COMPULSION BILL TO PASS THURSDAY IS HOUSE BELIEF

Expected That National and Laurier Amendments Will Be Lost, and Measure Go Through With 60 Majority.

Ottawa, July 4 .- Tomorrow the Nationalist-Conservative sub-amendment to give conscription a six months' heist will be defeated overwhelmingly, it is believed. It will have only about a dozen supporters. The Laurier amendment, calling for a referendum, will then be put and will be defeated by a normal Government majority of at least thirty. After that, the bill will be carried with about sixty votes to spare. This is the general opinion throughout the House today.



The management will be under the direction of some of the most successful American tire manufacturers, men who have devoted a life study to the business.

Special contracts have already been secured, aggregating \$400,000 yearly. The heavy duty on this class of goods coming into Canada is the reason for the firm's anxiety to come to Canada. Another Canadian firm will place an order for a minimum of 10,000 casings a year. The company would employ 400 hands, and would pay out in wages \$350,000 annually. The agreement calls for a minimum of 250 employees, and the minimum annual wage of \$250,000.
