

GOV'T GOES DOWN TO DEFEAT

LIBERAL LANDSLIDE DEEPLY BURIES THE ADMINISTRATION OF RT. HON. ARTHUR MEIGHEN

Ontario Results Up To Midnight Showed There Was No Hope of Government Winning the Fight for Honest Policies.

Quebec, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island Returned Liberals from Every Constituency—Liberal Victory in Maritime Provinces Greater Than Supporters of Mr. King Had Hoped for.

DOMINION SUMMARY

At midnight, with every constituency east of Saskatchewan complete with the single exception of Frontenac in Ontario, returns from which will likely not be available tonight, Hon. Mackenzie King has a clear majority of the 235 members comprising the new House of Commons, being a total of 118, with possible acquisitions in British Columbia. Latest figures show the premier, Hon. Arthur Meighen, is beaten in his home constituency of Portage La Prairie, Man., where his former opponent has a lead of six hundred with only four polls to come. Following is the summary of the seats:

Conservative—New Brunswick 5, Ontario 38, Alberta 1, British Columbia 2. Total 46.
Liberal—Prince Edward Island 4, Nova Scotia 16, New Brunswick 5, Quebec 65, Ontario 24, Manitoba 2, Saskatchewan 2. Total 118.
Progressive—New Brunswick 1, Ontario 19, Manitoba 12, Saskatchewan 11, Alberta 20, British Columbia 1, Total 64.
Labor—Manitoba 1, Alberta 1. Total 2.

It is to be noted that the Liberals have carried every seat in three provinces, Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and Quebec.

Ottawa, Dec. 6.—The Government is defeated. At 11 p. m. Senator Robert-son, Minister of Labor, conceded that the administration could not carry the election. It now lies with the cabinet to decide on the course of action. The customary struggle is for a defeated Premier to hand his resignation to the Governor-General, who then calls on the leader of the victorious party to form a new administration.

From reports of the Ontario results, it was evident that the Government had little chance of winning the fight. Liberal victories in the Maritime Provinces were greater even than the Ontario seats. In Nova Scotia, they carried all the 12 seats, defeating two members of the government. At dissolution Liberals held six and the Government two. In New Brunswick, Liberals captured two additional seats, and in Prince Edward Island, one additional seat. Progressives merely retained the one seat they had east of the Ottawa river.

Ontario Did It

But it was in Ontario, of the larger provinces, that the Government especially lost ground. Of the 67 Ontario seats they held at dissolution, Conservatives—up to 11 p. m.—had retained 35. Progressives, who had expected to sweep the Ontario rural ridings and secure at least half of the total 62 seats in the province, had up to the same hour, secured only 15. PATERNITY OF TWO CHILDREN ISSUES BROUGHT INTO STILLMAN DIVORCE HEARING

Noted Banker Questions Legitimacy of Guy, Who Bears His Name—Wife Brings "Leeds" Child Into Case.

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., Dec. 6.—The paternity of Guy Stillman and Jay Ward Leeds, both three years old, was the main issue in testimony today at hearing in the divorce suit of Mrs. Stillman.

Defending Guy Stillman's paternity there was testimony that Mr. and Mrs. Stillman lived together at that estate in the Poughkeepsie Hills during January and February, 1918, and at the St. Regis Hotel in New York during the latter month.

Attacking the paternity of Jay Ward Leeds, Mary Farley, a trained nurse, was called, it was said, to testify that when the infant was born to Florence H. Leeds, former Broadway show girl, Miss Farley congratulated Mr. Stillman as the father. He was present, pretending to be "Franklin Harold Leeds," and inquired as to the well-being of "the wife," according to a report of her testimony.

Mabel Horso, formerly employed by Mrs. Leeds, told of Mr. Stillman's visit to the former showgirl's 51st Street apartment posing as the husband, it was said.

The nurse, it was reported testified she was employed by Mrs. Leeds at her country place, Red Court, Stony Brook, Long Island in June, 1918, adding that Mr. Stillman came there from New York about three times a week.

In August the nurse accompanied the former show girl to New York and attended her when Jay Ward Leeds was born the following month. Mr. Stillman was present at the birth, she was said to have testified, describing him as being nervous and excited. When the baby was shown to him, she noted said Mr. Stillman, "he kept after him" and ever she wanted a present.

Some of the experiences of Mr. Stillman and Mrs. Leeds when they were alleged to have taken up light housekeeping at 13 East 66th St. late in 1917, were recounted by Mabel Horso, who said they employed her as maid. At first, she said, Mrs. Leeds spoke to her as "the nurse" and later as "Mrs. Stillman," later referring to him as "Jimbo." The witness, colored woman, told of Mr. Stillman coming in with jelly and a coffee percolator on one occasion.

York-Sunbury True To Traditions of The Constituency

R. B. Hanson, K. C., Conservative, Elected Over Col. Osborne by About 800.

Fredericton, Dec. 6.—York-Sunbury in today's election stood true to the traditions of the constituency and the principles of the Conservative party. In spite of the efforts of the Liberals making their greatest attempt, backed by the United Farmers and playing the returned soldier canvass to the limit, R. B. Hanson, K. C., of the city, was elected over W. J. Osborne, Liberal, by a majority not far short of 800. The majority is almost as great as was that of Mr. Hanson over E. W. Stairs, Progressive candidate, in the by-election of May last, when he received a majority of 347.

The United Farmers' strength showed itself in some sections of the outlying parishes, but the centres of population, almost without exception, voted Conservative. Fredericton, Devon and Marysville did particularly well for Mr. Hanson, giving him a lead of 821 which it was impossible for the supporters of Colonel Osborne to overcome in the smaller places.

The forecasts of the Liberals went badly astray. Sunbury county, which had been claimed as Liberal by 300 majority, broke about even. Neither polling division of Fredericton was carried by the Liberals. No. 2, in which they expected to make a showing with twenty-five of a possible thirty-one seats as a result of today's general election. Among the fallen followers of Premier Arthur Meighen were Hon. Heavy Vote Polled.

A heavy vote was polled, upwards of 14,000, out of a total registration of 22,000. This was about 1,000 more than in the by-election.

Although the general result of the election was a disappointment to the local supporters of the Conservative party, they had a feeling of pride in making so good a showing in York-Sunbury under the circumstances.

Mr. Hanson, as soon as his election was announced, visited the Fredericton committee rooms and gave a rousing welcome. He addressed his supporters and expressed his gratitude for the support given him and for the efficient and strenuous labor on his behalf performed at all polling places in the constituency.

LIBERAL PARTY MAKES CLEAN SWEEP IN NOVA SCOTIA AND ISLAND

L. Mackenzie King, emerged from the Maritime Provinces with twenty-five of a possible thirty-one seats as a result of today's general election. PREMIER FOUGHT THE FIGHT TO THE BEST OF HIS ABILITY

Said He Always Felt That Conditions Surrounding the Contest Made the Result Most Uncertain.

Ottawa, Dec. 6.—Seen shortly before midnight when the overwhelming defeat of the Government was a foregone conclusion, Mr. Meighen said that he had always felt that conditions surrounding the contest made the result most uncertain. He admitted, with a smile, that he was disappointed, but added that he felt no personal animosity toward anyone.

"I have nothing to add to the statement I gave out," he said.

"Have you anything to say about your own future movements?" the Premier was asked.

"No," replied Mr. Meighen.

He went on to say that he felt defeated less because he was conscious that he had fought the fight to the best of his strength and ability.

Premier Meighen received the returns in his own private office. Mrs. Meighen was with him, as well as his little daughter, Lillian, and his son Max. Hon. G. D. Robertson, Sir James Loughheed, Dr. Alfred Thompson, Hon. James Calder, Hon. Martin Burrell and others called upon him during the evening.

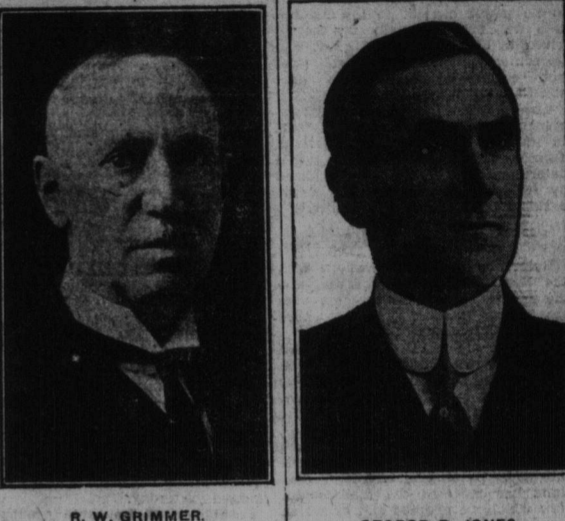
Progressive Party Claims 37 Members in West Provinces

Winnipeg, Dec. 6.—Leaders of the Progressive Party here claim the election of 37 members in the three Western Provinces for the 43 constituencies. Progressives claim to have carried ten out of twelve in Alberta, leaving two Calgary to the Conservatives; and West Edmonton to the Liberals; Regina went Liberal, and Mackenzie, where Dr. Michael Clark is the Liberal candidate, is still in doubt, with the possibility of rural polls giving the Progressives a majority.

With the possible exception of Mackenzie no rural constituency in the three provinces have returned a Liberal or a Conservative.

While the total results of the election throughout the country are not particularly gratifying to the National Liberal and Conservative Party, the verdict of the people of Canada is accepted with the belief that, within a very short time, the electors will return to the support of the principles of Government, as laid down by such eminent statesmen as Sir John A. Macdonald, Sir Georges Etienne Cartier, and Sir Leonard Tilley, it was in his devotion to duty, its straightforward and unequivocal platform from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and its adherence to the policy of statesmen, whom Canadians have grown to revere and love, that brought to the Meighen Government the loss of power.

Hundreds of men and women gathered at the Seaman's Institute yesterday to hear the returns and the announcements were made by L. P. D. Tilley, K. C. London, Dec. 6.—The American Relief Administration by the middle of January, when the Russian famine conditions are expected to be at their worst, will be feeding 1,200,000 children. This is 200,000 more than they expected to feed when they went into Russia. It is probable that next week the administration will begin clothing the youngsters in the famine area and within a short time will furnish suits and stockings to the number of one half million.

ANTI-OUTLAW SENTIMENT GROWING STRONGER DAILY

Protests Against Poison Gas, Submarine and Other Weapons That Humanity Decries Are Impressing American Delegates to the Arms Conference.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 6.—The outlawing by international agreement of the use of poison gas and the submarine in modern warfare is before technical committees of naval and military men of the conference.

That the subject will be taken up by the conference soon after the expected Christmas recess was regarded as certain here today. Sentiment for action by the conference has and still is developing rapidly not only in the United States and Great Britain but also in parts of continental Europe.

The American delegation is becoming more and more convinced, it is understood, that sweeping reductions must be agreed to in the amount of submarine tonnage assigned to this country and to Great Britain in the Hughes programme for a naval holiday.

It was intense and so arranged that this essential element should rule the fencers with foil, epee and sabre, even to a degree where the desire for victory should be subordinate. Each team wanted to win. This was by no means natural. But above all else each side aimed at the highest standard in sportsmanship, in a sport where the true sporting spirit is more than ordinarily manifest. And the objective was attained by representatives of both nations. There could have been no question of this when the fencing bouts concluded.

Baseball's Winter Airing Is Now On

Minors Open Annual Session in Buffalo — The Majors Are Soon to Follow.

New York, Dec. 6.—Baseball will shake out of the moth balls this week for its annual winter airing.
The yearly meeting of the minors has opened in Buffalo to be followed by the winter sessions of the National and American Leagues and the joint sessions of both leagues in New York. With Judge Landis, the presidents and most of the managers and owners of the big leagues attending their session, the little fellows will find themselves in a real Ritz gathering of baseball.

New York Boxing Pot Still Boiling

The National Sporting Club Threatens to Ask for Repeal of Law.

New York, Dec. 6.—Taking a rap at boxing is becoming the popular pastime in New York. The National Sporting Club, Jack Curley and the "Boxer's Union" have a new addition now in the National Sporting Club.
This club, which organized two years ago to elevate boxing through the moral support of "the best people in New York," serves notice on the warring elements to quit warring or they'll all have to go to work.
The club says unless conditions are changed, it will go before the governor and ask the repeal of the boxing law.
Tips from up state have it that Governor Miller is just waiting for some responsible organization to give him the excuse to close all the fight shops and put the poor abused prize fighters to work.
The National Sporting Club drew up the Walker Boxing Bill and was largely responsible for getting it passed under the administration of Governor Al Smith. The club had plans to rule and control the game in an elaborate club house which was never built. The organization was about on the rocks until recently, when it was reorganized with Guston Borglum, noted sculptor, as its president.
Tex Rickard was one of the original members of the club, but he withdrew, and some bitter feeling resulted, which still exists.
The "Boxer's Union" did not take kindly to a "crowd of boiler-plate fronts" trying to tell them how to run the game, and the club had a tough time getting a license, only to lose it after the Lynch-Herman fight, a \$100,000 proposition on which the club lost money.
The club does not like the way boxing affairs are being conducted, and through Borglum says: "We shall be the first to lead a movement to repeal the law and suppress it, because as an enterprise where large purses are made, rather than rounds, govern the duration of a bout, it can only degenerate to a cock fight or an occupation of sortid commercialism."

Edward Bouchard Is Professional

Montreal, Dec. 6.—Upon receipt by President Granger, of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association of the affidavit by E. Lavelle, hockey of the Hochelaga Hockey Club in which he declares that Edward Bouchard was paid \$40 a game last season, the matter will be declared a professional in the face of the evidence. Mr. Granger stated today. The cause of other players who figured on the Hochelaga team with Bouchard will also be investigated. Players who are now in Ontario will have to clear themselves before the Dominion registration committee and any who have gone to the United States will be unable to play until they obtain a transfer from the Quebec Hockey Association.

Three Doctors' Certificates
