Halifax, N. S., Dec. 17—The British steamer Manchester Hero, from Manchester for St. John, N. B., is sending out distress signals by wireless. Radiograms received here from the steamer give her position at latitude 44.15 north, longitude 63.14 west, which is about sixty miles south of Halifax, and add that the ship is not under control.

Curling, Nfid., Dec. 17—The passengers and crew of the coastal steamer Ethie, numbering ninety-two, were crought ashore on a life line run out from the ship by a Newfoundland dog on Martin's Point. Boats could not make the hazardous passage from the stranded steamer. An effort to shoot the line ashore failed when the line became caught. Men did not dare attempt the trip through the waters and so the dog was put overboard.

Directed by officers of the ship, the animal succeeded in releasing the rope and, holding it tightly in his teeth, fought his way through the breakers to the shore. With block and tackle, the ship's crew, aided by fishermen on the shore, rigged a life saving device, using a boatswain's chair for a carriage. One by one in this chair ninety-one of the ninety-two persons aboard were hauled to safety. A baby, eighteen months old, was pulled ashore in a mail

The Ethie, which had been engaged in the coastal service between Curling and Labrador ports, went ashore on last Wednesday during a gale while bound south. The wreck was not reported here until the shipwrecked passengers and crew arrived from Bonne Bay, all wires having gone down in the storm.

of provocation in Ireland were the result of a plot to prevent the settlement of the Irish question and reconciliation of the Irish people. He implored the house to realize the tragedy of this mad policy.

Mr. Adamson, Labor leader, associating the Labor party with the motion, declared that, while his party had no sympathy with the serious crimes perpetrated in Ireland, they believed that the government's resort to methods of repression had a close connection with these crimes.

Mr. O'Connor's motion for adjournment was defeated, 161 to 55.







### U. S. GOVERNMENT PLANS TO HAVE AIR POLICE FORCE

To Be Under Supervision of Secretary of Commerce—President's Special Board Prepares Legislation.

Washington, Dec. 17—Regulation of air navigation in the United States by an inter-departmental board whose rules would be enforced by the secretary of commerce is proposed in a bill to be presented to congress by the special board appointed by the president last October to draught some form of regulatory legislation. The board is comprised of representatives of the war, navy, post office and commerce departments.

The proposed board would be authorized to promulgate regulations for air navigation, including eshablishment of minimum altitudes for flight over cities, of prohibited zones in the vicinity of military establishments, and the setting up of proper service and signalling systems to promote and facilitate commercial flying especially.

Pilots and crews of aircraft would be licensed by the department under requirements prescribed by the board, with revocation of license and other penalties provided for violation of rules. The primary design of the proposed regulation, it was said, is to promote the safety of the flier and the public as well.

The preparation of this aerial police force, which will virtually have control of the air, marks the first step toward government regulation of air traffic. They will presumably have jurisdiction over arrivals and departures of machines from foreign ports, control of customs and detection of air smugglers. Enforcement of inter-state commerce air laws will be in their hands as well.

AYRSHIRE CATTLE SENT TO BELGIUM

Will Be Completely Separated from British Herds Imported by Commission.

Some time ago the Ayrshire Cattle Herd Book Society decided to organize gifts of Ayrshire cattle for the purpose f restocking the devastated regions in Belgium, and for that purpose they beame affiliated with the Scottish Agricultural Committee for the Relief of Allies. Through that committee a special listrict in Belgium, close to the Yser front, and situated between the towns of Nieuport, Furnes and Dixmude, was allocated to them. It is said to be suitable for the grazing of cattle and suitable for the grazing of cattle and the farmers there have already had experience in dairying and stock breeding. The Ayrshire breed will be completely separated from other British breeds imported by the commission, and the chance of crossing will thus be eliminated as far as possible. The committee of the Ayrshire Cattle Herd Book Society made an appeal to their members wherever resident, and they joined up in Ayrshire with a general committee of farmers appointed for a similar purpose. At a meeting held in Ayr it was reported that thirty-four Ayrshire cattle and several pigs and sheep had been promised, and that a sum of £900 had already been paid or promised to the fund. Further subscriptions are to be obtained. In addition a sum of £1,000 had formerly been subscribed by farmobtained. In addition a sum of £1,000 had formerly been subscribed by farmers in the Kilmarnock Mariet for the purpose of restocking Belgium, and a committee is now engaged buying Ayrshire cattle out of that fund.




