



Briefly I showed, from American evidence, and from unchallenged reports, that (1) the whole judicial system of America had fallen into contempt; (2) that it was corrupt; (3) that its proceedings, as in the Thaw trial, were in the highest degree degraded, offensive and abominable; (4) that its ordinary police methods, as in the case of Signor Caruso, lately honored by King Edward VII, were beneath the standard of Hottentots; (5) that in Chicago, for example, the magistrates and the police were brigands and thieves in league with thieves; (6) that when a poor man, without money to bribe the loathsome press and the more loathsome judge, was executed, he was killed with hideous and revolting tortures; (7) that the deficiencies of American "justice" were supplied by the karosene can of the obscene Judge Lynch; (8) that a peculiarly savage and abominable form of slavery was actually engineered by legal officers; (9) that all the municipalities of America are corrupt, and (10) frequently depend on enforced bribes from brothels; (11) that children are held to industrial slavery; (12) that the condition of the poor is unspeakably wretched and far worse than in any other country; (13) that the legislatures are corrupt; (14) that every kind of noisome and poisonous adulteration flourishes together with (15) a host of peculiarly squalid, silly and mischievous impostures known as "new religions."

TORONTO AND PLAYGROUNDS

(Toronto News.)

With the shortsightedness that has too often characterized the civic parks committee, the share of last year's special fund was soon swept away, and a mortage of nearly \$180,000 drawn up and cashed with the year of 1080 pawned for security. Now the park commissioner has learned to his amazement that he has enly \$30,000 instead of \$185,000 to carry out a "comprehensive scheme of play grounds boulevards and parks." This is hardly fair play to the new head of the department. Fortunately, there is one portion of the proceeds of the mortage appropriated, but not expended. In the list of liabilities is included \$50,000 for Arnold square, chosen as a playground for the Second Ward. The council of 1907 piedged itself to this expenditure as part of the piecemeal policy that would seem to be the inevitable result of countrol by a changing committee of council. But under the circumstances no obligation is imposed on the present council to earry out this policy. Mr. Wilson protests against the expenditure of such an amount on any one playground. Very sensibly he points out that the limited supply of money should be distributed over a larger area. With this view Council will hardly disagree, and his contention that the \$50,000 should be placed at his disposal should be heartily supported.






