The bill consists of one clause providing that in lieu of the subsidy of land authorized by act to be granted to the Red Deer Valley Railway and Coal Company, the Governor in Council may grant Dominion lands to the company to an extent not exceeding 6,400 acres for each mile of railway from Calgary to a point about 55 miles

The bill provoked an interesting discussion on the question of making grants to railways and other companies in the North-

west.

Mr. Mulock remarked that so far as this particular road was concerned it was to be operated by a coal company who were running the line to their own coal fields, and if a land subsidy were granted them care should be taken that the rights of the public were protected. He proposed that a clause should be inserted providing that the company should not charge more than a

clause should be inserted providing that the company should not charge more than a certain freight for coal, otherwise the line might be valueless to other coal owners who would be discrimated against.

Mr. Tow regarded the proposal of the member for York as perfectly reasonable.

They had had innumerable instances of corruption practiced by members of a former House and by members of the other House in connection with subsidies to these companies.





How to Gather and Keep Winter Apples.

Useful Hints in Road-Making.

The Alabama Agricultural Experiment Station at Auburn has issued an interesting bulletin on this subject, from which the following extracts are taken: As an unnecessarily long road would increase the cost of construction, the cost of repairs and the cost of time and labor in traveling over it, it should, other things being equal, be perfectly straight, but straightness should always be sacrificed to obtain a level or make the road less steep. This is one of the most important principles to be observed, and yet is most often violated. Roads should be made to curve sometimes for economy in construction, such as to avoid swampy or bad ground, or to avoid large excavations, or to reach points or streams better stuted for the approach of bridges. Besides its substantial advantages, the gently curving road is much more pleasing to the traveler, for he is not fatigued by the tedious prospect of a long straight stretch to be traversed, but is met at each curve by a constantly varied view. An Illinois correspondent of the Country Gentleman writes: "Through inadvertence I have neglected to report the progress and condition of my experimental patch of alfalfa during this exceptionally dry summer. The first crop, as before reported, was taken of the ground May 27, and was estimated to yield two to two and a half tons to the acre of dry hay. The third crop is now fully six inches grown, and appears as indifferent to the drought as the two previous crops have been, yt would evidently be benefited by warmer in ghus and higher day temperatures.

Apiculture in Ontario.

Keeping Winter Apples.

The following rules are recommended for gathering and keeping winter apples: 1. Gather rather early or before too ripe. 2. Handle carefully, like eggs, and place in a cool, shaded spartment, opening to the north, until freezing weather is about to set in. 3. Assort carefully, removing all specimens which are decaying or about to decay, and store in a room where the selected fruit may be kept within a few degrees of freezing, without much change in temperature.

4. In a damp fruit room place on airy shelves, in a very dry room pack in boxes or tight barrels.


