

THE ORPHANS' HOME.

ANNUAL MEETING OF MANAGERS AND SUPPORTERS OF THE INSTITUTION.

REPORTS FOR THE YEAR MOST SATISFACTORY.

The annual meeting of the managers and supporters of the Orphans' Home took place on June 3rd, in the Home, Dovercourt Road, the Mayor in the chair. The meeting was held in the Board Room, and here the children were assembled, and presented a most beautiful spectacle, their cheerful faces and healthy appearance testifying to the good care of the managers and the sanitary condition of the Home and its surroundings.

After prayer and singing by the children, the Secretary read the Annual Report of the managers, which stated that the general health of the children during the past trying winter had been such as to require but little medical attendance. Since the date of the last annual report 70 children had been admitted—41 boys and 29 girls, while 54 had left, of whom 25 had been removed by parents or relatives, who were again in a position to support them; 19 had been apprenticed, 4 adopted, and 3 absconded and 3 died. The average number for the year had been 117, though for the past three months there has not been fewer than 129, an increase of 24 since the removal in October last to the new Home. On the 8th November last the new Home was formerly opened by the Mayor. Soon after a subscription book was opened towards reducing the debt upon the building, and within a few minutes \$700 had been subscribed. With legacies and other contributions the amount reached \$2,197, or \$1,269 in advance of last year's returns. eral gifts from other friends were gratefully acknowledged. The resignation of Mrs. Macnab, of the Board of Management, was referred to in terms of regret, as well as that of Miss Ridout. Satisfaction was expressed with the manner in which the matron had discharged the duties of her office. The managers expressed the hope that those of the citizens who did not contribute to the support of the institution would pay the Home a visit, as they would then more thoroughly realize the benefit of the charity, and would gladly receive the tired and disheartened collectors who so faithfully fulfilled their duties, though often with but poor success.

Mr. W. B. McMurrich moved the adoption of the Report in a brief speech, in which he advocated the claims of the Home upon the charity of the citizens.

The Report was adopted.

OTHER REPORTS.

Mr. Murray presented the Treasurer's Report, from which it appeared that there was a balance in hand of \$1,287.60. The expenditure had been \$6,384.81 and the receipts \$7,671.91.

Mr. J. S. McMurray presented the Report of the Building Committee, showing a mortgage debt on the Home of \$36,000, or when the sale of the old Home is completed of \$23,210.

The Reports were adopted.

Rev. Mr. Wallace said that no charity appealed more strongly to the benevolence of the citizens than the Orphans' Home. He congratulated the Committee of Management upon the efficient manner in which they had managed its affairs. The physical, spiritual, and intellectual welfare of the children were well attended to in this Home. He hoped that the little girls would be taught the various duties of domestic life in connection with household work.

The Resolution was adopted.

Resolution of thanks.—Mr. Wm. Gooderham moved a vote of thanks to the retiring Board of Management. The mover took occasion to speak of the blessedness of giving, and pointed out that it was a duty of every Christian to give to such a charity as the Home in proportion to his or her means. He added, amid applause, that he would be always willing to contribute his share towards paying off the mortgage debt.

Ald. Harvie, who seconded the motion, bore testimony to the improved appearance of the children since they had lived in their new quarters.

The motion was carried.

Rev. Mr. Ingles moved a vote of thanks to the Orangemen of Ontario and the many friends of the Home for their contributions during the year. Carried.

Mr. J. W. C. Fegan, of the Boys' Home, Southworth Street, London, England, gave a cheering account of the results of the work of taking care of supposed deserted children in the Homes in England.

A vote of thanks to the chairman concluded the proceedings.

ORPHANS' HOME AND FEMALE AID SOCIETY.

33RD ANNUAL REPORT.

In accordance with the rules of this Society the Lady Managers beg to present to their friends and the public the following report of the affairs of the Institution for the past year. The Managers feel they have great cause for gratitude, and thankfulness to Almighty God, that during an unusually long and trying winter the general health of the children has been such as to require but little medical attendance, and with equal gratitude they record the increased usefulness which the Home has attained during the past year.

Since the date of the last annual report 70 children have been admitted—41 boys and 29 girls, while during the same period 54 have left the Home; of these 25 have been removed by parents or relatives, who were again in a position to support and care for them; 19 have been apprenticed, after the Rules of the Society; 4 adopted, 3 absconded, and 3 died—one little girl of heart disease, from which she had suffered for years; one of congestion of the brain and lungs, and one poor little lad of ten years was drowned while on a pleasure excursion at the Island in July last. The average number for the year has been 117, though for the past three months there have not been fewer than 129, an increase of 24 since the removal in October last to the new Home.

On the 8th of November the new Orphans' Home on Dovercourt Court Road was formally opened by His Worship the Mayor. This event had been looked forward to with deep interest by the Managers and many friends of the Institution. The new building had not been undertaken without much thought and anxious deliberation but the increased demands which the growth of a city invariably entails, proved to the Board the necessity of providing a larger accommodation for the ever-increasing work of the Institution. In taking these heavy responsibilities upon themselves the Managers looked forward to still greater efforts and largely increased subscriptions from the generous-hearted and sympathetic citizens of Toronto, and they earnestly hope that a more thorough knowledge of the needs of the Institution will awaken a deeper interest in the hearts of the benevolent of this city. Immediately after the formal

opening of the Home a subscription book was opened towards reducing the debt upon the building. Within a few minutes nearly \$700 had been subscribed. The following were the principal amounts: His Worship the Mayor, \$25; Mrs. Alex. Cameron, \$500, in addition to \$300 previously subscribed; Ald. Crocker, \$50; Rev. C. V. Adams, \$25; Mrs. A. P. Macdonald, \$25. Added to these sums a legacy of \$500 from the late Mr. Kiffin, of York, and \$100 from the late Mrs. Ballard, of Streetsville; \$20 from Mr. Martland; \$532.63 from Annual Calico Ball; \$46.33 from Lecture delivered by the Rev. T. Patterson; \$49 from concert due entirely to Mrs. McKean's exertions, and \$25 from Miss Wheelwright, the Matron, makes a total of \$2,197.96; \$1,269.36 in advance of last year's returns. Nor must we fail to mention the several gifts from other kind friends, among which were handsome brass gasaliers for Board Room and Hall from Mrs. M. R. VanKoughnet; stained glass window from Elliott & Son; new benches for School Room from Mrs. McMurrich; iron bedsteads from Mrs. Macnab; set of granite ware, the result of Miss Ridout's personal effort, and visitors' book from Miss Wheelwright.

Very many gratifying accounts are constantly being received from those to whom the children have been apprenticed, proving that the careful training, which it has been their privilege to receive, has not been lost upon them. As usual the little ones have not been forgotten, but through the thoughtful kindness of the captains of the several ferryboats have spent many delightful days of pleasure and recreation. To Prof. Schneider and Mr. Harris, in conjunction with other friends, who have so kindly interested themselves in the religious training of the children, the Managers feel deeply indebted; as also to Mr. Murray, their solicitor, Drs. Ogden and Macdonald, and Mr. McMurray, Chairman of the Finance and Building Committee, through whose skilful and personal supervision the success of the committee is largely due.

It is with regret that the Management have received the resignation of two of their number—Mrs. Macnab, who for many years has been one of the most active members of the Board, and who for the past two years has filled the onerous position of Secretary-Treasurer to the Building Committee, and Miss Ridout, who so ably acted as Recording Secretary. The Committee have much pleasure in availing themselves of their annual privilege to express to Miss Wheelwright, the Matron, their entire satisfaction with the

manner in which she has discharged her arduous duties; as well as to Miss Armstrong, their Teacher, under whose able tuition the children are making rapid progress. To the victuallers, bakers, grocers, and all other friends who have so kindly and substantially remembered the little ones, the Lady Managers tender their grateful thanks. They also feel their thanks are due to the old and tried friends of the Institution who continue to support it year after year with their subscriptions; but at the same time they feel assured that many well-to-do-people in this city do not share the burden of its support. Would they but visit the Home for themselves, they would then more thoroughly realize the benefit of this charity, and would gladly receive the tired and disheartened collector, who faithfully fulfils her duty, though often with but poor success. In support of this argument the Managers quote the remarks of two wellknown and philanthropic gentlemen of this city, who are deeply interested and thoroughly acquainted with the workings of all our benevolent institutions, and who visited the Orphans' Home a week or two ago for the first time: "Spent about two hours in the building; were shown the various rooms, and were greatly struck with the admirable arrangements of the entire building for the purpose for which it was erected; with the cleanliness and healthfulness of the children, as well as the proficiency which they evince in their studies. The Institution deserves to be widely known and very generously supported."

Annexed will be found the Treasurer's Report, with a full and satisfactory statement of the financial condition of the Home.

THE REPORT OF THE FINANCE AND BUILD-ING COMMITTEE.

To the Lady Managers of the Orphans' Home and Female Aid Society:

At the opening of the "New Home" on Thanksgiving Day (8th November last) your Committee presented their Report and Statement of Receipts and Expenditure to that date, showing a total outlay up to that time of \$48,167.22.

Since then the several contractors have completed their work, and we are glad to be able to report that every outstanding account for labour and materials furnished has been paid, and the entire debt with which we now have to contend is the consolidated debt to the North of Scotland Mortgage Company, amounting to \$86,630.94.

As soon as the pending sale of the old Home is completed, and money in bank credited, our entire debt upon the "New Home" for land and buildings will be \$23,210.51, bearing interest at six per cent.

The details of receipts and expenditure will be found in the accompanying statements of account, duly audited and certified.

Now that the Building Committee have finished the work of construction and the completion of the buildings, it remains for the Lady Managers and the charitable public to reduce the existing mortgage debt upon the building with as little delay as possible, so as to leave the "New Home" free from encumbrance, and enable the Managers to increase the accommodation for more children, and thus extend the usefulness of this noble charity.

All of which is respectfully submitted.
