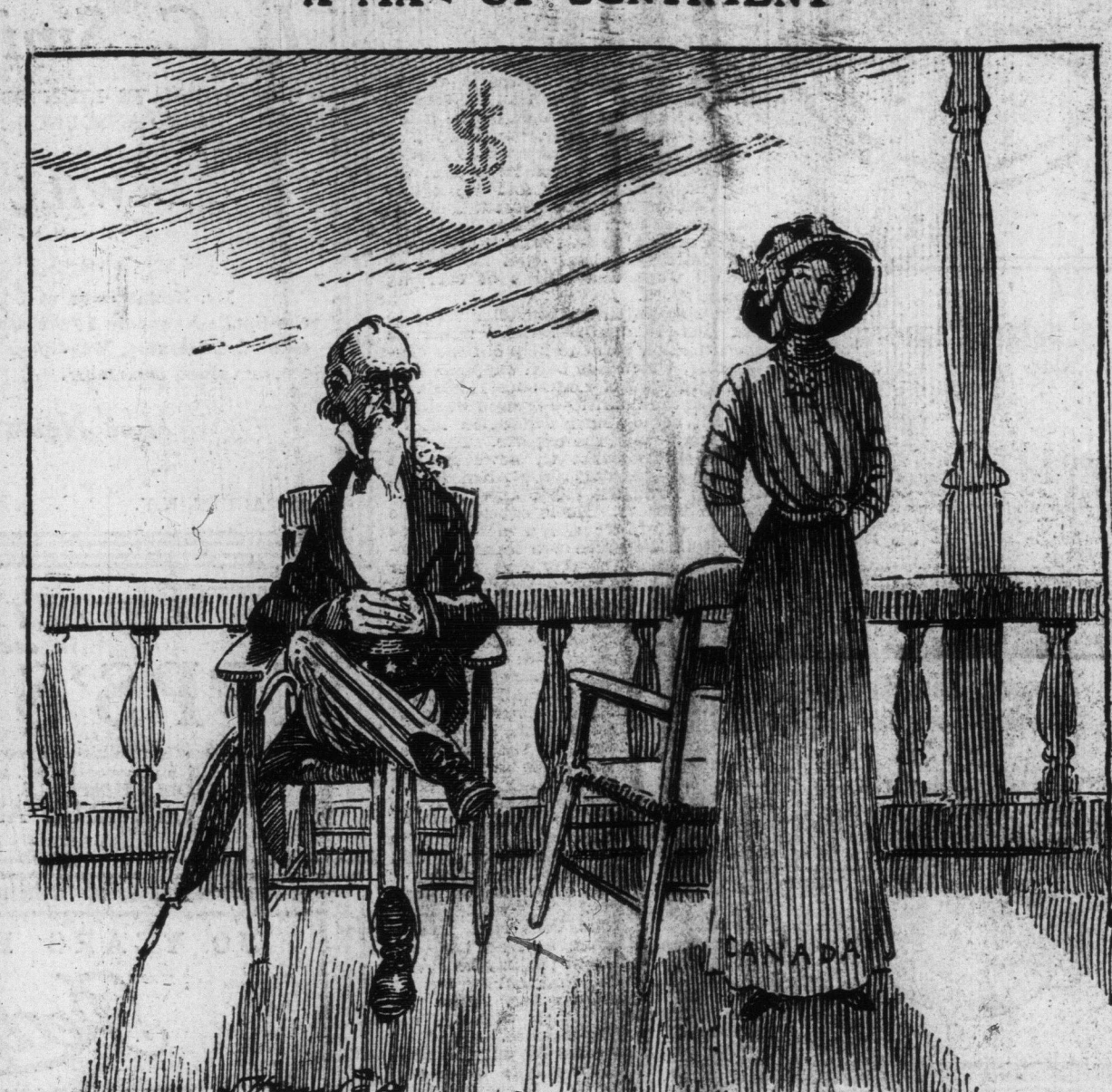

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HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

ENGINEER WAS KILLED TRYING TO BOARD TRAIN

Was on a Holiday—13th Regiment Holds First Parade of the Season.

HAMILTON, March 24.—(Special.)—George Crowe, an engineer on the T. H. and E., was killed about 5 o'clock this evening near the Hunter street station while trying to board a moving passenger train. He was off duty and was about to go on a week's trip. He had just left some friends and tried to jump on the Buffalo train. His foot slipped and he fell between the wheels, his body being badly mangled, almost beyond recognition. The deceased was about 45 years of age, and is survived by a widow and two children. The remains were taken to the Dodsworth morgue, where the coroner will open an inquest to-morrow.

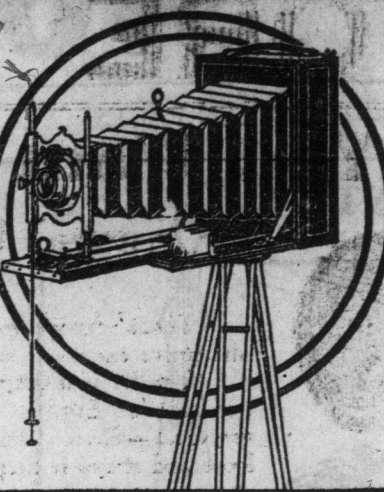

CORNWALL, March 24.—(Special.)—The house of refuge committee of the county council has accepted the plans of A. L. Weeks, of Ottawa, subject to certain modifications, arranged for by the committee. The estimated cost is within the \$40,000 fixed by the county council. The building will be largely modelled on the lines of the Belleville House of Refuge, and will contain changes suggested by the officials of that institution, which their experience has shown them would be an improvement. It has been practically decided to build on concrete blocks, but tenders will be called for both brick and concrete. The building will be made a school.

DAMMING OF LONG POND TO SHUT OUT BAY WATER

City Promptly Takes Steps to Act on Advice of Board of Experts.

The city's board of experts on the water situation brought in an interim report to the city council on the board of control yesterday, suggesting a scheme for gating lake water in two ways. The plan, which is to dam the bay end of Long Pond and tap it into the lake, using it for a settling basin, was favorably received by the board, and a second session was held privately after the usual open meeting to discuss ways and means of carrying out the work.

The suggestion of Controller Ward to put every available cement mixer on the filtration plant to help out the contractor has been approved. The board also came under discussion in the conference with the experts. The controllers did discuss it, however, and decided to telegraph for Allen Hazen of New York, the city's expert on filtration matters. He is expected to be present before Tuesday's meeting, and the advice he gives will largely determine whether the city will take over the work at the filtration plant.

"Future is Clouded."

Dealing with the problem of a temporary supply of lake water for the citizens, the experts said:

"After a careful examination of the existing conditions we realize that the period in which the former source of supply can be restored, is involved in uncertainty, owing to the fact that the progress of the work must be governed largely by weather conditions, and the difficulties to be met with are to a large extent problematical."

"We, therefore, confine this interim report entirely to this matter, and would recommend that the body of water known as Long Pond, on Long Point, Ontario, and thus converted into a sedimentation basin, that all the connections to the bay be cut off, and that suitable dams, that a new cut be made at Clarendon-ave., about 600 feet in length, and provided with the necessary controlling devices."

"The result of carrying out this project will be that only lake water will be supplied to the city, the exclusion of all bay water. We consider this advisable, as Long Pond will act as a sedimentation basin and so produce a mass of water that is not amenable to chlorination treatment than the water from a temporary intake at Long Point, which is on the shore, at which point the water will be subject to severe wave action, and in the event of turbidity rendering it almost impossible to treat satisfactorily."

"We consider that by adopting the foregoing recommendation, the city authorities will have time and opportunity to concentrate their energies on the investigation and repairs of the present intake pipes."

The report is signed by J. G. Singh, chairman; T. A. Murray, Isham Farnham, and J. G. Singh, members.

Contractors Already Engaged.

After the first private session had adjourned, Mayor Geary announced that immediate steps would be taken to act on the advice of the experts. Within 10 minutes City Engineer Rust had Peter Arnot, contractor, in his office, and he was given the details of the plan. Arnot, in communication with J. E. Russell, another contractor, with a view to securing a claim on the city, and to keep the channel to the lake open, and to hand this morning.

It is expected that the engineer who enters the lake will be behind to keep it from filling up with sand when the storms wash huge piles of sand up on the island shore. Even if this precaution, however, the engineer expects to have the channel clear during stormy weather. When the water is put into the lake, the entrance from the bay will be stopped, and the city will likely have two sources of supply for lake water, for by this time it is expected to have the temporary intake at the lake, and the completed in 10 feet of water 600 feet south of the shore.

At the second conference held by the board of control just after the public meeting the question of how the work will be carried on was discussed. Property Commissioner Harris and Engineer Rust were present with the mayor. The question of putting a number of men from the commissioner's department to the island was discussed, and the commissioner was directed to make an advance and will report to the board on the practicability of it.

Waterworks matters also came in for some discussion at the public meeting. The board was given the report of the waterworks committee, which suggested that it would be well for the members of the board to take a trip over to the scene of the trouble. Controller Church intimated a desire to make the trip, and it was arranged for Monday forenoon at 11 o'clock. After the return from the island the members will take a trip over the proposed site of the C.P.R. freight sheds on the government house property with a view to settling some points on which they are not quite clear.

On Roads Commission.

Lionel H. Clarke and Controller J. Ward were nominated as the city's representatives on the good roads commission.

There was considerable discussion over a proposal to put a clause in city contracts whereby the contractor would be obliged to put a clause in his contract to keep a horse in an untrained shed without being prosecuted for maintaining a nuisance. The bylaw says "horses" and is so interpreted by the officer of the health department. The city solicitor will be consulted with a view to having the bylaw amended.

The board approved of the decision of the engineer to proceed at once with the construction of the civic car lines on East Gerrard-street, and immediate steps will be taken to widen St. Clair-avenue and Danforth-road.

It was decided to send Controller Church to a meeting to be held in the board of trade council chamber at Montreal this morning of those interested in preventing the damming of the long sault rapids by an American Power Company.

ABROGATE OPIUM TREATY.

At the executive meeting of the committee on Moral and Social Reform it was decided to ask the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church to petition the imperial government to abrogate the opium treaty with China. The committee was pleased with work done by the Dominion and Quebec Governments in prohibiting the traffic in opium, cocaine and similar drugs except for medical purposes.

It was decided to ask the entire church in Canada to observe the "Patriotic Sunday" in June as "Patriotic Sunday." Sunday school teachers, preachers and others will be requested to speak on "National Ideals." Provisions of the general assembly's consent to the name of the society will be changed to the Board of Social Service and Evangelism.

Gas: Technical schools, \$375; Collegiate Institutes, \$450; public schools, \$2400. Total \$3225.

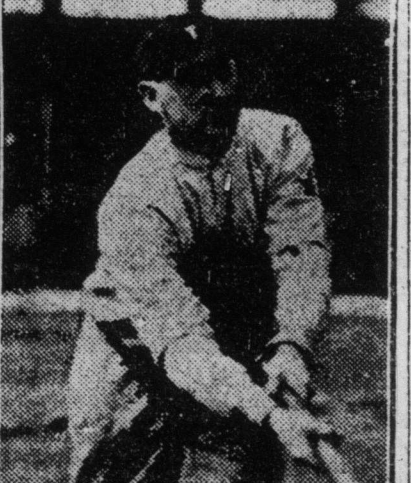

The issue lies, of course, in this point: Do we wish good government or not? If not, as the Globe indicated, there is no more to be said. But we believe the people do want good government, and not only good government, but the best government to be had.

We are firmly of the opinion that the results obtained under private control are equally attainable in the public service. We go further, and believe that better results can be attained in the public service than under private control.

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WIND DESCRIPTION OF FAMINE'S HORRORS

Returned Missionary From China Tells of Acute Suffering He Witnessed.

Liborn Merrill, M.D., of the Methodist Episcopal Central China Mission, who has just returned from Chinkiang, the headquarters of famine relief, has sent to the board of foreign missions the following picture of conditions in that city as he was leaving for the United States.

"Chinkiang lies on the Yangtze River, at the junction of the Grand Canal. Directly north is a vast area of agricultural land—a great level plain, with numerous canals. Unfortunately, these canals are perennially choked with sediment, and each year a greater or less area is overflowed and thousands of the poor rural folk are driven away for the winter.

"Following an unusually heavy rainy season the flooded area is greater and the number of homeless is increased to a million souls or more. "It was in this portion of China that the great famine occurred three years ago. Thousands died. One would have expected the officials to deepen the canals and prevent a recurrence of famine. But nothing was done. A year ago poor families were there were twelve thousand refugees at Chinkiang throughout the winter. We missionaries spent several weeks distributing rice to them. The conditions were heart-rending. Early each morning thousands of men, women and children gathered at the distributing point. Scores of Chinese people maintained a semblance of order by beating the people over the head with bamboo sticks. Some days the rain fell in torrents and the refugees stood shivering in mud a foot deep. During these desperate rainy mornings a child was born in the midst of the mob. An hour or so later the mother was up and with the child and a sack of rice she was off to her straw-mat shelter a half mile distant.

"This year the conditions is vastly more important. At Chinkiang there are probably forty thousand refugees. A piece of straw matting 3 x 8 feet is the only shelter for a family of five or six. The thousands are gathered together in great camps. Those who are strong enough wander over the hills, pulling up the roots of weeds to eat. They are in the habit of eating rice they secure from the relief agencies. The suffering is terrible. Thousands of tottering babies, boys and girls, are dead in rags, if clad at all, are about you everywhere. Old women and men hobble about, leaning heavily on sticks for support, or they lie by the wayside with their eyes staring savagely up at you, with a mute appeal that turns the heart cold. You see a mother weeping and you stoop over the dead body of a three or four-year-old boy. O God! what a hell of a scene! How many have fallen to these things? Thousands.

R. at the intersection of the company's line and the Kingston-road, decided that the railway company must safeguard the interests of those using the Kingston-road by placing a subway on it.

A petition signed by 200 or 300 ratepayers was presented to the commission with reference to the C. N. R. crossing at William-st., asking that a subway be constructed there. The crossing is by far the most dangerous in the town, and if ever a spot were held out by nature for a subway, it is the one in the railway commission's jurisdiction.

Quebec Fire Chief Dying. QUEBEC, March 24.—It is stated the condition of Chief Fitzback of the Quebec Fire Brigade, is very serious, and that the worst is feared, the last rites of the church having been administered.

TO REFORM WORLD IN PRESENT GENERATION

Representative Laymen's Missionary Speakers Are Inspired With Cheerful Confidence.

"The opportunity to advance the world in this generation," was the keynote of the laymen's missionary movement banquet, held at the Grand Hotel yesterday last night.

John A. Patterson, A.C., was in the chair, and Jos. A. Suenstam, Matthew Parkinson, N. Davidson, and N. W. Howe were the main speakers.

"The work that has been entrusted to us is the greatest that has yet been given to a generation," said Jos. A. Suenstam, representing the Methodist movement.

"The world needs saving, and we need a world to save. What we must do, we can do, and what we can do, we must do. If we present the proper conception of the stewardship entrusted to us."

"If the gospel is to be taught to the world it must be done in a living movement," said Matthew Parkinson, representing the Presbyterians.

"Christianity has got to keep up to the mark, or it will be a dead letter. But if Christianity keeps up to the mark, the heathens will die in a single generation, and the world will be Christianized in a single generation."

"Never before were all the kingdoms of the world open to Christianity. God opened them to this generation for a purpose. Christians now control the finances of the world as in no other age. Everything points to the fact that Christians will evangelize the world in this generation."

"A Breadth of View. I do not think that anyone can over estimate the value of the laymen's missionary movement. It is a movement that is making for a breadth of view that is needed in our day. It has been entirely unexplored."

"We are going to raise \$500,000 as Toronto's share in this work during the next six months. It is a milestone of what is to be accomplished."

"Twenty-three years ago there were but seven communicants in the Methodist church in Toronto. To-day there are over two hundred thousand. That shows what can be done in a short time if, when the opportunity is presented, the laymen will obey that command. It has been argued about it in the way that we now hear men argue in our clubs, the British Empire would not be here to-day. Not so."

"The younger men of this generation are not as prayerful as their fathers were before them," said N. W. Howe, K.C., representing the Anglicans.

"The laymen's movement is bringing them to realize that prayer is the strength of our power. We have a vaster view of the world than our fathers had. We have had three or four years ago."

"The Methodist Church of Canada has been increasing its activities for years by a little over \$500,000 per year. We now aim to raise \$1,000,000 in the next five years, half for home missions work and half for foreign missions work. The impetus given the work by the laymen's missionary movement is an elevator of the work."

A vote of thanks to those who spoke was moved by Thos. Findlay and seconded by Dr. Kilpatrick.

AUBURN, N.Y., March 24.—The board of arbitration of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues today decided that the "Three-I League" officially the Indiana, Illinois and Iowa League, should be consolidated during the season of 1910. The decision is announced by Secretary John H. Farrell, who is a member of a number of the league, and sustains the contention of Lehigh, Iowa, for membership. 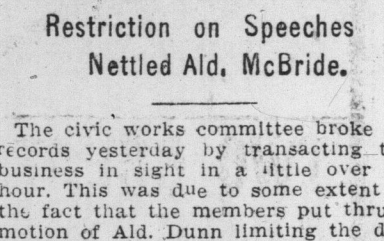

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MONTREAL CONSTABLE BADLY MAULED BY TOUGHS

Twelve to Fifteen Men Engaged in Hammering Him—In Hospital in Serious Condition.

MONTREAL, March 24.—Walking along St. Lawrence-street, on his regular beat, at 3 o'clock this morning, Constable Venne Auger of the City Hall Avenue-station, whose official number is 61, was assaulted midway between Sherbrooke and Milton-streets by a gang of men, who mauled him so terribly that to-day he lies in the General Hospital in a very serious condition, with a broken jaw, deep gashes on his head and bad bruises all over his body.

This morning Joseph Duval of 57 Viger-avenue and Pierre Bernard were brought up in the recorder's court to answer to the former charge, while the charge of interference with the constables was laid against Hector Herbert, 67 Sanguinet-street, Joseph Dubreuil, 67 Viger-avenue, and Alfred Demereau of 32 St. Hubert-street.

NOW FOR SCHOOL BOARDS TO PROCEED WITH 'TECHS'

Department of Education Points Out Machinery of New Act.

The Industrial Education Act just passed by the legislature goes into effect at once. It is important for the high school boards and boards of education concerned to note that in the case of technical schools heretofore established, it is specially provided that the members of the advisory industrial committees shall be appointed at the first meeting of the boards held after the passing of the act. This provision applies to the technical schools at Toronto, Hamilton and Sudbury, the industrial classes at Brantford, the Industrial Institute, and the co-operative Industrial School at the South, and to such other secondary schools, whether day or evening, as may have already provided classes of an industrial or technical character.

The member of the advisory industrial committees have, under certain conditions specified in the act, the management and control of the various classes of technical and industrial schools. Such committees shall be composed of twelve persons, the members of which shall be appointed by the board, as follows: (a) Six members of the board, including one representative of the board of public school trustees, and one representative of the board of separate school trustees, if any.

Until the attitude of interest was concerned, they fell flat, and prices ruled dull but steady at a slight advance. 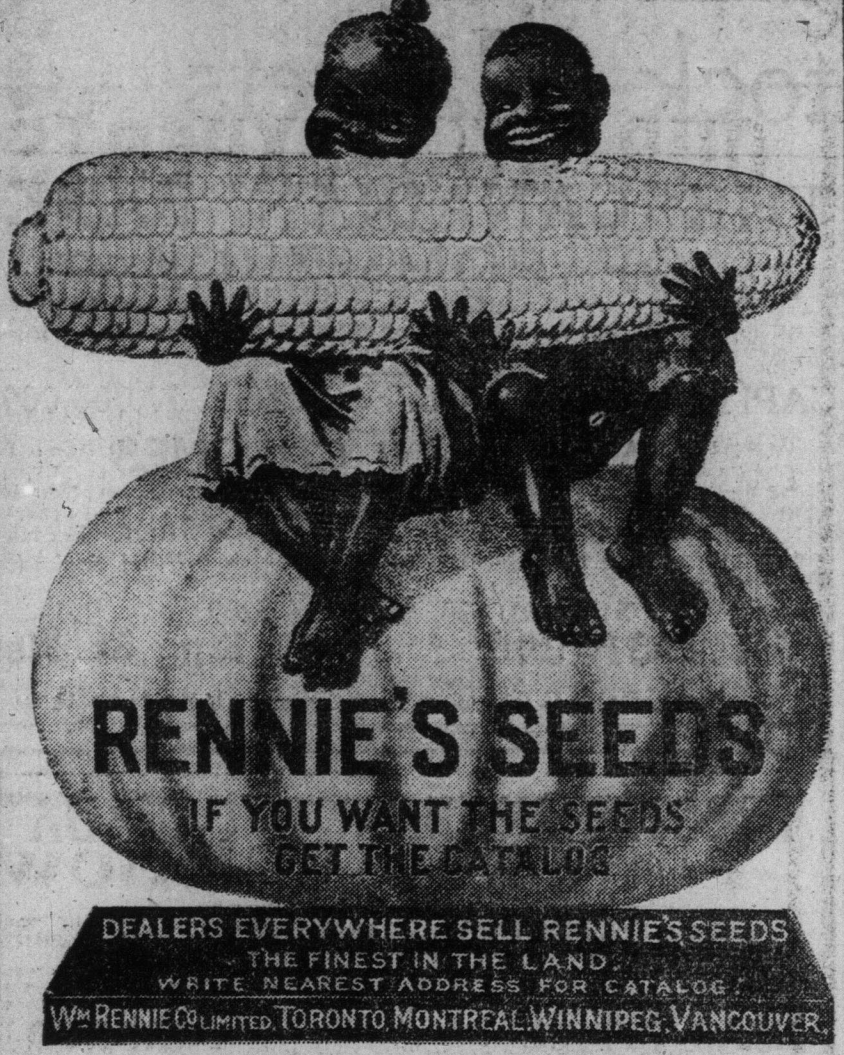

Aggressive Mining Work on Porcupine Properties

Cheaper Porcupines Move Up Cobalts Barely Hold Their Own

Gold Mining Stocks Record Advances, But Market is Mainly in Waiting Mood—Cobalt Issues Easy.

World Office, Friday Evening, March 24.

There was no outstanding change in the mining exchanges to-day, the market being in a more or less waiting mood after the movements made yesterday. Despite this tendency, however, several further advances were noted, but it was noteworthy that these were all in the cheaper Porcupine stocks.

As far as the gold mining issues were concerned the market showed a definite firmness. Trading was active, and in the issues where a special demand was in evidence prices were moved toward higher levels.

Such stocks as Dome Extension, West Dome, Vipond and Pearl Lake were the features in the dealings. Dome Extension sold up to 52 3/4, or over two points above the opening price. West Dome moved up to 34 3/8 and Vipond gained three points, at 88 1/2. Pearl Lake made a new high record at 35; or six cents above yesterday's price.

Hollinger quieted down after its strenuous advance, and a medium of profit-taking brought the value back 25 points below the high record made yesterday. Little stock came out on the reaction, however, and the movement was an entirely healthy one.

The Cobalt issues were little changed, with prices changing, where indicated, in the main toward lower levels. Timiskaming sold ex-dividend at 69, equivalent to 72 with the dividend added. This represented a loss of two points. Beaver firmed early in the day, but dropped back half a point later in the session. Both these issues were under liquidating pressure.

Chambers-Perland sold as low as 19 3/4 to-day, but there was no news to account of the decline. City of Cobalt and Great Northern were firm; Rochester was easy at 3 3/4.

The market was a rather irregular one on the whole, but the undertone was fairly responsible, and stocks acted well in most instances. Interest in the Porcupine issues was still the dominant factor, and all of these issues showed firmness.

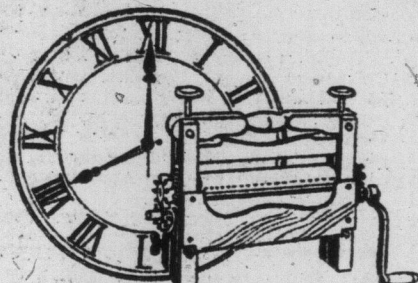
