On Oct. 19 reconnoitering patrols proceed-ing along the north bank of the river in a westerly direction, suddenly encountered a party of Boers in some dense brush on the Rhodesia side of the Limpopo. After giving the question of sending a Canadian contingent to the Transvaal his **GEYLON TEA** Containing consideration, Sir Wilfrid Laurier announced his policy as follows: "There exists a great deal of miscon-ception in the country regarding the powers of the Government in the pre-sent case," said Wilfrid. "As I under-stand the Militia Act, and I may say that I have given it some study of late, our volunteers are enrolled to be used in the defence of the Dominion. They are Canada's defence. Perhaps the most widespread misspprehension is that they cannot be sent out of Canada. To my mind it is clear that cases might arise when they might be sent to a foreign land to fight. To postilate a case: Suppose that Spain should 'e-clare war upon Great Britain. Spain has, or had, a navy, and that navy might be being got ready to assail Can-ada as part of the Empire. Sometimes the best method of defending one's self is to attack, and in that case Canadian soldiers might certain that they legally might be so despatched to the iberian Peninsula. The case of the South African Republic is not analog-ous. There is no menace to Canada, and, although we may be willing to contribute troops, I do not see how we can do so. Then, again, how could we do so without Parliament's granting us the money? We simply could not do anything. In other words, we should have to summon Parliament. The Gov-ernment of Canada is restricted in its powers. It is responsible to Parlia-ment, and it can do very little with-out the permission of Parliament. There is no doubt as to the attitude of the Government on all questions that mean menace to British interest, but in this present case our limitations are very clearly defined. And so it is that we have not offered a Canadian conlingent to the home authorities."
