Information having been received that Susan Ear, formerly an inmate of the McDougall Orphanage, was not to be married, as had been expected, the Supply Committee asked if, under the circumstances, a household outfit should be given. The majority of votes were adverse.

Another letter from Rev. S. Huntingdon, regarding the removal of a band of the White Fish Lake Indians, and the building of a school for them, and asking that the \$250 appropriated by the Board, but "left in the hands of the Executive Committee until further information is received," be given, was sent to the members of the Executive. The majority were in favor of giving the grant.

Arrangements having been made by the Board for the payment this year of only one-half the sum appropriated for the building of the Home at Chilliwhack, and no provision having been made for the balance, it was unanimously decided to pay this from our own treasury, and thus save the interest.

In February a letter was received from Japan, asking that, on account of changed circumstances, the request for a dressmaker be held in abeyance. Mrs. Large recommended that two ladies be sent to Japan, who shall for six months devote their time especially to the study of the language, assisting in other ways as they could. Meantime an offer had been made to pay the travelling expenses of two ladies, if sent to Japan this summer. A letter was sent to the Executive asking if approval would be given to the transfer of the money appropriated for a dressmaker to the payment of the salaries of these two ladies. A majority vote was given in favor.

A copy of the temporary agreement entered into between our Ladies' Council in Japan and the native gentlemen—founders of the Girls' School in Kofu—was sent to members of the Executive, and it received their confirmation.

## DECISIONS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING.

HELD IN THE METROPOLITAN CHURCH, MAY 15TH, 1889.

Present—Mesdames Gooderham (*President*), Strachan (*Cor. Sec.*), Ross, Rosebrugh, Briggs, Burns, Cunningham and Willmott (*Rec. Sec.*).

Interim minutes were read by Mrs. Strachan, and confirmed.

The following communication from the French Educational Committee, in Montreal: "That, in the opinion of this Committee, it is not expedient, for the present, to duplicate the cost of management, educational and domestic, in our French Educational Work by maintaining both the Montreal and Actonvale Institutes. And that, for this and other reasons, we respectfully recommend the Board of Managers of the Woman's Missionary Society to consolidate the work for the present in Montreal." On motion, the recommendation of the Committee was confirmed, and the following passed: "That the French Educational Committee be authorized to correspond with missionaries and chairmen of districts in regard to the opening of mission day-schools in some of the French districts."

The estimated annual expenses of the French Institute were submitted—\$5,000—and it was decided that our Society should pay in proportion to the number of girls in the school.

A letter was read from Mrs. Large, in reference to the opening of a school in Kofu; also a communication from Kofu, addressed to the Woman's Missionary Society Council in Japan, on the same subject. The Board having authorized the opening of the school, Miss Wintemute had been chosen for that important work, but she would require an assistant. It was decided to send another lady to Kofu. It was also decided to accept Miss Hart, of Lockport, N.S., and Miss Blackmore, of Truro, N.S., for the work in Japan.

A letter was read from Mr. Tate, of Chilliwhack, stating the need of \$1,000 more to complete the building, fence lot, etc. On motion, this sum was granted.

The Corresponding Secretary was instructed to write to Mr. McDougall, and ask to whom the deed of the property is made.

Mrs. Burns and Mrs. Cunningham were appointed a committee to apply to the Minister of Indian Affairs for a grant from the Government for the Chilliwhack Home.

Kind greetings were presented from the Canadian Woman's Board of Missions by Mrs. E. R. Greene.

A letter was read from the Secretary of the Presbyterian Woman's Foreign Missionary Society (Western Section), Mrs. A. F. Robinson, conveying the kind greetings and hearty good wishes of that Society.

Very satisfactory and encouraging reports were received from Mrs. Large, of our School in Tokyo; from Miss Cunningham, of the School in Shidzuoka; from Miss Lund, of the Evangelistic Work, chiefly in Tokyo; from Miss Wintemute, of the School in Kofu; from Miss Knight, of the Crosby Home, Port Simpson; from Rev. C. M. Tate and Miss Elderkin, of the Home at Chilliwhack; from Miss Leake, of the Chinese Rescue Home, in Victoria, B.C.; and from Mr. Youmans, of the McDougall Orphanage.

The financial statement of the Orphanage, furnished by Mr. McDougall, not being very explicit, it was decided to make the usual appropriation, but to allow it to remain in the hands of the Executive until a detailed statement of receipts and expenditure is received.

The report of the Publication and Leaflet Committee, sent by Miss Wilkes, was read by Mrs. Strachan, and the following resolution carried unanimously: "That this Board desires to express its appreciation of the patient care and labor given by Miss Wilkes, at the cost of much time and thought, to the interests of the Leaflet and Publication department of our work."

The report of the Supply Committee was read by Mrs. Briggs.

The report of the French Work was presented by Mrs. W. I.

Shaw, and the financial statement read by Mrs. Torrance.

On motion, the following resolutions were carried unanimously:—
"That an expression of the cordial thanks of the Board of Management of the Woman's Missionary Society be sent to the Rev. C. M. Tate, of Chilliwhack, for the thought, time and labor which he has bestowed in connection with the erection of our Home and School for

Indian Children. We appreciate very highly the interest taken by himself and Mrs. Tate in the management of this new branch of work; and we hope that, as they will now be free from the care that has rested upon them for the past two years, they may have increased blessing in their general missionary work, and have the satisfaction of seeing our ladies well established and successfully carrying out the designs of the institution."

"That this Board of Managers of the Woman's Missionary Society desires to express its hearty thanks to the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church for the favor of allowing Rev. C. M. Tate to spend so much time in the superintendence of the erection of our Home and School for Indian Children, at Chilliwhack, B.C. It is hoped that this institution, without being a further tax on him, will prove a great blessing to the mission station of which he has charge."

The following are some of the questions which were answered by a committee appointed for that purpose, composed of Mesdames Burns, Whiston, T. G. Williams, Willmott, and Miss Palmer:—

Have Auxiliaries formed during the year a right to send a delegate

to the Branch Annual Meeting? Ans. Yes.

Must Organizers be elected to the Branch Annual Meeting by their Auxiliaries? Not necessarily.

Should not Organizers be members of the Branch Meeting by virtue of their office? No such provision is made by the Constitution.

Mrs. Parker read a short report of her work as editress of the Woman's Missionary Society department of the *Outlook*, which told of a large increase in its circulation, and urged the members to increased diligence in securing new subscribers.

Various memorials and letters were received and referred to the appropriate committee, which subsequently reported as follows:—

#### MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

1. From Goderich, asking that the place of meeting of the General Board be more central. The Committee recommend that this be not entertained. Carried.

2. The Rattenbury Street, Clinton, Auxiliary, having given the necessary notice, asks "That the Constitution be so amended that the editress of the Woman's Missionary Society department of the Outlook shall be, by virtue of her office, a member of the Board of Management." The Committee recommend that this be entertained. Carried.

3. From the Western Branch, "That, as we understand the buildings of the Crosby Girls' Home are in a dilapidated condition, we would recommend that the question of new buildings be considered by the Board of Managers." The Committee recommend that this be entertained. After some discussion, the recommendation of the Committee was carried; also "that the question of erecting new buildings at Port Simpson for the Crosby Girls' Home be laid over until further

4. Belleville (Bridge Street) Auxiliary, having given the necessary notice, asks, that Sec. I., Art. V., Constitution, Woman's Missionary Society, be amended to read thus: "The management and general administration of the affairs of the Society shall be vested in a Board of Managers, consisting of the officers of the Board, the President and Corresponding Secretary of each Branch, and delegates from each Branch in the proportion of one to every two hundred," etc. The Committee recommend that this be entertained. Carried.

5. From St. Thomas First Auxiliary, asking the General Board to so amend the Constitution that at the election of delegates from the Annual Branch Meeting to the General Board, not more than one delegate be sent from any Auxiliary, and in cities, not more than one be sent from every two Auxiliaries. The Committee recommend that it be left to each Branch to make its own by-laws. Carried.

6. From St. Thomas First Auxiliary, asking that certificates of membership may be granted to annual members of any Auxiliary who may be changing their place of residence, which shall constitute them members of the Auxiliary in the place to which they remove. The Committee recommend that this be entertained and made a by-law. Carried.

7. From Queen Street, Toronto, Auxiliary, asking that the editresses of the Woman's Missionary Society department of the Guardian and Outlook be recognized as officers of the Board of Management, and have seats on the Executive Committee. The Committee recommend that, inasmuch as election to these offices does not constitute them officers of the Board, as contained in Art. V., Sec. 2, this be not entertained. Carried.

8. From the Central Branch, asking that By-law No. 8 of Auxiliaries be made to explain itself more clearly by the insertion of the word "Executive" before the word "Committee"; also in Art. V., the insertion after the word "officers" of the words "shall constitute an executive committee who" shall, etc. The Committee recommend that this be entertained. Carried.

9. From New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Branch, recommending a change in the Constitution, to provide for the addition of a Mission Band Corresponding Secretary. No notice of this having been given, the Committee recommend that it be not entertained. Carried.

10. In regard to letters received from Rev. Mr. Bond and Mr. Walker, requesting a grant for the Methodist Orphanage in Newfoundland, the Committee recommend that this be entertained, and referred to the favorable consideration of the Committee on Appropriations. Carried.

11. With reference to letters received from Rev. J. E. Roy and

Rev. M. E. Wilson, asking that a school be opened in a French district near Bridgewater, the Committee recommend that the advice of the Chairman of the District be asked, and action taken accordingly. Carried. It was afterwards decided that the Executive Committee interview the Minister of Education as to the possibility of having a school established there to meet this want.

12. From Western Branch, asking an increased grant to be made to the French Work; and from Western and Central Branches, asking that in response to the request of the Rev. A. P. Jourdan, French Missionary, a boarding-school be established at Roxton Pond, Que. The Committee asks that this be referred to the French Educational Committee. Carried.

The following reply was received from that Committee :--

"Resolved, That in the matter of the application of Rev. A. P. Jourdan, for the establishment of a boarding school at Roxton Pond, we hereby re-affirm the resolution passed by the French Educational Committee of the Woman's Missionary Society, to the effect that we cannot entertain such a proposal until the Institute at Côte Ste. Antoine is fully occupied, and the funds authorize such further extension. But that, in the meantime, we will do what we can in the maintenance of day schools as tributary to the Institute."

On motion, this resolution was confirmed.

The Committee on Missionary Candidates recommended—

1st. That No. 1, Miss Clarke, of Pownall, P.E.I., be appointed to the Chilliwhack Home. Carried.

2nd. Owing to the fact that No. 2 does not possess a teacher's certificate, and that Mrs. Large recommends that only those holding certificates be sent to Japan, we deem it unwise to accept this lady. Carried.

3rd. That No. 3 be accepted as a reserve missionary, to be em-

ployed by the Executive Committee if necessary. Carried.

4th. That, in order to secure proper knowledge, it is recommended that a form of medical certificate of health be required by this Society, to be sent to, and properly filled and signed by, all candidates for any field or department of our work; and this Committee having examined the form of certificate used by the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church, United States, recommend its adoption. Carried.

The Committee on Modes of Work recommend-

1st. That the tract "Mrs. Pickett's Missionary Box" be made free, and furnished to Organizers. Carried.

2nd. That, as requested by the Western Branch, the letters from missionaries be printed all the year round, to meet the wants of country Auxiliaries. Carried.

3rd. That the prayer cards be so arranged as to suggest the advisof making a study of the places and branches of work indicated as subject mittee.

1st. That, in response to the requests from the Queen Street (Toronto) Auxiliary and from Woodstock Auxiliary for more space in the Guardian and Outlook, Dr. Dewart and Dr. Sutherland be communicated with, conveying this request. Carried.

2nd. That the Corresponding Secretary's report be condensed, and

issued in leaflet form. Carried.

3rd. That, with the missionary letter, occasional children's letters be written to juvenile Bands. Carried.

4th. That 10,000 copies of "Our Work," revised to date, and 5,000 copies of the leaflet, "Ten Reasons," etc., be issued for distribu-

tion. Carried. 5th. That a committee be appointed to consider and report to the next Annual Board Meeting upon the advisability of establishing a paper of our own, and to supply definite information as to expense, size, style, subscription price, probable income from advertisements, and cost of mailing sheets. Carried. The following committee was appointed: Mrs. McKay, Mrs. Parker and Miss Wilkes.

6th. That application be made for a column of suitable matter in French in Pleasant Hours, and that the Sunbeam be printed in French, provided the question of expense can be arranged. It was stated that Dr. Withrow is already considering the matter of French

literature, and action on this was deferred.

7th. That 5,000 copies of the monthly letter be printed for dis-

tribution to absent members. Carried.

8th. That, instead of sending leaflets monthly to the Auxiliaries, Miss Wilkes be requested to take charge of the leaflets, having a printed list of all in stock, which can be had by order from any Auxiliary. Carried.

9th. That the cordial thanks of this Board are due and hereby presented to the Standing Committee on Publication. Carried by a

standing vote.

On motion, it was decided that the Publication Committee should

be composed of ladies residing in the same locality.

It was moved that each Branch appoint one lady resident in Toronto to represent it on the Publication Committee. Amendment, that the Publication Committee be composed of ladies residing in the Eastern Provinces. Some objection was offered by the Eastern ladies, and the amendment was withdrawn. The following ladies were appointed: For Western Branch, Mrs. D. G. Sutherland; Central, Miss Wilkes; Eastern, Mrs. Parker; New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, Mrs. McKay; Nova Scotia, Mrs. Willmott.

A set of the new books for Auxiliary officers, prepared by the committee appointed at last Annual Meeting, was shown. Question

The Committee on Annual Report recommended some changes— 1st. That, in order to condense, the names of Auxiliary officers be placed first in the list of members, with name of office in abbreviations.

2nd. That members contributing over \$1.00 have the amount entered opposite their names.

3rd. That reports of Auxiliaries be limited to five lines.

4th. That the totals of all reports be given in the schedules.

5th. That the schedules for Annual Report be revised.

These were carried, and Mrs. Burns and Mrs. Detlor appointed to revise the schedules.

Resolved, That when any change of Constitution is requested, notice of such change shall be published in the Guardian, Wesleyan and Outlook, not later than the middle of September preceding the Annual Meeting, and that this be considered sufficient notice to the Branches.

Resolved, That a committee be appointed to revise our whole Constitution, all proposed changes to be published in the Outlook of next September, for the consideration of Branch Annual Meetings. The following Committee was appointed: From Western Branch, Mrs. Burns; Central, Mrs. Willmott; Eastern, Mrs. W. E. Ross; Nova Scotia, Mrs. MacCoy; New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, Miss Palmer.

Resolved, That the following ladies, in Montreal, compose the French Educational Committee: Mesdames Dr. Nichol, Armstrong, Pitcher, T. G. Williams, Shaw, W. G. Brown, and Robins, with power to add to their number. And that this Committee be empowered to act as it thinks best in the opening of day-schools and the employment of Bible-women.

Resolved, That we request the Board of Directors of the French Institute to admit children at twelve years of age, and, in the case of Roman Catholic children, at an earlier age.

Resolved, That this Board desires to express its sincere appreciation of the time, thought and labor given by the French Educational Committee to that work in the interests of this Society, and which have resulted so satisfactory.

It was stated that Dr. Briggs had very kindly appropriated a corner of the stock-room in the new Book Room for the use of the Woman's Missionary Society, for which the Society expressed very sincere thanks.

The Committee on Appropriations presented the following report, which was considered item by item, and adopted:—

#### PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

I must congratulate the ladies of the Montreal Auxiliaries on their having this beautiful sanctuary in which to hold the Annual

Meeting of the Woman's Missionary Society.

I confess to a feeling of sadness to-day as I miss the kindly familiar faces of the Vice-President, through personal affliction, and the Presidents of the Central and Eastern Branches, from family and personal illness; I know that much prayer has been offered for them in it all, and I bespeak for them a continuance of your sympathy in whatever may be the issue, or God's will concerning them.

If one member suffer, all the members suffer with it; or one mem-

ber be honored, all the members rejoice with it.

"We share our mutual woes, Our mutual burdens bear; And often for each other flows The sympathizing tear."

Some of you will remember that the second Annual Meeting of this Society was held in this city. Many of the delegates know comparatively little of its early history. They may not have seen the report for that year, but the first supporters of the infant cau-e will naturally turn to the printed report for 1882-83, and recall the circumstances under which fourteen ladies met, reviewed the year's successes and discouragements, and planned for the future. I question if the most sanguine among us then dared to hope for the rapid progress which has been vouchsafed to us during the past six years.

I am thankful that modern methods of a questionable character have not been conspicuous in exciting an interest in or in obtaining money for this good cause. "Wisdom and knowledge shall be the stability of thy times," would be a fitting text for our guidance and conduct, and a more intelligent knowledge of the condition of the heathen world should be sufficient to deepen the interest of every

Christian woman in the missionary cause.

Various methods have been employed to secure the co-operation of all the women of the Church to work in behalf of their less favored sisters. In addition to individual efforts, much time and thought have been bestowed upon the selection and distribution of missionary literature. Very little was attempted in this way until 1884, when three ladies in Toronto, at our third annual meeting, offered five dollars each for this object. The results were so satisfactory that the printing of letters from our missionaries for the monthly meetings soon followed the circulation of the leaflets. About this time space in the Guardian and Outlook was secured for reports of the work. Representatives were appointed to bring the aims of the Society

before the Conferences, and thus many prejudices have been removed from the minds of the ministers as to the effect of this organization on the income of the parent Missionary Society, and other Church schemes for raising money or promoting the spirituality of its mem-

bership.

District Organizers are now pretty generally employed, with excellent results, and there can be no good reason why every woman in the Church should not join this sisterhood, and give her influence and prayers to promote its schemes. But, while we try to sum up some of its plans, who can calculate the silent influences which have been working? Who can estimate the results of the hour for prayer on Sabbath afternoon, when the women of two denominations are interceding for the blessing of Heaven upon each other, and upon the work of their hands, and upon all women?

In carrying out the decisions of the Board of Management, new obligations have been incurred. Instead of causing alarm, this should inspire feelings of thankfulness. May we never stand still while there remains so much to be done. That there may be constant progress, every new member must contribute her proportion of interest and influence to meet these new obligations, and enable us to still further extend the benefits of this new power wherever it is most

needed.

We have reason to rejoice that the new French Institute is now open, and we hope a great future of usefulness is before those who are appointed to carry forward its work. And if the committee of ladies to whom our part of this French work is entrusted have discovered providential openings, we shall hear of them in due time. No department of the mission field requires greater wisdom, or more prayer and patience, than this does.

The new school in Kofu, Japan, was opened some months ago. The most hopeful feature in our foreign missions is the fact that the co-operation of the people is secured in bearing a large proportion of the expenses, and that natives are gradually being employed in the

evangelistic work, as well as in the educational work.

A new Indian Home has been erected in Chilliwhack, and is occupied. We have now an Indian Home all our own. The Church has labored about sixty years among the aborigines of the Domini n, and many have been turned from their idols to serve the living God, and have become "new creatures in Christ Jesus." But a wide field of usefulness is open to the women of the Church, among the Indian girls, which no other agency can reach so well.

Perhaps no department, a year ago, was beset with so many difficulties and discouragements as the Chinese Mission, in Victoria, but a wonderful change has been wrought by the power of the Gospel, "which is the power of God unto salvation to every one that

The hope is now entertained that those who have been rescued. and sheltered in the Home, may eventually become chosen vessels to carry the message of salvation to some of their benighted sisters in their native land. The time has come when the value of woman's work on the mission field is being recognized. Dr. J. Hudson Taylor writes: "In the large and important province of Kiang-si, with fifteen millions of people, we have scarcely any male workers. Nothing has been more striking of late years, in missionary work, than the way in which God has blessed the work of the women in China. The Chinese are not afraid of them, they are not afraid that they are the pioneers of an army of conquest; and many who would be afraid to be on terms of intimacy with a male missionary, are very willing to let their wives and families be visited by our sisters, and making the excuse they must know what the women are being taught, they will go in and hear for themselves the Gospel message. I imagine that, perhaps, in this way, through lady workers, the men of some of the higher classes are to be won for Christ." In my address, six years ago, I alluded to what I thought was our duty to the Chinese on the Pacific Coast. The heathen Chinese girls neglected in the streets, and their mothers hidden away in the garrets and lanes of China Town, Victoria, appeal to the mothers and daughters of this Dominion. If we cannot send missionaries to China, we can do more than we are doing to Christianize those whom Providence has permitted to come to our very doors. Two dangers threaten every Christian life and enterprise, the danger of going where God does not lead us, thus wasting our time, strength and substance; another danger lies in failing to see, or in refusing to go, where He calls us, incurring the guilt of those whom the angel cursed bitterly, "because they went not up to the help of the Lord, to the help of the Lord against the mighty." Let us beware of these dangers, and, while we adhere closely to our commission, "Go disciple all nations," let us never lose sight of the promise, "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." We need the Divine presence at home just as much as our agents do on the mission-fields; without this there will be failure and disappointment. We need not fear about the numbers who are to fight this battle, "He can save by few or by many." We need have no fear about the income, "The earth is the Lord's, and the fulness thereof." Our faith and obedience will be the measure of our success.

The Woman's Missionary Society has been the means of awakening a deeper interest in the minds of the young people of the churches, on the subject of Christian missions. Many ladies, with praiseworthy perseverance, are devoting a large portion of their time in wisely directing this interesting and profitable department. Too much attention cannot be given to it, for from this class are we to derive the workers at home and abroad. Let us give them the encouragement they deserve.

Every one that is trying to do all things "heartily as to the Lord," must realize great satisfaction in that the Master accepts his offering, but those who are engaged in the special work of spreading the good news of salvation through a crucified Redeemer must have a deeper and more sacred joy.

In this Missionary Society, those who are in the battle face to face with

heathenism, and those at home, divide the spoil and rejoice together.

Their successes are ours, and we only regret that all the women of our Church are not eagerly desirous of having a share in the toil and in the triumph.

Our work, we believe, is expanding in a healthy way, and although growth is sometimes embarrassing, yet it is what we all desire, and is a cause for gratitude. The important thing is for us to adapt ourselves to it while directing and training as wisely as possible.

A few words concerning each department will be sufficient, as a full report

has been sent by those actually engaged in the work.

#### JAPAN.

Continued prosperity attends our school in Tokyo. Changes have arisen in the staff of teachers, owing to the opening up of new fields and the arrival of reinforcements, made available by special donations, but public favor has still been extended, and, more valued than all else, the presence and favor of the

Master have been realized in many ways.

You will rejoice to know that one assistant teacher and some of the pupils have been baptized. Several, it is believed, have been converted, and they have expressed a desire for baptism, but this has been delayed through the opposition of parents. Although there have not been as many confessing Christ for the first time as in the previous year, the majority being already in the fold, yet there has been much encouragement from the manifest growth in Christian character.

One discouraging feature of the work is that so frequently a bright promising girl is removed in order that she may be married; another is that the girls who wished to fit themselves for teaching, have withdrawn from our school to attend the Normal. Our ladies have felt so troubled over losing these girls and having them removed from Christian influences, that they have resolved to add a Normal school department, which will necessitate the employment of another teacher for certain branches, but which will be of immense advantage to the school in furnishing Christian native teachers, so difficult to obtain now.

There were eleven graduates in the Japanese course at the close of the year, and of these nine have returned, who would have been lost to the school but for the enlarged course of study adopted

the enlarged course of study adopted.

Again this year there is a gratifying surplus of native receipts over

expenditure.

Mrs. Large continues most efficiently to superintend the work, and it requires no ordinary ability and application to look after all the interests of an institution of this size.

All the ladies have devoted themselves untiringly to their various duties, but these being so numerous and constant, the coming of additional help has been much appreciated.

SHIDZUOKA.

In the city of Shidzuoka, as you are aware, a school building was erected by the Japanese themselves, who manage all the finances pretty much, except providing the salaries of the two Canadian ladies who are in charge. This building was formally opened November 4th, 1888, when a great deal of interest was manifested by some of the prominent people of the place. At the summer vacation there were fifty pupils in attendance, twenty-four of them being boarders. All the native teachers are now Christians, a most encouraging feature.

In this neighborhood there has arisen considerable opposition to Christianity, which no doubt has prevented the school from increasing in numbers as it might have done. It seems a foregone conclusion that if the pupils remain any time they will become Christians, and the Buddhists are arousing antagonism. In a town a few miles distant this has extended into persecution.

Let us not forget to pray that the hearts of the people may be turned to Christ, and that Miss Cunningham and Miss Morgan, our two faithful representatives, may be protected, directed and encouraged.

#### KOFU.

A new field of work has been opened to us during the year in the city of Kofu. It was the desire of the people, or at least some leading men, to found a school for girls, but they did not feel prepared to assume the whole cost. They have provided some small buildings, and hope to erect a more suitable one within two or three years.

The school opened in June with six pupils, three entering subsequently; but after the vacation it was expected there would be a number of boarders

and an increased attendance of day scholars.

Miss Wintemute cheerfully left the more attractive and congenial quarters in Tokyo to undertake this pioneer work in Kofu, without the society of an English friend, showing that our ladies are ready to practise self-denial for the cause of the Master. She is being joined this fall by Miss Preston, who will specially devote herself to the evangelistic work, but teaching sufficiently to secure a residence in the place.

#### EVANGELISTIC WORK.

In the superintending of this department Miss Lund has continued energetic and enthusiastic, instructing and directing the Bible-women, visiting in

the homes, helping in the Sabbath-school, etc. Nine Bible-women have been employed, and much good has been accomplished through their labors. Over eighteen hundred (1800) visits have been made, and hundreds have heard the sound of the Gospel. Forty-five people have requested baptism, and there have been several happy deaths.

A resolution of our Ladies' Council was sent to our Society, "That another lady be appointed to assist in the evangelistic work, or to relieve some one now in the school, so that Miss Lund may be set free to make evangelistic trips through the country, visiting the churches and the Bible-women in the field."

Since we have been able to strengthen our mission Miss Hargrave has been

designated for this position.

Having thus sketched these four divisions of our work in Japan, we return

to our own country.

### FRENCH WORK.

During the past year successful work was carried on in the girls' boarding-school at Actonvale; but, after a great deal of consideration, it was deemed wise by the ladies in Montreal, with the approval of several of the ministers, to concentrate all effort in the new French Institute just opened, conducting, in addition, some day-schools at advantageous points. Fuller information will doubtless be given in the report on the French work.

#### INDIAN WORK.

In the Crosby Home, at Port Simpson, B.C., there are twenty girls and four boys under the care of Miss Knight and Miss Hart, who have faithfully and earnestly discharged their duties, the former at times amid much suffering and weakness, having been apparently near death's door last winter.

The three elder girls are consistent followers of the Lord Jesus; three others also attend class. None of them being very communicative, it is a little difficult to ascertain their religious state, but if asked they would all probably say they loved Jesus. During the year one has gone to Mrs. Tate, in Chilliwhack, one has returned to her home, and another has been married.

A yearly grant is made from the Society to this Home and to the McDougall Orphanage at Morley, North-West Territory, the latter also receiving from the Government an annual appropriation. It is gratifying to learn that the income has not only met the expenditure, but has reduced the debt in some degree. In this institution there are twenty-four (24) children, eleven boys and thirteen girls, who are improving in their studies, and in the practical lessons of home and farm life. Owing to drought there has been a failure of crops, but the dairy produce has been excellent, five hundred pounds of butter having been made for the market. A small creamery has been built, making the crowded Home a little more comfortable.

#### CHILLIWHACK.

About eighty or ninety miles up the Fraser we reach the third Indian Home in which we are interested, and for which we are wholly responsible, having purchased the land, two and a quarter acres, and erected upon it a two-and-a-half story building, costing about \$3,600, apart from the furnishing. There is room for forty pupils; at present there are eighteen, some of whom have been converted, the most welcome reward coming thus early to Mr. and Mrs. Tate and Miss Elderkin, who have had a great deal of labor and care through this first year.

Several valuable donations were made to this Home from merchants in Toronto, but in addition to these the Executive has been obliged to exceed the

appropriation of last annual meeting by more than \$2,000, and over \$500 are still asked for to complete the building.

From the Treasurer's Report it will be seen that in the Indian department of our work the Society has spent, during the past year, nearly \$7,000.

#### CHINESE.

Our Home for Chinese girls in Victoria has been greatly favored during the year. "Showers of blessings" were granted, and all the six inmates were converted to God, becoming, indeed, "new creatures." Miss Leake writes of the wonderful contrast, and that every member of the missionary societies that had worked and prayed for that institution should be encouraged. Four have been rescued since spring, and one already, she believes, has received "the truth as it is in Jesus." One has been married, apparently very happily, so that there now remain nine girls.

Some very handsome and acceptable gifts have been made to the Home by visitors and others.

In looking over the whole field we have abundant cause for thanksgiving and redoubled diligence, as we stand at this dividing point gazing backward and forward. Surely He who hath been our help hitherto will still be with us, giving us all needed grace and wisdom, going before us, and making "the crooked places straight, and the rough places plain."

#### REPORT OF SUPPLY COMMITTEE.

This Committee, consisting of five members, viz.: Mrs. Dr. Williams, Mrs. J. B. Willmott, Mrs. Dr. Bull, Mrs. Tyner and Mrs. Briggs, have been unwearied in their efforts to supply all demands made upon them, and have been enabled, through the kindness of the members of Auxiliaries and Mission Bands, to send very substantial aid to a number of missions. The work done by the Lindsay, Milton, and Carlton Street Mission Bands is especially commendable, as they sent warm flannel dresses and underclothing, made by themselves, to different missions. Several times during the year we were delighted to recognize the interposition of Providence in sending us help just at the right time.

The following missions received supplies:— Norway House—A case from Charing Cross.

Parry Sound -Cases from Farmersville, Collingwood, and Carlton Street Mission Band.

St. Clair Mission—Cases from Queen's Avenue, London; Dungannon, Nile, and Spencerville, sent to the Saugeen Reserve.

Cape Croker—From Hamilton, and the Welland Avenue Mission Band, St. Catharines.

Crosby Home —Parcels, bales and boxes from Holmesville, Bowmanville, Bermuda Mission Band, Carlton Street, Milton, Lindsay, Picton and Foxboro' Mission Bands.

Miss Lawrence, Nanaimo, received a case from Toronto, prepared by Mrs. Dr. Bull.

The McDougall Orphanage received parcels and bales from Kingston Mission Band, Pickering, and Wellington Street, Brantford.

A large parcel of quilts was sent to Powassan, Nipissing District.

White Fish Lake—Received a case of Christmas gifts from the Queen Street Auxiliary, Toronto.

Battle River-Received a large case from the John Street Auxiliary, Hamilton.

Muskoka-Received bales from Perth and Newton Brook.

Mr. J. F. Guild, of Guilds, Ont., very generously sent five cases of dry goods, boots, hats, etc., and a large bag of prunes. The goods were equally divided between the Crosby Home, the Home at Chilliwhack, and the McDougall Orphanage—the latter also receiving the bag of prunes, which weighed 150 lbs.

The Chinese Home, B.C., was provided with a sewing machine, costing \$30, the money for which came from Mrs. McCoy, Halifax, \$2.00; "Gratitude," \$2.00; Bowmanville Sabbath-school, \$7.80; "A Friend," \$1.00; Cecilia Argue, Shawville, Que., \$5.00; Carlingford, \$1.00; Queen Street, \$6.00; Central Auxiliary, \$6.00.

The Home at Chilliwhack was also provided with a sewing machine, contributed to by "A Friend," \$5.00; Mrs. Lewis, Belleville, \$5.00; "B. B.," Nova Scotia, \$6.00; Mrs. Dr. Bull, Toronto, \$5.00; Berkeley Street, per Mrs. Dr. Ball, \$2.00; Bridge Street, Belleville, \$7.40. A case of goods was sent from Ridgetown.

## REPORT OF LITERATURE AND PUBLISHING COMMITTEE.

In presenting their Report, your Committee regret that although considerable individual effort has been made by each member, and, they trust, some good work done, yet, as the Committee could not meet during the year (its members being so scattered), and was never properly organized or a definite plan of work arranged, the Report, as a whole, is not so satisfactory or full as they could wish.

The duties of the Committee, as defined at last Annual Board Meeting, were to provide leaflets, uniform programmes, and other helps for monthly and public meetings. They have done what was possible under the circumstances to carry out these instructions, and, in spite of the difficulties under which they labored, have been fairly successful. It was decided in the early part of the year that each Branch be asked to furnish a stated number of programmes; that these programmes be published in the Outlook monthly, and that Mission Bands be strongly urged to make use of them at their monthly or public meetings. Eight or nine of these programmes were prepared and printed in the Outlook from time to time. To supply the demand for additional copies and to preserve them for future use, four (one on each of our fields) were printed in leaflet form and sold at a small price. The Japanese programme (of which an addition of 1,000 was issued) is entirely exhausted. Some of the others are still on hand, but will no doubt be used during the coming year. It was most gratifying to us to be assured by the reports from several Bands of the favor with which the programmes were received. A President of one Band writes: "I was so thankful to get them (the programmes), for I have such faith in sowing seeds of missionary information, and I believe they are, by God's blessing, a great power for good; and I am quite sure that the children and young people taught to use them properly will require nothing more novel or exciting to keep up a growing interest in missionary work."

The publication of leaflets was continued during the year as formerly; \$4,000 were issued and distributed monthly, as well as 10,000 on "Our Work," and an edition of 3,000 of a special leaflet on "The Duties of Auxiliary Officers," for the use of new Auxiliaries and organizers—in all 67,000 were printed during the year. Of the nine monthly leaflets sent cut, two were

ordered by the General Board ("The Corresponding Secretary's Report," and "Ten Reasons Why I should Belong to a Woman's Missionary Society"); four of the others were on our special fields of work—Japan, French, Indian and Chinese—and were prepared by ladies whose intimate knowledge of the subjects treated eminently qualified them for the task, and your Committee feel that they have reason to congratulate themselves on the result.

In accordance with the recommendation of the General Board, a supply of the best leaflets issued by other societies was held in stock during the year, for sale. For these leaflets over 125 orders were received and filled, amounting to about \$32. on the sale of which a considerable profit accrued to the fund. This department could, with judicious management, be largely increased, with much benefit, both to the Publishing Fund and to the Auxiliaries.

Six thousand prayer cards were issued, under instructions from the General Board, all of which have been distributed. We cannot but believe that "the Circle of Prayer" thus formed among our members has been instrumental in bringing down upon us many rich blessings. "More things are wrought by prayer than the world dreams of."

Your Committee are glad to be able to report a most generous and hearty response to the appeal made to Auxiliaries for contributions to the Literature Fund. Remittances were received from about 150 Auxiliaries and one Mission Band, in sums varying from thirty cents to \$6.70, and amounting in all to \$198. After paying for leaflets, prayer cards, postages, etc., there is still in the treasury the sum of \$13.95.

Over 500 personal letters and post cards were received and answered by the convener of the Committee during the year, and 2,421 mite boxes sent out. Thanks are due to the ladies who prepared, at much outlay of time and

labor, the Mission Band programmes, leaflets and prayer cards issued during the year.

Believing, as we do, that most of the apathy and indifference exhibited by our women arises from a lack of knowledge of the needs and possibilities of our work, no effort should be spared that will tend to their enlightenment; and what can accomplish this end better or more quickly than the wise and careful distribution of suitable literature?

# REPORT OF THE JAPAN WORK.

## THE TOKYO SCHOOL,

TOKYO EIWA JO GAKKO, September 10th, 1889.

DEAR MRS. STRACHAN,—It seems as the years pass by that the work increases, and there is less time for it to be done, in proportion as our ladies increase in number. Last year my annual work was all written with only the last words to add after the meeting of our council; this year I am just beginning when I should be ending; and now, because the time is so short, my letter must be short too.

I will begin, as usual, with the accounts. Our balance from school funds is little more than half what it was last year, partly from the fact that our attendance has not been so large, and, also, it has been steadier; again, we have had to pay much larger salaries to our teachers than formerly; it is a great satisfaction to us to have even this amount. The earthquake necessitated an expenditure of over fifty yen to repair the chimneys—the wash-out in the back yard took twice that sum, and next year's repairs must have another item of about three times the amount of the first, for damages done by the heavy rains when we were absent this summer. Our new building called for many new furnishings, also more light, but we saved in fuel. We have advertised pretty widely this summer. The past year has been one full of encouragement in our work; all the way has not been clear sunshine, but the clouds that came but made the sunshine all the brighter. Again a year has rolled away, and the Death Angel has not been permitted to come near us, both teachers and pupils have been spared from severe illness. Your missionaries here have all been permitted to carry on another year's work without one break; strength has been given for each day's duties.

We cannot report as many conversions as last year, because of the great ingathering last year, and the comparatively little change in the students in attendance; but we can truly say the Master has been in our midst, and strong, earnest, Christian characters have been growing—characters that must and will tell on the Lord's side when these girls go out from our school to take their places in the world. The little girls resolved to save some of their pocketmoney every week, and devote the savings to the Azabu church; between Easter and July they gathered eleven yen, which they gave to Mr. Hiraiwa. This collection was made at their own prayer-meeting each Sunday afternoon.

Our King's Daughters' Circles have done and are still doing a good work; they give fifteen minutes a day to work for charitable purposes; it is not much time, but a good deal in the school life of a Japanese girl.

Our religious services have been the same as reported last year. When the Azabu church is completed, we will attend service there morning and night,

but still have our own Sunday-school.

During the year there have been two breaks in our school staff, which all felt, because those who went out from us had been with us so long. When the call from Kofu came, Miss Wintemute was appointed to take up the work there The girls grieved over her departure very deeply; but they learned that there were sacrifices they could and must make for their sisters in this land, and that it is more blessed to give than to receive. Knowing the work in Kofu as they do, and how happy Miss Wintemute is in it, I think that if now they were given their choice of having Miss Wintemute back, and Kofu work given up, their unanimous decision would be for Kofu. Miss Mizuno found it necessary to give up her school work, partly because of ill health, and partly for family reasons. We felt as if part of our back-bone were being taken away, and dreaded the results of her leaving; but God was better to us than our fears, and while Miss Mizuno was missed, we realized again that the Lord's work must and will We had some difficulty in getting good Japanese teachers to keep up our staff during the latter half of the year, as the demand for teachers is much greater than the supply, and most teachers prefer to teach in government schools.

We have felt that it was necessary to add two years more to our Japanese course of study in our Tokyo school, in order to hold our students. This course enables those wishing to do so to obtain government teacher's certificates; this has necessitated the employment of additional teachers at even higher salaries than we have formerly paid. Until we prove to the public that we are doing good work, we cannot expect a very large attendance, so we must ask for an allowance to be made us for this year, in case we need it. We purpose to raise all our school fees from the beginning of the new year. We are encouraged to believe that the step we have taken is in the right direction, for nine of our graduates have returned to us to take up this course, and we would have had none of them. We are glad to have secured Miss Mizuno for an hour a day, for this course; she will take the Science of Education. I must not forget to speak of our Ontario readers, which we use in all our schools. They have been and are a help to our students in many ways. They are full of idiomatic English, the literature is such that our girls are realizing what is meant by that word, and are being stimulated to greater efforts in the attainment of English, that they may open wide for themselves the doors through which they are now but taking a peep. I seldom attend a class-meeting without hearing some one refer to encouragement received, or some lesson learned from her English reader, and what I hear there, I also hear from them in social conversation. We know these books are a help in our Christian work.

Our estimates for the year seem to have grown very rapidly; during the last year the work has taken new departures, and the reinforcements call for

larger expenditure.

We have found it better to have a committee on furnishings, and let the ladies hand in their list of articles required to said committee, who will purchase so far as funds will allow.

Would it not be well to state in the Report, and to all new ladies, that at first all letters from their friends, if sent to our address here, will reach them at once.

We have had put in an estimate for salaries of Japanese teachers, for our ladies, until now this has been included in one item—teachers' services—but as so much time is required now, it would hardly be fair to charge all to the school. We have to pay at the rate of five yen, per hour, a month, also we have separated our books required for study. What these shall be, and how many,

We thank you for the reinforcements sent, they bring to us many new ideas for our work. We feel that their coming is a strength and an encouragement. We are glad to have them in our Tokyo work, where we feel that at the present time we need to build up and strengthen if we are to keep our standing as a school.

Our thoughts will be with you during your annual gathering, and our prayers will go up, that you and we may be blessed, and that more, much

more, may be done for the Master, both there and here.

# REPORT OF SCHOOL IN SHIDZUOKA.

September 10th, 1889.

The Shidzuoka school re-opened September 10th, 1888, with forty-two pupils, seven of the married women who had previously attended having withdrawn.

Since then nineteen have entered the school, and some have left; a few on account of sickness, but the greater number to be married. We closed school July 10th, 1889, with fifty students, twenty-four of whom were boarders. The closing exercises consisted of singing, prayer by Mr. Kobayashi, a few addresses, and the giving of reports and certificates of standing to the pupils. The following day Miss Morgan, myself and the Japanese teachers were invited by the members of our School Board to dinner at the foreign restaurant. We spent a very pleasant evening, meeting for the first time some of the new members of the Board.

On the fourth of November, 1888, the new school building was formally opened. There were about two hundred visitors present, including the Governor and other officials, also Mr. Hiraiwa. The new building is convenient and

Our numbers have not increased as rapidly as we hoped, or indeed expected, they would. This, there is no doubt, is largely owing to the fact that the

school is so decidedly a Christian one.

People complain that such a strong religious influence is thrown round the girls that those who enter the school as boarders are almost certain to become Christians. At first there was little or no objection to Christianity. It was something Western, and there was such a craze for anything from the West.

Our Japanese minister was telling me some of the experiences of some ladies in a Tokyo school. Girls were brought to the school, and it was requested that they should be taught everything Western, but especially English, dancing and Christianity. The teachers could not make the parents understand why they would teach their daughters Christianity and not dancing. Both were from the West, and they had heard as much of the one as of the other.

I have written frequently about the good work which has been going on quietly during the past year. Miss Morgan and I went into the class-meeting every other Wednesday. For a few weeks before the holidays the meetings

were very interesting. One after another the girls would speak or pray. It is impossible to tell of the joy we felt when listening to them telling of their love for Christ, their faith in Him, and of how He helped them in their struggles. The greatest joy of the year was Miss Saito's decision for Christ. When she came to Shidzuoka she hated Christianity. At first she came to as few of the services as possible. Toward spring she began to attend regularly, and for more than a year she was seldom absent from church or class-meeting. I could not talk to her personally, except through an interpreter, and I was afraid she would resent that. For months I felt that the Spirit was striving with her. I dared not interfere. I could only pray, and I did pray. I do think it was the greatest desire of my life to have her and her influence for Christ. Never shall I forget the joy of the Sunday when Mr. Kobayashi told me that she had gone to him the evening before to ask for baptism.

In a little talk, which we had on the evening of that day, she told me how troubled she had been for a long time, and how glad she was now, although she knew that there was not one of her friends who would not be angry at the step she was taking. I asked her what her friend, Miss Kato, one of the teachers in the Normal School, would think of it. She said she dreaded telling her, she would be so angry, that she destested Christianity. We had a little talk about it, and I told her that we could pray for Miss Kato, and that I believed she would be a Christian yet. She answered, "I believe she will." The Normal School did not close for two weeks after ours, and in a letter received from Miss Saito, during the holidays, she told me that Miss Kato, before leaving Shidzuoka, had had a talk with Mr. Kobayashi, and had asked for baptism. I am so glad, for I know well what an influence for good she will have among the pupils.

The serious illness of Mrs. Inonye, who was such a help to me during my first year in Shidzucka, stopped for a time my work in the Normal School. My teacher, Mrs. Takase, felt diffident about interpreting there, but was quite willing to interpret the Bible lesson, if the girls would come to the school. I sent an invitation to them, which eighteen accepted. They attended the Bible-class from December 9th till April, when word was sent that they could not spare Sunday afternoons, as they were working so hard for their examination. When the examination was over I did not ask them to come back, as my Sundays were as full of work as I felt they ought to be, with the hot weather coming on.

Our Sunday services were, Sunday-school from 8.30 to 9.30 a.m. Miss Morgan has a Bible-lesson in English with our advanced class. I hear the ethers recite their Bible verses. Mrs. Takase hears the catechism, and then I speak, through her, for about fifteen minutes. After Sunday-school, all the pupils come with us to church. As yet there has been no unwillingness on the part of the pupils to attend church. In the afternoon I have a Bible lesson, from two to three, in the school, while Miss Morgan goes to a Sunday-school which she has opened in a village a few miles off. We have singing with the girls from 5 to 5.30 p.m., and also an evening service, which Miss Morgan and I take turns in leading.

In a few weeks a new agreement must be drawn out between us and the Spidzuoka people. While I do not think there is any danger of us not being able to come to terms, still there may be trouble, and I dread it. One does require so much wisdom and patience in dealing with a people so different from us in many respects. I do pray that we may be kept from mistakes.

While the past year has had quite as many troubles and discouragements as the year before, although of a different kind, yet it has been a year with a great deal of brightness in it. The Master has been nearer to me than ever before, and I have proved Him to be "a very present help in trouble." Miss Morgan, too, has been wonderfully sustained in her affliction. She has borne her loss so bravely. Her patience has been a lesson to me God has been with her in her trouble. No one could doubt that.

For some weeks before the holidays the girls had a prayer-meeting every day to ask God's blessing upon our school, and that the numbers might be increased. Ought we not to be encouraged, when we remember that our God is a God who hears and answers prayer?

Will you not pray that this year your missionaries may "be endued with

power from on high," for then only can we work successfully?

## REPORT OF KOFU SCHOOL.

It hardly seems necessary to send a report of the Kofu work this year, as the school was only opened about six weeks before the holidays, and as I have already written you everything of interest up to that date. But perhaps it would be well to re-state briefly the account of the beginning of our work here.

I left Tokyo about the middle of May, accompanied by an interpreter (a man) and a Japanese teacher, who is a graduate of our Tokyo school. The remaining half of the month was spent in getting unpacked and settled, in attending meetings of the Board of Directors to draw up the calendar and school rules, and in making other necessary preparations for the opening of school the first of June.

Six students were present the first day, and three more entered before the holidays; but although the numbers were small, the six weeks of teaching were very interesting and encouraging. All are in the first year of the preparatory course in English; in Japanese, three are in the academic course, and the rest are in the first year of the preparatory. It will be necessary to form another class in Japanese in September.

Japanese is taught in the morning, and English in the afternoon; and the daily half-hour Bible lesson comes out of the Japanese time under the head of moral science.

The students are very diligent and eager to learn, but one can hardly tell yet how much perseverance they have. As for ability, I think they will compare favorably with the same number of Japanese girls anywhere.

The Bible is new, interesting and wonderful to most of them; they listen to the lesson very attentively, and ask many questions, both in the class and at other times. Since the first week, all except two have attended Sabbath-school and morning service in the church quite regularly, although, being daily stu-

dents, they were not compelled to do so.

Some of them, at least, have already started in the right way to gain a knowledge of the truth, namely, the way of obedience to the truth as far as they know it; for Christ Himself has said, "If any man will do His will, he shall know of the doctrine, whether it be of God." I refer to the outward observance of the Sabbath. Being daily students, I had no control over their actions on Sunday; but some, who before had prepared their lessons, and worked on that day the same as on any other, gave up doing so after they heard the fourth commandment and had it explained to them. The father of two, the mother of one, and the brother of another are Christians; but the rest knew nothing whatever of Christianity before coming to the school.

I feel that there is great need of patience and wisdom in this new work, and I dare not, for fear of discouragement, let my mind dwell upon all that I

know should be done, or upon the much more that I do not know which the future probably has in store; but I look to Him who ever "giveth more grace" as it is needed, but not before.

The expense of running the school this year will be considerable, for the same staff of teachers is required for three classes, whether they contain fifty

students or only ten.

One teacher of Japanese, one of Chinese and Japanese writing, one of sewing, and one of translation, have been engaged for next year; also a school servant and a cook, the latter being the wife of the former. No matron could be found, and for a time, while the boarders are few, the Japanese teacher will do most of the matron's work in addition to her teaching. We hope to be able to secure a graduate of the Tokyo Normal School to teach the higher Japanese work; but it is hard to induce them to go to the country when there are so many situations available in Tokyo. In Kofu, especially, there are very few inducements to a Normal School graduate, in comparison with other places, but if we can secure one, it will, no doubt, increase the attendance considerably.

The building used for the school at present is a two-storied Japanese store, that opens off one of the principal streets. It has been connected by covered passage-ways with several small tenement houses in the garden behind it, and both have been repaired and altered to suitthe needs of a boarding school. The work is rather roughly done, and the furnishings are not all of the first quality; but we have been able to arrange the rooms much more conveniently than I had any hopes of at first, for they are of so many different shapes and kinds. The founders have promised to do all in their power to raise funds sufficient to put

up a new building within three years.

Boarders will enter in September, and the formal opening of the school will be as early in the fall as we can arrange for it. I am so glad that we shall be able to have a second lady here this year to do evangelistic work and to assist in the school.

The prejudice and ignorance of the people, who are not as advanced as those of most of the provinces, the active opposition of the Buddhists and others who hate Christianity, and the distrust that many here have in private schools where English is taught, on account of the failure and breaking up of such schools several times in the past, after subscriptions had been solicited for them-all these are things that we have had, and shall still have to work against.

Pray with us that the blessing of God may rest richly upon the work thus providentially opened up, and that the school may be a centre of light to all who come within its influence, and a source of strength to our mission work

throughout the whole of this province.

# REPORT OF EVANGELISTIC WORK.-JAPAN.

In commencing my annual letter to you, I think it will be well to tell something of the Bible-women's lives, attainments, and so forth, thus correct-

ing several mistaken impressions that seem to be extant at home.

The Bible-women are of various ages. They live (with the exception of one) in their homes, and go out from those homes to work among the women in their own neighborhood. They all have more or less Japanese education, while some have a considerable knowledge of Chinese, but none of them can speak, read or write any English.

be preferable to the printed one. Now these reports are written in Japanese, and must be translated before being sent home. Besides they, with the pastor's signature subscribed, are my guarantee that the Bible-women are earnestly pursuing their work from day to day, and of whether that work is a success or a failure. They also keep me informed of the work, and to me this is very important. Perhaps this misunderstanding of the nature and working of things can be best explained by sending you a copy of the rules and regulations under which the Bible-women work,

so I enclose one. The number of Bible-women engaged in our work is nine. Of these two are girls in the school. Their names are respectively, Ito O Kono San, who is preparing herself in both English and Japanese; and Shemada O Sato San, who studies Japanese in the morning and is engaged in evangelistic work three afternoons in the week. The names and addresses of the others are as follows:

(5) Mrs Hiyama, Ushigome, Tokyo. (4) Mrs. Sabashi, Azabu, Tokyo. (2) Mrs. Toyama, Shitaya, Tokyo. (1) Mrs. Inomata, Tsukiji, Tokyo.

(3) Mrs. Suzuki, Hammamatzu, Shidzuoka Ken. (2) Mrs. Neshioka, Shidzuoka, Shidzuoka Ken.

(1) Mrs. Sato, Mori, Shidzuoka Ken.

The number before each name indicates the year in which the Bible-

woman is now working. As the sum of two yen per month for the first year's salary left nothing for expenses incurred by the women in going to places comparatively distant, and the matter had come before me repeatedly, a meeting of the pastors under whose charge the Bible women are working, and myself was held last March.

At that meeting the Bible-woman's course of study was taken up and discussed also, and several changes made, some books being struck off the course and substituted by ones lately published, which, because simpler, were more suited to the purpose.

The change in the salaries, as you will see, is from two yen per month to three, and any increase is to be made, not yearly, but as circumstances show such

increase to be right and necessary. You will also see by referring to the rules that each Bible-woman is provided with the books necessary to carrying on her studies. The fact that they cannot afford to buy them renders this imperative.

Last year a considerable sum, twenty-four yen, was spent on papers. That amount we will not be able to increase this year unless an allowance for books and papers is granted us.

In the matter of estimates, the almost doubling of the amount asked for

last year is caused by the development of the work. On the eleventh of June an examination on the year's work was held. Reverends Toyama and Tsuchiya conducted it. As I have sent you both questions and results, I will simply add that those results were eminently satisfactory. The reports for the year show that over 1,800 visits were made, and that hundreds of people heard the sound of the Gospel. Forty-five people requested baptism, and many others have become deeply interested. In Tokyo meetings have been held in each of the different churches. During the first half of the year the attendance was large, but after the New Year it was considerably smaller. Though the numbers were smaller, the conversions were more numerous, and so our Father's hand was in it all.

The death of Suju Okawa, of Shitaya, a young girl of about sixteen years, did great good. Several persons were converted by her peaceful illness and triumphant death, while others were led to ask, "What made her so happy?" Who knows but that even that little seed may spring up and bear fruit after many days? I visited her several times, and always found the same cheerful, contented spirit.

One of the most helpful young ladies in the Ushigome church has also gone to her reward. She was only ill about three weeks, and died happily, leaving behind her this testimony on the hearts and lives of all who knew her as the result of her life, "She hath done what she could." Those of you who have known the inspiration of a face like hers will understand how I miss her.

Then in Azabu, Mrs. Takeda, the wife of one of our evangelists, has passed over the river. The Azabu woman's meeting was held in their house up to the time when she became ill; in fact, at the last one held there she was in bed in another room. It seemed to me that if any one had asked me whom I could least spare from Azabu and Ushigome, (outside the Bible women), I would have named those two. Yet the Master had need of them, and so each one was called home. We bow in submission and say, "Thy will be done!" knowing that some day we will know what is dark now.

This summer has been an unusually hard one on the Bible-women. Mrs. Hiyama was very poorly for about three months, Mrs. Inomata laid up for some weeks, and suffering yet from rheumatism, while Mrs. Toyama has been in the hospital for some time. All are getting better fast; and though these discouragements have come, we are looking forward to a glorious ingathering during this year. Two thoughts fill me with courage and surety of success, namely, "The battle is the Lord's," and "This is the victory that overcometh the world, even your faith." This year I shall (D.V.) go over our work twice, holding women's meetings. I am looking eagerly to the time when I shall make my first trip, for it is such a longed-for opportunity.

Some one has been sending me the Young Women's Christian Association magazine for two years, and I want to thank her and say that I enjoy reading it very much.

Praying that God may bless you abundantly, and asking your prayers that God may strengthen us physically, mentally and spiritually for the year's labor,

# REPORT ON FRENCH WORK.

The work of evangelizing the French youth during the past year, as pursued by your Committee, has many encouraging features. In the first place, its success has been so gratifying that, with your sanction, the agencies are being gradually extended and increased. The work itself is becoming more generally known among the French, and more highly appreciated by them as its results are seen; and by its means we trust the way may be opened for the work of future evangelists.

During the past year your Committee has endeavored to carry out the wishes of the Woman's Missionary Society as to the school at Actonvale. We have had as many as twenty-six pupils, the full number which the house can accommodate, and others were refused on that account. The work of the school was very encouraging, for, judging by the closing exercises, the time had been improved to the utmost, and some of the young women really had a very creditable standing in the higher branches of study.

Their spiritual interests also were well cared for by the pastor, Rev. Joseph Pinel, and by the teachers, Mrs. Roy and Miss Hall, whose faithful work cannot be too highly estimated, and through whose labors and prayers every soul in the house was converted during the year. Oh, that they all may stand fast in the Lord.

As the completion of the Institute drew nigh, it became necessary to consider what would be the best method of continuing the school work of the Woman's Missionary Society. The new scheme would naturally require very much larger outlay, especially at first, while the attendance might not be so great at first as subsequently. Should we, therefore, advise the Society to continue the Acton school, as well as the Institute, while a limited number only might be expected in each, and while a full staff of teachers must be maintained in each, thus doubling the cost of maintenance? This was a most difficult question, and needed much prayer and serious thought. Your Committee naturally felt a warm affection for Actonvale School, as it had been the place of such marked success in saving souls, and being situated in the midst of a comparatively Protestant French population, we were loth to recede from the foothold obtained there. But, on the other hand, if we continued there another year, we would be obliged to incur still further expense in refitting the building, which is the property of the Missionary Society, and occupied by us free of rent, on condition of keeping it in repair.

Our previous expenses averaged more than \$100.00 per annum for alterations and repairs; and as new floors were now needed, we hesitated before the additional expense, especially as, after all, the building is not well planned for continued use as a school, and at best would contain but a limited number.

On consideration of this serious question, it was reluctantly, yet unanimously, decided by your Committee to advise the Executive of the Woman's Missionary Society to consolidate the work, and bend all our energies to make the Girls' Department of the new Institute a success, with the earnest hope that it may not be long before circumstances will warrant us in opening similar schools to that of Acton in other places.

It will be remembered that the Board of Managers of the Woman's Missionary Society last year assumed on building account payment of interest at 6 per cent. on \$10,000, for a term of years; and as to current expenses, the agreement has been made between the General Society and our own, that these shall be borne by the two societies respectively in proportion to the numbers of girls and boys in attendance. It is expected that the amount chargeable in this way upon our Society will be \$2,500.

We have been governed in making regulations by the rules prevalent in similar institutions of other denominations in this Province. At Acton, none were admitted paying less than \$2.00 per month. You are, no doub, surprised that any would propose to send their children for so small a sum when it must cost more than that to keep them at home, yet in many cases it was with some difficulty that even this small sum was paid. There are a few parents also, who, being well able, are not willing to pay more, and it has required a great deal of skill to determine who are worthy.

In opening the new Institute, however, it has been thought best by the joint committee of ladies and gentlemen to set the minimum figure at \$4.00 per month for boys and girls, on account of superior advantages of building, locality, heating, lighting and comfort. They were encouraged to do so by the fact that one institution charging the same has many more applicants each year than it can receive. This rule, however, is not so strict but that some few exceptions may be made on good reasons being shown therefor. In all cases it is the effort of the Committee to have some payment made either by the students or by benefactors. Many, however, on proposing to enter are willing to pay \$6.00, \$8.00, or even \$10.00 per month.

wherever a good opening is found, and we take pleasure in reporting three such schools. The first, in connection with the West End French Mission, is now held in the Salle Evangelique, on Delisle Street. This school has been in existence two years, and has had as many as twenty pupils. Our teacher this year is Miss Runnels, one of the two pupils of highest standing at Actonvale.

Our second school is found in the basement of the French Methodist Church, with about twenty pupils in attendance. Teacher, Mlle. Félicie Berloz, also one of the pupils of highest standing at Actonvale. At the St. Théodore Mission is a Dissentient school, which is aided financially by our Society. We are thus entitled to a voice in the selection of a teacher, and the school is thereby made tributary to our work. The teacher, Mme. Senecal, is a member of the Methodist Church.

It is hoped that a system of scholarships in the Institute may be arranged for competition in the day-schools, as a further means of binding them together.

We enter upon the new year with brighter prospects and stronger hopes than ever. Recent agitations, though possibly creating in many quarters strong animosity against Protestantism, which we greatly deplore, will yet, no doubt, be overruled by Providence for the furthering of the Master's work.

Our object is not to assail Romanism nor yet to proselytize, but simply to educate our fellow-countrywomen on the basis of an open Bible for all, in the furtherance of which we earnestly desire the prayers of each member of the Woman's Missionary Society.

# REPORT OF CROSBY GIRLS' HOME.

PORT SIMPSON, B.C., Sept. 16th, 1889.

My DEAR MRS. STRACHAN, -Another year has gone, though it hardly seems possible, for it has passed so rapidly that it is as a dream as we look back over it. It is a merciful Providence that hides the future from our view, for if we could see it all spread out before us who could bear the burden? Last autumn, as I wrote my annual report, the coming winter looked dark and trying, for we knew it must be gone through without the ever ready help and sympathy of our dearly loved Mr. and Mrs. Crosby. Two days after Mr. Crosby left us an unexpected trial came to us, in the shape of a severe illness to myself. All our pleasant plans for Christmas were stopped, and for some weeks it seemed as if my work for the Master was done, and that I was to be called to give an account of my stewardship. Friends were very kind, the girls anxious and willing to do all in their power to care for me and lighten the heavy burden that had fallen, so unexpectedly, upon Miss Hart. But, in spite of all the help and kindness, the burden was almost more than she could bear for a time, and we wondered how she kept up so bravely under the severe strain. She proved fully the reality of the blessed promise, "As thy day so shall thy strength be," and nobly stood the test; but her bodily strength was severely tried, and we were all glad that an opportunity occurred for her to take a holiday this summer. Just before my illness baby Dollie was quite sick for a week, but with that exception we have had no sickness to speak of during the year. We have twenty girls and four boys in the Home at present. Annie Thorne (or Victoria Louise Picton) went to Chilliwhack late last fall; her health had been very poor, and her heathen relatives troubled her so much, that we thought it best in every way to send her to Mrs. Tate for a time. She is well and happy there, and I think very useful to Mrs. Tate. Tillie Bernard was removed by her parents in November last; she had been with us for more than two years, and had become very useful in the house for so young a child. We regretted for the girl's own sake that the mother was not willing to let her remain, but we did not wish to keep her against their will. Agnes, who came from Queen Charlotte Island last November, remained with us till June of this year, when she left to be married. She is married to a Christian Indian and is very happy, says she will never go back to the old bad way, but will always remember the good lessons she learned in the Home. Her last testimony in class before leaving us was very touching and earnest. She said, "Jesus loves me and I love Him, and I am going to follow Him always." Mary Offutt, a little fatherless girl, came in the Home in October. She is between seven and eight years of age, and is obedient and quiet, makes good progress at school, and is very anxious to take part in the house-work when at home. Mr. Crosby brought three children from New Westminster when he returned late last fall-Aleck and Ellen Tenass and Willie Woollard. The two first had been very much neglected, and were at first very wild and unmanageable; now they have settled down, and, though not very docile, are learning well at school, and can be kept within bounds somewhat at home. Willie is a little motherless boy, quiet and obedient; we have very little trouble with him. A few weeks ago one of our native workers placed his little girl with us. She is a little over nine years of age, is small and delicate; her ankles are extremely weak, causing lameness; we hope to get medical aid for her, and that she will outgrow her delicacy. You asked me in your last letter how many of our girls profess to be converted. It is probable that they would all say that they loved Jesus if you were to ask each one personally. Our three elder girls, Hannah, Sarah and Jennie, are good, consistent girls, and are trying, I am sure, to follow and serve Jesus. They do not make much

Household Miss Knig Miss Har profession, but are always ready to bear testimony in our weekly class-meeting, and will pray earnestly whenever requested when visiting with us among the sick or in our own Bible readings at home. Eliza, Priscilla, Betsey and Erie attend class regularly, and also profess to love and follow Jesus. Eliza has gone to Nanaimo with Mr. Crosby, to visit her parents. She came for three years, and her time being up, she became very anxious to see her mother. I do not know whether she will return or not.

Our work at present is rendered difficult, and often trying, by the many drawbacks and inconveniences of the building we now occupy. We wish very much to have a new house; and I think, if the Committee will give us an extra grant of two thousand dollars, a suitable and convenient one could be built for that amount. We thought and prayed much over the matter before making this request, for in all things we desire to be led by Providence before branching out in any way; and feel sure that if we are to carry on the Home successfully, and with real benefit to the children, a new and more commodious building is a necessity. We are grateful for the interest which has been shown in the Home during the past, and for the substantial aid given; and our prayer is that in the great harvest-time those who have given of their substance, and those who have done the work, may rejoice together over many of these girls saved in the Redeemer's kingdom.

To the President and other Officers of the Woman's Missionary Society.

Dear Ladies,—It affords me great pleasure to lay before you an account of our past year's history. Not that we have achieved very great results, but that you may see that we have made the most of our opportunities.

We have had seven recruits—four girls, viz., Agnes and Rebecca Soldier, Sarah Job, and Mary Kechies, aged respectively, ten, seven, nine and eight years; and three boys, viz., Thomas and Judas Wildman, and James Kechies, aged ten, seven and nine years respectively. We now have twenty-four pupils—thirteen girls and eleven boys.

They are all young. We find that there is more hope of doing them a permanent benefit when they begin at less than ten years of age, than older. They sooner become reconciled to the restraint necessary to school life, and they take more kindly to the new manner of living. They find a great change from the wild, free and easy camp life, where cleanliness is not thought of, clothing in summer superfluous, and rags no disgrace; where economy is stinginess, where feasting and fasting are the common occurrences of life; abundance prevailing for a few days after the weekly ration is given out, followed by destitution and want, so that when ration day returns, they have a keen relish for the feast again.

You would be agreeably surprised to see how quickly the pinched features give way to plumpness, from regular habits of cleanliness, food, sleep, exercise, study and proper clothing. The expression changes so much, that you would hardly believe the frank, open countenance of a child a few months here, to be the face of the fearful, cast down, neglected child whom we cleaned up and installed into a place among us so short a time ago.

We are thankful to be able to report that there has been no loss this year by desertion. This is the first year we have been able to make so favorable a report in this respect.

But we have lost two by death, Jane Ear, aged nine years, after a lingering illness all last summer, died November 1st, of consumption. She was a very bright, promising child, till she took the St. Vitus' Dance last summer.

Ella Campbell also died in camp, of consumption, last spring, as five of her brothers and sisters had done. She had been taken for treatment by her mother. The Indians seem to fall easy victims to consumption. Judas Wildman was not strong when he entered, and as he continued to fail, they took him to live in a tent again, after being with us only about three months. He seemed to recover his strength, but has not returned yet. With these few exceptions, our children have enjoyed increasingly good health, till at present all are well.

As we hope to produce a permanent benefit by teaching them some useful occupation, and as cattle-raising is the only reliable one in these parts, we took some cattle on shares three years ago, and have made considerable butter every summer since. We will have about twenty head, mostly calves, after we return the original stock this fall.

Our boys and girls learn to milk the cows, and to break in the unruly ones, and to rear calves on skim milk. The girls get a good practical knowledge of butter-making, which we hope they will never forget, and which we trust they will turn to good account.

The girls' time is fully occupied out of school-hours with cooking, baking, washing, ironing, sweeping, scrubbing, bed-making, sewing, knitting, milking, etc., embracing the whole routine of house-work, with which they are becoming familiar by constant practice.

The boys' work, consisting of cutting fuel, bringing water, hoeing and weeding in the garden, bringing the cows and helping to milk them, etc., is all calculated to prepare them for their future duties, and to teach them that out-of-door labor is men's work, and that the men should allow the women to have their time to thoroughly attend to household affairs. The boys also knit. They as well as the girls, are preparing socks and mittens to send to the fair at Calgary, in October.

Our crop has been almost a failure on account of the drought which has been general throughout the country. But our butter-making has been a success. We have made five hundred pounds, besides using a liberal amount of milk and butter. But we cannot hope to make any for sale next summer, as we will probably have only three or four cows.

When we were in Ontario last winter we were asked, "How can we help

"By giving us money to buy cows with," I replied. But I did not urge the matter on the Auxiliaries, for some feared a new enterprise would overburden them. However a few private individuals gave something.

In Picton we received \$17.75, in Parkdale, \$5, and a Mr. Bowman of London, Ont., while calling on us this summer, gave us \$5 for the cattle fund. We hope to invest it soon.

We have somewhat relieved the overcrowding, by putting up at very small cost an addition for a milk room, and we got half a dozen creamers (\$11), in Ontario, with collections received in Cannington (\$5), Kinsale (\$2.44), and Mount Pleasant (\$2.88), which were the only collections we received, so that we have a neat little creamery, and we make first-class gilt-edge butter.

As to the school-work proper. Our visitors, including ministers, Indian agents and other officials, seem surprised at the facility with which our pupils read, and at the intelligence and readiness of their answers, showing that they grasp the meaning of the sentences, as well as the pronunciation of the words. They also do their writing and arithmetic fairly. But they excel in their Sunday-school lessons, reciting the whole of each lesson, and often quote from them in their conversations.

They are storing their minds with Biblical knowledge, which we hope some of them may turn to good account. They are trying to serve the Lord Jesus Christ. We find that the recitation of Scripture verses assists them in using English words. Quite a number of the children can now express themselves readily in English, and all the teaching is done in English.

We hope you can make us a liberal appropriation, for there are a number of improvements needed. We want to buy boards and shingles to roof our stable, we need another waggon, a pump and other things.

We are more sanguine of success than heretofore, as we begin to see more of the fruit of our labor. Pray for us that we may teach so wisely that our Master will accept and bless our work. We send our best wishes to you all.

# REPORT OF THE COQUALEETZA HOME AND SCHOOL

CHILLIWHACK, B.C., Sept. 30th, 1889.

DEAR MRS. STRACHAN,—I couple with this a financial statement for the year just closing. We have tried to make ends meet, and have nearly done so, running over only \$4.40.

We found it necessary to get some one to help Miss Elderkin, and have had to pay that help \$20, besides \$50 for a man to do the heavy work in clearing up the yards, getting out stumps, fencing playground, etc.

Our estimates for the incoming year will be: For salaries, \$700; supplies, \$800. We expect to take from twenty to twenty-five children, for which number the latter item is very low; but we hope to get something in the way of food from the people.

The Government ought to give at least \$1,000 per annum for this institution. Received during the year, 12; left, 1. Number in Home at present, 18. Attending class, 10. Conversions during the year, 6.

# COQUALEETZA HOME AND SCHOOL, CHILLIWHACK, Sept. 28th, 1889.

When I came here, the 23rd March, I found five girls and two boys under the care of Rev. and Mrs. Tate. Immediately after the annual camp-meeting we had three more added to the number, and a day or two later, on the 10th June, three other arrivals compelled us to move into the new building, although it was not quite ready for our occupying. We spread the beds upon the floors, and made the best of the noise of carpenters' hammers and saws, knowing these were necessary for our comfort and convenience. Two little girls, whose mother died during the time the camp-meetings were in session, came to us now. About the first of July Miss Lawrence brought two more children from Misiamo, and a little girl, whose mother is ill (the doctor says with consumption), came to us. Also a lad named Alfred Stephen, whose mother is dead, was sent here by his father, making our present number eighteen. The names and ages of all the children who have been under Mr. and Mrs. Tate's care since they opened this school, I will forward, and the date of their entering. We have with us at present twelve girls and six boys.

Lizzie, Lillie Corbin, Lillie Commoder, Jessie and Nellie, as well as Sam Smith, were all converted before I came, and were members of the class. Since we moved into the Home I have had reason to believe Joseph, Richard and Louisa have decided to live for Jesus, and are daily trying to be like Jesus.

Little Annie and Mary sing most triumphantly, "I've been redeemed," but we think they are too tender in years to comprehend the meaning of that song. I hope they may always sing thus, and my daily effort is to teach all these dear children that Jesus loves the little children. The boys, as well as the girls, are being instructed in the use of the needle, broom, scrub-brush and iron. Two of the eldest boys made up the sitting-room carpet, and then put it down quite as nicely as a professional carpet-layer could have done. They are planning what occupation they would like to have when they are men. Sam thinks a shoemaker would be the best trade, as he is not very strong, being deformed. Joseph wants to be a blacksmith, Richard and Alfred carpenters. In watching them from day to day, I think they show aptitude for these occupations. We are delighted with the desks and seats, they are so very neat and pretty.

Goo which I this quarter; but they will not soon be forgotten in the Home, for the influence for good will be felt from year to year. The Christmas gifts from a number of friends, and the enjoyment of the girls in their first Christmas celeration, made this season one of gladness.

The second quarter of this year will always be remembered by us for the "showers of blessings" that came to the Home, resulting in the conversion and baptism of the first six girls named in the list. No one, unless they had lived a year with them before their conversion, could realize what religion has done for them. They have become "new creatures in Christ Jesus." I am sure that every member of the Missionary Societies throughout and beyond the Dominion of Canada who has worked and prayed for us, will be encouraged, knowing that their prayers have been answered. In connection with this event I should mention the assistance given by Mr. and Mrs. Chan, our Chinese missionaries of Vancouver, during their first visits to the Home.

Four girls have been rescued during the year. The first in March, from a "den of iniquity" in Victoria; the second in April, from a similar place in Vancouver. The third, an interesting young woman, came from New Westminster, seeking protection from the special oppression of her owners; and the fourth, a young child of eight or nine years, was taken from a private Chinese family in Moodyville, near Vancouver. All the four seem to have yielded at once to the Christian teaching and influence of the Home, and have asked for baptism.

You will observe in the financial statement that we have had in small sums from various sources, the sum of \$94.35. Sums accompanied with much sympathy, interest and self-denial—as for instance, the \$1.45 candy money from children somewhere in Ontario, per Rev. Mr. Crosby. Early in the year we had a contribution of a box of medicine from Milburn & Co., druggists, Toronto, and a small parcel of dress goods from Berwick, N.S. A quilt and picture album from Bermuda reached us in May last. We had also an autograph quilt from friends in St. John's, Newfoundland; and three quilts from Oakville, Ontario; and a half-dozen Methodist hymn books, with Easter cards, from Portland, N.B.

Mr. Chase had a swing put up in the girl's yard, at a cost of \$10.50. He has also very kindly placed in our hands the sum of \$95.00 to pay for guardianship papers and other expenses in connection with the rescuing of the girls. From the Supply Committee we had \$30.00 to pay for a sewing machine; and from Hall & Ross Co., Victoria, we have had during the year forty mats of

Through the kindness of Hon. Senator Macdonald, when in Victoria a few weeks ago, nearly \$100.00 was raised to provide additional beds and bedding, so that each girl may have a separate bed, Mr. Macdonald giving three-quarters of the amount. For the contributions named we are thankful, as well as for many favors and small gifts too numerous to mention.

The Rev. J. E. Starr and Mr. J. E. Gardner always very kindly render me any assistance necessary when I call upon them. Mrs. C. E. Lockhart has been with me since March. Though a visitor, she has filled the place of an assistant, making it possible for me to take nearly three weeks' holiday in July, and to leave the Home for business and out-door exercise.

The last event in the Home calling for notice is the marriage of Katie to Ah Lou, her "long-time good friend." We are hopeful that this marriage will result in a happy Christian Chinese home.

Among the other blessings of the year named should be that of the good

health of every member of the Home.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY FOR 1888-89.

In presenting this the Seventh Annual Report of our Western Branch, the review of the work seems encouraging, as we find that 23 new Auxiliaries and 10 Mission Bands have been formed. Besides the Auxiliaries at Nile, Dungannon, Woodstock, Galt, Paisley, Wellington Street and Colborne Street (Brantford), reported at our last meeting as having just been organized, Burford, Oakland, Lynedoch, Elora, Ridgetown, Kirkton, Petrolea, Exeter, Sarnia, Wellington Street (London), Wycombe, Georgetown and Eramosa have been formed. Stoney Creek, Hagersville and Belfontaine have also formed during the year; but no report has been received from them. Zion Tabernacle (Hamilton), Beamsville, Town Line, Talbotville Circuit and Watford have just organized, ready for work next year. Mission Bands have been formed at Flesherton, Welland, Wesley Church (Hamilton), Wellington Street (Brantford), Goderich, Chatham, Dundas, The Grove, Galt and Woodhouse.

We have now a total of 85 Auxiliaries and 27 Mission Bands, being an increase of 17 Auxiliaries and 6 Mission Bands. We have annual members, 1,978; life members, 142—total membership, 2,120. Increase, 402. Mission Band members, 677; increase, 223. Amount sent to Treasurer, \$6,724.66, being an increase of \$771.88.

During the year over 100 packets of letters and leaflets have been sent out monthly to each Auxiliary and Mission Band, and some 1,300 printed reports

circulated.

Our delegates to the different Conferences were well received, and resolutions of sympathy with our work passed by each. At our Branch Meeting we missed from among us our beloved Vice-President, Mrs. Messmore, who has returned to her work in India. While we are thankful to report an increase in every department, yet we are not satisfied with the year's work, when we think of how small a part of our field is covered—of 396 circuits within our boundary only 87 are occupied. While the reports of our Auxiliaries show by the small increase in membership, and the low average attendance at our monthly meetings, that even where we have entered a place, the missionary spirit is not all that it ought to be.

The idea of District Conventions, as worked out by Mrs. Jackson in her paper on "Organizers' Work," I think will be helpful, and we hope will be tried by all our Districts. We have also appointed a Central Organizer for each Conference, hoping it may more fully meet the needs of the case. So that while we look back somewhat regretfully, we are looking forward hopefully to the

result of the work of the coming year.

Our Society forms one of the three branches into which the original "Brantford Auxiliary" was divided about a year ago. Much gratitude fills our hearts that on the separation, which was looked forward to with some anxiety and regret, we now realize it was a providential leading, and will redound to the glory of God and the furtherance of the Saviour's kingdom. In this result we gratefully rejoice. And now, with a goodly number of willing members, a faithful president, and the assurance of divine help for future undertakings, we are disposed to heartily thank God, and take courage

# BRANTFORD, WELLINGTON STREET.

The Auxiliary of the Wellington Street Methodist Church of Brantford was organized September, 1888. Twenty-five members were enrolled. Our membership is now fifty. The monthly meetings have been held regularly. Subscribers to Outlook, forty-five.

## BRANTFORD, COLBORNE STREET.

This Auxiliary has increased from a membership of sixteen to twenty-eight. We have forty-two subscribers to the Oullook. At Christmas time the three Auxiliaries sent a valuable box of clothing to Bella Coola, and we hope to do more in the ensuing year than in the last.

#### BURLINGTON.

We present our seventh Annual Report with mingled feelings of gratitude and sadness. We miss from our circle Sister Freeborn, our first beloved president, an earnest Christian worker. Monthly meetings have been held regularly during the year. We are sorry to report a slight decrease in membership by death and removals. A visit by Miss Cartmell helped to awaken an interest in the work. Only a few of our members take the Outlook. We hope to do better. Mite-boxes are used by us to good advantage. We have thirty-two members and two life-members. The whole amount sent to Branch Treasurer for the year is \$79.60.

Our Society has held its own this year, our second. We find the leaflets a great help to keep up the interest in the meetings, and we find the mite-boxes a good way to gather up the "mites" for the mission cause. We are determined to go on, and hope for still better things.

#### BURFORD.

We have been struggling on amidst discouragements, chiefly arising from lack of interest on the part of those whom we fondly hoped would have helped us by their presence; but like Gideon's army, "though faint, yet pursuing," expresses our present condition and experience.

## CLINTON, RATTENBURY STREET.

We have been encouraged during the past year by the increased interest in the missionary work among the members of our Auxiliary. We are glad to report one new life-member; and while we have lost some members by removals, several new names have been added to our list. We hope and pray that great success may crown our efforts through the coming year.

# CLINTON, ONTARIO STREET.

Organized 1888. Although we have not gained in numbers, we have in interest, and the future looks encouraging. We are praying the Lord would send forth more laborers.

#### CHATHAM.

We can say, "We are not weary in well-doing," for God has blessed us in our work, not only financially, but He has filled our hearts with more love for those who need our help. Fifty dollars were received from the "Gleaners," organized since last yearly meeting, making a total of \$180.35 Besides this, we sent 140 pounds of clothing to the North-West Forty-eight copies of Outlook are taken. We have been favored by a visit from Miss Cartmell and Mr. Crosby, thus getting a better insight into both Japan and Indian work.

## CHARING CROSS.

This Auxiliary reports an increase of two life members, and one annual member. One dear sister has gone home to heaven, and three have removed. We raised a little over \$40 with our mite boxes, and \$77.40 from other sources, also a box of clothing was sent to Norway House.

#### CARLINGFORD.

We are meeting with every encouragement. Our members have been doubled, and a spirit of liberality manifested toward and from every one.

#### DUNDAS.

The year has been a prosperous one spiritually. Meetings have been held regularly. A Band has been organized numbering twenty, also a visiting committee, which has done much good by visiting families who do not attend any church, and relieving want. We have held three entertainments and one public meeting. Both finances and membership are in advance of last year.

#### EXETER.

Exeter Auxiliary was organized on March 6th, 1889, by Mrs. J. C. Detlor, with thirty-one members; since then we have added two more to our number. We have had six regular and one open meeting, and are taking nineteen Outlooks. We hope to be able to do more next year, and add many more to our number.

#### ELORA.

The Elora Auxiliary was organized by Miss Cartmell in March last, with a membership of five or six; the membership now is fourteen. Two public meetings have been held; the first was addressed by Miss Cartmell, and the second by Miss Campbell, of China. A donation of \$10.00 was given by a friend, making a total of \$19.00 raised by the Society during the first half-year of its organization.

## GODERICH.

The membership has increased, the finances greatly improved, and we believe the interest is more widespread. A mission band, consisting of forty members, has been organized, and is doing good work. We are continually keeping this great work before the people, young and old, having at least once a month a missionary prayer-meeting, at which a letter, leaflet, or an essay is read, and the subject of prayer kept in remembrance and laid upon the hearts of our people. We aim at giving all an intelligent idea of the work, and thereby impressing them with the great need.

#### GALT.

This Auxiliary was organized in October, 1888, by Mrs. Cunningham, Miss Cartmell being present. We have had eight monthly meetings; average attendance, twelve. Amount sent to Branch Treasurer, \$59.50. No particular work has been taken up during the year, but a growing interest in missions is manifested. The mission in connection with the Auxiliary is a great success. We are hopeful for the future.

#### GEORGETOWN.

Our Society was organized July 3rd, 1889, with a membership of seven. Having held but two meetings, we have not as yet taken up any special lines of work. At present we are arranging for a public meeting some time in the near future. Having faith in this God-given work and implicit trust and confidence in our Leader, we know that our efforts will not be in vain.

## HAMILTON, CENTENARY CHURCH.

We can report a larger average attendance at our monthly meetings than last year. There has been an addition of three life-members, but owing to the name of a former one being transferred to another Auxiliary, according to the new regulation, the increase appears to be but two. Funds have been raised, chiefly by fees and voluntary donations from members. A box of clothing was sent to the Indians at Cape Croker. We are thankful for the privilege of laboring in His service.

### HAMILTON, WESLEY CHURCH.

We have just closed our second year of existence, and though we lost a number of members through death and removals, can report an increase in funds and membership. Seven monthly and three union quarterly meetings have been held during the year. The returns from eighteen mite-boxes added materially to our funds. One lady reported \$6 in her box from the sale of canaries. Mrs. Clarke has secured one hundred subscribers for the Outlook. There are two smaller clubs, making 129 copies taken. We filled a large case with six quilts and a quantity of clothing, and sent to Rev. Mr. Glass, Battle River. Our Mission Band consists of eighteen little girls, who, through loving service and earnest effort to do something for the Master, raised the sum of \$76.14.

#### HAMILTON, FIRST METHODIST CHURCH.

Our membership is the same as last year, twenty-nine members, and two life-members. We have sent to the Branch Treasurer \$180.06—\$60.06 raised by the ladies, and \$120 by the Mission Band and Little Gleaners. Mrs. Oberholt was appointed to circulate the Outlook. She distributes fifty copies.

#### INGERSOLL.

Eleven monthly meetings have been held, at all of which we have been profited, not only by the reading of letters, leaflets, and other missionary intelligence, but more than all, in the half-hour spent in unitedly praying that "the kingdoms of this world shall become the kingdoms of our Lord and of His Christ." Our missionary scrap-book has been the source of great interest. About thirty mite-boxes are in use, and over thirty copies of Outlook in circulation.

#### JARVIS.

The meetings are especially interesting, each Branch being well represented. We find the *Outlook* more interesting than ever before; the letters and leaflets are appreciated very highly.

#### OWEN SOUND.

The report for this year is not very encouraging. It seems very hard to rouse our people and interest them in missionary work. We have only sent forty dollars this year, being considerably less than last year. However, we hope that the ensuing will be more successful, as our officers are determined to work with renewed vigor.

#### FULLARTON.

This Society was organized in April, 1885. We have lost two of our members by death, and some by removal. During this year we have added four members to our number. We pray the Master will own and bless our work.

### OAKLAND CIRCUIT.

By the aid of Miss Cartmell an Auxiliary was organized in December on the Oakland Circuit, with a membership of eleven. Twelve meetings have been held, which includes three quarterly meetings. These have been seasons of delight in which we have felt the Spirit moving strangely upon our hearts. Different Bible subjects have been studied from quarter to quarter, such as the "Promises on Missionary Effort," "Faith," and the present subject, 'Charity," which study has been profitable to teach. Rags have been gathered and sewed, thirty-two yards of rag carpet sold, and some forty yards yet on hand. We have now a membership of twenty-nine, two life-members. We take two missionary papers, the Outlook and Heathen Woman's Friend, and have a circulating library, by which we hope to build each other up, and increase missionary intelligence; \$103 have been sent to the Branch Treasurer, all free-will offerings. We can truthfully say the interest is growing.

## PETROLEA.

We were organized Feburary 28th of this year, by Mrs. Brown, of Strathroy, with a membership of seven, which has increased to ten. Though our numbers are small, they seem possessed of the true missionary spirit: The monthly meetings have proved a means of grace to the few who attend. We hope to enlarge our borders during the coming winter.

## PAISLEY.

Our Auxiliary was organized in October last. We have held one public meeting, proceeds \$7.11. We hold missionary prayer-meetings once a month, at which missionary readings are given. We have secured nine subscribers to the Outlook, and have disposed of ten reports. We have a membership of fifteen, and have sent \$21.61 to the Branch Treasurer for the year, and hope to do better in the future.

### REPORTS FROM AUXILIARIES.

### TORONTO, METROPOLITAN.

This Auxiliary reports eight meetings held for the year, of much spiritual interest to those who attended, and much enhanced by the presence of such devoted workers as Mrs. Crosby, Miss Cartmell and Mrs. McDougall. Average attendance, thirty; yearly members, eighty-seven; life-members, seventeen. The receipts for the year, including returns from Mission Circle and Coral Workers' Mission Band, \$882.70. The Coral Workers' Mission Band are very young workers in the Master's vineyard, and this year have labored under rather disadvantageous circumstances. Receipts, \$41.25.

### METROPOLITAN YOUNG PEOPLE'S MISSION CIRCLE.

The year has not been marked by any wonderful effort on the part of the Circle, but a steady and quiet interest has been maintained throughout. A large number of mite boxes were distributed, from which we realized \$112.17. The membership is ninety-one, which includes five life-members. Amount raised, \$355.

### TORONTO, ELM STREET.

Elm Street Auxiliary was organized in September, 1883, and reports fifty members this year, nine of whom are life-members; \$290.50 was sent to the Branch Treasurer. The Mission Band has a membership of fifty-six, and has worked well through the past year. They handed the Treasurer of the Auxiliary \$151.12.

### TORONTO, SHERBOURNE STREET.

This Auxiliary was organized September, 1888; has been in existence one year. Formerly we were in connection with Berkeley Street. We feel grateful for the prosperity we have had. Too much cannot be said of our esteemed President, and of her untiring efforts to make our gatherings profitable.

### TORONTO, BROADWAY TABERNACLE.

Broadway Tabernacle Auxiliary, organized November, 1886, reports regular meetings well attended, with interest increasing. An increase of eight annual members; present total membership, sixty-seven. Over 200 leaflets, letters, prayer-cards, and back numbers of Missionary Outlook distributed. Donations of sheets, towels, pillow-slips, comforters, and \$4.75 cash to French Methodist. Institute, Montreal; \$2.75 raised by collection for the Publication Fund.

### TORONTO, YONGE STREET.

Our Auxiliary was organized May, 1888. We had the pleasure of listening to a most interesting a dress from Mrs. Crosby in regard to the work being done at the Crosby Girls' Home at Port Simpson, B.C. Mrs. T. Thompson also gave us a graphic account of the work being done amongst the Chinese girls in British Columbia, especially at the Home in Victoria.

### TORONTO, CENTRAL CHURCH.

This year we report our life-members, increase, three; sixty-nine annual members, increase, four. ### MISSION CIRCLE, CENTRAL CHURCH.

Towards the close of last year we organized a Mission Circle. With the fees from our thirty members and a small loan, we purchased material to make articles for our sale, meeting semi-monthly. We held a sale of the articles thus prepared, at which we more than quadrupled our expenditure, realizing \$100. The Rev. Mr. Watson kindly gave us an illustrated lecture, from which we realized \$32.

### TORONTO, QUEEN STREET.

Our Auxiliary has a membership of ninety-two, including twelve life-members, two of whom were added this year. We held nine monthly meetings, with an average attendance of thirty-eight, and seven public meetings. Amount sent to Branch Treasurer, \$549.29, which includes \$150 from our Mission Band.

### MISSION BAND.

The Band has a membership of sixty-five. Contributed \$150.

### TORONTO, EUCLID AVENUE.

The membership at the close of last year was twenty-eight; added during the year, three; removed or dropped, eight. Present net membership, twenty-three. Moneys raised last year, \$53.23; this, \$45.81; a decrease of \$7.42.

### BRIDGE STREET, BELLEVILLE.

Was organized March 12, 1884. Membership has steadily increased year after year, until it now numbers 136, five of these being life-members. We have lost one member by death, Mrs. Bennett. Receipts for the year, \$197.39. There have been three donations—Mrs. Higinbotham, \$5; Mrs. W. W. Chown, \$2; Mr. Henry Taylor, \$1.50.

### JUBILEE MISSION BAND.

The Jubilee Mission Band was organized in April, 1889, and now numbers forty-nine. The annual fees amounted to \$12.25, and over and above this amount \$50.90 have been raised, \$50 of which have been appropriated to the French Institute in Montreal.

### PETERBORO' AUXILIARY.

### REPORTS FROM AUXILIARIES.

### MONTREAL, ST. JAMES'.

This Auxiliary is but one year old, and is not yet developed to the beauideal of a missionary meeting. There have been eight monthly meetings, with an average attendance of sixteen. The meetings have been of considerable interest, but here the greatest difficulty is found, as one poor meeting undoes the benefit of half-a-dozen good ones. The public meetings, at which Mr. Crosby and others gave interesting addresses, were well attended and productive of good.

### MONTE EAL, DOUGLAS CHURCH.

Was organized last September, with a membership of thirty. During the year seven new members have been added. While we are thankful for the interest which has been manifested in our work, we hope that in the coming year we may realize to a greater extent our responsibility in the cause of missions, and do our utmost to carry on the work. Amount remitted to the Branch Treasurer, \$102.82.

### MONTREAL, MOUNTAIN STREET.

This Auxiliary was organized in January, 1889. Membership, fifteen, which we hope to increase largely during the year. We are praying and trusting for a greater interest on the part of all our ladies in the great work of missions.

### DOMINION CHURCH, OTTAWA.

Our Society was organized in February, 1889. We are glad to report the interest increasing, and we pray that God will bless our efforts and that our numbers and usefulness may increase. Sent to Branch Treasurer, \$11.25.

A Mission Band has been organized this year, which seems to have considerable enterprise. This Society has forwarded during the year the sum of \$33.27 to the Branch Treasurer.

### PERTH, MISSION BAND.

Was organized in March, 1889. The members number twenty-seven, the majority being girls from thirteen to tifteen years of age. We meet every alternate Saturday evening, and spend a pleasant and instructive hour singing and reading, while we sew. We have succeeded already in raising a small amount by a Mission Band social, and feel much pleasure in being able to present it to the Woman's Missionary Society.

### COBDEN.

Our Auxiliary was organized December 27th, 1887. We have four regular members. Amount remitted during the year was \$8.02. Quite an interest is evinced in mission work, and our hearts are glad in the thought that God condescends to use our feeble efforts for the spread of the Gospel of Jesus.

### CORNWALL.

In looking over the year just closing we are thankful, but not satisfied. We have fourteen members, two of whom are life-members. In March we had a very successful meeting, \$28.67 being given as a thank-offering. Miss Cartmell's visit in April greatly encouraged us. In June we were called to part with our esteemed President, Mrs. (Rev.) F. C. Reynolds. The total amount sent to Branch Treasurer, \$67.53.

#### ATHENS.

This Auxiliary was organized March, 1885, by Mrs. Williams; does not grow very fast, but still keeps its first interested ones. It has a membership of ten, and a Mission Band numbering thirty-five. They (the Band) raised \$30.22 from all sources, last year, and sent a box of clothing to the Indians at Parry Island, and Sunday-school papers to the men in the shanties.

### WEST WINCHESTER.

We have held two public and ten monthly meetings during the year, and are thankful to report an increase in members and income, and the interest is steadily growing. Our Mission Band, organized in November, now numbers twenty-five.

### MIZPAH, MISSION BAND.

Our Mission Band was organized by Mrs. D. Geddes and Mrs. J. E. Mavety, on the 29th November last, with a membership of sixteen, which has increased to twenty-five. We hold our meetings monthly, and have raised \$70 for Japan. With "Trust in God," which is our motto, we are looking forward to better results in the future.

#### KEMPTVILLE.

We close this year with a membership of fifteen. Amount sent to Branch Treasurer, \$15; also \$1 sent to Leaflet Fund. We have held nine monthly meetings. We are entering on the new year with prospects of an increased membership, and a more widespread interest in the work. Eight copies of the Outlook are taken.

#### IROQUOIS.

Our Auxiliary was organized October 3rd, 1888, by the Rev. W. H. Sparling, with eleven members. Since then our membership has increased to twenty-seven. Miss Cartmell visited us and gave us two interesting and instructive addresses, and was the means of bringing several new members to our Society. We have a Mission Band of forty-one members. Interest in the work seems to be increasing.

### CLARENCEVILLE

### MONTREAL, ST. JAMES' YOUNG PEOPLE'S MISSIONARY CIRCLE.

Since organization we have steadily increased until we now number fiftyfour active and nineteen honorary members. The regular monthly meetings

the work is not performed by the officers alone, but each member does her part,

# REPORTS FROM AUXILIARIES.

### HALIFAX NORTH.

#### DIGBY.

# CONSTITUTION

OF THE

# WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY

OF

# THE METHODIST CHURCH.

#### ART. I.-NAME.

This Association shall be called "THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE METHODIST CHURCH."

#### ART. II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Society shall be to engage the efforts of Christian women in the evangelization of heathen women and children; to aid in sustaining female missionaries and teachers, or other special laborers in connection with mission work, in foreign and home fields; and to raise funds for the work of the Society.

# ART, III.-MEMBERSHIP.

The payment of one dollar annually, either at one time or in instalments, shall constitute membership; and twenty-five dollars given by one person at one time, or in instalments during the year, shall constitute a life membership.

# ART. IV.—ORGANIZATION.

The organization of this Society shall consist of a Board of Managers, co-ordinate Branches, and Auxiliary Societies, to be constituted and limited as laid down in subsequent articles.

# ART. V.-BOARD OF MANAGERS.

Section 1.—The management and general administration of the affairs of the Society shall be vested in a Board of Managers, consisting of the Officers of the Society, the President and Corresponding Secretary of each Branch, and delegates from each Branch in the

proportion of one to every two hundred members, which delegates, together with two alternates, shall be elected at the Branch Annual Meetings, said meetings to be held within two months before the meeting of the Board of Managers. Said Board shall meet annually or oftener, at such time and place as it shall annually determine. The President of each Branch is by virtue of her office a Vice-President of the Board of Managers.

SEC. 2.—That the Officers of the Board of Managers shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer, these to be elected at the Annual Meeting of the Board, and any vacancies occurring during the year shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

SEC. 3.—To transact business during the year, the Officers of the Board of Managers with the President and Corresponding Secretary of each Branch shall ex officio form an Executive Committee, five of whom shall form a quorum.

SEC. 4.—The duties of the Board of Managers shall be: (1) To take into consideration the interests and demands of the entire work of the Society, as presented in the reports of the Branch Corresponding Secretaries, and the estimates of the needs of mission fields; to ascertain the financial condition of the Society, to appropriate its funds, to devise the means for the carrying forward of the work to be undertaken by each; suggesting the amounts to be raised, employing suitable missionaries, as the work may require, designating their fields of labor, and examining the reports of those employed. (2) To appoint a committee to arrange for the publication of an Annual Report of the work of this Society. (3) To transact any other business that the interests of the Society may demand, provided all the plans and the directions of the Board shall be in harmony with the provisions of the Constitution.

#### ART. VI.—BRANCHES

Section 1.—Branches may be organized according to Conferences. This plan, however, may be changed by an affirmative vote of three-fourths of the Board of Managers present at any Annual Meeting of the same.

SEC. 2.—The officers of each Branch of the Society shall consist of a President, three or more Vice-Presidents, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, and an Auditor. These, with the exception of Auditor, shall constitute an executive committee for the administration of the affairs of the Branch, five of whom shall be a quorum.

SEC. 3.—The President or one of the Vice-Presidents shall preside at all meetings of the Branch and of its Executive Committee. She shall sign all drafts upon the treasury before they are paid.

The Corresponding Secretary shall, under the direction of the Executive Committee, conduct any official correspondence with the other Branches, with its Auxiliaries, hereinafter mentioned, and with the Branches, with its Auxiliaries, hereinafter mentioned, and with the Secretary of the Board of Managers, and shall endeavor, by all practicable means, to form Auxiliary Societies within the prescribed territory of the Branch. It shall also be her duty to present to the Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers a report of the work of the Branch during the year, for publication in their Annual Report.

The Treasurer shall receive all contributions to the Branch, keeping proper books of account, and shall forward the money quarterly to the Treasurer of the Board of Managers.

SEC. 4.—The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the President and Secretary as often as may be necessary, to transact any business that may arise between the annual sessions of the Board.

SEC. 5.—No Branch shall project new work, or undertake the support of new missionaries, except by the direction or with the approval of the Board or Managers.

SEC. 6.—Each Branch may make its own by-laws, regulating its own meetings and those of its Executive Committee, also any others which may be deemed necessary to its efficiency, not inconsistent with this Constitution.

# ART. VII.—AUXILIARY SOCIETIES.

Any number of women contributing at least one dollar each annually may form a Society auxiliary to that Branch of the Woman's Missionary Society within whose prescribed limits they may reside, by appointing a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Receding Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, and a Treasurer, who together shall constitute a local Executive Committee.

# ART. VIII.—RELATION TO THE MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

SECTION 1.—This Society shall work in harmony with the authorities of the Missionary Society of the Methodist Church, and be subject to their approval in the employment and remuneration of missionaries or other agents, the designation of fields of labor, and in the general plans and designs of the work.

SEC. 2.—All missionaries or other agents supported or aided by this Society shall be approved, before appointment, by the constituted authorities of the Methodist Church, and shall be subject to the same rules and regulations as other missionaries or agents of the said Church.

#### ART. IX.—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION,

This Constitution may be changed at any Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers by a two-thirds vote of each Branch delegation, notice of such amendment having been given to each Branch before its Annual Meeting; but Art. VIII. shall not be changed, except with the concurrence of the General Board of Missions of the Methodist Church.

#### By-LAWS.

1. The Corresponding Secretary of each Branch shall be required to furnish in her report, in schedule form, to the Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers, the following items:

2. Each Branch Treasurer shall furnish the Corresponding Secretary an annual report, in schedule form, of moneys received by her quarterly, and the sources of income.

3. The General Treasurer shall publish each quarter, in the

Outlook, the moneys received by her.

4. When delegates to the General Board are elected at the Branch Annual Meetings they shall meet at once, and select three of their number, who shall be members of the Nominating Committee, and who shall meet one hour previous to the opening session of the Board, to arrange for committees and their times and places of meeting.

5. Certificates of Membership may be granted to annual members of any Auxiliary who may be changing their place of residence, which shall constitute them members of the Auxiliary in the place to which they remove.

# ART. I.-NAME.

This Association shall be called "THE -- Branch of the Woman's Missionary Society of THE METHODIST CHURCH."

# ART. II.—OBJECT.

Its object shall be to aid the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church in its work of engaging the efforts of Christian women in the evangelization of heathen women and children; to assist in sustaining female missionaries and teachers, or other special laborers, in foreign or home fields; and to raise funds for the work of this Society.

# ART. III.-MEMBERSHIP.

Any person paying annually the sum of One Dollar, at one time or in instalments, to the funds of this Society, shall be deemed a member, and as such shall be entitled to be present at the Annual Meeting of the Society, and vote at the election of Officers and Board of Management. Twenty-five Dollars given by one person at one time, or in instalments during the year, shall constitute a Life-membership.

# ART. IV.—OFFICERS.

The Officers shall consist of a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer, to be elected from among the members at the Annual Meeting.

# ART. V.—COMMITTEE.

A Committee of - ladies shall be appointed annually, who, with the Officers, shall constitute an Executive Committee, who shall conduct the affairs of the Auxiliary during the year.

# ART. VI .- ANNUAL MEETING.

An Annual Meeting shall be held in the month of September, at which the reports of the Secretary and Treasurer shall be presented, an abstract of which is to be forwarded immediately to the Secretary of that Branch of the Woman's Missionary Society to which the Auxiliary belongs; Officers and Committee elected for the ensuing year, and such services held as may tend to promote the objects of the Society.

#### ART. VII .- FUNDS.

The funds of this Society shall be derived from membership fees, the proceeds of missionary socials, sewing circles, or the like, and from voluntary donations by friends.

# ART. VIII.—APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS.

After meeting necessary local expenses, the funds raised by the Auxiliary shall be transmitted quarterly to the Branch Treasurer, to be applied to the support of such part of the work as the Central Board of Management may indicate.

Note —Any Auxiliary having a preference for any special department of the work is at liberty to designate it.

#### By-Laws for Auxiliaries.

1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all the meetings of the Society, and to supervise its general interests. She shall call special meetings upon the request of three members, and shall be ex officio a member of all Standing Committees. She shall sign all drafts upon the Treasury before they are paid.

2. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Presidents to perform the duties of the President in the absence of that officer, and to aid in devising means for the efficiency of the Society.

3. The Recording Secretary shall keep a fair record of the proceedings at all meetings of the Society or Committee, and give proper notice of all special and stated meetings.

4. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to report quarterly to the Corresponding Secretary of the Branch the number of members, the amount sent to the Branch Treasurer for the quarter, and any other items indicating the state of the Society. She shall, in connection with the Recording Secretary, prepare the Annual Report.

5. The Treasurer shall receive, hold and keep an account of all money given to the Auxiliary, and shall transmit the same quarterly to the Branch Treasurer, not later than the 20th of the month.

6. Meetings of the Society for prayer and business shall be held —— of each month. Once a quarter, if practicable, a public meeting shall be held, in which reports shall be read, addresses given, and every effort made to increase general missionary intelligence and zeal, as well as earnestness in the special work of the Society.

7. There shall be a Standing Committee of three or more to provide literary exercises of a missionary character for monthly and quarterly meetings.

8. If an office becomes vacant by death, resignation, or removal, it must be filled by the appointment of the Executive Committee, until the next Annual Meeting.

9. Each lady connected with this Society shall try to induce others to become members, and shall do what she can to add to the general interest, remembering in prayer daily the Society, its workers, missionaries, orphans, or other special interests.

10. At the Annual Meeting of each Auxiliary in September, or such other meeting as may be most convenient, delegates to the Branch Annual Meeting shall be elected in the proportion of one for every Auxiliary numbering twenty-five or under, and two for every Auxiliary numbering fifty or more.

11. A lady shall be appointed in each Auxiliary to obtain sub-

scribers for the Outlook.

# MISSION BANDS.

1. An association of young people, banded together to aid the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church, shall be called a Mission Band Auxiliary to the Missionary Society of the church in which it is found, or to the Branch in whose territory it is.

2. Any one may become a member of the Mission Band by the annual payment of twenty-five cents, and may become a life member

thereof by the payment of five dollars.

3. The Officers of a Band shall be a President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually.

4. The duty of the President shall be to preside at all stated meetings, and to have a general oversight of the work of the Band.

- 5. The duty of the Secretary shall be to keep a record of the proceedings of the Band, and make an annual report to the Missionary Society to which it is auxiliary, or to the Branch in whose bounds it is.
- 6. The Treasurer shall receive and hold all funds, paying the same annually to the Treasurer of the Auxiliary or the Branch in which the Band is formed.
- 7. Each Mission Band must select an appropriate name not already in use, and report the same to the Society to which its money is sent.
- 8. Any Mission Band numbering forty members or over shall be entitled to one representative at the Branch Annual Meeting, but she shall not be eligible to any office in the Branch, or election to the Board of Managers, except she be a member of an Auxiliary.

# REQUIREMENTS FOR MISSIONARY CANDIDATES.

- 1. A missionary candidate must believe herself divinely called to the work of a foreign missionary, and assert her belief that she is actuated only by a desire to work in accordance with God's will.
- 2. She must here indicate her ability to work in a foreign field by Christian usefulness at home.
- 3. She must declare her intention to make foreign missionary work the service of her effective years, and agree to give at least five of these years of continuous service, as a single woman, to the work of the Woman's Missionary Society, unless prevented by ill health; she must also assert her willingness to labor in any field, though her preference is always to be taken into account.
- 4. She must furnish satisfactory testimonials in regard to scholarship, and we regard some experience in teaching and a knowledge of medicine and nursing as desirable qualifications.
- 5. The age of a candidate must not be less than twenty two years, nor more than thirty. A thorough intellectual training, with a facility in acquiring languages, and a remarkable ability for Christian work, may be considered as a sufficient reason for deviation from this rule.
- 6. Financial and executive ability, and power of adaptation to circumstances, are essential qualifications.
- 7. She must present a certificate of health from a competent physician, and give satisfactory answers to the medical questions.

3. Have you any experimental knowledge of salvation through the atonement of Jesus Christ our Lord?

4. Have you an earnest desire to win souls to Christ, and how has this desire been manifest in the past?

5. Do you believe in the doctrines of the Methodist Church, as set forth in the Book of Discipline of said Church?

6. Have you a thorough English education?

7. Have you studied Latin or any modern language; what proficiency have you made, and do you readily acquire the same?

8. In what schools have you taught, and with what success?

9. Have you a knowledge of music, either vocal or instrumental?

10. What is the condition of your health?

11. Have you ever been married? If so, is your husband living?

12. Will you answer by testimonials to each of these questions?
