# STEADY PROGRESS BY ALLIED ARMIES DESPITE STUBBORN RESISTANCE BY THE GERMANS

# RECOVERING LOST GROUND BRITISH ARE NOW HOLDING WHOLE OF MEMETZ WOOD

Throwing Heavy Reinforcements Into Breach Germans Fiercely Attack Allied Front in Northern France, but Thrown Back With Heavy Losses-British Driving Steadily Towards Crest of Ridge Commanding Bapaume Plateau.

London, July 12.-The Anglo-French offensive is maintaining itself London, July 12.—The Anglo-French offensive is maintaining itself as rigorously as ever against the most determined attacks, which the Germans are now delivering against the front in Northern France. The Germans have thrown reinforcements into the breach, having had ample time to recover from the first shock and the unexpected strength of the British and French attacks. There is no doubt the Germans had supposed the French to be enfeabled greatly south of the Somme, because of the number of troops needed in the defence of Verdun against the forces of the German Crown Prince. The fact that the Allies are progressing so methodically and even against German attacks, sives

No events of a sensational character on the front in Northern France were announced today, but General Haig, in a brief builtein tonight, recounts the recovery by the British of all the lost ground in the Mametz Wood. The British commander tells also of the repulse of two heavy German attacks against Containnaison, and on steady progress by his forces in the Trones Wood, the scene of much heavy and desperate fighting during the past few days. Creamed Cucumbers—Peel cucumbers and cut in quarters, place in a saucepan of salted boiling water and cook for one-half hour. Melt a level tablespoon of butter in a saucepan and mix in one slightly rounding tablespoon of flour. Add two-thirds of a cup of water in which the cucumbers were boiled and stir until smooth. Cook eight minutes; then stir in a third of a cup of milk, and season. Pour over the cucumbers.

Mint Jolly Salad—Chop a bunch of mint and simmer in a cup of water for thirty-five minutes. Strain, add the fuice of two lemons, a tablespoon of granulated gelatine softened in cold water, pour into a bowl to harden, cut in cubes, and serve with ayonnaise on lettuce leaves.
