

THE CITY HALL, GUELPH.

GUELPH, August 11th, 1880.

A Special Session of Reliance and Progress Lodges, of this City, being assembled, the Grand Marshal announced the R.W. Grand Lodge of Ontario in waiting, whereupon that body was introduced and appropriately received in a cordial, happy address of welcome by Bro. Charles Cottis, who tendered the free use of the spacious City Hall and Committee Rooms adjoining for the purposes of the present Session. To which the M. W. Grand Master, Bro. Whereupon the Representatives present were introduced and instructed in the Grand Lodge degree.

The Grand Marshal and Grand Conductor having ascertained that all present were entitled to remain, the R. W. Grand Chaplain, Rev. Bro. St. George Caulfield, offered the following prayer:-

Almighty and Eternal God, in whom we trust as our Protector and Guide, let Thy Holy Spirit rest upon us, and guide us in all our deliberations as we are assembled together in Thy

name.

O. Thou Great Father of Mankind, who hast made of one blood all nations of men to dwell on the face of the whole earth, cause a spirit of brotherly love to prevail amongst them; may they warmen as the control of the control

Whereupon, by direction, the Deputy Grand Master declared the Grand Lodge duly open for the transaction of business.

On motion of Rep. Jas. Dawson, Bro. T.G. Lowe, of Forest City Lodge, No. 38, was appointed Assistant Grand Secretary for the present Session.

The Minutes of the last Session were adopted as printed, and the reading thereof was dispensed with.

The M. W. Grand Master, Bro. F. Fowler, presented his Report, which was referred to the Committee on Distribution.

GRAND MASTER'S REPORT.

GUELPH, August 11th, 1880.

To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F. REPRESENTATIVES AND BROTHERS:

Clause 1.—It is my pleasing duty and privilege, now that my term of office is about closing, to render you an account of my official acts, and present some thoughts the consideration of which will, I believe, tend to

Clause 2.—It must needs be a source of gratification and thankfulness to us all that we are enabled, under such favorable circumstances, to meet here in this Royal City, the happy centre of a rich agricultural district, feeling assured that our Order stands firm, and is a mighty force for good. in the land.

Clause 3.—At our last Grand Lodge meeting I was appointed chairman of a committee charged with the duty of inviting the Sovereign Grand Lodge to hold the Session of 1880 in Ontario, provided a suitable place of meeting could be secured, and if in the estimation of the Committee the sum of money set apart by the Grand Lodge of Ontario would be sufficient for the object contemplated. Having ascertained that it was the unanimous opinion of the committee that it would not only be prudent out also highly desirable to extend the invitation, and the majority of the committee favoring Toronto as the place of meeting, I forwarded through our Representatives an invitation accordingly.

Clause 4.—I am happy to state that it was accepted in such a manner as to render it doubly pleasing to this Grand Body.

Clause 5.—Feeling the necessity of early preparation being made for an event which, I am certain, is so richly fraught with benefits to the Jurisdiction of Ontario, I called the Advisory Board together on the 21st of November last, the meeting being held in Toronto.

Clause 6.—A plan was sketched out, a general committee was appointed, composed mainly of the members of the Advisory Board and the Grand Representatives of the Encampment; and sub-committees were formed to carry out such arrangements as were deemed necessary for the fitting reception of the Sovereign Grand Lodge next September.

Clause 7.—On a subsequent occasion an interview was obtained with the members of the Ontario Government, when on representations being made to them as to the cosmopolitan and non-political character of the Sovereign Grand Body, the use of the Legislative Assembly Rooms was accorded us as a place of meeting. It is needless to say that they are eminently adapted for the purpose.

Clause 8.—It must be a source of unmixed pleasure to the whole brotherhood that the Ontario Government, by this praiseworthy action, has recognized the importance and high standing of our Order. The courtesy so practically exemplified deserves our warmest thanks.

Clause 9.—The brethren in Toronto, on whom the main burden has fallen of carrying out the arrangements in detail, have proved themselves abundantly able and willing for the task, and to them is mainly due the credit of the grand success which the undertaking promises to be.

Clause 10.—I was instructed, at last session of the Grand Lodge, to obtain possession of the Charter and effects of the defunct Capitol Lodge, Ottawa. I accordingly did so, transmitting to the Grand Secretary the Charter, together with the effects, accompanied by an inventory thereof.

Clause 11.—I took the opportunity, when the effects were in my possession, to examine the books and papers, and I found that while their affairs had evidently been conducted in a careless and unbusiness-like manner, yet their obligations had been all met, and their Lodge closed in an honorable way.

Clause 12.—I am happy to be in a position to state that there is a prospect of Capitol Lodge being resuscitated.

Clause 13.—It having been brought under my notice that great irregularities had occurred previous to and during the closing of Riverside Lodge, I felt it to be my duty to visit Iroquois and make inquiries conin di up

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cerning them. I had interviews with several members of the late Lodge. cerning them. I had interviews with several memoers of the lace longs. One of these confessed to me that he had in his possession two notes which were given to Riverside Lodge by members of that Lodge for money which belonged to the Lodge. I urged him long and earnestly to surrender to me these notes. This he refused to do, until I, acting on legal advice, therefore the height an action nowing them in Chancery. threatened to bring an action against him in Chancery.

One of these notes was paid me by the maker of it on my bringing the matter under his notice. The other I was compelled to sue. I obtained a judgment against the party, and he has since paid me a portion of his

Clause 14. —Having vindicated the authority of the Grand Lodge, I did not feel justified in pressing for infinediate payment of the whole, as I have good reason to believe that doing so would have brought distress

Clause 15.—I take the liberty of recommending that the balance due be collected in instalments, and that the Grand Lodge forego the interest which has and will accrue on the note.

Clause 16.—Having also been informed that a member of the late Lodge had for a few nights acted as Per Secretary, receiving dues and giving no account of the same, I wrote him, demanding a surrender of the funds in his hands. With this demand he complied.

Clause 17.—I forwarded to the Grand Secretary these moneys which I received, also papers and effects handed over to me at Iroquois. I submit all the papers and correspondence connected with this painful case, which illustrates how easily a fine Lodge may be ruined by improper man-

Clause 18.—In common with my predecessors in office, numerous questions have been submitted for my decision. While many of these to me appeared plain and easily answered by reference to the ritual or the laws of subordinates, yet I received these communications gladly, looking upon them as manifestations of a felt interest in the Order and a desire to

Clause 19.—I submit the following decisions for your approval:—

1. A Lodge, even if incorporated, cannot sue a member in court for dues, there being in the laws of the Order a mode prescribed for dealing

2. It is competent for a Lodge to appoint a special committee to nvestigate a brother's sickness, if so doing does not conflict with the by-laws.

3. It is legal for a Lodge to entertain a motion appointing a committee to get up an excursion or concert, but it is not right for a Lodge to risk its funds for such purposes, or allow its seal to be put on excursion or

4. A Lodge need not admit a brother having T.P.W. unless he has a card and A.T.P.W., but the Lodge must be prepared to justify its refusal if complaint is made to Grand Lodge.

5. The N.G. is not obliged to give P.W. when an order is presented, but he must be prepared to justify his refusal if complaint is made.

6. Members of a committee to try a brother should be in good stand-

o. Memoers or a committee to try a proper should be in good seeming, not more than thirteen weeks in arrears.

7. The Grand Master has no right to appoint a special committee during recess of the Grand Lodge, unless authorized or instructed by the Grand Lodge so to do; but if necessary, should call the Advisory Board

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8. A Lodge can sublet their hall to another society by taking due precautions 9. With reference to reported frauds by members in business trans-

actions outside the Lodge, the Lodge should not take the matter up unless

the frauds are such as a court of justice will take cognizance of.

10. Unless the by-laws of a Lodge state that a brother in arrears is not qualified to be nominated for office, objections on this score should be reserved till (if elected) a brother appears for installation, when, if in arrears, he should not be installed.

11. It is not legal, in addition to the regular fees, to charge the mem-

bers a stated sum to pay a Lodge physician.

12. It is not legal to pass a by-law to tax members to pay for a band at funerals 13. It is not a legitimate appropriation of Lodge funds to pay for

educating a brother to act as Organist 14. Having held the position of Chaplain does not of itself qualify for

the office of V.G.

15. A brother can obtain from a Lodge a new trial on the ground that notice of the charges preferred against him did not reach him.

16. It is not necessary, when a Lodge expunges a by-law, to submit the act for approval to the Grand-Lodge.

17. When a special meeting on Lodge is called for general business, N.G. can go through the regular routine.

18. An Installing Officer should not be influenced by a vote of the Lodge with reference to installing officers not clear on the books, but should refuse to instal such officers; but if he does instal under such cir-cumstances, the officers are entitled to their positions.

19. Confirming the minutes merely affirms them to be a correct re-

cord of what took place, and does not bind the Lodge in any way. 20. The law with reference to the N.G. voting is as follows:

He can vote with the other members in the election of officers, but not under any other circumstances.

He has, in the case of a tie when a ballot is taken, no casting vote. He has, in case of a tie when no ballot is taken, a casting vote, and

when in this last case the yeas and nays are called, he has a casting vote. 21. When the by-laws of a Lodge require dues payable in advance, a brother not doing so is not entitled to P.W.—855-871 Journal.

22. The general law which states that the fees paid by a candidate for admission into an Oddfellows' Lodge shall not be less than \$5, does not apply to those admitted by card, but in such cases the Lodge can determine by by-law the fee to be paid, making it less if it sees fit.—Digest, Sec. 277; also see Reinstatement.

23. No claim is allowed as an offset to dues, except money due as

benefits for previous sickness.

24. A proposer can withdraw a proposition for membership any time before the report of the committee is read, even if such report has been placed in the hands of the Secretary

25. The sitting V.G. is not eligible for the office of N.G. until his term of office has expired while there are any P.G.'s belonging to the Lodge.

26. Money paid for degrees a brother did not take, although there was a favorable ballot, cannot be applied to dues with or without the consent of the brother. The money must be applied to the purpose for which it was paid.

27. An amendment declared carried at one meeting cannot be de-

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was sent ch it declared out of order at the next. A reconsideration should be moved if the 28. An amendment which has been carried against a motion is not in

force until it has been carried as a separate motion.

29. The receipt for dues of the P.S. must be accepted, even if it is not the regular Lodge receipt, and credit giving from the time of receiving the money. The P.S. can receive dues at any time, unless by laws dis-

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30. A Lodge has the power to appoint one Secretary to do the work of P.S. and R.S., but if two separate Secretaries are appointed, each must do the work laid down in the Ritual.

31. A Lodge has a right to appropriate money as a bonus for a lease of a hall for Lodge purposes.

32. The only office that can be held in a Lodge by a brother of another Lodge is that of O.G.

Clause 20.—I was instructed to send Charters to several Lodges instituted during the regime of my predecessor, and I did so accordingly.

Clause 21.—I granted dispensations for the following new Lodges Woodslee Lodge, No. 220, instituted by P.G.M. McAfee, on the 12th

February, 1880. Chesley Lodge, No. 221, instituted by D.D.G.M. Sinclair, on the 7th

Mount Elgin Lodge, No. 222, instituted by D.D.G.M. Andrews, on the 27th July, 1880.

Clause 22.—Believing that these Lodges possess the elements of endurance and success, I recommend that Charters be granted them.

Clause 23.—A petition was sent to me for the institution of a Lodge at Erin, but inamuch as it was not endorsed by the D. D. G. M., nor approved of by the nearest Lodge, I thought it prudent to refuse a dis-

Clause 24.—It was with deep regret that I found that Cookstown Lodge had for some time been getting more and more feeble. was found that it could no longer be maintained, and D.D.G.M. Ross was instructed to reclaim the Charter and get possession of the effects.

Clause 25.—I granted a dispensation to Live Oak Lodge to remove to Strabane, satisfactory evidence having been laid before me that the removal would benefit the Lodge without in any way injuring any of the neigh-

Clause 26.—I also granted dispensations to several Lodges to hold public installations. I, in all such cases, impressed upon the Lodges the importance of having the ceremony conducted in such a manner as would make a favorable impression upon the public.

Finding that in many Lodges the day for the election of officers fell upon Christmas, I authorized the Lodges so situated to select another day for such meeting, cautioning them to give due notice of such change to all

I also on various occasions gave dispensations for the wearing of regalia in public.

Clause 27.—I granted cards to the following brothers:

Bro. McLellan, Trenton Lodge, 113; J. B. McCabe, Trenton Lodge, 113; Henry Ullyott, Thames Lodge, 43; James L. Holmes, Riverside Lodge, 145; J. W. Hendricks, Trenton Lodge, 113; B. Cunningham,

Clause 28.—Following the established custom, I re-appointed the members of the Committee on By-laws, as also the Auditors, making no change in the personnel of these Committees, feeling that their familiarity with the work added to their fitness for these positions.

Clause 29.—I caused Circulars to be issued to all the subordinate Lodges, directing their attention to the following proclamation of the Grand Sire, and requesting them to comply with the same.

Clause 30.—I find there is a desire felt by many members of our Order in this Jurisdiction, that the Grand Lodge should take some steps towards furthering a scheme whereby an endowment would be secured to a widow or children at a brother's death.

Clause 31 .- I consider any such scheme foreign to the functions of this Grand Lodge, and that if carried out it would lead to fatal entangle-

Clause 32.—I recognize the propriety of members of our Order being impressed with the desirability of striving to make a larger provision for their families than our Order undertakes or can undertake to do.

Clause 33.—This I conceive should be brought about by the cultivation of economical and saving habits, and, when practicable, by brothers insur-ing their lives in some reliable company.

Clause 34.—The importance of this step being very great, it does not surprise us to find that while so many prefer joining the Relief Association —which, while independent in its management, has yet intimate relations with the Order—others maintain that companies of a non-mutual character are preferable.

Clause 35.—But inasmuch as the Relief Association is the undoubted means of retaining very many members in good standing in their several Lodges, it assuredly deserves the good wishes of every true Odd-Fellow for a long continuance of the very marked success which has attended it.

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Clause 36.—One of the members of this Jurisdiction having been expelled from his Lodge, appealed to me for an arrest of judgment. Having carefully read all the papers connected with the case, and consulted with the District Deputy, I, by virtue of the power vested in me by the Grand Lodge, ordered an arrest of judgment in his case. I submit the documents connected with this case for your consideration.

Clause 37.—Complaints have been made to me at different times that some Lodges, unwittingly or otherwise, have initiated brothers residing within the Jurisdiction of other Lodges. There appears to be no provision of a satisfactory character for Lodges which suffer in this way.

Clause 38.—I consider that the requirements of the case would be met by the offending Lodges being obliged to pay over to the aggrieved

Clause 39.—The new law relating to dormant Odd-Fellows has frequently been brought under my notice. While the law aims in the right direction, and has to my knowledge been the means of getting back many suspended and dropped members into good standing, yet it has many obvious defects, and should receive your consideration with a view to instructions being given to your Representatives to use their influence to secure its amendment.

Clause 40.—I have not received a great many formal reports from the District Deputies at the end of the terms; but I have had a good deal of correspondence with very many of them. I feel satisfied that there is an earnest desire felt by them to advance the interests of the order, and promote the welfare of the Lodges under their care.

Clause 41.—The great majority of the reports received are cheering in their character, and indicate that the Order in Ontario is in a pros-

Clause 42.—It is true that some Lodges appear to be in a struggling condition, partly owing to removals of members, but chiefly in consequence of being located in very small villages in close proximity to other

Clause 43.—In such cases the maintenance of Lodges is very difficult, particularly so when high sick benefits are given, and considerable annual payments promised to widows and orphans.

Clause 44.—An Odd-Fellows' Lodge could undoubtedly be maintained with much greater certainty in places where the membership is necessarily small, if until the finances are brought into a prosperous state, such Lodges would make their benefits nominal, supplementing such nominal payments in urgent cases by donations according to their means.

Clause 45.—While I am of opinion that the present system of appointing District Deputies is on the whole satisfactory, yet inasmuch as in many small Lodges there are no qualified brothers to fill the position of District Deputy in consequence of all much being required to fill other in many small Logges there are no quanties proteins to hit the position of District Deputy in consequence of all such being required to fill other offices, and also from local causes of other kinds even in large Lodges, I am of opinion that the Grand Master should have discretionary power to among Lodges. appoint District Deputies having under their charge two or more Lodges, in other cases than where such is provided for by the present law provided that by doing so he is satisfied the interests of those Lodges will be vided that by the present law provided that by doing so he is satisfied the interests of those Lodges will be promoted without at the same time causing any undue expense to the Grand Lodge.

Clause 46.—In the circular which I sent to the District Deputies at the commencement of my term of office, I requested them to insist upon

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Lodges insuring their furniture and effects against fire. More than one Lodge, I regret to say, has suffered from fire during the past year.

Clause 47.—I take this opportunity of again urging that Lodges exercise a prudent foresight in effecting an insurance upon Lodge property.

Clause 48.—I received applications from different Jurisdictions in the neighboring States, asking permission to appeal for aid to the Lodges in Ontario.

Clause 49.—I did not see my way clear to grant these applications, being of opinion that the necessities of the cases were such as might be easily met by Lodges in the immediate neighborhood.

Clause 50.—One application which I received from the Lower Provinces a few weeks ago I have left over for your consideration, feeling that no interests would suffer by the short delay.

Clause 51.—The hand of death has been laid on many of our brothers since we last met. Our sympathies are due to the sorrowing friends—the widows, the parents, and the children. Many sad bereavements there must have been unknown to the most of us.

Clause 52.—But there must be few who have not heard and left the heavy blows which have fallen during the year upon the family of our much-valued Senior Grand Representative. He has, I am sure, our tenderest sympathies.

Clause 53.—One striking case I desire to record. Brother Lambert was with us at our last Grand Lodge meeting, was appointed District Deputy, and corresponded with me with reference to the interests of his Lodge he loved so well. A dear friend of his writes me thus: "My poor old friend, Geo. W. Lambert, was cut off before he reached the prime of life; but having never been very strong, a long life was not expected for him, though his friends did not expect so early a termination. He was a most useful member of the Lodge, and exercised a great influence over the members. He was elected Treasurer at the time of the formation of Dyfham Lodge, and held that position up to the time of his death, except one term when he was elected V. G., and two terms he served

Clause 54.—"By his will he leaves \$1,000, to be disposed of as follows: \$600 to the Widows and Orphans' Fund; \$200 for the decoration of the Lodge Room; \$100 for special charity, and \$100 to be expended in decorating the lot belonging to the Lodge in the cemetery here. Brother Lambert was unmarried; but leaves an aged mother, who feels his loss keener than words can tell. He was a worthy fellow all through, a most useful citizen, and an enthusiastic Odd-Fellow."

Clause 55.—We are met here for the transaction of important business, which will require close application and careful consideration, and to this we must now address ourselves. But part from the work in this Hall and in the Committee Rooms, there are other considerations which have an important bearing upon ourselves and others. Who can fully estimate the advantages which flow from friction of thought, the friendly interchange of greetings and courtesies, the warm outpouring of feeling, or the silent but expressive meetings of old and dear friends, the formation and cementing of new friendships, and the outgoings of hearts and hands to one another, which we all have looked forward to with ardent joy.

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REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY.

GUELPH, August 11th, 1880.

To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F.

Clause 1.—The undersigned has much pleasure, in compliance with the haws defining his duties, of submitting the following report of the transactions of his office, as well as such suggestions as have occurred to him, looking to the welfare and interests of the Order in Ontario. The outlook is brighter than it was a year ago, though the much hoped for return of commercial prosperity has not, to any very great extent, taken place. The losses in membership the last half of the past year is very much less than during the first half. Many Lodges report an increased activity and bright prospects ahead, while some few speak in rather despondent tones. It is hoped that the approaching Session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, to be held in Toronto in September next, and the preparations being made to suitably entertain that worthy body, will stimulate all Lodges to renewed zeal, and result in a great and lasting good to the Order in Canada.

Clause 2.—At the last Session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, new legislation was enacted in regard to members hitherto and hereafter suspended for non-payment of dues. I issued a circular giving the law as it was adopted, without any special instructions to Lodges, as I judged, from the expression of opinion in the press of the Order, that the Law would in all probability be somewhat altered at the coming Session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

Clause 3.—I would respectfully suggest the propriety of this Grand Lodge purchasing a suitable flag, which could be displayed from the office of the Grand Secretary on all public occasions, and be taken to and hoisted at the annual place of meeting of the Grand Lodge.

Clause 4.—At the last Session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, the Legislative Committee reported as follows, page 8067, Jour. 1879:—in their subordinates one year."

in their subject is worthy of the careful consideration of this Grand Lodge. Very many if not all Lodges are making Past Grands faster than their eligible material will admit of or the necessity of the Order requires. Just about the time a N. G. becomes accustomed to the work on hand he is made a P. G., and a new officer is elected, with the same experience to

Clause 5.—Immediately after the close of the last Session I compiled the minutes, and, as directed by the Report of the Committee on Printing, 1 had 1,500 copies printed—1,000 of which were bound up as usual and sent to the several Lodges Officers of this Grand Lodge, and to each of the Grand Lodges and Grand Encampments in the U. S., and 200 were kept for use at the present Session. The extra 300 copies were left unbound, so as to be bound up with the second volume of the Reprinted Journal, School, and the same price per page as the Journal of 1878 was printed at, the at the same being engaged on the Reprint. This course was adopted owing to the trouble experienced with the Journal of 1878, and

with the advice and consent of the Grand Master. I ask your approval of the same.

Clause 6.—As directed by Report of the Committee on Finance, adopted page 1860, Jour. 1879, as early as possible after the close of our last meeting, in company with Bro. W. Badenach, Grand Treasurer, I procured an office in the City of Toronto, at No. 42 King Street East, having the required vault accommodation, at a yearly rental of \$150, water rate included; and on the 1st of November, 1879, I removed to Toronto. The office is pleasantly situated, and has been honored with visits from brothers from every portion of the Jurisdiction, and many prominent brothers from the U. S. Independent of any personal motive whatever, I must say that I believe the change of decided benefit to the Order. Toronto is the metropolis and constantly increasing commercial centre of Ontario, and as such is visited by a very great many brothers. Many have called at the office, to some of whom it has been my privilege to be of service, in instructing in the secret work and other ways.

Clause 7 .- The following Circular was duly received:-

WHEREAS, It is believed that a proper revision of the lectures and ritual of the Degrees, and their reduction from five to three, retaining the present unwritten portion of them, but varied in form, style and matter, would be more impressive, attractive and effective; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Grand Lodge of Missouri is in favor of a revision of the Subordinate Degrees, and their reduction in number from five to three and that our K. W. Grand Representatives are requested to advocate and vote for the same in the Grand Lodge of the I, O. O. F.

Rep. Grant submitted the following amendment to the preamble and resolution, which was accepted by P. G. Sire Veitch:

That the Grand Lodge of Missouri is also in favor of such change as will have the work in the Subordinate Lodges done in the highest Subordinate Degree.

The preamble and resolution, together with the amendment of Rep. Grant, were unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That the Grand Secretary is instructed to forward the resolution introduced by P. G. Sirv Veltch, in reference to a revision of the Degrees, to the several Grand Lodges, and request their co-operation.

In accordance with instructions, I have the honor of transmitting this Circular, and ask at the hands of your R. W. Grand Lodge a careful consideration of this important matter.

Clause 10.—In my report of last year, page 1799, I suggested the propriety of having the portraits of all our Past Grand Masters placed in the Reprinted and Annual Journals of the Grand Lodge, two or three the kepnnted and Annual Journals of the Grand Lodge, two or three each year, until all were included. The Legislative Committee to whom the clause (No. 13) was referred, reported, "approving the action of the Grand Secretary;" but without more definite instructions, your Grand Secretary did not feel justified in undertaking the expense of having any portrait placed in the Journal of last year (1879). Your further attention is earnestly called to this matter. It surely is but a well merited compliment to a brother who has devoted his hest years and talents in the pliment to a brother who has devoted his best years and talents in the priment to a properly who has devoted his nest years and talents in the service of the Order, to perpetuate his memory by this simple act of courtesy. It is gratifying at all times to know that one's labors are appreciated, and any action which demonstrates that fact would ever be an incentive to renewed zeal and earnestness in the cause. A brother does not become a Grand Master without first having to labor for years toos not become a Grant Blasser without the maying to about for years in his Subordinate Lodge, where by faithfulness and untiring energy his highest ambitions are finally realized; and after having borne the "burden and heat of the day," he can, with his portrait as a reminder, refer with pride and satisfaction to the active part he took in bringing the Order to its present proud position, and feel that his labors have been appreciated.

Clause 11.—As directed by the Grand Lodge Jour. 1879, p. 1881, I had fifty extra copies of the "Early History of Odd-Fellowship in Canada" bound up in cloth covers, and presented a copy to each of the brothers who kindly assisted the Committee by supplying information for the compilation of the work. The acknowledgment of the receipt thereof has been duly received and are herewith submitted; all speak in high terms of the value of the work, and extress full appreciation of high terms of the value of the work, and express full appreciation of

Clause 12.—I have to report the completion of the Reprint of the first volume of the Journals of this Grand Lodge. The copies subscribed for have been sent to the Lodges, and, so far as I have heard, have given entire satisfaction. It was found to be impracticable to include the whole proceedings up to 1879 in one volume, as it would make a book so large upon consultation with the Grand Master, it

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was decided to complete the work in two volumes, the first volume to include the year 1874, with a complete index, thus making a book of 1,000 pages—quite large enough to be serviceable. The first volume also embraces the Early History of Odd-Fellowship in Canada, with the portraits of its pioneer Past Grand Masters. The removal of your Grand Secretary from Brantford caused, some delay in getting the work finished, owing to proofs and revises having to be sent to and fro, and will seriously interfere with having the work completed by the contractor for the work, Mr. W. Watt, Jr., Brantford Expositor. Owing to the lack of interest manifested by the fraternity for so valuable a work, I would suggest that only 300 copies of remaining years, including 1880, be printed. This would furnish each of the subscribers with a copy.

It is greatly to be deplored that a work of so much value and importance to the Order as this Reprint and History really is, should be so little appreciated, the bare number guaranteed only having been subscribed for. It was hoped that immediately upon its completion and distribution, orders would come in so rapidly that the edition of 1,000 copies would soon become exhausted; but that fond hope has not been realized. The young members of to-day should bear in mind that the time is fast approaching when they will be called upon to take the front rank, in the places of the aged, active workers of their Lodges of to-day, and that only as they are well up in the laws of the Order, and have a knowledge of the circumstances which have caused Lodges to weaken and die, will they be competent to assume their places and carry to a successful issue the great legacy entrusted to them. Only by a thorough knowledge of all our laws will they be able efficiently to discharge their duty, and on retiring, leave their places to be filled by other worthy successors.

The Reprint has been completed at considerable cost, has a full index, and will, I trust, be prominently brought before their respective Lodges by the representatives present.

I would respectfully suggest that a copy of the Reprint and History be sent to the Grand Lodges of Missouri, Oregon and Texas, in return for the copies of their reprinted Journals, which have been duly received.

Clause 13.—I regret very much that I cannot report the completion of the Register of Membership. But very few of the delinquent Lodges reported last year—page 1806—have responded to my request to sendon the returns of their membership. I shall endeavor to go on with the work during the coming year, filling up the membership of the Lodges named from their old returns, on tyle in this office. In these Lodges the history of the membership in the early years will of course be very imperfect, owing to the incompleteness of the form of return then in use, which merely required the name of the brother admitted, &c., neither age nor date having been asked for.

Clause 14.—As directed at the last Session (page 1883, Jour. 1879), with the assistance of Bro. Thos. Woodyatt, P. G., I prepared a circulargiving full instructions as to the mode of procedure required for Lodges to become incorporated, together with the certificate required to be filled up, the necessary copies of which I sent to each Lodge which had not already been incorporated. Very many Lodges have taken advantage of the information given, and become incorporated; and in view of the trouble experienced by the Grand Master in winding up the affairs of late Riverside Lodge, I would suggest the advisability of this Grand Lodge requiring all its subordinates to become incorporated immediately, or as soon as possible after institution.

Clause 14a.—Grand Secretaries throughout the entire Jurisdiction of chause 14d.—Urand Secretaries throughout the entire Jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge are beginning to realize the importance of the vital statistics published, and are each year collecting and giving to their several Jurisdictions and the Order at large very valuable information, which should serve as a glass, in which each Lodge may view its position, and can show the breakers which have caused the ruin of so many good Lodges by not making the vate of dues repositionate to the amounts they Lodges by not making the rate of dues proportionate to the amounts they promise to brothers when they may become disabled through sickness or promise to promers when they may become unsabled inrough sixiness or accident. Your Grand Secretary regrets very much that he cannot give as much statistical information this year as the importance of the matter would warrant. With the year closing 30th June, returns not in by that July, and the Session of Grand Lodge coming on the 11th August, does not give time to collect the information of the past year's transactions with any degree of accuracy. I would suggest that this Grand Lodge make its fiscal year end on the 31st December, the same as that of the Sovereign Grand Lodge; some months would then be had in which to presovereign Grant Louge; some months would take be had in which to pare correct reports. The transactions of the half year ending 30th June could be specially reported upon at each Session. As it now is, the Annual Report of the Grand Cor. and Rec. Secretary of the Sovereign Grand Lodge made in Sentember of each year only contains the information of Report of the Grand Cor. and Rec. Secretary of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, made in September of each year, only contains the information of the year's transactions ending 51st December, and there always is great discrepancy between the reports of that officer and the reports of your Grand Secretary at our own Grand Lodge in August of each year. The above suggestions are worthy of your consideration.

Clause 15.—I would suggest that a special committee be appointed to report upon the advisability of this Grand Lodge procuring a very hand-Lodges at about cost, for presentation to each member upon his attaining the Scarlet Degree. I believe that such a course would be conducive to the best interests of the Subordinate Lodge, and an incentive to all brothers to get the Degrees as early as possible. The certificate could be made of a size suitable for framing, and should set forth the brother's

Clause 16.—A great source of trouble has at times arisen from the Clause 16.—A great source of trouble has at times arisen from the careless manner in which representatives hand in the name of the brother whom they desire to be appointed District Deputy Grand Master. It is often handed in on alips of paper of every conceivable shape and style of writing, so imperfectly in many cases that the Christian and surnames of these officers last year were printed wrong. I trust that this year the names of all brothers nominated to the M. W. Grand Master for D. D. G. M. be plainly written. Clause 17.—I am inclined to the belief that a return to the system of Clause 17.—I am inclined to the belief that a return to the system of Deputies for each district would be much better than our present system. Many good Lodges complain that they hardly ever see a Grand Officer, no one taking sufficient interest to visit them; that the Installation of Officers, which used to be looked upon as an important occasion under the old system referred to, being now conducted by members of the Lodge only, is tame and dull. Under the old system, the Installation of Officers was looked upon as the event of the term: members attended in greater only, is came and unit of the term; members attended in greater numbers to see so distinguished a brother as District Deputy Grand

Clause 18.—The effects of late Charity Lodge, No. 129, Sutherland; Cookstown Lodge, No. 162, Cookstown, have been received, and the tems credited to these Lodges, the former through Brother Henry Wilson, of Markham, the latter through Bro. W. Ross, D.D.G.M., Barrie. These brothers did all they possibly could to keep the Lodges named alive, but without avail.

I have just received a letter from Bro. J. F. Reed, D.D.G.M., Dunnville, stating that the furniture, books and Charter of Oswego Lodge, No. 156, at Attercliffe, formerly at Canboro', has been placed in the Possession of Emerald Lodge, No. 173, by the late D.D.G.M. Brother McLaughlan, and asking directions as to their disposal. I at once directed

him to forward the same to this office without delay.

There are now in the possession of the Grand Lodge three sets of regalia, which I would suggest had better be sold to new Lodges about starting at a duly appraised price, and the proceeds placed to the credit of the defunct Lodge; and if it should ever be resuscitated, the full value of effects surrendered could be restored in cash. I make this suggestion, fearing that moths may get into and destroy these regalias, and no return would then be got for them at all.

Question by Rop. W. H. Marsh, of Warriner Lodge, No. 75:
Section 56 of our By-laws states that no funeral or sick benefits shall be payable by this
Lodge to any brother who, when his sickness began, was more than three months in arrears.
Section 57 also states that no brother, being three months in arrears for dues, shall become
entitled to any benefits until two months after such arrears shell have been paid in full
to lodge, by a special vote, places a member (that is in arrears) in good standing on the
books during a period of sickness, and he, the said member, dies during said sickness before

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REPORT OF THE REPRESENTATIVES

TO THE

Sovereign Grand

SESSION OF 1880,

HELD AT TORONTO, ONT.

TO THE R. W. GRAND LODGE OF ONTARIO:

Your Representatives to the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the I.O.O.F., in presenting their Report, have thought it advisable to deviate somewhat from the course usually pursued. It is deemed the duty of Representatives to report to their constituency only a synopsis of the legislation had in the Supreme Parliament of the Order; but the circumstances attendant upon the last Session were such as to justify a more extended notice. For the first time in its history, the Sovereign Grand Lodge met outside the boundaries of the United States; for the first time in its history, the Grand Lodge of Ontario had the honor of receiving the Sovereign Grand Lodge as its guest; for the first time in their lives, many of our the Grand Lodge of Untario had the honor of receiving the Sovereign Grand Lodge as its guest; for the first time in their lives, many of our Canadian Odd-Fellows had the opportunity of making the personal acquaintance of the leaders of our Society. It seems to us fitting, therefore, that not only the legislation of the Sovereign Grand Lodge for 1880, but a complete account of the reception of our honored visitors, should go on record in the Journals of the Grand Lodge.

At an early date after the acceptance of our invitation to the Sovereign Grand Lodge to meat in Ontario, preparations were commenced with a

At an early date after the acceptance of our invitation to the Sovereign Grand Lodge to meet in Ontario, preparations were commenced with a view to extending to that body a reception that should be an honor to Canadian Odd-Fellowship. A Joint Committee was organized, embracing Representatives from the Grand Lodge, Grand Encampment, and the Fraternity in Toronto, with Bros. F. Fowler, Chairman, J. T. Hornibrook, Vice-Chairman, J. B. King, Secretary, and Hugh Blain, Treasurer. It is only a matter of justice to say that the actual work of the Committee was performed by the Toronto brethren, and that to their carnest and zealous labour the anneass of the recention, was mainly due. labors the success of the reception was mainly due.

In arranging the programme for the reception, it was found necessary to keep in mind the promise made by your Representatives, that there should be no interference with the work of the Session. It was therefore decided to invite the members of the Grand Lodge to attend in Toronto on Friday morning, the 17th September, thus giving plenty of time for

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suitable festivities before the Session began. To this proposition the Grand Sire kindly consented, and arrangements were therefore made for the formal reception by the civic authorities on that day. An arrangement was also made with the managers of the Toronto Industrial Exhibition for a visit to their Fair, and an invitation was sent to all the Lodges in the Province to unite in welcoming the Sovereign Grand Lodge to Ontario.

After careful consideration it was decided that the main features of the programme should be as follows:

FRIDAY, 17th SEPTEMBER.—Grand Procession, visit to the Industrial Exhibition, reception by the civic authorities.

SATURDAY, 18TH.—Trip to Penetanguishene.

SUNDAY, 19TH.—Sermon by the Grand Chaplain, Rev. Bro. Venable, in St. James' Cathedral.

MONDAY, 20TH. - Reception by the Grand Lodge of Ontario.

Tuesday, 21sr.—Cab jaunt to places of interest in the city; Grand Representatives' Re-union at Horticultural Gardens.

THE RECEPTION ON FRIDAY,

The demonstration on Friday was the most imposing ever witnessed in Toronto. The weather was beautiful; the attendance was large, and the enthusiasm unbounded. From an early hour in the morning the streets of the city were througed with people, strangers as well as citizens; on every hand were to be seen men dressed in the uniform of Patriarchs, or wearing the neat badges that indicated the members of the Order; while the music of the bands accompanying the visiting Lodges, filled the air with continuous strains of martial melody.

The rendezvous for those taking part in the procession was the Parlia-

The rendezvous for those taking part in the procession was the Parliameter Grounds; and the hour for assembling, twelve o'clock. Promptly at the time the various Lodges and Encampments began to assemble. The west end of the grounds had been set apart for the Canadian Lodges, and the east for the American Lodges and Uniformed Encampments. The most attractive spectacle was presented on this side, where were gathered the handsomely uniformed Patriarchs, embracing delegations from Rochester Encampment, under the immediate command of Col. S. S. Eddy, of the 54th N. Y. Regiment, author of "Eddy's Tactics;" Excelsior Encampment, Chicago; Toronto Encampment, and Adelphian Encampment, London.

About two o'clock the procession began to move out of the grounds, preceded by a detachment of mounted police under the command of Major Draper. First came the flags of the three principal nations represented: the German tri-color, borne by W. A. Jackson, Queen City Lodge; the Stars and Stripes, by E. Smith, Owen Sound; and the Union Jack between them, by H. L. Armstrong, Covenant Lodge, Toronto. The Canadian Lodges which followed were guided by Division Marshal W. G. Mutton (mounted). After this came the Sovereign Grand Lodge in carriages. Each carriage bore on either side a shield with the name of the State or Province riage fore on either side a smeld with the name of the State or Province for whose delegates it had been reserved. The Grand Lodge was in charge of its own Grand Marshal, Bro. Nathan Taylor, of Worcester, Mass.; Walter Blight being Division Marshal, and Wm. Jefferies, Marshal's aide. The character and appearance of this magnificent procession can be best described in the words of an impartial observer. In its report of the

day's proceedings, the Toronto Globe said:
'Never before in the history of the Queen City has so long a procession marched through her streets, and it may with equal truth be said that a larger, more orderly, and respectable crowd of people never assembled on any occasion in our midst. There was very little rowdyism, and there was also an entire absence of unseemly noise. Cheering there was in plenty from house tops, front windows, and from every other available point of observation; and the waving of handkerchiefs on the part of the fair sex created a continued flutter. Flags waved, and broad banners flaunted their gilded folds in the breeze, while bannerets met the eye at

flaunted their gilded folds in the breeze, while bannerets met the eye at every turn."

The route of the procession was along Wellington Street to Simcoe, up Simcoe to Front, along Front to West Market Square, up Market Square to King, and along King to the Exhibition Grounds. When the procession reached the Exhibition Grounds gate a halt was made, and the brethren separated so as to form a line on each side of the road. This line extended down the road over the viaduct crossing the railway track, half a mile away. The Grand Lodge, headed by its Marshal, with its officers and members in cabs, passed through the line and so into the grounds amidst the most enthusiastic cheering of the multitude, and the Lodges and Encampments followed, moving on towards the Judge's stand, in front of which a dash had been erected for the civic officials and the authorities of the Order. As the Lodges reached the stand they "broke of;" and the the Order. As the Lodges reached the stand they "broke off;" and the procession, which had taken an hour and ten minutes to pass by, was dissolved, the bands uniting in the National Anthem.

Meanwhile a number of gentlemen had assembled on the dais to receive the Officers of the Grand Lodge. Messrs. Wood, Pardee, Mowat and Crooks represented the Ontario Government; Mayor Beaty, Ald. Walker, Steiner, Garlisle, Farley, and Messrs. Coatsworth and McWilliams, represented the Municipal authorities; Messrs. Withrow, McGee and Hill the Industrial Exhibition. GRAND SIRE, GRAND OFFICERS, AND REPRESENTATIVES OF THE SOVE-REIGN GRAND LODGE OF THE INDEPENDENT ORDER OF ODD-FELLOWS I have much pleasure, on behalf of the City of Toronto, in welcoming You to Canadian shores. It is a great gratification to me, as well as it is to the citizens at large, that this the first Session out of the United States has been held in the Queen City of the West. We are very much gratified in having the presence amongst us of so many persentatives of this great institution to day in this procession, and I sm. quite sure I am correct in saying that Toronto has never witnessed a grander procession since it had an existence. We are exceedingly gratified/hat we have to day representatives from, I believe, almost every State in the Union of the United States of America at present with us, as well as representatives from all parts of the Dominion of Canada. When we understand the magnitude of the operations of these gentlemen who represent this organization, we well wonder at the extent of their work. I have been told that they sometimes expend four millions of dollars in one year for charitable purposes. I have also been informed that several of the representatives present have come over 4,000 miles for the purpose of attending this grand organization. When we consider all that, we see the importance, and magnitude, and great extent of this great institution; and I am able with much more freedom to say welcome to you, Grand Sire, because I know that the institution is non-sectarian, non-political, and only devotes itself to charitable objects and the relief of those who are in distress. An instituchariable objects and the relief of those who are in distress. An institu-tion of this kind, expending so large a sum of money, and extending its ramifications over the world, exerts a great power for good, and I trust you will go on and extend your good work in all lands. I thank you for your attendance here to-day, and I trust your stay will be as pleasant to you, as it is pleasing to us to receive you.

To these addresses John B. Harmon, Grand Sire of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, replied as follows:

Mr. MAYOR AND Mr. PRESIDENT, AND OFFICERS OF THE INDUSTRIAL EXHIBITION ASSOCIATION OF TORONTO,—Time was when Englishmen and Americans did not meet fraternally on Canadian soil. In 1813 we took the ancient city of York, now called Toronto, and burned its legislative buildings and archives, and all America applauded the deed. A year later, in 1814, you took Washington and burned the Capitol of the United States, the President's house, and other public buildings, and all Great Britain and Canada applauded the deed. In both cases nothing substantial was gained and nothing shown, except that savageism then lurked, as it now lurks, in our civilization. The 5,000 years of history seem to have lifted the man just hich anough not to be apriciply above the burne. The wellthe man just high enough not to be entirely above the brute. The smell and taste of blood reveal the line of his nature and make him mad for his prey. The butcheries, meanness, and selfishness exhibited in the wars of the 19th century equal those of antiquity. "War is a barbarism which civilization only intensifies, as indeed civilization intensifies every barbarism which it does eradicate or cover up." In short, if we take as an example Europe, the supposed centre of modern civilization, only this point has been reached, to wit, that a standing army of five millions of men is necessary to keep the peace. In some parts, if left to themselves, Jew would eat Christian and Christian would eat Jew. If this be civilization, what is barbarism? When we say Europe is refined and civilized, what do we mean? The smallest nations there have large standing armies. Little Belgium struts around with about 100,000 soldiers. If it were not scripus it would be ridiculous. And yet Europe is learned, scientific, cultivated, full of universities, libraries, museums, hospitals, asylums, and churches. If North America were cut up into as many asymms, and churches. It North America were cut up into as many separate nations, the result would perhaps be the same. Wherever we turn our eyes the world bears on its very front many of the marks of barbarism. Passion, selfishness, injustice, inhumanity are everywhere characteristics of the body politic—inwoven in the private and public life of every civilized nation under the sun. The whole secular organism works more and more towards corruption and vice, which if unstemmed, will in time turn us back to that barbarism and despotism from which we sprung. Nations to day go to war over petty disputes about boundaries, the right of fishers, the possession of a worthless island, insult to the flag or a minister, or, as in the case of Germany and France in 1870, because the former would not agree that no Hohenzollern should ever be King of Spain. The motives and objects of our wars are as small and the unreason and passion as great as in the wars of the Pawnees and the Sioux. The Apache no more delights in the bloody scalp than do the priests and lay-men of civilized nations delight in a long list of the enemy slain. Must this always be so? Conceding that the race has necessarily passed through

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war, despotism, and inhumanity in its progress from barbarism to civilizawar, desponsin, and innumently in its progress from barbarism to civiliza-tion, certainly all these can now be banished from our code. National disputes can be settled by negotiation or arbitration, and the inherent rights of man are so well understood, that organized or governmental injustice should not be tolerated, and individual wrongs should have full remedy in public opinion and in the Courts. That such disputes may be rements in protect opinion and in the courts. That such disputes may be successfully settled is shown by the four recent examples between Great Britain and the United States, whereby the Alabama claims, settled by the Geneva award in favor of the United States, the fisheries settled by the Halifax Commission in favor of Great Britain, the claim of San Juan and the claim of San Ju other islands settled by the Emperor of Germany in favor of the United States, and other claims growing out of the civil war in the United States settled by the Washington Commission in favor of Great Britain, were all removed by these great nations from the domain of war to the domain of reason and fraternity. Behold the difference! Germany and France, in the miserable question of Hohenzollern or no Hohenzollern, butchered hundreds of thousands of men and wasted over two thousand millions of dollars, while Great Britain and America settled four difficult international disputes at a cost of about twenty-three millions, and without the loss of a life. Among the evidences of barbarism is the want of hospitality to strangers. To-day the City of Toronto and its Industrial Exhibition Assostrangers. To day the City of Toronto and its industrial Balliotaton association have given us a truly fraternal welcome—in striking contrast with the manner in which strangers were received in former times. A few hundred years ago they had scarcely any rights. Even Cardinal Richelieu arowed the right of arresting them when they came into the kingdom without safe conducts, and many examples occurred of industrious strangers who, when thrown by accident on Christian shores, were kept in captivity until ransomed. All the members of this Sovereign Grand Lodge of Odd-Fellows, except the seven from Canada, come from the United States as strangers. And yet we are permitted by British law and British civilization to tread British soil free as the citizen himself, and we are welcomed by this vast amphitheatre of thousands of open-armed and open-hearted by this vise amplianease of thousands or open-armed and open-neared men. Verily, the march of human fraternity has been grand. Fifty years ago, neither this city nor this Association would have recognized the presence here of a Grand Lodge of Odd-Fellows. But now, so deep down into the hearts of men has human brotherhood sunk—so essential to the power, the prosperity and the happiness of a nation have the great industrial classes become—so essential is it that these be tied by the strong bonds of friendship to all other classes—that an institution like Odd-Fellowship, which gathers within its fold a half million of men without distinction of calling or creed, which pays out each year millions of dollars in relief of distress, which educates its members in industry, in self-reliin reher or discress, which educates its memoers, in industry, in sen-renance, in Parliamentary law, in Legislature and judicial capacities, in morality, in the power of command and in the duty of obedience, which, in a word, is a great overflowing Nile of humanity—commands everywhere in America the respect of rulers and people. Within the lodge-room every man—from the scholar, the scientist, the artist, to the modest day-laborer—may find a hyother, and he may also find that toleration of opinion, that may find a brother, and he may also find that toleration of opinion, that freedom of thought and conscience, that justice between man and man, which in this age can build up society and maintain a Government. Neither monarchies nor republics can have other foundations. Great Britain and America are strong only in so far as they stand on the bed-rock of human fraternity. But be it ever remembered that fraternity requires that a man should know how to obey as well as how to rule—just as no man is fit to be a general who is not fit to be a soldier. In Odd-Fellowship

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there is no communism and no lawlessness. Fraternity is mindful of its own, but it is also mindful of other people's own. Its essential maxim is

—As you would that other men should do unto you, so do ye unto them. —As you would that other men should do unto you, so do ye unto them. This Order prospers in proportion as a people are free. Hence its large growth in the United States, in Canada, and Australasia. It binds the people of a nation together, and helps to bind nations to each other. The Dominion of Canada and the United States are nearly twice as large as Europe, and if they were filled with Lodges of Odd-Fellows, the chances of war between us would be largely diminished. May we all ever be brothers, and may the uplifted sword never again flash in war on either side of the great lakes. This North American Continent—by its position on the earth's surface, securing its people from attack by other nations; by its soil and climate, tending as they do to the best human development; by its traditions and habits of freedom for a century past; by its recognition of that invaluable right of man—a government based only on the consent of the governed, with the happiness of the whole people its object; by its immense agricultural, mining, mechanical, and commercial power; by the vigour, the intelligence, and the tremendous energy of its people—ought to be a beacon-light to the nations as they move on to their destiny. Of this great continent the United States and the Dominion of Canada constitute almost the whole, and while we accept your cordial welcome to this city great continent the United States and the Dominion of Canada constitute almost the whole, and while we accept your cordial welcome to this city and this Exhibition, we bid you, Mr. Mayor, Mr. President, and people of Canada, join us as Odd-Fellows and citizens of that noble Republic across the lake in stamping out war and every other barbariam, making of all peoples one people, bound together by fraternal commerce and universal

This finished the formal ceremonies of the day, and closed one of the

most imposing pageants ever witnessed in the City of Toronto.

In the evening the members of the Grand Lodge were entertained by the Mayor and City Council in the Exhibition Dining Hall. Upwards of 200 gentlemen sat down, the great majority of whom were American representatives. His Worship the Mayor presided at the head of the table, with Grand Sire Harmon on his right.

After lunch appropriate toasts were proposed, and in response addresses were made by Past Grand Sire Sanders and Representatives Herring, of Texas; Bigelow, of Verinont; Morrow, of California; Garey, of Maryland; Shaffner, of Kentucky; Woodyatt, of Ontario.

THE TRIP TO PENETANGUISHENE.

In order to give our visitors an opportunity to view some of the wild and beautiful scenery in the northern part of the Province, arrangements had been made for a trip to Penetanguishene; and about 200 brethren, with their ladies, accepted the invitation. Several members of the Board of Trade, the Exhibition Committee and the City Council, accompanied the party. The Northern Railway Company placed a special train at the disposal of the excursionists; and at eight a.m. the party started from the City Hall Station. The morning air was pleasantly cool and breezy; a shower the previous night had cleared the country from dust; and provided with every comfort possible for an excursion train, all seemed in the happiest of spirits, and ready to enjoy the trip. Leaving the city behind, the train sped rapidly along, passing farm and homestead, village and hamlet in quick succession, presenting to the tourists an ever changing scene. Taking the newly-constructed North Simcoe Road, where it branches off from the main line, the route now lay through a new and comparatively unsettled country, where only an occasional log cabin or lumber mill broke the dull monotony of the thickly wooded forest.

About twelve o'clock the train steamed into the station at Penetanguishene, where the civic authorities and a number of citizens were assembled to meet the party. Proceeding to the Georgian Bay Hotel, the following address was presented by the Reeve, Dr. Spohn, on behalf of the Corporation:

Although our town was founded many years ago by the British authorities as a naval and military station, yet in the due course of events the withdrawal of that source of support and its then isolated position withheld the possibilities of its advancing as other Canadian towns advanced, until in the past year it renewed its birth by the advent of the railway that now connects it with the railway system of the continent; and we feel that in the future, as one of the principal ports of Ontario, it will play an important part in the commerce of the country. We trust that the visit of our American friends will tend to bind still stronger the ties of friendship that exist between the two great peoples of this continent, and that the route over which you have brought them to-day may soon be the outlet for the trade of their great West, and that our spacious harbour may share in the commerce that nature has formed it for. We hope that after having visited this section of the Province, and viewed the many attractions that nature has bestowed on us, your faces will become familiar in our midst, and that in the future, among the happy recollections retained of this gathering of your Order, the visit to Penetanguishene may be one of the happiest.

In the absence of the Grand Sire, Deputy Grand Sire Glenn replied. In acknowledging the courtesy shown by the Corporation of Penetanguishene, he referred to the fact that among the representatives in the highest legislative Council of the Order of Odd-Fellows, were to be found men of every political shade of opinion, and of every religious creed. Among them were members of the legal and medical professions, doctors of divinity, merchants, mechanics, and laboring men—in fact, men from all classes of society. Yet among them there was no strife here or at home, and no dissensions saving that noble emulation as to who could best serve in upholding and disseminating the great fundamental principles of Odd-Fellowship. This was not the time or the occasion for him to dwell upon those principles, but he could not forbear from saying that the great mission of

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Odd-Fellowship was the diffusion of the principles of benevolence and Odd-Feilowship was the diffusion of the principles of benevolence and charity, the bringing of men together in social union and fraternal intercourse. The Sovereign Grand Lodge originated many years ago, but this would be the first occasion on which it had ever assembled outside of the United States. That meeting would constitute an event, an export, not only in the history of Ontario, but in the history of the Order itself. In reference to their reception in Ontario he had a word to say. He had been a member of the Grand Body since 1852; he had travelled with it in been a memor or one urand Body since 1802; he had travelled with it in all its wanderings; he had attended its gatherings at San Francisco, on the golden shores of California, at Chicago, the great commercial emporium of the North-West; in the beautiful city of Indianapolis, capital of the Hoosier State; and in Philadelphia, the city of brotherly love, on the occasion of the Centennial in 1876; and he could assure them that the demonstration on Friday, and the reception given them generally in Toronto, exceeded any and all former occasions. He sincerely trusted and believed that the fruits of this visit of the Grand Lodge to Ontario would be seen not only in an increase in the membership of the Order throughout Canada, but in drawing more closely together the ties of union, consanguinity, and fraternity between Canada and the American nation. He also expressed the hope that hereafter peace would shed her influence both upon Canada and the United States, and upon the Mother Country from which they had all sprung. The boat proceeded further up the bay with those who remained on board, passing Minneagneshene—the Indian for Blueberry Island—and coming within sight of the "Giant's Tomb," when she turned homeward, taking on board the Reformatory visitors on the return trip. Arriving at Penetanguishene, another repast was partaken of at the hotel, after which the company repaired to the railway station, and a start was made for home at company repaired to the railway station, and a start was made for home at a few minutes to six. The party arrived in Toronto shortly after ten—all

well pleased with the excursion.

THE SUNDAY SERVICES.

On Sunday, the 19th, at 3 p.m., the members of the Order in the city marched to St. James' Cathedral, which was crowded with an attentive congregation, gathered to listen to a sermon by the Chaplain of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, Rev. J. W. Venable, of Kentucky. Taking for his text Luke x. 29, "And who is my neighbor," the reverend brother preached an able and interesting discourse on charity. He said:

A certain lawyer, we are told, on one occasion came to Christ and asked a question, "tempting Him," i.e., seeking to draw from Him a reply which might compromise Him, as we say, before His enemies, and bring discredit on His words and works. The question was, "What shall I do to inherit eternal life?" It seemed to be an earnest inquiry, but it

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proceeded from a corrupt heart, and therefore did not deceive our Lord, "unto whom all hearts are open and all desires known." Our Søriour quietly asked His plausible questioner, "What is written in the law? How readest thou?" "You are a teacher of the law; what does the law say?" And he, answering, said: "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy strength, and with all thy mind, and thy neighbor as thyself." To which Christ replied, "Thou hast answered right: this do, and thou shalt live." But nothing vexes accorded to the process resource as much as having simple duty plainly say thefore them. And so, hoping to involve our Saviour in a difficulty by asking a question which touched upon tender points at that day, the lawyer inquired further, "And who is my neighbor?" Mark well the answer of our Lord. ther, And who is my neignor: Mark went the answer of our lord. He enters into no definition of the term neighbor, to which great objections would at once have been made. He does not give a bare statement of the relationship existing between all the human family, which would probably have made little impression; but He adopts the more direct, simple and effective course of teaching by example, and by means of a parable conveys a lesson of truth which no man that heard it could ever forget. "A certain man went down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell among thieves, who stripped him of his raiment, and wounded him, and departed, leaving him half dead." The picture was one the truth of which thus far every one present might recognize. The traveller had to traverse the wild, rocky road which led from Jerusalem to Jericho, and which preserves to this day its ancient dangerous character, being in some places a savage mountain pass, well fitted for deeds of violence such as our Lord here describes. As the wounded man lay helpless on the ground, "there came down a certain priest that way, and when he saw him he passed by on the other side. And likewise a Levite, when he was at the place, came and looked on him, and passed by on the other side. These persons looked upon the misery which they did not even attempt to relieve. If any class of men were bound to carry out the principles of the law of Moses-a law so full of kindness and consideration for the afflicted and helplessit would be men of the priestly order-Levites and priests. If any men might be supposed to know their duty better than others, it would be the men who were the teachers of the people—the men whose lips ought to keep knowledge as the appointed messengers of the Lord of Hosts. But when they had seen the wounded man lying in the way they both took the same view of the case, and quietly stepped aside as if it were no concern of theirs. The unfortunate traveller was doubtless a Jew—one of their own nation—and therefore entitled to some degree of active sympathy. And yet they showed him none. "But a certain Samaritan, as he journeyed, came where he was, and when he saw him he had compassion on him and went to him and bound up his wounds, pouring in oil and wine, and set him on his own beast, and brought him to an inn and took care of him. And on the morrow when he departed he took out two pence and gave them to the host, and said unto him, "Take care of him, and whatso-ever thou spendest more, when I come again I will repay thee." It should be observed, that all this tenderness towards the wounded man proceeded from a Samaritan—an alien from the commonwealth of Israel—one of a From a samartan—an anen from the commonweath of Israel—one of a community with whom the Jews had no dealings; whose name was a very by-word of reproach and infamy, and who were almost reckoned with the very heathen. On such an one, therefore, the bleeding traveller had no claim whatever, and the Samaritan might easily have invented an excuse for passing on and leaving him to his fate. But this man had studied in a better school than the great bulk of either nation—the school of benevolence and charity. He is found to have left no means untried to relieve the wounded man's sufferings.

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Such was our Lord's narrative; and, turning to the lawyer who had questioned him, asked his opinion of the case: "Which now, of these three, thinkest thou was neighbor to him that fell among the thievers?"

Instantly the natural dictate of the man's heart was pronounced, "He that showed mercy on him." He was "the neighbor." Then said Jesus unto him, "Go, and do thou likewise." If we may venture to paraphrase our Lord's words, we may say that this is at least a part of their meaning: "You have asked me what you are to do in order to attain termal life. I have told you what to do in this parable; go and do likewise. Do not waste time in speculating which commandment of the law is greater than the rest, but do what the law in spirit, if not in words, exhorts you to do. Go forth and engage in the active service of assisting the distressed, of ministering comfort to the suffering, of visiting the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and you will soon learn more than you know at present about the spirit of the holy law which you profess to teach, and how it will lead you on to eternal life. You will find that in its true intention it seeks to make all men neighbors and brothers; that it regards them as God's children, and would, if ble, join them all in one great family. But how is this to be learned? By comparing the predictions of the Old Testament with the fulfilments which I have become the superstructure. I have brought about. In me you will find the true interpreter of the law, and you will see, when the mist is cleared from your eyes, that the law which you profess to reverence so highly is after all the educator, the law which you profess to reverence so nightly is after all the educator, the schoolmaster, whose business is to lead you and all the world, if you will follow its guidance, to Me, the Messiah, the Christ of its prophecies. Regard both law and Gospel as parts of one great plan, in which the latter portion is the true explainer of the former. The first great commandment will lead men to Me; the second will show how all mankind are, in My view, 'neighbours' to Me and to each other. And the true way to learn view, neignours to me and to each other. And the true way to learn this great truth is to put it into practice. The practice of Christian charity will teach you more about Me, and show how the two great command-ments of the law are really blended into one, and inseparably bound up with each other by the Gospel." My beloved hearers, we may regard the good Samaritan of this parable as Christ Himself, the great healer of the sick, the physician of souls, the minister of comfort to the broken in heart as walls as the sufficient in heart who true the law of the property and the state of as well as to the suffering in body-who took His journey from Heaven for this very purpose, and who pours the oil and wine of comfort into their wounds. It is He who takes upon Himself the burden and the cost of their cure; it is He who lodges them safely within His inn, the Church. their cure; it is He who longes them sately within this him, the Church. Who feeds them with His own life-giving spirit, imparted in the sacraments ordained by Himself for their support, at His own loot—the cost of His own blood; and when His own bodily presence is withdrawn from sight does not lose sight of them, but provides the means for nourishing and supporting their sguls until He comes again. The more real the pattern of Christ becomes to us one by one, the more vivid our sense of His personal presence with us one by one; the more firmly we grasp the truth, one by one, that He is ours, the more widely will our feelings and longings reach out for the welfare of all whom He calls His brethren.

The likeness of the good Samaritan must be repeated in every shape. There is misery on a large scale to be relieved by associated efforts; there is constantly the great work to be done of bringing to Christ the souls of is constantly the great work to be dulte to stringing and abroad. Its like-benighted heathen and unbelievers, both at home and abroad. Its like-ness may be seen also in greater or less degree in all who will put then selves to inconvenience and self-denial for the purpose of relieving or comforting or doing good to others, not only in ways which are properly called spiritual, but in such as show kindness and friendly support and called spiritual, out in such as snow kindness and friendly support and benefit in the wants and necessities of everyday life. In these, the great question is not so much what work is done, as in the spirit in which we undertake and carry it through. There is plenty of ostentatious charity in the world, which is no charity at all, and there is much humble, unpretending kindness and love for others, even though not of our kinsfelk or acquaintance, which leads men and women to try and do them good, though without prospect of reward, or even, perhaps, of acknowledgment When Sir Philip Sydney was mortally wounded, he requested a cup of When Sir Philip Sydney was mortally wounded, he requested a cup of cold water. As it was being brought he heard a dying soldier make the same request. "Hand it to him," said the General, "hispeneds are greater than mine." Sir Philip was mighty in his country's service, but what act of his life approaches this one in grandeur! He died for his country, and he died also making willing sacrifices for his fellows. His name and the deed are remembered. Every man who walks this earth is by the bond of common humanity linked to avary other. Our Eather when He greated common humanity linked to every other. Our Father, when He created man, ordained that none should live for himself alone. Each one is linked, by cords invisible, to friends, to kinsfolk, to humanity at large; and along these electric wires our sweetest pleasures come. The various relations and dependencies of humanity are to each one as the boughs of the parent tree. They derive their strength and sap from him, but they render us as much as they receive. While his branches wave around him each leaf shall catch a breath of the cool breeze, a ray of the golden sunshine, or a drop of the freshening rain, and every genial influence thus shine, or a drop of the freshening rain, and every genial influence thus received shall send a thrill of pleasure to his heart. But let him once in selfishness lop off the branches which derived their life from him, and he shall be like the trunk blasted by the lightning. The sun may shine, the rain may fall, and the fresh breeze sweep over him, but he is sensitive to their sweet influences no longer; he shall remain cold and dead at heart forever. Men are still falling among thieves as they journey through life; are the Samaritans on the increase or decrease? This world wants nothing half so much as the brotherliness exemplified by Christ, whose mission was the wel-fare of the bodies and souls of men. When we do meet a true Christian we find a man who is spending and being spent in these Divine acts of self-denying charity. The most effectual way of reforming the depraced and the scoffing is to be found in liberal acts of self-sacrifice. Faith and works scoming is to be found in incertal acts of sear-sacrinet. Faith and works are never separated. The man who has been habitually helping others through life may in his day of need ask assistance with boldness and confidence; but who authorizes the penurious arm to be stretched out for returns where the seed of liberality was never sown? What right has a returns where the seed of inderanty was never sown! What right has a man to expect assistance in his day of trouble from friends or strangers, who never lifted his little finger when they were calling for help? "As ye sow so shall ye reap." It is gratifying to know that the example of the Good Samaritan has not been lost upon the human family. The lesson taught by this parable impresses itself more deeply as time rolls onward. We witness its effect in the multiplying charities of the Church; in its noble institutions for the sick and distressed, for the aged, for the tender orphan, for the outcast and unfortunate, for all who are

afflicted "in mind, body, or estate." We see it in the great public charities of states and nations, in caring for the unfortunate within their borders. It is exemplified anew in the various organizations of men, bound together by fraternal ties for mutual aid, and the diffusion of the principles of benevolence and charity. Not the least among these human brotherhoods is the Order of Odd-Fellows, whose Sovereign body is now about to hold its Annual Session here. Representatives from every State and Territory of the Union, from the islands of the sea, and from your beautiful Canadian Provinces, will meet in the interests of a common humanity. I trust it may not be amiss for me to state that this benevolent Order (whose honored Chaplain I have been for many years) expended during the year last reported over one million seven hun-dred and forty thousand dollars, chiefly for the relief of brothers, relief of widowed families, burying the dead, and the education of orphans. The Almighty Father, who regards the actions of His creatures, knoweth how many thousands of hearts have been made thankful by the quiet and cheerfully rendered bounty of this brotherhood. Prayers unnumbered have gone up from the hearts of widows and orphans who have been made joyous by its instrumentality in turning aside the iron hand of poverty and distress, and causing the rainbow of promise and hope to illuminate their darkened pathway. It may seem singular to many of my hearers that a minister of the Church should speak in such high terms of a human organminister of the church should speak in such light terms of a handle speak thus of it.

Many good people are prejudiced against this Order as tending, they imagine, to exalt the power of mere human voluntary associations above that of an institution established by God Himself. They regard it as a form of worldly religion, embraced and recommended purely upon worldly views, to the utter repudiation of those high and commanding truths whose maintenance is essential to the integrity of our holy religion. There cannot be a greater misconception, as the Constitution of the Order plainly shows. Instituted solely as a beneficial agency between man and man in shows the rugged journey of the present transitory life, it neither usurps the name nor place of religion. In its lectures and charges it inculcates in positive terms the cultivation of those virtues which serve to render man acceptable to his Creator, not failing to remind him of that worship and honor ever due to the Maker and Preserver of us all. It teaches the Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man, inculcating truth and love towards all with symbols, ritual, and ceremonies, all tending to the same great end. But it is not a religion, nor even a substitute. Its chief object is to benefit man here in this world as man, leaving his future destiny to be cared for, provided for, by our blessed and holy religion, under the ministration of those who are properly authorized and set apart to perform the work. It watches man to the grave, not beyond. It deals with the living, not the dead. To illumins the shadowy viste of the future. with the living, not the dead. To illumine the shadowy vista of the future, and prepare the soul for the mansions of bliss eternal in the heavens, is the mission of another holier institution. If it invaded the functions of the Church by daring to teach a religious system, or offering itself as a sub-stitute for that institution, it would long since have been discovered by struct for that institution, it would long since have been discovered by thousands who delight to do it honor; and in place of defending they would be found fighting shoulder to shoulder in the ranks of its opposers. We do not expect it to do the work of the Church. That halls from heaven. This confesses an earthly derivation, nothing more. The one faith professed and taught is benevolence and charity, co-extensive with the bounds of its power and the limits of its jurisdiction. 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educated, the stranger succored, the afflicted relieved, and every form of tenacted the stranger succeed, the america reneved, and every form of human distress alleviated, as far as possible. And thus even a human organization can carry into practice the beautiful and striking lesson taught us in the parable of the Good Samaritan. In looking at the various hinderances to the growth of a missionary spirit, we find a prominent one in the want of enlarged Christian views on what constitutes a "neighbor." Many who are kind and even generous to those around them, are unwilling to extend their sympathies far and wide. Yet whom does this instructive bearing which we have been considering teach us to regard as our neighbor.

Those only who dwell in our immediate vicinity? Those only of the same nation? Not at all. The whole world, it tells us, is one great neighborhood. Our Lord makes no distinction in the offices of benevolence between any kindred or people. He places us upon a high point of moral, sympathetic elevation from which all the distinctions of human selfishness are lost to sight. He breaks down all those barriers of separation which have been built up between man and man. The pathless waters of mighty oceans, the sullen gloom of tangled forests, the burning sands of silent deserts, the rugged sides of cloud-capped mountains, all are powerless to confine the spirit which He would inculcate. The wings of Christian love surmount them all, and a world is embraced in the arms of Christian mercy. As we contemplate this expanded answer to the question, "Who is my neighbor?" contemplate this expanded answer to the question, "who is my neighbor" do we not all stand convicted, in lesser or larger measure, of narrowness of soul? Let us regard the character of our Master, who lived and labored and died for the redemption of our whole race, and seg if in Him we find a warrant for anything like contractedness, either of heart or mind. He himself says, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like unto it. Thus shalt love thy neighmandment. And the second is like unto it. Thus is the first and great combor as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets." It is a natural instinct with children all the law and the It is a natural instinct with children of the same earthly parent to love one another. Are we not all children of our Heavenly Father? Hath not one God created us? He is Ruler amongst nations. Although one acknowledges one dominion and another another, the Kingdom of God ruleth over all. The Lord God reigneth omnipotent. dom of God ruleth over all. The Lord God reigneth omnipotent. The whole world, moreover, has but one Redeemer. Christ came not to save any one nation of men. "Look unto Me, and be ye saved, all the ends of the earth," was the call of Christ through the mouth of this prophet Isaiah: "God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." And more than this, the whole world will have but one Judge. When the earth and sea shall give up their dead, and the movinds who have so long slumbered in silance shall stand up at the voice myriads who have so long slumbered in silence shall stand up at the voice of the archangel's trumpet with a mighty resurrection, all of us must be arraigned at the same tribunal—all must appear before the judgment seat arragined at the same crimma—at must appear before the judgment seasor of Christ—each to answer for the things done in the flesh, whether good or evil. These are great considerations, and should have great weight. It is a matter vital to the progress of our holy religion, that the mind of every Christian should be emancipated from that selfish narrowness which is such a striking characteristic of the world. It is one of the most beautiful features of Christianity, that it can expand the most contracted nature to a capacity of conceptions of which the unchristianized philanthropist of the broadest wiews could never even have dreamed. Keep before your minds the fact that the whole world has with us a common nature, and common interests, the same Creator, the same Governor, the same Redeemer and the same Judge—and that, consequently, the whole world and nothing

less is our "neighbor." Reflections like these will forbid the confining of our sympathies, our prayers, our labors, or our contributions within some poor contracted circle. It will force them to go forth as free as the air and wide as the earth-to go forth disinterestedly and cordially, rejoicing that in any degree we can do as our Saviour commands us. Beloved dispute it who may, that noble Samaritan is your Lord's answer to the question, "What shall I do to inherit eternal life?" Be like that the question, "What shall I do to inherit eternal life?" Be like that good-Samaritan, and you will have the "mind of Christ!" For if it be, indeed, as holy men have thought, that the character of our Divine Pattern Himself is shadowed forth in His description of the Samaritan—what higher aim can we have, what nobler conception of goodness can we hope to form than this? How shall we better prove ourselves to be the disciples of Him who "went about doing good," than by unselfish patience and benevolence amidst all dangers and duties? Christ, when on earth, was the Friend, the "Neighbor," the Brother of His people, yet was from the first as a passing stranger here, hastening to the heavenly temple—the "Jerusalem that is above"—and blessing all whom He met by the way. When man had fallen from his high estate of innocence and holiness, and, stripped of the robe of original righteousness by the enemy of souls, lay wounded and ready to perish, then it was that Christ was led to look upon him, and to feel compassion, to draw near (as He did by "the mystery of His holy incarnation") to heal the wounds of our nature with the blessed medicine of His Word and Sacraments, that "oil and wine" wherewith the Great Physician binds up that which was broken, and strengthens that which was sick; to convey man thus rescued from death to the Church (that inn higher aim can we have, what nobler conception of goodness can we hope sick; to convey man thus rescued from death to the Church (that inn sick; to convey man thus rescued from death to the Church (that improvided for the reception of all "strangers and pilgrims" travelling towards "a better country, that is an heavenly") and there to "take care of him." All this it was reserved for Christ, the Good Samaritan, to perform for man. It is said in the parable that when the Samaritan departed, "he took out two pence, and gave them to the host, and said, Take care of him, and what soever thou spendest more, I will repay thee." And what is this but a mysterious hint that Christ, at his departing, bequeathed to His Church great gifts and graces, which were to be exercised for the relief of sick and perishing souls until his coming again? And, further, that when He "shall perising souls until his coming again? And, further, that when the "snar come again in His glorious majesty to judge both the quick and the dead," He will not only graciously allow what love and zeal have done in His blessed service, but will give it His mighty sanction also, and (in the language of the parable) "repay" it!

The heathen world is lying, like the traveller in the parable, bleeding, neglected and dying. A few are endeavoring to act the part of the good explanation that the latest which the same property is to the part of the good explanation.

Samaritan, but what multitudes of priests and Levites are passing by on the other side? Our own consciences must decide whose part we have acted. "Who was neighbor to him that fell among thieves?" "He that acted. "Who was neighbor to him that fell among theves!" "He that showed mercy on him." Who is neighbor to the perishing heathen? He that showeth mercy on them. We act the part of neighbor, perhaps, to those immediately around us, when we feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, relieve the stranger, clothe the naked, visit the sick. The heathen are our neighbors. Have we acted the part of neighbor towards and the part of the part of heighbor towards. heathen are our neignoors. Have we acted the part or neignoor towards them? They hunger: we must feed them with the bread of life. They thirst: we must give them to drink of living waters. They are strangers to the Covenant of Promise: we must lead them to the fold of the Good Shepherd. They are naked: we must clothe them with the garments of salvation. They are sick: we must tell them of the balm in Gilead, and the physician there. They are in prison: we must proclaim liberty to the captives. Acting thus the part of "neighbor" from motives of Christian

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love, no self-denial will prove too great a burden that shall enable us to show mercy. We shall cheerfully take from our luxuries, from our comforts, yea, from our fancied or real necessities, to supply their deep, imperious wants. And when the Son of Man shall come in His glory, and all the holy angels with Him, and before him shall be gathered all nations, then shall the King say to us, "Come ye blessed of My Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the beginning of the world. For I was an hungred, and ye gave me meat: I was thirsty, and ye gave me drink: I was a stranger, and ye took me i: Naked, and ye clothed me: I was sick, and ye visited me: I was in prison, and ye came unto me."

THE RECEPTION BY THE GRAND LODGE OF ONTARIO.

On Monday, the 20th, the Sovereign Grand Lodge commenced its legislative labors. When the Officers and Representatives had assumed their places in the Chamber, our M. W. Grand Master, Bro. W. H. Cole, presented the following address:

Most Worthy Grand Sire, Officers, and Members of the Sovereign Grand Lodge,—It gives me great pleasure to be able to welcome you to the Dominion of Canada, and especially to the Jurisdiction of the Province of Ontario.

You have already received a cordial welcome to this beautiful city from its Chief Magistrate. It enhances the pleasure of meeting you upon this occasion, to know that this is the first time that your august body has met outside the country that gave it birth.

But let me assure you, sir, that you will find brethren as true, with hearts as warm, to the principles of our Order, here in this country, which stretches to the frozen regions of the north, as you have found in the country in which you have so far sojourned; and may all the incidents of your journey to and from this place, as well as our intercourse during your short stay amongst us, be of that pleasant character to cause it to be remembered as a bright spot in life's journey; for it will be the earnest endeavor, not only of the members of the Order, but of the citizens here, to make you comfortable and happy while with us. I welcome you to this Chamber, which, by the kind permission of the Government, is placed at your disposal, with the library and committee rooms adjoining.

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desired. Again, I say, welcome to the Dominion of Canada; and if, during your short stay, you do not become so enamoured of our national institutions as to desire to become one with us, may your visit be so pleasant and agreeable that the bonds that now unite us may be strengthened, and we all more fully recognize the grandest principle of our Order, "The Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man."

THE RECEPTION BY THE GOVERNOR.

Early in the Session a communication was received from His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, intimating the pleasure he would have in receiving a visit from the members of the Grand Lodge and their ladies that afternoon; and, on motion of Past Grand Sire Nicholson, the invitation was unanimously accepted. In accordance therewith, the Officers and Representatives of the Grand Lodge, with a large number of ladies, visited Government House at the appointed time, and were most cordially received by Governor Robinson and his family, and by the Attorney-General of the Province, the Hon. Mr. Mowat. The interest of the occasion was increased by a visit from the Uniformed Patriarchs, in response to an invitation received by them. The Encampments formed in line in the grounds, and were reviewed by the Governor, who expressed himself highly delighted with their appearance. The cordial and pleasing manner in which His Honor received the American visitors not only made the reception exceedingly pleasant to our visitors, but was especially gratifying to the Canadian Odd-Fellows, who felt themselves honored in the courtesses shown their brethren from the United States.

THE CARRIAGE DRIVE ON TUESDAY.

Tuesday afternoon was devoted to a carriage drive around the city. Accepting the invitation extended them by the Reception Committee, the members of the Grand Lodge and their lady friends were provided with carriages to the number of sixty or more, each carriage being supplied with a member of the Local Committee to act as cicerone to the party. Starting from the Queen's Hotel, the Horticultural Gardens, the Normal School, the University, the Park, Osgoode Hall and the Metropolitan Church were visited. At the latter place the visitors were addressed in kindly words of welcome by the pastor, Rev. Dr. Potts, and also by the Rev. Dr. Ryerson. The organist, Prof. Torrington, had also arranged for an organ recital, embracing an extended programme of vocal as well as instrumental music, which was rendered in excellent style.

But this is the first time in its history, being the Fifty-sixth Annual Communication, that it has met outside of the United States. two great nations that have rendered the settlement of international dis-putes honorable, proclaiming to the civilized world that the sword can be turned into a ploughshare and the spear into a pruning hook, and that here-after we need not learn war any more. The recollections of this kind and fraternal greeting will be cherished to the latest time, and rehearsed at the firesides of half a million families, who will share with us the high compliment you have paid to their representatives. There seems to linger in the breast of the ex or past members of this body the brightest memories of that association, for year after year, upon the return of the Annual Convocation, we find many of them coming up to renew in this social and fraternal way the feelings of friendship that have been so happily formed during their official life, until we now have enrolled in the Association the names of many hundreds of Past Grand Representatives, some of whom meet annually on the second day of the Annual Session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, at which one or more of its companions deliver an address; and when the members of the Order in the locality have thought it design and the meetings are held in public, as upon the present interesting occasion, where we like to meet the fairest, brightest, and the best in the community, such as we now have the honor and gratification to behold. Our distinguished brother, Past Grand Sire James B. Nicholson, has been chosen to deliver the annual address for this year, and I will now give you an opportunity to hear what can be said in behalf of an Association that has for its political, moral, and religious platform the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man.

Hon. G. W. Allan replied to the address. He said he had much pleasure in tendering a hearty welcome to the Sovereign Grand Lodge to He supposed he had been asked to do this because he was the Re-union. President of the Society in whose pavilion they had that night met. He was glad to have it in his power to bid them welcome. They were all was guard of the world brothers in blood, having a common origin, and he hoped they would always regard each other with feelings of good-will. He had a high esteem for the organization, which had the doing of good works for its objects, and he hoped they would always be able to carry out their good intentions.

He would again extend to them a hearty welcome.

Past Grand Sire J. B. Nicholson then delivered one of the most able addresses on the principles and practices of Odd-Fellowship to which the people of Canada have ever had the pleasure of listening. Though the large building was crowded to an uncomfortable degree, and though it is by no means well suited for either speaking or hearing, yet the vast audience listened attentively to the address, interrupting it only by hearty applause

This address will probably appear in full in the proceedings of the

Sovereign Grand Lodge.

THE VISIT FROM THE GOVERNOR.

Intimation having been given that His Honor the Lieut Governor and the Mayor would be pleased to visit the Grand Lodge, twelve o'clock Wednesday was set apart for that purpose, and at that hour the Grand Lodge took a short recess. The doors of the Chamber and of the galleries bouge took a open, and a large number of the chief citizens of Toronto and of ladies were admitted. Lieut. Governor Robinson, Mayor Beaty, and several of the City Aldermen were then introduced and escorted to places of honor, the entire Grand Lodge rising to receive them. Grand Sire Harmon then delivered the following Address of Welcome:

This body takes great pleasure in receiving your Honor the Lieut.

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Governor of Ontario, and your Worship the Mayor of the City of Toronto. The receptions extended to us by the Government of the Province, the Exhibition Association, the City, the Odd-Fellows of Canada, and the people generally, have been beyond all expectation, and show a courteous and kindly, yet manly spirit, which become our common ancestry. people of the United States claim a kinship with Newton and Milton and shakespeare, and the host of other great men who have made the name of England immortal, and the Dominion of Canada is heir to the splendid history of that motherland. Permit me to give, through your Honor, on behalf of all Odd-Fellowship, and on behalf of the citizens of the United States, the right hand of welcome to the people here, and may they have the most abundant prosperity from generation to generation.

The Lieutenant-Governor replied as follows

Grand Sire and Gentlemen of the Sovereign Lodge,—I am glad, in response to your invitation, to find myself among you to-day, and to hear from yourself, speaking in behalf of the officers and members of your association, that I am a welcome visitor. Your own visit and that of your association, one I am a weacome visitor. Lour own visit and one of your brother members to this country and city is very significant of that good and friendly feeling which now exists between the people of the United States and the people of this country, and it will have the effect, I trust, of strengthening the many ties which already units us. My presence here in your midst is somewhat of a novel and exceptional character, for I find myself, as Governor of Ontario, warmly welcomed to my own Parliamentary Chamber by a numerous and powerful organization composed of citizens of the United States, representative men from every State and territory of the Union, who have voluntarily come to this Canadian city to transact the important business of their Order, and which, I am happy to learn, will take at least a week to accomplish. I must, however, be honest with you, sir, and inform you that by the Constitution of this Province I can withhold my consent to any law passed in this Chamber, which would render the law, though passed by the Grand Lodge itself, entirely inoperative. This I shall certainly do, and I will withhold my consent to the passing of some of your laws, unless, before I leave, I learn on good authority that you have determined to pay us another visit. I am greatly gratified in having this opportunity to join my fellow-citizens in evincing by my presence here to-day my respect for your organization; and believe me, sir, that knowing the great good accomplished already by it, I have as sincere a wish for its future prosperity and usefulness as any member of your own body can have. And now, sir, let me bid you farewell, expressyour own body can nave. And now, sir, let me bid you larewell, expressing a hope that the long journey before you in returning to your respective States and homes may be in every way pleasant to you, and that you may carry back with you a lively recollection of an agreeable week spent in this city, which will long be remembered by all Canadians who have had the

carry, which will long be remembered by an Canadians city, which will long be remembered by an Canadians good fortune to meet you.

His Worship Mayor Beaty also replied briefly, saying that he had great pleasure in acknowledging and reciprocating, on behalf of the citizens of Toronto, the hearty welcome extended by the Grand Sire. These visits are considered and perpetuated. were productive of much cordiality and good feeling between the two countries, which, he trusted, would be ever maintained and perpetuated. Looking at the grand demonstration the previous evening in the Gardens, a stranger would never have imagined that the large gathering was compared of citizens of several extractions are similar to the control of posed of citizens of separate nationalities, so similar were they in their persons and bearing, and so uniformly good-looking were all the Odd-Fellows. When they considered that there were 900,000,000 of heathen Asiatios and 90,000,000 Africans, and millions more, to be civilized throughout the

world, it was a pleasing thing to find the United States, the Mother Country, and Canada engaged in the noble work of accomplishing such a commendable object, so that peace and harmony might reign the world

After some time spent in conservation, the Governor rose to take his leave, when the Grand Sire, grasping him by the hand, bade him a hearty good-by. While he hoped His Honor would suspend his decision with regard to the terms upon which the Sovereign Grand Lodge should return to Canada, he could assure him that the members thereof would cherish

to canada, he could assure that the troper sentiments of friendship in their hearts forever.

"That, Grand Sire," said His Honor, "is an evasion of the question.

But hoping for your return in the near future, I bid you a hearty farewell." The visitors then left the room amid rounds of hearty applause from the Representatives.

THE WORK OF THE SESSION.

The Session of 1880 was not only a notable one from the fact that it was the first ever held outside the boundary lines of the United States. It was notable also for the length of time occupied, and the importance of the legislative work performed. Usually the Session commences on Monday and ends on Saturday, with at least one day in the middle of the week devoted to festivities, thus giving only five days of actual work. This year there was no interruption during the week on account of festal arrangements, and the Grand Lodge continued in active labor from Monday morning, the 20th, until the afternoon of Monday, the 27th—the longest Session ever held. This was largely due to the fact that the Grand Lodge had under consideration the revision of the entire Ritual of the Order, a work which occupied about two days. The Session was well attended, all the Officers and members being present, except the Representatives from the Grand Lodges of British Columbia, Chili and Switzerland, and from the Grand Encampments of South Carolina and West Virgnia.

CONDITION OF THE ORDER.

The state of the Order, as given in the Reports of the Grand Officers, is most encouraging. There was an increase over the previous year in the number of initiations, in the numbers of Lodges, and in the revenue of the Order; and though there was a decrease in membership, yet that decrease was far less than in the Reports of 1879, thus giving evidence that we

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cers, is in the of the ecrease hat we have recovered from the temporary depression of the past few years, and are once more mounting on the wave of prosperity. From Australia and New Zealand the most flattering reports were received. Into the West Indies the Order has been introduced by the opening of Americus Lodge, No. 1, at Bridgetown, Barbadoes. In Europe the work is progressing; and in addition to increase made in Germany, another Lodge was instituted in Denmark. In Manitoba, Portage Lodge, No. 3, was opened at Portage la Prairie, April 22nd, and Gateway Lodge, No. 4, at Emerson, April 14th. During the year the Grand Sire gave permission to the Odd-Fellows of Providence, Rhode Island, to initiate a Turkish General, Hassan Bassier, with a view to introducing the Order into Turkey. From Chili and Peru the reports were not so favorable as in former years. By way of showing the condition of the Order, we quote the conclusion of the Grand Secretary's Report, which not only gives a statistical resume, but an interesting personal retrospect of that venerable Officer:

The Grand Corresponding and Recording Secretary, in concluding the forty-first Annual Report he has had the honor to submit to the Supreme Body, cannot refrain from a glance at the years (uearly half a century) since he was elected to the honorable and important position, in which, by

the suffrages of his brethren, he has been continued. Coming into the body in September, 1831, as a Representative from the Grand Lodge of Maryland, when the Jurisdictions of Maryland, Massachusetts, New York, Pennsylvania, District of Columbia and Delaware appeared in the Grand Lodge by three Representatives and three Proxies, he has witnessed the growth of this great High Court of the Order until 148 accredited Representatives appear on the roll to answer for 50 Grand Lodges and 39 Grand Encampments. From 6 Grand Lodges, 69 Subordinates, and less than 5,000 members, he has been permitted to live to record the fact that 7,067 Lodges and 440,783 active members (besides those in Australasia and Germany) constitute the strength of this great institution.

many) constitute the strength of this great institution.

The first hall in the world for the exclusive use of Odd-Fellowship was dedicated in the City of Baltimore, in the year 1831, with all the pompand ceremony it was possible to improvise for such a momentous occasion. Though an insignificant building at the outset, it has grown to magnificent proportions, and has proved the incentive to others to move forward in this direction, until numberless Odd-Fellows' temples decorate the mountains and ornament the valleys of our favored North American Continent.

tains and ornament the valleys of our favored North American Continent. The systematic contributions for the "relief of the distressed, the burial of the dead and the education of orphans," have increased from less than \$5,000 in 1838 to \$1,714,805 in 1879, a total reported relief since the writer, in April, 1840, was elected Grand Corresponding Secretary, of about \$30,000,000, to which, if the volume of extraordinary contributions (not until within a few years reported) be added, the grand aggregate cannot fall much short of \$60,000,000 laid upon the altars dedicated to Benevolence and Charity by the Independent Order of Odd-Fellows during the sixty-one years of its existence in America.

The early associates of the writer in this body have passed from time to eternity. He looks over the honored list of active members of to-day and misses the familiar names of Wilder, Scotcheure, Matheur, Hall, Brice, Marley, Birkey, Gettys and Boyd, who served with him and constituted the Officers and members in 1831, and finds that they have all "gone to that undiscovered country from whose bourne no traveller returns."

Coming down to later years, and casting his eye over the roll of Past Grand Sires—the honored chiefs under whom it was his privilege to serve—he notes that of the twenty-four called to preside over the destinies of this great institution, twelve had been removed from the active scenes of

"To that mysterious realm, where each shall take His chamber in the silent halls of death."

Past Grand Sires Wilder, Gettys, Keyeer, Perkins, Glazier, Key-Novy, Hopkins, Knrass, Griffin, Ellison, Boylston and Stuart have departed, but their active services in behalf of the Order will not, cannot be forgotten; their devotion to its interests; their entire abnegation of self in their endeavors to place the institution in the uppermost rank of benevolent organizations, have justly deserved the highest encomiums bestowed upon them, and of each it may be truly said: "Well done, good and faithful servant."

It may be your lot, as it has been mine, to see many fall by the wayside—to count the number who wearied in well doing; to drop the tear of sympathy over the graves of those who continued faithful to the end, and "died with the harness on."

The active of to-day may be the dead of to-morrow; but their places will be filled by new men who will assume the vacant chairs and conduct

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the business entrusted to them with the same wise forethought that marked the course of their distinguished predecessors.

Twenty years ago the Grand Lodge assembled in the City of Nashville, State of Tennessee. The roll of Representatives accredited to this Session contains the names of only two of the 96 who were members of the Grand Lodge of 1860. Looking over the long list of brothers who have disappeared from this forensic stage, I am constrained to say:

"I feel like one
Who treads alone
Some banquet hall deserted,
Whose lights are fled,
Whose garlands dead,
And all but he departed!"

Year after year I have had the opportunity of speaking to you words of cheer, even when the heavy clouds of gloom hovered over us and seemed to shut out the faintest gleam of sunlight. During the dark days from 1861 to 1865, when the membership was so depleted that the heart of every true Odd-Fellow became sad, and fears for the safety and stability of the Order were felt by many of our best and wiscest, I did not despair, but expressed a firm belief that "the undying principle will not perish, but will again, when haleyon peace, with healing upon its wing, shall descend in mercy among the children of men, lift its fraternal voice to awaken a kindred and mpathetic pulse in the great heart of the Order."

During the years 1877, 1878 and 1879, we have lost from our fold 15.442 members. reducing the grad aggregate from 455-155 active Odd

During the years 1877, 1878 and 1879, we have lost from our fold 15,342 members, reducing the graid aggregate from 456,125 active Odd-Fellows in 1876, to 440,763 in 1879, yet there is no cause for despondency, our annual loss from 8106 in 1877 having been reduced to 1508 in 1879.

This Order is not an experiment, but has survived "the pestilence that walketh in darkness," the ordeal of fire has not affected it; gaunt famine has fied at its approach; and at its command the sword red with the blood of fierce conflicts has been sheathed. With its sixty-one years of active ministration in the cause of humanity; its admirable code of laws; its systematic benevolence—attributes that have been widely copied by other organizations—there is not the slightest room for doubt as to the permanency of the institution. Built upon the immutable corner stones of Friendship, Love and Truth, despite the efforts of foes without and enemies within, it will live to bless mankind in the future as it has in the past. As it has stood, so it will stand:

"As some tall cliff that lifts its mighty form, Swells from the vale, and midway leaves the storm; Though round its breast the rolling clouds may spread, Eternal sunshine settles on its head."

n Representatives of a world-wide Jurisdiction, standing like watchmen on the towers of some great castle, you will doubtless take lessons from the past, and so shape your legislation that there may be no step backward; but that "progress" shall continue the watchword of the Order.

FAITH, with resplendent eyes, looks on lovingly, and bids you "fail not, falter not, weary not in well doing." HOPE bends over you a bow bright with magnificent promise for the future, inviting you to enter upon and occupy the uncultivated grounds; and CHARITY, "chief among the blessed three," with her angelic countenance, smiles her approval of your efforts in the past, encouraging to still greater achievements in the years to come.

It is my earnest prayer that your deliberations may redound to the good of the great Order whose destiny is in your hands; that wide-spread as it has become, it may be still further extended, encircling the world;

its beautiful banner float from temples in every habitable portion of the globe; its anthems be continually heard, "like the drums of England, from the rising to the setting, and the setting to the rising sun," until it may be truthfully said, "there are no more worlds to conquer."

REVISED RITUAL.

The most important work of the Session was the revision of the Ritual. The Degrees of the Subordinate Lodge were entirely changed, and their number reduced from five to three. Several changes were also made in the Initiatory Degree, and in the Encampment Degrees. A new ritual for the Degree of Rebekah was also proposed, but action thereon was deferred till next Session. Of the changes made, those in the Subordinate Lodge Degrees and in the unwritten work were decided improvements. Of the changes in the Initiatory Degree your Representatives have rather a poor opinion, but therein they differed from the large majority of the Sovereign Grand Lodge. The following are the resolutions bearing on the introduction of the new work:

Resolved,—That the revised Initiatory, Degree, and Encampment Vork, as adopted at this Session, shall go into operation on the 1st day of January, 1881; and that to this end the Grand Secretary is directed to have the same ready for distribution, upon orders of Subordinate Grand Secretaries and Grand Scribes, by that time.

Resolved,—That the price of the Initiatory Charge Book shall be one dollar and twenty-five cents each to Grand Lodges.

Resolved,—That the price of the Degree and Encampment Books shall be one dollar each to Grand Bodies.

Resolved,—That all members of the Order who have heretofore received the first and second degrees under the old work shall be entitled to rank as members of the first degree of the revised work. All members who have received the third and fourth degrees of the old work shall be entitled to rank as members of the second degree of the revised work; and all members who have received the fifth degree of the old work shall be entitled to rank as members of the third degree of the old work shall be entitled to rank as members of the third degree of the revised work, without charge.

Resolved,—That as soon as the Charge Books containing the revised work are printed, the Grand Secretary is hereby directed to forward to the Grand Secretaries and Grand Scribes of each Grand Jurisdiction, a number of copies of the same, equal to the number of Grand Representatives that each Grand Body is now entitled to in the Sovereign Grand Lodge, for the special use of said Grand Representatives or Grand Officers of such and Scribes as soon as the revised work goes into effect, and that such copies be charged to such Grand Bodies.

Resolved,—That the revised work, as adopted at this Session of this Grand Lodge shall, from the time it takes effect, be the only lawful work of the Independent Order of Odd-Fellows to be used throughout the globe, and any other or different work is hereby declared to be illegal and void.

Resolved,—That the Grand Secretaries and Grand Scribes of the various Grand Jurisdictions, in the distribution of the revised work, be charged with the collection of the Charge Books containing the old work, and that the said Officers be authorized and directed to burn or destroy the same, and make report of the result to the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

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FUNERAL SERVICE.

The following was adopted as an addition to the present service:

To be used immediately after the opening remarks by the Chaplain, and before the hymn and closing prayer.

CHAPLAIN.—Man shall be brought to the grave. The clods of the valley shall be sweet anto him, and every man shall draw after him, as there are innumerable before him.

NOBLE GRAND.—What man is he that liveth and shall not see death? Shall he deliver his soul from the hand of the grave?

CHAPLAIN.—There is no man that hath power over the spirit to retain it; neither hath he power in the day of death; and there is no discharge

NOBLE GRAND. - Your fathers, where are they ? and the prophets, do they live forever?

CHAPLAIN.—We are strangers before them, and sojourners, as were all our fathers; our days on earth are as a shadow, there is none abiding.

NOBLE GRAND.—Is there not an appointed time to man upon earth?

Are not his days also like the days of a hireling?

O'Appraise like the charge is a missing in the court of t weep and a time to laugh.

NOBLE GRAND. - If a man die, shall he live again ?

CHAPLAIN.—Verily, verily, I say unto you, except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone; but if it die, it bringeth forth much fruit. For we have here no continuing city, but we seek one

RESPONSE BY BRETHREN. -Farewell, brother! We hope to meet you in the Eternal Home.

(After a pause.)

Chaplain.—Man goeth to his long home, and the mourners go about the streets. Then shall the dust return to the earth as it was, and the spirit shall return unto God who gave it.

LEGISLATION.

The work of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, in so far as it affected the laws of the Order, is found in the Reports of Committees on Appeals, Legislation, Judiciary, etc., and the decisions of the Grand Sire as approved by the Grand Lodge. Instead of giving these reports at length, we give a digest of the decisions reached in the various matters on which action was taken.

DEISIONS AFFECTING GRAND BODIES.

The Grand Master of a Jurisdiction has no power to call special meetings of his Grand Lodge under the law of 1879, and for the purposes therein prescribed, until the Grand Lodge has first determined that it will hold such special meetings .- Decision of Grand Sire.

When special Sessions of a Grand Lodge are called under the law of 1879, above named, either the Grand Master, or the Deputy Grand Master, or the Grand Warden with the Grand Secretary, can hold the Session; that is, either one of the first three named and the Secretary are sufficient so far as officers are concerned; of course a quorum under the law is requisite. - Decision of Grand Sire.

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Grand Encampments and Grand Lodges that may lawfully change their time of meeting from annual to biennial Sessions, shall be permitted to elect their Officers for the term of two years.—Report of Legislative

DECISIONS AFFECTING THE PATRIARCHAL ORDER.

An officer of an Encampment suspended from membership in his Lodge vacates his office in the Encampment, and loses the honors thereof. Decision of Grand Sire

If the Chief Patriarch Elect does not appear at the time for installa-tion, the Encampment may instal the other officers; and the nine preliminary questions may be read in their hearing. In such case the sitting C. P. will retain office until his successor is installed.—Decision of Grand Sire modified by Grand Lodge.

Where a person has been elected to receive all the Encampment Degrees and has received the Patriarchal Degree in the Encampment in which he was elected, an Encampment in another Jurisdiction may confer on him the Golden Rule and Royal Purple Degrees at the request of the

on him the Golden Rule and Royal Purple Degrees at the request of the former Encampment.—Decision of Grand Sire.

It is not lawful for an Encampment to have a By-law to the effect that "in the event of the death of a Patriarch in good standing there shall be paid to those who defray the expenses of his burial an amount equivalent to the amount produced by a division of the invested funds, concease it is an evident attempt at life insurance, and because the beneficiary may not be a present to whom the laws of the Order propriit. ciary may not be a person to whom the laws of the Order permit its benefits to go, as the widow, orphan or dependent relatives.—Decision of

Grand Encampments are authorized to permit their Subordinates to make suitable rules and regulations for the government of such of their members in their practice and drill as choose to uniform: such regulations not to be in conflict with the laws and usages of the Order.—Report of Legislative Committee.

When a brother is a member of both a Subordinate Lodge and Encampment, and his Subordinate Lodge shall become extinct, and who by reason of age or infirmity cannot successfully apply for membership in another Subordinate Lodge, upon his obtaining a Grand Lodge card from the Grand Secretary of his Jurisdiction, such aged or infirm member shall be entitled to retain membership in his Encampment upon said card.—

Report of Legislative Committee.

be entitled to retain membership in his Encampment upon said card.—

Report of Legislative Committee.

A Patriarch expelled from his Lodge loses membership in his Encampment; but when reinstated in his Lodge he is not reinstated in his Encampment without action of the Encampment by ballot; but in such a case the Encampment may act without asking permission of the Grand Encampment.—Report of Judiciary Committee.

Patriarchs may wear baldric instead of collar in their Encampment.—Report of Special Committee.

DECISIONS AFFECTING REBEKAH DEGREE.

A legally adopted daughter of a Fifth Degree member is eligible to receive the Degree of Rebekah, where the local civil law provides for adoption, and such adoption creates the legal relation of parent and child, as in no other case can the applicant be a "daughter" within any definition of that term, and therefore step-daughters are not eligible.—Decision of Grand Sire, as modified by Grand Lodge.

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An unmarried, divorced sister of an Odd-Fellow of the Fifth Degree is eligible to membership in a Degree Lodge of the Daughters of Rebekah. Decision of Grand Sire.

An unmarried daughter of an Odd-Fellow of the Fifth Degree who has attained the age of eighteen years, and whose parents are dead, may be admitted to membership in a Lodge of the Degree of Rebekah when proposed by the Noble Grand of the Lodge of which her father was a member at the time of his death, or by a member of a Lodge of the Degree of Rebekah, when furnished with a certificate from the Subordinate Lodge of which the father was a member that he had attained the Scarlet Degree, and was in good standing at the time of his death.—Report of Committee on Degree of Rebekah.

In this connection it may be mentioned that a memorial was presented from Victoria Lodge, No. 1, D. of R., complaining that it had not received from the Grand Lodge of Ontario proper notice and attention; but on account of informality, no action was taken thereon.—Decisions affecting

Subordinate Lodges.

Where the law provides that the election of Officers of Subordinates shall take place four weeks prior to close of the term, and that installation shall be in the first week of the new term, the sitting Vice-Grand, who has not served a previous term as Vice-Grand, can be elected Noble Grand if by the time of installation he would have rendered sufficient service as Vice-Grand. — Decision of Grand Sire.

When the term of a Subordinate Lodge is one year, it is necessary for an Officer to serve a majority of nights in order to retain the honors of the office. - Decision of Grand Sire.

When a Grand Lodge changes the term of its Subordinates from six months to one year, the term P. W., issued by the G. M., lasts for one year, unless the Grand Lodge determines to have two or more P. W.s for the term. — Decision of Grand Sire.

A brother cannot be refused the P. W. or deprived of his right to vote on account of arrearages unless he is more than thirteen weeks in arrears. Report of Committee on Appeals.

It is not permissible to appoint an Investigating Committee to inquire into rumors affecting a brother's character. Charges should be preferred, and the brother given an opportunity to defend himself.—Report of Com-

and the brother given an opportunity is mittee on Appeals.

It is a fundamental principle of Odd-Fellowship that a brother in arrears for dues, who is not dropped, is entitled to be visited by the Officers of his Lodge, and cared for in sickness, although he may not be entitled to pecuniary benefits.—Report of Judiciary Committee.

A member of a Subordinate Lodge can decline to receive sick benefits the state of the control of the contro

which are due to him-said act being, in fact, a donation by him to the

which are due to him—said act being, in fact, a donation by him to the Lodge; and after the reception of such declination by his Lodge, in the absence of local legislation, he is forever debarred from further right to demand said benefits.—Report of Judiciary Committee.

A wife shall be allowed to testify against her husband in a case where he is arraigned upon the charge of inflicting corporeal injury upon her.—Report of Legislative Committee.

Any. member of this Order who has been a contributing member twenty-five years, upon change of residence shall have the privilege of applying for membership in any Lodge at his new place of residence, without first applying for a Withdrawal Card from the Lodge in which holds membership. Upon election of such brother by the Lodge to which he shall apply for membership, said Lodge shall notify the Lodge of which

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he is a member of such election, when, being free from all charges and the payment of all dues and fees, upon proper application, he shall be entitled to a Withdrawal Card. Upon deposit of said card with the Lodge in which he had been elected, he shall be entitled to sign the Constitution and By-laws and be received in full membership from such time, upon the payment of the admission fees required by the By-laws of said Lodge. Report of Legislative Committee.

The Dormant Law is repealed, and the previous laws relating to suspension and reinstatement are re-enacted as follows:

SUSPENSION AND REINSTATEMENT.

Resolved,—That a member of the Order who becomes in arrears for dues for the period of one year may be suspended or dropped from membership, but he cannot be expelled from the Order on account of being in arrears for dues.

Resolved,—That a member suspended or dropped from membership for non-payment of dues may be reinstated in the Lodge or Encampment from which he has been suspended or dropped, within one year after suspension, by paying the amount of one year's dues, and being reinstated in the manual prescribed by the local law.

pension, of paying and the manner prescribed by the local law.

**Resolved,—That, after one year from the date of suspension, a member dropped or suspended for non-payment of dues may be reinstated upon the payment of the fee charged for an initiate of the same age, or such less sum as the By-laws may prescribe.

Resolved,—That a member suspended or dropped from membership for non-payment of dues, who makes application for reinstatement and for a Withdrawal Card for the purpose of uniting with another Lodge or Encampment in the same Jurisdiction, may be reinstated and granted a final card at any time within five years from the date of suspension, upon the pay-

ment of one year's dues, and the usual price of a card.

Resolved.—That a member suspended or dropped for non-payment of Resolved,—I has a member suspended or dropped for non-payment or dues, after five years' suspension, wishing to join a Lodge or Encampment in the same Jurraidction, shall be entitled to receive, and the Lodge or Encampment shall grant, upon proper application, a Dismissal Certificate upon the receipt of one dollar.

Resolved,—That a Lodge or Encampment, upon proper application and the receipt of one dollar.

the receipt of one dollar, may, at the discretion of the Lodge or Encamp-ment, by a majority vote of the members present, grant a Dismissal Certi-ficate to a member suspended for non-payment of dues, to enable such suspended member to join a Lodge in the same Jurisdiction before the five years have expired.

years have expired.

Resolved,—That a member suspended or dropped for non-payment of dues, wishing to regain membership in another Jurisdiction than that in which he was suspended or dropped, shall be entitled to receive, and the Lodge or Encampment to which he belonged shall grant, upon proper application, a Dismissal Certificate, upon the receipt of one dollar.

Resolved,—That in all cases wherein a Lodge or Encampment has refused to reinstate a member suspended or dropped for non-payment of dues, he shall be entitled to receive, and the Lodge or Encampment shall, upon proper application, grant, a Dismissal Certificate, upon the receipt of one dollar.

Resolved,—That where the books of an extinct Lodge or Encampment have been lost or destroyed, the Grand Secretary or Grand Scribe, as the case may be, upon being satisfied of the good standing of any member of

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ipt of ment s the er of such extinct Lodge or Encampment, may issue to him a Card of Withdrawal. Where the books of a defunct Lodge or Encampment are in the possession of a Grand Scribe or Grand Secretary, he may issue cards to former members of the defunct Subordinate; such cards shall have the

same privilege as a card issued by any existing Subordinate.

Resolved,—That Dismissal Certificates may be received upon deposit in any Lodge or Encampment, as the case may be, but the privilege of visiting a Lodge or Encampment shall not be awarded to the holder of visiting a Lodge or Encampment shall not be awarded to the holder of a Dismissal Certificate. The Certificate shall be provided by the Graind Corresponding and Recording Secretary, and be sold as other supplies are sold, and at the same rate as cards. When State Grand Officers grant cards to former members of defunct Lodges, the brother receiving the card is not entitled to the A. T. P. W.

The card cannot be used for visiting Lodges, but is good for deposit only by the holder as an Ancient Odd-Fellow.

Resolved, -That all laws, by-laws, or provisions thereof, that are inconsistent with the above general laws, conditions and regulations, are hereby abrogated or repealed. - Report of Legislative Committee.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

The only Amendment to the Constitution adopted was one providing that the unwritten work of the Order may be changed by a four-fifths vote, and the written work by a two-thirds vote,

By an interpretation of the Constitution made at this Session, it was decided that Past Grand Sires have no right to appointments on Committees. An amendment proposing to give them such right received a large vote, but not sufficiently large to adopt it.

NEW DIGEST.

A revision of the Digest was ordered, which will probably take a year to complete. The work will be done by Bro. J. H. White, of Albion, N.Y.

DUES AND BENEFITS.

The Special Committee on this subject presented a lengthy Report, embracing many tables of statistics and estimates, showing what, in their opinion, are the safest and best schemes for regulating the rates of dues

and benefits. They say:

"The statistics which your Committee have gathered during the past year emphasize the facts presented in former reports, viz. that with advancing years a Lodge's liabilities increase; that its rate of sickness and mortality continually rises higher; that the income sufficient to meet its expenditure in the first years of its existence becomes utterly inadequate when it reaches its age of maturity.

"Notwithstanding the accumulation of facts that have been presented as the results of the actual experience of the Lodges, compiled from their reports, there are many Lodges that, through the action or non-action of their members, are moving steadily to financial ruin, the members imagining that because the Lodge has during an existence of years, been able to meet all just demands, that it will continue to do so in the future, notwithstanding its investments are being disposed of, or have disappeared, and its ratio of sickness is increasing with each recurring year, and its means are decreasing. Facts are stubborn things, and they will not bend to the wishes or hopes of those who desire to get a great deal for very little,

or something for nothing. The delusive appeals that are made by some associations that promise a large amount of weekly benefits upon the payment of a very small pittance of weekly dues, has something to do with the continuance of an unsound basis. People generally are profoundly ignorant of the cost of sickness in organized bodies of men, and suppose that the promises that are made will be kept in good faith, not realizing that the means of performance are solely dependent upon the amount contributed, and that small dues means small benefits, and in the course of years no benefits whatever. If it was not that those who make the appeals are themselves ignorant of the relative value of dues and benefits-that they are simply blind leaders of the blind-they might be liable to be charged as swindlers, because the people are deceived through their mis-representations. The fair, honest course that every Odd-Fellow should pursue is to place his Lodge above all reproach—to keep its faith and honor untarnished, and if, in its performance of the command to 'visit the sick, relieve the distressed, bury the dead, and educate the orphan,' it becomes necessary to contribute a penny or two more a week, it should be cheerfully done for a great common good. Even selfishness, if it only be far-sighted, prompts to the creation of a permanent fund to meet future exigencies.

In discussing the question whether the average of sickness for each year of an individual's life increases with anything like certainty, the Committee give tables showing the actual amount of sickness at the different ages in many Jurisdictions. From these and other statistics the Committee make up the following table, showing among other things the expectation

of sickness of each year :

The Committee are of opinion that the only just and equitable scheme of dues and benefits is one in which the dues vary according to the age at which a member joins; and they give the following as a correct table of dues and benefits according to this plan: Sick benefits being \$4 per week; funeral benefits, \$40; and widows' annuities, \$40:

Where Lodges prefer a system of uniform dues, the Committee estimate that for the same amount of benefits there should be charged not less than 83 per annum, in accordance with the full principal states of the charged not less

than \$8 per anium, in accordance with the following rule:

"Weekly sick benefits, not more than half the amount of the year's dues; funeral benefit and vidou's annuity, each not more than five times the year's dues. Where a Lodge makes no provision for widows' annuities, the sick benefits may be advanced about 25 per cent. above the sum given in the preceding estimates."

The Committee say that in these calculations, the word "revenue" might be used instead of "dues," if it be understood that the revenue is fixed and certain. If the receipts per member from dues and permanent investments together amount to the required sum, the same purpose is gained as though the dues alone reached that sum.

In recommending State Grand Lodges to take action in this matter the Committee discussed the question as to whether Subordinates have or have not full control of their finances, and show that the power to regulate dues and benefits is by both law and usage vested in the Sovereign Grand Lodge and in State and Provincial Grand Lodges, and that Subordinates are limited to making such regulations as they choose, only in accordance with the enactments of their respective State Jurisdictions.

On motion of the Committee, the following resolutions are to be taken up for consideration next year; and in the meantime a sufficient number of extra copies of their Report have been printed to supply one to each Subordinate Lodge:

1st. That Grand Lodges and Grand Encampments under the jurisdic-

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tion of the Sovereign Grand Lodge be recommended to legislate for their respective Subordinates, and define, within certain limits, the rate of dues

and benefits.

2nd. That the rate, which should not be exceeded, should be the following: If the system of graded dues be adopted, then for the payment of \$4.00 weekly benefits, \$40.00 funeral benefits, and \$40.00 widow's annuity, the scale of dues should not be lower than that defined in this report (Table H), and for higher benefits higher dues in the same proportion. If uniform dues be charged, then the weekly sick benefit should not exceed half the amount of a year's dues, nor the funeral benefit, nor widow's annuity, five times the amount of a year's dues.

Provided, that this rule shall be held to be practically in force if the revenue of a Lodge per member for dues and permanent investments combined shall equal the amount called for as dues. And provided further, that where Lodges make no provision for the payment of widows' annuities, then the amount of sick benefits paid may be 25 per cent higher, in proportion to the dues, than those above given.

3d. That where from peculiar local circumstances, climatic or other conditions, it may appear to any Grand Body that the limit herein fixed may be safely exceeded, then whatever rate may be fixed by the said Grand Body should, before coming into force, be submitted to the Sovereign Grand Lodge, with the reasons and data upon which such conclusion has been reached.



goir of t Special attention of Subordinate Lodges is called to the following resolutions, adopted by the Grand Lodge of the United States, at the Session held at Atlanta, Ga., in Sept., 1874:

IMPOSTORS TO BE EXPELLED.

Resolved,—That a member of the Order in good standing, evidenced by holding an unexpired Visiting Card, issued in conformity to the laws of the Order by his Lodge or Encampment, and having the A. T. P. W., being in distress, or pretending so to be, and needing money, and who having asked for and received from a Lodge or Encampment, or a member thereof, a sum of money under the assurance and promise that he will return or repay the same within a given time, or so soon as he returns home, but who shall neglect so to do after a reasonable time thereafter, without a satisfactory excuse being rendered, shall be deemed guilty of conduct unbecoming an Odd-Fellow; and due notice of such fact having been officially communicated to his Lodge by the Lodge or Encampment so loaning him the money, it shall be the duty of his Lodge to notify him of such indebtedness or loan, and to demand payment thereof, and if he then refuse or neglect to pay the same, his Lodge shall prefer charges against him, try him, and if found guilty and without sufficiently mitigating circumstances, to expel him from the Order. If there be such mitigating circumstances, then impose such penalty as the Lodge may deem best.

Resolved,—That the respective State Grand Lodges cause the foregoing resolution to be embodied in their proceedings, and the attention of the Subordinate Lodges and Encampments especially called to it.




