Rumor Says It Stands Nine to Three for Acquittal-No Agreement in Sight.

DEFENDANT MAKES STATEMENT TO THE PUBLIC

Declared His Life Was Threatened, Compelling Him to Carry a Weapon, and Demands That He Be Judged According to Law of State.

New York, April 12, 12:30 p.m.-J ustice Fitzgerald decided to go out for Iuncheon, and ordered a recess until 2 o'clock.

Luncheon for the jury will be served in the consultation room.

Apparently there is no prospect of an early verdict. New York, April 12.-Harry Thaw this morning, through his attorneys,

gave out the following statement: "I wish the jury and everyone else to understand that no one more de-

spises a person who carries a concealed weapon more than I do. "That only after my life was in jeopardy, as I was informed by persons, and as was communicated to me by professional detectives, did I protect myself. Then I employed the Pinkertons-and they could never prove these attempts, so I could invoke the protection of the law or disprove them, so I could safely continue defenseless.

"Then doubting my judgment, I consulted an ex-chief of police, a man respected in his community, and he advised that my duty was to protect myself.

"In this trial, I wish my case simply and solely based upon the law of the state and upon the evidence which had convinced, not only me, as I reviewed all this evidence, but also the district attorney that I am innocent under the written law of the state."
