# REPORT

—OF—

## The Session of Knox Church,

OTTAWA,

*Presented at the Annual Meeting of the  
Congregation, held Jan. 14th, 1886.*

THE Members of the Session, in the absence of our respected Moderator (who they fondly hope, in answer to prayer, may soon, restored to health, be with us again), would, in presenting their Report for the past year, with grateful hearts, acknowledge the continued goodness and loving kindness of the great Head of the Church to us as a Congregation.

Like other years, the one that is gone brings memories of joys and sorrows. If trials and misfortunes have been our lot—if those dear to us have been removed by death; nevertheless, let us look to the future in faith and hope, believing that God will in due time wipe away all tears from our eyes.

In view of the sore affliction with which it has pleased our Heavenly Father, in His all-wise providence to visit the home of our beloved Pastor, the Session has placed on record a resolution, expressing its heartfelt sympathy with the bereaved parents.

During the past year, *nine* members have been received—*six* by profession of faith, and *three* by certificate. *Three* have been removed by death, namely, Miss Lizzie Shearer, Mrs. Mackie, and Mr. Thomas Clark, *twelve* dismissed by certificate to other churches, and *one* by order of the Session, leaving two hundred and fifty-four on the Communion Roll.

*Fourteen* baptisms have been entered on record.

The thanks of the Congregation are due to the Lady Collectors for the faithful and diligent discharge of the duties assigned them, in the distribution of the "Record," and the collection of the contributions to the "Schemes of the Church," which amount to \$340.

# FORTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT

—OF THE—

## TEMPORAL COMMITTEE OF KNOX CHURCH, OTTAWA.

YOUR Committee appointed on the 8th of January, 1885, ere resigning into your hands the trust then committed to them, desire to submit for your consideration a report of the financial work of the year just closed. Unlike some of those formerly presented, this report is not marked by the narration of any specially interesting or important transaction, but it should not on that account be less interesting to the members of the Congregation, nor should it be less fruitful of suggestions for our future guidance.

That you may better judge of the years' financial work, and determine whether on the whole it has been favourable or unfavourable, we submit a synopsis of the receipts of 1884 and of 1885, together with the items of expenditure of 1885, as gathered from the Treasurer's Financial Statement, to which you are referred for a more minute and detailed account of moneys received and expended during the year.

From this synopsis of receipts and expenditure it will be noticed:

(1.) That the total receipts for 1885 fall short of those of 1884 by \$144.88.

(2.) That the Weekly Contributions for 1885 fall short of those of the preceding year by the considerable sum of \$218.57; and that from the main sources of our income, namely: Weekly Contributions, Ordinary Collections, Prayer Meeting Collections, Thanksgiving Offering, Missionary Collections, and Ladies' Association, we received in 1884 \$5,468.60, while from the same sources we received this year \$5,180.66, which shows a falling off in receipts from these sources to the amount of \$287.94.

(3.) That in the items of Weekly Contributions, Prayer Meeting Collections, Thanksgiving Offering, and Ladies' Association, there is a decrease in 1885 as compared with 1884 of \$316.47, while in those of Ordinary Collections and Missionary Collections there is a small increase amounting to \$28.53.

(4.) That while the comparison of receipts as between 1884 and 1885 is unfavourable to the latter, yet this unfavourable aspect is more

than removed when we compare the items of expenditure for the two years. In 1884, the total annual expenditure was \$5,516.54, while that for 1885 is reduced to \$5,422.52, in which there is included the unusual sum of \$135 for pulpit supply, caused by Rev. Mr. Farries' prolonged illness.

This reduced expenditure is chiefly caused by the fact that, last year, for the first time, we began to reap the good fruit of diminishing our debt, inasmuch as we paid for interest in 1885 only \$920.80, and even of this sum \$20.80 represents interest on interest, while in 1884 we paid for interest \$1618.48, so that our annual expenditure has been by this single item reduced by the large sum of \$697.68.

### Balance.

The total receipts for the past year, as given above, were \$5,427.20, and the total expenditure, \$5,422.52, leaving a balance in the hands of our Treasurer of \$4.68.

### Next Year's Work.

In our report for 1884, we placed in our estimates an item to meet a note, given by the Chairman of your Committee. This note, now representing \$645.68, was given to meet promised, but, at the time, unpaid subscriptions to the recent debt fund. During the last two years, your Committee have been unable to cancel this note, but the Congregation must resolutely set its face towards the payment of this amount during the now current year, and so prevent, what may, if now neglected, result, in the immediate future, in forming the nucleus of an unpleasant floating debt.

Another matter, now to be noticed, must be undertaken by the Temporal Committee of 1886. The Church is in imperative need of a new covering for the roof, and of fresh painting and tinting, and recent experiences during public worship show that this work cannot be safely delayed beyond the coming spring. The special means by which these necessary improvements may be carried out, we leave to the judgment and tact of our successors in office.

To raise this amount two things are essential: (1.) That there should be no decrease, as was the case in 1885, but rather an increase in the amount of the Congregation's Weekly Contributions. (2.) That the strictest economy must be practised in administering the revenue placed in the hands of the Committee for the current year, and, in addition, a special effort must be made to raise the amount given above.

Your Committee, near the close of their year of office, by printed circulars, asked the contributors to name, before the end of December, the amounts they proposed to give as their weekly contributions for 1886. It was thought that this method would save much unnecessary trouble and valuable time, formerly devoted by members of Committee to canvassing contributors for their annual subscriptions, and that it came much nearer the ideal mode of Christian giving to God's cause. Seventy-five contributors responded to the appeal, promising for 1886 the sum of \$2,457. Those who did not respond will be waited on by members of Committee, and, when full returns are made, we hope to be able to recognize an advance in the hitherto unfailing liberality of the Congregation.

With strong and unwavering trust in the God of our fathers ; with hearts more and more submissive, year by year, to Him to whom we owe all things, and from whom cometh down every good and every perfect gift, giving glory to God for all He has done for us, and for all that in the past He has enabled us to do for Him, let us, each for him-



self, ask the question—Lord, what wilt thou have me to do? and when in God's providence, the answer comes, and the work is assigned, let us prayerfully undertake that work, and in His name, and for His sake, let us "labour while it is day, for the night cometh when no man can work."

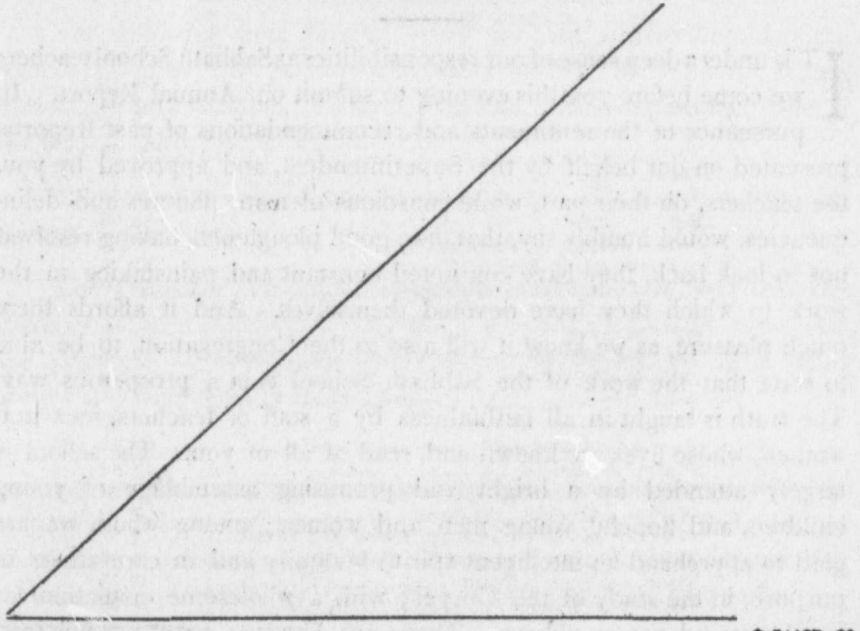

IT is under a deep sense of our responsibilities as Sabbath School teachers we come before you this evening to submit our Annual Report. In pursuance of the sentiments and recommendations of past Reports, presented on our behalf by the Superintendent, and approved by you, the teachers, on their part, while conscious of many failures and delinquencies, would humbly say, that, like good ploughmen, having resolved not to look back, they have continued constant and painstaking in the work to which they have devoted themselves. And it affords them much pleasure, as we know it will also to the Congregation, to be able to state that the work of the Sabbath School is in a prosperous way. The truth is taught in all faithfulness by a staff of teachers, men and women, whose lives are known and read of all of you. The school is largely attended by a bright and promising assemblage of young children, and hopeful young men and women; among whom we are glad to apprehend an intelligent spirit of inquiry and an earnestness of purpose, in the study of the Gospel; with a wholesome emulation for regular attendance on classes. These are, however, tokens which may mean much or little according as they are promoted or neglected; yet they are seasonable and in the line of the truth, and for which we bless God and take fresh courage to persevere in our work.

In the course of the year we have been called to mourn the removal by death of two children from the Sabbath School, viz, James Farries

and Bella Graham ; "Therefore, be ye also ready, for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of Man cometh."

Our staff of teachers is larger than at any previous time :—consisting of ten ladies and twelve gentleman besides the Superintendent and Rev. Mr. Farries, teacher of the Bible Class. Mr. McKinnon was appointed by the Session assistant teacher of the Bible Class, and conducts it in Mr. Farries' absence.

The total number of pupils on the roll during the year was 200, making an average attendance of 134, a gratifying result.

Miss Masson's class of six takes the Superintendent's prize for highest average attendance, making 97½ per cent., a creditable showing—nearly a perfect attendance for the year. Mr. McKinnon's class takes second place, with 95½ per cent.

The following were present every Sabbath, and so obtained the Teachers' prize for perfect attendance :—Eva McKinnon, Rosan Strackan, Flora Waddell, Victoria Strackan, Bertie McMillan, George McKinnon, and Joseph McCracken.

The following missed one Sabbath only :—William Bremner and Robert McCracken.

The Treasurer's accompanying statement will show you that our finances are in a satisfactory condition ; which also goes to show that the principle of worshiping by voluntary systematic giving is being taught and developed in the school.

The ordinary collections, the monthly missionary collections, the proceeds of the Congregational and Sabbath School pic-nic, with the balance from last year, amount to the respectable sum of \$222.24, out of which we contributed \$50 to the French Evangelization Scheme and met all our other obligations, leaving a balance on hand of \$70.82.

As Bible students and teachers, we would here record our sincere acknowledgments for the invaluable incentives and benefits we have always derived from the mutual study of the Sabbath School lessons with fellow-workers of other churches, at the Teachers' Normal Class, on the Saturday evenings ; and also our fervent gratitude to the pious fathers entrusted with the arduous duty of selecting the International

Lessons, for the great wisdom and faithfulness exercised in the discharge of the work, which is so full of interest to all.

As a class, who, it will be allowed, have exceptional opportunities of observing matters which concern the present and prospective interests of the Congregation, we would this year again call the attention of parents and friends to the fact that several of our children who might conveniently attend our own Sabbath School do not do so, but go to swell the volume of other Sabbath Schools. The teachers hold this as a grievance, and would regard it as an act of kindly appreciation of, and co-operation in the work if this practice should be brought to a stop. The welfare of the Congregation demands it. The children should, in every possible case, attend the Sabbath School to which they properly belong, so they might grow up in love and sympathy with the other youth, and with the best interests and associations of the Congregation.

It is on natural; internal increase, cherished and promoted in this way, that old established congregations, like Knox, must in future mainly depend for a sustained and healthy progress. New comers can take little interest in the past history and traditions of any congregation, however fondly these memories may be cherished by the honored veterans of those scenes.

We call your serious attention also to the case of several young men and young women, loiterers on our borders, who yet attend neither Sabbath School, Bible Class, nor Church Service, but drift about aimlessly with kindred spirits, spending their money for that which is not bread. We ask the assistance of all in the work of reclaiming such young people, and of giving them a place among us.

This work, we are persuaded, the Lord requires of us as a church, as of individuals:—to deal our bread to the hungry, that we bring the poor that are cast out to our house, when we see the naked to cover him; and that we hide not our face from poor brethren, or kindred. "Then," and the promise shall not fail, "shall thy light break forth as the morning, and thy healing shall spring forth speedily; and thy righteousness shall go before thee; and the glory of the Lord shall be thy rereward."
