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Historical Shetch.

ACADIA COLLEGE was founded by the Nova Scotia Baptist Education Society in 1838. In the following year application was made to the Nova Scotia House of Assembly for a Charter of Incorporation with the title: "The Trustees, Governors and Fellows of the Queen's College." An Act creating such a corporation with the powers of a University was passed in 1840. At the next meeting of the Legislature, this Act was amended by changing the name to Acadia College.

In 1851 the power of appointing the Governors was transferred from the Education Society to the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces. The developments of succeeding years made it necessary that various amendments to the original Charter should be obtained. In order to avoid confusion and bring the Act of Incorporation into more complete harmony with existing conditions, a general revision and consolidation of the different Acts relating to the College was proposed by the Board of Governors. The Report of the Committee of the Board having been adopted by the Governors, was referred to the Convention. That body, at its meeting in Yarmouth in August, 1891, after suggesting 'some' modifications, approved the report and instructed the Governors to apply to the Parliament of Nova Scotia for the necessary legislation. Accordingly a bill embodying the proposed alterations was passed by the two Houses at the Session of 1891, and received the signature of the Lieutenant-Governor on the 19th of May in the same year. A copy of the Revised Charter is appended.

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An Act Bespecting Acadia University.

, (Passed May 19th, 1891).

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly, as follows :-

1. The persons now holding the offices of President and Governors respectively of Acadia Gollege, and their successors in office, and six additional governors and their successors in office, shall be designated the Board of Governors, and they are hereby constituted a body corporate under the name of the Governors of Acadia University, with perpetual succession and a common seal, with power to break, alter and change the same at pleasure, and by that name may sue and be sued, implead and be impleaded, and be able and capable in law to take, purchase and hold any personal property whatsoever; and shall also be able and capable to take, purchase and hold to them and their successors not only all such lands, buildings, hereditaments and premises as may from time to time be used or occupied for the purposes of the said University, and of Horton Collegiate Academy and Acadia Seminary, and of any other preparatory or academical or other department, and for residences of the president, professors, principals, tutors, students and officers of said university, academy and semmary, but also any other lands, buildings, hereditaments and premises, provided such lands, buildings, hereditaments and premises shall not exceed in value eight hundred thousand dollars, any law or statute to the contrary notwithstanding; and to accept on behalf of said university, or any departments thereof, and on behalf of said academy and seminary, and of any other preparatory or academical or other department, any gifts, devises or bequests of any property real or personal, and to assume and execute any trust which may accompany such devises, gifts or bequests; and they and their successors shall be able and capable in law to grant, demise, alien, lease, or otherwise dispose of all or any of the property, real or personal, at any time belonging to said university, and to invest the proceeds thereof upon such securities or in such way as shall seem best to said Board of Governors, and also to do all other matters and things incidental or appertaining to such body corporate.

2. All the real and personal property, rights, easements, privileges and immunities of every nature or kind whatsoever, which are now held, occupied and enjoyed by the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College or by any person in trust for them or in their behalf, or by this act vested in the corporation hereby constituted, subject to all trusts, attaching thereto respectively, and all leases and contracts made by or with the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College, shall be dealt with in all respects as if the same had been made by and with the corpora-

tion hereby created, and all debts, rents, interest and moneys due to the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College, shall be henceforth payable to and recoverable by the corporation hereby created, and all covenants, contracts and agreements made with or entered into by the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College, shall be deemed and taken in all courts of law and equity to have been made with and entered into by the corporation hereby created; and the president, professors, tutors, teachers, students, officers and agents of Acadia College, shall be deemed and taken to be the president, professors, tutors, teachers, students, officers and graduates of said university, and all tenants of the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College, shall be deemed and taken to be the tenants of the corporation hereby created, and the graduates of Acadia College shall be deemed and taken to be graduates of said university, and entitled to the rights and privileges as such, and all academical honors and degrees, and all rights, powers, privileges, and authorities now had, held or exercised by any person by virtue of the acts hereby repealed except so far as they may be necessarily taken away, altered, abridged or affected by or in consequence of this act, shall be had, held and exercised in relation to the said university as fully as they now are had, held or exercised.

3. The said governors of Acadia University shall be entitled to receive and hold gifts, devises and bequests already made or hereafter coming into effect by any person or persons, to or for the benefit of Acadia College, Horton Collegiate Academy and Acadia Seminary, or any or either of them, or to or for the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College as fully and effectually as if the said corporation or university was named in such gifts, devises or bequests instead of Acadia College, Horton Collegiate Academy, Acadia Seminary, trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College or any or either of them, subject, however, to all the trusts in such gifts, devises and bequests provided, and shall have power and authority to sue for and recover all damages arising from any cause which the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College would have been entitled to recover but for the passing of this act, all debts, damages or demands due or accruing or arising upon any bond, covenant, contract or agreement made to or with the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College, and all persons shall have the power, any statute to the contrary notwithstanding, at any time to grant, devise, bequeath or convey by deed, will or otherwise, any real or personal property to the corporation hereby created, either for the purposes of the university generally or any department thereof, now or hereafter to be established, or for Horton Collegiate Academy or Acadia Seminary, or any other preparatory or academical or other department, or otherwise, as may be provided by such grant, devise, bequest or conveyance.

4. All legal or other proceedings heretofore taken by or against the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College, may be continued under the same name or style of cause in which they have been instituted. 6. The Board of Governors shall have the power to grant degrees in theology and degrees of bachelor, master and doctor in the several arts, sciences and faculties, and any and all degrees which may properly be conferred by a university, and shall have the right to determine the course of study, and the qualification for degrees, and the granting of the same.

- 7. The Board of Governors shall have full power and authority to fix the number, residence, duties, salary, provision and emolument of the president, professors, principals, teachers, tutors, instructors, officers, agents and servants of said university, academy and seminary, and any other preparatory or academical or other department, and may also appoint the president, professors, principals, teachers, tutors, instructors, officers, agents and servants of said university, academy and seminary, and any other preparatory or academical or other department, and may from time to time remove the said president, professors, principals, teachers, tutors, instructors, officers, agents and servants, including those who at the passing of this act held any of said offices or positions under the acts hereby repealed.
- 8. The Board of Governors shall have the control and management of the property and funds of the said corporation, and shall have power to adopt and carry into effect by-laws, resolutions and regulations touching and concerning the instruction, care, government and discipline of the students of said university, academy and seminary, and any other preparatory or academical or other department, and touching and concerning all other matters and things of every nature and kind within the scope of this act which to them may seem good, fit and useful for the well ordering and advancement of the said university, academy and seminary, and any other preparatory or academical or other department, provided the same be not repugnant to the provisions of this act or any law in force in this province, and may from time to time alter, vary or rescind the same.
- 9. It shall be the duty of the Board of Governors to keep proper records and minutes of all their proceedings, and to keep proper books of account of the financial affairs of the said university, academy and seminary, and any other preparatory or academical or other department, and to present a report of the work of the university, academy and seminary, and any other preparatory or academical or other department, accompanied by a duly audited financial statement, to each annual meeting of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces.
- 10. The persons now holding the offices of president and governors, respectively, of Acadia College, and their successors, shall exercise the power and carry into effect the provisions of this act until the appointment by the said convention of the six additional governors of the said university herein provided for, after which the management and administration of said university shall devolve upon the president thereof for the time

- 11. Seven governors, or such larger number as the board may fix, shall constitute a quorum of the board, and all questions shall be decided by a majority of the members present at the meeting of the board.
- 12. The Board of Governors shall appoint a body to be known as the Senate, to consist of the president of the university, and of such other persons not being governors as the said board shall appoint, whose duty it shall be to advise the board from time to time upon all matters concerning the system and course of education pursued in said university, academy and seminary, and the examination of all departments thereof, and concerning the courses of study and the qualification for degrees, and the granting of the same, and concerning the establishment of additional branches of instruction, and the appointment of the professors, and generally concerning all matters relating to the literary welfare of said university, academy and seminary, which shall from time to time be committed to said Senate for their advice and recommendation or action, who shall report to said board at such times as may be determined by the board. The present members of the Senate of Acadia College, except those who are or may be hereafter appointed governors of the said university, shall be members of the Senate under this act for the unexpired portion of the time for which they were respectively appointed. The Associated Alumni of said university shall have the right to nominate one-third of the members of such Senate
- 13. The Board of Governors may appoint the members of the Senate for such period as they shall deem best, and may remove them on account of non-residence within the bounds of said Convention, non-attendance at meetings of the Senate, or for any other cause which they shall deem sufficient.
- 14. The proprietors of scholarships of Acadia College shall henceforth be deemed and taken to be proprietors of scholarships of Acadia University, with the same rights and privileges, and subject to the same conditions as were attached thereto previous to the time of the passing of this act.
- 15. All acts and parts of acts of this Legislature, in so far as they are inconsistent with this act, are hereby repealed.

Matriculation.

The regular examinations for admission to the Freshman class will take place on Monday, October 1st, beginning at 9 a. m.

Candidates for Matriculation are required to pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects:

- I. Latin.—Cæsar, Gallie War, Book I, or Books II and III; Virgil, Æneid, Book I; Ciceo, two Orations against Catiline; Latin Grammar (Bennett's is preferred); Smith's Principia Latina, Part IV, Exs. 1—25, or the equivalent.
- II. (a) GREEK.—White's First Greek Book; Xenophon, Anabasis, Book I, or Book IV; Greek Grammar (Goodwin's is preferred) or—
- (b) FRENCH.—Grammar as in Otto's French Grammar. A thorough knowledge of the conjugations is especially insisted on. Translation, La Belle Nivernaise (Daudet) or an equivalent.
- III. MATHEMATICS.—Arithmetic, as in Hamblin Smith; Algebra, including Quadratics, Indices and Surds (Hall and Knight's Element ary Algebra); Geometry, as in Hall and Stevens, Books I-IV, including the easier exercises.
- IY. ENGLISH.—Grammar; writing from dictation; a short composition upon a subject drawn from one of the following works: Shakespeare's Julius Cæsar, Macaulay's Essay on Lord Clive, Irving's Alhambra, or their equivalents The composition must be exact in expression, in division into paragraphs, and in punctuation and spelling.
- V. HISTORY AND GEOGRAPHY.—Canadian and British History; Myers' History of Greece; Myers' History of Rome; Geography of Greece, Italy and Asia Minor; Modern Geography.
- VI. PHYSIOLOGY (Martin). This examination will be held for the first time in October, 1900.

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Graduates of Horton Collegiate Academy, and of approved High Schools, upon presentation of certificates that they have completed the studies prescribed for matriculation, and passed satisfactory examinations thereon, may be admitted by passing the examination in English, from which no candidate for admission to the Freshman Class will be excused.

The holder of a certificate or license required of teachers of the Grade B class in Nova Scotia, or Class I. in New Brunswick, will be exempted from examination in History, Geography, and Mathematics.

The holder of a New Brunswick teacher's license of the Superior School Class may be admitted to the Sophomore year by passing satisfactory examinations on the subjects of the Freshmen year, not included in the requirements for said license.

The holder of a Nova Scotia Grade A license, or of a New Brunswick license of the Grammar School class, may be admitted to the Sophomore year without examination.

Students desiring to enter upon the full Course, or to take general studies, should report themselves to the President for registration on the day before the opening of the College. A fee of one dollar is charged for registration, and an additional fee of one dollar for matriculation.

Applicants for admission must be at least sixteen years of age, and must present a certificate of good moral character.

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Courses of Instruction.

Course of Study for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts.

The subjects of the Undergraduate Course form a system of prescribed and elective study. The subjects of the first two years have been selected mainly for their disciplinary value, and with the exception that a choice is offered between Greek and French, are strictly prescribed. In the last two years the element of personal choice is more freely introduced, the prescribed studies occupying in the Junior year seven of the sixteen hours of instruction each week, and in the Senior year four of the thirteen hours.

Honor Courses.

In addition to the regular class of instruction, Honor courses have been arranged for the advantage of students who may be able to do more than the ordinary work of their classes. These are open at the beginning of the Junior year to those undergraduates who have made during the first two years an average of not less than seventy-five per cent. of the available marks. The course selected must be continuous as to the subject during the Junior and Senior years. On the successful completion of the Honor course the student will be graduated with honors in the department chosen, provided he has made an average of not less than seventy-five per cent. on the regular studies of the last two years.

Any student failing to complete the work required for graduation with Honors shall be entitled to receive from the Professor of the department a certificate for the part of the course successfully accomplished, provided he shall have continued the study during at least one year.

General Course.

The studies of the College are arranged with reference to the wants of students who intend to take the full course. Provision is also made to accommodate all who may wish to study for a short period in any department, if, after examination, they are found to be prepared to work with the regular classes. The studies selected by general students must in respect to number and character be approved by the Faculty. General students, on leaving the College, shall be entitled to certificates of proficiency according to their attainments.

IV.-HISTORY, ECONOMIC SCIENCE AND AFFILIATED LAW COURSE.

- HISTORY. (Juniors.) 3 hours.
 - Canadian Constitutional History, Federal, Provincial and Municipal, amplified by lectures giving a comparative view of the Constitutional Governments of the present day. Six weeks.
 - (b) The General History of Europe from 476-1815, with particular reference to Institutional and National development and Colonial expansion. This part of the course is enlarged by a few lectures tracing the history of the Roman Empire and the incoming of the Teutonic Nations, from 31 B. C. to 476 A. D. Twenty weeks.
 - (c) Great Britain during the Nineteenth Century, giving special attention to political economic, and social changes, also noting international dealings and colonial development. Six weeks.

Text Books: (a) How Canada is Governed, Dr. Bourinot: (b) Mediaeval and Modern History, Myers: (c) England in the Nineteenth Century, C. W. Oman. On ... each subject numerous references are given to Contemporary History.

HONOR COURSE. Social and Industrial Life during the Mediaeval and Modern Ages.

Requirements: -- Montgomery's History of France. Chapters from Hallam's Middle Ages, Lecky's European Morals, from Knight's, Green's and Bright's Histories of England, and the Tudor and Stuart periods from Lecky's History of England in the 18th Century, and from The Poor in Great Cities.

The work is tested by recitations, class discussions, and frequent written examinations. In addition each student is required to prepare four essays or written reports of about fifteen minutes length on subjects connected with the above outline.

 - (b) Economic History. Eight weeks.
 - (c) Currency and Banking. Eight weeks.

 Social Evolution (Kidd); The Quintessence of Socialism (Dr. Schaffle); Poverty, Its Genesis and Exodus, (Godard); Co-operation, (Porter); Chapters from Rae's Contemporary Socialism. One essay upon some assigned subject will be required from each student.
- 3. Affiliated Law Course. (Seniors.) 3 hours.
 - (a) Constitutional History of England. First Half Year.
 - (b) International Law. Second Half Year.

The methods are by lectures and text book study.

 $Text\ Books:$ (a) Taswell-Longmead. (b) Woolsey, Lawrence or Davis. Each student should possess one of these works on International Law.

- The following books of reference are kept in the Lecture Room for daily use:—For course (a) Stubbs, Hallam, May, Bouvier's Law Dictionary, &c. For course (b) Hall, Maine, Snow's Cases and Snow's Treaties.
- The above subjects (a) and (b) constitute one full course which is open for election to any member of the Senior Class, though designed for those students who, after graduation, intend to enter the second year in the Dalhousie Law School. Dr. Weldon of the Law School, prepares the examination papers and estimates the work of those intending to enter the Law School.
- (c) Contracts. (Juniors and Seniors.) 1 hour. Lectures on Contracts are given in alternate years. They will be given in 1900-01. The Lecturer is W. E. Roscoe, Esq., M. A., Q. C.

SUPJECTS OF LECTURES ON CONTRACTS. - Definition of Terms; agreement, consideration, proposal, acceptance, promise, etc. Persons who may contract, principal and agent. Disabilities arising from infancy, coverture, lunacy, intoxication, etc. Express and implied contracts. Verbal and written contracts. Specialties. Statutory requirements as to the validity or authentication of contracts; Statute of Frauds. Causes vitiating agreements; mistake, fraud, duress, etc. Discharge of contracts, recission, performance, payment, release, merger, etc. Leading cases.

The lectures on Contracts are taken as an extra, receiving no credit on the Acadia Arts Course, but they receive the same credit on the Dalhousie Law Course as Constitu tional History or International Law.

DR. RUSSELL of the Law School supervises and estimates the work in Contracts.

Note.—The College Library is very well supplied with books bearing on the courses included under Department IV. References to leading authorities on special topics are given as the work of the year goes forward.

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VII.-PHYSICS AND ASTRONOMY

Sophomore Class.

GENERAL PHYSICS. The course of instruction includes lectures, experimental demonstrations, and recitations. The first half year is devoted to elementary dynamics, the properties of solid and fluid bodies, sound and heat; the second half year, to light, electricity and magnetism.

Three hours a week.

Text Books: Mechanics and Hydrostatics, Loney. Heat, Light and Sound, Jones. Electricity and Magnetism, Knott.

Junior Class.

The subjects studied in this class are those prescribed for the Sophomore year, but they are treated in a less elementary manner. In 1900-1901 selections will be made from the following:—

Elementary Treatise on Dynamics, Loney; The Theory of Heat,
Maxwell; The Theory of Electricity, Cumming. Three
hours a week..

HONOR COURSE. Sound and Music, Taylor; The Theory of Light, Preston.

Senior Class.

Practical Physics. A series of quantitative experiments in Mechanics, Sound, Heat, Light, Electricity and Magnetism. Lectures on the methods and principles involved and reports by the students on the experiments performed. The manuals of Sabine, and of Stewart and Gee are used. A fee of five dollars is charged for the course. Six hours a week.

Honor Course. A study of Analytic Mechanics. Applications of the Calculus to the solution of problems in Physics.

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ASTRONOMY.

A recitation course in general descriptive Astronomy, supplemented by occasional lectures. An attempt is made to stimulate personal observation, and frequent visits are made to the Observatory. The previous study of elective courses in Mathematics is not necessary, but a knowledge of Analytical Geometry is desirable. (Young's General Astronomy.) One hour a week.

Note.—This course can be taken only as an extra. The work done will not be accepted in place of other work, prescribed or elective.

VIII.-CHEMISTRY, GEOLOGY AND MINERALOGY.

CHEMISTRY.

Freshman Class.

GENERAL CHEMISTRY. The work in this course continues throughout the year and deals mainly with Inorganic Chemistry, its laws and principles. It is designed to give the student a general understanding of the composition, action and interaction, of the various substances which make up the material world around him. For the current year Remsen* Introduction to the Study of Chemistry will be used as a text book, additional experimental and problem work being introduced as may be deemed necessary. Three hours per week.

Sentor Class.

ANALYTICAL CHEMISTRY This course consists of laboratory work with occasional recitations and discussions of the results of analyses. The purpose is to give the student practice in the processes of Chemical Analysis and in the detection of all the common acid and base forming elements and their systematic separation from mixed compounds. Caldwell's "Elements of Qualitative and Quantitative Chemical Analysis" is used as a laboratory manual. Six hours a week.

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GEOLOGY.

Junior Class.

This course consists of lectures and recitations with weekly excursions during the Autumn and Spring. The topics treated in the lectures are: The Earth as a Planet; The Materials of the Earth's Substance—their arrangement and re-arrangement by Geological agencies: The History of Life upon the Earth; and the Geology of Nova Scotia. The students are expected to read Geikie's Text-book of Geology (Third Edition) in connection with the lectures. Eight field excursions will be made to points within easy reach of Wolfville, which is in the centre of a region unequalled in Nova Scotia for variety of Geological Formations. Reports upon each excursion, embodying the facts observed and the legitimate deductions from those facts, are required. Lectures three hours a week.

Honor Course. Work will be assigned, at the opening of the College Year, to students desiring to pursue a two years Honor Course in Geology.

Begulations Bespecting Andergraduate Work.

1. Students are graded according to the value assigned to their work in daily exercises, and in examinations at the close of the term. The term standing is determined by the average of the daily and the examination marks, according to the following scale:—

- 2. The examinations are conducted, as a rule, by written papers, but oral examinations may be introduced at the discretion of the. Faculty. In addition to these regular examinations the Faculty may require special examinations of any class or members of a class upon any subject included in the course of study.
- 3. In order to maintain standing a student must make 45 per cent in each subject of his course, both in term work and in the examination. Absence from class exercises lowers the student's standing. Failure to make 45 per cent in the term work in any subject excludes the student from the terminal examination in that subject, and necessitates his making standing both in the term work and the examination in the ensuing year.
- 4. Failure to make 45 per cent in the examination in any subject necessitates making standing in the corresponding examination in that subject in the ensuing year, the student receiving full value for the examination paper in such conditioned subject.
- 5. A notice of the student's intention to take examinations in the subjects in which he has failed, must be filed at the office not later than January 15th for the Mid-Years, and May 1st for the Finals.
- A candidate for the degree of B. A. may not enter upon the studies of the Sophomore Year until the Matriculation work has been completed.

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- 7. A candidate for the degree of B. A. may not enter upon the studies of the Junior Year until he has made a pass mark in the subjects of the Freshman Year.
- 8. A candidate for the degree of B. A. may not enter upon the studies of the Senior Year until he has made a pass mark in the subjects of the Sophomore Year.

Public Exercises.

The Junior Exhibition is held in December, at which time orations prepared by members of the Class are delivered in a public assembly.

On the first Wednesday in June the anniversary of the College is commemorated, at which time the ceremonies connected with the graduation of students and the conferring of degrees are observed.

Special Announcements.

- The course of public lectures given by members of the University Faculty will be continued during the current year.
- 2. Pedagory.—During the latter half of last year a provisional course in Principles of Education was offered as an extra to members of the Junior and Senior Classes. The course was designed especially for the benefit of prospective teachers, and was conducted by the Rev. A. W. Sawyer, D. D., Ll. D., Professor of Psychology and Metaphysics. The lectures were largely attended. It is the purpose to offer a course in the History of Education to the members of the Junior and Senior classes during the College year 1900-1901. The lectures will be weekly, and will be given by Dr. Sawyer.

2. The fees for tuition and the use of library are the same as in the case of general students.

3. Undergraduate work taken by resident graduates may be accepted as an equivalent for part of the work required for the degree of M. A.

Begulations for the Degree of M. A.

The degree of Master of Arts will be granted to a holder of the B. A. degree according to the following regulations passed by the Senate at its meeting in June, 1892:

 That the M. A. Degree be given only after the candidate has passed a satisfactory test in a prescribed course of study.

2. That such course of study be equivalent to a full year's course of advanced study.

3 That the assignments be arranged so as to secure a large acquaintance with some one subject, rather than a slight acquaintance with several.

4. That the manner of testing be by written examinations, by the presentation of a thesis on some assigned subject, and the preparation of a critique or review of some author included in the course selected.

 That the thesis and critique be submitted to the President on or before the first day of April, and the returns from the last examinations on or before the tenth day of May of the year in which the degree is to be conferred.

A full course is required for this degree; but the candidate is at liberty to select any two closely related half-courses.

Arrangements for the examinations are made by the Professor under whose direction the work is taken. Con

Theology.

GENERAL STATEMENT RESPECTING THEOLOGY.

For several years past it has been the purpose of the Board of Governors to provide a course of theological instruction, as soon as the finances of the University should make it practicable. The course in contemplation during these years has appeared upon the pages of the Calendar, under the title: Course for the Degree of Bachelor of Theology.

It may now be stated that the bequest of the late Godfrey P. Payzant, Esq., of Windsor, N. S., amounting to \$100,000.00, less the succession tax imposed by the government, has made the actual teaching of theology possible. For sufficient reasons, however, no course in Theology will be inaugurated during the current college year, and no definite announcement can at present be made respecting courses which may be adopted later on.

During the current year it is expected that the President, who was appointed as a Professor of Theology, will continue to give some provisional instruction in Homiletics, Christian Doctrine and Pastoral Duties to ministerial students pursuing the Arts course.

The Payzant Beneficiary Fund.

The half of Mr. Payzant's bequest constitutes a fund for "assisting worthy young men of the Baptist denomination who are studying for the ministry, and who otherwise could not afford the means to enable them to pursue their studies." This fund is available for students as above described, subject to such regulations as the Board of Governors may adopt from time to time. The terms of the bequest make it necessary that all beneficiaries shall be engaged in some work under a theological professor. The fund is administered through a committee of the Board known as the Ministerial Committee.

A fee of one dollar is charged for registration, and an additional fee of one dollar for matriculation. The fee for an Honor Certificate is three dollars; for the Degree of B. A., five dollars; for the Degree of M. A., ten dollars. The fees for Honor certificates and Degrees must be paid before the Annual Meeting of the Senate. If a student is excused from a regular Examination, he may have a special Examination, for which a fee of two dollars for each subject will be charged.

Rule of the Board of Governors.

University students shall pay to the Treasurer at the opening of each term, all Tuition and Incidental Fees, etc., for the term on which they are entering, and pay to the Treasurer, or secure to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee, all board bills, room rent or other bills due the University as follows: For the Fall Term, on or before December 5th; and for the Winter Term, on or before April 5th, in each College year. Students failing to comply with this rule shall not be admitted to examinations after the dates named respectively, and no student shall be graduated until he is clear on the books of the Treasurer of the University.

A certificate from a Scholarship-holder, accompanied by satisfactory evidence that such Scholarship-holder is legally qualified to grant the use of the Scholarship, may be presented to the President, to be forwarded to the Committee on Scholarships; and if such certificate is satisfactory, the student presenting the same will be credited with the proper sum on account of the Scholarship. All certificates from Scholarship-holders granting to students the privileges of Scholarships, must be in the hands of the President of the University before the 10th of October of each year.

The DeWolfe Scholarships.

There are seven of these Scholarships,—two of the value of \$30.00 a year, four of \$25.00, and one of \$20.00. The nomination to these Scholarships, which, by the terms of the bequest, can be granted only to male students, will be determined by the Senate, according to the class-standing, needs and conduct of the applicants. Application should be in the hands of the President on or before April 15th of each year.

The Ralph Manning Scholarship.

Thia Scholarship is awarded subject to conditions determined by the donor, Rev. J. W. Manning.

Ministerial Education Fund.

Students who have the Christian Ministry in view, and are approved by the churches of which they are members, may, in case assistance is needed, receive an annual appropriation from the Board of Ministerial Education.

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The Payzant Beneficiary Fund.

Regulations Respecting Aids.

In the distribution of the financial aids at the disposal of the University, the Board have adopted the principle that needy and deserving students resident in Chipman Hall shall be granted priority of claim.

Hereafter any student who shall marry during his undergraduate course will thereby disqualify himself for the remainder of his course in respect to any of the financial aids at the disposal of the University.

Conduct.

Special rules concerning conduct and good order will be announced from time to time as circumstances may require. It is assumed that students are in attendance for the purpose of intellectual and moral improvement, and that they will readily comply with all regulations that, in the judgment of the Faculty, are helpful in the accomplishment of this object. Inattention to study or misbehaviour of any kind will subject the offender to reproof or suspension at the discretion of the Faculty.

Residence.

- 1. Board and rooms for about 60 students are provided in Chipman Hall. The charge for board, which includes table, care of room, and plain washing, is \$2.60 per week. Room rent, fuel and light, are extra. Board and lodging can be obtained in approved places in the town at reasonable rates.
- 2. Young ladies attending the University are recommended to obtain board and residence at Acadia Seminary, provided rooms are available.
- 3 Young ladies who reside in the town are not permitted to board at residences where male students are also boarding.

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Library.

The College Library contains a valuable collection of books especially suited for the use of students.

The Library receives donations both of money and of books; additions are also made to it by means of the annual income of the DeWolfe Library Fund.

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Museum.

The Museum contains Geological, Mineralogical, and Botanical collections from various parts of the world. Some material of Ethnological and Historical interest is also being accumulated.

A Museum should not be a curiosity shop, but should serve the purposes of Education and Instruction, in order to justify its existence. With this end in view the material is being as fully labelled as the information in regard to it will permit, and arranged in sequence so as to bring out the relations of its parts one to the other.

This arrangement can be carried out more fully in the collections of rocks and minerals, on account of the greater variety and amount of the material. This, though rather large and varied for a local museum, is still meagre in our own local and provincial rocks and minerals.

This need is being supplied as rapidly as opportunities will allow by the work of the Instructor in Geology.

His opportunities for collecting are, however, necessarily limited, and he calls on all friends of the College and of Education, who have opportunities for collecting characteristic rocks and minerals, or natural products of economic importance, from any part of the Province, to aid in making the Museum a place of scientific instruction for both students and visitors, and its contents a complete representation of the scientific and economic wealth of our Province.

If friends of Education and of the College will assist in this work the Museum may be made of great value to our own people, and of interest to the increasing numbers that yearly visit Nova Scotia for purposes of scientific investigation.

An important addition this year is a collection of prehistoric pottery, consisting of about 40 pieces, which was presented by Dr. Lewis Hunt, of Sheffield, England.

This pottery was dug up near the site of Paphos in Cyprus, where it was found in graves from 60 to 70 feet below the surface. This collection has been placed in a suitable case with as full accompanying information as was obtainable.

DIRECTIONS TO COLLECTORS.

Rock fragments should be taken directly from the ledges, and pieces sent large enough to dress out, in specimens 4x3xx inches in size. If this dressing can be done by the collector it will save expense in transportation. Collections from quarries are particularly valuable and should be complete enough to represent the uses to which the stone is applied. Minerals with definite crystal forms are most desirable, and full collections of ores from provincial mining areas are needed.

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This Soci The meetings studies and d tainments of The fullest information should be furnished with each specimen, as to where found, the relation of the mass represented by the specimen, to adjacent rocks represented by accompanying specimens, if possible, and in the case of ores, building or ornamental stones, the uses to which the rock or ore is put, methods of preparation, photographs of works or rock mass, and all facts that could be called knowledge in regard to any material sent.

Societies.

Acadia Athenæum.

The object of this Society is the improvement of the students in debate and public speaking. The laws and regulations of the Society are subject to the approval of the Faculty. Besides its weekly meetings, arrangements are made for a course of Public Lectures during each College year. The Society has under its control a Reading Room furnished with a selection of newspapers, provincial and foreign, and other periodicals.

Acadia Amateur Athletic Association.

A large and convenient campus gives abundant opportunities for Athletic Games in the spring and autumn. There is also on the University grounds a large and well-equipped Gymnasium. From the first of November to the first of April the students have regular gymnastic drill under the director of the Gymnasium. In May of each year a public field day is held.

The Propylæum.

This Society is composed of the young ladies in the Arts course. The meetings are held on Friday afternoon. The exercises consist of studies and discussions on assigned topics. Occasional public entertainments of a social and literary character are given by the Society.

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College Young Men's Christian Association.

A branch of this Society has been formed and is in a flourishing condition. A present there are about ninety members. Addresses are delivered monthly before this Society by clergymen invited for the purpose. The Executive Committee of this Association publishes, in the summer vacation of each year, a College Hand-book containing a large amount of useful information.

College Young Women's Christian Association.

A Society bearing this name has been formed. In addition to regular meetings, a prayer service is held every Sunday morning of the College year.

Acadia Missionary Society.

This Society holds public monthly meetings. Its aim is to cultivate interest in Missionary work, and especially to gain information respecting Christian Missions in foreign lands.

Prayer Meetings and Sunday Services.

Prayer Meetings, conducted by the students, are regularly held on Sunday morning and on Wednesday evening throughout the College year. These religious meetings have been maintained ever since the founding of the College.

All students are required to be present at morning prayers, and also to attend public worship regularly on the Sabbath. Parents and guardians are requested to give instructions respecting the place of worship which they wish the students under their care to attend. Religious services are held every Sabbath in the town in connection with the various denominations.
