# When the Operator Says "One Two-Six Three"

No doubt you have noticed the way the telephone operator repeats numbers. When, for example, you ask for "One Two-Six Three," she repeats "One Two Six Three," pausing just a fraction of a second between the hundreds and the tens.

There's a real reason for this practice: The switchboard before which the telephone operator sits is honeycombed with tiny holes, each the termination of a subscriber's line. These holes are in sections of one hundred. To locate "1263," the operator first finds the section labelled "12" and then the "63" hole in that section.
