NOT INTIMATES AID FOR LUMBERMEN

POSSIBLE THAT
CHANGE MADE IN
SCALING POLICY

Matter Has Already
Received Attention
Of Cabinet

TO INVESTIGATE

Government Ready to Assist in
Effort to Secure New
Markets

THAT some action may be taken by the Government of New Brunswick to assist the lumbermen of the province in the present trying period was gathered today from an interview given by Hon. P. J. Veniot, Premier, who is in Saint John. Reference was made to a possible change in scaling policy and also to action on the stumpage if the market conditions continue as at present.

SCALING SYSTEM

"I read with considerable interest," Hon. Dr. Veniot said, "a report of the discussion that took place at the meeting of the lumbermen here yesterday and I wish to say that the matter of the serious competition they are meeting in the lumber markets of the world, particularly the United States, has already engaged the attention of the Government. The matter was considered fully at our last meeting and we have decided to investigate thoroughly into market conditions with a view to ascertaining what could be done to help out our lumbermen. Among other matters, we discussed the adoption of a new system of scaling, such as is in vogue in the Province of Quebec."

STUMPAGE

Asked concerning stumpage rates, Premier Veniot said that the date on which this is fixed annually is August 1. While no definite decision was taken at the last meeting of the Government, he said, it was hoped that something along the lines of regulating the stumpage rates would take place before August 1. He declared that if market conditions continued as they were at present, he felt that the scaling of the important industry of the province something of a tangible nature should be done to assist it.

LUMBERMEN'S CASE

In the discussion referred to by Premier Veniot the lumbermen yesterday set forth the conditions of the business in New Brunswick and compared the operation of the crown lands in New Brunswick with that of Quebec and Ontario. The stumpage on spruce was \$4 a thousand here while in Quebec the amount charged by the government was \$2.70 a thousand and in Ontario only \$2. The scaling in Quebec, he said, was more favorable to the lumbermen than in New Brunswick.

The lumbermen sought the aid of the Board of Trade in having the government reduce the stumpage rate and also be more generous in the scaling.

U. S. COAST RUM BLOCKADE IS BIG SUCCESS

State Welcome Is Extended To Canadian Canoeist on His Arrival In Rome; Given Medal

Canadian Press Cable via Reuters. ROME, May 7.—Official Italy was represented yesterday afternoon, at the meeting to George H. Smyth, Canadian canoeist, when he completed his paddling trip from London to the Italian capital. The government was represented by the Minister of War and the Minister of Naval Affairs, while the mayor of Rome found time from his many duties to attend and present the Canadian with a gold medal. Mayors of Municipalities in the vicinity also attended as well as officials of aquatic clubs. Smyth's entry into Rome by way of the Tiber, was in the nature of a triumph. He was accompanied by hundreds of canoeists, who joined him along the route, and when he reached his destination great crowds on the river banks cheered him wildly.

LEAGUE ASSEMBLY TO DEBATE PROTOCOL

Must Make Some Disposition of it After Great Britain's Rejection.

GENEVA, May 7.—On the agenda of the next League Assembly on September 7, first place is given to the question of arbitration, security and the reduction of armaments, which again comes up for discussion because of Great Britain's rejection of the Geneva peace protocol. The protocol itself will be debated and some disposition made of it.

47 DEAD, 150 HURT

Are French Losses in Battle With Rifis Who Suffer 10 Times as Much.

PARIS, May 7.—The Temps prints a telegram from Fez, not otherwise verified, giving the French losses in one recent engagement as four officers and 46 men killed and 150 wounded. This message says the Rifians' losses were ten times as heavy.

Winnipeg Tax Rate To Remain As At Present

WINNIPEG, May 7.—The tax rate will stand at 28-1-2 mills according to a decision of the finance committee yesterday. Fears had been expressed that the city would be unable to balance its budget, but new sources of revenue will be drawn upon to keep the rate at the present level.

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1000 VESSELS AND 13 AIRPLANES PATROL WATERS

Fifteen Liquor Vessels Reported In Jersey Fleet

ALL FOREIGNERS

Automobile Patrol Does Duty On Land Watching Beaches And Highways

NEW YORK, May 7.—A fleet of more than 1000 vessels, aided by 13 seaplanes, all a part of the great dry armada organized to crush rum-running, is patrolling the North Atlantic seaboard from Cape Cod to Cape May. Coast guardsmen at sea reported extraordinary success since the imposition of their blockade Tuesday.

Thirty-five vessels of this flotilla have put to sea from the local base, Stapleton, Staten Island, 25 represent the States Island base, 20 picket boats, operating from the Atlantic coast district base at Ashbury Park, constantly patrolling the North Jersey coast, while 52 swift patrol boats are lying in Inlet Harbor, Atlantic City, ready for action.

SOAP KING DEAD

LORD LEVERHULME IS DEAD IN LONDON

Multi-millionaire Soap Manufacturer, Started Career in Lowly Position.

LONDON, May 7.—Lord Leverhulme, who rose from a grocery assistant to become one of the leading industrial figures of the British Empire, died at 4:30 o'clock this morning. He had been ill from bronchitis only a few days, and died yesterday his condition did not cause great anxiety.

ATTEMPT MADE TO WRECK COAL MINE

Dynamite Blast Blows Away Transformers of Highland Mine in West Virginia.

FAIRMONT, W. Va., May 7.—A blast of dynamite late last night blew away the transformers of the Consolidated Coal Company, serving the company's Highland mine, but did not break a high tension power line serving other properties. State police believe it was an attempt to wreck the Francis and Victor mines.

TRIPLETS ARE BORN

Boy Dies, But Girls Are Doing Well in Windsor, Ont.

WINDSOR, Ont., May 7.—Triplets were born here to Mrs. Mary Jean Woolson yesterday. It is the first time in the history of Hotel Dieu, the hospital where the babies were ushered into the world, that such an event has taken place.

Whites Make Attack On Negroes In Oil Fields

ELDORADO, Ark., May 7.—Riot broke out in the oil fields, eight miles north of here, last night, when a band of 200 oil field workers marched upon a camp of 80 negroes brought for a reduction in armaments. Both sides were injured.

Arms Reduction To Be Ottawa Subject

LUXEMBURG, May 7.—The committee of the inter-parliamentary union, dealing with the question of reducing armaments, yesterday took cognizance of a detailed plan for the organization of demilitarization zones introduced by the German group. A Danish delegate presented a report on methods for a reduction in armaments. Both these reports will be discussed at the Washington and Ottawa conferences in October.

ONE STORM IS CALMED; OTHER STILL RAGING

U. S. Women Placated After Apparent Slight Yesterday

NEGROES PROTEST

Prepare Resolution For Women's Council Declaring Against Race Discrimination

WASHINGTON, May 7.—One of two squalls besetting the course of the International Council of Women, in convention here, appeared to be diminishing today, but the other displayed indications of renewing activity.

American patronesses of the convention, who because of a shortage of cards to White House tea for the delegates yesterday were left behind, found their names at the top of President Coolidge's visitor list today.

The arrangement was made when the 108 patronesses were reported as being slighted, and after consultation officials had explained that too few cards had been requested to provide for them.

Explosion Victims' Bodies Identified

PITTSBURGH, May 7.—Albert J. Jeremia yesterday identified the bodies of eight persons who were killed in an explosion at Swissvale, a suburb, early yesterday morning. All the victims of the blast were his relatives. The bodies were terribly burned, and identification in some instances, was possible only by teeth filings, rings or bits of clothing.

ADMIRAL OF THE FLEET WAS 54 YEARS IN NAVY

Has Visited Saint John On Several Occasions

RELATIVES HERE

Col. E. T. Sturdee Is Cousin—General Regret Expressed At His Death

LONDON, May 7.—Sir Doveton Sturdee, Admiral of the Fleet, who commanded the British squadron in the battle of Falkland Islands, in 1914, and later participated in the battle of Jutland, died today.

Admiral Sturdee had been ill for some time at his residence in Cambridge, Surrey, where his death occurred.

Entering the navy in 1871, he rose by successive stages to the rank of rear admiral in 1908 and was made a vice admiral just before the war began. He commanded the Anglo-American force in the Samoan troubles of 1898-99. A baronet was conferred on him in 1916.

WELL KNOWN HERE

Admiral Sturdee was a son of the late Captain Frederick Hankey Sturdee, Royal Navy, who was a brother of the late Henry P. Sturdee, father of Colonel E. T. Sturdee, of Saint John. He had visited Saint John a number of times, at one time while lieutenant in H. M. S. Belcheron and later on private visits to relatives and friends here.

The title will descend to his son, Commander Lionel D. Sturdee, who is at the present time attached to a torpedo ship in England.

Colonel Sturdee was greatly shocked by the death of his cousin as he had heard only recently that he was in good health and busy with the plans for the restoration of Nelson's Victory. Other friends of the late admiral also expressed great regret at the passing of one whom they regarded as in a certain sense one of their townsmen.

Violence Starts In N. S. Mine Strike

Besco Official Struck on Head With Stone When Pickets Surround Him.

GLACE BAY, May 7.—At the Reserve collieries numbers five and ten, United Mine Workers of America pickets were quite active this morning, and one resorted to violence.

A detachment of about 50 or 75 pickets turned back some nine clerical and surface officials, who were bound for the plant, to do maintenance work. P. E. Ogilvie, chief employment clerk for the British Empire Steel Corporation, protested against being interfered with. He was surrounded by pickets and one struck him on the back on the head with a rock or some other missile.

A nasty wound was inflicted. One of the arteries of the head had been severed. Mr. Ogilvie is taking legal action.

Work Also to be Continued
on Loch Lomond
Road

PREMIER SPEAKS OF
N. B. PUBLIC WORKS

Talks Also of Grand Falls—
Nothing on Cabinet
Reorganization.

Premier Veniot, in Saint John today, asked about the work of his own department of public works, said that an expenditure of between \$700,000 and \$800,000 on permanent and ordinary bridges was planned, with about \$350,000 for main trunk roads, and between \$300,000 and \$350,000 on secondary, branch and by-roads. He said that in the vicinity of 50 to 60 permanent new bridges would be built this year, for which tenders were being issued daily. In addition, work on 20 started last year will be completed this year. Included in the programme are the Tyne Creek bridge and the Mac's Bay bridge in Saint John county. The Premier also said that new work would be undertaken this year on the Loch Lomond road, this being a continuation of last year's work.

GRAND FALLS

Regarding the Grand Falls project, Hon. Dr. Veniot said he would leave for Montreal on May 13 to attend the session of the International Joint Waterways Commission, which will meet in Montreal on May 15 to consider the application of the province relative to the Grand Falls development. While in Montreal, the Premier said he would meet representatives of the International Pulp and Paper Company with respect to a settlement of the company's claim to property at Grand Falls. He declared that Hon. J. E. Michaud, Hon. Dr. E. A. Smith, chairman of the N. B. Electric Power Commission, J. D. P. Lewin, solicitor, and probably S. R. Weston, chief engineer, would also go to Montreal. G. C. Acres, Niagara Falls, consulting engineer of the commission, also will attend.

Asked regarding the personnel of the new Power Commission, Premier Veniot said he had no statement to make at present. Premier Veniot also declined to discuss matters in connection with the coming provincial elections and also regarding cabinet re-organization. Hon. Dr. Veniot will remain in the city tomorrow and then return to his home in Bathurst.

Irish Language Not
Popular in Army

LONDON, May 7.—The Morning Post's Dublin correspondent says that the Irish language is unpopular in the Free State army, was revealed yesterday in evidence given before the Gaeltacht commission. Col. P. O'Connor commanding what is known as the "Irish Speaking Battalion," testified that the battalion was much below strength, and said there was some feeling against the language on the part of some of the officers.

LONDON CHURCH HAS
GREAT CELEBRATION

Noted For Fashionable Weddings More Than 200 Years Ago.

LONDON, May 7.—London's fashionable church, St. George's, Hanover Square, celebrated its bicentenary yesterday with a special series of services. Often called "St. Cupid's Church" in the latter part of the last century, St. George's is still popular for fashionable weddings, and second only to St. Margaret's, Westminster.

Sixty years ago as many as 1,000 weddings took place each year at St. George's, but during the last 80 years the average has been about 300. Included among the latter was that of Theodore Roosevelt, who described himself in the register as a "Frenchman" when he walked over from Brown's Hotel in a bowler hat to be married to Edith Kermit Goreau.

The registers are rich in signatures of other prominent men, as well as royalties. QUICK ACTION NOW
IN TRAFFIC CASES

Autoists in Washington Given
No Time to Bring Influence
in Court.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—(United Press).—A fourteen-hour-a-day traffic court has been established here.

Autoists now apprehended for violation of traffic regulations are haled into the new tribunal for immediate trial. Heretofore, a motorist arrested for traffic violation could post collateral for appearance in court the following day. But times have changed.

With the advent of the all day and half-night tribunal, arrested motorists are prevented from mustering influence "to get off" or be "let down" with a small fine.

If an officer makes an arrest for speeding or any other traffic violation, he hops into the motorist's car and orders him to drive to traffic court, which sits until eleven o'clock at night. The route to the court must be direct. No time is granted for telephoning of relatives to "pull strings."

Once in court, the arrested motorist awaits his turn from trial and with the populace wrought up over the increasing number of accidents and deaths resulting from reckless driving, sentences handed down by the court are usually severe.

First offense speeding cases usually result in fines averaging \$15, with the warning that a second offense will bring a jail sentence. The new traffic court was authorized by the last Congress.

Say Cotton Trade Is

757 Persons Made
False Statements

LONDON, May 7.—The House of Commons was told yesterday by the Minister of Labor that there were 1,256,000 persons insured under the Unemployment Insurance Act and the latest figures showed that there were approximately 1,200,000 persons unemployed in Britain. The number of persons convicted on charges of knowingly showing false representations for the purpose of obtaining benefit, between November 1, 1924 and March 31, 1925 was 757.

DON'T RUSH AT AMALGAMATION, SAYS GRAHAM

Parliament Should Hesitate to Shake Investors' Confidence

PROJECT ALLURING, HE TELLS COMMONS

Good Informed If He Becomes Leader He Can Help Solve Problems.

OTTAWA, May 6.—"My advice would be not to rush at this amalgamation without full consideration," said Hon. G. P. Graham, minister of railways, speaking today on the Canadian National Railways. Mr. Graham was dealing specifically with the suggestion that the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific railways should be merged.

Mr. Graham's stand summarized was: So far as the Federal Government was concerned the proposal for the amalgamation of the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific railways was not an immediate issue, but no effort would be spared to secure reductions in the Dominion's transportation costs through co-ordination of the two systems. If this could not be achieved through voluntary co-operation on the part of the railways it would be obtained through intervention by the Dominion Railway Board.

FULL CONSENT REQUIRED. Mr. Graham said the Parliament of Canada should hesitate to take any steps that would shake the confidence of the investing public in the justice and honesty of Canadians. Amalgamation was a big problem and nothing should be done without the full consent of all parties who had invested their money in these lines.

A corporation, Mr. Graham added, whether its stock owned privately or by the Government, having possession of all the transportation facilities in the country might not be in the best interests of the people.

\$50,000,000 SAVING SEEN. Mr. Graham thought the estimates of W. D. Butler, that amalgamation would effect a saving of \$100,000,000 a year might be more accurately set at \$50,000,000. "The proposition is still very alluring and attractive," Mr. Graham made his annual statement on the Canadian National Railways.

The general results of last year's operations have already been announced. The total deficit on the Canadian National, after fixed charges, was \$54,800,419.

This, said Mr. Graham, was made up of \$51,189,161 on Canadian National lines in Canada and \$3,611,258 on Canadian National lines in the United States. To the total would have to be added a deficit of \$897,062 on the Central Vermont. This would make a deficit, after fixed charges, of \$58,507,481.

IMMIGRATION URGED. The real solution for industrial, agricultural and transportation problems was in the bringing of people to Canada.

W. C. Good, Progressive, Brant, asked how people could be kept in Canada when they were once here.

Mr. Graham replied that if Mr. Good would become a leader in affairs instead of a follower, he would help to solve these problems.

WONT BE STAMPEDED. Referring to the holders of securities in the Old Country, he would like to say "that Canada always pays its debts, but will not be stampeded into a position she is not entitled to be stampeded into."

Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader, complimented Mr. Graham on his speech.

ENTERPRISE WRECKED. Mr. Meighen said that criticisms of the former Government's method of taking over the shares of the "Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific Railways were absurd. What the shareholders did not realize was that their company principally by its Grand Trunk Pacific adventure, but as well by its long distance inefficient management of the road had itself over a series of years, wrecked the enterprise."

Grant Morden Asked To Pay Damage Claim. LONDON, May 6.—Sensational lawsuits are promised as a result of the serving of a writ this morning on Col. Grant Morden by Julius Turner, a well known financier, in which Turner claims damages in connection with the recent floating of the Vocation Gramophone Company.

This company was formed for the distribution of an invention of Pemberton Billing, who was much in the public eye in the years immediately after the war. Its records run for two or three hours and the invention was taken over by the Vocation Company. Most interesting revelations are promised and other members of Parliament as well as the Canadian member for Brentford are alleged to be involved.

Albert Man Gets \$1500 In Alienation Case. HOPEWELL HILL, May 6.—At the sitting of the Albert County Circuit Court today the case of Charles A. Cahill vs. Avery Parsons, in which the defendant was charged with alienation of the affections of the plaintiff's wife and also with criminal conversation, was completed, the jury bringing in a verdict for the plaintiff on the first charge of alienation and fixing damages at \$1,500. On the second charge the verdict was given in favor of the defendant.

Loses Fine House Near St. Martins. ST. MARTINS, May 5.—The fine residence of George M. Brown, of Fair View, was burned last week. The origin of the fire is unknown. When at \$1,000. On the second charge the verdict was given in favor of the defendant.

TROTSKY BACK IN MOSCOW, SAYS HE'LL BE GOOD

Not Likely, However, to be Restored as Minister of War

ABSOLVED FROM POLITICAL HERESY Expected to be Offered Post in Soviet Foreign Trade Dept.

MOSCOW, May 7.—Leon Trotsky, deposed Soviet War Minister, returned to Moscow today after four months isolation, ready to accept any position the Government may offer him. He traveled from Sukhum in Transcaucasia, in his private car.

The former Red army leader has been granted absolute freedom from his political heresy upon his promise to obey the dictates of the party and observe all the rules of strict Bolshevism, and it is probable that he will be offered the Commissariat of Foreign Trade vacated by Leonide Krasin's appointment as ambassador to France.

While Trotsky still has hopes of regaining his place in charge of the Red army, it is believed General Frunze, who succeeded him, will be left in that position.

MOST DIVORCES IN U.S. AFTER FOURTH YEAR

Most Dangerous Time for Married Pairs, Statistics Show

WASHINGTON, May 6.—If a man and woman are still able to face one another across the breakfast table after three years without resort to violence, they have a better than even chance of going along smoothly until the 20th year when the strain on the family begins to grow heavy again.

The United States Census Bureau has been at great pains to mine this nugget of cheery information from the bleak mountains of statistical data which are the bureau's stock in trade.

The fourth year of married life is the worst, the bureau has ascertained with mathematical certainty by examining the divorce records of the country. Slightly less than one-fifth of all the divorces granted to couples in the fourth year, and more than two-fifths of the romances which went to smash did so within five years. The third year is only slightly less dangerous to felicity in the U. S. home than in the fourth.

Those who get by their fifth anniversaries without visiting the divorce court face a diminishing prospect of dissolution. But it is noted that couples who have been married 20 years account for one-tenth of all divorces.

After 10 years wives evince a tendency toward drink, for a large proportion of the divorces granted in that period on the complaint of the husbands are due to drunkenness. Husbands withstand the lures of the temptresses during the first four years, comparatively few divorces being granted to wives on grounds of infidelity in that period. But the masculine affections begin to stray after the fifth year. The cruel strain in the male nature is likely to assert itself in the first three years, as indicated by the divorce records. Thereafter the wives' suit or the husbands become more melancholy. Desertion by husbands is infrequent in the first three years, but frequent thereafter and the males take to drink in larger numbers after nine years have passed.

BEATTY TERMS CO-OPERATION INSUFFICIENT

Will Not Solve Canada's Railway Troubles, Says C. P. P. President

APPROVES ENDING TRAIN DUPLICATION

Is Surprised at Government's Move Towards Control of Shipping Now.

MONTREAL, May 6.—Addressing shareholders of the Canadian Pacific Railway at the annual meeting here this afternoon, E. W. Beatty, president of the company, declared that although the Canadian Pacific was in favor of a co-operative policy, which would eliminate as far as possible duplication of train services on the lines of that railway system, and of the Canadian National Railways, such a policy was not sufficient to constitute a solution to Canada's railway difficulties.

This, he said, was the only proposal that had been discussed between the Canadian Pacific and the Dominion Government, and no situation had arisen which should give the shareholders of the company any reason "to believe that their interests would be adversely affected in finding a solution to Canada's problems as regards the Canadian National Railways."

PETERSEN DEAL SINGULAR. Regarding the shipping side of the company's business, Beatty found it singular that the Dominion Government should have started a movement toward government control of shipping rates, with lower rates as the object, through the Petersen contract, at a moment when it was well known that shipping, particularly freight, had given "very unsatisfactory financial results during the past two years."

SURE OF ENLIGHTENMENT. He felt sure that the public generally would get a much more accurate knowledge of the Atlantic shipping situation if publication was made of the evidence being given on the subject before a committee of the House of Commons.

Mr. Beatty regretted the somewhat disappointing results achieved in the field of immigration, adding that he and the president of the Canadian National Railways, had "made representations" which he thought would tend to bring more immigrants into the Dominion.

RED BAN IS WANTED

Suppression of Envoys From Austria is Sought by Jugo-Slavs.

VIENNA, May 6.—A Belgrade despatch says that the Jugo-Slav Government summoned the Austrian Minister to the Foreign Office and requested that the Austrian Government endeavor to suppress alleged Bolshevik emissaries from Vienna, who threaten the security of the Balkan States.

Candidates Named For N. S. Election

AMHERST, May 6.—D. G. MacKenzie, M.L.A., leader of the Provincial Opposition; Archie Terris, M.L.A., and Percy C. Black, were named today as Opposition candidates in Cumberland county in the provincial elections. Messrs. MacKenzie and Terris were successful candidates in 1920 on the Farmer-Labor fusion ticket. Mr. Black is a former member of the Nova Scotia highway board, and one of the leading Conservatives of the province. Mr. Black requested that he be granted a week to consider acceptance.

Scheme For Fasciti To Remain in Power

ROME, May 6.—Premier Mussolini is planning to perpetuate the Fascist party in power, according to Deputy Amicecci, who lays the scheme here in an article in La Nazione. A committee appointed by Mussolini upon the recommendation of the Fascist grand council, Amicecci says, has proposed a bill virtually altering the system of Government so that the Liberals in Italian politics never could be able to vote the Fascist party out of office.

Court Interpreter Handles Narcotics

WINDSOR, Ont., May 6.—Chie Lee, Chinese court interpreter, in a "dope" action against his cousin, Why Lee, in city police court this morning, was caught in the act of attempting to popium through the bars of Why Lee's cell, after the latter had been convicted, and was arraigned on a charge of having narcotics.

THREE THOUSAND ARRESTED.

SOPIA, May 7.—More arrests have been made in consequence of revelations at the trial of those charged with complicity in the Strel Kral chetnik bombing tragedy. There are now about 3,000 persons in prison throughout Bulgaria, and the authorities state that the Communist organization, which is blamed for the plot, is more far-reaching than was at first supposed.

OLYMPIC GRANT BARRED.

THE HAGUE, May 6.—The lower chamber of parliament today rejected a bill guaranteeing one million florins for the 1928 Olympic games at Amsterdam. The normal value of a florin is about 40 cents.

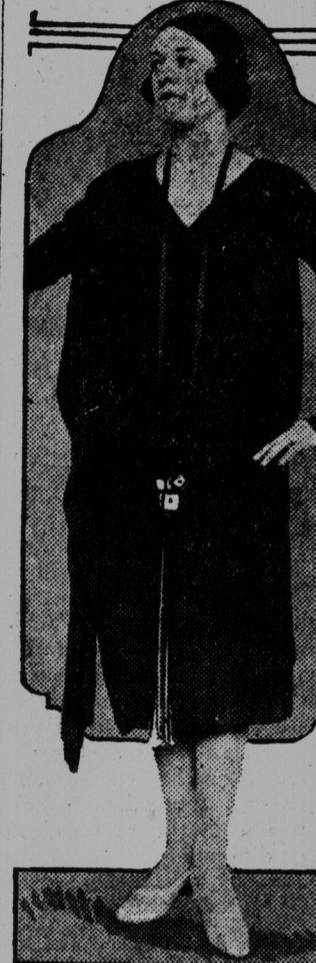

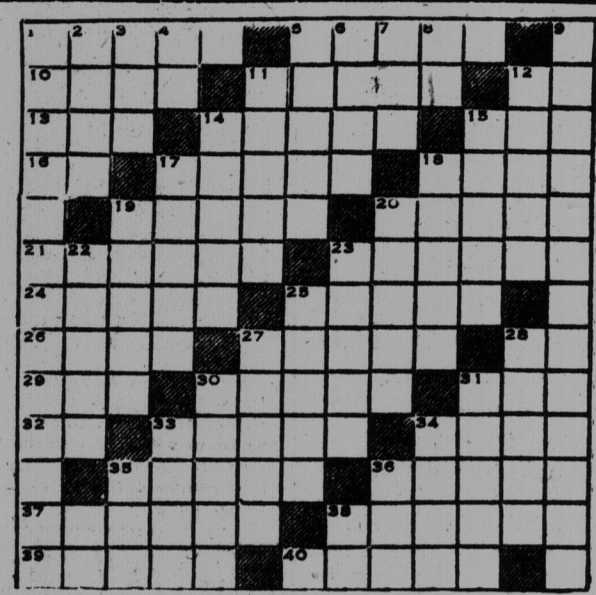

Flared Skirts Prominent In New York Season Fashions

This season we should be bouffant from the hips down with hems extending like the petals of a blown rose. We may even be barrel-shaped with a rounded fullness below the hips held in at hip and hemline in tapering effect similar to the hobble. But we won't have tube-like silhouettes—unless we care not a whit about style.

Newest of flares are the back flares which cause the frock to stand out at a perky angle in the rear. This is achieved by means of pleated lace or chiffon insets or circular godets placed on each side of the centre of the skirt. These insets may be at the knees, the hips or the normal waistline. Until now we have had flares used in front and at the front sides or placed evenly about them since the flat back was considered necessary. However, not only frocks but ensemble coats are now appearing with rear flares.

This combination of colors is unusual but decidedly flattering to youth. The fitted bodice is made with an off-shoulder neckline trimmed in a wide scalloped yoke of yellow velvet. The full skirt is shirred on at a normal waistline and is made in two-tier effect with each tier bordered in wide scalloped yoke of yellow velvet.

Bridal frocks are also lovely when combining yellow chiffon over flesh or coral shades. Layers of pastel hued petals may adorn the hem of the chiffon overdress.

Summer pajamas of knee length are appearing in the shops. They are made of striped silks or cotton cloths, and in piques and crepes. Sometimes these are made so short that they resemble tracks suits.

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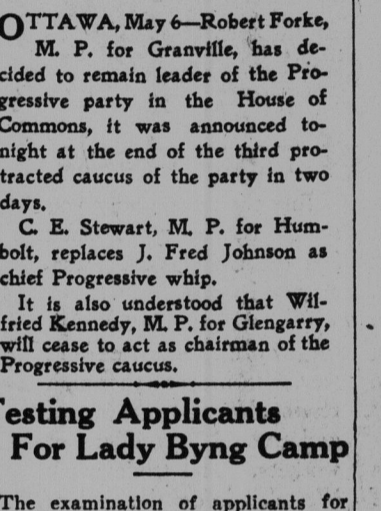

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NATIONALISTS ARE UNRUFFLED BY AGITATION

Declare Difficulty to Prove That Circumstances Would Have Affected Result

FLAG QUESTION ALSO RAISED BY PARTIES

Reichbanner Body Intimates President's Reception Will Be Monarchist Display.

BERLIN, May 7.—Official protest has been entered by the Socialists against the validity of the election of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg, as president of Germany.

This action, however, does not seem to worry the Nationalists, who say it will be difficult to prove that the circumstances were such as to affect the result of the vote.

LONDON, April 22.—It is satisfactory to know that King George's sea trip and the Mediterranean air at the very best of the year have greatly benefited His Majesty's health. I understand that there is no ground for any of the anxiety caused in London by the noticeable fact that the King kept far more closely to the royal yacht than Queen Mary, and missed a good many of the most interesting shore visits. But it is pretty certain that King George needed a rest. His influenza at one time developed alarming symptoms of pneumonia. This was what made the medical attendants so insistent on a real holiday in the sunny south.

Comments on the thrilling adventure of the R. 38 reveal much popular misconception about modern airships. These monsters are utterly helpless without their mooring masts, or other means of coming safely to earth. They are in this respect exactly like a ship at sea in an era before docks existed. Nor can a rigid airship, even with the most favorable terrain below, come down to make a bronchial landing. She would be inevitably broken up when her hull touched the ground, and, unless the air happens to be dead still, would be bound to start rolling.

with disastrous consequences both to herself and her crew. The only hope in such cases, so far as the crew are concerned, would be to spike her on trees in a wood, and climb down the trees. Parachutes are the last resort for saving the crew, but that, of course, means abandoning the ship absolutely to her fate.

SPEED FACTOR

Modern airships usually consist of a stout outer envelope about the consistency of heavy sail cloth, stiffened and toughened by doping, over a light metal framework that holds the supporting gas balloons. The crucial factor is speed. Airships are essentially fair-weather craft unless their engines are sufficiently powerful to outdrive the strongest winds. The R. 38 is a comparatively old vessel, and even at full speed ahead, drifted backwards at nearly 30 miles an hour in the gale. Either of the two latest super-airships now being built in this country would have been able, barring accidents, to make 80 miles an hour against the same wind. Very seldom in these regions of the earth does wind velocity exceed 80 miles an hour, and the new airships possess a 90-miles-an-hour capacity of engines. The sensation of airship travel in good weather is delightful, but in rough winds new hands suffer from "sea sickness."

COMING DIVORCE CASES

An unusual number of libel actions, mostly against newspapers, and several well-known people among the divorce court suitors promise an Easter law listings hardly less interesting than the listings just closed. There are some 70 cases in the divorce lists, being about the same as last Easter, and of these more than 80 are undefended. Among them is a petition for divorce by Lady K. E. Vincent from Brigadier-General Sir Kerley Vincent, whom she married in 1906; also a suit for divorce by the Marchioness of Queensberry against the Marchioness, Sir J. H. Dunn, a Canadian, being cited as co-respondent. The Marchioness was once a Gaiety actress, known as Irene Richards. In point of probable interest the most important suit in the defended list is that of Viscount Gort, V. C. against his wife, Viscountess Gort, who

is his cousin, and ran a millinery business in the West End during the war for the benefit of the Red Cross.

FEWER AMERICANS

Although the well-known American hostesses are coming over as usual this year—Mrs. Harry Brown is renting Spencer House from Earl Spencer, and the wealthy Mrs. Corzigan will not be far away—there is not quite the same demand for houses by Americans as there was last year. I was told last night that well-known ladies who make a habit of "schmoozing" American girls for discreet but handsome fees are finding that competition is keen, and there are not enough fair Americans to go round. In any case, it is often a thankless occupation, even if the pay is good, because these girls will so often get engaged to the most unsuitable young men. If this happens, the diversion it certainly comes in for a very unpleasant half-hour with an irate mamma, who wants to know what all the money has been spent for.

THE ROYAL TOURNAMENT

Rehearsals are in full swing for the Royal Tournament, which opens in May at Olympia. All the profits of this great annual display are distributed among service charities, and an exceptionally fine programme will be provided this year in the hope of raising some £15,000, which will constitute a financial record. The Royal Regiment of Artillery pageant in itself should prove an irresistible attraction. This will be supplemented by the inter-tribal competitions, always keenly exciting items, and musical rides by the Life Guards and Royal Horse Artillery. A special feature of the tournament will be practical illustrations of the steady progress of mechanizing the Army or draught purposes. The Air Force, Marines and Territorials will all find a place in the extensive programme.

BOTTLED SUNSHINE

Dean Swift's notion of sunshine bottled in cucumbers is now quite a hack number. A friend of mine, who has installed at home one of the new ultra-violet-ray lamps all the hospitals and clinics are getting, not only takes regular baths himself, but gives them to his children. CITY INVITES HAIG HERE

LETTER FROM G. W. V. A. READ AT MEETING

Details Are Left by Council in Hands of Mayor

MUCH TALK OVER CAMERON CASE

Princess Street Building Matter Gone Into—Commissioner Harding to Chicago.

The Common Council this morning decided to extend an official invitation of Earl Haig to visit the city while in Canada this summer. The details were left in the hands of the Mayor. The meeting discussed the application of George Cameron for a building permit and whether the building inspector could refuse the permit. The consolidated business by-laws, prepared by the city solicitor, clearing up some points in regard to fines and licenses, were recommended to the council for enactment and will be taken up on Tuesday.

Mayor Potts said he had received a letter from McKenna's Cash Grocery, Waterloo street, stating that the store had been broken into three times in the last eight weeks and asking what would be done about the matter. This was referred to Commissioner Harding for a report.

INVITE EARL

The Saint John branch of the G. W. V. A. wrote suggesting that the city extend an official invitation to Earl Haig to visit Saint John when he visited Fredericton and offer to cooperate in entertaining the distinguished visitor. They had been informed, the letter said, that Premier Venturi intended to hold a reception for Earl Haig at Fredericton. The letter was referred to Mayor Potts to come to Saint John and he was given authority to make the necessary arrangements for a reception and entertainment while here.

Commissioner Harding said he would like the council to hear the building inspector on a matter which was giving him some concern and on which he would like the council to give some advice.

CAMERON PERMIT.

James Carleton, building inspector, said the matter was the granting of a permit to George Cameron to erect a building in Princess street and he would like to know if the council intended in 1915, providing that certain buildings could not be erected within 50 feet of a church was to be carried out.

Two applications had been made for a permit for this building. The one had been refused because of its proximity to the building which was for a public garage and being objected to by St. David's church. Later another application was made and in this the use to which the building was to be put was not stated. On refusing the permit an order for mandamus was asked for by Mr. Cameron. The plans for the building stated that it would be 48 feet wide and 98 feet long, and he believed the specifications provided for safe construction.

Mayor Potts asked if the building laws gave the city the right to condemn a building which was considered unsafe, and the building inspector said the law provided for a board of arbitrators.

The city solicitor, Mr. Carleton said, had ruled that the building inspector had no right to demand the applicant to name for what use the building was to be put and he wanted to know whether to follow this advice or the by-law passed in 1915.

Commissioner Frink asked if he understood the building inspector to mean that he thought the permit should not be issued and wanted the council to approve of his going to the judge's court. To this Mr. Carleton replied that "that was about it." He further said that, so far as the mandamus proceedings were concerned, the case seemed to have been settled before going to court, as he had not been asked to give testimony.

LAWYER CALLED IN.

At this point the Mayor asked A. N. Carter to come to the committee room to explain what had taken place at the mandamus proceedings.

Mr. Carter said that when the motion for mandamus was taken the matter had been referred to Dr. Baxter, city solicitor, and he had advised that, as the building inspector had no right to refuse a permit on the ground that the occupancy of the building had not been stated, it was no use fighting the case, and he had agreed that the permit would be granted, provided the plans and specifications were as called for in the code.

Mayor Potts asked if any person was further ahead and knew any more about the case than before the discussion started, and Commissioner Frink said he was, for he had found out that Mr. Carter said it was no concern of the building inspector what a building was to be used for.

Mr. Carter said that was not what he said. What he had said was the refusal to state the use was not a ground for refusing a permit.

Mayor Potts said there was no doubt the information had been concealed in this case for a purpose and he would say let them go ahead, and then, if it was used in a way the law did not allow, see what could be done about it.

Commissioner Harding asked what Mr. Carleton was to do in the matter, and Mayor Potts said it was not up to the council to decide.

Commissioner Frink asked if the building inspector did not have the right to name the materials which should go into the building, and Mr. Carleton said he had so far as No. 1 district was concerned.

Commissioner Bullock said the city did not seem to be properly protected,
