Famous Emerson-Crocket Case Taken Up at York County Circuit Court This Morning—Judge Landry's Charge to Jury Favors a True Bill.

HOW KINGSLEY REACHED THE TOP OF THE LADDER

He Clinched His Job in the New York Life by Marrying John A. McCall's Daughter--Now He is Head of the Company.

New York, June 17--Another of the queer things brought about by the "whirligig of time" was the election today of Darwin Pearl Kingsley to the presidency of the New York Life Insurance Company.
Twenty-two years ago Kingsley went to work for the New York Life and became inspector of agencies in New England. He was transferred a few years later to the home office in New York, and came under the attention of John A. McCall, who was just beginning to be the great power in the company. McCall made him superintendent of agencies. Kingsley clinched his position after McCall had become president and undisputed king of the great corporation, by laying siege to the heart and affections of McCall's daughter. On December 3, 1885, the marriage of Miss Josephine McCall to Darwin Pearl Kingsley was celebrated.

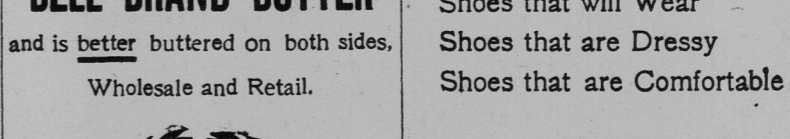

**MAKE ALL THE HOBOES WORK IS THE SOLUTION OF PROBLEM**

Interesting Paper on the Tramp Nuisance and How to Fight it Read Before Charities and Correction Conference in Minneapolis.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 17.—At the national conference of Charities and Correction held on Tuesday of this week here, the principal address was delivered by Orlando P. Lewis, superintendent of the Joint Application Bureau of Charity Organization Society of New York. "What Tramps Cost," was the subject of the paper read by Mr. Lewis, who said in part: "Our present methods of treating tramps err in being neither sufficiently repressive to the vagrant by intention nor sufficient to the accidental wayfarer. To attack vagrancy effectively, the main principles of a consistent programme must be followed by all communities. Preventive measures must be based on two principles; first, that the able-bodied vagrant must work for what he receives, and second, that the punishment for intentional vagrancy must be so severe and so conspicuous as to act as a strong deterrent. Vagrants can be divided into the employable and the unemployable. The employable are in two groups, accidental vagrants and habitual vagrants. Works should be available for the able-bodied vagrant; habitual vagrants, those idle by intention, need extended punitive and penal treatment. The unemployable, composed of the hopelessly incapable and the incurable should have permanent care in asylums or almshouses. "The moving on" of arrested vagrants should cease. Vagrants should be sentenced to hard labor. In many instances the county jail or workhouse is a kind of water vacation resort for tramps. Towns lodging vagrants should provide for them a separate house, or if they are lodged in the almshouse, separate and distinct quarters. Massachusetts reduced by this means the number of vagrants lodged in almshouses in 1905 nearly 50 per cent and the number lodged by towns more than ninety per cent. "The number of tramps killed annually on American railroads exceeds the combined deaths of passengers and trainmen. From 1901 to 1905, inclusive, 23,694 tramps were injured. From one-half to three-quarters of the tramps were vagrants. The annual total shows no signs of decreasing. The cost to railroads of such injuries and deaths is often considerable. Hospital and burial charges are often paid by the railroads, towns being unwilling to assume such expenses. The cumulative cost to society from injured vagrants cannot be estimated, but is evidently enormous. Few railroad systems maintain systematic railroad policing. The Pennsylvania Railroad, with efficient policing, reports that the 900 vagrants arrested in 1906 were but a small part of the total number of vagrants constantly travelling over the road. Police work in each state should be carried on vigorously against vagrants by four co-operating agencies: railroad police, special state police officers, town police, and, in cities, special mendicancy police officers. In cities troubled with beggars there should be at least one special mendicancy officer in plain clothes. "The mendicancy squad of the New York Charity Organization Society in fifteen months in 1904 and 1905 arrested 1863 beggars. The entire police force of Greater New York,

**IS NOW SURE OF VALLEY ROUTE**  
Dr. Pugsley Has no Doubt the Line Will be Built.

Hon. William Pugsley, who returned from Montreal yesterday, when asked as to the proposed St. John Valley Railway said he understood the report of Mr. Stewart, the engineer who recently made the flying survey, had just been completed, and was now being considered by McKenzie and Mann. He had no doubt whatever, he added, that the line would be built. Referring to the work on the G. I. P. he said, construction would be commenced at both ends of the Moncton-Chipman section immediately after June 25. With regard to cold storage matters he said St. John would soon have a large cold storage plant in operation. Sussex already had one and Woodstock was about to have one erected. The provincial government had agreed to give assistance to both. The St. John plant would be very much larger than either of these. The policy of the provincial government as announced at the last session was to give a bonus for a period of years based on the cost of the warehouse, which in no case was to be less than \$15,000. In the case of St. John, the legislature authorized aid in an alternative by providing for a guarantee of the principal and interest of the bonds of a company to the amount of 75 per cent on the cost.





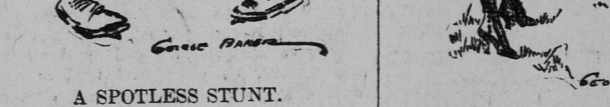

FAVOR CONTINUING THE PRESENT SYSTEM

Some of the Aldermen Would Let Public Works Administration Remain as at Present Until End of Year.

Although the meeting of the board of works which has been called for tonight is announced to be for the purpose of considering what steps will be taken to restore Union street, there seems to be more interest in the matter of what will be done to fill the position of director made vacant by the dismissal of R. H. Cushing.

The names of Engineer Hunter and F. W. Holt are mentioned prominently as successors to the position it is unlikely that any definite steps will be taken for some time. Several of the aldermen who were seen today were in favor of allowing matters to remain as at present under the charge of Alderman McGoldrick and Engineer Peters, until the first of the year when a readjustment of the city's officials will likely be made.

It is probable that the plans of ex-director Cushing for the restoration of Union street will be adopted and the work carried out.

REACHING FOR INDUSTRIES

Fredericton Ready to Make Concessions to New Manufacturers.

FREDERICTON, N. B., June 18 (Special)—The city council held an informal meeting last evening and dealt with the application of Alex. Dunbar & Sons Ltd. of Woodstock, for certain concessions in case they should decide to remove their industry to this city and amalgamate with MacFarlane Thompson & Anderson. It was decided to grant them exemption from taxation on the increased valuation in case the amalgamation is carried out and free water for twenty years. In regard to the application of Donald Fraser & Sons for exemption from taxation and a free siding on the mill, a committee was appointed to ascertain the probable cost of the right of way.

It was decided to grant the prayer of the petition of the Scott Lumber Company and John A. Morrison for water extension to their mills, provided it can be shown that sufficient revenue can be derived to pay the interest on the cost of outlay.

ALL BRIDAL PARTY ON ROLLER SKATES

Even the Minister and Thousand Spectators on Wheels at Odd New York Ceremony
