THEY DON'T TAKE THE SMELL

A Deputation Representing \$25,000 Waited on the Board of Health.

Property Subject to Depreciation on Account of the Odor Coming From the Dump, Strond's Cattle Yards and Various Other Localities—Other News From Hamilton.

Hamilton, Aug. 1.—(Special).—A deputation of residents from the northeast portion of the city waited on the Board of Health and protested strongly against odors that came from one or more of the following: The coal oil inlet, Freeman's fertilizing works, Strond's cattle yards or Lawry's pork-packing factory. The deputation represented \$25,000 of real estate, and was headed by J. G. Y. Bushnell, who told of the great inconvenience they were put to and the depreciation to which property was subjected through the smell. The board stated they would do everything possible to remedy the objectionable state of affairs.

The state of the dump at the north end also came under consideration. The Medical Health Officer recommended that the dump be covered with earth every day during the hot weather. Mayor Colquhoun presented a statement from Superintendent Edgar of the city hospital to the effect that a large number of cases of diphtheria during the past few months were attributable to the uncovered dump and the smell from the Ferguson-avenue interception works. On the motion of Mayor Colquhoun the board resolved to have the dump covered with earth every day during the hot weather.

Board of Governors Meet.

A meeting of the Board of Governors of the City Hospital was held this afternoon, and it was decided to enclose the passages from the different sections of the institution. The Medical Health Officer and Dr. Griffin was elected chairman and Dr. Glasgow secretary of the board.

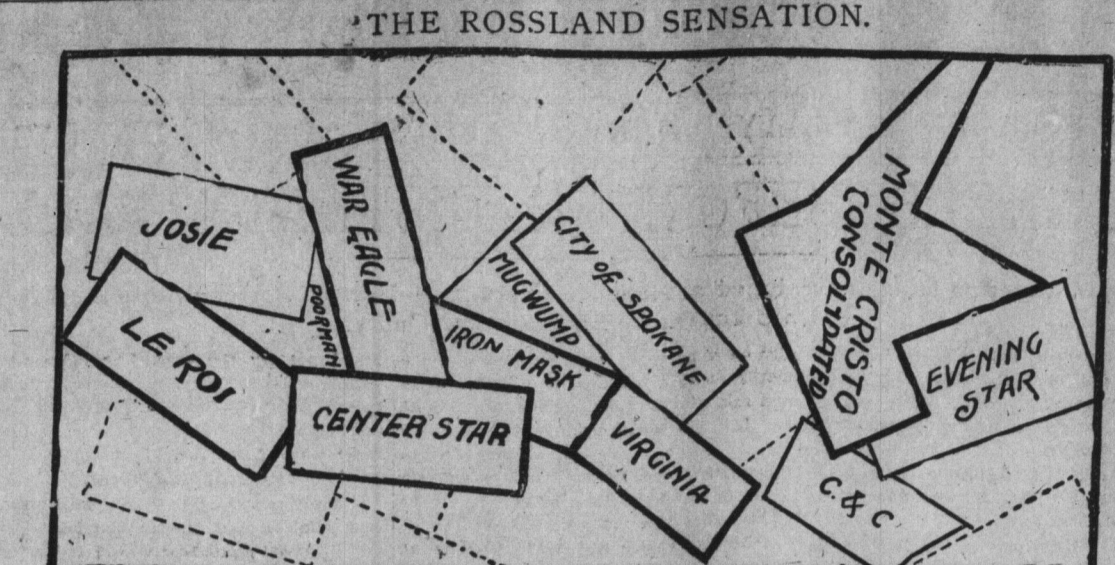

OUTERLAND HAS THE FLOOR

Some Peculiar Bookkeeping in West Zorra Township.

An Apparent Deficit in the Accounts—Something of Interest to All Municipalities—Mistakes Were Made, But in About Every Case the Effect Was Against the Township.

Woodstock, Aug. 1.—(Special).—A sensation has been caused here and throughout the West Zorra township by the report of the provincial auditor in regard to an investigation into the financial affairs of the township. The report, made by the Provincial Auditor J. B. Laing, under the heading of "Bookkeeping," states that this year a petition was circulated in West Zorra asking the Provincial Government to investigate and audit the township accounts. The investigation and audit, according to the auditor, was held in the township, and the auditor, after visiting the locality, appointed F. H. Hazell, C.M.A., of his staff, to do the work.

The report was handed down to-day, and it shows that the period covered by the audit is six years, from Jan. 1, 1912, to Dec. 31, 1917.

From Jan. 1, 1912, to March, 1914, George Innes, now of Woodstock, was clerk and treasurer. He was succeeded in both offices by E. L. Sutherland, one of the most widely-known men in the locality.

The auditor, referring to the method of bookkeeping followed by both these men, affirms that neither of them kept a cash book. They had made entries from the papers held as vouchers directly from the outside. Col. Clarke, the veteran clerk, had been appointed in 1914, and he was reported to have been a very careless and careless in the part of Mr. Innes in keeping his own funds and those of the township. The report says that Mr. Innes does not think the causes of the mistakes, and it is understood that Mr. Innes is quite willing to make the deficiency good.

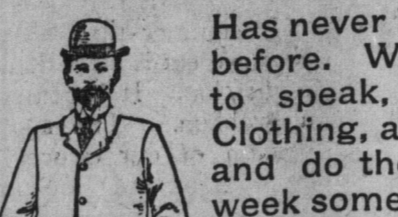

THORN PAYS THE PENALTY. The Murderer of William Guldensuppe Electrocutated at Sing Sing.

Electrical Apparatus Worked Without a Hitch and Death Was Instantaneous - Condemned Man Displays Remarkable Nerve, Smiling as He Enters the Execution Room.

Sing Sing, N.Y., Aug. 1.-Martin Thorn was executed at 11:17 o'clock this forenoon.

Thorn slept soundly until nearly 6 o'clock this morning. Then he put on the new suit of clothing provided by the State, which he met with death. Thorn eyed it carefully and inspected the slit in the neck where the electrode was to be applied.

Thorn told me he was not nervous, and would die bravely. He said he was perfectly reconciled to his fate, and that he had made his peace with God. He slept well and had no fear of death.

When Thorn rose this morning he told one of his keepers that his only dread was the wait from the time he awoke until he was summoned to the chair. Rev. Father Hansmann of Brooklyn, the priest and adviser of the murderer, called at the prison shortly after 8 o'clock, and remained with Thorn until the last prayer book and prayer until he was summoned to the death house.

Worked Without a Hitch. All the witnesses assembled in the warder's office at 11 a. m. today, to witness the execution. They passed through a small passageway at the rear of the condemned cell to the execution chamber.

Prison Physician Izard and several doctors took up positions near the electric chair in the centre of the cell, to witness the execution. They were seated on pine benches, and then ensued a wait of a few minutes.

Finally the iron door leading from the corridor to the execution room was swung open, and the big form of Chief Keeper Cunningham loomed up above the threshold.

The fact that the Liverpool and London grain markets were closed to-day had a curtailing effect upon the trading on the Chicago Board. Early in the session wheat showed heaviness, owing to the large receipts in the West, inducing selling from the Northwest. Later in the session the visible supply seemed to change the situation, and the market recovered somewhat.
