Paris, Nov. 23.—Abomey, which is a PARIS, Nov. 25.—Abomey, which is said to have been captured by the French force operating in Dahomey, contains some 8,000 or 10,000 inhabitants, by whom Echanzin was more dreaded than loved, and many of whom were incapacitated as fighting men. The extent of the town is about 600 squar yards. The French shells, grape-shot and Lebel bullets inflict dreadful wounds, and to their action may be largely attributed the constant defeat of the Dahomeyans. They reassembled, always heroically, on the morrow, but they were seized with terror and could not be rallied to the field of battle. A desperate resistance, however, was expected in Abomey. The capture was a kind of taking Jerusalem, for the Dahomeyans, like the Ashantis and the Senassis, regarding themselves as chosen people. For five centuries they have occupied this country, and their dynasties have as much a religious as a civil or mititary sanction. It is expected that following upon the victory a kind of territorial division will be organized. It was stated that the actual sums obtained by him from various persons amounted to \$35,000, most of which had been wasted in "outside" Stock Exchange speculations. His method of procuring money for his gambling transactions, which were also carried out in connection with horse racing, was this: He had gone to friend after friend with a story, of which the particulars varied slightly in each case, but of which the gist was that he was commissioned by Mr. Goschen to "place" shares to a large amount in a private Government loan. Washington, D. C., Nov. 23.—Mr. Catchings, the leading member of the House Committee on Rules, who is now in Washington, is quoted as expressing the belief that the present Congress will do nothing to lessen the burdens of the incoming Administration, and that the new Congress will be compelled to take the necessary steps to increase revenues. He does not believe the revision of the tariff can be successfully undertaken during a can be successfully undertaken during a special session, but he does hold that in a special session the new Congress might properly repeal the McKinley Act, thus restoring the old duties of 1883. That would wipe out the sugar bounties, effecting a saving of \$13,000,000 annually, and at the same time by restoring sugar duties add about \$50,000,000 to the annual revenues, making the total increase of revenues approximate \$65,000,000. This increase he feels would prevent any deficiency until after the next regular session, and possibly for a longer period. Mr. Catchings would also pass the separate bills that were passed last session by the House only to remain unacted upon by the Senate, and he would add umber and salt to the free list. The reduced prices of the necessaries of life covered by these bills would, according to his reasoning, reconcile the people to the reimposition of the sugar duties. Unwards of 200 of the patrons of the factory and farmers of the locality, together with a goodly number of ladies, were present to listen to Mr. Wheaton's instructive address on practical dairying. He gave particular attention to the production and care of milk for cheese-making, and urged upon the farmers the necessity of selecting and keeping only first-class dairy and care of milk for cheese-making, and urged upon the farmers the necessity of selecting and keeping only first-class dairy cows, and of providing for them an abundance of suitable food, such as corn ensilage, etc. The preper handling of milk was discussed in all its details, and the patrons were urged to attend to these little thin and endeavor to secure for Western chee the best possible reputation. The subject of "Winter Dairying" was taken up and

of "Winter Dairying" was taken up and some of its alvantages mentioned.

Mr. Henderson, of Beverly, secretary of the Patrons of Industry for Wentworth county, also spoke in favor of winter dairying and urged upon the patrons of the factory the advisability of putting in the necessary apparatus and of commencing the manufacturing of winter butter.

The Lynden cheese factory has been running only one season, and has had an exceptionally good beginning. Over 110 tons of cheese were manufactured last season, and a much larger yield is expected next season. The factory buildings and equipment are second to none in Western Ontario and the company intend at an early date to put in the necessary apparatus for making butter during the winter.

CANADA A NATION.

Mr. McNeill, the somewhat eccentric M.P. for North Bruce, has addressed several audiences in Great Britain recently, taking for his text the fad which Mr. Heward Vincent came from England to promote in Canada last year. The member for North Bruce-a constituency, by the way, gerrymandered so as to secure the defeat of a Liberal-holds himself to be the special promoter of a plan that shall enable Canadians to obtain some undefined advantages by permitting their affairs, or a portion of them, to be once more controlled in Downing Street. That, in brief, is what Imperial Federation means, no matter what may be the fine-spun theories of men who are the self-elected

champions of it on this continent.

The fad has so far commended itself to but a few persons in Canada. It is a scheme promoted chiefly by inconsequential office-holders in Toronto, who break down whensoever they are asked to show how their views can be carried out without sacrificing the interests of the people of

Canadians are a practical people, and it is not likely that they will permit them-idens to be drawn into any nebulous pro-ione that may bring them no end of trouble, while a much clearer and more intelligent course is mapped out for their guidance.

So far Mr. McNeill and his friends have stated the chief objects which they seek to achieve by their fad to be (1) an army and navy alliance between Britain and the colonies; (2) the establishment of some sort of preferential trade arrangement whereby the people of the British islands shall be compelled to re-establish "protection" against all foreign countries, and in favor of the colonies, in return for the granting oy the colonies of a lower tariff for British ods than for imports from other coun-

To effect these objects would require revolution in the present relations of Great Britain and the nations of the earth. So great, indeed, would be the upheaval that even Mr. McNeill's friends in Parliament admit the scheme to be chimerical in the extreme. And if there is to be Imperial Federation, there must be an Imperial Parliament, in which representatives from all the colonies would have seats, and where these questions would be decided. How? In each case the voting would be according to self-interest. Would Canada with its half-dozen votes be able to control its own destiny, and make the most of its opportunities by any such arrangement? The idea is out of the question. A body meeting thousands of miles away from Can-ada would, under Imperial Federation, have practical control of Canadian commerce We have but to point out the fact to prove the utter unworkableness of the project. But it may be said that under Imperial Federation rule, Canadians would have the right to regulate their own tariff. That would be impossible if they bound them-selves to the proposition of the Imperial Federationists, which is that, no m how profitable the trade, say, of their neighbors in the United States, or how beneticial it might be to trade freely with France and Germany-the fatherlands of many of our people-it would be imperative to tax imports from those places at a higher rate than that charged to goods coming from the British Isles.

Another effect-indeed the first effect-Another effect—indeed the first electrical that would flow from Canada's indersation of Imperial Federation would be the binding of the Dominion to become an active partner in all wars in which the old world rulers might choose to engage. Everybody knows that these dreadful conflicts are often the result of mere accident, and that jingo Ministers may decree a war that will result in most disastrous loss of life and treasure before the masses have a chance to ntter a protest, though they are invariably the chief sufferers. Then, when war is begun, however indefensible, it can with difficulty be withdrawn from while there is a hope of worst-ing the other side, lest perchance national humiliation may be the result. Can-ada's development cannot be promoted by any alliance that will bind the country to rush with its men and its millions to the support of any old world nation in any quarrel that may arise. The destiny of quarrel that may arise. The destiny of Canada is to peacefully develop this great northern country. It can best do so, we feel assured, by minding its own business and keeping out of all old world quarrels, blood-letting and political jeal-ousies regarding the "balance of power an Europe." We need no standing army to enable us to held our own. We require no heavy expenditure to sustain warriors to fight in battles that they can have no to fight in battles that they can have no to fight in battles that they can have no power in promoting or averting. advancement of all such schemes can have but one outcome, the retarding of the prog-ress of a united Canadian people. Our forefathers dearly won emancipation from Downing Street rule. It was no small task that they achieved when they won for Canada a recognition of her right to con-trol her own destiny by the rule of her own citizens.

Nor would any trade policy, such as Mr. McNeill and his coadjutors indorse, be satisfactory either to Great Britain or to Canada. The British people, Lord Salisbury has assured us, will never again con-sent to the taxation of their food—not even to relieve the distress of Canadian trade restrictionists. The reimposition of these duties would, this Conservative leader has cold the British people, lead to a condition akin to civil war. Gladstone, John Morley and others agree with him. But in this connection Canadians must

think not so much of what is or is not bene-ficial to Great Britain—the shrewd traders there can be trusted to look after No. 1-but to what is best calculated to promote the welfare of this vast country. The people of Canada do not want to have their hands tied. They already have free trade with England, so far as exports to the motherland are concerned; they can to-morrow establish freedom of trade in imports from Great Britain, if their rulers desire to increase the trade between the two countries by the fairest of means. But it would be fatal to the future of the Dominion if its people were to discriminate against and antagonize their kinsmen and neighbors in the adjoining States, with whom, despite hostile tariffs on both sides of the border, we now do nearly half of our trade. Instead of a nondescript agitation in favor of the unattainable, let us agitate for tariff reform and reduced taxes. This we can do while still holding before the eyes of the ris-ing generation what the best minds in both political parties regard as the ideal future

for the Dominion.

As an Independent Nation, Canada would live and prosper in friendly alliance not only with Great Britain, but with the great Anglo-Saxon but with the great Anglo-Saxon nation to the south of us. We have not a doubt that when we choose to so declare both of these countries will be ready to acknowledge the rightfulness of our posi-tion and wish us Godspeed in our enterprise. Then our statesmen would do us better service, for, instead of looking to the old world for their honors, they would deem it the highest duty to approve themselves to their fellow citizens in the new Nation; and our rising generation would take far greater pride in their common country be-cause it was no longer a colony of an old world power, but a Commonwealth of which

hey could justly be proud.
Years ago, Secretary Seward of the United States, when speaking of the Do-

inion said: "I see in British North America, stretch ng as it does across the continent from the hores of Labrador and Newfoundland to shores of Labrador and Newfoundland to the Pacific, and occupying a considerable belt of the temperate zone, traversed equally with the United States by the lakes, and enjoying the magnificent shores of the St. Lawrence, with its Thousand Islands in river and gulf, a region grand enough for the seat of a great empire. In its wheat fields, its broad ranges of the chase at the north, its inexhaustible lumber lands, the most extensive now remaining on the globe, its invaluable fisheries, and its yet undisturbed mineral deposits, I see the elements of wealth."

In graphic language, the American states man unfolded the destiny of the Dominion as a great independent northern powerthe Russia of the new world, but "a very different Russia from that which fills all Southern Europe with terror." This estimate of, and prophecy regarding, the future of our country we believe the majority of the people of Canada heartily endorse. Its effective promulgation, side by side with a common-sense policy of trade, would do more to put hope and courage into our young manhood, and to aid immigration to our shores from oid world military ouresd nations, than any colicy that could be devised.
