## COMB SAGE TEA IN HAIR TO DARKEN IT

It's Grandmother's Recipe to Keep Her Locks Dark, Glossy, Thick

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## NORWAY ICE CROP

Primitive Methods of Cutting and Storing the Frozen Harvest

The methods used to secure the ice harvest in Norway are primitive. To begin with, the ice lake is cut up by means of a small plow, drawn by a pony. Two long cuts, with a space of 28 inches between them, are made along the lake, and then men armed with huge axes cut the strip of ice thus separated into blocks, each 28 inches square.

The next step is to take the blocks of ice to the storerooms, at which the ice ships can call. The first stage of the journey is simple enough. The ice harvesters have already cut a channel in the lake. Could anything be easier than pushing the blocks of ice along the channel so made? This, of course, is not the case. The blocks are first reloaded, from which point they are in position for the final journey overland.

These slippings remind one irresistibly of the modern switchback railways. The ice blocks are allowed to slide down a set of very rough and ready wooden lines hemmed in with wooden railings so that the blocks shall not slip away and be lost. TILL BRIDE AGREES TO SAY SHE'LL OBEY

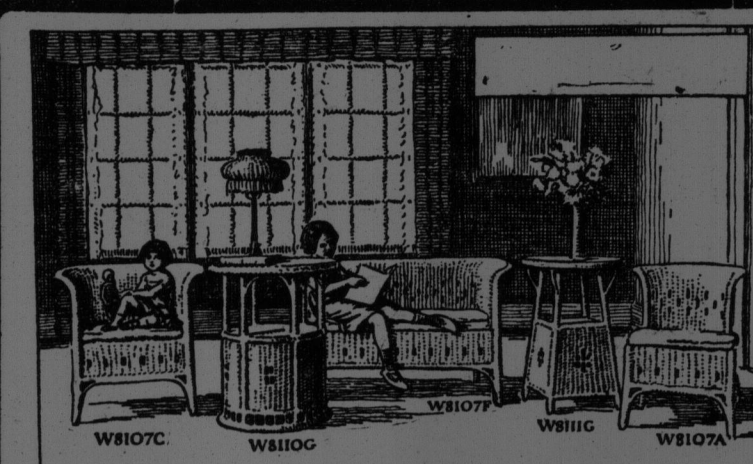

## CANADA TO HAVE VISIT FROM BROTHER OF QUEEN

Ottawa, Feb. 24.—The report from London some time ago that his Royal Highness Prince Alexander of Teck, Canada's summer with Lord Brooke and command a cavalry brigade, either at Petawawa or the Seville camp in Manitoba, is confirmed by Col. the Hon. 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## Daily Hints For the Cook

**Pancakes**  
One cup of sugar, 1 cup of sweet milk, 1 large or 2 small eggs, 1 teaspoon of cream of tartar, 1-2 teaspoon of soda. Add a little nutmeg and salt. Beat well, add flour to make a stiff batter. Drop with a spoon into boiling fat. We use to eat them with lemon juice and sugar, and sometimes with sirup.

**Cream Puffs**  
One cup of boiling water, 1-2 cup of butter. When boiling briskly stir in 1 heaping cup of sifted flour, stirring until there is no dry flour. Take from the fire and stir in 3 eggs which have been beaten. Drop by tablespoons into buttered tins with quite a space between and bake in medium oven 1-2 hour. 1 soft four into cup and keep it high, as it will stay on when sifted. One-fourth of a pound of butter makes 1-2 cup. Filling—One-half cup of milk, heated in double boiler (1 put dish in pan of water). Mix 3-4 cup of sugar, 2 heaping tablespoons of flour and 1 egg together and stir into hot milk until it thickens. When puffs and filling are cool cut a



**As to Future of Lancaster**

Opportunity There, Now Rests With The People

NATURE HAS DONE MUCH

A Talk With George S. Miller, Engineer, Contains Some Practical Suggestions—This in the Time For Proper Planning

In an interview yesterday with George S. Miller, supervising engineer of the Canadian Consolidated Lumber Co. of Montreal, the Times asked his opinion as to the future of Lancaster and his remarks are worthy the perusal of all interested in that community, coming as they do from an expert source.

It depends principally upon what you make of the opportunities which lie before you. Nature has done everything for you and man little or nothing, so far as I can see from present conditions, that you will grow at an extremely good rate is without doubt, due to economic pressure within the city of St. John. The natural outlet, but whether you grow beautiful and become one of the most desirable places to dwell in, depends entirely upon the energy and foresight of the citizens in planning its development while the opportunity exists.

Consulting a chart of the City of St. John which was made up by him to show the physical characteristics of St. John and vicinity, Mr. Miller gave the following explanation of certain features that development depends principally upon.

Taking areas of mile circles about the court house in the city, it is readily noticeable that a large proportion of the available space within the different radii is occupied by water, since the entire southern portion is occupied by the Bay of Fundy, and the northern portion by South Bay and the St. John river. The peninsula upon which St. John proper is situated, extends to nearly its limit, which leaves only the territory to East, West and North, for future growth and expansion. The portion is already occupied by parks, cemeteries, etc., that are not available for use. Upon considering the relatively small portion of area which remains from a development point of view and expenditure of money, the territory to the north might as well be considered beyond development at present, except in a few small districts, for it would be extremely expensive to put it in shape for such purposes on account of the irregularity of the territory and the high cost of construction in rock, and since human life is more valuable than the spreading out will occur in an easterly and westerly direction.

As President Lowell has suggested in urging the freshmen dormitories, the recreations of youth lose their danger when they are associated with one's normal conditions and relationships; they become ominous when they have to be sought apart from the normal way of life. It is precisely so with young people everywhere. Some of the best social service of today is being rendered by residents of settlements, who enter wholeheartedly with young working people into a really vital programme of enjoyment within the immediate circle of neighborhood acquaintance. These leaders thus acquire an authority from within which enables them, with full and free consent, to establish a better standard, and a still better, for social custom and for personal behavior.

BROKEN PLEDGES  
CHIEF FEATURE  
OF HIS RECORD

Premier Borden Scored by Liberal  
Chieftain For Failure to Fulfill  
Pre-Election Promises

Ottawa, Feb. 23.—The premier and other government men had a hard time of it today trying to explain away the ministry's failure to make good Mr. Borden's pre-election pledges to transfer the natural resources of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta to provincial control.

For the most part the "explanation" consisted of quotations from former Liberal speeches and comments upon them, both made for the purpose of showing that the late government had not favored the policy to which Mr. Borden had pledged himself specifically and repeatedly when in opposition. It was another of the many government explanations which do not explain.

The matter was brought up by W. A. Buchanan, the Liberal member for Medicine Hat. He reminded the government of the premier's pledge and of the utter failure of the cabinet to make a single move so far toward the redemption of it.

Premier Borden, plainly nettled by Mr. Buchanan's comment, spoke with considerable warmth. It was significant, however, that he made no plain statement as to why he had failed to make good his word. Nor did he hold out to the people of the west much prospect of any early government action looking toward the fulfillment of the promises he made when seeking votes as opposition leader. Instead, he stated positively that it is manifest that the proposal of Premier Roblin, Premier Scott and Premier Sifton that the resources be transferred to the provinces and compensation now paid, in lieu of lands, be paid as compensation for lands alienated "cannot be entertained."

Some of the prime minister's slickness are coming home to roost and he is having difficulty to find a place for these troublesome birds," said Sir Wilfrid Laurier, amid general laughter, as he began his reply to the premier.

Continuing, Sir Wilfrid reviewed Mr. Borden's course since he took office in the election of 1911. Sir Wilfrid went on to state that the question of the west and stated in language as emphatic as he could make it that if the "conservative party was returned to office the lands would be handed over to the provinces, that the men of the provinces were free men, that it was their right to have the administration of those lands which properly belonged to them. Radium; Its Discovery and Its Properties

(Manchester Guardian Correspondence)  
Among the marvels of discovery which distinguished the closing years of last century that of radio-activity stands unrivaled in interest and importance, since it has completely revolutionized our conceptions of physics and chemistry, especially as regards the relationship between electricity and matter, and although the atomic theory of matter remains, yet the atom must now be regarded not as the indivisible ultimate unit of matter, but as an exceedingly complex aggregate of smaller bodies.

The discovery of radium itself in 1898 by Madame Curie was no more product of chance than was the logical outcome of Röntgen's discovery of the X-rays in 1895, and of Becquerel's discovery of radio-activity in 1896. Bequerel found that uranium salts sent on photographic plates without the aid of sunlight, so that there could be no question of phosphorescence. Many other elements were found to possess the same properties, and then Madame Curie set herself to measure the radio-activity of a large number of substances as a thesis for her degree. She soon discovered that certain salts were more active than uranium itself, and with the generous assistance of the Austrian government, who gave her a large quantity of pitch-blende from the Joachimsthal mine, she was finally able to isolate small quantities of the salts of a new element which she called radium.

It should be noted that although pure metallic radium has been obtained, it is in one or other of the salts of radium—radium-chloride, radium sulphate, or most commonly of radium bromide—that it is made use of and not the pure metal. All these salts and all other radio-active bodies in varying degrees possess certain peculiar properties. In the first place they give off heat, and this heat is always about 5 degrees centigrade above that of the surrounding air. Radio-active bodies also set up fluorescence in various substances, such as zinc sulphide, and Sir Wm Crookes has devised a very simple instrument, the Spintheroscope, for observing these effects.

Radio-active substances also set up photographic plates, and this property has already stated, led to their discovery, in medicine it is of great interest in their properties.

New Orleans, La., Feb. 23.—Directors of the Louisiana Leper Home believe a cure for leprosy has been discovered. In this report to the board of control of the leper home, Dr. Ralph Hopkins states that the serum he is now using is the most satisfactory he has tried, and nine patients were discharged as cured some time ago and others are improving. It is a vaccine from the bacteria of erysipelas. He also stated that the patients sometimes cannot assimilate the oil, but in several instances it has proven efficacious.

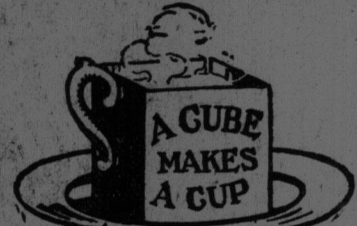

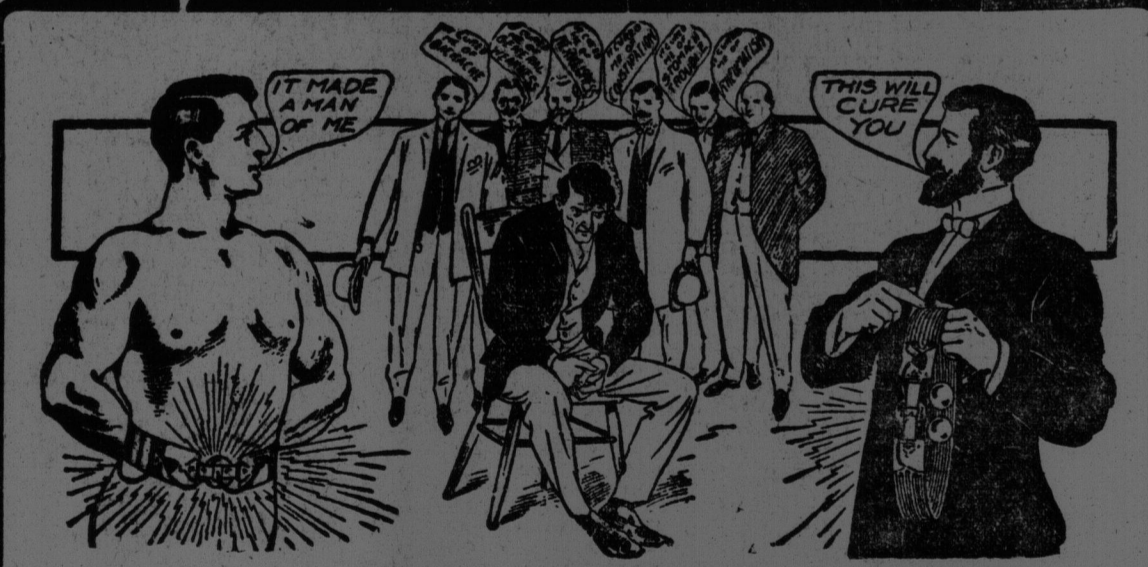

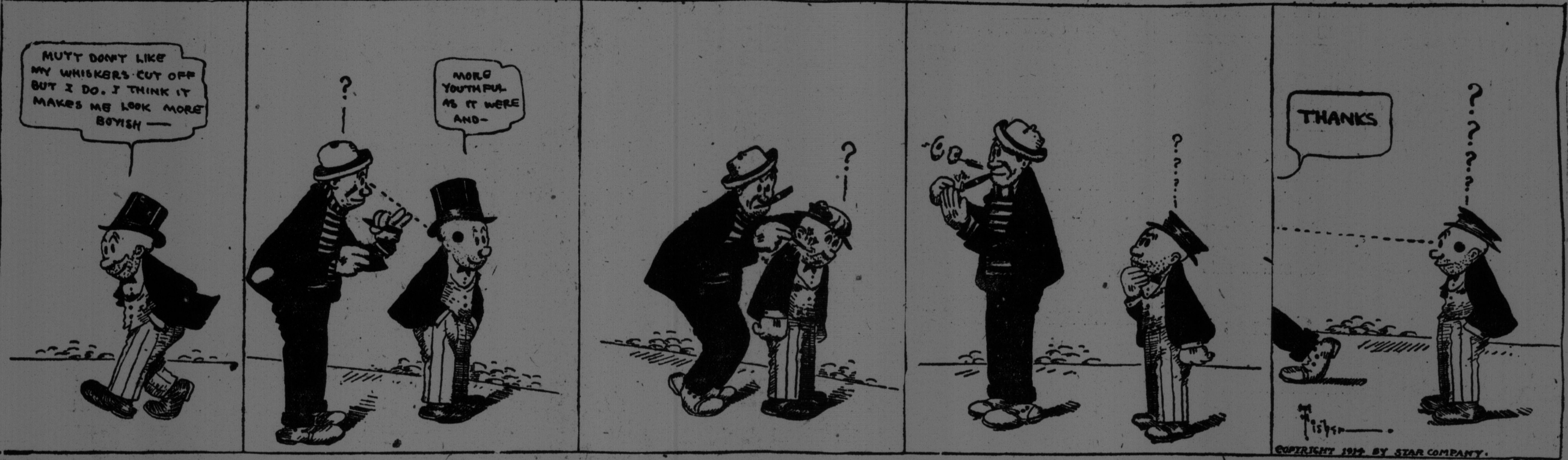

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Four Fingers Missing But He Is Back In Ring Again

Milwaukee, Feb. 22—Willie Hoppe, the little Pacific coast boxer, who lost two fingers of each hand in an explosion of a toy cannon on last Fourth of July, made a comeback in the fight game a few nights ago when he fought Soli Salvador, a four-pounder, at Sacramento, Cal. Hoppe won a four-round decision and displayed enough ability with four fingers missing to entitle him to another try at the game.

This recalls the fact that Joe Walcott, a noted colored giant killer, fought after having part of his hand shot away in a mix-up in Boston some years ago. Joe retired for a time, but later got into the game and was matched with Jack Dougherty, a Milwaukee welterweight. This was on July 10, 1906, and the fight took place in Chelsea, Mass. For several rounds Doherty beat Walcott and was making a great showing, but in the eighth Joe put over his right to the jaw and Jack went to sleep for several minutes.

Frank Mullock, a Milwaukee newspaper millionaire of those days, was with Jack and he happened to be in Walcott's corner when the gloves were taken off. Then he noticed that Joe had a big leather pad to fit his hand and it was as hard as a piece of iron. No wonder poor Jack took the count when Joe landed with the leather mallet.

In a recent article Hugh Pullerton of Chicago pointed out that while Chicago fans would like to put a boxing bill on the legislature, they would never stand for such a bill as is now operating in Wisconsin. The writer points out that some boxers have not been paid for contests in which they took part and that the commission has picked out certain boxes to vent their spite against, meaning the action in suspending Peckey McFarland for a year.

The Wisconsin bill is all right and will work out to the satisfaction of every one if given a proper chance. Many laws have been passed and found wanting at first, but have come out all right. For a moment the terse editorial instructions puzzled me, until I was suddenly reminded that London has just been invaded by a community of a hundred of the smallest people in the world, whose singing, dancing, scrobatic feats, and skilful training of the Lilliputian animals are attracting huge crowds to the London Opera House.

The task seemed to present no difficulty, but I quickly learned that diplomacy must be exercised in approaching these little people, who have come from all parts of the European Continent—Russia, Germany, France, Hungary, Austria, and Italy.

Sensitiveness is out of their chief characteristics. To regard them as children is to draw attention to their lack of stature and to give offence. One must forget that they are real men and women, clever, quick-witted, humorous, and, above all, in the majority of cases, perfectly formed. The ladies indeed are just beautiful dolls.

"Ah, monsieur," laughingly said Mile. Felicy, who dances the Tango and sings "Hilichy-Kool" in a manner that has made her the darling of every audience, when I complimented her upon her charm and vivacity. "I am pleased with your remarks. I like you Englishmen. I have several big sweethearts in London, who, in spite of her twenty-two years, is only 2ft. 6in. in height, talking of her illness in my life. CAMPBELL CASE IN COURT TODAY

Matter of Alleged Theft of Liquor in C. P. R. Shed—Appeal From City Court

The case of the King vs. George Campbell was taken up this morning before Judge Forbes and the following jury:—R. E. Bates, W. B. McDonough, William B. Hatfield, Chas. Dummer, Thomas Ogger, Ralph M. Parker, Thomas E. Dillon, Joseph Higgins, J. A. Stevenson, T. E. Leary, James Craig and J. A. Brown. Campbell was indicted on the charge of stealing a bottle of Canadian Club whisky from the C. P. R. or receiving the same, knowing it to have been stolen. Edward G. Mondy, Thomas J. Conroy, Bartholomew Yorgain, William H. Snider and Joseph Amberg gave evidence for the prosecution. The defendant, Rev. W. R. Robinson, Hugh McGill and Charles Sweet gave evidence for the defendant, closing the case. J. A. Barry addressed the jury in behalf of the defence, and A. A. Wilson, K.C., for the crown. The court adjourned until this afternoon, when the judge's charge will be given. The case of the King vs. W. P. McFadane, will be taken up this afternoon. Case From City Court

In the case of the National Life Insurance Company vs. Jacob W. Campbell, Judge Forbes reversed the finding of the city court judge and ordered a verdict for the plaintiff for the amount claimed and costs of city court judgment and review. In this case a note was given for the payment of a premium due on a life insurance policy, extending the time for payment, eight days. When the note was not paid the policy was cancelled and suit was brought to recover the amount of the note. It was argued for the defence that the policy having been cancelled, there was no consideration for the note. His Honor held that the extension of time was a valid consideration, and reversed the original judgment as above. Mr. E. C. Weyman appeared for the plaintiff, and James E. Cowan for the defendant.

HOPE STEAMER SIGHTED AT MOUTH OF BAY IS THE OVERDUE KADUNA

Twenty-eight days and still no word of the South African liner Kaduna. A vessel sighted from Brier Island this morning and supposed to be the Bengore Head, is thought by the agents to be the Kaduna, as the Bengore Head was to call at Halifax on her way to St. John and has not yet arrived at the Nova Scotia port. The arrival of the steamer which passes Brier Island will settle the question conclusively.

NEWS OF UNEXPECTED DEATH OF MOTHER COMES TO MRS. A. J. ARCHIBALD

Sad news, and unexpected, came to the home of Mrs. A. J. Archibald, pastor of the Charlotte street Baptist church, West End, in a telegram from Chester, N. S., announcing the death of Mrs. Archibald's mother, Mrs. Lucinda Oxner, there. As there had been no word that she had been ill, and as no particulars were contained in the telegram, it is believed that her death was sudden. Mrs. Oxner was about seventy years of age, and is survived by six children. Not only in West St. John, but throughout the city there will be deep sympathy for Mrs. Archibald in her great loss. She and her husband left for Chester on the Halifax train today and expect to return on Saturday.

COMPLAINTS TO WASHINGTON

Rev. Mr. Robinson Not Pleased With Immigration Official's Action

Rev. W. R. Robinson said this morning that an official of the U. S. Immigration department here was insolent to him in the railway depot yesterday and as a consequence he has notified the immigration department at Washington and has demanded an apology. Mr. Robinson said he was sitting in the depot with a woman he was to see away on the train when the official demanded to see her ticket. The woman was not going into the United States and Mr. Robinson told the official that it was not his business where she was going. Mr. Robinson says that the officer roughly pushed him aside and he demanded of the woman that she show her ticket.

FAIRVILLE NEWS

This morning, owing to an accident to the overhead trolley wire, Fairville passengers were obliged to transfer at the foot of the village to the Carleton line by means of which they were carried to the bridge. Notice in yesterday's paper that the St. John Railway Company were installing the illuminated sign system on the St. John city service was read by Lancaster residents with satisfaction. They feel that there is great need for this improved equipment on the West End and Fairville cars, where pedestrians have to cross a cold bridge and remain in almost an equally cold waiting room until the car they have just missed arrives.

There is no distinguishing mark at present and passengers frequently run the bridge without need, and take their leisure when their car reaches the cars were fitted with electric announcements of destination, particularly these cold nights, would greatly benefit.
