

Yet behind the scenes, where one could witness the actual manufacture of the puppets who were placed on the stage, one was sometimes amazed at the gullibility of a world which believed in their reality. As it is useless to protest, one must be content to state the firm conviction. based on the closest and most careful observation of recent proceedings, that the conduct of the members of the Sacred College before, during and after the conclave was absolutely in accordance with their high office and grave their consciences.

> London, Aug. 6. - The Financial Times, commenting on the programme of the Montreal Congress of the Chambers of Commerce of the Empire, has no fault to find with the ten resolutions emanating from the Canadian chambers, except that from Belleville, asking for the destruction of inter-Imperial tariff barriers, which it is obviously impossible to table. All the Canadian resolutions, it says, make requests for preference in the friendliest terms, except Winnipeg, which complains of lack of reciprocity. The Financial Times hopes that the Montreal Chamber of Commerce will withdraw the ill-advised motion concerning Imperial defense.

Fifty delegates, representing provincial chambers of commerce, sailed today from Liverpool on the Allan liner Bavarian to participate in the international meeting at Montreal. In a long letter to the Times to-

day, Sir Gilbert Parker makes short work of many of the anti-Chamberlain arguments. 
