It is ordered that all railway companies on or before Jan. 1, 1911, shall erect and maintain on each side of the right-of-way fences of a minimum height of four feet six inches, with swing gates at farm crossings and cattle-guards on each side of the highway crossing at rail level. The railway fences at every highway crossing have learned. shall be turned into cattle-guards on each side of the highway.

At lines not completed or not open for traffic or in course of construction the empanies shall erect fences, gates, If not open yet for traffic the fences shall be erected and maintained before the road shall be open for traffic. Exceptions may be made as the railway board sees fit.
