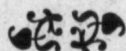

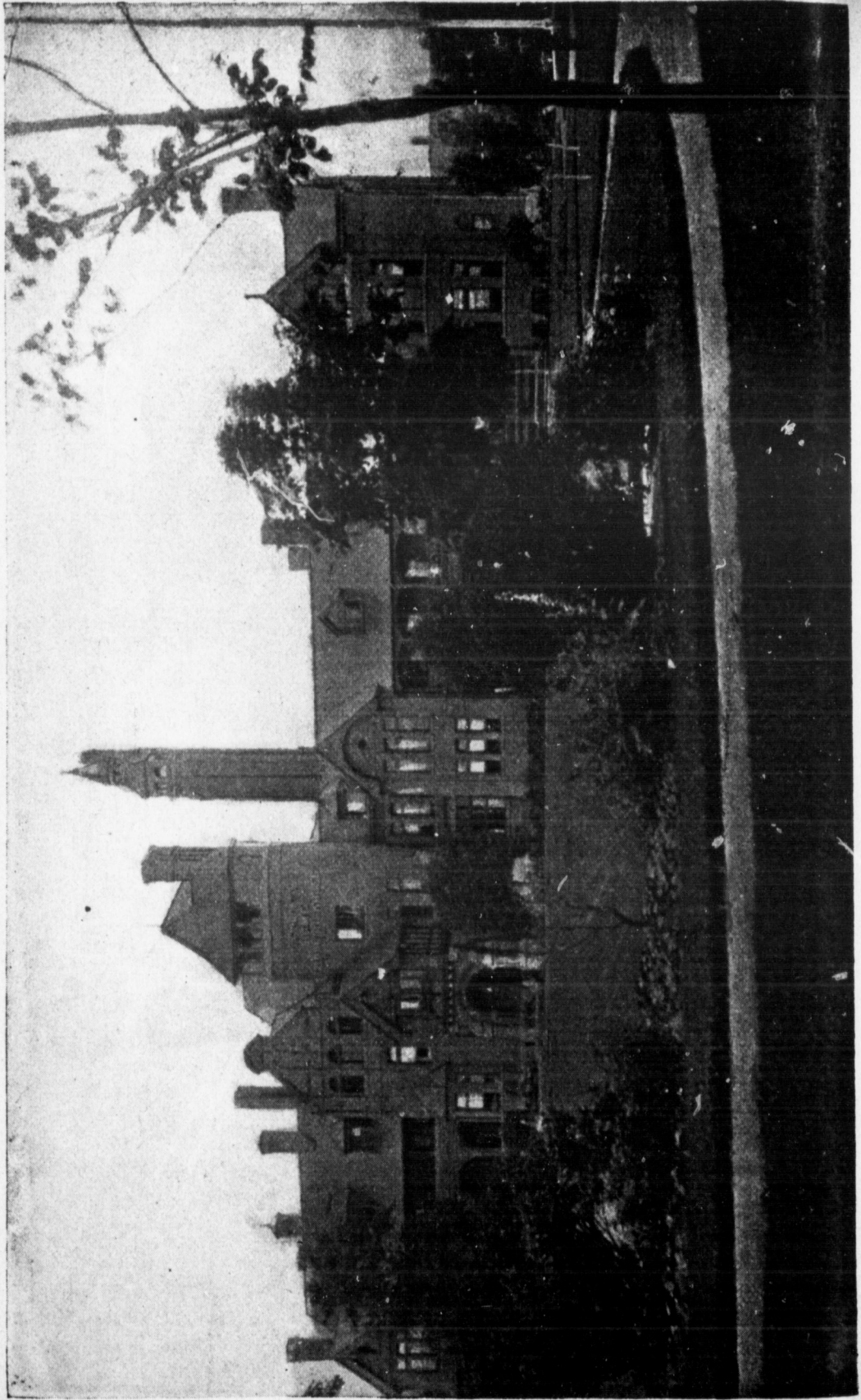

CONSTITUTION
OF THE
Home for Incurables

Amended and Adopted March 23th, 1896.

I.—This institution shall be known as “THE TORONTO HOME FOR INCURABLES.”

II.—Its object shall be to afford maintenance, nursing and medical and surgical aid to persons suffering from incurable disease, and to provide for them while inmates of the Home the ministrations of the Gospel.

III.—Every subscriber of two dollars and upward per annum shall be entitled to vote at the annual meeting, at which a Board of Managers shall be elected for the ensuing twelve months. Every individual who shall pay in advance, and at one time, the sum of fifty dollars, shall be entitled to the same privileges for life.

IV.—All money now in the possession of the Home, or which may hereafter be collected or acquired by it, shall be applied, save as hereinafter provided and unless otherwise directed by the donor, to the general objects, uses and requirements of the Home.

V.—The affairs of the Home shall be under the direction, control and management of the Board of Managers, of whom at least forty shall be ladies and twelve gentlemen, and who shall be elected at the annual general meeting of subscribers, qualified as set forth in Article III.

(1) The medical staff attending the Home shall be *ex officio* members of the Board of Managers.

(2) In case of a vacancy arising, the Board may elect a member to fill the vacancy until the next annual general meeting.

(3) The Board shall control and direct all the business of the institution, and their decision upon all points of management shall be final.

(4) There shall be chosen annually, by vote of the Board, a President and Vice-President, who shall be gentlemen, and from among the Lady Managers the following officers, viz. : First Directress, Second Directress, Third Directress, Secretary, Assistant Secretary and Treasurer ; and also three Trustees, from among the gentlemen members thereof, by whom the Endowment Fund shall be held, invested and administered.

(5) For the more convenient working of the Institution, the Board may from time to time appoint committees of not less than three of their number, such as an Executive Committee, and committees for visiting and superintending the Home.

(6) The Board may also enact By-laws for regulating the duties of the various officers and employees of the Home.

(7) The By-laws shall not be altered except at a regular meeting, after notice duly given at least a month previously.

VI.—The Board of Managers shall hold stated meetings at least once a month, and may hold adjourned meetings when necessary. At such monthly meetings the Board shall have power to make additional By-laws regulating its own government, and for the government of the officers and employees, as before provided, and, when necessary, after due notice, to alter and amend the same.

(1) Special meetings of the Board may be called by the President, and one of the Directresses, or on requisition of five or more members of the Board. When a special meeting is called, the time and place of meeting and the business for which it is called shall be stated in the notice calling the meeting, and no other business shall be taken up at such meeting.

VII.—The annual general meeting of the subscribers, qualified as set forth in Article III., shall be held in the month of March.

necessary arrangements for said annual meeting ; (2) to lay before the subscribers a report of the proceedings of the previous twelve months, and to exhibit a full and accurate view of the funds, property and effects of the Home.

VIII.—In view of the large contributions given by the citizens of Toronto, and the grant made by the City Council in aid of the Home, applications from the City of Toronto for admission to the Home shall have preference over others.

IX.—The Board will receive incurable persons from any municipality in Ontario outside of Toronto, on condition that a bond be given by said municipality to pay such sum as the Board may determine from time to time for the maintenance of each patient so sent. Provided always that a certificate as to general character and circumstances shall have been received from such persons as the Board may approve ; that a certificate be given by the gaol surgeon of the municipality, or by such other medical gentleman as the Board may approve, that the person seeking admission is incurable, provided also that such certificate be endorsed by the medical officers of this Institution, and that the application be approved by the Board at a regular monthly meeting.

X.—That all money which may be received from bequests, unless otherwise ordered by the testator, and all amounts paid for life membership, be applied to the Endowment Fund, and not used for current expenses. That said money be handed by the Treasurer to the Trustees of the Endowment Fund for Investment, and that the income of said Fund be paid by the Trustees to the Treasurer for the maintenance of the Home.

XI.—The foregoing Constitution shall not be altered, unless it be at the annual general meeting of subscribers, notice of such alteration having been given at a regular meeting of the Board at least three months before the annual meeting, and approved by a majority of the Board of Managers.

BY-LAWS

Amended and Adopted March 23th, 1896.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

I.--At all meetings of the Board of Managers, the President, and in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside ; and, in the event of neither being present, the Managers present shall elect a Chairman *pro tem.* . . .

(1) The Chairman shall be the judge of order, and his decisions thereon shall be acquiesced in without debate.

II.—The Secretary shall keep fair and regular minutes of the proceedings of the Board of Managers in a book to be provided for that purpose.

(1) She shall preserve all the records and papers of the Society which do not belong to the Treasurer.

(2) She shall cause a notice of each stated meeting, and of each special meeting of the Board of Managers, to be sent to the address of each Manager, at least one day previous to the day fixed for the meeting.

(3) The Assistant-Secretary shall assist the Secretary in her duties when required, and act for her at meetings of the Board in her absence.

III.—The Treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to the Society, and shall give a receipt to the persons from whom money may be received.

(1) For the sake of regularity, and in order to establish the amount, all persons who may hand money to the Treasurer are requested to ask for a receipt for the money so paid over.

(2) The Treasurer shall deposit all moneys which may be received in a deposit account in some chartered bank, to be approved by the Board, to the credit of the Home, and all cheques to be drawn on

said account shall be signed by the President or Vice-President or the Chairman *pro tem* and the Treasurer.

(3) The Treasurer shall keep a fair and regular account of the receipts and expenditures, and the account book and bank book shall be open to the inspection of the Managers at each stated meeting.

(4) Prior to the general annual meeting the Treasurer shall prepare a statement showing the receipts and expenditure during the year, duly classified and audited, that a lucid, full explanation, or exposition of the working of the finances of the Home, may be submitted at the general meeting.

(5) The Treasurer's accounts shall be audited by a Committee of the gentleman Managers named by the Chairman or by the Board.

IV.—The Treasurer shall pay accounts for articles and services supplied to the Home only when duly certified, and in all cases of payment shall require a receipt.

(1) Accounts shall be certified to be correct as to prices by the Managers who make the purchase of the articles, and shall be initialled "correct" accordingly. They shall then be initialled by the Matron, to show that the articles were received at the Home.

(2) The accounts shall be laid before the Managers at the stated monthly meetings, and when payment is ordered, the orders shall be entered on the minutes by the Secretary.

(3) The Treasurer shall then pay the accounts, and an entry upon the minutes will be a sufficient authority to the Treasurer to pay whatever accounts or disbursements the Board may have ordered.

V.—The Managers may appoint from time to time Committees from amongst themselves to attend to any special duties.

(1) As a rule such Committees shall consist of not less than three, and not less than two shall be considered a quorum to act.

(2) These Committees, for the sake of regularity and for future reference, shall as a rule report to the Board in writing.

VI.—The stated meetings of the Board shall be held on the last Friday of each month, at such hours as the Board may from time to time appoint.

VII.—The Matron and Housekeeper shall hold their offices at the pleasure of the Board.

(1) They shall do all in their power to promote the comfort of the inmates of the Home and shall follow the instructions of the Executive Committee for the week, and of the medical staff when orders are given.

(2) The Matron shall keep a book for entering all such things as she may consider necessary for the use of the Home, and submit it to the Executive Committee. When disbursements are ordered, a regular account of the same shall be kept for the information of the Managers and the Treasurer.

VIII.—The Managers deeming the point of admission of inmates into the Home to be a very important matter, decided that the following formalities shall regularly be observed :

(1) Applicants for admission into the Home are to state how long they have resided in the city, their residence, age, disease, and circumstances, also whether he or she has been attended by any medical man and whether any clergyman has visited.

(2) Thereafter two of the Managers shall visit the residence named (two ladies if the applicant be a woman, two gentlemen if the applicant be a man). They shall look at the surroundings of the applicant, ascertain what can be practically known of the person's circumstances, habits and general character ; in short, get all the available information about the case.

(3) They shall see the clergyman and the doctor, if either have been in attendance, hear what each has to say about the applicant, and report to the Board of Managers.

(4) That two of the medical staff of the Home shall visit each applicant for admission, and report to the Board of Managers the character of the disease, and if incurable ; and from any applicant outside of Toronto, the equivalent testimonials shall be required.

(5) Each application for admission to the Home shall be presented at the regular meeting of the Board, and if entertained, after due investigation, shall be acted upon at the following regular meeting of the Board.

(6) But application for consumption and cancer cases made at a weekly meeting may be acted upon at the next following meeting,

(7) If, after the name of an applicant has in due course been approved by the Board, a considerable time should elapse before the occurrence of a vacancy, and there is reason to apprehend that such a patient is at, or near, the point of death, then the resident medical officer shall be directed to visit the case and report to the Board as to the advisability under the circumstances of removing the patient to the Home.

(8) All the inmates of the Home must distinctly understand that an admission confers no right of permanent residence in the Home, and at any time the Managers have the power of dismissing an inmate for what they may deem a sufficient cause; of its sufficiency the Managers are to be the sole judges.

(9) Any inmate who shall leave the Home without consent of the Directors, thereby forfeits all claims for residence within it, and will not be re-admitted.

IX.—No person shall be admitted as a free patient into the Home until he or she shall have first executed such an instrument as may from time to time be approved by the Board, providing for the disposition of his or her property then owned, or which may subsequently be acquired by him or her, for the benefit of the Home.

X.—Any applicant from Toronto for admission to the Home as free patient must have resided in the city at least one year immediately preceding the presentation of the application, it being understood that this period shall be exclusive of any time spent in any charitable institution in Toronto.

XI.—The Board of Management shall appoint an Executive Committee consisting of three Directors, the Treasurer and four members of the Board, whose duty shall be to meet on Wednesday of each week, at three o'clock, p.m. (except during the week of the regular monthly meeting) and shall have charge of all matters pertaining to the internal economy of the Home. The Secretary of the Board shall be Secretary of this Committee, and the visitors for the week outgoing and incoming shall be *ex officio* members thereof. The minutes of each weekly meeting of the Executive Committee shall be

reported to the monthly meeting of the Board. Three members of the Committee shall form a quorum.

XII.—That two lady members of the Board shall visit the Home each week in their turn, who shall be known as the Weekly Visitors. Their duties shall be to inspect the Home and advise with the Matron on such matters as require attention. The Secretary or Assistant Secretary shall notify the visitors by post card the week before their week for visiting.

HOME RULES.

Visiting days : Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 2 till 5.

I.—No person shall be admitted to the Home for Incurables until the Board is satisfied as to his or her character and respectability.

II.—The inmates must at all times show proper respect to the Managers and Matron, and a strict regard for the rules and regulations of the Institution. They are also urged to cultivate kind and cheerful dispositions, thereby making a happy Christian Home.

III.—Those inmates who are able will be required to keep their own rooms in order, and to assist in such other domestic duties as they are able to perform.

IV.—All such inmates as are able to leave their rooms are requested to take their meals at the general table, and for sanitary reasons none will be allowed to carry food or drinks to their rooms ; good manners and cleanly habits are particularly requested at table.

V.—All who are able are expected to attend morning prayers, prayer-meeting and Sunday services at the hours appointed.

VI.—Inmates shall not leave the premises without the consent of the Matron. Any inmate wishing to be absent for more than one day must obtain the consent of the Board.

VII.—Male inmates shall not be allowed in the rooms



occupied by females, nor female patients in those occupied by males, unless in special cases.

VIII.—Inmates desiring to make a request or complaint shall inform the Matron, who will thereupon bring the request or complaint before the Weekly Board.

IX.—The inmates shall not receive wines or spirits or other stimulants without the knowledge of the Matron.

X.—The inmates may be visited by their friends on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays in each week, between the hours of two and five o'clock. No visits at any other time except in special cases.

XI.—Should an inmate become dissatisfied or unhappy, he or she is at liberty to leave the Home, taking with them only such articles as they brought to the Home

XII.—If any inmates shall not conform to the rules of the Home, or behave rudely or improperly, such inmate may be discharged by the Weekly Committee at their first meeting after the insubordination has been duly investigated.

XIII.—That every parcel for an inmate shall be submitted to the inspection of the Matron before received by the inmate, and that every person bringing a gift for an inmate shall submit it for inspection. That hereafter any patient guilty of drunkenness shall be reprimanded by the President of this Board, and on the second offence shall be dismissed from the Home. That any person visiting friends within this Home, and secretly conveying intoxicating drinks, shall not again be granted admission to the Home.

Inadmissible Applicants.

MEMORANDUM

**For the guidance of Members of the Medical Staff and Visitors
adopted at a General Meeting of the Board of
Management held 27th May, 1881.**

THE FOLLOWING CLASSES OF APPLICANTS ARE
NOT ADMISSIBLE :

1. Anyone who has not actual incurable disease, which prevents the person from earning a livelihood.
2. No one merely infirm from old age or from debility.
3. No one merely blind.
4. No one whose disease is venereal in its origin.
5. No one suffering from mere functional disease.
6. No one suffering from epilepsy.
7. No insane persons.
8. No one under seventeen years of age.

TWENTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
Toronto Home for Incurables
FOR THE YEAR ENDING FEBRUARY 28, 1899.

A quarter of a century seems to be a lengthy period to which to turn our thoughts and to feel that through all the vicissitudes and changes of the years, success still attends any particular enterprise. Therefore in presenting our Twenty-fifth Annual Report we acknowledge in true thankfulness that it is to the "Father in whom is no variableness, nor shadow of turning," that we owe the success and firm establishment of this Home for Incurables.

When the Home was first suggested in 1874 by a few ladies and gentlemen whose sympathies had been awakened to the urgent need of such a place, where the misery and discomfort of some lives might be lessened, there was no idea that the work would reach its present dimensions. Since, however, even the cup of cold water given in the name of Christ is blessed, so have the faithful and untiring efforts of the members of this organization received

their reward in the large number of sufferers who have been alleviated and made comfortable.

We rejoice that some of our membership have been spared during all these twenty-five years, who have given time and strength to the difficult task of collecting subscriptions and managing the many details of an institution.

Others, whose interests were wound up with the early days of the Home have heard the "Well done," accorded to faithful service, and although their bodily presence is no longer with us, the memory of their untiring devotion still remains as an incentive and restful remembrance to those who are striving to follow in their footsteps.

The year just closed has passed in the ordinary routine without undue incident or accident of any kind.

There have been 42 patients admitted, 30 have died, 3 have improved sufficiently to live with friends, and 2 have been dismissed. On March the 1st, the Home was filled to its utmost capacity, there being 131 patients, the largest number ever on the daily register at one time.

These for the most part have been exceedingly helpless creatures, suffering acutely and requiring constant attention, and when we think of the irritability and nervousness of disease and its effect upon the mind of the patient, we can hardly realize the patience, self-restraint and arduous work entailed upon our conscientious head nurse and her assistants.

For twenty years we have been privileged to retain

the faithful service of our Superintendent Mrs. Craigie, who by her executive ability and personal interest in her work has ably assisted the Board in their efforts to continue and extend the usefulness of the Home.

Outsiders cannot realize the difficulties there are to contend with in a many-sided work of this nature, and the sympathy and co-operation with the officials of all who are interested in the patients would materially lessen their burden.

We are also glad to acknowledge our appreciation of the services of the Medical Staff of the Home who from their busy lives find time and sympathy to devote to the benefit of the patients.

The resident physician, Dr. Mitchell, has proved to be satisfactory alike to the Board and the patients, and has endeavored conscientiously to fulfil his many duties.

There are various improvements in the way of separate buildings for nurses and certain classes of patients for which we have seen the necessity for some time, but as the available funds do not more than meet expenses, we must defer the execution of any plans until greater liberality on the part of the public shall enable us to proceed.

The amount received for maintenance has been \$11,748.17, the expenditure \$16,198.73, showing that we are much in arrears and were it not for a surplus of \$6,267.67 from last year we could not have met our indebtedness. Expenditure has increased because of the exceedingly helpless class of patients now admitted.

We can assure the public, that we endeavor to practise strict economy in every department, as an examination of our Treasurer's statement will show.

It would be remiss not to acknowledge the continuance of the Government and City grants, and the subscriptions from the public. The Home could not exist without these sources of income, and although newer charities may engage attention as time goes and necessity arises, still we hope that the "Home for Incurables" may have more and more sympathy and interest extended to it and when twenty-five years more may have rolled over it and its jubilee year shall have been reached, that its foundation will still be found unassailable, and its usefulness extended through the advancing knowledge of the age.

25th ANNUAL MEDICAL REPORT

For the Year ending March 1st, 1899.

To the President and Members of the Toronto Home for Incurables :

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—It is my privilege to present to you the Report of the Medical Staff at this your Twenty-fifth Annual Meeting.

Success in an Institution of this kind is different from that of almost any other organization designed to help unfortunate humanity. The success of your great charity is measured by the number of those whom you befriend and the skill and care with which their afflictions are ameliorated, and new troubles are warded off.

Judged by any of those standards you are to be congratulated on your prosperous year. In the number of inmates there is nothing to be desired, as during the past year, it has been found necessary to refuse admission from want of accommodation, and now the space is almost all occupied.

The work of the physicians in the care of the sick has been most effectively seconded by a competent house staff; while the relative infrequency of acute disease—less, I believe than in an equal number of robust people in their own homes—speaks loudly in praise of the hygienic surroundings of the inmates.

Success is not meant to encourage glorification or indolence, but those who use it best make it a stimulus to hope and further effort.

Great as has been the progress of this Institution, there are other things to work for.

It has long been felt by the Medical Staff that other and better quarters should be provided for the Consumptives of this Home. They are always a numerous class, 20 per cent. of the deaths for the past year being the result of this disease.

Improved conditions are desirable for these unfortunates, and their segregation is demanded in the interest of their associates. Another building for their healthful and separate housing is greatly to be desired.

The nursing department is the one with which the physicians come into most intimate relation, and it is of vital interest to the Institution.

The Staff appreciates very much the efforts of this department, and commend it to your kindly consideration. The comfort of the nurses and the accommodation of the Home would alike be increased by providing a Nurses' Residence. This and the number of nurses employed are matters for your earnest thought.

Insane, delirious and other inmates distressingly ill, are frequently a cause of disturbance to a whole ward or flat. A suitable place where such could be properly placed and cared for is desirable.

The Medical Staff find in Mrs. Craigie a constant friend, in sympathy with their aims, and of great service in their work. We wish to express our appreciation of the energy and resource of Dr. Mitchell, the constant consideration and tact of your Secretary, Miss Martin, and of

the indefatigable care and kindness of Miss McTavish, and her staff of nurses, young ladies whose patience and skill we value often when we do not speak our praise.

The number of inmates is now 131. During the year there have been 42 admissions, 3 left the Home, 2 were dismissed.

Since the last Medical Report there have been 30 deaths, only 4 of which were due to acute disease, and in those cases precedent chronic disease was a prominent factor.

There is appended fuller statistics regarding the diseases of those admitted during the year, and the causes of death of those deceased:

This meeting of the friends of this Home also desire to assure Dr. Parsons of their sincere sympathy with him in his present illness, and their earnest hope that, in God's good providence, he may be restored to do good service in carrying on our great Master's work in this suffering world, and also that he be appointed an honorary member of the Board.”

“ That the thanks of the Board are hereby tendered to Miss Martin, the Secretary, Miss J. Mortimer Clark, Assistant Secretary, and also to Mrs. Hugh McMath, the Treasurer, for their valuable services to the institution during the past year.”

Moved by Rev. Canon Sweeney, seconded by Rev. R. C. Tibb :

“ The Board desire to express their deep appreciation of the interest taken by the Medical Staff in all matters pertaining to the Home, and thank them for their continued great assistance in the care of the inmates.”

Rev. R. P. McKay addressed the meeting in a practical and inspiring manner, the following being an extract from his remarks :

“ In past years it was my privilege frequently to visit this Home and often to conduct religious services in this Hall. Rarely did I preach to a more sympathetic audience. Afflictions prepare us for messages of consolation and peace from the Word of Life. But it must be said that all in the Home are not of that sympathetic type. Many lived here for years

without the knowledge of true peace, without even a grateful appreciation of kindnesses shown them in the Home, that are entirely gratuitous so far they are concerned, and for which they pay nothing. It is well known that a large number who are received were in poor circumstances and distressing conditions before they came here. When admitted, and for some time after, they enjoy the warmth and cleanliness, the comfortable beds and kind ministrations. Everything seems too good—beyond their deserts. By and-by, however, they begin to feel the restraints of law and discipline to be irksome. To that they were not accustomed—it is indeed the want of self restraint and discipline that sent many of them here—and they become dissatisfied. They find fault with everything from the Board of Directors down to the officers in the kitchen. Nothing pleases, everything is wrong. These complaints are freely expressed to all who will lend a listening ear, and there are many visitors who are naturally sympathetic and unsuspecting, who do listen and believe, and go away and give circulation to these false reports. The impression thus gets abroad that instead of being a comfortable, well-administered Home, all sorts of privations are endured by the patients, and cruelties inflicted upon them. This is not, of course, the fault of the Home, it is the fault of the visitors, and yet much injustice has been done in that way and possibly practical sympathy and help have been estranged. There are, however, let it be said, many patients of a different type. Their very faces testify to their happiness. They are always rejoicing, although in bodily suffering, tried as by fire. To them it is a real Home, and it is a real pleasure to minister to such.

“Notwithstanding these and other discomforts sure to arise in connection with this, as with all other good works, the Board and Matron and all concerned are to be congratulated on the success of the Institution—in fulfilling its purpose—smoothing the way for such as cannot care for themselves. ‘Inasmuch as ye have done it to the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me.’”

The benediction was then pronounced by Rev. Chas. Ingles.
