London, Nov. 14-The Germans met with a complete deefat at the hands of the British yesterday in Flanders. The war office so reports. An attempt to recapture the ground recently won by the British near Passchendaele was re-

Following upon the increased activity of their artillery already noted, the Germans yesterday afternoon attacked the positions held by our troops on the high ground north of Passchendaele. The attack was repulsed completely. "There is nothing further to report."

Paris, Nov. 14-"The artillery was very active last night on the right bank of the Meuse," says today's official communication. "French detachments made a number of successful raids, particularly southeast of St. Quentin east of Sap-
