



Sir Walter Cassels and Sir Thomas White Agree That the Stocks Are Worthless. While Chief Justice William H. Taft Presents a Dissentient Judgment-Any Consideration To Be Shown Share holders Must Come From the Canadian Government - White Says Receivership Could Not Have Been Avoided.

Ottawa, Sept. 7.—Rendering judgment today, 1 Trunk board of arbitration decided, by a majority ruling, that the common and preferred stocks of the Grand Trunk system were worth nothing. The board was appointed to determine the MYSTERIOUS AEROPLANE value, if any, of such stock, and the price at which it was to be acquired by the Government in taking over the road. The stock has a par value of £37,073,492. The majority ruling was rendered by Sir Walter Cassels, chairman of the board, and Sir Thomas White, arbitrator for the Government. Hon. W. H. Taft, arbitrator for the Grand Trunk, presented a dissentient judgment.

In rendering judgment, Sir Thomas White, arbitrator for the Government, said that down to December 31, 1917, the Grand Trunk system, according to its books of accounts, was mak ing profits of varying amounts, annually available for dividends. From the end of 1917 down to December, 1920, very heavy annual deficits were incurred

It has been suggested that some effort could be directed along this line with creditable success. It was brought forcibly to the attention of different members of the city council last evening that this question, once considered by the city resulted in a splendid start in the right direction, but was eventually allowed to "die a more or less natural death."

Scribblers and Pencils.

During 1911 it is claimed a sum of \$14,000 was voted to purchase textbooks. This was finally cut to \$7,000. Questioned at that what books or school materials were actually purchased with this amount in question, the reply from citizens, who had children attending public school at that time, was "a few scribblers and pencils." One fact stands revealed evidently that some use was found for the \$7,000 whether books were available for the pupils or not.

Several of the aldermen, including Ald. Watkinson, Harley and Wenige are keenly interested in this phase of educational affairs. It is contended from numerous sources that at the present time there is considerable hardship endured by dozens of children. Many are without certain books deemed necessary by the department, and are forced to borrow from one another. Harley seconded a resolution that the city solicitor be instructed to seize the cars of the street railway company and retain the same until such time as the city is paid in full, subject to the approval of the city solicitor. It is proposed to man the cars and operate them until the required amount is secured.





Stead, in his weekly telegraphic summary to the department of immigration and colonization on western crop conditions says: "This week's summary covers territory two hundred miles northward from Calgary to Edmonton and eight hundred and fifty miles southeastward, Edmonton to Winnipeg. All this great wheat belt of more than a thousand miles promises an average yield of approximately 20 bushels to the acre, after allowing for lighter areas in the vicinity of Calgary and one or two other points. At Nokomis, wheat fields were found yielding 30 bushels, and although this is above the average, many fields will yield 25 bushels. Excellent crops of corn are found as far north as Edmonton and Saskatoon. The demand by Saskatchewan for two thousand additional harvesters at the last moment indicates that crops are heavier than the estimate based on the outlook of a month ago. Competent labor is at a premium in certain parts of that province.

Basements are not entirely excavated and the roofs leak. He questions if the latter defect is due to too much lap, the shingles not being laid four inches to the weather, according to specifications. There is no roofing paper, as called for in specifications for these houses. "There is no feature for or against the material used. He asserted that it is Architect Mc Brde's duty to decide how these defects can be overcome, pointing out that the roofs are the most serious. He emphasizes the fact that the houses "are not falling down," which secret did not require a special trip of an expert from Toronto to reveal.

"There is nothing that cannot be remedied," concludes the report, "and it is certainly a question of supervision, whether on the part of the architect or contractor the workmanship could have been better.

Plastering defects he attributed to the fact that the houses in question were unoccupied at the time of the inspection. He urged that the contractors and architect get together and arrange to have things fixed up, and arrange to have that in his opinion they were not properly set below the frost line.

Inspector Hammett states that as the houses have been erected several months the remedies to be exacted will be "hard on the contractors." The local commission, through its architect, ought to get it settled, allowing the contractors a portion of expenses for deterioration. He suggested that if the weeds about the houses were cut the homes would present an improved appearance to prospective purchasers.


