# GERMAN REDS GAINING CONTROL THROUGHOUT COUNTRY

Volunteers Are Overpowered by German Reds and Killed, Bodies of Officers Mutil ated-Foodstuffs Are Obtainable Only in Small Quantities and at Fabulous Prices.

Berlin, March 22.—Conditions in Germany were described by the ministry of defence this morning as extremely serious.

"You cannot paint the situation throughout Germany too black," an official at the ministry declared to the correspondent of the Associated Press after a survey of the reports that had come in during the night."

In one case a company of volunteers had been overpowered by Spartacan forces, its officers killed and their bodies mutilated. This occurred near the Johannestal aviation ground. The Government forces recaptured Aldershof and Johannestal, from which they had been driven, killing 20 of the Red troops, and capturing 24 others, who were promptly executed.

The southern and eastern parts of Germany are reported quiet, although unrest was said to be spreading among the agricultural population in Pomerania and Mecklenburg. The communists were still in charge today at Stettin, At Kiel, which the troops had left, conditions were reported quiet.

#### IRELAND IS ON VERGE OF CIVIL WAR, DECLARES BRITISH PAPER, INTEREST IN LIFE IN REVIEWING MURDERS OF WEEK

Cork Tragedy Has Stirred All Sections of Ireland and England—Future Is Looked to With Anxiety—Lord Mayor MacCurtain Believed To Have Been Murdered As a Warning to Others.

London. March 22.—Dispatches from freland during the week-end show the murder of Thomas MacCurtain, lord mayor of Cork, to have produced an intense, if subdued, sensation throughout Ireland. This tragedy, says the London Times correspondent in Dublin, closed one of the blackest weeks since the rebellion of 1916. He gives a long list of outrages in various parts of the island, including five murders of policemen and others, and an attempt to kill Professor Stockley of Cork.

In Dublin consternation was created by the assassination of Lord Mayor MacCurtain, and the citizens are looking to the future with anxiety and alarm. The motive of the murder continues as mysterious as ever. No arrests have been reported, nor, so far as known, have any clues to the perpetrators been obtained. Warsaw, March 22 .- (By the Assoclated Press) .- The five points on which Poland is willing to enter upon peace negotiations with the Bolsheviki were made public by Stanislas Patek, minister of foreign affairs, after the document had been submitted to the Diet's foreign committee for its consideration. No announcement has been made as to when the terms will be sent to Moscow, the date depending upon further conferences between the border, state delegates in Warsaw and the Poles.

The chief points of the terms refer to territorial questions, Poland insisting territorial questions, Poland insisting upon the return of lands wrested from Poland by Russia after Poland's partition of 148 years ago.



Paris, March 22.-The rejection of the treaty of Versailles by the United

States Senate has been so long disstates Senate has been so long discounted in France that the news caused little sensation.

The Journal points out that the question of ratification of the Anglo-Franco-American convention must now come up for discussion, and inquires whether President Wilson will maintain a project which was so intimately connected with the peace treaty. It recalls that the whole operation of the learne of nations and economic reorganization of the world was based on American co-operation.

The Figaro remarks that "the Democrats who voted against the treaty were partisans of integral ratification, while the Republicans who voted for it rejected the important articles," and concludes that the treaty's fate was largely provoked by party rollitics and antagonism to President Wilson,

L'Eclair says: "All the socialists and all the radical pacifists counted upon President Wilson to mutilate our victory. They have not been disappointed. But what is the great idealist going to do now? Will he appeal to the country against the slight he has sustained?"

L'Homme Libre says: "The American opposition was organized in America itself, of course, by personal adversaries of the president and uncompromising adherence to the Monroe doctrine. But it was strongly fortified and helped by French criticism. If the Senate at Washington does not want the treaty of Versailles, it is in great part because a section of French opinion. In delirious exaggeration and impatient opposition said it did not want it, either."

BRITISH EXPRESS REGRET.

London, March 22.—Commenting on the defeat of the Versailles treaty in the United States Senate, the Liverpool Post expresses profound regret that the pact was rejected.

"Many thizes contributed to this deplorable upshot of the president's diplomacy." the newspaper adds. "It is not for outsiders to sit in judgment on America's decision, nevertheless it seems terribly plain the senators have spoken and voted amid a great deal of misconception as to the treaty as a league of nations, and that unfortunately mental atmosphere might have been markedly improved had Mr. Wilson shown himself as skilled a manager of men as he has undoubtedly shown himself a lofty idealist."

The newspaper thinks America may have a chance of putting the league to an immediate test regarding herself, as she is technically at war with Germany, and asks:

"May not the league be instructed to smooth out that difficulty?"

# NO NEW WARSHIPS

Still Greatest Naval Fighting Force in World.

Washington, March 21. — British naval estimates for 1920-21 provide for no new warship construction, it was stated today at the British embassy, stated today at the British embassy, and provision is made for a post-war fleet in full commission of only 15 battleships, 4 battle cruisers, 9° light cruisers, with destroyers and submarines in proportion.

The British post-war fleet, as described in the embassy's announcement, will constitute the greatest naval fighting force in the world.

The embassy's announcement as to Great Britain's program for the next fiscal year follows:

"The British naval estimates for 1920-21 provide for a total expenditure during the year of £84.372.000, and of this sum £23,000,000 is accounted for by liquidation of terminal war expenses. The estimates provide for no new war construction, but eight light cruisers, two flotilla leaders, eight destroyers and seven submarines, the construction of which is far advanced will be completed.

"The personnel of the navy will be 136,000 men. Provision is made for a post-war fleet in full commission of only 16 battleships, 4 battle cruisers, 38 light cruisers, with destroyers in proportion."

The demobilization of the Canadian naval servce follows a decision of the Unionist caucus held recently, at which it is stated the plans of Admiral Jellicoe, looking to the establishment of a Canadian navy, were turned down in a decisive manner by those present.

The attitude of the caucus and the decision of the Government to demobilize the naval service means that Canada will lose a fleet of ships valued at pre-war figures at \$16,500,000. Admiral Jellicoe, in his report, stated that the Imperial Government would be willing to present to the Dominion a number of specified vessels worth approximately that amount, on condition that Canada embark on a naval program involving an annual expenditure of fur willies. embark on a naval program involving an annual expenditure of five millions NAVY LEAGUE PROTESTS.

The league, representing a constituency of 60,000 members throughout the dominion, appears to be desirous of dominion, appears to be desirous of forcing a reversal of the policy announced in the press this morning.





#### **PUNISH GUILTY** OF REVOLUTION EBERT PURPOSE

German President Voices Determination To Prosecute Higher-Up Offenders.

STRIKERS' AGREEMENT

Resume Work—One Condition Is That Coal Industry Be Nationalized.

STUTTGART, March 21 .- (By the Associated Press.)—The immensity of the damage caused in Germany by the revolution and the consequent uprising, and the Government's present determination to prosecute the guilty were voiced by President Ebert today.

"I am optimistic enough to think that the damage has not been catastrophical, and that is also the opinion of the cabinet," Herr Ebert sad. "I am sorry the events of the last few days have proved there are still circles in Germany that think the distress of the lost war not great enough. They are the same group that always desired war; they are the inciters of the militarists and reactionaries."

Regarding the punishment of the Kapp leaders and the expectation of some that the state of slege would make necessary the execution of the guilty, the president declared:

"Those guilty shall feel the full weight of the law. All officers of responsible position and all leading civilians who joined wilfully will be regarded as guilty, be charged with high treason, and might be punished with penal servitude."

Regarding executions under martial law Herr Ebert said:

"The lawyers will determine. Perhaps some will be executed, besides the confiscation of their property. We want to punish the leaders, but to spare those who were forced into the movement or acted through ignorance." and the Government's present deter-

The president said it would take time

to restore complete quiet, but declared he was quite confident all would be well. He expressed his thanks to the foreign governments for their attitude during the crisis, and especially to France and Austria, which countries sent diplomatic representatives to Stuttgart, and to England, whose representa-tive from the beginning dealt with the old government. governmental announcement today

The family good budget in some sixty cities averaged \$15.70 at the middle of February, as compared with \$15.30 in January, \$13.41 in February a year ago, and \$7.75 in February, 1914.

Wholesale prices are also on the increase, the index number in the Gazette rising to 343.5 for February, as compared with \$36.4 for January, 279.8 for February a year ago, and 186.6 for February 1914.







Canada's mortgage loaning institutions are but slowly adjusting themselves to peace conditions as indicated by the annual reports of the various loan, trust and insurance companies. In this they reflect the national situations as regards loans and the international situation as regards capital supply. However, it was not to be expected that after the severe strain of the war there would be an immediate return to old conditions and so far as the institutions referred to are concerned, their reports give every indication of ability to immediately meet the demands of borrowers whenever the resumption of immigration and building activity create a market for their funds.

Not only was there a contraction of mortgage loans in Canada of about \$15,000,000 during the war, but there was marked rise in the value of capital on both sterling and currency debentures. The result was that larger interest payments were made necessary, while on the other hand, the position of borrowers was such that rates to them could not be increased. At the same time general prosperity encouraged repayments on a wide scale and other investments like Victory bonds, which would leave the companies in a position to quickly mobilize their resources when demand returned, did not yield as substantial profits. The companies also had to face 25,000 or 30,000 draft evaders at large—men who business.
