hopes

of better success attending them.

We were favoured in June last by a visit from the Lord Bishop, on which occasion sixteen persons were confirmed, all but one of whom have been admitted to Holy Communion, and some of them have become regular communicants. It is with great pleasure that I now inform your Society of the erection of a handsome and commodious Parsonage for this Mission. The work was begun early in July, and pushed on with great vigor by the contractor ever since, so that the building is now completed and ready for occupation. It is a balloon-framed cottage, cased outside with brick, of Gothic style, and after the model of, though rather smaller than the Kingsey Parsonage. About \$350 of the debt incurred will be paid this year, and by the end of next, we hope with outside help, to nearly clear off the balance.

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We have, as usual, collected for the various objects of your Society, and also, as will be seen by the financial statement, for some outside of it. I think that the total of such offerings is not much below what it was last year, though a falling off might naturally, perhaps, be expected, on account of the great local call upon our resources in building a Parsonage. Let me here remark, in regard to the money raised this year on behalf of the Jews, that I was urged to the work by the Rev. E. A. W. King, and think it a most important one. There can be no doubt that we owe to this people under God a great debt, and have not made sufficient effort in the past to discharge it. I cannot but think that a special blessing is connected with such work, and that a sincere desire to be engaged in it will ensure to ourselves and our

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Missions a fulfilment of the promise, "They shall prosper that love thee." Our Church, too, of all the Christian bodies, is the most likely to have an influence with the Jews,—and the Society in England, which is striving to benefit them, deserves our confidence, as any one may be convinced by reading its reports. I would therefore take this opportunity of heartily recommending other Missions to do something to help on the work.

In the financial statement appended, the amounts for outside objects represent, as in the last report, the totals of public offertories and of private contributions collected by means of the missionary cards and boxes. The rest of the statement will sufficiently explain itself.

The Parish Register shows, for the Church year, 6 burials, 18 baptisms, and 4 marriages.

I close with a humble acknowledgment of God's goodness to our Mission generally, and to myself in particular, during the past year.

DRUMMONDVILLE.

The Rev. F. J. B. Allnatt reports:-

Last year I spoke of the financial prospects of this parish as being at a very low ebb. Since that time several new families have been added to our number, attracted by the factories lately established here, and I begin to hope we may ere long enjoy some relief from the chronic condition of struggle and difficulty under which we have been so long labouring.

Our gains thus far hardly balance our losses. Political changes, in depriving Mr. Hemming, our chief subscriber of his judicial office, have deprived us of his large contribution, making a serious deficiency. Had it not been for the zealous activity and perseverance of our new Church Warden, Mr. Wright, who has imported from the old country its energy and determination, our parochial finances would have been in danger of collapsing altogether during the past summer.

As it is, it will be seen that although the gross amount of our receipts for Church purposes falls short by nearly \$12 of last year's total, yet the amount actually contributed by the Parish has been larger this year by \$106.69. Last year it was necessary to hold a concert and bazaar to enable us to meet current expenses. By this means \$118.80 was raised, in a great measure by visitors from a distance. This year we have had no such extraneous assistance.

I am thankful to note increasing congregations, render-

ing it necessary to build more pews.

We had a very pleasant visit from the Bishop and Mrs. Williams in June, when 17 young people were confirmed.

EAST FRAMPTON.

The Rev. F. Boyle reports :-

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. Political bscriber of During the year several parties have migrated to the United States, some with a view of settling there, others to obtain a few months' labour; but in one case and another they find by experience that the olive branch is not indiscriminately spread over their path in that country either, so they are gradually dropping back again. The result is, we stand to-day numerically about the same as last year.

Our people here are poor, poor in worldly goods beyond the common lot of poverty, either in this Diocese, and I believe, any other Diocese in the Dominion.

Yet the generality of them are struggling hard and gratefully to meet their Church dues, and thus, and I believe thus only, "to prove their faith by their deeds." But some there are, and it is with extreme sorrow it is said, who hold back from doing their duty, waiting for their more liberal brethren to do it for them. This being an evil not easily controlled, has to be borne as one of our trials.

The Church services in both churches, with very few exceptions, have been duly maintained, and the attendance tolerably good.

Our School, both day and Sunday, is working well. The former, under the charge of Miss Penney, the latter, under the guidance of Mr. G. Bagnall.

GASPÉ BASIN.

The Rev. J. P. Richmond reports:—

During the past year the usual services have been held, and the attendance has been about the same as in former years.

The number of deaths has been unusually large, including the departure of two very old members of the Church, who, in past years, were very active in Church matters. Mr. Philip Bechervaise, senior, and Mr. John Eden, for many years Church Warden; also, two very promising young men.

St. Paut's Church.—The congregation are still struggling to finish the new Church. This year has seen the completion of the inside ceiling and walls, and casing of the windows, and clap-boarding of a portion of the outside. Several local subscriptions are still unpaid owing to the hardness of the times, and several have been lost to the Church by the removal of the subscribers.

Owing to the destruction of the Hotel last spring, the number of summer visitors was small, and consequently the congregation during the summer months was smaller than usual.

St. James' Church.—The congregation have repaired the Church, the site of which has been very badly chosen in a clay swamp, consequently the building is always working with the frost and water, and the fence always out of order, and the churchyard in the spring of the year almost a standing pool of water.

Schools.—There are five schools in the Mission, in most of which a Sunday school is held. It has been necessary to increase the school tax in order to open a school at L'Anse aux Cousins, and to maintain the efficiency of the other schools in Gaspé South. This, together with the assessment and demands for local Church purposes, presses very hard upon the people whose circumstances have done anything but improve for the last few years—and this year the people are without winter employment.

HATLEY.

The Rev. A. J. Balfour reports :-

Divine service has been held with little or no interruption every Lord's Day during the past year at St. James' Church, Hatley, St. John's Church, Waterville, and at Services have also been given at St. James' Massawippi. Church and St. John's Church on the chief festivals, and Three Sunday Schools have been on other occasions. maintained during the summer and autumn. For one of these, held at King's Corner, I am indebted to Mrs. Earle. I have given much time and thought to Parochial visiting during the year; I have travelled close upon four thousand miles in the discharge of this duty, frequently spending an evening with a family living at a distance from their Church, and sometimes with a family not belonging to our communion, in order that I might bring home to them, as far as it was in my power, the office and duty of a pastor. I hope, and believe, that I have in this way done some good at least in stimulating an interest in the spiritual welfare of the Mission, and in removing misunderstandings and prejudices as to our doctrines and practices. Reference was made in last year's report to a building then recently purchased for a parsonage. A difficulty shortly after that arose with regard to obtaining a clear title, but it is confidently expected that it will very soon be satisfactorily removed, and this without expense on our part. Meanwhile the most of our purchase money, \$200, which was most

gen-rously given by kind friends in Quebec, lies in the Eastern Townships' Bank.

Referring last year to the contemplated increase in the assessment of this Mission, I ventured to express my belief that my people would not be found backward in taking upon them their share of the increased liabilities thrown upon the Diocese by the reduction of the S. P. G.'s grant. I am happy to be able to report that when the deputation came, my people at once cheerfully undertook to raise the additional amount asked of them by the Diocesan Board. and not only so, but, learning that their sister congregation at Waterville was not in a position to comply with the Board's demand, generously volunteered to assume their share also I need not say that I fully participate in the gratification expressed by the deputation at this christian conduct on the part of my Hatley congregation. We are indebted to Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Murray for the present of a handsome tapestry carpet for the transcept of St. James' Church, Hatley. Chiefly through the instrumentality of Mr. Henry Pennover and Mrs. Anthony Wiggett a new fence has been erected about the Church and Burial Ground of St. John's, Waterville, at a cost of about \$55.

In August last we had the pleasure and benefit of a visit to our neighbourhood from the Right Reverend the Bishop of New Hampshire, advantage of which was taken, with his kind and courteous consent, to hold what is called "an all day service" in the "Old Church," the centre of the Adventists' Society. The Bishop preached thrice to large and attentive congregations. The services were made further interesting by the assistance of the Hatley choir and by the liberal distribution of prayer books and hymn books. In June, our own Bishop visited us, when the sacrament of baptism was administered to ten adults, and confirmation to thirty-four candidates.

INVERNESS.

The Rev. P. Roe reports:-

The services and Sunday School work have been going on regularly in this Mission until the 13th October, when I was absent (on leave) for some weeks. During my absence, I was indebted to my good brother, the Revd. T. L. Ball, for a service at St. Stephens on the 20th October, and to my kind neighbour, the Rev. John Kemp, for another service at Campbell's school-house on Sunday, the 3rd November. During the fine weather, the services at all the stations have been well attended; in rough weather and bad roads, there is always a great falling off.

The Rev. Rural Dean Fothergill paid an official visit to the Mission on Sunday, the 24th February; he preached to a large congregation at St. Stephens and administered the Holy Communion to thirty-three members; he at the same time took occasion to address the congregation on the readjustment of the Diocesan assessment.

On Sunday, the 17th March, the Lord Bishop held an ordination service in St. Stephens, when I was admitted to the Holy order of the priesthood. There was a very large attendance from all parts of the Mission, and many had to go away, not being able to obtain admission. The Rev.

Professor Roe, the Rev. John Kemp, B.D., and the Rev. W. King, St. Sylvester, were in attendance on his Lordship, and took part in the service; there was a large number of communicants.

In connection with our Sunday School work, I may mention a very successful pic-nic for the Sunday School children, held in September, on Mr. Thomas Witton's grounds, near the Church. It was largely attended by the members of the congregation, and greatly enjoyed by all, especially the young people. Mrs. Dr. Reed, Mrs. Austin, and Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Lyster took an active part in making all go off pleasantly. This may seem a small matter to some, but it has been a great event in our quiet little Mission.

St. Stephens' Church, the only Church in our Mission, has been enlarged by adding to its length 12 feet, and a small vestry, at a cost of about \$150. The people in the Mission have subscribed \$50, the Messrs. King Brothers \$50, and I have undertaken to collect the balance. This addition has very much improved the appearance of the little old Church, and when finished, (the painting is left over till the spring) will be a great comfort and convenience to the congregation. I think it right to state that Mr. W. J. Smythe, a prominent member of the congregation, took the leading part in this work, for which he deserves the thanks of all the members of the Church here. Honour to whom honour is due.

This Mission is especially indebted to Mr. James and Mr. Charles King for their liberality in paying so largely towards the support of this Mission; indeed it is admitted by all, and may be truly recorded here, that the Mission could not be kept open, under the arrangement with the Diocesan Board, were it not for their large contributions to the assessment; they are worthy sons of their late father, who did so much for the support of the Mission during his lifetime.

There are a number of young people being prepared for confirmation. The Bishop had intended to hold a confirmation at St. Stephens when on his tour in the early part of December, but the Church was then being enlarged, and we were not able to hold the service.

IRELAND.

The Rev. T. L. Ball reports:—

The enlargement and restoration of Trinity Church has so far progressed as to allow the use of Chancel and Vestry. About \$400 has been carefully expended. The improvement is very marked both within and without the building. Our thanks are tendered to kind friends in Quebec for \$78, and in Sherbrooke for \$22 for this purpose. The Ladies' Association was able to make a grant also of \$140 from funds raised through the exertions of the members, who beg to acknowledge the kindness of Mrs. Williams in sending a supply of hymn books for use in Church, and also a number of articles of her own work which sold for a good price. A new class room has been added to the school house and the school kept open the whole year under efficient teachers.

Christ Church has fallen a quarter in arrears in assessment to Diocesan Board. They naturally feel the increase in assessment and being deprived of service once a month,

on Sunday. I hope the way may be clear to place the Parish School ere long under a Deacon, who will be able to assist in the Parish work. The Church needs to be restored or renewed, but has to wait with other work till we have an increase in funds and laborers.

Adderley has suffered more than any other part of the Parish by the removal of Church families. The fortnightly Sunday service has been fairly attended and the interest in

Church work kept up.

We have been cheered by the visit of the Bishop for confirmation and Missionary meeting. The Rev. Rural Dean Fothergill and Rev. T. S. Chapman, of Dudswell, attended our Missionary meeting and delivered addresses. The Rev. Professor Roe also spent a few days visiting some of the families in the Parish and no doubt improved the opportunity.

LEEDS.

The Rev. J. Kemp reports:-

The usual services have been kept up in the Mission during the past year at the several churches and stations. involving long journeys over roads which make travelling anything but a pleasure. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese has paid us two visits, and on each occasion favored us with a missionary address. Confirmation was held in St. Mark's Church, Kinnear's Mills, on the 16th December, when 22 young people were confirmed; and on the 17th at St. James' Church, Leeds, when twenty-six renewed their baptismal vows. The preparation of these was commenced last July, and from the scattered nature of my Mission, I had to take them at ten different points, and to see each one once, I had to travel over a hundred miles. wishing to say too much about my labours, I may remark, that during the summer season my Sunday work is about twenty miles and three services, and I have also services on week days in certain localities, where there are old people, or where any are too far from the Church to attend the services.

At St. James' Church, Leeds, a Sunday School has been kept up during the summer months for a number of years, superintended by our worthy Lay Delegate, Mr. George Bayne, who is assisted in the work by some of our young ladies of the congregation. I may also add that the Church here is very much indebted to Mr. Bayne, for more than a quarter of a century of faithful service and constant work, both in the Sunday School and Choir, which must have more then once fallen to the ground had he not held on

through all discouragements.

Mr. Wm. McVitey, Church Warden, has also taken charge of a Sunday School at St. Mark's Church during the past summer, where there has been an attendance of from 20 to 30. I gave instruction in each when I was able to be present. St. Mark's Church has been new shingled and the outer walls white-washed during the past year. I must here also acknowledge the efficient work done by the young lady collectors for the Church Society. The subscriptions this year have fallen off—cause, hard times; while some will not give because all the subscribers' names are not inserted in the Report.

MAGOG AND GEORGEVILLE.

The Rev. J. Hepburn reports:-

The present Mission of Magog and Georgeville was formerly two distinct ones. The union of them was not owing to the smallness of the field, nor the scarcity of the work, but to the want of men and means. This is to be lamented, for I believe one man is not able to do efficiently the work he sees to be done. It is not as though the Mission were old, and the people had learned to value the distinctive privileges of the Church—the field is but newly opened up; there are many strange and strong prejudices against us—and our position can only be kept by hard labour; the congregation is to be gathered, and that can only be done by visiting from house to house. This latter task is not easy, when it is borne in mind that for years "divers and strange doctrines" have been preached, oftentimes with great zeal and feryour, (the Scripture being used on all occasions as the store-house of these doctrines) and that many have been impressed with these, and consider themselves prepared and called upon to defend them, or else have heard and doubted and turned away hardened, sickened of everything that professes to be religion. Too often a conversation is but a cold and heartless argument, when the pastor is painfully reminded that the object in view is not the gaining of truth, but the building up of a side, and when he is conscious of God's holy word being used not "as a lamp to the feet and a light to the path," but as a work to make one clever at an argument. After an experience of this kind how cheered one is to come across a "humble man of heart?" an anxious enquirer! And this is, I am glad to say, not of unfrequent occurrence.

The regular order of service has not been broken throughout the year, viz.: three each Sunday, excepting once a month, when there are but two; service on holydays generally, three special week-day services during Advent and Lent.

During the summer months our numbers were greatly increased by visitors from other parts, who came to enjoy our beautiful Lake; and in order to obtain morning service at both centres on Sundays, one of the Lennoxville students lent his assistance. Mr. Judge helping the first month, and Mr. Lee the second.

It is with much gratification that I record the undertaking of additional work in a district about six miles distance from Magog, towards Massawippi Lake. A man from that district, tired of Advent preachers, came to St. Luke's Church, Magog, on Christmas, and he was so deeply moved that he remained to see me privately. pleaded with me to visit him and his neighbors and begin to hold services. This I declined, seeing that the region was wholly given to "isms," and again, because there was more than I could do satisfactorily in the region known to me and under my care. However, he returned saying that he had been speaking with others and that they all desired it and would pay for my trouble. The pay did not move me, for I could not think of taking extras, but it did seem as if I should be guilty were I not to obey this call. Shortly after New Year I began, taking a few friends at first to aid in response, and have been encouraged to keep them up since. Already we have a fair little congregation of young men and women chiefly, who are most attentive to the teachings given, and who have learned to enter themselves into the prayers of our Mother Church. Five have been baptized, and several more are in preparation. Let us thank God and take courage.

Through the kind assistance of young ladies in the two centres of work, the Sunday Schools have prospered. Misses Sweeney, Phelan and Harrower in Magog, and Misses Tuck, Packard and Bullock in Georgeville, doing their duty faithfully.

In Magog, where I am able more conveniently to oversee the work and consult with the teachers, a good school of thirty has risen from a very small beginning.

Whooping-cough has greatly thinned our numbers at

Georgeville for two months past.

In the schools a very lively interest has been taken.

The Christmas tree at Georgeville was a great success, 200 or more assembling on the occasion, and 150 remaining

to close a happy day in church.

Through the kindness of two brother clergy, the "Magic Lantern" was shown in both villages; at Georgeville by Rev. A. Stevens of Dixville, and at Magog by Prof. Roe of Lennoxville.

The annual Sunday School pic-nie was on a larger scale than usual, the Revds. Clayton and Kittson (my neighbours in the Diocese of Montreal) bringing their schools together, and all going on board the "Lady of the Lake" to Owl's Head.

Mrs. LaFrenaye gave an additional treat to the children

of Magog in the grove by her residence.

The need of a Sunday School library was sorely felt, and Mr. Webster, of Magog, very generously began a subscription with \$10, which was supplemented to the amount of \$37.22, and with this a very respectable library was bought.

The ladies of Georgeville formed themselves into a Society of workers for the Church, making articles for a Bazaar in the summer, giving entertainments on a small scale each fortnight, thus bringing in about \$100. Also in the summer, through the invitation of certain friends in Georgeville, the young ladies and gentlemen of Stanstead came over and gave a concert (interspersed with readings) which brought in \$50 more.

The Magog ladies are now working for a similar object. The Mission was honored by the Governor-General and Lady Dufferin spending the Sunday in it, and attending the Parish Church. On that occasion Bishop Niles, of New Hampshire, kindly assisted by preaching, and there being a great assembly, did much to strengthen the Church in

these parts.

His Lordship spent three days in the Mission, confirming in the two centres 14, and at a private house 2—16.

MAGDALEN ISLANDS.

The Rev. J. Chambers writes :--

In forwarding my report for this summer's work, I have to say that only one or two things of more than ordinary

importance have taken place.

The Bishop arrived at Amherst Island on Thursday, 25th July, in ss. "Albert;" the Mission boat being in readiness ran alongside to convey His Lordship to Grindstone Island. distant about ten miles from Amherst. A smart breeze blowing, the boat soon ran across the Bay and arrived safely. Arrangements were made to proceed to Grosse Isle on Saturday, ready for Divine Service on Sunday. day appointed, the boat was got ready and we embarked. The leaden hue and flying scud foretold heavy weather, but we were limited to time, the Bishop wishing to visit the whole group before the arrival of the next steamer, which would be in a fortnight. Had it not been for this we should probably have postponed the visit; but with the strong favourable wind then blowing there was good probability of our arriving at Grosse Isle before the heavy part of the breeze should strike. In this, however, we were disappointed, for we had hardly been under weigh half-an-hour before the gale began, the sea lashed furiously, sail after sail was reefed, and, at last, all the boat could carry was a close-reefed foresail. Fifteen miles had yet to be traversed, and the question was whether we should proceed or run under a point of land jutting further into the Bay. The latter was decided upon, and bringing ..\$ 659 82

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the boat close to the wind, we hauled under the lee as close as possible, the sea washing fore and aft until we anchored. The wind still increased and at noon was at its height, and continued blowing furiously, but at about 3 o'clock it abated somewhat and the boat was got under weigh and scudding rapidly before the wind arrived safely at Grosse Isle. Here I would thank those kind friends of the Mission in Quebec to whom I am indebted for our Mission boat, which is safe and able.

I had previously sent word to the inhabitants of Grosse Isle that the Bishop would be with them on Swaday, if possible, which gave them time to gather from the different places around Grosse Isle.

On Sunday morning the Church was literally filled with

people, and His Lordship confirmed ten persons.

In the afternoon, three others, who had been previously prepared, came forward for confirmation; these were unavoidably absent in the morning, two of them being on Bryon Island, distant from Grosse Isle ten miles, but they beat their boat against a head wind the whole way, thus showing their earnestness.

On Monday we returned to Grindstone, but had hard work, having to beat against wind and tide a distance of twenty miles, arriving late in the evening.

During the week the Bishop embarked for Entry Island, and having splendid weather, arrived early. Here the people expressed their hearfelt gladness at seeing their Bishop once more. In the evening the house of Mrs. Dickson was filled with people for Divine Service; one adult woman was baptized by His Lordship, and, afterwards, with seven others, was confirmed.

The following morning we returned to Grindstone Island, as arrangements had been made to spend the Lord's Day there. We had some difficulty in finding room for all in our little Church, for men, women and children all came to Church, which is not always the case; beside this, a number of strangers from the mainland were visiting the Islands, they also attended service.

Seven persons were confirmed, one being an adult man.

Amherst Island had yet to be visited, and on this occasion we travelled by the land, or rather by the beach, which connects the two Islands. This route, however, is not always safe, as there are dangerous quicksands in

several gullies along the beach, which often give trouble to passers-by. I will give you an example: -Early this summer. I was travelling alone to Amherst and was crossing one of these gullies, when suddenly I found the horse and cart sinking. I knew at once I was in quicksands, and immediately jumped out of the cart up to my knees in water and sand, and by constantly moving, succeeded in untack. ling my horse. The animal, finding itself clear of the cart. plunged tremendously, and by so doing, got clear of the quicksands, but the cart sank as far as the box, and would have disappeared altogether, had not the pressure of water under the box resisted it sinking. Fortunately, some men were busy hauling a seine close by, and with their assistance, I recovered the cart, and got off with a good ducking of water and sand. But to return-on this occasion with the Bishop no trouble ensued and we arrived safely at Amherst.

On Thursday, Divine Service was held and six persons confirmed. At midnight the Bishop embarked on board ss. "Albert," much to our regret, for we were all sorry at his departure, for words of holy love, counsel and comfort had been given to all.

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The next point of importance is our schools.

I wrote to the Department of Public Instruction. Quebec, requesting permission to form all the Protestants into one school municipality, to be under the control of a Board of Trustees selected from the different islands. But this was not granted. However, the Council gave permission to declare dissent, and to have one schoolmaster under the ioint control of two or more Boards of Trustees. ingly declarations of dissent were signed and forwarded, two Boards of Trustees were formed, and one schoolmaster passed examination for diploma. This school-master is to receive two hundred dollars (\$200) per annum, and he is to work at alternate intervals at Grindstone and Grosse Isle under the joint control of the two Boards. This is but a beginning. I hope before many years have passed to see a school-master for each municipality (dissentient of course.) We can get men easily, but money is what we want.

My own work has gone on as usual. I have visited as often as possible my several congregations on the different islands, holding services in churches and houses, and administering Holy Communion at proper intervals.

The amount collected for the Church Society is \$19.49.

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MALBAIE.

The Rev. G. Radley Walters reports:-

I was inducted into this Mission on the 30th of July last by the Rev. Rural Dean Lyster, so that I have only been here six months.

When I came I found the people all eager for the services of the Church, and ready to welcome me amongst them, which they did in a very hearty manner.

Malbaie and Point St. Peter are purely Church of England stations. The people, though in most cases poor, are strongly attached to their Church, and seem ever ready to second their minister's efforts for good. I am sorry to report that the fishing season this year proved to be a poor one for my people. The cod, the principal article of our commerce, did not visit our shores in such numbers as last year, and this necessarily implies that it has been but a

poor season for Church work.

With us coast people, a scarcity of fish means a corresponding scarcity of money; and with little or no ready cash, many and many a poor family, good deserving people all, have to go with little or no flour this winter. Still we must hope that when this night of distress and hard times has passed away, the morn of prosperity will again light

up our shores.

However, we have done our best and have succeeded, in spite of hard times, in doing a little most necessary work to our Church. We have underpinned and boarded both Church and chancel, placed lead as gutters between Church and chancel to prevent a most decaying leak; we have also completed our vestry. Next spring we have, what I look upon as a far more difficult task, to fence in an acre and a half of land. Our old fence is completely worn out. We hope also to be able to paint the outside of the Church.

In the month of August His Lordship the Bishop visited the Mission and held a confirmation service, when twenty young persons came forward to receive the Apostolic rite.

I hold regular monthly services at the Corner of the Beach, where I spend the whole of the Sunday. I have also week night services at the Barachois, which are fairly attended. I am indebted for the celebration of the Holy Communion in my Mission to my neighbouring brethren, and in order to this we have to exchange duty.

My register shows for the six month-10 baptisms, 4 marriages, 2 burials.

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NEW CARLISLE AND PASPEBIAC.

The Rev. Thos. Blaylock reports:-

After a residence of little more than a year in this Mission, I beg to present my first report to the Board.

It was with some doubt and misgiving that I entered upon my work here, but the dark cloud which for some time past has been hanging over us, seems to be breaking away.

The chief event to notice was the visit of our Bishop for confirmation. I wish sincerely that the visits of His Lordship to the coast could be more frequent than in the necessity of the case they are, as their good effect are plainly seen in more vigorous Church life and growth.

For four months previous to confirmation I held weekly classes in each Church, for preparation, which were very regularly attended by most candidates. On the 8th Sunday after Trinity I presented 24 young people to the Bishop at St. Peter, Paspebiae, and 27 at St. Andrews. New Carlisle. On both occasions the Bishop preached to large and attentive congregations, as well as addressed the candidates. The Rev. Prof. Roe was also present and gave his assistance at the services. I am sorry to add that only a small proportion of the newly confirmed have become regular communicants. In both congregations the percentage of communicants is miserably small: this is very discouraging and indicates a low state of spiritual life or an erroneous idea of this sacrament.

The attendance at the ordinary Sunday services, (which have been regularly conducted throughout the year) and the special week-day services, is good. The demeanour of the congregations is for the most part all that could be wished.

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The collections for the Society in Paspebiac have been nobly responded to, notwithstanding that times have never been known to be so hard. My best thanks are due to Misses Scott and Gallie for their energy in collecting from house to house when the roads were in a miserable state. I would strongly recommend the Society to send their lists for subscribers to the coast earlier, say August or September, when I am sure the response for several reasons would be much more liberal. At New Carlisle, owing to the state of our local finances, and the heavy expense entailed by the necessary repairs upon the Church, I thought it better not to attempt anything beyond the usual offertories for the year.

The following improvements have been effected during

the year:

St. Andrew's Church, which now presents a very creditable appearance, has been thoroughly painted, pews stained and varnished, pulpit lowered, new lamps provided for it, and a four-light chandelier for the chancel, the two latter the gift of two ladies of the congregation. A handsome new altar cloth and a communion table, more suitable to the size of the chancel, have replaced those hitherto in use. A new platform has been built before the church doors and the church yard fence completed.

At the Parsonage, a wood-shed and carriage-house combined has been built, and the barn made habitable. The

glebe and garden have also been well fenced.

At St. Peter's Church, Paspebiac, by the removal of the reading-desk from the body of the Church into the chancel, space has been gained for two new pews, which have been built and were urgently needed. Fences and shed have been put in good order.

I have much pleasure in acknowledging with many thanks the receipt of a New Year's gift from my parishioners of a horse, sleigh and harness, and a quantity of hay,

the total value \$175.

You will see that Paspebiac has done well this year towards reducing the Parsonage debt, \$175 having been paid by this part of the Mission alone. If the rest of the Mission would do as well, in two years the debt might be cleared, and the Mission at once self-supporting. A bazaar is under way, which, I trust, will do something towards accomplishing this end. We have already received aid from the Board

long enough, and it is high time we began to think of

walking alone.

During the year we have had to mourn the loss of Mrs. Milne, wife of the Rev. Geo. Milne, late Rural Dean and Incumbent of this Mission. For thirty-five years she was a worthy help-meet to her husband in his work, and is much missed by the older people, who have long known her as a true friend in time of need. After a few days illness, she died peacefully, relying upon God's mercy through Jesus Christ. I must also mention two other deaths after long and trying illnesses,—Mr. Philip Duval, an old and firm supporter of the Church in Paspebiac, and Miss Enright; both of these rest in the Lord.

I must say a few words concerning Hopetown. During the summer months no services were held here, as we were unable to obtain any suitable room. Now that the new school-house is finished, I intend to apply for the use of it for monthly services. I consider the attempt to establish a separate Mission here as perfectly hopeless. After many years work we have less than a dozen Church families, and some of these prefer to attend Paspebiac Church, which is only three miles distant. Most of the people are Presbyterians and have a Minister of their own. No assessment has been collected here for the last two years.

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NEW LIVERPOOL.

The Rev. F. A. Smith reports:—

Last year it was my pleasing task to report that Christ's Church, New Liverpool, had been thoroughly repaired. neatly painted, and put in good order inside and out. There was then no Parsonage. Now, I am happy to tell you, there is a Parsonage which does credit to the parish and the diocese. It is a substantial building of brick on a stone foundation, well and very tastefully planned and well put up, on the pretty and convenient site which, as I informed you a year ago, was presented to the parish by Messrs, Benson Bros. It combines all the advantages of close proximity to the Church, fine views on all sides, pure air, a quiet, though not too secluded neighbourhood, and is heated in the most approved modern style by hot-water pipes throughout. A week before Christmas it was taken possession of by the Incumbent and his family, who feel most grateful to the many kind friends, far and near, who have helped to provide so desirable a residence for the clergyman. Of course so goodly a building has not been provided without considerable expense, and our Building Committee have found it necessary to obtain a loan of fifteen hundred dollars, to be repaid by instalments. We trust that when its funds admit, your Society will kindly aid us with a liberal grant. A concert held in September in aid of the Parsonage Fund was very successful, clearing \$255.

The ordinary work of the parish has gone on during the year uninterruptedly, and on the whole satisfactorily. The attendance in Church has been steady and good considering our small English population. The Sunday School has been well kept up. In the autumn Mrs. Roberts, with her usual kindness, entertained the children in her house and allowed them to roam over her pretty grounds. During Christmas week they were again feasted, a richly laden Christmas Tree set up for their benefit, and a Magic Lantern exhibited for their amusement by our kind hearted ladies and gentlemen, who spared no pains to make them enjoy themselves.

I append the usual financial statement for the year,

which will show that our people continue to give liberally to help on every good work, the hard times notwithstand-

ing. To Messrs. H. Atkinson, Benson, Ritchie, and L. H. Hamilton, I am much indebted for a welcome supply of fuel.

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PORTNEUF.

The Rev. J. B. Debbage reports:-

My exertions during the past year have, to a considerable extent, been taken up in trying to keep our vessel afloat. It has been hard work, and I often feared that, after all my time and work here, the Mission might have to be closed; and yet it seemed too humiliating to think that these people should have to be left without a clergyman, because the small sum necessary to enable me to hold my post could not be made up.

But in addition to the assessment to the Diocesan Board, this Mission has the burden of a Parsonage only partly paid for, and with instalments coming due every year. As the time drew near for paying, I thought it would have to be sold in order to save what we have already paid on it. But finally the money was raised through the earnest efforts of the congregation at the village and at Halesboro'.

I have twice during the past year had the opportunity of addressing large numbers of French Canadians, to whom e, and L. H. ne supply of

The Rev. E. A. W. King reports:-

Period-Advent to Advent.

Adult members, 80; children, old and young, 60. Hearers (say), 10. Total, 150 souls. Congregation at Church, 15 to 40 in winter, and 40 to 150 in summer.

At Station school-house, 20 to 45.

Communicants (actual), 30.

Confirmed during the year, 5 men, 4 women, making 9 new members.

Services on Sundays, 108; on festivals and fasts, 30; on other week days, 26, which, with 13 missionary services ontside the parish, make a total of 177, or an average of more than 3 a-week.

Holy Communion celebrated 15 times with attendance of 3 to 25. Lack of sufficient number twice.

Baptisms—local 15, outside 5, making 20. Marriages—local 2, outside 1, making 3. Burials—2.

Contributions for all purposes, \$630.22. Church edifice creditably restored and free from debt. No Parsonage.

Children's service and Sunday School in the afternoon. Scholars and teachers 33. Day school visited often. The visiting from house to house has been frequent. The Bishop and five clergymen from abroad honoured and benefitted the parish by assisting in services and missionary meetings. Here I would gratefully mention the Rev. Mr. Pollard, of Ottawa.

The offertory has been devoted to the various funds of the Diocesan Church Society, Algoma, S. P. G., S. P. Christianity amongst the Jews, Yellow Fever Relief Fund, and to general purposes and current expenses. The assessment has been increased 20 per cent.

The permanent parishioners are under great obligations to the summer visitors and others for aid in maintaining

the services and in restoring the Church.

The moneys entrusted to the Incumbent came from Mrs. Finden and Mrs. Macdonell through an entertainment; from Mrs. Meredith, Mrs. Ward, Mrs. Sterry Hunt, Mr. Chesley and Mr. Dunbar for Sunday School books, &c.; from "penny lectures," sale of fancy articles, and surplice fees for prayer and hymn books with \$22 for the "Ross memorial" fund.

Mrs. Williams, Rev. C. Hamilton, Mrs. Edwin Jones, Mrs. Jarvis, Mrs. Morris, Mrs. Hodgson, Mr. LeClain and

Mr. Williston contributed various furnishings.

In the beginning of the year Mrs. Macnab, greatly admired by all who knew her, and lately Mrs. W. Hodgson, one of the oldest and most respected members of the con-

gregation, were called to rest.

There has been a very general desire on the part of the people to pay the annual rent (\$48) on the small house used as a Parsonage, and also to raise funds immediately for buying or building a Parsonage for the Mission. The collectors are Mr. J. Walker, Mr. J. A. Jarvis, and Mr. Jos. Unsworth.

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SANDY BEACH.

The Rev. M. Ker reports :--

The year now drawing to a close has been, financially, one of the worst that I have experienced during my connection with the Mission, a period now extending to more than twenty years. The general depression in mercantile affairs still bears down most heavily on the resources and energies of this people, and in addition to such incubus. the fisheries have not been as productive as they have sometimes proved. All are experiencing, to greater or less degree, a time of scarcity and privation. It is not wonderful then that a portion of the assessment imposed by the Board should still be unpaid. They hope, however, that the greater part of the indebtedness to the Board will be met before the close of the year; yet, I am afraid that, for the first time, there will be a deficit in the funds, but hope for the best. The amount paid by each of our members may seem to those living near the great centres of commerce and civilization, and consequent wealth, as very minute, yet, if the relative facilities for accumulating material wealth be considered, and the actual incomes of both classes be compared, the contributors of these seemingly small sums may be giving proportionably more than those dwelling in more highly favored localities. Nothing has been added to the principal of our Endowment Fund; it is however steadily increasing by the continued addition of accruing interest, speaking loudly for the practical wisdom of the measure, and gratifying the wishes of those generous and far-seeing benefactors by whose gifts the nucleus of the fund was provided, shewing too, the care and skill of those to whom the management of the moneys is entrusted.

Of the moral and spiritual state and prospects of the Mission, it is more difficult to speak definitely and positively. This deals with forces whose working is in a great measure hidden. We can note, indeed, the regular attendance upon the means of grace, but how far the heart and inner life are acted upon we can but dimly surmise.

The ministrations of the Church and the usual work of the Mission have been carried on without hindrance or failure. The attendance of the congregations, and the interest exhibited, have not lessened or flagged. I have, as nearly as I could, given three Sunday services in each

month at the Peninsula, (one of them an evening service.) and one evening service a month in Douglastown, besides holding regular Sunday morning services at St. John's Church, Sandy Beach, the headquarters and main Church of the Mission, and observing all the chief holydays and Till the last three months I attended at Little Gaspé one Sunday in the month. I hope to take up Little Gaspé again shortly, and go there when I can, without binding myself to any set times; but as its congregation has refused to contribute its quota any longer to the maintenance of the Mission, the preference must be given to those continuing to pay. During the summer we were cheered by the arrival of our Bishop, on his triennial visitation of the Missions, for the purpose of confirming the voung members of our Church. At St. John's, Sandy Beach, an interesting class of 19 were admitted to full membership in our communion, and at St. Matthew's. Peninsula, 5 more, making a total of 24. The newly confirmed all cheered me by using their privilege of coming to the Holy Supper of the Lord on the first opportunity offering, and since a fair number of them have been regular communicants. On the whole, I have reason to hope that good is being done in the name of God's Holy Child Jesus. There has been raised during the year, for all Church purposes, the following sums:

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knowledge of Bible facts and doctrines is being treasured up in the minds of the young, which the Holy Spirit may, at any time, use as a seed, from which fruit may ripen to His glory, and to the blessing of their own souls.

STANSTEAD.

The Rev. Geo. Thornloe reports :-

The services in this Mission have been kept up during the past year with their usual regularity, and one new out-station has been added. To enable me to take up the new work referred to, Mr. Colston, of Lennoxville, has kindly undertaken to help me fortnightly at Libby's Mills. Thus freed, I have given Caswellboro', as the new station is called, a fortnightly service, and am pleased to find that the people turn out well and manifest some interest in the work.

In June last the Bishop confirmed a small class of seven candidates, in Christ Church, Stanstead Plain, and also immediately after administered to them all the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

My register shows, for the year, a record of 13 baptisms,

5 burials, and 2 marriages.

The Rev. M. M. Fothergill has recently inspected our Church school, and reports very favorably as to its condition. I may add my testimony as to the efficiency of the painstaking teacher, Miss Barnard, and also to the excellent progress made by the scholars in the past year. We acknowledge most gratefully the debt we owe to the Societies which, by their grants, make it possible for us to keep it up. But for their liberality many of our children would be obliged, if they went to school at all, to attend the common school, where no religious instructions of any character is supplied, and where there are already some 60 or 70 scholars under one female teacher.

And while speaking of the school I must not forget to acknowledge, with thankfulness, a generous grant of maps and lesson books made to us by the C. & C. C. S. through their kind Secretary, Mr. Scott. These were very much needed and have proved most useful in the school work.

The Guild established last autumn has been in successful operation during the greater part of the year, and is likely,

I think, to become a permanent and useful organization. Hitherto it has been chiefly used for home work; during the coming winter, however, we intend to give it something of a missionary character.

The bell, for which money has been in hand for some time, has not yet been purchased, as we have not yet succeeded in devising means for hanging it.

I am sorry to say that the attendance at Holy Communion is yet painfully small. I trust this may not have to be said next year. Our congregations at Stanstead Plain have kept up to last year's average, and on the whole I think they have been less fluctuating than formerly. There has, this year, been a better attendance in the morning than in the evening—a good sign it seems to me, since the morning service is made up more exclusively of our own people.

Of the out missions there is not much to record. I have not yet succeeded in forming any of them into organized congregations. But I am hoping that this will be accomplished in one case very soon. I am persuaded that the services given to these places are not to be without effect. Even now, I believe, evidences of awakening interest are not wanting.

As regards the religious condition of our people, while acknowledging, with thankfulness to God, the zeal and faithfulness which many have displayed, I have still to lament that there are abundant evidences of widespread and painful indifference to the whole subject of religion.

I am glad to be able to state that we have managed to bear our rather heavy financial burdens without very much difficulty. The addition of \$50 to our assessment, which brought it up to \$400, caused us, at the beginning of the year, no inconsiderable uneasiness. Still we have managed to struggle through the year. But the struggle has been made the harder by the efforts we have been making to secure a Parsonage. This has been the great work of the year. We have not been wholly unsuccessful at it either. The amount secured, in hand and by subscription, amounting already to about \$1000; and we have reasonable hopes of making it \$1200 by the actual close of the year.

SHIGAWAKE.

The Rev. R. James Harvey reports:— The parish of St. Paul, Shigawake, with that of St. James, Port Daniel, on the Baie des Chaleurs, has been under my charge for the past year, having been duly ordained by his Lordship the Bishop of the Diocese, in St. Peter's Church, Quebec, on Sunday, the 18th November, 1877. In this Mission there is much to be done, and I am thankful to add there is also much to encourage us, as experience testifies. Since coming among the people here I have met with many tokens of a warm-hearted sympathy and solid proofs of personal respect from many friends. Church has had more than a fair share of my services, and in return the attendance is good, so much so as to make it necessary to suggest that the two aisles now in use should be thrown into one aisle, which would benefit us by an increase of a large number of sittings, thus enabling many more worshippers to attend our services, probably gain their sympathy by a hearty co-operation in supporting the pecuniary needs of the congregation in repairs, &c., so much needed for the increased demands of this parish. The Easter Vestry of this Church was the largest ever attended here; the many thanks then awarded to the members of the congregation were mainly due to the exertions of a few whose gifts together with the work of painting the Chancel may be seen in the subjoined financial statement. Church requires painting both inside and out; this I hope the good people of Shigawake will do early next spring by making a grand united effort to accomplish so desirable an The Parsonage is situated at this end of the Mission, but is in a very bad state of repair; it would be well for the congregation to remedy the evil of its utter dilapidation by a speedy repair. The Sunday School inaugurated by the Rev. Professor Roe, with a regularly appointed staff of teachers, continues in working order. The attendance of an average number, considered really good, is about 65 out of 99 names now upon the school roll. Daily Matins and Evensong were well attended throughout the holy season of Lent. The Church-Wardens, Messrs. Wm. Young and Benjamin Traverse, were re-elected, and continue in office. It is with the greatest satisfaction and pleasure that I have to report of St. James' Church, Port Daniel. This Church is attended by a large and thoroughly united congregation, ready to take part in every good work, which is clearly seen in the liberality of their offerings, as compared with St. Panl's congregation, yet, though excelling in this respect their brethren, they would nevertheless do well to copy them in the matter of responding and singing in the Church services, the theory of which is emphatically laid down in the Rubrics of our Service Book, but in practice is an utter failure. It would be ingratitude in me not to mention that the thanks of myself and the congregation are due to our voluntary organist, Miss F. S. Gadd, who, amid much that is discouraging, continues so perseveringly to render additional aid in leading the praises of the sanctuary. The thanks of this congregation are hereby recorded to the Rev. Professor Roe for the handsome gift of a crimson altar cloth, and also to Mrs. Roe for the complete sett of The regular attendance of this congregation altar linen, being so large, necessitates my adding, as in the case of St. Paul's, that some improvement be made by way of increasing the sitting accommodation; this could be done bairs, &c., 80

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with very trifling expense. As a suggestion, I propose that a Chancel be added, and that the raised floor, now carpeted to serve as a temporary Chancel, be removed, and seats placed there instead. At least 100 persons would by this means be accommodated with sittings. This improvement, together with a good bell, is much needed. The Sunday School is well attended, the children manifesting a heartiness in their school duties worthy of the teachers who are appointed over them. The Church-Wardens, Messrs. Jas. Dow and Wm. McKenzie, were re-elected and continue to act.

The Church at L'Anse-au-Gascon has undergone a complete change since my appointment, in the accession of church furniture, which is mainly due to the exertions of Mr. Philip Acteson, our Church-Warden. There have been added to this Church an altar and altar cloth, prayer desk, lectern and font, for all of which our warmest thanks are due to Mr. Acteson for his generosity and much needed help. Situated as this Church is among so few who profess allegiance to the Church, it is indeed up-hill work, nevertheless, we are encouraged by the regular attendance and the prospect of increased zeal and energy on the part of This Church only requires ceiling those who do attend. inside to make it presentable to his Lordship the Bishop The Sunday School is held every Sunfor consecration. day, regularly conducted by Miss Martha Acteson, to whom our thanks are due for labour so generously bestowed. is to be hoped that on the occasion of his Lordship's next visit here we may be able to present the Church for consecration, and that it may please his Lordship to dedicate it to St. Philip, Ap. and M.

Thanks are due to the Rev. Thos. Blaylock, B.A., for a celebration of the Holy Communion at Christmas and Easter last year, also to the Rev. Professor Roe, for a celebration at the Church of St. James, Port Daniel. The number of candidates confirmed was 55, and upon this occasion his Lordship was the celebrant at the Holy Communion, when 60 persons communicated.

WEST FRAMPTON AND CRANBOURNE.

The Rev. J. S. Sykes reports :-

Facts are stubborn things, in their so stubborn, that no amount of ingenuity can furnish them before they exist.

If imagination would serve instead, I could imagine a pretty fair stock, and so, with comparative case, get over the annual difficulty of reporting nothing.

The word recapitulation is suggestive of a way to get over the difficulty for once,—but then a man would have to read over his previous reports, and exaggeration is too closely allied to falsehood to be thought of for a moment.

The fact is, we, the pastor and people of Frampton and Cranbourne, are a peculiar people; we have no differences, no falling out to enliven us, and so ours is only a hum-drum sort of existence.

Shakespears says "Crabbed age and youth cannot live together." We have plenty of age with its crabbedness, many of our people being between the ages of eighty and ninety, and this coupled with the fact that it is now fully three years since any one died belonging to either of my congregations, will establish the reputation of Frampton West as a healthy locality. The last funeral I had was on Christmas Day, 1875.

The increase of our assessment by the Diocesan Board, has made it very hard for the people to meet the demand, owing to the very low prices paid to the farmers for their produce. Pork they have had to sell for as low as \$3 a hundred, and butter for 9 and 10 cents a lb., whereas in previous years they could get \$10 a hundred for pork, and from 23 to 25 cents a lb. for butter.

To anticipate a fact, I may state that we shall, during the next year, lose some more of our people, who are bound to

Manito' ...

During the past four years we have lost nine families from the two Missions, some having gone to Bury and others to the States.

We have this year, as in past years, been kindly remembered at the Parsonage,—people from all parts of the Mission have given to us very liberally of the best they had. To mention the names would make this report unnecessarily long, but we should like to thank them all and assure them that their many kindnesses are appreciated.

We have improved the Parsonage a little, the most glaring improvement being the white-washing of the building

from the chinney-top to the foundation.

To save us from another white-washing, would any good, liberal, whole-souled Churchman send us the sum of \$250 to pay off a mortgage on the Parsonage, and remove a load of anxiety from the mind of the Incumbent.

In contributing to the funds of the Church Society and other objects, I am sure the people of West Frampton have

done their very best.

BISHOP'S COLLEGE MISSIONS.

The Rev. Professor Roe reports :-

The Mission work done in connection with Bishop's College has grown during the past year. Two new stations, served regularly from the College, have been adopted, namely, Westbury, in the Mission of Dudswell, and Libby's Mills, in the Mission of Stanstead Island Brook has also been made a College Mission, though, for the present, no student is employed there. So the College Missions are now Moulton Hill, Ascot Corner, Westbury, Mitchell's, Sandhill, Milby, Libby's Mills, and Island Brook. Eleven students are employed in this work, namely, Messrs. R. Browne, Harper, C. Browne, Chambers, A. F. Browne, Macfarlane, Webster, Richard Hewton, Lee, and Colston. The Rev. Principal Lobley has always been most ready to help, and has rendered valuable aid at several stations, specially at Milby. In all these places Divine Service and Sanday School was regularly kept up every Sunday, with the exception of Mitchell's, where there is a Sunday School only, and Libby's Mills, which is served only once a fortnight. I have visited Island Brook four times, more particularly for the administration of the sacraments. This station is regularly served by Mr. W. H. Mayo, an alumnus and graduate of the College, now in charge of the Cookshire Academy, Mr. Mayo zeafously gives his services gratuitously, going to Island Brook every Sunday morning, a distance of 10 miles there and back.

The church people of Gould having applied for the services of a student during the vacancy of the Mission of Bury, I was requested by the Bishop to supply it. Mr. Webster accordingly gave them a monthly service during the winter, and I visited the Mission thrice for the purpose of administering the sacraments. The congregation of Gould paid Mr. Webster for his services at the rate of \$5 a Sunday, the greater part of which was necessarily swallowed up in travelling expenses. One could not but conceive an affection for the warm-hearted people of Gould, and I was surprised and pleased to find their numbers far in ex-

cess of what I had supposed, proving this to be a station quite worthy of the fostering care of the Church.

As to results of any marked kind from these missionary services, these must be looked for in the distant future. The continuance and growth of the work, however, is itself a result of no small importance. Nor must it be forgotten that the original idea of the College Missions was the education of the Divinity students of the College in pastoral work. Their value in this respect can scarcely be exaggerated; the very failures of the men,—of course, to be deplored in themselves,—being often, perhaps, quite as useful to themselves as their successes, in bringing out in their own consciousness their weak as well as their strong points. There is perhaps a danger of the men failing to realize the very sacred nature and very grave responsibility of their work. Uhope that a sense of this responsibility is deepening among our students.

A few incidents of interest may be noted. The number of communicants in Ascot Corner is now ten. all gains, the fruits of the Mission. Mr. Radley Walters was ordained last Trinity Sunday, and left us for his Mission in the Gulf. He had served Ascot Corner for three years, and had conciliated the affectionate regard of every one. He was presented with an address and a purse on his departure.—At Sandhill, the Holy Communion was administered for the first time at the Harvest Festival Service on the 28th October. There were four communicants belonging to the place, two of them gains. The building of a church here is in a fair way of being carried out; already \$300 have been subscribed by the people on the spot.—On one of my visits to Island Brook, I administered the Holy Communion to seven persons, several of them receiving for the first time. In all these places there are great trials of one's faith and patience, and great disconragements; but that is in the nature of things. Invariably, after the novelty of our first services in a new district has passed away, the interest slackens and the numbers fall off. But this we expect; we know that it is the patient toil of years only which wins real success.

Another branch of church work, worthy perhaps of notice, which has grown out of our College Missions, is the employment of our Divinity students during their vacations in the parishes and missions of the Diocese. During

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haps of nosions, is the their vacae. During the past summer, in addition to Messrs. Webster and Chambers, who remained behind and laboured at Sandhill and Westbury with Ascot Corner, the following students were employed and paid for their services by the clergy: Mr. Colston, at St. Peter's, Quebec; Mr. Judge and Mr. Lee in the Mission of Magog and Georgeville; Mr. Harper, in the Mission of Brompton and Windsor, and Mr. Simpson, subsequently replaced by Mr. C. Brown, at Drummondville. A two-fold useful purpose is served by this arrangement; the students both gain experience and help to support themselves, and the clergy are enabled to secure for a few weeks during the heat of summer what every one must feel is a most needed and well-earned holiday.

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
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




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RICHMOND AND MELBOURNE.

The Rev. Isaac M. Thompson reports:--

As it is now four years since I sent a report of the condition of this parish, I think that perhaps a short account of its successes and reverses might be interesting to the readers of the Society's Report. The condition of the parish, as a whole, is better financially this year, than on any previous year, more given for our own work and more given for work outside of ourselves. The condition spiritually is not worse, I have also good reason to hope, than on

any previous year.

St. Ann's Church, which is the Parish Church, is attended by a large, attentive, and devout congregation. The morning congregations have not been larger this year than on former years, but the evening congregations have increased. The increase, I am happy to say, is made up of young men and women, in whom there is evidently a growing interest in spiritual things. The congregation worshipping in St. Anu's Church numbers 122 families; averaging these at 4 to a family will make the congregation number 488 souls; add to these 30 young men and women not permanently connected with any family, and we get as the real and actual congregation 518 souls. We have an average every Sunday of 400. The remainder of the congregation, (which, taking the two services together, numbers 500,) is made up of members of other religious bodies who come in to worship with us. There are on the parish roll the names of 235 persons who have communicated at some time in this church. Of these, 187 have communicated with more or less regularity during the past year. The average number at our monthly celebrations has been, for the past three years, 65, 75, 80.

In view of the erection of the Township of Melbourne into a separate Mission, to be placed on the Diocesan Board, and the consequent withdrawal of that portion of the clergyman's salary paid by St. John's Church, the vestry of St. Ann's voted their clergyman the sum of \$1000 a year, the new arrangement to take effect from the first of July past. This increase has been promptly paid, together with all other claims on the revenue of the church, so that financially, the church is in a safe condition. It will be seen also, by the financial statement annexed, that contri-

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butions have been made to church work outside ourselves to a considerable amount. The ladies of St. Ann's Church have, by their own exertions, erected a very nice building for the use of the Sunday School, and for any other purpose connected with the church for which it may be found necessary to use it. The money for the erection of this building, which, with its furniture, will cost \$1000, has been made during the past three years. The ladies hope to hand it over, free of debt, to the Vestry, on Easter Monday next. The Sunday School connected with this church is in a prosperous condition. There are 200 names on the roll; of these, 115 are boys and the remainder girls, 85 in number. The average attendance is 75. These are taught by twelve earnest, faithful teachers, and the accounts are kept and library books received and distributed by a painstaking librarian. His Lordship the Bishop has confirmed in this church since 1874, the date of my last report, 146 persons, most of whom have been very faithful in the discharge of their religious duties.

As I have before intimated, the Diocesan Board has, (acting on a recommendation made by the Deanery of St. Francis,) set off the Township of Melbourne into a separate Mission without drawing any lines, the Mission so set off to comprise St. John's, Melbourne Ridge, Rockland Quarry, Melbourne Quarry. As this new Mission is to receive aid from the Diocesan Board, it might interest the readers of the Society's Report to know something of its

different stations.

St. John's Church.—This congregation erected a new church on the site of the old one, which is now complete, with all the necessary appliances of Church Worship. This congregation has been supplied with a service every Sunday afternoon by myself almost up to the present. Owing to the scarcity of clergymen, his Lordship has not been able to supply the Mission with a clergyman in orders, but to meet the present wants and to supply the other outstations with Sunday services, his Lordship appointed Mr. Arthur H. Judge, Divinity Student, to assist me. Mr. Judge, not being in orders, could not hold a separate charge; the new Mission is therefore under my superintendency. Consequently, St. John's Church has been almost altogether supplied by myself up to the present. This congregation numbers 50 families, 7 of whom are

nominal adherents of the church without being actual members, or partaking of any of her ordinances beyond that of worshipping with us. 43 families are really church people and go to no other place of worship. The average congregation in summer is 100, in winter not so large. The Sunday School contains 58 children, who are taught by eight faithful, painstaking teachers, under the superintendency of Mr. Robert Frazer. We have just held a very successful Xmas tree festival, at which earnest addresses were delivered by the Rev. Professor Roe and Mr. Judge. The school is now closed for the winter months.

There are on the roll of this church the names of 88 persons who have communicated some time; either publicly or privately, in the past. Average number at the monthly celebrations only 25. I am prepared to blame invself to some extent for this, for owing to the fact that I was making extra efforts to establish the services at the other out-stations, I spent more of my time than usual with them; but now that these stations are supplied with regular Sunday services, I hope to be able to give more time to the building up of the spiritual life of this people. has removed a number of communicants from this congregation, but I pray God that others may be persuaded to fill up the blank which death has made: His Lordship has confirmed 47 persons in this congregation during the past four years. The pew rents of this church, which amount to \$150 a year, go towards Mr. Judge's salary.

Melbourne Ridge.—We have at this station, which is five miles from St. John's Church, 16 families, who have declared themselves adherents of the church, and have subscribed more or less towards Mr. Judge's salary. There are very good congregations at this station, but unfortunately for us, the school-house in which we held service, and which was central for all our people, was taken from us, no satisfactory reason being given for our expulsion. We had therefore to move into a school-house belonging to another school district, and quite out of the way for many of our people. If those who were the cause of sending us away, desired to hinder us in our work, they have succeeded admirably. We hope some day to be able to build a little church there; this, however, is in the future.

Rockland Quarry and Kingsbury.—There are at this station 11 families who are professedly Church people, and

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there are many others who are friendly. The services here are well attended and the people have subscribed liberally towards Mr. Judge's salary.

Melbourne Quarry.—At this station we have, at present, but 5 families who are professedly Church people, but all the Protestants living there attend the services. Some Church families who are too far off to attend St. Ann's Church regularly, will also go to the Quarry services. The attendance for the present cannot be more than 25, and a severe disease, which broke out there, has prevented some even of this number from attending. This station, through the kindness of Mr. Walton, the proprietor, contributes also towards Mr. Judge's salary. We hope, now that the holidays are over, to work up these stations, and to have our services better rendered by cheerful singing and more hearty responding.

Arthabaska.—The congregation there is not changed in many respects; some removals have lessened our numbers, but the interest is still the same. We number there, in all, 44 souls, old and young. All but three of the Protestant families living there belong to the church, and these three are very kind and friendly, attending the services and contributing with our own people towards the clergyman's expenses. His Lordship the Bishop held a confirmation there last winter, at which he confirmed an aged woman, a mother of a large and grown up family, and nine young persons, all of which, with but two exceptions, have become regular communicants. We have 25 regular communicants, and, on an average, 33 persons attend the services. This, out of a congregation of 44, is very good.

264 services have been held in this parish during the year, and 615 pastoral visits paid. 700 people attend our services every Sunday.

The out-stations not yet supplied with Sunday services are New London, and Boast School House. These are in the Township of Cleveland, on the other side of the St. Francis River. This river divides the Townships of Melbourne and Cleveland, as it does the villages of Richmond and Melbourne.

SHERBROOKE, (ST. PETER'S CHURCH.)

The Rev. I. Brock reports:-

I commence my report with parochial statistics. In Advent, 1876, there were 216 enrolled communicants; in Advent, 1877, there were 230; in Advent, 1878, there were 257. The increase this year has been chiefly owing to the confirmation which the Bishop of the Diocese, held in Sherbrooke, on Dec. 9, 1877. At that confirmation, 18 males and 17 females were confirmed. Of these 35, five have since left the parish, 3 of them communicants; of the 30 that remain, 19 have become regular communicants. During the past year there have been 30 celebrations of the Holy Communion in St. Peter's Church. Our new Communion linen, purchased from St. Matthew's Guild, Quebec, was used for the first time on Easter Sunday last. It has given general satisfaction. Our new Communion Service,

ordered by the Wardens from England, was used for the first time on Sunday, Nov. 3. It is of solid silver, the chalice and paten being plated with gold. It is chaste and handsome, and in every way worthy of the high service in which it is used. No report is given below of the special subscription raised in the parish to meet the expenses of this new service, for this reason, the items raised for "Parochial Church expenses" are always taken from the Church-Wardens' printed report, made up each year to March 1, and submitted to the Easter Vestry following. For this reason, no report is given here of the working of the envelope system, which was adopted in St. Peter's Church on the first Sunday in March, 1878, and has yet, therefore, three months to run before any authentic report thereon will be drawn up by the Wardens.

During the past year there have been in connection with St. Peter's Church, 61 Baptisms; 10 Marriages, and 23 Burials.

To turn to the report of sums raised in the parish for extra parochial objects, notwithstanding the financial pressure, which has been felt more and more of late in Sherbrooke, there is much that is most encouraging to report. In every congregation, of course, there are some who do not give to God's Church and God's poor, according to the Scriptural rule, that is, "As the Lord hath prospered them," still I am happy to report an increasing liberality on the part of St. Peter's congregation, and venture to say that in the support given to the Missions of our Church, it will compare very favorably with some of the wealthier congregations of the same size in Upper Canada. In 1877, the parish contributed \$482.30 to our Church Society. This year it contributes \$576.80; being an increase of \$94. Last year the total amount contributed for all extra parochial objects was \$572.30; this year it amounts to \$851.30, being an increase of \$279.

Three extra parochial objects have this year been brought before the parish, which have enlisted largely the sympathies of the people. In December last, at our anniversary, we were favored by an address from the Bishop of Algoma, who gave a most interesting account of the work of the Church in his Diocese. His visit amongst us has produced the happiest results. Last year \$95 was received for Algoma; this year, (including the \$10 sent direct to the

Indian Schools,) \$173.50 has been raised for Algoma. One lady in St. Peter's Church was so interested in the Bishop of Algoma's account, that she set to work to collect amongst her friends 5 cents a week, or thereabouts, for Algoma; the result is a contribution of \$50.

In January and February, the Bishop of Saskatchewan visited Sherbrooke, and so interested the people in the work and needs of his extensive Diocese, that after an evening sermon and two meetings, \$100 was collected.

At our Thanksgiving Service in October, the needs of our suffering brethren in the South were brought before the people, and the offertory, (outside the envelopes,) was devoted to the Orphan Homes of New Orleans; the thank offering amounted to \$92.

I will only add in conclusion, that the usual services on the Lord's day and festivals in the church, on Wednesday evening in the school-room, and in the Protestant Reformatory, have been kept up by Rev. C. P. Reid and myself, and that the Sunday School, in which I have been aided by twelve zealous teachers, has maintained its numbers.

I give and bequeath to "the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec," incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171, the sum (or Shares of Stocks in the Bank of standing in my name in the Books of the said Bank, or of Debentures, describe them briefly,) upon trust to be by the said Church Society applied to and for the uses and purposes of the said Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation and none other.

 A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock or Debentures for one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

(Same as foregoing, only instead of the words in Italics say) towards the augmentation of the Fund formed for the purpose of providing for the future support of the Clergy of the Diocese, called the Sustenation Fund.

Or.

Towards the support of missionaries and clergymen of the United Church of England and Ireland in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or,

Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for those of the Clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland, in the Diocese of Quebec, who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, called the Pension Fund.

Or.

Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for the widows and orphans of the clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland, in the Diocese of Quebec, called the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

Or.

Towards the augmentation of the Fund for endowing the Church in the Mission of (or at held by the said Church Society, subject to the conditions of a Deed of Trust passed between the said Church Society and the Incumbent and Church-wardens of the Church in the said Mission, (or at

Or,

As the commencement of an endowment for the Church of St.

in the Mission of (or at a strength) and to provide for the future maintenance of divine worship in conformity with the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland.

Or.

For and towards the encouragement of education, and the support of day schools and Sunday schools in the said Diocese of Quebec, in conformity with the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland.

Or.

For and towards a Fund for assisting persons preparing for the Ministry of the Gospel in the United Church of England and Ireland, within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,

For and towards a Fund for circulating, in the said Dioeese of Quebec, the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer of the United Church of England and Ireland, and the Books and Tracts approved by the said Church Society for circulation within the said Dioeese of Quebec.

Or,

As an aid towards the erection, endowment and maintenance of churches according to the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland, within the Diocese of Quebec,—the erection and maintenance of parsonage

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and maintenof the United the Diocese of parsonage houses,—the setting apart of burial grounds and churchyards, and the endowment and support of parsonages and rectories within the said Diocese.

III. A Devise of Real Estate for the general purposes of the Society.

I give and devise unto "the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec," incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171, all and singular, &c., [describe the real estate clearly.] to have and to hold the said, &c., unto the said Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, and their successors, for ever; upon trust to hold and apply the same, and the rents, issues and profits thereof to and for the uses and purposes of the said Church Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation, and none other, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.

IV. A Devise of Real Estate for any one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

V. A Devise to the Society of a site for Church, Sc.

Same as No. 3, down to the words "for ever"—then go on as follows:—to the uses and upon the trusts following, that is to say: upon the trusts to hold the same forever hereafter as and for the place and site of a Church and church-yard, and burial-ground, for the sole use and benefit of members of the Church residing in the places adjacent to the said site and premises within the said Diocese of Quebec, according to the doctrine and discipline of the United Church of England and Ireland, and for no other purposes, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.

NOTICE.

The Annual Sermons in aid of the various Funds of the Church Society are appointed to be preached,—

FOR GENERAL PURPOSES, on Quinquagesima Sunday.

FOR THE MISSION FUND, on the Sanday nearest to Michaelmas.

FOR THE ALGOMA DIOCESAN FUND, on the Day of Intercession.

FOR THE PENSION FUND, on Thanksgiving Day.

The attention of applicants for grants is particularly directed to the following rules:—

- 1. That no grant be made for any church, parsonage, glebe, or other property, which shall not have been duly vested in the authorities of the Church.
- 2. That grants be payable when the amount shall be sufficient to free the property from debt; or that the debt be a mortgage for an amount not exceeding twenty-five per cent. of the value of the property or building when finished.
- 3. That the Treasurer when transmitting the amount of any grant of money made by this Society to any parish or mission in the diocese shall require a receipt, signed jointly by the Incumbent of such parish or mission, and one or both of the Church-wardens.
- 4. That in all cases where grants of money (other than personal) are made by the Church Society, it shall be the duty of the person to whom such grant shall be paid to

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furnish, within three months afterwards, regular vouchers of the expenditure of such sums, to be submitted to the Board.

5. That when the conditions on which any sum is voted are not complied with, and the money applied for within one year from the time it is voted, such grant shall be struck off the list.

6. That no grant shall be made towards the erection of and church or parsonage, unless the plans and site have been approved of by the Bishop.

7. That no grant shall be made to any parish, mission or station, in which at least one sermon (in aid of the Pension Fund) shall not have been preached, and from which the subscription shall not have been sent in during the year.

8. That all applications for aid reach the hands of the Secretary in time to be submitted to the Finance Committee, who hold a meeting in the fortnight immediately preceding each meeting of the Central Board.

9. That no application for aid in repairing either churches or parsonages be entertained for the future; as the Central Board conceive it to be the daily of congregations to keep all their Church property in good repair.

10. Clergymen desirous of participating in the benefits of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund are required to pay their annual contributions before the first of May in each year.

11. No school shall be assisted for a longer period than twelve months without being inspected and reported to be in a satisfactory condition.

12. That no application for grants in ad of churches parsonages or buildings of any kind be entertained by the Central Board without a resolution from the Congregation approving of such application be sent at the same time to the Board.

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
