SIR,—With reference to your application to pay Messrs. Dupuis & Nolin, \$850 on account of linen supplied to Rideau Hall, I beg to say that, in my opinion, the payment has not received Parliamentary authority.

The appropriation to which it is proposed that the charge should be made, viz: "Repairs, furniture, heating, &c.," authorizes payments for such furniture as may be required for public buildings used for public purposes, but does not, in my opinion authorize a charge for furniture of any kind for a building to be used by any official as a residence, even should the official be the highest in the land, as in the present case.

The payment in this instance appears to me to be equivalent to a payment for private purposes, which can be legally made only when there is a special direct authorization for the purpose. It is true that the residence of the Governor General is owned by the Government, but that fact does not at all, as far as I can see, warrant the supplying of furniture, which is merely adding an unauthorized emolument to one which has been authorized. I have to take the responsibility of having passed previous applications for similar payments, on what I now consider insufficient grounds.

SIR,—I am in receipt of your letter of the 29th instant enclosing a report from the Auditor General refusing to issue a certificate to pay an account for \$850, for linen supplied to Rideau Hall, for the reason that there is no parliamentary authority therefor, and requesting to be advised whether such authority exists for the payment of it.

In reply I have the honor to state as follows:—

The Supply Bill of last session (p. 27) contains the following item: "Repairs, furniture, heating, &c., \$190,000."

I am of opinion that this provision is sufficient authority for the expenditure referred to. The furniture at Rideau Hall, as well as the building itself, was purchased in pursuance of express Parliamentary authority in 1868, and items of the character in question have been continuously provided for and paid with the knowledge of and without question by Parliament, as the Public Accounts and Parliamentary Proceedings will show. There can be no doubt but the words "Repairs, furniture, heating, &c.," are wide enough to include "linen" and they have been so interpreted in making expenditures in former years without any disapproval by Parliament. Inasmuch as the furniture heretofore purchased at the public expense is public property, and has heretofore been considered necessary in connection with Rideau Hall, as the official residence of the Governor General, there is just as much authority for repairing and renewing the furniture as there is for repairing and renewing the building itself.

EXECUTIVE REGULATIONS.

I have thought it advisable to collect for reference several Orders in Council and letters relating to economy in public expenditure, which are frequently quoted in the following pages.

Powers of Attorney.

Rules prescribed by the Treasury Board, under sanction of the Governor General in Council, in reference to the mode of Acquittal of Warrants for the payment of money by the Government of Canada.

1. No officer in the Civil Service shall, under any circumstances, be permitted to act as attorney for the receipt of public moneys.

2. No power of attorney will be recognized, received or acted upon by the Receiver General which is not printed, and of the form to be obtained from the office of the Receiver General, under which only payment can be made, and such power will operate as to any sum of money due only by the Government at the date of the power of attorney.

3. No powers of attorney will be received by the Government for the payments of moneys on warrants which partake of the character of an assignment of the moneys to another party, or purport to be irrevocable, or are in "any respects qualified."

4. General powers of attorney, authorizing the receipt of money due, or which may become due after its date, by which any chartered bank or agent of a chartered bank, or any private individual, is constituted the attorney, will be received and acted upon if printed, and of the special form to be obtained from the office of the Receiver General; and in the event of the power being to the agent of a chartered bank, the bank must declare itself, by a proper instrument in writing, responsible for the acts of such agent, in respect to the receipts of moneys thereunder.

It is, however, optional with the party executing any power of attorney to a bank or agent of a bank, or any private individual, prior to the execution, to erase the words "or may hereafter become due."

5. All powers of attorney must be signed in the presence of a witness.

6. In case of the death of the person in whose behalf payment is claimed, the probate of will or other proof that the applicant is entitled to receive the money, must be furnished on application for such payments.

Blank forms of powers of attorney may be obtained from the office of the Receiver General and at all the branches of the Bank of Montreal.

Duplicate Cheques.

Treasury Minute, June 18, 1888.—The Board had under consideration a communication from the Auditor General suggesting that uniform regulations be prescribed by the Board with reference to the requirements which are to warrant the duplication of lost cheques.

The Board, on the advice of the Department of Justice, direct that if a Government cheque, whether on Letter of Credit or Receiver General's account, does not reach the person in whose favor it is drawn, or is lost or destroyed by such person, the bank on which it is drawn be notified first by such person.

2. That a duplicate cheque be issued, on a bond of indemnity of the form annexed being furnished, securing the Government against loss; such bond to be examined by the Department of Justice after execution.

3. That a declaration showing whether the original cheque was endorsed or not, and how it was lost or destroyed should accompany the bond, in case it is claimed that the cheque was lost or destroyed.

4. That each duplicate cheque should have the word "Duplicate" written in red ink across the face of it.

Accounts for Advertising.

Order in Council, December 17, 1875.—On a memorandum from the Hon. Mr. Mackenzie, on the subject of Departmental advertising, proposing a scheme for adoption as absolutely necessary to prevent the recurrence of abuses which seem inseparable from isolated action, and an inefficient audit by those Departmental officers who may not have the means of ascertaining facts necessary to an accurate correction of advertising accounts.

Mr. Mackenzie states that if this scheme is adopted, he recommends that the Secretary of State shall at once communicate to each Department information of the mode of proceeding for the future.

The Committee advise that the scheme and recommendation submitted be adopted.

Memorandum referred to above.—With a view to similarity of action by the various Departments in respect of orders and accounts for advertising it is recommended that all such orders as are issued at the Seat of Government be given through the Queen's Printer, and that the Queen's Printer certify to the accounts before payment.

The copy to be sent to the Queen's Printer, accompanied by Ministerial directions, naming the papers in which the advertisement is to be published, specifying whether in the daily or weekly issue, and the number of insertions in each paper respectively.

On receipt of these instructions the Queen's Printer to procure the printing by the contractors of a sufficient number of copies to enable him to furnish duplicates to the papers indicated. These to be forwarded by him to the publishers, accompanied by an intimation of the number of lines to which the advertisement is to be limited, himself establishing the space on a proper estimate of the solid matter of the notice, with a moderate allowance for purposes of display; and accompanied also by an instruction to the publishers to render the accounts to him, with a copy of the order attached, and with marked copies of the papers in which advertisements are printed.

The Queen's Printer to ascertain the established tariffs for advertising of the several papers on the list; and on receipt of the accounts, certify to the same in accordance with these rates, and to transmit the accounts for payment to the Departments from which the orders issued, having first satisfied himself that publication has been had as directed.

Accounts for advertising required by the outside services to be also rendered with the orders, and marked copies of the publications, to the Queen's Printer, and the advertisements to be by him measured, certified to, and transmitted for payment in accordance with the rules which obtain for advertisements issued at the Seat of Government.

The Queen's Printer to keep, with each paper, accounts of the advertisements directed to be published in it, under the different Departmental headings, so as at all times to show the state of each account.

Order in Council, March 22, 1883.—On a report dated March 21, 1888, from the Secretary of State, submitting that the Act respecting the Department of Public Printing and Stationery prescribes that all charges for advertising in the *Canada Gazette* shall be paid in advance, and that the Queen's Printer reports that in some cases, after such payment, the parties advertising discontinue their notices before all the insertions asked for have been given, and apply for a refund of moneys paid for insertions ordered but not given.

The Minister recommends that the Queen's Printer be instructed that no such return of moneys can be made, as the Government is ready at all times to fulfil the contract entered into with the advertisers in the *Gazette*, and is in no wise responsible for their discontinuance. The Committee submit the above recommendation for your Excellency's approval.

Printing, not under Contract.

Order in Council, November 2, 1884.—The Board had under consideration a letter from the Auditor-General referring to the discussion in the Public Accounts Committee respecting public printing done otherwise than by the contractors, and requesting a ruling from the Treasury Board thereon.

The Board, on careful consideration of the subject, recommend to Council that whenever printing is done by others than the contractors, the rates to be charged should be the current rates for work of the same magnitude at the place where the printing is performed.

Stationery Office.

Order in Council, November 17, 1877.—The Committee of Council have had under consideration the items in the Public Accounts under the head of Departmental Contingencies, from which it appears that considerable sums are expended by the several Departments for books, maps and stationery, outside of the Stationery Branch. They are of opinion that those articles could be purchased more cheaply through the Stationery Branch than by the system now pursued. They therefore recommend that hereafter those articles be purchased through the Government Stationery Office, by requisition from the Minister or Deputy Minister of each department, and that the Stationery Office be directed to procure the articles when not kept in stock.

Order in Council, October 8, 1880.—On a memorandum dated October 2, 1880, from the Secretary of State, stating that it has been represented to him that the practice occasionally prevails in the Departments of ordering or purchasing stationery otherwise than through the Stationery Office—the accounts for which (accompanied by the orders for the same) are thereafter presented to the clerk of the Stationery Office for payment.

That as it is impossible that the prices of the articles thus ordered can be properly checked, and as the practice appears to him (the Minister) to be otherwise

objectionable, he recommends that it be discontinued, and that it be the duty henceforth of the clerk in charge of the Stationery Office to refuse to pay any accounts for articles which have not been ordered through him.

Order in Council, July 24, 1882.—The Board had under consideration a letter from the Auditor-General in connection with the purchase of stationery at Victoria, B.C., for the use of officers of the Dominion Government in that Province.

The Board recommend that the Order in Council of November 17, 1877, be amended, and that power be given to officers in British Columbia to purchase stationery at Victoria, and to officers in other provinces, excepting Ontario and Quebec, to purchase mucilage and ink, viz., at St. John, Halifax, Charlottetown and Winnipeg.

Advertising in Pamphlets.

Order in Council, April 16, 1880.—The Committee of Council have had under consideration the subject of advertising in pamphlets, and the question of the subscription by Departments to books, and they recommend:—

(1.) That no advertisements be authorized in connection with the publication of any pamphlet or book whatever, save only that, where any department of the Government causes to be published a pamphlet or book, the Head of such department may cause to be inserted therein such advertisements connected with his own Department as he thinks expedient in the public service.

(2.) That as regards subscriptions to books, no Department be allowed to subscribe for or purchase any book whatever unless such book be deemed by the Head of the Department one which will be useful for reference in the administration of the Department, and that not more than four copies shall be taken in any such case.

The Committee further recommend that the foregoing Minute be published in the *Canada Gazette* for the information of the public.

Order in Council, November 1, 1881.—Ordered that the Immigration Branch of the Department of Agriculture be excepted from the provisions of O.C., April 16, 1880, relative to the purchase of pamphlets, books or other publications, and that the same rule of exception be applied to advertisements.

Legal Services.

Order in Council, April 12, 1879.—On a report dated April 2, 1879, from the Hon. Minister of Justice, stating that it has been represented by the Auditor-General that it would facilitate the business of his office were an Order in Council passed making it necessary that the accounts rendered by any legal agent employed professionally by any of the Departments of the Government should be submitted to the Department of Justice for examination and approval before payment.

That at present the practice of the Departments appears to be to submit such accounts to the Department of Justice before paying the same, but no formal Order in Council exists on the subject.

That an Order in Council does exist providing that all accounts for printing and advertising are to be certified by the Queen's Printer before payment.

That he, the Minister, thinks that it would be proper that a formal Order should be passed with respect to legal agents. He recommends, therefore, that it be ordered that the accounts rendered by legal gentlemen employed professionally by any of the Departments of the Government be submitted to the Department of Justice for examination and approval before payment, and that a copy of the Order be transmitted to each of the Departments of the Government.

Gratuities.

Order in Council, Feb. 1, 1868.—As frequent instances occur of the death of officers in the service of the Government, leaving their families in circumstances of great and immediate want, and destitute of means to defray the expenses of illness and funeral, the Committee respectfully advise that in all cases of the decease of an officer of the Government on the permanent list a gratuity equal to his salary be paid to his widow or orphan children, or to such members of his family or household as His Excellency may approve, for two months from the day of his decease.

Order in Council, Dec. 26, 1837.—The Board having had under consideration the matter of the payment of gratuities to the widows or other representatives of officials of the Government not on the permanent list, are of opinion, and recommend to Council, that the terms of the Order in Council of Feb. 1, 1868, be adhered to.

The Board are further of opinion that should Council, in special cases, deem it necessary that the provisions of the above mentioned Order in Council be extended to include payment of gratuities to the widows or other representatives of officials not on the permanent list, the consent of Parliament should be asked for the payment thereof.

Salaries.

Order in Council, Feb. 9, 1875.—On a memorandum dated Feb. 9, 1875, from the Hon. the Minister of Finance, reporting that there appears to be a want of uniformity in the manner of paying the salaries of deceased officers—that in some cases the salary is paid to the day of death, and in others the salary of the month in which the officer died is paid. He therefore recommends that for the future the whole month's salary be paid in all cases. The Committee submit the above recommendation for Your Excellency's approval.

Order in Council, July 29, 1871.—On a report, dated July 29, 1871, from the Minister of Finance, stating that considerable inconvenience having arisen from Orders in Council making promotions and other changes in the Civil Service, and granting superannuation allowances, not naming the time from which they shall count, and it being desirable that, excepting for special reasons, such changes shall always count from the first day of some month, and recommending that it be established as a general rule that unless some other date is specially named in the Order in Council, all such changes shall be held to count from the first day of the month next succeeding the date of the said Order. The Committee submit the above recommendation for Your Excellency's approval.

Order in Council, Jan. 13, 1887.—The Committee of the Privy Council have had a memorial from the members of the Civil Service laid before them by the Right Honorable the Prime Minister, praying for relief of their financial embarrassment in reclaiming the advance of salary.

The Committee recommend, with a view to relieving the financial embarrassment, that the pay list for each month be authorized on the 15th day of the month, provided that when the day for passing any pay list under the provisions hereof shall be a Sunday, or a bank or departmental holiday, the pay list be issued on the previous day. The salaries of the Ministers to be paid at the end of each month.

Order in Council, November 14, 1885.—The attention of the Board was called by the Deputy Minister of Finance to the statements of the balances of the several Government accounts with the Bank of Montreal, on the 31st October, 1885, by which it appeared that some of the Departments had issued pay cheques in advance of the due date.

The Board recommend that the attention of the several Departments be called to the irregularity of such action, and the Board are of opinion and recommend that steps should be immediately taken to stop the practice for the future.

Order in Council, March 5, 1888.—The Treasury Board have had their attention called to the fact that the terms of the Order in Council of Jan. 13, 1887, governing the issue of the Civil Service monthly pay cheques have not been strictly adhered to, and that cheques are sometimes issued in advance of the days authorized by the said Order for the issue of the pay lists. The Board recommend to Council that the

several Departments be notified that in future the monthly pay-cheques must not be issued in advance of the days authorized by the said Order for the issue of the pay-lists, and that the provisions of the said Order must be strictly adhered to.

Order in Council, July 1, 1886.—The Board had under consideration the matter of payments for extra services, under various headings, paid to permanent officers of the Public Departments, as shown in the statements submitted to Parliament in the Report of the Auditor-General.

Taking these statements into consideration, the Board are of opinion, and recommend to Council, that, with the following exception, from and after the 1st July, 1886, no payment be made for any extra service of any kind whatever.

The exception referred to in the above, is the amount yearly allowed by Parliament for the computation of interest and balancing the accounts of the depositors in the several Post Office and Government Savings Banks, which has to be performed immediately after the close of the fiscal year, whereby no inconvenience should arise to depositors, and it may be added that an analogous vote for the same service is granted by the English House of Commons.

Order in Council, October 16, 1886.—That the Order in Council of July 1, 1886; founded on a Minute of the Board dated June 24, 1886, providing that no payment be made for any Extra Service of any kind whatever, be amended by excluding from the operation thereof "payments for services performed by persons in the Customs and Fisheries Departments in connection with the distribution of the Fishing Bounty and collection of statistics," for which a vote of Parliament is taken.

Superannuation.

Order in Council, Jan. 7, 1884.—The Board had under consideration the fact that several recommendations to place temporary officers on the permanent list have been referred to them for report.

The Board, in compliance with the law, have recommended favorably on the cases submitted to them, but at the same time the Board have to direct the notice of Council to the fact that placing these officers on the permanent list has the effect of bringing them under the operation of the Superannuation Act, and that hitherto no provision has been made for payment of abatements on the pay of these officers while temporarily employed, although their temporary service counts on retirement.

The Board now recommend to Council that from and after the 1st inst. it shall be optional with temporary officers, on receiving permanent appointments, to place themselves, as far as regards their temporary services, under the operations of the Superannuation Act; but that in the cases where officers desire to avail themselves of this privilege, the Board are of opinion that abatements should be paid on their past temporary salaries since the Superannuation Act came into force, when the officers have served for so long back; otherwise, from the commencement of their temporary services.

The Board further recommend that, as the immediate payment of abatements on past salaries would, in many cases, involve considerable hardship, a period of six months be allowed for paying the same, the deduction to be made in six equal parts, to be taken from each monthly pay for the first six months of the permanent appointments.

Order in Council, May 3, 1886.—That the 34th paragraph of the Treasury Minute of the 11th November, 1870, which paragraph is as follows :—

'(34.) When any officer has an official residence or other similar perquisite his salary shall be stated at such higher sum as may fairly represent these advantages, and he shall pay the abatements on such higher salary, otherwise his superannuation allowance shall only count on the salary on which he has paid abatement;'—be repealed, except in the case of those who now pay superannuation abatement on such allowance or perquisite in addition to the abatements from their salaries.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge your letter of the 7th, asking whether, under any circumstances, superannuation once established by Council may be reopened—always presuming that no clerical error has been made.

The Superannuation Act provides that under the circumstances mentioned therein the Governor in Council may grant to a person who has served in an established capacity in the Civil Service a superannuation allowance, and that the Order in Council made in the case shall be laid before Parliament. If the grant was made by Letters Patent, the latter could not be cancelled by authority of an Order in Council, except they had been issued in the name of the wrong party, or contained a clerical error or misnomer, or wrong description of a material fact. (*See 38 Vic., Cap. 13.*) As the grant in the case of a member of the Civil Service is made by an Order in Council, I am of opinion that in practice it would be well to adhere to the same rule and not to cancel or amend the Order in Council, except in cases mentioned in the Act referred to (*38 Vic., Cap. 13.*)

Special Qualifications.

SIR,—I have been directed by the Hon. the Treasury Board to call your attention to the 5th sub-section of section 7 of 46 Victoria, chap. 7 (C.S. Act), wherein it is stated that "In the case of attorneys, barristers, engineers, architects, actuaries and land surveyors, the examination may be dispensed with on a report from the Deputy Head, concurred in by the Head of the Department, that it is not necessary;" and in connection therewith I have to call your attention to the *Hansard* of last Session, page 1035, when in reply to an observation from Mr. Ross, of Middlesex,

Sir Hector Langevin stated that these gentlemen are employed in the Service in the practice of their professions, and therefore an examination would not be required, as they had already passed technical examinations before their admission into the ranks of their professions.

I have now to ask whether, in case any of these professional gentlemen are employed in a Department where their professional attainments are not required, as, for instance, a barrister in the Finance Department, the spirit of the Act would allow of the examination being waived?

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 13th instant, in which you call attention to sub-section 5 of section 7 of 46 Victoria, chapter 7, wherein it is stated that, "In the case of attorneys, barristers, engineers, architects, actuaries and land surveyors, the examination may be dispensed with, on a report from the Deputy Head, concurred in by the Head of the Department, that it is not necessary."

An opinion is requested as to whether, in case any of these professional gentlemen are employed in a Department where their professional attainments are not required, as, for instance, a barrister in the Finance Department, the spirit of the Act will allow of the examination being dispensed with.

I am of opinion that the spirit of the Act does not allow of the examination being dispensed with in the case mentioned, but that the examination can be dispensed with only in cases where the duties to be performed by the officer seeking promotion are those connected with his profession as an attorney, barrister, engineer, architect, actuary or land surveyor.

Travelling Expenses.

Order in Council, Sept. 8, 1871.—The Committee of Council have had under consideration an extract from the minutes of a meeting of the Treasury Board held Sept. 7, recommending that the following rules be adopted for the payment of removal allowances to Government employees, and they respectfully advise that the recommendations therein submitted be approved and adopted:—

"*Removal Allowances.*—No removal allowance can be granted except on report of the Treasury Board. No removal allowance is to be granted if the salary is increased, except in special cases, and on a report of the Head of the Department. A removal allowance is not to exceed the actual cost on account rendered."

Order in Council, Nov. 29, 1882.—Ordered, that the Order in Council of May 6, 1876, governing travelling expenses, be modified, and that from July 1, 1882, with the exception of the Major General commanding the Militia, and the judges who are otherwise provided for, there be paid to all officers travelling on public service in the Dominion, except in those parts hereafter specified, over and above the actual moving expenses, a uniform rate of \$3.50 per diem—the days of leaving and arriving to be counted as full days—and to those officers who may be called upon to travel in British Columbia, Manitoba, the North-West Territories or out of Canada, the rate of \$5 per diem.

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Order in Council, June 28, 1886.—That from and after the 1st of July, 1886, the Order in Council of the 29th November, 1882, fixing the allowances of officers travelling in Manitoba and the North-West Territories be amended, by placing the *per diem* allowance at three dollars and fifty cents (\$3.50).

Order in Council, Nov. 10, 1886.—The Board having had their attention called by the Auditor-General to the subject of the payment of expenses incurred by officers in the employ of the Government while travelling on Government business, and also advances made to such officers on account of such expenses, after full consideration of the subject, recommend to Council as follows:—

1. The *per diem* allowance for maintenance shall not hereafter be paid to such officers for days spent on board steamers or steamships or other modes of conveyance, if the passage money includes meals and all other accommodation.

2. All advances made to such officers for travelling expenses shall be accounted for within one month from the conclusion of the trip, and the officer shall render to the Auditor-General a detailed statement of such travelling expenses.

Order in Council, Jan. 12, 1888.—That the Order in Council of Nov. 8, 1887, providing that the name of the Lieutenant-Governor of the North-West Territories be added to the list of officers excepted from the operation of the Order in Council of June 28, 1886, and that his traveling allowance be at the rate of \$5 *per diem*, take effect from and after the commencement of the current financial year. Such change is recommended to date from that period, inasmuch as the accounts for the year 1886-87 are now closed, and it is not deemed desirable to make the increase take effect from a prior date.

Order in Council, July 5, 1888.—On a memorandum dated June 27, 1888, from the Minister of Justice, recommending that the allowance *per diem* to be paid to the Registrar of the Exchequer Court, while travelling on the business of the court, be at the rate of \$4.50 *per diem*, the days of leaving Ottawa and arriving there on return to be counted as full days, and his allowance to be over and above his actual moving expenses. The Minister further recommends that the proposed allowances relate back to the time of the appointment of the present Registrar, and be paid to him in respect of journeys heretofore made by him in his official capacity. The Committee submit the above recommendations for Your Excellency's approval.

Insurance.

Order in Council, July 5, 1881.—The Committee of the Privy Council have had under consideration, upon the suggestion of the Acting Minister of the Interior, the general question of insurance against fire of Government property; and they are of opinion and humbly advise Your Excellency, that in view of the large amount, varied character and widely separated position of the property in the Dominion belonging to the Crown, it is a wise economy for the Government to underwrite its own risks, as well on movable as on immovable property, and they recommend that

all existing policies (if any such exist) be suffered to lapse and no new ones effected, and that a copy of this Order, should Your Excellency approve of it, be sent to every Department of the Government.

Order in Council, April 1, 1886.—That the rate to be paid for all copying done for the several Departments of the Government and in the preparation of returns for the Senate and House of Commons, be fixed at five cents (5c.) per folio of 100 words, to commence on the 1st April instant.

Appropriation Balances.

Order in Council, June 27, 1888.—The Treasury Board had under consideration a communication from the Auditor General respecting the interpretation of section 37 of the Audit Act, which provides for the extension of time for closing the Appropriation Accounts.

The Auditor General states that he understands the section to mean: “That an Appropriation Account can be kept open for any time fixed by Council, up to three months, for the purpose of charging against a vote all services or supplies for which the vote was taken, that is, those rendered before June 30.”

As the present practice of bringing down the balances of appropriations for three months, and thereby lengthening the financial year to fifteen months, has been productive of delay in the preparation of the accounts for Parliament, and with the view of definitely deciding what course should be followed, the matter was referred to the Department of Justice for opinion.

The Deputy Minister of Justice reports: “The question is, whether, upon an Order in Council having been passed as specified in the section, a Department may make additional expenditure and incur increased liabilities upon the strength of the original estimate; or whether the extension referred to in the section is only for the purpose of enabling a Department to pay after June 30 liabilities that have been incurred previously to that date. It would appear that the latter interpretation is the correct one. The section, without the proviso, categorically provides that any balance unexpended on June 30 shall lapse and be written off. The proviso does not either expressly or by implication give a Department power to make a new expenditure, and if that power is not contained in the proviso it is nowhere: it does not exist. The only meaning to be drawn from the proviso is that the extension is made for the purpose of paying after June 30, out of the original a appropriation, such accounts as had at that date been incurred.”

The Board, after careful consideration of the matter, recommend to Council that for the current fiscal year the present practice be retained, so that no inconvenience may be experienced by the Departments, the Auditor General having intimated that he is willing that for the present year such course be adopted; but as the law is clearly in accordance with the contention of the Auditor General, the Board are of opinion that under existing circumstances the practice now followed cannot be continued.

Memorandum respecting Contractors' Securities.—Some little time ago during the Session of Parliament a casual remark made by one of the Bank managers at Ottawa drew my attention to the subject of the securities given by public contractors to the Government. I had not time then to attend to the matter, but since then I have noticed in looking over the reports of proceedings in connection with the Central Bank that one of the cases before the Master refers to a deposit made with the Ontario Government as security in connection with the contracts for their new Parliament buildings. I find on enquiry that the departments who have contracts differ in their manner of treating these securities. Two only, the Departments of Public Works and Railways and Canals, send their certified cheques to the Finance Department immediately a contract is entered into with those Departments, but as regards the Department of Militia and Defence, the Mounted Police and the Indians, and the other Departments who have large contracts, we have never received from first to last, as far as I can find, any security deposited by their contractors. I see, on looking at the various advertisements calling for tenders for contracts, that the usual form is to require each tender to be accompanied with a certified cheque. I presume that in the case of the tenders that are not accepted the cheque is returned immediately or within a reasonable time. When a tender is accepted the two Departments, I have named send the certified cheques to the Finance Department, but I am informed that—notably in one Department—the cheques are locked up by the Deputy Minister in his vault and remain there until the contract is completed, when they are returned to the contractor. It seems to me that some uniform practice should be adopted. I understand that some banks in Canada mark their cheques as good for so many days, and if such a cheque were not presented for payment within the time named and it became necessary afterwards to call upon the bank for payment a question might be raised on account of its not having been presented within the time limited. Again, as in the case of the Ontario Government above referred to, if before the termination of the contract the bank should become insolvent, the Government might be held responsible to the contractor for any loss which might accrue in consequence of the suspension of the bank, and it has been suggested to me that in any case, whether the cheques are marked for a limited time or not, in the case of the suspension of the bank, it is possible that the liquidators or assignees might allege that the Government had committed laches in not presenting the cheque within a reasonable time and there might be difficulty in connection with their claim. I do not know how far this may be the case, but I am strongly of opinion that cheques received on account of accepted tenders should be at once sent to this

Department instead of being retained in the Department controlling the contract. They may be on banks which, from their returns or from other knowledge in the possession of this Department, appear to be in a shaky condition, and in such cases the money could be drawn out and placed in a solvent bank. Once the cheque is received here it should be presented for payment and I would strongly recommend that hereafter all proceeds of such cheques and all deposits on account of contractors' securities should be deposited in the Government Savings Bank until the contract is completed, when the amount due, with such interest as might have accrued under the rules governing a deposit in such bank, would be returned to the depositor. I may add that—do what we will to satisfy the public—unless something of the kind I have suggested be adopted, we shall be continually in hot water. For instance, Dr. Wilson, of Elgin, waited on me during the last fortnight the House was in Session with regard to a security deposited by Mr. Lindop, the contractor for the public buildings at St. Thomas. Mr. Lindop deposited a *certified cheque*, not a deposit receipt, on the Molsons Bank agency at St. Thomas. There was nothing on the face of the cheque to indicate that any special arrangement had been made between Mr. Lindop and the agency. We had not at that time any account with the Molsons Bank with regard to contractors' securities, but in order that there should be no charge to the contractor for the collection of the cheque, instead of depositing with the Bank of Montreal we deposited the cheque with the Merchants Bank, which also had an agency at St. Thomas, and collected the money through that bank, giving Mr. Lindop, at the conclusion of his contract, a cheque on the Merchants Bank. Mr. Lindop, who throughout the duration of the contract, some three years, never said a word as regards any arrangement with the Molsons Bank, although, as we find from a letter from the agent, he was perfectly well aware that the cheque had been immediately cashed, made through Dr. Wilson, a demand upon the Department for three years' interest, claiming that he had made that loss by our action. I told Dr. Wilson that the application could not for a moment be entertained, for two reasons.—1st. It was not a rule of the Government necessarily to deposit contractors' securities with the banks upon which they were drawn, and I mentioned to him the Central Bank as an instance; and, secondly, that there was nothing on the face of this cheque to show that any arrangement had been made with the bank. I mention this case to show the nature of claims that may be made under the present system, but no such claims could arise if the moneys were deposited in the Government Savings Bank. Then the cheques would be received, forwarded to the Finance Department, cashed and the proceeds placed at interest, and at the conclusion of the contract, as soon as the work was satisfactorily done and the security was to be returned, it would be returned with the interest that might have accrued upon it.

Small Balances Due to Estates.

AUDIT OFFICE, June 12, 1888.

SIR,—It frequently happens that there is a small sum due to the estate of a deceased person who has left no will, generally for superannuation or salary, when the whole assets of the estate are so small that the cost of obtaining letters of administration would be a large part of them.

I suppose that in strictness the amounts due by the Government cannot be legally paid to any one but the administrator of the estate. However, the amounts are frequently paid, either on receiving a renunciation from all the other known heirs in favor of one, or on a bond approved by the Department of Justice, indemnifying against loss should a person who has obtained the legal right to claim the payment make a demand for it.

I would suggest that payment, under the circumstances above set forth, should be made to a person who is not legally empowered to demand it, only when the assets of the estate are under one hundred dollars, and after the execution of a bond as above described, approved by the Department of Justice, with any additional safeguards which in the opinion of the Department of Justice the special circumstances of the case call for.

Letter-of-Credit Cheques.

Order in Council, June 27, 1888.—The Treasury Board had under consideration a communication from the Auditor-General with regard to the signing of letter-of-credit cheques, and submitting a list of the names of persons who sign such cheques for the different departments; and they recommend to Council:

(1.) That, for each department, substitutes be authorized by order in council to sign for those in whose favor the letter-of-credit is drawn, and that a copy of the order in council be sent to the Bank of Montreal or other bank on which the credit may be drawn.

(2.) That the departments be instructed not to permit any person to sign except those authorized by order in council.

(3.) That no cheques be signed in blank either in the inside or outside service.

(4.) That all cheques be drawn in the form: "Pay to the order of——," and not in either of the forms: "Pay to—— or bearer," or "Pay to—— or order."

(5.) That authority be given for the signing of letter-of-credit cheques in the different departments by the following substitutes: (List not printed).

Canadian Pacific Railway.

Order in Council, June 1, 1888.—On a report dated 29th May, 1888, from the Minister of Railways and Canals stating that by an agreement entered into between the Government and the Canadian Pacific Railway Company on the 18th day of April, 1888, subject to the approval of Parliament, the Government agreed, in effect, amongst other things, to guarantee the payment of interest up to the time of maturity on bonds of the Company to be thereafter issued to an amount not exceeding \$15,000,000 or its equivalent in sterling, the principal to be payable not later than 50 years from their date, and the interest thereon half yearly at 3½ per cent. per annum: such bonds to be secured by mortgage on the unsold lands of the Company estimated at about 14,934,238 acres, it being a condition of the said mortgage that the net proceeds of the sales of the said lands should from time to time be paid over to the Government, and the Company might at its option also pay over other moneys to the Government, the whole to constitute a fund to be set apart and held by the Government exclusively for the purpose of satisfying the principal of the said bonds.

And that as soon as the aggregate amount of the said fund in the hands of the Government should equal the principal of all bonds of the said issue then outstanding, then the Company might pay into the said fund also a sum sufficient to cover the interest, if any, up to that time, and thereupon the Government should assume and pay all interest which should thereafter become due on the said bonds, as well as the principal of the said bonds at maturity, the Government not being liable at any time to pay any part of the principal of the said bonds except in so far as the Company shall have provided it with a fund for that purpose.

And that the Minister of Interior for the time being, or such other Minister as the Government should nominate, be one of the trustees under the said mortgage, and that the appointment of any other trustee or trustees be subject to the approval of the Government. The said mortgage to be subject to the payment of such of the land grant bonds formerly issued by the Company as are now outstanding in the hands of the public, amounting to about \$3,463,000. The sums due or to become due to the Company for unpaid purchase moneys of lands heretofore sold amounting to about \$1,200,000 to be applied towards the payment of the said land grant bonds now outstanding according to the provisions of the mortgage securing the same.

The Minister of Railways and Canals further reports that the said agreement was duly confirmed by Parliament at its last session by an Act which authorized the Government to guarantee the payment of interest as aforesaid, and to enter into the said undertaking concerning the principal of the said bonds as above stated, which Act provided also that the word "bond" therein and in the said agreement included such form of undertaking as the Company with the approval of the Governor in Council should adopt, either in the shape of registered bond, bond transferable by delivery, debenture stock, inscribed stock or otherwise.

And the said company having, at a special general meeting of its shareholders duly called for that purpose, approved and adopted the said agreement as binding on the Company, and having authorized the issue of bonds and inscribed stock amounting together to the sum of \$15,056,006.67 to be dated on the 1st day of July, 1888, and the principal thereof to be payable on the 1st day of July, 1938, with interest in the meantime at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum, payable half yearly on the 1st days of January and July in each year, the form of which undertakings is more particularly specified in the draft of mortgage hereinafter referred to. And the said Company having resolved to avail itself of the guarantee of the Government for the payment of interest as aforesaid, and of the said undertaking of the Government concerning the principal in the event of the Company providing it with a fund for that purpose as above mentioned, and the Company having submitted for the approval of Your Excellency in Council, the accompanying form of mortgage as one proper to be executed for the purpose of securing the said issue of bonds and inscribed stock as aforesaid, and having submitted the names of the Honorable John Joseph Caldwell Abbot and Richard Bladworth Angus, Esquire, as two of the trustees under the said mortgage, and the Company having asked that the Government should name a Minister who should be third trustee under the said mortgage:

The Minister recommends that the appointment of the Honorable John Joseph Caldwell Abbott and Richard Bladworth Angus, as two of the trustees under the said mortgage, be approved of.

The Minister further recommends that the Honorable George Eulas Foster, Minister of Finance, be appointed as trustee under the said mortgage on behalf of the Government of Canada.

The Minister also recommends that the said issue of the Company to the extent of \$15,056,006.67 be approved of in the form of bonds and inscribed stock as specified in the draft mortgage hereinafter referred to.

The Minister submits a draft mortgage for the purpose of carrying into effect the said agreement, which draft mortgage has (subject to the approval of Your Excellency in Council) been revised and approved by the Minister of Justice, and he recommends that the said draft mortgage be adopted, and that the Government enter into the guarantee and undertaking referred to in the said agreement and in the said

Act, by the Minister of Railways and Canals executing on behalf of the Government the said mortgage.

The Committee concurring in the above submit the same for Your Excellency's approval.

St. Lawrence Ship Channel.

Order in Council, July 6, 1888.—On a memorandum dated 3rd July, 1888, from the Minister of Public Works, representing that the Act 51 Vic., Chapter 5, intituled: "An Act to make further provision respecting the construction of the ship channel between Montreal and Quebec," being permissive, and providing, amongst other things that the Montreal Harbor Commissioners may be released from certain obligations to the Government incurred by them; that the excess of their expenditure over their net revenue for the year 1887, amounting to \$37,405 be refunded to them; and that the amount remaining unexpended of any sums authorized by any Act to be advanced to the said Harbor Commissioners for completing the ship channel between Montreal and Quebec, may be expended through the Montreal Harbor Commissioners or otherwise.

The Minister recommends that authority be granted as follows, that is to say:—

1st. To release and discharge the Corporation of the Harbor Commissioners of Montreal from all liability to repay to the Government the whole or any part of the advances made to the said Corporation to enable them to widen and deepen the channel in Lake St. Peter in the River St. Lawrence from Montreal to Quebec, or any interest thereon beyond the amount of interest already paid by them to the Government, it being understood that no portion of the amount so paid for interest is to be refunded.

2nd. To confirm the authority granted by Order in Council of 21st June, 1888, to pay to the Montreal Harbor Commissioners the sum of \$37,405, being the amount expended by them during the year 1887 in excess of their net revenue.

3rd. To expend on the work of completing the ship channel between Montreal and Quebec the amount now remaining unexpended of the sums authorized by any Act heretofore passed to be advanced to the said Harbor Commissioners of Montreal for the purpose of completing the said channel. The expenditure to be made either through the Montreal Harbor Commissioners or the Minister of Public Works, or both as may seem to the Minister to be most in the public interest.

The Committee advise that the requisite authority be granted accordingly.

Revenue Accounts.

Rules and Regulations in reference to the Receipt, Entry and Accounting for Public Moneys.

- (1.) Receipt Books with printed consecutive numbers should be used.
- (2.) A receipt should be given for each payment.
- (3.) All receipts should be entered in a Cash Book, and each entry should bear the same number as the receipt.
- (4.) The counterfoil of the receipt should bear its number, the name of payor, the amount, a short memo. of the object for which payment was made, and should be signed by the collector, and when payment is made in person, by the payor.
- (5.) A deposit should be made to the credit of the Receiver General daily, if the receipts amount to \$25. If the daily receipts do not amount to \$25, a deposit should be made whenever that sum or more is on hand.
- (6.) As soon as possible after the close of each month, and not later than the 10th of the succeeding month, a copy of the Cash Book should be transmitted to this office, with the corresponding counterfoils of receipts granted, and also the blank when a receipt has been spoiled or cancelled.

SIR,—In connection with the coupons, warrants and bonds recently received from your Department, I beg to make the following observations:—

Inter-colonial Railway 5 per cent. Unguaranteed Loan.—No warrants for the interest on \$97,333 inscribed stock of this loan have yet been furnished.

New Brunswick Debentures.—I have again to call your attention to the fact that no vouchers have ever been furnished this office for interest on these debentures.

Coupons short for 1886-87.—Messrs. Glyn, Mills, Currie & Co. have not yet furnished coupons of the following dividends appertaining to the accounts of 1886-87:—May 1, 1887, 4 per cent. loans of 1874, 75, 76, 78-79; July 1, 1887, reduced 4's, and 1885, 4's.

Coupons for account of 1887-88.—The following are the coupons which have been received on account of the past fiscal year: From Messrs. Glyn, Mills, Currie & Co.: Rupert's Land loan, dividend due Oct. 1887. From Messrs. Baring Bros. & Co.: Coupons for all dividends to Dec. 31, 1887, with the exception of those for the New Brunswick debentures referred to above.

There is in almost every instance, as a matter of course, a certain number of coupons and warrants outstanding. I have previously asked that statements should be procured from the agents, showing in detail the amount of each, outstanding, made up to the date of sending the next batch of either. I have again to request that such statements should be sent to me. They are very necessary for the work of this office.

SIR,—I find it impossible to make any audit of the expenditure for telegrams, as the vouchers rendered to this office contain nothing but totals for each month.

On making requests for details by names, dates and amounts on previous occasions, it was objected by some Departments that it was not expedient to give such information for that portion of the account covering telegrams sent or received by the Minister himself. A similar objection has been recognized in the case of Ministers' travelling expenses, for which no details are required. (See my Report for 1879, page 45.)

To obviate this difficulty, the accounts might be divided between Ministerial and Departmental telegrams, as is already done by the Privy Council and Finance Departments. The Departmental telegrams might then be specified by names, dates and amounts, and the information audited would equal that required for other expenditure.

If you agree with these views, please inform the Departments that the figures should be separated from July 1 last.

If it is legal, how long should he have been out of employment?

I have considered the question submitted to me upon sec. 47 of the Civil Service Act, R. S. C., ch. 17.

I do not think it can be said to be illegal to re-employ a person who has already served as a temporary clerk, and who during the time of such service failed to pass a qualifying examination at which he presented himself, he having been out of the Government employment some time since that failure.

The object of the section would appear to be to give at all times to qualified candidates a preference in temporary employment. It would not I think be consistent with the Act to take back a person at once after failure to pass, to go on with the same work which he left in order to present himself for examination, for that would be to "continue" him "in such temporary employment"; but it is such continuance and not a subsequent re-engagement, which appears to be prohibited.

I cannot say definitely how long he must be out of the Government employ before being re-employed, but there must be an actual, not a colorable break, in his service. Having served, failed to pass, and left the service, he may at a future time, in the absence of qualified candidates, be again employed temporarily on an occasion of temporary pressure.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 17th inst. stating that the Warden of the Manitoba Penitentiary had been allowed for charges made by him for "light and fuel" for his quarters, amounting to \$450.12, and directing my attention to the provisions of the amendment to the Penitentiary Act passed in 1887. I beg to state that you are mistaken in supposing that these charges have been allowed to the Warden. The Warden has been charged with the value of the fuel and light, which he obtained, and payment may be required at any time. That, however, has not been yet insisted on because certain representations, which he has made on the subject, are to come up for consideration before the Privy Council, with a view to Parliamentary action. The Warden has made application to be relieved from these charges on the ground of exceptional circumstances connected with his residence; and because he claims that, in making up salaries, as fixed by the Act of 1887, a sufficient allowance, through inadvertence, was not made in place of perquisites heretofore enjoyed by him.

SIR,—I have the honor to bring to your notice voucher No. 235 or the Manitoba Penitentiary, in which there is a charge of \$37 for light for "Warden's Quarters," also the several vouchers of the same institution enumerated on the accompanying statement, in which are charges for furniture for "Officers' Quarters," amounting in all to \$215.05. In connection with these payments I beg to ask your attention to the following extract from my letter of 17th May, last:—

"By an amendment to the Penitentiary Act that portion of Sec. 27 which empowered the Governor in Council to make allowances of light and fuel to penitentiary officials has been eliminated; and under Sec. 8 of the said amendment it is expressly stated that free quarters, uniforms and the privilege, under certain conditions, to use convict labor, shall be the only perquisites that may be allowed to such officials."

Pending the action of Parliament I have transferred the amount \$487.12 to a special account headed "S. L. Bedson," and the amount \$215.05 charged to "Officers' Quarters" to an account headed "Officers' Quarters, Manitoba Penitentiary, Special Account."

Circular to Returning Officers.

AUDIT OFFICE, OTTAWA,....., 188 .

SIR,—The following suggestions are intended to help the speedy settlement of your account for holding the coming election in.....:—

1. The charges for mileage should be supported by a minutely detailed statement of actual travel, specifying the work done on each day, the names of persons travelling, the places passed through, and the distances from place to place. I send herewith a map on.....chains to the inch, showing all the roads in your county. You will please mark the route followed when posting proclamations, and return the map to me. The total of the detailed account will be paid, if it approximates to the measured length of the line. No statement of route will be of any use whatever unless it can be followed throughout on the map.

The practice is to make payments for posting notices and distributing boxes in one trip. If, from unusual and special circumstances, the returning officer is unable to have everything ready to send out at one time, full proof of the fact should accompany the charges for mileage.

2. Please see that a specimen of each form printed is sent with the printer's account. No item will be paid which is not supported by a sample of the work done. Enclosed is a list of the sums which will be allowed to the printer for necessary forms.

3. With this I send blank accounts for the deputies, containing full instructions as to the rendering of their bills. Claims for rent and constables will be recognized only when made in writing by the person to whom the money is due: please note this fact carefully. You should certify that each item charged is correct, and that the rent paid for the polling booth is a reasonable amount for the house used. Four dollars for rent is a limit, and not a fixed fee. Polls can generally be obtained for much less than that sum, and you are expected to make a reasonable effort for economy under this, as well as every other head.

4. I send you by mail a specimen of a portable screen, designed by a prominent member of Parliament, much experienced in elections. It is a piece of heavy grey cotton, 6 feet square, hemmed along the top, with a ring on each end of the hem, the whole to be hung across the corner of the room. The size can be varied to suit your own notion of efficiency. Screens of this kind can be made under your direction at a cost of less than 75 cents each, and sent to the deputies (where needed) inside of the ballot boxes. After the polling day, they can be returned to you in the

same manner. The voucher should be based on the quantity of material used for the number made. As the deputies are instructed to include only the actual cost of any screens erected by themselves, this item will disappear from their accounts entirely, and there will also be a second economy in the presence of the same screens at succeeding elections.

5. If, however, an election has lately been held in your county, these suggestions have been already offered and accepted; you will in that case find.....screens and.....ballot boxes in the possession of.....postmaster at..... These will be given to you on payment of a delivery fee of \$2 a year, counting from the time when the postmaster got them. You will please, therefore, pay him the sum of \$.....when taking the property over.

6. Any new ballot boxes obtained by you, together with the screens, should be securely packed up after the election, and left with a postmaster near the place of declaration. A storage allowance of \$2 a year will be made to him, payable when he gives them up. His receipt should be taken, and transmitted to this office, specifying the number of screens and boxes.

7. The accounts of your creditors must be forwarded in original, without alteration, except your deductions and certificate in the margin. Please support the whole account by a declaration under 37 Vic., chap. 37, that you have made a reasonable examination of the claims, and are to the same extent satisfied of their correctness; that each voucher accurately describes the service performed; and that you do not know of any item for which the Government is asked to pay more than others would under circumstances of similar urgency. As the Dominion officer having most knowledge of the locality, we rely upon you for protection against overcharge.

8. Any voters' list required for yourself or Deputy Returning Officers are to be obtained from the Revisor for the District, under Sec. 40 of Franchise Act.

9. Let me call your attention to the Dominion Election Act, sec. 126, sub-sec. 30, instructing returning officers to report through the Secretary of State the distribution made of money paid to them for election expenses. Since many of your claims on the Government are not completely established without receipts from your creditors, and you cannot be expected to advance the money, a subsequent verification is the only one possible. Your services will not be completed until the account is closed, and a part of your fee will therefore be withheld until this is done.

AUDIT OFFICE, OTTAWA, April 3, 1888.

DEAR SIR,—I have examined the vouchers for expenditure on account of the Experimental Farm for the eight months ended February 29, and ask your attention for the following remarks thereon :—

Travelling Expenses—When an advance is made for this service, the destination and probable time of absence should be stated. Accounts and vouchers for the expenditure under the advance should be rendered immediately on return to headquarters, and no second advance should be made until the preceding one is accounted for. The exact dates on which each item of expense was incurred should be stated; the points between which fares are charged should be given; single fares or return tickets should be so described; and all extra charges for Pullmans and porters should be kept separate from the items of regular transportation.

Cab-hire.—In every case the name of the person using the cab should be given, as well as the time occupied. All cab-hire for the Minister should be charged to Civil Government Contingencies. I would recommend the adoption of the ticket system, as practiced by some of the other Departments. Where the city cab-tariff applies to the service performed, a certificate should be given that the tariff figures have not been exceeded.

Telegraph Accounts.—These should always be given in detail, showing the persons by whom and to whom the several messages are sent.

Purchases of furniture and fuel have been made at different times direct from the dealers. These should in every case be procured from the Public Works Department. Books and stationery have also been paid for by you. These are required to be obtained from the Government Stationery Office.

A payment of \$1,000 was made to Messrs. Pinhey & Christie on account of legal services. A certificate from the Department of Justice should be attached to the voucher, to the effect that at least the amount paid was due.

In all accounts for services rendered, the nature of the service and the rate of pay should be specified.

Finally, I would direct your attention to Section 33 of the Audit Act, which provides that "No payment shall be authorized by the Auditor General in respect of work performed or materials supplied by any person in connection with any part of the public service of Canada unless, in addition to any other voucher or certificate which is required in that behalf, the officer, under whose special charge such part of the public service is, certifies that such work has been performed, or such materials supplied, as the case may be, and that the price charged is according to contract, or if not covered by contract is fair and just." Also to Section 42 of the same Act, which provides that "Deputy heads of the several Departments, or the officers, clerks or other persons charged with the expenditure of public moneys, shall respectively audit the details of the accounts of the several services in the first instance, and be responsible for the correctness of such audit." Under this section every account should bear a certificate that it has been examined in the Department and found correct.

SIR,—I beg leave to make the following remarks upon the vouchers of April last for "Experimental Farms," which I have just finished examining:

Voucher 9, John Fixter, travelling expenses to Toronto and return, \$33.08. Mr. Fixter went to Toronto March 14 and returned March 21, obtaining a single ticket each way. Return tickets are good for 30 days, and the cost in this case would be \$13 instead of \$15.60, making a difference of \$2.60.

Voucher 10, A. Smith, V. S., commission for purchase of 5 span of horses, \$100. Please furnish the calculations by which this sum was arrived at.

Voucher 12, Ottawa Gas Company, 2,400 cubic feet of gas at \$3=\$7 20. There is a discount of \$1 a 1,000 feet, provided payment is made by April 14. It was made April 12, so that in this case a discount of \$2.40 should have been granted.

Voucher 24, Thomas Roach, purchase of land for Maritime Provinces' farm, \$15,079.30. A voucher should be obtained showing every detail of situation and price.

Voucher 31, A. R. Dickey, land, \$1,200; interest, \$18. Why was it necessary to pay this interest? It would be well to give more details as to the price per acre and the situation.

CENTRAL EXPERIMENTAL FARM, OTTAWA, Oct. 4, 1888.

DEAR SIR,—In reply to the questions submitted by you to me with your letter of September 26, from the Auditor General, regarding some expenses incurred on account of the Experimental Farm, I beg to submit the following:—

Voucher 9, April, 1888.—John Fixter was sent to Toronto to purchase horses for the farm, and as he proposed to return in the freight car with the horses, he expected to return free, as he had done on a similar mission before. The Canadian Pacific Railway officials refused him this privilege, and although he returned in the car with the horses he was compelled to pay full fare. His object in taking the single ticket was with the view to lessening the expenses of the journey.

Voucher 10, A. Smith, V. S.—The \$100 paid to Dr. Smith for the purchase of five span of horses was in accordance with a special arrangement made with him by the Minister of Agriculture for that purpose, and included professional services in examining the horses and certifying to their soundness. This sum was equivalent to a commission of five per cent.

Voucher 12, Ottawa Gas Company.—The payment of the gas bill referred to without discount was an error of the accountant, which passed through my hands unnoticed. The Gas Company have promised to allow the discount of \$2.40 to be deducted out of the next bill.

Voucher 31, A. R. Dickey, \$1,218.—The land in this case was purchased for \$1,200 in December, 1887. The owners were ready to convey shortly after purchase but there were unavoidable delays before settlement could be made. After careful enquiry into the merits of the case, the Minister agreed to allow the three months interest. The quantity of land secured for this sum was one hundred acres, which now forms part of the Experimental Farm for the Maritime Provinces.

Voucher 24.—The Roach farm consisted of 202 acres, and was offered at the following figures:—

Subsequently Mr. Roach agreed to deduct \$500 from the price asked for the wooded upland, and on this basis the purchase was made, the price agreed on being \$14,930.

When settlement was made two months interest was allowed Mr. Roach, for reasons similar to those mentioned in the Dickey case, the interest being \$149.30, which added to the purchase money makes the amount referred to, \$15,079.30.

Quebec Agency—L. Stafford.

W. Tofield, Victoria Hotel, South Quebec.—Meals and beds for immigration staff, June 1, to November 14, 1887, \$92.80. These bills should be itemized, giving names, dates and amounts.

Albert Marquette, Quebec.—Meals for staff at night, May and June, 1887, \$8.35. Items should be given.

Dawson & Co.—Stationery, \$3.25. All stationery should be procured from the Government Stationery Office at Ottawa.

Montreal Agency—J. J. Daley.

Geo. Horne.—Stationery, \$19.70. This should have been ordered from the Stationery Office, Ottawa.

St. Henri Water Works, \$82.50.—Montreal Water Works, \$17.10. These bills should contain calculations of the amounts. Please obtain them.

Mrs. Dubuc.—Services at the Tanneries eight months, \$64. The nature of the services is not given.

Henry Earle.—Rent of office, 517 St. James Street, eight months at \$350 a year, \$253.36. It would be useful to know the assessment of this building, to check the charge for water rates.

Without more information, and with a knowledge of the geography of Montreal, it is difficult to account for these figures. From so large a number of the trips being made in the daytime it is probable that the starting point is the Immigration Office at 517 St. James Street. This is only half a block from the Bonaventure Station, to which 136 trips are charged. Some trips are to places which can be reached for 25 cents, and to which the cab stands are so near that a cab need not be kept waiting. Please ask Mr. Daley whether these items include anything but cab-hire, and get him to show that his charges agree with the Montreal cab tariff.

Ottawa Agency—W. J. Wills.

City Taxes on office.—19 $\frac{1}{2}$ mills on \$3,250, \$63.05. This was paid October 11, 1887. Why was it not paid before September 30 to save the discount of 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.?

Kingston Agency—R. Macpherson

A. F. Macpherson.—Six months services to Dec. 28, 1887, \$90.—The nature of the services should be described.

H. F. Saunders, M. D.—Medical attendance, \$9.50.—There is an item of \$2 for attendance on Mr. Macpherson which he has overlooked, unless it is for some other person of the same name.

Toronto Agency—J. A. Donaldson.

J. H. Lowe, M. D.—Medical attendance, \$73.—Itemized bills are needed, instead of bills in gross.

Street car tickets—Seven months at \$5, \$35.—It would be preferable to charge in each month the amount actually used. Monthly round sums have the aspect of an allowance.

J. Coope, 214 days, \$214.—The nature of the services should be described.

Water Rates, two quarters at \$7.50 gross, \$15.—For the quarter ending Sept. 30, 1887, the discount period closed July 31, and the bill was paid August 12. For the quarter ending Dec. 31, 1887, the discount period closed Oct. 31, and the bill was paid Nov. 19. Both accounts should have been paid in time to secure the discount of 50 per cent.

J. A. Donaldson, August travelling, \$107 85. This voucher is missing.

P. Burns, Fuel, Dec., \$25 75. An itemized account is needed.

Postage, Telegrams and Cab-hire, Five months to July 31, \$71.70. I shall need details of this sum similar to those given in subsequent months.

Trip to Toronto—June, 1887, \$4.90. This covers a ticket from Hamilton to Toronto, \$1.20, and a ticket from Toronto to Hamilton, \$1.20. Return tickets should be bought whenever the probable time of absence will allow.

London Agency—A. G. Smyth.

Travel and Incidentals—May and June, 1887, \$61.05. Details of this are needed.

Halifax Agency—E. M. Clay.

Cleaning Office, five months, \$37.50; interpreter for summer, \$15; office boy, five weeks, \$15. To whom were these sums paid?

Winnipeg Agency—W. C. B. Grahame.

Alex. Taylor—Stationery, \$15.58. This should have been procured from the Government Stationery Office at Ottawa.

Scott & Leslie—Walnut desk, \$50. The Public Works Department is charged with the duty of providing furniture for Government offices.

Jas. Hope & Co., Ottawa:—Postage stamps, \$36. Please explain why these were bought in Ottawa, instead of by the agent himself in Winnipeg.

Brandon Agency—Thos. Bennett

Several Items are not supported by receipts where it would have been quite practicable to take them.

Pullman twice each way between Brandon and Winnipeg, \$4. The special authority of the Government should be obtained for the use of Pullmans in the daytime.

For trips between Emerson and Gretna, items of \$5 a day for horse hire are entered, without vouchers in support. These should be furnished in every case.

Moose Jaw Agency—R. L. Alexander.

Office Rent is charged at \$5 a month, without a voucher from the owner of the building.

Medicine Hat Agency—M. Sutherland.

A voucher from Tweed & Ewart for hardware, \$50.95, gives no details. Also a voucher for \$19, repairing doors and cleaning shed, does not mention the name of the person performing the service, and is not receipted.

I notice that 50 copies of the "Scandinavian Canadian" are charged for four months, making \$10. I call your attention to this, as no similar item occurs in the other agents' accounts.

Two copies of the Winnipeg "Call" were also furnished for six months. Please let me know to whom these newspapers were supplied.

Contingent Accounts Generally.

Have these Contingent Accounts of agents been examined in your Department with reference to the necessity of the expenditure? Do the agents apply for your permission before incurring any unusual item of expense?

The person in your office who examines these accounts should certify that the examination has taken place, that the prices charged were fair and just, and that the account is otherwise regular.

AGRICULTURE DEPT., OTTAWA, Oct. 29, 1888.

SIR,—As requested in your letter of the 16th of April last, I send to you herewith statements in detail, containing the explanations furnished by the several immigration agents on the points requested by you *seriatim*, and in order of your questions, in relation to the contingencies of immigration offices for the eight months from the 1st of July, 1887, to the 29th of February, 1888.

Quebec Agency.

Mr. Stafford reports as follows:—

William Tofield, Victoria Hotel, South Quebec. Meals and beds for immigration staff, June 1, to November 14, 1887, \$92.80.

Detailed accounts are appended as follows: June, \$22.80; July, \$21.20; August, \$19.60; September, \$13.60; October, \$12.40. Up to 14th of November, \$3.20. Total, \$92.80.

Albert Marquette, Quebec. Meals for staff at night, May and June, 1887, \$8.35. This forms part of account rendered June 1, 1887, for \$23.85.

Dawson & Co., stationery, \$3.25. Account shows articles were procured previous to receipt of circular, April 4, 1887,

Montreal Agency.

Mr. Daley, the agent, reports as follows:—

Stationery. "All stationery received from Mr. Horne was so received prior to receipt of official letter of April, 1887, ordering all stationery after date to be obtained from the Stationery Department, Ottawa."

Water rates. "The water rates for Immigration shed, Tanneries, have been paid semi-annually, as per accounts rendered, and accounts forwarded to the Department. These have been sent to the Audit Office."

Mrs. Dubuc. "The nature of Mrs. Dubuc's services was as caretaker, or guardian, of Immigration shed at Tanneries."

Henry Earle. "The city water rate is paid annually to Corporation of Montreal, and is based on rental of office, which is \$400 per annum, an increase of \$50 from previous year."

Cab service in Montreal. Mr. Daley, the Agent, reports,—

"The 379 trips include from 1 to 3 trips, day and night service, for various members of the staff, between the points of Tanneries and St. Martin's Junction. Steamship passengers generally arrive at night after office hours, which necessitates one or more of the staff going by cab from his residence to Bonaventure station, for detailed information as to the number, and thence to Tanneries, where the meals were furnished. No cab is ever taken from the office to Bonaventure Dépôt alone, unless we have to go on elsewhere."

"*St. Martin's Junction, cab charges, \$2.75,* include meals and bed for man while waiting, perhaps, the whole night. Distance 13 miles.

"*Trips to C. P. Ry.* offices and station are for information respecting lost baggage, or exchange of tickets, and the cost of the cab depends on the time occupied. Looking for baggage may necessitate retaining a cab over one hour, when going from office to baggage room or wharf, when only a few minutes was anticipated.

"*G. T. Ry. Office.* The same remarks apply as to C. P. R.

Port, 16 trips. These cover visiting steamship offices for information, and thence to wharf where the vessel lies, or for conveying from steamship, after information gained at steamship office, female immigrants to the Ladies' Home.

"The sundry trips are continuous work made on special investigations by order of Department, such as Belgian enquiry, or pauper importation, to refute newspaper statements of various kinds damaging to immigrants.

"As regards Montreal cab tariff, the rate has been by the hour, and the tariff in no case exceeded. The rates during night are special."

Ottawa Agency.

Mr. W. J. Wills, the agent, reports as follows:—

"*City Taxes.* In 1887 and previous years there were quarterly statements sent to the Department. Monthly accounts were not then as now sent to the Department.

Kingston Agency.

Mr. R. Macpherson, the agent, reports as follows,—

"*A. F. Macpherson* was engaged under authority of the Department by letter dated June 27, 1887. The nature of the services were similar to those of Allan Chamberlain, employed in 1886, and of Thomas B. Ross, now in this office, viz., assisting me in the various duties pertaining to office and immigration work, placing

immigrants, attending to correspondence, and keeping register of immigrants, and more particularly during my absence inspecting children, and attending to other necessary duties. The office work could not have been efficiently carried out without such assistance, and was therefore necessary.

"As to the item of \$2 in Dr. Saunders' account, I may state that it was not overlooked by me. The explanation is that, when driving through the country visiting pauper children, I contracted an illness, causing me much suffering, occasioned through exposure, driving late at night over rough roads and in bad weather, and was obliged to return home, seek medical assistance, and remain quiet at home for a time. It is but simple justice that the Department should pay the doctor's charges under the circumstances."

Toronto Agency.

Mr. Donaldson, the agent, reports as follows:—

Medical attendance.—Details appended hereunto (marked A).

Street car tickets.—Mr. Donaldson, the agent, reports as follows:—That he will attribute to each month its charge for the future, instead of grouping an amount of \$5 for seven months' service, as in the accounts rendered.

Services in the station, J. Coope.—The nature of the services for which Mr. Coope is paid \$1 per day is to assist in the handling of the baggage of immigrants arriving, and to assist in the night when immigrants arrive, the arrivals being nine days out of ten at night.

Water rates.—To give the reason why the Department does not obtain the discount of 5 per cent., Mr. Donaldson furnishes the reply of the Secretary of the Water Works Committee for answer, viz:—

"I am instructed by the Committee on Works to notify you, in reply to communication from the Deputy Minister of Agriculture, that the Dominion Government is treated exactly the same as the Ontario Government with respect to water rates, in accordance with Section 5 of By-law No. 836, a copy of which is herewith enclosed."

Extract from By-Law No. 886, of the Municipal Corporation of the City of Toronto, entitled: "A By-Law respecting the management of the Toronto Water Works."

V. "All such rates paid within the first month of the quarter for which they are due shall be subject to a reduction of 50 per cent., save and except in the case of Government institutions which are exempt from city taxes, in which cases the provisions as to discount shall not apply."

Travelling, \$107.85.—This account was sent to Audit Office. Copy herewith (marked B).

P. Burns:—Fuel, \$25.75. Account already sent to Audit Office. (Copy annexed, marked, C.)

Hamilton Agency.

Mr. Smith, the Agent, reports as follows:—

Postage, telegrams and cab hire—\$71.70. This amount appears to be an error, as no such figures appear in the statement of July expenditure forwarded by Mr. Smith, which, together with details, was sent to Audit Office in usual form.

With respect to trip to Toronto, Mr. Smith reports:—

"In reference to the \$4.90 expenses to Toronto, June 8, 1887, when I left here it was uncertain whether I should have to proceed to Milton from Toronto *via* the Credit Valley Railway, but not requiring to do so, I returned by the Grand Trunk Railway to Hamilton."

London Agency.

A. G. Smyth, agent. The details requested are enclosed, amounting to \$61.05.

Halifax Agency.

Cleaning office—Five months, \$37.50. Mr. Clay, the agent, reports that in examining his accounts he cannot find any five months where he paid that sum for

cleaning office, his expenses from July, 1887, being for that service \$6 per month. He states that these amounts are paid out by him in sums of fifty or seventy five cents according to the work done, sometimes by one charwoman, sometimes by another. He did not take vouchers for these small amounts, individually, as he considered his own statement would be sufficient.

Interpreter for summer, \$15. Mr. Ernest Hanson's voucher for same appended herewith (marked D).

*Office boy :—*Five weeks, \$15. John F. Connors was employed by Mr. Clay as office boy at \$3 per week; voucher appended herewith. His services have now ceased.

Winnipeg Agency.

Mr. W. C. B. Grahame, agent, furnishes the following details requested:—

Stationery, \$15.58.—This was for goods procured before receiving instructions that all stationery should be ordered from Ottawa, and that in all cases, except absolute necessity, his supplies are obtained from the Department of Public Printing and Stationery.

Walnut desk, \$50.—This desk was authorized after the destruction by fire of the furniture in the immigration building, on the ground that it was necessary to be immediately procured.

Postage Stamps, \$36.—These were purchased in Ottawa for transmission to Winnipeg, by order of the Minister of Agriculture, being intended principally for distribution of Scandinavian colonization printed matter.

Brandon Agency.

Mr. Bennett, the agent, reports that the regular Pullman fare between Brandon and Winnipeg is \$1, and that no instructions had been given him not to use Pullmans.

The last Auditor's Report contains correspondence with the Treasury Board respecting the use of Pullmans, but I have not learned that any rule has been made.

Emerson Agency.

Mr. Têtu, the agent, reports that the charge for horse hire between Emerson and Gretna is \$7 per day, but that, as he has continual occasion to make that trip, he has arranged with Mr. Ritter, the only livery keeper in Emerson, for \$5. He will, in future, furnish vouchers for each trip.

Moose Jaw Agency.

Vouchers for office rent, \$5 per month, appended, marked (F.)

Medicine Hat Agency.

Hardware, \$50.95.—Copy of account furnished herewith (G.)

Repairing doors, \$19.—Copy of receipted account enclosed (H.)

With respect to the fifty copies of the *Scandinavian Canadian*, Mr. Sutherland reports:—

In regard to the fifty copies of the *Scandinavian Canadian*, such was for distribution among the Scandinavian immigrants in this district, for promoting Scandinavian immigration. It contained reports of progress by settlers.

With reference to the two copies of the *Winnipeg Call*, Mr. Sutherland reports:—

One copy is kept on file for reference in my office, and the other is for distribution and kept in the office to be sent to inquirers.

Contingent Accounts Generally.

Every account is examined in Department and submitted to the Minister for his approval before payment is made.

Agents are strictly forbidden to incur any unusual expense without authority of Minister.

DEAR SIR,—In answer to your letter of Oct. 29, I beg to offer further remarks on Immigration Contingencies, as follows:—

MONTREAL AGENCY.

Water Rates.—I need calculations of the amounts, as they are not given on the vouchers received at the Audit Office.

Cab hire at Montreal.—It will be noticed that Mr. Daley has not understood my request. What I need is, calculations of the charges by time and rate per hour, and an explicit declaration that the items cover nothing but cab hire.

OTTAWA AGENCY.

City Taxes on Office.—In answer to this question Mr. Wills says: "In 1887 and previous years there were quarterly statements sent to the Department; monthly accounts were not then as now sent to the Department." My question was "This was paid Oct. 11, 1887, why was it not paid before September 30 to save the discount of 2½ per cent.?"

KINGSTON AGENCY.

Mr. Macpherson should refund the \$2 charged by him for medical attendance on himself after exposure on official business.

TORONTO AGENCY.

J. H. Lowe, M.D.—Medical attendance. The details appended to your letter show 35 visits at \$2, and medicine. It would be well in itemizing these bills to give the dates of the visits as well as the reasons for the same.

HAMILTON AGENCY.

Postage, Telegrams and Cab-hire—Five months to July 31, \$71.70. The entries for this expenditure are as follows:—March 31, 1887, \$13.27; April 30, 1887, \$18.26; May 31, 1887, \$14.67; June 30, 1887, \$12.67; July 21, 1887, \$12.83. Total, \$71.70. The agent will probably now be able to furnish me with the details asked for.

HALIFAX AGENCY.

Cleaning Office—\$37.50. This was paid at \$1.50 per week from June 4 to end of November.

ACCOUNTS GENERALLY.

The person in your office who checks the accounts should place his initials upon the vouchers, to show that such accounts have been examined as to the correctness of the calculations, and the necessity for the service.

GENERAL IMMIGRATION.

1. *Captain William Clark*—Allowance 152 days, \$760; advance for expenses \$389.33. The nature of Captain Clark's services should be described, and he should account for the advance of \$389.33.

2. *G. Vekeman*—\$500 for printing and distributing his Flemish pamphlets. The voucher should show the number of pamphlets furnished, and should contain a specimen copy.

3. *John Dyke*—Expenditure for exhibitions, \$1,203; including picture of the Queen for Liverpool Exhibition, \$20 44; and frame for picture of the Queen, \$86.38. Under the same head are purchases of lumber, cloth and other materials for fitting up the Canadian portions of exhibitions. Please explain what became of these after the exhibition was over.

4. *Wm. Clark*—To pay A. E. Langton's salary as attendant, 9 weeks, \$65.70. Why was the salary paid in this manner instead of to A. E. Langton himself as by sub-voucher No. 7?

5. *Gas*—\$50.25. The calculation should be given.

6. *E. Agostini*—Expenses and services re distribution of his report, \$685.41. An itemized account is needed.

7. *Dr. Otto Hahn*—Salary 3 months to Sept. 30, \$200. Please describe the nature of his services.

CONTINGENCIES OF IMMIGRATION AGENTS.

8. *Postage*—Liverpool, Glasgow, Bristol, Dublin and Belfast, \$668.10. How was this account audited?

9. *Telegrams*—Liverpool, \$20.50; Glasgow, \$11.19. Statements should accompany the vouchers showing the cost of each telegram and the person to whom it was sent.

10. *Newspapers, Journals and Magazines*—Liverpool, \$34.47; Glasgow, \$23.00; Dublin, \$18.29. Please give details.

11. *Liverpool*—Clerk, 22 weeks, at \$7.30, \$160.60; paid from allowance of \$4.00 a day. The name of this clerk should be given, with receipt from him.

12. *Liverpool*—Salaries for 5 months, G. H. Mitchell, \$121.67; R. Paulson, \$160.60; W. A. Edwards, \$53.53; E. T. Forrest, \$28.78. The nature of the services should be described in each case.

13. *Liverpool*—Rev. J. Bridger, paid out for clerk's assistance, 5 months, \$36.50. There should be a receipt from the clerk.

14. *Liverpool*—Deutsche "Welt Post," advertising, \$35.95. The calculations should be given.

15. *Liverpool*—John Dyke, fare to and from London and expenses, to meet the High Commissioner, \$23.85. The fare and living should be separated, and items given of each.

16. *Dublin*—Allowance for 153 days, \$206. No details are given, as they are by the other agents.

17. *Allowances*.—Please let me have copies of any departmental regulations or instructions, describing the nature of the expenditure which these per diem allowances to agents were intended to cover.

ARCHIVES.

18. *J. Marmette*.—On account of travelling expenses, \$599.89. There are no accounts given of the expenditure. They are necessary.

REPLIES OF HIGH COMMISSIONER TO QUESTIONS RAISED BY AUDITOR GENERAL.

1. *Captain Wm. Clark*—\$760 and \$389.33. Captain Clark was appointed by the Minister of Agriculture to take charge of the Canadian sections of the exhibitions at Liverpool and Saltair in 1887, and an inclusive allowance of \$5 per day was made to him. The \$389.33 was part of a larger advance, amounting altogether to \$656.71. Captain Clark subsequently rendered details of this expenditure, and his statement was duly transmitted to the Minister of Agriculture.

2. *G. Vekeman*—\$500 for printing and distributing his Flemish pamphlet. This expenditure was authorized by the Minister of Agriculture in his telegram of July 6, 1887. 2,000 copies were printed and distributed, and 6 specimen copies were forwarded to the Minister of Agriculture, September 1, 1887.

3. *John Dyke*—Expenditure for exhibition, \$1,203; covering picture of the Queen for Liverpool Exhibition, \$20.44; and frame for picture of Queen, \$86.38. The picture-frame, coverings, lumber and other material mentioned were, at the close of the Liverpool Exhibition, sent to London and were subsequently forwarded to Glasgow. They are now using in connection with the Canadian display in the exhibition in that town.

4. *Wm. Clark*—To pay A. E. Langton's salary as attendant, \$67.50. Langton's receipts are enclosed herewith. The other receipts were merely *ad interim* receipts given by Captain Clark to Mr. Dyke, and, by some misunderstanding at Liverpool, Langton's receipts for the particular items were not transmitted at the proper time.

5. *Gas*—\$50.5. This is presumed to be a mistake, and that the item refers to \$86.10. This was principally for gas used in connection with the illumination of the Government offices on the occasion of the Queen's jubilee. No actual measurement of the gas used was taken, and the charge was based, in accordance with the rule followed by the gas company, upon the number of burners and the number of evenings the gas was used. The account includes also the ordinary gas used at the office during the quarter ended June 30, 1887.

6. *E. Agostini*—distributing his report, \$695.41. Settlement of this account was authorized by the Minister of Agriculture, September 22, on the following basis:—10,000 pamphlets, \$484.73; transport, \$200.68.

7. *Dr. Otto Hahn*, \$200—Dr. Hahn was appointed by the Minister of Agriculture some years ago, to aid in promoting emigration from the Continent to Canada, both

by his writings and by the distribution of information in the ordinary way. Dr. Hahn has now given up his agency, and is, it is believed, in Canada.

8. *Agents' postage*, \$668 10—The amounts paid for postage by the agents are kept in stamp books, and the accounts are checked and certified by the respective agents.

9 and 10. *Agents telegrams and newspapers*—No details appear to have been retained by the agents, of the expenditure made for telegrams and newspapers last year. Instructions have, however, now been given for the necessary particulars to be supplied with the monthly accounts in future.

11. *Clerk at Liverpool, 22 weeks*—The clerk referred to is Mr. Mitchell, and his receipts are attached.

12. *Mr. Mitchell* is bookkeeper and general corresponding clerk, Mr. Paulson is foreign corresponding clerk, Mr. W. A. Edwards is a junior clerk, and E. F. Forest is the office boy.

13. *Mr. Bridger, clerk, \$36.50*—The Rev. J. Bridger pays this money under an old arrangement. He does not take any receipt from the clerk, but his own receipts for the money are handed in.

14. *Liverpool "Post," advertising, \$35.95*—This was the contract price for 13 weekly insertions.

15. *John Dyke, trip to London, \$23.85*—The railway fares amount to \$14.12, but the other particulars asked for are not now obtainable. They will be given in future.

16. *Dublin, allowance for 153 days, \$306*—This is to cover office rent and such charges, for which the other agents are allowed in addition to their *per diem* allowance.

17. *Per diem allowances to agents*—These allowances were in force prior to the establishment of the office of the High Commissioner, and there is no record on the subject. It is suggested that the details will be found in the Department of Agriculture.

18. *J. Marmette, travel, \$599.89*—This sum was advanced to Mr. Marmette to cover the cost of removing himself and family from Paris to Ottawa. It was understood that he would present the details on his return to Ottawa. He is now engaged in the Archives Department.

DETAILS OF EXPENDITURE.

 AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT, OTTAWA, Oct. 25, 1888.

SIR,—In reference to that portion of your letter of May 25 last, in which you ask for an explanation of voucher 6, connected with the Colonial and Indian Exhibition, having relation to a payment to Messrs Owen McGarvey & Son, of Montreal, for an allowance of \$500 for damage to their exhibits, I have to report the following facts:—

Messrs. Owen McGarvey & Son sent an exhibit of furniture to the Colonial and Indian Exhibition, and they alleged that owing to improper packing, for which the officials of this Department connected with the Exhibition were responsible, the goods were damaged during transport on their return to Canada. The matter was the subject of long correspondence, but the material facts are:

Mr. S. C. Stevenson, of Montreal, who was an agent of the Department at the Exhibition, was instructed to examine and report on the damage done. A copy of his report is hereunto annexed.

The matter was then referred to the Department of Justice for opinion as to liability of this Department, with the result that that Department reported this Department was liable, and recommended that a compromise be made.

Messrs. Owen McGarvey & Son claimed \$705, but finally agreed to accept \$500 as settlement in full.

DEAR SIR,—In compliance with your request, I have the honor to submit the following report concerning the exhibit sent by Messrs. Owen McGarvey & Son, of this city, to the Colonial and Indian Exhibition.

A very fine display of rich furniture was exhibited by this firm; it was placed in a most prominent position in the Canadian Court and was much admired.

The goods were shipped back to Canada with other exhibits in the early part of this year. A portion of the goods arrived in fair condition, considering the length of time they had been on view. Some of the articles were most seriously damaged, however, and as I was called on by Mr. McGarvey, sen., to inspect these on their arrival, I speak knowingly on the subject.

The damaged articles which I particularly noticed were as follows, viz.:—

Ebony secretary.—This was broken badly and some portions were missing.

Ebony centre-table.—This was completely crushed, as if some heavy weight had been allowed to fall on it; it was rendered useless.

Horn sofa.—The tops of the horns were broken and the covering damaged by water.

Bedroom suite.—This was richly carved, and I noticed that some pieces of the suite had been smashed and much of the carvings destroyed or scratched and broken in places. The rich drapery with which the bedstead was ornamented had been lying in water and was discolored and useless.

Mr. McGarvey also reported to me that one of the horn chairs which he had sent to the exhibition had not been returned.

The damage to those portions of this exhibit which were badly injured is mainly due, in my opinion, to negligent and improper packing, and to gross carelessness in handling.

AUDIT OFFICE, OTTAWA, 6th April, 1883.

SIR,— I beg to draw your attention to the following remarks in connection with your Militia Expenditure for the fiscal year 1887-88:—

Salaries of Military Branch and District Staff.

I notice that the allowances of \$1 a day paid to Lt.-Cols. Holmes, Maunsell and Otter for acting as Deputy Adjutants General of their respective districts, are charged against the corps which they command, viz.: "C" Battery of Artillery, and "A" and "C" Companies, School of Infantry. Should these allowances not be charged against the vote for "District Staff"—as are the salaries of the Deputy Adjutants General in other Districts?

"B" Battery, Quebec.

An advance of \$50 was made November 4 by Paymaster Forrest to Dr. N. F. Dionne, as acting Surgeon of "C" Battery. Up to date we have not received any vouchers at this office to show that Dr. Dionne has accounted for the advance. Mr. J. A. Duncan has performed the duties of Surgeon of "C" Battery since November 9, as by Battery pay-lists. Please obtain from Dr. Dionne an account of his disposition of the advance of \$50.

In October \$333.11 was paid to G. Broomer for carting 740 cords of wood out of the Citadel. I would like to have further particulars concerning this payment.

"A" Battery, Kingston.

In October a payment of \$75 was made to Mr. G. Creeggan for 100 caps for "C" Battery. This is, I think, a proper charge against "C" Battery. You might make application for an entry charging "C" and crediting "A" Battery with this amount.

Cavalry School, Quebec.

A payment of \$2,500 was made in October to Mr. Joseph Bigaonette for purchase of horses. Please obtain an account of the expenditure of this sum.

Mounted Infantry School, Winnipeg.

In several cases payments were made in July for supplies furnished in May and June. In August the same persons were paid for supplies furnished in March and April. I beg to point out the irregularity of this practice, and the difficulty of keeping proper track of the accounts. I would suggest that the different paymasters

be instructed to see that persons having claims against the Government render their accounts at the end of each month, more especially in connection with supplies for the Permanent Corps.

"C" Company, R. S. I., Toronto.

In August a payment of \$1,794.03 was made to the City of Toronto for water supplied to the Infantry School from April 1, 1886, to June 30, 1887. From examination of the vouchers it appears that accounts are generally rendered quarterly, and that a discount of 50 per cent. is allowed for payments before a certain date. Why were these accounts not paid quarterly, so that the Government might obtain the benefit of the discount?

General.

In connection with the pay-lists of the Permanent Corps, I notice that in one or two cases (M. I. School and "A" School of Infantry) the paymaster does not sign the abstract on the back of the pay-list. This omission should be corrected in future.

In several cases, vouchers for supplies furnished to the Permanent Corps, although certified by the Paymaster or Deputy Adjutant General, have not been certified by an officer of the Corps.

I notice that the certificate as regards the quality of supplies furnished or work performed,—“that the prices are fair and just, and that no item of the account has been previously certified,”—although on a good many of the vouchers—is not on each voucher, as required by the Audit Act.

Several receipts on the contract forms in payment of supplies are not dated. (See "A" Battery.) Please have this done in future.

In some cases the payments for transport are included in the pay lists, and in others are charged in the paymaster's account current. It would be well to have them all charged into the accounts current, as the pay and transport items are kept separate in this office.

Salaries, District Staff.—The allowances paid to Lieut. Colonels Otter, Holmes and Maunsell as Deputy Adjutants General were formerly charged to Militia contingencies, there being no provision made for this expenditure under the vote for salaries. It was subsequently charged to "Schools" and "Batteries" as more readily traceable, and at once showing the total pay of those officers.

"B" Battery.—Details of expenditure of \$50, advanced to Dr. Dionne have been asked for, and will be forwarded as soon as at hand.

The payment of \$333.11 to G. Broomer for the carting of wood included the repiling as well, the distance carted nearly 300 yards. The wood removed to guard against the danger of fire.

"A" Battery.—The payment of \$75 to G. Creeggan for caps, for the use of "C" Battery and charged in "A" Battery account can be transferred to "C" Battery if so desired. The total expenditure for "A," "B" and "C" Batteries is charged to the same vote.

Cavalry School.—Details of expenditure on account of payment of \$2,500 to J. Bigaouette, for the purchase of horses, have been asked for. Will be sent over as soon as received.

Infantry School, "C" Company, Toronto.—Payment for water for Infantry School, \$1,794.03. The discount on this amount was refused on the ground that the Government "does not pay proportion of general taxes to the city."

In regard to general references and suggestions, instructions will be given to have them carried out as far as possible.

DEAR SIR,—I beg to draw your attention to the following remarks with reference to your reply to my letter of the 9th of April.

Salaries of District Staff.—With reference to the payments of \$1 per diem to Lieut. Cols. Maunsell, Holmes and Otter, for performing the duties of Deputy Adjutant General being charged to the corps which they command, it would be better for this year to charge them against one vote, say Contingencies. In the future they should be estimated for under the vote to which they properly belong, viz., salaries of District Staff, the same as the payments to the other Deputy Adjutants General.

I notice that the paragraph in the "Regulations" giving over the duties of Deputy Adjutant General of Military District No. 2 to Lieut. Col. Otter, does not make any reference to extra pay. It is necessary that an Order in Council should be passed granting him the \$1 per diem allowance, as was done in the cases of Lieut. Cols. Maunsell and Holmes.

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Lachine Canal Award.

To all to whom these presents shall come: I, JOHN PAGE, of the city of Ottawa, in the County of Carleton and Province of Ontario, the Chief Engineer of Canals of the Dominion of Canada; send greeting:

Whereas by an Instrument in writing under the hand of the Hon. John Henry Pope, the Minister of Railways and Canals for the Dominion of Canada, acting on behalf of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, as such Minister, and under the seal of the Department of Railways and Canals, bearing date the 2nd day of June, 1887, after reciting:—"Whereas John Lyons, John Heney and Patrick Lyons, all of the city of Ottawa, in the Province of Ontario, carrying on together the business of contractors as partners under the name, style and firm of John Lyons & Co., had entered into a contract with Her Majesty Queen Victoria, represented by the Hon. Alexander Mackenzie, then Minister of Public Works of the Dominion of Canada, on the 29th day of January, 1876, for all the works connected with the enlargement of the Lachine Canal, embraced in section No. 9 at Lachine, in the Province of Quebec, such contract to be fulfilled by the 25th day of April, 1878." And after reciting that "Whereas the said John Heney, by an Indenture bearing date the 18th day of March, 1887, did acknowledge to have, in or about the year 1876, sold all his interests and rights in the said contract and works to the said John Lyons and Patrick Lyons, and did assign the same to them by the said Indenture." And after reciting that "Whereas the said John Lyons and Patrick Lyons, under the name of John Lyons & Co., had, on the 21st day of February, 1887, preferred certain claims in connection with their said above mentioned contract, and by their letter of the 10th day of February, 1887, had requested that these claims be submitted to Mr. John Page, Chief Engineer of Canals, as sole arbitrator, and had expressed their willingness to abide by his decision whatever it may be." And further after reciting that "Whereas an order of His Excellency the Governor General in Council, bearing date the 2nd day of March, 1887, authorized the reference of the aforesaid claims to Mr. John Page as sole arbitrator:"

It is witnessed that "the Hon. John Henry Pope, Minister of Railways and Canals, acting on behalf of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, as such Minister, thereby referred to the sole valuation, arbitrament and award of me, the said John Page, all claims made, stated and alleged by the said John Lyons & Co. against Her said Majesty the Queen for matters arising out of the above mentioned contract, and all matters arising thereunder and in respect of such claims, whether made on the part of the claimants or of Her said Majesty; and the said Minister of Railways and Canals, under the authority aforesaid, did thereby appoint me, the said John Page, to be the said sole arbitrator, and did thereby agree that the valuation, arbitrament and award of me, the said John Page, should be accepted as final, conclusive and without appeal." And whereas the said John Lyons and Patrick Lyons, the contractors and claimants on the preceding pages named, "assented to the reference of their claims arising out of their contract with Her Majesty the Queen for the works embraced in section No. 9 of the Lachine Canal enlargement or connected therewith as on the preceding pages stated, to the sole valuation, arbitrament and award of me, the said John Page, Chief Engineer of Canals of Canada, and accepted the appointment of me as sole arbitrator on the part of Her Majesty the Queen, and did also thereby jointly and severally appoint me, the said John Page, as sole arbitrator on their part, and did further promise and bind themselves to accept the decision, valuation, arbitrament and award of me, the said sole arbitrator, as final, conclusive and without appeal, and to abide by the same."

Now know ye that I, the said John Page, having taken upon myself the burden of the said arbitration, and having heard and duly considered all the allegations and evidence of the respective parties of and concerning the said claims and matters in question so referred to me, as aforesaid, and duly examined the papers, accounts and documents connected with the same, do make and publish this, my award in writing of and concerning the said claims and matters in question so referred, as aforesaid,

and I do hereby award, order and determine that there is due from Her said Majesty the Queen to the said John Lyons & Co., in respect of the matters so referred to me, as aforesaid, for all work done by them under their said contract and remaining unpaid, corrected estimates, lowering foundation for side walls, widening cut, removing slides, selecting material for side walls, drilling holes for blasting, and in full satisfaction of all claims made, stated or alleged by the said John Lyons & Co. against Her Majesty the Queen for matters arising out of the above mentioned contract, and all matters arising thereunder and in respect of such claims, the sum of \$7,929.

In witness where I, the said John Page, have hereunto set my hand and seal, in duplicate, this twelfth day of November, 1887.

To all to whom these presents shall come: I, JOHN PAGE, of the city of Ottawa, in the County of Carleton, and Province of Ontario, the Chief Engineer of Canals of the Dominion of Canada; send greeting:

Whereas by an Instrument in writing under the hand of the Honorable John Henry Pope, the Minister of Railways and Canals for the Dominion of Canada, acting on behalf of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, as such Minister and under the seal of the Department of Railways and Canals, bearing date the 30th day of March, 1887, after reciting: "Whereas John Nicholson, of the city of Ottawa, in the County of Carleton and Province of Ontario, contractor, and William Anderson Allan, of the said city of Ottawa, contractor, carrying on together the business of contractors as partners under the name, style and firm of 'Nicholson & Allan,' had entered into contract with Her Majesty Queen Victoria, represented by Sir Charles Tupper, then Minister of Railways and Canals of the Dominion of Canada, on the 18th day of March, 1884, for all the works required to deepen and improve the channel-way at the upper entrance of the Galops division of the Williamsburg canals, such contract to be fulfilled by the first day of November, 1885; And after reciting that "Whereas after the said works had been carried on by the said firm of 'Nicholson & Allan,' their partnership was duly dissolved and the said John Nicholson retired from the said firm, and assigned and transferred all his interest in the said above mentioned contract to the said William Anderson Allan and absolutely renounced all claims and demands past, present or future against Her Majesty in respect thereof, to which assignment, retirement and transfer the Honorable John Henry Pope, then acting Minister of Railways and Canals, on the 29th day of April, 1885, assented on behalf of Her Majesty in pursuance of an Order in Council bearing date the 4th day of April, 1885, and did recognize and accept the said William Anderson Allan, under the authority aforesaid, as sole contractor for the works above mentioned;" And after reciting that "Whereas the said William Anderson Allan, by his letter of the 24th day of February, 1887, preferred certain claims as per schedule thereto attached, dated 19th day of February, 1887, in connection with his said above mentioned contract, and by the same and another letter of the first day of March, 1887, the said Wm. SIR,—Respecting the vouchers submitted to me for audit, for the expenditure of the Marine Department during the first quarter of the current fiscal year, I have the honor to direct your attention to the following remarks:—

Vouchers 11 and 41 are for \$4,000 and \$6,006, respectively, paid Gagnon et Frères on account of contract for repairs to steamer *Napoleon III*. Both these payments were made apparently without any certificate from an agent of the Department as to the extent of the work completed at the time of payment. \$6, of the latter amount is for interest on draft. The contractors should be debited with the full amount \$6,006.

Voucher 135 is for \$14.40 paid Dawson & Co. for stationery, which, according to an Order in Council dated November 17, 1877, should be obtained through the Stationery Office.

Voucher 374. Captain Guildford, of steamer *Newfield*, should furnish details of expenditure of \$100 advanced to him for outlay.

Voucher 859. P. Harty charges in his account for travelling expenses: \$10 for cab hire at Montreal, \$8.09 for freight, \$3 for checkers on wharf, and \$3.50 for waiters on boat. Vouchers should be furnished for the first two payments, and the other two require explanation.

I find several vouchers not bearing the official certificate required by Sec. 33 of the Audit Act, to which I had the honor of directing your attention in my letter of 31st December last. This certificate is essential, and I trust you will insist in future on its being attached to every account before payment is made.

SIR,—In Voucher 671 an item of \$10 is allowed for undercharge on zinc castings supplied on the 5th August and 3rd November. The price charged on these dates was 22 cents per piece, and the accounts rendered are certified "O K" by W. M., receipted and marked settled by Thos. Dean; but in Voucher 671 the price charged is 32 cents per piece, and the claim for \$10 is the additional 10 cents on pieces supplied at 22 cents on the above dates. If 22 cents was considered a reasonable price at the time of purchase, and the account marked as "settled," why has this amount been allowed?

Voucher 600—\$179 48—paid for stationery. This should have been obtained from the Stationery Office.

Voucher 1126. Dr. H. V. Payne is allowed in his account for travelling expenses, \$12.50 for three days at Halifax, and \$11.50 for three days at St. John. The amount allowed by Order in Council is \$3.50 per day. Please explain.

Marine Hospital, Quebec. In accounts of contingencies for July, August and September, there are charges for fish for Dr. C. and family. Are these for Dr. Catellier, and is he allowed board for himself and family at the hospital? There are also charges for contingent expenses for Dr. C. What are these for.

Vouchers 448 and 449, for painting and repairs at Lunenburg, N.S., are not certified. Please inform me upon whose certificate the amount paid, \$26.35, was allowed.

Voucher 1048. The commissioners at Bathurst are allowed \$4.99 as commission on \$49.95 advanced for fuel and repairs. Why was not this account forwarded to the Department in the first instance, and paid as similar accounts from other hospitals?

For three months ended 30th September, 1887, Mr. Meneilly, steamboat inspector, charged in his account for travelling expenses, \$1.00 for newspapers and \$4.40 for fees to porters at hotels. Mr. Horbottle for the same period charged 5c. for a

newspaper and 65c. fees to porters, Mr. O. P. St. John charged 20c. for newspapers, and 80c. fees to porters. Mr. Coker charged 50c. porter's fees, and \$2 for a parlor car, and Mr. Russel \$1.75 for incidentals. These are not payments which should have been made from public funds.

SIR,—I have the honor to direct your attention to the vouchers furnished me for the expenditure of \$3,998.19 during the fiscal year 1887-88 in connection with the Lobster and Oyster Commission. Of this amount, J. H. Duvar received \$2,034.31, W. B. Deacon, \$250, Ed. Hackett, \$450, for which the only vouchers forwarded to me are their acknowledgments of having received the money on account of expenses. The Bank of Montreal was paid \$400 by cheque 310, for which there is neither voucher nor acknowledgment. An account, apparently compiled in the Department, is furnished for \$820 paid Alfred Ogden, but it is not certified by the chairman of the commission or by any responsible officer. As a rule these payments were made by sight drafts on the Deputy Minister of Fisheries. This mode of paying out the public funds is objectionable and I would suggest that it be avoided in future. The vouchers for the remainder of the \$3,998.19 are for telegraphing, but are not certified by any person.

I will thank you to forward to me at your early convenience full details of the amounts paid Messrs. Duvar, Deacon, Hackett and Ogden, properly certified, giving the dates on which each commissioner was employed, and the items of his travelling expenses. I am awaiting this information to complete the audit of your Departmental expenditure for 1887-88.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 27th ultimo, and in reply to enclose vouchers covering the expenditure in connection with the Lobster and Oyster Commission, and to give the following explanations in reference thereto :—

Cheque No. 310 for \$400 was issued in favor of the Bank of Montreal, to be placed to the credit of secretary, J. H. Duvar, with the branch bank at Chatham, N.B.; this amount is accounted for in the statement of expenditure.

The account from Commissioner Ogden for \$820, which you refer to as being apparently compiled in the Department, I may state that the form in which it was rendered was not in accordance with the Audit Act, and was re-written in the Department, the amount paid being authorized by the then Minister after being certified to by the secretary of the commission.

The drafts drawn on the Deputy Minister by the secretary, and which you state are objectionable, were authorized by the Minister and were necessary to enable the secretary to meet the travelling expenses of the commissioners without having the members wait at the particular place for funds. The disbursements had to be made in this way or an accountable credit issued, which the Minister would not consent to. Except in special cases, such as above referred to, drafts upon the Department are not permitted.

Duvar are given allowances of \$250 and \$200 respectively for special services; these payments should not have been made except under the authority of an Order in Council. Kindly let me have your explanation. Voucher 1460. There is an overpayment of \$37.60 on this voucher, which amount should be refunded.

J. J. Donovan and W. Robinson have been paid by cheques 2527 and 2528, \$8 each for damage done to nets by "Canadienne" please send me the certificate upon which you allowed this sum as a reasonable compensation for the injury sustained.

Voucher 3993. Allan Gilmour furnishes a receipt for \$5,000 for steam yacht "Cruiser," but there is no official certificate attached.

In many instances you have sent me copies of accounts rendered instead of the originals. The accounts as sent in to you with the necessary certificate attached should be sent to me.

I find also you have permitted the captains of the protection service to retain balances of advances held by them on 30th June; these amounts should have been deposited to the credit of the Receiver General at the end of the fiscal year.

SIR,—I have the honor to inform you that I have completed the examination of the vouchers for the expenditure of the Geological Survey during the seven months ended January 31 last, and beg to draw your attention to the following remarks thereon:—

I observe that some of your surveyors receive only actual expenses, while others are allowed the per diem living allowance of \$3.50. Of those whose accounts I have received, Messrs. S. Barlow, Whiteaves, Ami, Bowman and Low, and Dr. Lawson, have been paid their actual expenses, while Messrs. Cochrane, Lambe, Weston and yourself, have received the per diem allowance. I should like to be informed what regulations you have governing these cases.

I also observe that you are still in the habit of paying directly for furniture and repairs which should be ordered through the Public Works Department, such as the following:—

SIR,—I am in receipt of your letter of the 18th instant, I also received at the same time from the secretary of the Interior Department, copy of a letter addressed by you to the Deputy of the Minister of Public Works, dated 8th February, also copy of an extract from your letter to me of the 24th November last. I am surprised to find it stated in your letter of the 8th instant, above referred to, that you had received no answer from me on the subject.

You appear to have forgotten that when I received that communication (of 24th November), I called at your office and fully explained the circumstances to you. I then stated that I had neither ordered nor paid for any repairs or painting of the buildings or premises; that, except one chair on a representation made to me that it was urgently required, no office furniture had been purchased by my authority, and that the accounts which you then queried, were all for work in connection with museum fittings, shelves, cases, stands, &c., which could in no sense be regarded as furniture. I further pointed out that carpenters were permanently employed on the premises for the special purpose, as I understand, of doing this work under my immediate directions and supervision, as it is absolutely necessary and as has always been the practice here, as it is in all other well organized museums. I further stated that I had always assumed, and had acted on the assumption, that such expenditure was strictly within the meaning and intention of the Geological and Natural History Survey and Museum Act, 40 Vic. Chap. 9, which reads "and for the maintenance of the museum in connection therewith." My action in the past in this respect has never been called in question, and I have received no instructions to discontinue it. There can be no question that to do so would severely delay and obstruct the museum work, and might also often result in loss by injury to valuable specimens.

The mistake arises from not recognizing the essential difference in the requirements and in the nature of the work in connection with a museum and in those for an ordinary departmental office. The regulations applicable to the one are wholly inapplicable to the other.

As regards travelling allowances the matter has been submitted for the consideration and decision of the Minister, but this has not yet been received. Hitherto the custom has been to pay actual expenses, except as regards myself when travelling on inspection duty.

Some of the explorers have deferred sending in their accounts until the matter of travelling allowance was decided.

SIR,—In reply to that portion of your letter of yesterday which refers to the maintenance of the museum, I have the honor to draw your attention to the fact chap. 23 of the Revised Statutes which repeals 40 Vic., cap. 9, does not contain the words "and for the maintenance of the Museum in connection therewith."

By Chap. 36 of the Revised Statutes the Minister of Public Works is given the charge of the Government Buildings at Ottawa.

As I explained to you verbally, when the law directs that a course should be taken, I have no power to permit myself to deviate from it, on account of the convenience of the public service or other consideration.

If a change is to be sought, representation must be made to those who initiate the amendments to the Acts of Parliament.

Pending the decision of the Minister, I think it would be advisable to follow the former custom and pay the surveyors simply their actual expenses, without discrimination. If it was then found that the Minister's decision was favorable to the granting a per diem allowance, any balance due could be easily paid; while in the case of an adverse decision there would be no refunds of the difference to be made.

DEAR DR. SELWYN,—Pardon me for not sooner replying to yours of the 23rd ultimo, but I may say that I have not been at my office since that date. A few days previously I asked Dr. Dawson to mention to you that by Mr. White's instructions I had had some conversation with the Auditor General about the payment of travelling allowances to members of the staff of the Geological Survey, and that after that conversation the conclusion at which Mr. White arrived was that for short trips taken from Ottawa on special business the members of the staff will be regarded, as I understand they have been heretofore, as coming under the operation of the Order in Council governing the allowances to members of the service absent from headquarters on business, that is to say, they will be allowed actual travelling expenses and a living allowance of \$3.50 per day if in Canada, and \$5.00 per day if in the United States; but the regular exploratory trips of the Survey must be conducted as in the past, namely, the actual cost will be paid for, subject to the production of vouchers. It occurred to me that the economy and efficiency of the service might be promoted by adopting a schedule such as we apply to the Topographical Survey, and Mr. White asked me to discuss this with you at a convenient moment. This of course will apply to the future, and some day when I am well again and back at the office we must arrange to meet and talk the subject over. I do not know what proposal would suit your circumstances, but in any case the discussion can do no harm.

As to Mr. Coste's case, the intention was, since he was so near Washington as New York, to pay his railway and travelling expenses from New York to Washington and back, including a week's stay at Washington. To this the Minister says

could fairly be added the cost of the railway trip from Ottawa to New York and back, since that would be in accordance with his intention at the time Mr. Coste was authorized to go to Washington. I understand Mr. White to say that you had mentioned that you were not consulted about Mr. Coste's Washington trip. You will remember, however, that you were at that time in the North-West, and it would have been impossible to consult you.

I would ask to be supplied with a statement showing the date of return of each surveyor, the date his accounts were handed in, and the date these accounts were transmitted to this office, as in the following, where I have introduced hypothetical dates:—

In your letter to Dr. Selwyn of February 8, you acquainted him with the decision of the late Minister, that only when on special trips from Ottawa the per diem allowance be paid, but that when on the regular exploratory trips actual expenses only should be paid, on the production of proper vouchers. These instructions were repeated on the 7th of May. I cannot understand how, in the face of these instructions, the above accounts were approved and passed. I would suggest that the amounts in question be disallowed the several surveyors, and that the actual expenses be allowed when a detailed statement, supported by the necessary vouchers, is submitted.

In the accounts of Messrs. Ells and Giroux, the particular days for which the per diem allowance is claimed should be given.

In Mr. Fletcher's accounts items appear for the gross amount of fares between different dates; in every case the full details of the charges should be given. In this account there is also a charge for 94½ days board at \$1. I would ask if this is of the nature of an allowance, or if it is the actual amount expended; if the latter, full details should be given of the amounts paid at the different places visited.

In Dr. Bell's account I observe that he charges \$3 each way for his Pullman between Ottawa and Mattawa, while his assistants, Messrs. Barlow and Cochrane, charge only \$2 each for the same service. I would like an explanation of the want of uniformity in these charges.

SIR,—As the surveyors of the Geological Survey will soon be leaving for their summer's work, I beg to draw attention to an irregularity which has existed for some years.

When a surveyor sells a horse or any part of his outfit or supplies, the practice has been to take credit for the amount so received, and to deduct it from his gross expenditure, thus using it to supplement his personal appropriation.

According to section 25 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, which reads: "All public moneys, from whatever source of revenue derived, shall be paid to the credit of the account of the Minister of Finance and Receiver General," any amounts thus received should be deposited to the credit of the Receiver General and will thus be passed into Casual Revenue, or to the credit of the survey appropriation, according as the article sold was purchased during a preceding year or during the then current fiscal year.

I trust that you will have all the surveyors instructed accordingly.

SIR,—I have examined the vouchers for the expenditure on account of British Columbia Indians for the nine months ended March 31, and beg to ask your attention to the following remarks thereon.

Voucher 163 is for a payment of \$33 for hotel expenses of Mr. R. H. Hall in Victoria, B.C. Please state Mr. Hall's connection with the Government.

I observe that while Mr. Supt. Powell draws the maximum allowance of \$5 a day for living expenses when absent from Victoria, he introduces charges for tents, blankets and towels, and occasional charges for provisions and board.

The Order in Council authorizing the payment of \$5 a day for living expenses states that this shall be over and above actual moving expenses. Any officer accepting the per diem allowance tacitly agrees to be personally liable for any expenses that he may incur for accommodation such as is usually obtained at a hotel. All charges for tents, blankets and provisions for personal use should therefore be disallowed in such a case.

In cases where provisions have been purchased by Mr. Powell on his trips, such provisions were for the use of his men.

Mr. Hall cannot be said to have been even temporarily in the employment of the Indian Department, but was simply waiting for a decision as to whether he would be employed or not. He was in no sense a public officer, and thus cannot make his expenses a charge against the public funds. It would be setting a dangerous precedent to pay the expenses of any one who (instead of filling a public office) was simply a candidate for such office. I shall lay the matter before the Treasury Board.

SIR,—I am in receipt of your letter of the 21st instant, in reference to the payment by this Department of Mr. Hall's board when in Victoria pending a decision as to the appointment of an agent for the North-West Coast.

I note your statement that the explanation given by me seems hardly sufficient to justify the payment, and that you propose laying the matter before the Treasury Board.

In reply I have to state in connection with my previous letters that my instructions from the then Superintendent General were to endeavor to secure at the earliest moment the services of a reliable and suitable person to fill the position of Indian agent on the North-West Coast of British Columbia, where Indian matters were in a critical condition and the presence of such an officer was essential at as early a date as possible.

Mr. Hall was an officer of the Hudson's Bay Company at Fort Simpson, and highly recommended as an efficient, reliable man, and although not at all anxious to accept the position, nevertheless expressed his willingness in the interests of order and good government to place his services at the disposal of the Government. I acted to the best of my judgment in the interest of the Government in this matter, and I had to communicate by wire with the Honorable the Superintendent General in respect to the question of appointing Mr. Hall, who was then the only person known to me, or others with whom I consulted, who would likely fill the position in a satisfactory manner, but whom I had no authority to vest at once with the powers of an Indian agent and to despatch in that capacity immediately to the North-West Coast without having been previously authorized to do so by the head of my Department. Several days elapsed before the decision of the Superintendent General was received, and there being only a weekly steamer running to that coast, Mr. Hall was requested by me to remain until the decision of the Minister should be received by me. In the interim between my informing the Superintendent General of my recommendation of Mr. Hall and the receipt of the Minister's decision, another applicant for the position in the person of Mr. Charles Todd turned up, who was

strongly supported by well-known and highly respectable persons in Victoria; all of which was duly telegraphed to the Superintendent General, and the Superintendent General decided finally to appoint Mr. Todd instead of Mr. Hall; but the latter gentleman was in no way to blame, nor was any one else, for his delay at Victoria pending the Minister's decision. It was a special case and purely a Departmental matter, and I consider the Department was bound to pay the expenses of Mr. Hall while he was delayed, awaiting its decision as to whether he was to be appointed Indian agent or not.

SIR—I have completed the examination of the vouchers for Lt. Gov. Dewdney's expenditure for the six months ended Dec. 31 last, and ask your attention to the following remarks thereon :

Voucher 357, an advance of \$300, to Arthur Prieur on account of translating Ordinances:—When any advance of this kind is to be made on account of work, a certificate should be given that work has been done equivalent in value at least to the advance proposed.

I have again to draw your attention to the fact that all advertising vouchers must be certified by the Queen's Printer for the Dominion of Canada. In my letter to you of September 28, I drew a distinction between the Queen's Printer for Canada and the Queen's Printer for the North-West Territories, and showed that the certificate of the latter officer was not sufficient on the advertising vouchers. I return herewith the advertising vouchers received at this office, and ask you to have them certified, as well as those vouchers for advertising which have not yet been received here.

Specimens should be sent with all printing accounts. None of the accounts received by me for the current year are accompanied by the necessary specimens.

I notice that school inspectors are allowed \$5 a day for travelling expenses, and that members of the Board of Education receive \$4 a day. I would again draw your attention to the O.C. of June 28, 1886, which limits the *per diem* allowance in Manitoba and N.W.T. to \$3.50.

Vouchers 239, 252, 299, 359: these, and all other telegraph accounts should be given in detail.

I have numbered the items in order that you may better understand the observations which I now propose to make in respect to them.

While it is true that the whole expense of the Administration of Justice in the North-West Territories falls upon Canada, it has always been the practice to allow a certain proportion of this expenditure to be paid out of the vote for the expenses of the Government of the North-West Territories, or otherwise,—the vote of \$20,000 for Miscellaneous Justice being altogether insufficient for the purpose. The principle upon which these items have been paid, as recognized by this Department, has been that all the items in connection with Criminal Justice have been supervised and paid by us. The ordinary expenses in connection with Courts have been left to the Local Authorities, who are far better able to provide for an economical administration than we are, and I may say that up to the present time we have had no reason to be dissatisfied with the way in which the Local Authorities have disposed of the moneys placed at their disposal. According, then, to this practice, which has been in force several years, the items Nos. I, II, IV, VI to XII inclusive, are properly paid by Governor Dewdney.

With reference to item No. III, that should have been paid by this Department. I understand, however, that in that case it was at Governor Dewdney's express instance that an inquest was held, and the expenses were inadvertently paid by him without reference to this Department.

Item No. V is peculiar and requires explanation. Gaddy and Racette were undergoing trial for murder. Although half-breeds, they were in fact "Treaty Indians," and being undefended at the trial, Mr. Secord was asked by Mr. Dewdney, as Commissioner of Indian Affairs, to protect their interests. For his services in such defence Mr. Secord was paid \$237.60. Without criticizing the propriety of this item, it is necessary, I think, for me to state that as a rule professional gentlemen should not be paid from the public funds for professional services in connection with the defence of impecunious persons having no means to procure defence for themselves. In the event of an accused person having no professional assistance on his trial, the presiding judge may assign counsel to defend him, should he consider it in the interest of the prisoner to do so. It has always been considered the duty of the counsel so designated by the judge to give his professional assistance gratuitously. Had Mr. Secord, therefore, been assigned to defend the prisoner by the presiding judge he would not have been entitled to be paid for his professional services. Inasmuch, however, as he was retained on behalf of the Indian Department, I think the charge is one which should be made against that Department, and not against "Miscellaneous Justice."

The result therefore is that the only item in your letter which should be transferred to "Miscellaneous Justice" is No. III, "Expenses of Inquests," \$77.25. Shall I apply for the transfer?

DEAR SIR,—In your "Rideau Hall expenditure for 1887-88," I notice the following items:—

A payment for \$21 to P. Clarke is marked "Watchman for two weeks during the annual absence of Geo. Sleeman." The latter watchman was paid for 366 days. Please mention the authority for giving vacations, with pay, to officers of this grade.

Voucher 33360 is an account for \$249.20 rendered by Geo. Reid, a carpenter on the Rideau Hall payroll, for travelling with the Governor General from June 20 to October 12, 1887. The items may be divided as follows:—

Expenses at Quebec.....	\$117 70
Expenses east of Quebec.....	131 50

The Rideau Hall vote is of strictly local application, and covers no services outside of Ottawa. If Mr. Reid was working as a carpenter on the Quebec Citadel, the \$117.70 might perhaps be charged to "Repairs"; but as the Governor General stays in no Dominion building east of Quebec, Mr. Reid must be considered as one of his suite, whose travel is covered by the annual allowance of \$5,000 from Civil Government Contingencies. The same remarks will apply to Mr. Reid's trip in 1888, for which he took out an advance of \$100, June 7, 1888. Also, his pay of \$15 a week for the time absent from Ottawa is not a "Rideau Hall" item, and his work east of Quebec is not a public service. Please obtain from Mr. Reid a refund of his pay and expenses while east of Quebec.

DEAR SIR,—I beg leave to offer the following remarks concerning the Public Works expenditure for 1887-88:—

Certificate 745 is for \$227.75 in favor of G. B. Lanctot, of Montreal, for vessels and robes supplied to the Roman Catholic Chapel at Stoney Mountain Penitentiary, Manitoba. This sum was charged to the Public Works Vote for Penitentiary construction and furnishing. Similar articles obtained from Mr. Lanctot for the chapel at New Westminster Penitentiary, British Columbia, were paid for by the Justice Department from their vote for penitentiary maintenance and working expenses. I would like to have an expression of your opinion as to whether construction or maintenance shall bear these expenses: it is plain that one of the vouchers must be wrongly charged.

Mrs. Martineau of St. Antoine de Tilly was paid \$80 in June, 1888 (cheque 37395) for "Two large trees cut down in 1883 on her land during a survey of the St. Lawrence." This was charged to "St. Lawrence Water Levels." Please let me have some further explanation of this item.

Mr. S. H. St. O. Chapleau was paid as Inspector of Public Buildings, North-West Territories, up to February 29, 1888. \$41.66 for December, is dated December 17, 1887, and \$33.33 for January, and February is dated March 26, 1888. His time may be divided as follows:

July 1 to Dec. 25, 1887.....	\$ 241 92
Dec. 26, 1887, to Feb. 29, 1888.....	91 39

Since Mr. Chapleau's appointment and pay as Clerk of the Crown in Chancery dated from December 26, 1887, it is impossible that he could have performed the duties of an Inspector in the North-West after that time. Moreover, being a permanent officer in the Civil Service, any payment to him, outside of his salary as Clerk of the Crown, was illegal. Please obtain from Mr. Chapleau a refund of \$91.39.

Mr. Wm. Henderson, late Clerk of Works at Regina, was paid, May 11, 1888, as follows:—

Please let me know why the payments were so long delayed, if currently earned; and send me the vouchers for rent. Cheque 37,726 of June, 1888, \$192.50, in favor of John C. Winslow, caretaker at Woodstock, N.B., is for 770 gallons of paraffine oil, at 25 cents, bought and used between June 1, 1885, and December 31, 1886. Such a delay in payment is evidence that the service was not recognized at the time as a public one. Please let me have some further explanation of the circumstances.

37183 is a bill rendered by the Corporation of Quebec against the occupant of the Quebec Observatory for the following items:—

Apart from the irregularity of charging the ordinary city tax of \$21.75, to the account for "Water for Dominion Buildings," the personal tax of \$4 should be paid by Mr. Ashe, the observer. Please obtain from him a refund of the amount.

Mr. A. P. Kilganon, the superintendent of the works at Little Current, was paid as follows for 366 days:—

Where are Mr. Kilganon's headquarters, at which a living allowance is not due; and is there evidence that he spent no part of the year there?

Certificate No. 566, charged to "Nanaimo Harbor," includes \$3,500 paid to Larkin, Connolly & Co., for a clam-shell dredge. Such a large item as this should be classed as "New Dredging Plant."

The vouchers of M. G. Keir, an extra clerk in the Public Works Department, are made by "T. W. Keir, for M. G. Keir." Why are they not rendered by the person who performs the service?

\$311.00 was paid to Chas. Desjardins, of Ottawa, for insurance on the Nepean Experimental Farm buildings. The Order in Council of July 5, 1888, discontinued the practice of insurance of Government property. (See my report of 1887, Part ii, page 11.)

Some of the "Pay List and Account" forms for expenditure at Ottawa (such as "Revetment Wall") cover large bills rendered by Ottawa merchants. These should be paid by cheques, instead of by cash. The same remark applies to all payments in places with banking accommodation.

Mr. Chas Thibault's cheques for salary, are dated as follows:

DEAR SIR,—I have examined the vouchers for your expenditure on Dominion Lands (Capital and Income) from July 1, 1887, to April 30, 1888, and beg to offer the following remarks for your consideration:—

A. Pay list signatures.—The following extra clerks at Ottawa have not signed the pay-lists for the months indicated. Please explain severally the different omissions.

B. Chas. G. Meech was paid \$15, July 15, and \$108, Dec. 5, to cover services at Ottawa from July 1 to Oct. 31, at \$1 a day. T. A. Pope was paid \$225, July 8, and \$5 Sept. 13, to cover services at Ottawa from May 1 to July 31, at \$2.50 a day. Why were these amounts not paid monthly as they accrued, in the usual manner?

C. The vouchers for telegrams only name the amount for each telegram. They should show in addition the names of the sender and receiver.

D. The following payments were made for advertising in Books and Pamphlets:—

All advertising in Books and Pamphlets was discontinued by the Order in Council of April 16, 1880. See page 614 of my report for 1885, containing letters to you on the same subject, dated Aug. 26, 1884, and Feb. 23, Mar. 10 and Oct. 7, 1885.

E. Several vouchers for legal expenses give the names of the suits or transactions in which the services were rendered, without any further description of the circumstances under which the expenditure was incurred. Independently of the executive certificate given by the Justice and spending departments, there should be enough information in the vouchers to show clearly what the services were. These are the papers which go to the Public Accounts Committee when legal expense vouchers are called for, and any information which could reasonably be expected by the Committee is also necessary for the ordinary audit in this office. The following are some of the cases referred to:—"Atty.-Gen. vs. E. T. Houghton;" "Atty.-Gen. vs. Mathewman & Hunt;" "The 5 Railway Belt Cases;" "Atty.-Gen. vs. Hon. John Schultz;" "Atty.-Gen. vs. Bannatyne & Mathewman," and "Atty.-Gen. vs. Robt. Gerrie."

F. Postage.—There are several large items for postage stamps bought in round sums, the Land Board, for example, charging \$715 for 9 months to March 31. I notice in your printed Report a statement of the number of letters sent out from each Agency; are the two figures checked against each other in your Department? The Agent might specify in a monthly current account the number of letters at each rate. Stamps are so much like money in convertibility that a sub-accountant should be expected to explain his disposition of any considerable amount.

G. Timber Fees.—Please quote the authority for paying 25 per cent. to Land Agents as commission on collections of Timber Revenue. As these agents are appointed by Order in Council, any addition to their salary should also be made by Council. I have been unable to find an Order on the subject.

H. Let me call your attention to the Order in Council of Sept. 8, 1871, providing that no removal allowance shall be granted except on report of the Treasury Board. The following removal allowances have been paid by Commissioner Smith from his special service account. The Treasury authority should be obtained for these, and for any future payments.

K. The receipts and pay cheques of D. J. Waggoner, the Crown Timber Agent at Prince Albert, N. W. T., indicate that he has resided near Kingston, Ont., since July last.

L. Louis Schmidt, assistant in the Prince Albert Land Office, was paid in 1886-87, up to June 30, 1887, at \$3 a day. The next payment to him was \$186, Aug. 26, 1887, as salary for July and August. Why was he not paid his July salary in regular course?

M. The February pay cheque of R. A. Ruttan, of Winnipeg, dated Feb. 21, 1888, was cashed by the Bank of Montreal at Winnipeg, Feb 7.

N. Richard Breen, the caretaker at Winnipeg, enters in his monthly accounts several items for which vouchers might be produced, and does not always mention whether the services were performed by himself or by others.

O. The vouchers from the Brandon Agent are only receipts for money, without the bills which must in many instances have been previously rendered.

P. Cheque 2650 (Income) of Sept. 7, 1887, covers a payment of \$420 to Mr. Rufus Stephenson, as living allowance, from May 11 to Sept. 7, 1887, at \$3.50 a day. Mr. Stephenson should describe in the voucher the different places in which the time was passed.

Q. Mr. Inspector Gordon's account for November contains a voucher for \$38.12 from the National Manufacturing Company, of Ottawa, for a tent, 2 camp chairs and a camp table. These are for accommodation which would be supplied at a hotel if he were not camping, and are therefore properly chargeable against the living allowance of \$3.50 a day while away from home. Please ask Mr. Gordon for a refund.

R. In August last two camp-beds are charged for Mr. Pearce and his driver. One of these should be set against the living allowance of \$3.50 a day, which covers all personal expenses of Mr. Pearce.

S. The vouchers for refunds of Dominion Lands Revenue (\$4,457.41 in 10 months) are not complete enough to enable me to make an audit of any value. They should contain all the information on which the payments are based.

T. I notice that your letter of credit cheques are printed "Pay——— or order." The banks have sometimes held that they were not obliged to have an endorsement on a cheque of this kind, if presented by the person named on the cheque. The usual wording now is "Pay to the order of———." It would be well also to have the numbers printed on the cheques, instead of writing them, and to forward to this office any spoiled cheques, along with those returned from

the bank, to complete the series of numbers. Printed numbers are a safeguard against the issue of duplicate or irregular cheques.

EXPLANATIONS BY INTERIOR DEPARTMENT.

A. Pay List Signatures.—The only explanation that can be given for this omission is that the clerks mentioned have been either sick or on temporary leave of absence at the time the pay list cheques were delivered. However, the cheques, being made payable to order, are themselves vouchers for the payments made. In future, care will be taken to have the pay-lists signed by all the employees whose names appear thereon, although that will necessarily delay the sending of the pay-lists to you in some cases.—P. B. DOUGLAS, Aug. 23.

B. C. G. Meech and T. A. Pope.—The question of what these officers should be paid arose during my own absence from Ottawa last summer. Payment was withheld until my return, when the matter was finally settled, and the whole amount due was paid at once.—A. M. BURGESS, July 11.

C. Details for Telegraph Accounts.—All the agents of this Department in Manitoba, the North-West and British Columbia have been instructed to furnish in future the information you ask for.—P. B. DOUGLAS, Aug. 23.

E. Legal Expenses.—In each of the cases to which the vouchers relate, the suits were brought to cancel patents issued in fraud, or in error or improvidence; and the purpose of the suit in each case was to re-vest in the Crown the title in the land which was the subject of the litigation.—A. M. BURGESS, July 11.

F. Postage.—I have communicated with the Commissioner of Dominion Lands. I am under the impression that to adopt your suggestion would necessitate the appointment of a special officer to keep the account you mention, which would cost as much as the postage itself.—A. M. BURGESS, July 11.

F. Postage.—The Commissioner of Dominion Lands reports that stamps are purchased by the Accountant of the Land Commission in lots of \$25, as required, and that each day that officer supplies the clerk by whom the letters are copied, addressed and stamped with a sufficient number for a day's mail, the mailing clerk records them in a Postage register, and at the close of each day adds up the total postage, which is checked and initialed by the Accountant, and the surplus stamps balanced. The Commissioner states that by this means a thorough check is kept upon the stamps, and the possibility of a mis-application of them is, he thinks, reduced to a minimum. He adds that the correspondence of his office, already extensive, is still increasing, which accounts for the large amount of postage stamps required.—JOHN R. HALL, Aug. 23.

G. Timber Fees.—The Dominion Lands Agents who are acting as sub Crown Timber Agents were appointed by this department, and they do not receive 25 per cent. on all collections made by them, but only that percentage until the commission reaches \$50 in one year. The law does not appear to call for the sanction of the Governor in Council to an appointment of the above nature.—LYNDWODE PEREIRA, July 27.

H. Removal Expenses.—I have communicated with the Commissioner of Dominion lands on the subject.—A. M. BURGESS, July 11.

P. Travel of Mr. Rufus Stephenson.—Mr. Stephenson's attention has been called to the necessity for describing in his vouchers the different places in which his time was passed.—A. M. BURGESS, July 11.

Q. Camp furniture for Mr. Gordon.—As you are aware, I do not agree with you in the view you take on this point. The hotels furnishing accommodation to guests purchase the beds, chairs and tables, and all that the guests have to pay for is the use of them. Mr. Gordon is obliged to use a tent and the other articles named, in some of his trips, because there is no hotel accommodation to be had at any price whatever. It is needless to point out that if there were, the discomforts and inconveniences of living in a tent are such as to make even a very poor hotel preferable.—A. M. BURGESS, July 11.

R. Camp furniture for Mr. Pearce.—As regards the camp furniture purchased by Mr. Pearce, I do not, as I have said to you elsewhere, take the same view as you do. With respect to the other items to which you refer, I beg to say that I have communicated with Mr. Pearce.—A. M. BURGESS, July 11.

He was subsequently put on the permanent list at a salary of \$400, said appointment dating back to January 1, 1888.

Any payments for services performed subsequent to the date from which his appointment began, should have been set against his salary. As no pay for extra work is allowed to permanent employes, the above sum of \$37.50 should be refunded.

SIR,—I have examined the accounts and vouchers for the expenses (during the season of 1887) of the two Half-Breed Commissioners, Messrs. Roger Goulet and N. O. Coté; the Secretary, Jas. Anderson; the Clerk, Maxime Goulet; and their servant, Xavier Leclerc. The following items call for remark:

Mr. Roger Goulet charges living allowance for 369 days from December 28, 1886, to December 31, 1887, at \$3.50, \$1,291.50. The 4 days in 1886 were paid by voucher 3510, dated January 13, 1887. Of the 365 days in 1887, the accounts show only 249 days as having been spent in Government service outside of Winnipeg. For the other 116 days spent in Winnipeg—presumably his headquarters—the living allowance, \$406, should be refunded, as well as the \$14 for 1886.

The Commissioners have not understood that the living allowance is to cover all personal expenses, for provisions and sleeping. No item should be charged in the accounts which would not appear if the persons were staying at a hotel. The hotel furnishes meals, beds, furniture and protection from the weather, for which the traveller pays out of his living allowance of \$3.50. In a camp the traveller buys his own provisions, and supplies his own bedding, furniture and covering—the whole being likewise charged against the \$3.50. To repay any of these items in addition to the allowance would be to discriminate in favor of the camper, and against the ordinary traveller. I append a list of personal equipments charged up by the Commissioners, which should be paid for by themselves, out of their living allowances:

Similar items in the 1886 accounts should also be separated and refunded.

The wages of Xavier Leclerc, cook and servant to the Commissioners, for 171 days at \$1.50, \$256.50, as well as all rations and transport for him, should be paid for by the Commissioners out of their living allowance as part of their personal expenses. The hotel-test of the preceding paragraph applies here also: any person staying at a hotel would find similar services covered by the regular bill, and would not include them in his claim against the Government, in addition to the living allowance.

The first trip of the Commission (June to September) was from Winnipeg to Qu'Appelle, Batoche, Prince Albert, Cumberland, Grand Rapids, and back to Winnipeg. In October and November a trip was made to Green Lake, by way of Qu'Appelle and Batoche. It would be well to have attached to the account, for the information of Parliament, an answer to the obvious question, why did the Commission not go from Batoche to Green Lake and back, when they were there in June.

Messrs. Jourdain, Harcus and Ballendine, 3 boatmen belonging to Cumberland House, were paid off at Selkirk, September 27, their full claim for the downward journey, and 20 days time and rations to take them back to Cumberland House (from October 1 to 20.) It may fairly be inferred that this was a closing of their claim, by mutual agreement. In January, 1883, appear 3 payments, \$94 to Jourdain, and \$70.50 each to Harcus and Ballendine, for time and rations on account of 47 days extra detention (October 21 to December 7) owing to storms and adverse winds on Lake Winnipeg. As far as the vouchers show, there was no liability on the part of Government to compensate these men for such an ordinary risk of their business. Please let me have, to submit to the Treasury Board, any further information you may possess on the subject.

SIR,—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 25th ultimo, having reference to the examination which you have made of the accounts and vouchers of the expenses incurred by the North-West Half-Breed Commission during the season of 1887, and, with regard to your remarks on certain items which appear in the said accounts, I beg to make the following statement:—

The sum of \$14, being for four days living allowance, at \$3.50 a day, from December 28 to 31, 1886, which was included in error in Mr. Goulet's account of January 5 last, has been refunded by him.

Winnipeg was not Mr. Goulet's headquarters, nor is he a resident of that place.

I do not dispute the general principle, and on that point I agree with you, that the living allowance is to cover all personal expenses for provisions and sleeping, but it must be borne in mind that if the hotel furnishes beds, furniture and protection from the weather, for which the ordinary traveller pays out of his living allowance of \$3.50, he is only called upon to pay a moderate rental for the use of these things for the time being, and is not required to buy them.

In the case of a Commission sent out on some important mission, in connection with the public service, to a country where hotel accommodation or shelter of any kind cannot be procured, and keeping in view moreover that the Commissioners have in their keeping valuable Government property, such as books, certificates which pass from hand to hand in the Territories as if they were cash, Departmental records and stationery, as in the present case, it seems only just and reasonable that they should be provided with a camp outfit, for the protection of the Government property in their custody, as well as for shelter for themselves.

The articles which are mentioned in the list of personal equipments were not required for the exclusive use of the Commissioners, but were necessary also for the men they had in their employ; besides, these articles were needed for the carrying out of the work of the Commission, and should not appear under the head of personal equipments. For instance, a large tent was required for an office, and the rubber sheeting, camp chairs, camp table, camp stove and camp basin for office furniture, while the buffalo robes were purchased to be placed in the waggons which conveyed the Commissioners to Green Lake and Fort Pelly, at the beginning of the winter season; and the cost thereof should, therefore, form part of the transport account.

However, such of the articles enumerated in the list already referred to of "personal equipments" as were not lost or totally destroyed by accident or by wear and tear, are still the property of this Department, and will either be used again for some similar purpose, or should they not be utilized in that way, they will be disposed of to the best advantage for the benefit of the Government.

Xavier Leclerc was not engaged as cook and servant to the Commissioners, but, besides his other duties as boatman and as the person in charge of the Government property and of the camp generally, he was the cook for the whole party, comprising the hired men, and for all these services he was paid very reasonable wages.

The Commissioners were instructed from time to time as to the places they should visit, and it was only after their return to Winnipeg, in September, that it was found desirable in the public interest that they should hold a sitting of the Commission at Green Lake, and they were then instructed accordingly to proceed to that place.

As to the payments made to Messrs. Jourdain, Marcus and Ballendine, for 47 days extra detention on Lake Winnipeg, on their return journey, I may say that twenty days was at first regarded as probably a sufficient period of time within which to accomplish the trip, and under ordinary circumstances the party might have returned to Cumberland within that time; but a letter written in their behalf, in December last, by the Chief Factor of the Hudson's Bay Company at that place, was received by the members of the Commission, representing that these men had been wrecked in a storm on the lake, and that they had in consequence suffered great privations, besides losing all the goods and provisions purchased with the money earned while on the service of the Commission, and being 47 days longer on the trip than they should have been under ordinary circumstances. It was therefore urged on their behalf that immediate compensation should be made to them, as they were without food and clothing for the winter, and had no means of purchasing either.

The correctness of all these statements being certified to by the Chief Factor of the Hudson's Bay Company already referred to, and upon the recommendation of the Commissioners, who were both in Ottawa at the time, the payments alluded to in last paragraph of your letter were authorized; and moreover, they were correct and legal and proper payments to make under the circumstances.

Memorandum Re C. H. Davis' Survey Contract.

The following case is submitted to the Department of Justice for advice:—

On the 9th May, 1882, C. H. Davis, D. L. Surveyor, entered into a contract with Her Majesty, represented by the Minister of the Interior, for the sub-division of certain townships in the North-West Territories. Squire Smith and H. D. Smith are the sureties for the faithful execution of the contract, and are bound to the Crown in the sum of \$4,000.

On the 13th May, 1882, two cheques for \$200 and \$1,300 respectively were issued in favor of the contractor, as advances on his contract, and forwarded to him.

On the 28th July, 1882, a letter was received from the sureties, consenting to a further advance of \$500 being made to the contractor. The advance was made accordingly.

On the 12th August, 1882, the sureties wrote that the contractor had committed suicide by shooting himself, and they asked to be relieved from all liability for advances made upon the contract. They were informed that the settlement of the matter would be effected by the Department of Justice.

On the 3rd of October, 1882, Inspector Griesbach of the Mounted Police wrote to H. D. Smith, one of the sureties, that he, Griesbach, had been appointed administrator to Davis' estate. The letter being transmitted to this office, the claim of this Department against the estate, amounting to \$2,000, was filed with the administrator.

On the 9th of August, 1887, the administrator of the estate paid to the credit of the Receiver General a sum of \$866.66, being amount of dividend due to the Crown. It will thus be seen that there still remains due to the Crown on account of this contract a balance of \$1,133.44, and the advice of the Department of Justice is requested on the following points:—

1. Would the Minister of the Interior be justified in claiming the above balance from the sureties, notwithstanding the contractor's demise?

2. If this should be done, are the terms of the contract such that payment could be enforced by process of law?

Re late C. H. Davis' Survey Contract.

SIR,—Referring to your memorandum of 25th November last, stating that on the 9th May, 1882, C. H. Davis entered into a contract for the survey of certain lands, and also into a bond with two sureties for the faithful performance of the same; that he committed suicide before the completion of the contract, but after he had received advances to the amount of \$2,000, and that \$866.66 was received from Davis' estate, which proved insolvent, leaving a balance of \$1,133.44, and asking if the Crown could recover this balance from the sureties: I have the honor to state that the death of Mr. Davis cancelled the contract; the sureties are therefore relieved from all liability for the non-performance of the contract.

As the contract says nothing about advances, and as the bond does not make the sureties liable for them, I am of opinion that the sureties are not liable in the premises. I think that the letter signed by the two sureties and dated 27th July, 1882, in which they consent to a further advance of \$500 being made to Davis, is not of itself sufficient to render them liable for such advance.

SIR,—Referring to your memo. of the 9th instant, and enclosed voucher No. 359 of 1887-88, I beg to state that in all cases where the awards have been entered in the "seizing officers' share column," they represent amounts paid to officers who have acted in the capacity of seizing officer. Where two officers are concerned in making a seizure which has not resulted from information, but through their own efforts entirely, two-thirds of the proceeds of the seizure is divided among such officers. There are only two cases on the enclosed voucher where there were informers, being seizures 349 and 494. In the case first named, the deposit was specially sub-divided by order of the Minister, after a careful investigation into the conditions which caused such seizure to be made.

SIR,—The gross receipts on account of Crown seizures of Customs which have come to account for the fiscal year ended June 30, last, amount to \$98,260.75. These receipts I understand are the net proceeds of seizures, after deducting expenses. From this is to be deducted \$15, which was the proceeds of a cheque issued during

the year, in payment of a refund, but as the payee could not be found, the cheque was returned to the Department and deposited to the credit of the account. The balance (\$98,345.75) is the proceeds of seizures.

I find the amount shown, as net proceeds of seizures, of which distribution has been made during the year is \$90,337.03. Would you be good enough to explain how the difference in the amounts arises? I shall publish your reply in my report.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 30th ultimo, stating that the net proceeds of seizures, after deducting expenses, deposited to the credit of Receiver General during the fiscal year to June 30, 1888, amounted to \$98,360.75, and that the net proceeds of seizures of which distribution has been made, during the same year, amounted to only \$90,337.03, and asking for an explanation of the difference in such totals.

I infer that you have arrived at the last named figures by adding the columns in the various distribution sheets submitted as vouchers, which show the net proceeds of seizures from which distributions have been made during the year, and finding that the total does not agree with the amount deposited during the year, you ask for explanation.

In answer, I beg to state that the amount deposited to the credit of the Receiver General is not in all cases, as you seem to think, the "net proceeds." It is very often the gross proceeds—notably in cases of interim deposits and where fines have been imposed.

Again, under the Customs law, a period at least of two months elapses between the making of the seizure and deciding the issue involved, so that any seizure made after about the end of April in any fiscal year, would not be decided before June 30 of that year, and therefore the proceeds would not be available for distribution during that fiscal year.

As a matter of fact it frequently happens, where the parties interested make any defence, that the final settlement of seizures is not made until after a lapse of many months, more especially in cases which have gone to court for condemnation; the result is that the net proceeds as shown in distribution sheets, from which distributions are made during any fiscal year, are largely made up of amounts deposited in previous years.

In short there can be no correspondence between amounts paid in to the credit of the Receiver General in any one year, and amounts shown as proceeds from which distributions have been made during the same year.

In that communication you ask for an explanation of the fact that in some divisions no proceeds have been derived from seizures during the fiscal year above mentioned, while the officers have received moneys on account of distributions of seizures.

The reason is simply that the distribution is not of proceeds of seizures made during that year, but extending over the previous year as well. There can be no comparison between the two items, as they are not for coterminous periods.

SIR,—I have to acknowledge your letter of the 23rd inst., drawing my attention to your requirement as communicated to the then Deputy Postmaster General, under date of 16th December, 1887, that you should be furnished annually (not later than the 30th September in each year) with a statement of the arrears, if any, due by postmasters on the previous 30th June.

You are aware that the published Revenue Accounts of this Department have in the past related to the year ended 31st March, in respect of the greater number of offices. The statement published in your 1887 report, although nominally applicable to the arrears up to 30th June, 1887, substantially applied to 31st March only.

There will be no difficulty in giving to you, within the next week or ten days, a twelve months' statement in continuation of last year's and exhibiting amounts since received on account of arrears then published. I have been anxious, however, to give to you a more comprehensive and final statement covering all Postal Revenue transactions up to 30th June, last, *i. e.*, for one quarter later, such date terminating the mode of revenue collection and methods of account superseded by the present system. This additional quarter's accounts are now summarizing during extra hours by the Accountant's staff, and I hope to be able to exhibit the result in a month or six weeks, too late, however, I fear for your 1888 Report. This list, in addition to that to be embodied in your report, I will advise the Postmaster General to submit to Parliament for authority to extinguish such of the arrears as the Department may show to be beyond collection.

In respect of the question of arrears through default, I am happy to say that there is no indication of anything of the kind since the 1st July last. There have been delinquencies, but the prompt methods which obtain under the system of account now followed, so far, seem able to bring such matters to a speedy issue.

the revenue of this railway, I would briefly state that with respect to the passenger traffic: Tickets of two kinds are usually furnished the station masters and ticket agents—local, for sale to points on line of I.C.Ry., and through, to points on other railways. These tickets are numbered progressively and are furnished by the General Passenger Agent in quantities to suit the volume of business of the station, a record being kept of the form numbers, progressive numbers, &c., and the agent also being required to keep a stock book of same. At the station a book is kept showing the commencing number, each morning, of the tickets on hand, and at night, after last train, the closing numbers of the tickets; the difference between the two numbers being the tickets sold during the day which are extended at the rate charged for each ticket. These amounts added up bring the day's sales. At the larger stations commercial travellers' and some other special forms of tickets are kept and treated in same manner. At the close of 10th, 20th and last day of month, a ticket report is prepared by the agents showing commencing and closing numbers of all tickets, number and amount of sales, and this is sent to the Audit Office where it is checked by the tickets collected by the conductors to verify the half-tickets, reduced fare tickets, &c., and also to see that the agent has not sold tickets of a higher number than is accounted for. At the end of the month a report covering the month's sales is sent in and with the amount of this report the agent is charged in the Audit Office ledger as explained later on.

Freight traffic.—Freights forwarded over this railway is waybilled by the station master at the rates per tariff (or at special rates if the agent is so advised by General Freight Agent) on local waybills if for points on this railway, but if for points on Grand Trunk Railway and its immediate connections on through waybills which show the proportions due each railway. The waybills are entered up daily by each agent in an abstract book, under the name of the station to which the freight is forwarded, and at the end of each ten days' period the columns are totalled. In the same manner the waybills of freight received are checked and abstracted by the agent daily, and totalled at the end of each ten days' period.

The amounts on these waybills chargeable to the station is the amount of prepaid freight on outward bills, and to pay freight on inward waybills. The agent receives credit for any amount he may pay out to other railways as charges on goods received from them to be forwarded, and which appear in a special column of waybill and are added to the freight to be collected at destination. Amounts collected for wharfage, storage, &c., at certain stations are accounted for in special forms for the purpose. Mails and sundries consist of the charge for carriage of mails, proportion of express earnings, &c, the accounts for which are prepared here. A cash book is kept by the agents in which is entered daily the amounts from sale of tickets from outward prepaid freight, inward to pay freight and other sources, wharfage, &c, while on the credit side is entered amount paid out as back charges on goods and remittances to cashier here (which are made daily from larger stations and semi weekly, &c., from smaller stations.) A balance sheet is sent in by each agent to the Audit Office at end of each ten days' period, and at close of month, which shows the position of the accounts of his station. On the one side he credits railway with ticket sales, forwarded freight prepaid, received freight to pay, wharfage, &c., and on the other, charges railway with cash remitted and amount paid out as back charges on goods. The balances, if any, must consist of the cash on hand and charges on freight in store not delivered; and the agent is required to state amount of each and give in list of freight on hand and charges on each consignment. The cash received from the stations is counted by the cashier, and a receipt forwarded to each agent for amount sent in by him.

A classified statement is prepared monthly from the cashier's books, showing amount received from each agent which is used by the Traffic Auditor to check the agent's statement of account. Deposit is made daily by cashier in Bank of Montreal to credit of Hon. Receiver General. The ticket reports, abstracts of freight forwarded and received, returns of wharfage, &c., received from the agents are checked in the Audit Office, and amounts charged against each station in the Audit Office ledger,

and from these are made the entries of amounts accrued from passenger traffic, freight traffic and mails and sundries. The proportions of sales of through tickets due other railways and steamship companies, is reported to them monthly and in same manner. The sales over Intercolonial Railway are reported by them and checked against the tickets collected by conductors. The balance, if due them, is paid by cheque and voucher in the usual way: if due this railway, draft is made on the railway or steamship company for amount or remittance obtained. In the case of through waybilled traffic to and from Grand Trunk Railway points, abstracts and copies of the waybills are sent to the Grand Trunk Audit Office at Montreal, monthly, where the returns are checked and sent to audit office here to be compared with the returns sent in here by our station agents. The balances due either railway on the month's through freight operations are settled by cheque from the treasurer of either railway, as the case may be.

A balance sheet from the Audit Office ledger is furnished me each month, on which the entries for the general ledger are based.

The station agents and clerks handling money are guaranteed in either the London or the North American Guarantee Companies. Two travelling auditors are employed to check the accounts of the agents at the stations. Any receipts from sale of old material, &c., are paid in to cashier, the proper account being credited.

This briefly is the system in force for the accounting of the revenue of the railway, but of course there are numerous details connected with it which can only be fully explained by a reference to the forms and books employed.

SIR,—I have received from your office statements covering returns of telegraph revenue up to the 1st instant.

In reference to the summaries which should be prepared and signed by the District Superintendents, I notice that some have been prepared in your office from the detailed statements of officers. I assume you purpose in time having this done by each District Superintendent as provided for by Regulation No. 2 of my letter of 21st April, 1887.

I would beg to point out that no summaries or statements of any kind are furnished for the business of the North-West Territories, for which receipts have come to hand, amounting to over \$5,000.

In your letter of January 10 last, you stated that you had received detailed statements up to October 1887, and were awaiting the District Superintendent's account of deposits and other remittances, when you would present these returns in the same shape as the others. Would you be good enough to explain the delay, and to have the proper statements procured and forwarded as soon as possible.

It would be very desirable could you arrange to transmit with each monthly statement, an application for an entry warrant, crediting revenue and debiting expenditure by the amount of the vouchers furnished by operators, for which credit was taken in making up their Revenue account.

The receipts for February have not yet been forwarded by your Department; when they are I will send you my observations on the returns already furnished.

GOVERNMENT TELEGRAPH SERVICE, OTTAWA, March 29, 1888.

SIR,—I beg leave to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 26th inst., having reference to the Revenue statements submitted; and to state in reply to your remarks thereupon, that an effort is making to secure the uniform presentation of the accounts in accordance with the printed forms upon which some of the latter statements enclosed to you have been made out.

In explanation of the circumstance that some of the summaries have been prepared in my office, I would respectfully direct your attention to my letter of the 10th January, and would add to the information therein conveyed that in some instances the printed forms were misunderstood and incorrectly filled in, thus necessitating a recompilation of the summaries to be submitted to you with the statements of Revenue to hand.

I trust, however, to very soon have the use of the new form thoroughly understood by our several District Superintendents, and then there will be no lack of uniformity in the presentation of the returns.

With respect to the returns of the North-West lines, I have to state that owing to absence on leave and illness (due to exposure) since his return to Battleford, the District Superintendent has not so far been able to furnish me with the required information referred to in my letter of the 10th January. He has, however, temporarily engaged the services of an assistant, and I hope to be presently in receipt of a statement which will enable me to submit the returns to you in comprehensive and complete shape. Should I find, however, upon receipt of the expected statement, that any inexplicable discrepancy exists between the traffic accounts and revenue remittances, I shall arrange for the opening of a fresh account, and leave the unbalanced account for subsequent adjustment. This course is, I understand, the one you would wish to have pursued under such circumstances.

In regard to the application for entry warrants, I regret to state it is not practicable to meet your wishes, for the reason that the expenditure accounts do not, and cannot very well, in the nature of things, be made to come to hand concurrently; and as it is very desirable these should not accumulate but be got rid of as quickly as possible in the order in which they come to hand, it follows that our applications (through the Secretary of Public Works) for transfer entries and remittances, must of necessity, be made at odd times during each month. My monthly statements enclosed to you, however, contain an account of all such applications made, and with that, the return from the Departmental Accountant's office should be found to correspond.

SIR,—I beg to acknowledge at this late date the receipt of your letters of the 2nd August and the 8th inst., to which I have unavoidably been unable to give earlier attention, owing to the absence of myself and assistant from the office, in connection with the operation of the lines, and a subsequent press of accumulated correspondence that I have just now disposed of.

I have now in course of preparation, and will submit to you to-morrow, the delayed returns for the month of July, which will be found to cover the items referred to in your letter of the 8th inst.

The apparent want of correspondence between my accounts and those of your office, as set forth in your letter of the 2nd August, is due, I find, to the circumstance that in my returns I credit the Revenue with the amounts of all enclosures to the Secretary of Public Works (viz., Post Office Orders, Applications for Transfers, and Deposit Receipts on account of Revenue) from, or passing through my office; whereas, the "Statement of Deposits" which you receive from the Departmental Accountant, covers only such of my enclosures as may have passed through the Accountant's hands during a corresponding period.

I will prepare a statement as soon as possible more fully explaining this source of disagreement.

I think it might perhaps render matters more satisfactory were I to make my returns to your office, through the Departmental Secretary's (or the Accountant's) office instead of direct. They could in that way be brought into correspondence and you would be in receipt of one comprehensive statement, monthly, instead of two, disagreeing in their totals, as at present.

SIR,—Having further reference to your letters of the 2nd August and 8th September, the receipt of which was acknowledged in my letter of the 12th inst, explaining the want of correspondence between my returns of Telegraph Revenue collected, and the Departmental Statements of the amounts brought to account;

I now submit for your information a complete statement A, covering and agreeing with those that accompanied your letters, and showing on the one hand: 1. The lines from which the Revenue is derived. 2. The period covered by the Traffic Returns. 3. The amount due; and, on the other hand: 1. The remittances made to cover the Traffic Returns. 2. The amounts that, according to your statements, have come to account. 3. The balances outstanding, and explanation thereof.

I also submit herewith for your information a statement, B, showing: 1. The lines from which Revenue is derived. 2. The last Traffic Return to hand covered by the statement A. 3. The last Traffic Return to hand at this date. 4. The explanation of delay attending their transmission to this office.

In response to your request for an explanation of how the Revenue collected by other lines for the Government lines is accounted for, I have added to my inclosures herewith a necessarily lengthy memorandum, C, presenting the matter in detail, as I think this is best calculated to convey a clear understanding of the matter.

In conclusion I would state that the arrangement effected some months ago, for the making of transfer entries of part of the amounts of maintenance expenditure accounts, to cover the revenue collected and applied to maintenance, has been gradually applied in the several districts with very good results in accelerating the transmission of the returns; and I expect ere long to have it in general operation, so that by the end of the present fiscal year the prompt and uniform presentation of all of the returns may be secured.

Statement B. referred to in letter of 22-9-'88. Remarks explanatory of delay in bringing Revenue to Account (see Statement 31, page 153).

(1.) Returns for Jan.—March came to hand in August, and for April—July in September. Remittance by cash. The District Superintendent has been instructed with reference to transfer entries, and settlements will in future be so made. Delay in getting accounts is due to there being absolutely no mail connection between the offices. The entire Revenue is very small and insufficient to warrant special carrier service to effect monthly collections.

(2.) These accounts came to hand as promptly as could be desired. There is daily mail connection between the offices. The Revenue is remitted by transfer entries, and cash deposits of any excess of receipts.

(3.) These amounts come to hand with maintenance returns within four weeks of the end of the month represented; with increasing facilities more promptness will be secured. The Revenue is remitted by transfer entries.

(4.) The returns for these lines for March, April and May came to hand in June, and transfer entries to cover were applied for in that month, but were not made in time to appear in accounts for 1887-88.

(5.) The same explanation as No. 4

(6.) The delay in getting returns in promptly is due to negligence on the part of some of the agents at commission-offices. The District Superintendent is making an effort to secure more satisfactory service in this respect, and reasonable promptitude may be expected soon.

(7.) There was no balance due to the Government lines for months December, '87, to April, '88, inclusive. Cheques were received to cover balances due for May, August, which have been deposited and will appear in the general return, September,

(8.) This is a single office. Salaried agent. Remittances made by transfer, entries monthly.

(9.) Circumstances same as No. 6.

(11) Remittances in cash up to the end of May. Deposit in settlement will be found in general return for September. Remittances by transfer for June and July will also be found in September return. The Magdalen Islands lines, like the Anticosti lines, are maintained by cash advances to the District Superintendent to be subsequently accounted for by expenditure vouchers. The Revenue collections have been heretofore remitted at convenient intervals. It will hereafter be covered by transfer entries. For 7 months in the year we have no mail communication with the Magdalen Islands. The presentation of returns is therefore unavoidably irregular as to time.

(12.) The same explanation as No. 4.

(13.) Remittances are made by transfer entries of part of the amount of commission guaranteed to the agents, which is paid to them upon application or when otherwise convenient. The accounts come to hand with tolerable promptitude, but

the amounts involved are so small that it is inadvisable to make monthly settlements by transfer entries and remittances of the balances due on commission account. Remittances from Moisie in cash up to end of March, by transfer entries thereafter.

(14.) Remittances by transfer entries. Explanations the same as No. 6.

(15.) Remittances by deposits, by certified telegram accounts for collection from the Indian Department, &c.; and by collections from Canadian Pacific Railway of balances due to Government line on business transferred at the Qu'Appelle Transfer Office.

The lack of frequent mail communication between the offices interferes with the despatch of business in connection with the accounts, which would otherwise come to hand with some degree of promptness. The District Superintendent's absence from office in connection with construction work, affords an explanation of the delay attending the returns for July. The deposits reported on account of Revenue collections, subsequent to what is included in 1887-88, amount to \$1,174.92. The District Superintendent has been advised of the necessity for more prompt returns; and upon receipt of information requested, it will be seen what portion of the amount of these deposits is on account to end of June, and what amount is due for July and later. As soon as practicable arrangements will be made for the remittance of the revenue of the North West lines by transfer entries.

Memorandum C—Referred to in the letter of Sept. 22, 1888, showing how the revenue collected by other lines for the Government lines is accounted for.

It is done in three different ways, viz. :—

1. By monthly settlements upon the check reports of the Transfer Office.

This is done in the case of Anticosti Island.

Upon the receipt each month of the Check Report from the Gaspé Transfer Office, a letter is written to the Secretary of the G. N. W. Telegraph Company Toronto, giving the figures, thus:—

This balance is remitted to me in cash and comprises the deposit made up on account "Gaspé Transfer."

Under this arrangement the entire collections (for this line and for other lines) at Anticosti Island offices are remitted to me direct and deposited as net revenue from "Anticosti."

Note.—When the balance is the other way it is allowed to stand until the next month that brings a balance in our favor, when it is deducted. In this way obviating the necessity for remittances from here. The amounts are now considerable.

2. By periodical collections from other lines.

This is done in the case of the C. P. Ry. Qu'Appelle Transfer Office, N.W. Lines. The agent at Qu'Appelle handles the business for both lines; his statements presented to us and to the company necessarily agree and show whether the balance is due to the Govt. Line or to the Company.

Almost invariably the balance is due to the Govt. Line, when it is the other way it is subsequently deducted from a balance in favor of the Govt. Line. The last settlement was made to August 31, 1887, by a transfer entry (in paying a freight account) \$1,676.61. The total balance due by the C. P. R. to Govt. Line since August, 1887, up to the end of June (last statement to hand) is \$407, which will be deposited to the credit of North-West Tel. Revenue when remitted.

3. By monthly settlement, locally, at the Transfer Offices.

This is done at Moose Jaw (Wood Mountain Line), and at all the other points of transfer on our lines, excepting Gaspé and Qu'Appelle above mentioned.

Local settlements can always be made where sufficient business is done locally to yield cash for the remittance of balances due to the Government or to the other line.

For instance :— Quebec Office is the Transfer Office for the Grosse Isle Quarantine Line and the G. N. W. Tel. Co.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 16th inst., enclosing twelve statements of Wharfingers, and six statements of Shipping Masters at Quebec.

I would now beg to submit the following Rules and Regulations, which, it seems to me, are applicable to this class of Revenue:

1. The list of Wharfs and Piers should be divided into two classes according to the amounts of the receipts; (a) those where the receipts per season are \$25 or more; (b) those where the receipts are less than that amount.

2. The Wharfingers of class (a) should be furnished with receipt books with stubs and printed consecutive numbers, and a copy of the enclosed Rules and Regulations in connection with same. Books to be returned at close of each season with the statement.

3. All Wharfingers should be required to make a declaration before a Magistrate or Notary, of the correctness of the statements rendered by them. The form of the declaration should be printed at foot of each statement form.

4. Each Wharfinger should render his half-year statement and deposit the whole or balance of his receipts immediately after the close of each period.

5. These statements should be examined in your Department and compared (a) with the stubs of receipts where such have been used; (b) with the tariff of rates or charges; (c) with the deposits. They should be checked arithmetically and the words "examined and found correct," with the signature of the examining officer, should be written across the bottom.

(6.) As soon as possible after the close of each half-year these statements and a summary of them should be forwarded to this office. This summary should state; (a) No. of statement; (b) the Wharf or Pier; (c) the Wharfinger; (d) the period covered; (e) the gross revenue; (f) the rate and amount of commission; (g) the other expenses if any; (h) the balance due the Government; (j) the date and amount of the deposit receipt; (k) the amount credited to the current fiscal year; (l) the amount credited to the previous fiscal year. A list should be given of Wharfingers who have forwarded deposit receipts or funds to cover receipts, but no statements, and of those who have forwarded neither deposit receipts nor statements. At foot of said summary and lists a certificate should be given, signed by the Deputy Minister and countersigned by the Accountant, as follows:—I certify that the above is a summary of the Wharfingers' returns received during the period ended

, that the statements have been examined in this Department and are correct and complete in every respect; and that efforts have been made to procure statements and deposits from those in default.

I shall write you a separate letter with my observations on the statements received.

SIR,—I have the acknowledge the receipt of your letter of 30th ult., and 15 returns of Wharfingers; but without any Departmental Summary or Certificate.

I would beg to call your attention to my letters (2) of the 23rd February last on this subject, to which I have had no reply.

I have now to make the following observations:—

(1.) Goderich Pier. R. P. Bearman, lessee of Lots A, B and C, at \$565 per annum, does not appear to have paid anything on account of the present fiscal year. Jos. Williams, lessee of Lot D, at \$150 per annum, only paid \$55 on 28th March last. Were these leases fully paid up to 30th June last?

(2.) St. Lawrence Steam Nav. Co. This Company is the lessee of 6 wharfs on the St. Lawrence below Quebec, at a yearly rental of \$580. Nothing has been paid during the present fiscal year. I understand the rent for several years past has not been paid. I have had no reply to my letters of 17th June and 15th November, 1887, asking information on this matter. Would you please inform me what steps have been taken by your Department towards collecting these rents.

(4.) I observe that several wharfingers have paid for repairs to wharfs out of their collections.

This is contrary to the Statute and objectionable for several reasons, and should be stopped. In the meantime vouchers should be asked for the expenditure made, and an application sent to this office asking for a transfer to credit of Revenue account.

(5.) According to the list I have, there are still the following numbers of wharfingers for whose account neither deposit nor return has reached this office, viz.: Ontario, 2; Quebec, 17; Nova Scotia, 6; New Brunswick, 1; Prince Edward Island, 18.

A return should be made by each wharfinger; if there are no collections a "nil" return should be made.

(6.) I need not again return to the forms of returns, declarations of wharfingers and forms of Departmental summaries which were covered by my letter of 23rd February last.

I would ask that the Departmental summary should specify whether an item is connected with a harbor or a wharf.

SIR,—Referring to your letter of the 15th ultimo, making observations in reference to Goderich pier and other matters, I beg to inform you, in reply to your inquiries as to whether the leases of Goderich pier were fully paid up to the 30th of June last, that Mr. R. P. Bearman had paid rent to the 23rd of February, 1888, and Mr. Joseph Williams to the 15th of March, 1888, and that as the rents are payable in advance the lessees have been requested to remit the amount now due.

With reference to your inquiry as to what steps had been taken towards collecting rents from the St. Lawrence Steam Navigation Company, I have to inform you that no rent has been collected for some time back for the wharves below Quebec made use of by the company. The question of bringing these and other wharves under the provisions of the Act 40 Victoria, Chapter 17, has been under the consideration of the Department, and a report was sent to Council on the matter on the 1st of June, 1886, but the report in question has not been acted on and the matter stands in abeyance.

With reference to deposits having been received from certain wharfingers specified in your letter but no returns having been furnished to your office, I beg to inform you that several of the items refer to collections made by Harbor masters, which are separate and distinct from the collections made by wharfingers.

I enclose herewith returns relating to Harbor masters, and I will communicate with you again in regard to the wharfingers' returns.

With reference to the payment of repairs to wharfs, having been made out of collections by wharfingers, I beg to inform you that instructions have been given that the expense of any repairs shall not in future be defrayed out of collections, and wharfingers have been requested to forward vouchers for outlay made.

With reference to your request that returns should be forwarded from wharfingers who have neither made deposits nor returns, I beg to inform you that steps will be taken to procure and forward the returns required.

SIR,—Referring to your letter of the 23rd of February last, submitting rules and regulations which you consider applicable for audit of Revenue received from wharfs and piers, I beg to inform you that no arrangements have been made as yet for putting in force the rules referred to. On looking into them I find that while the system proposed is good it will be a matter of some difficulty to have it carried out. As you are aware, the entire Revenue collected from wharfs amounts only to a small sum, and that at some of the wharfs the receipts are very trifling and made up of small collections. I think it would serve all purposes required if a yearly statement only were asked from the wharfingers, and as some of them are men with little education and not accustomed to keep books, I will be glad if you can simplify the rules so that they may be able to carry them out without unnecessary trouble.

SIR,—I have your letter of the 7th instant in reply to mine of the 23rd February last, and I regret to learn that no arrangements have yet been made towards putting in force the rules which I then sent you.

You say "that while the system proposed is good it will be a matter of some difficulty to have it carried out," and "I will be glad if you can simplify the rules so that they (the wharfingers) may be able to carry them out without unnecessary trouble." These rules were prepared and based on the information that I had before me, and if you would particularize any changes which you think it would be desirable to make, I will be most happy to consider them.

I stipulated for half-yearly returns, because, as the printed forms were so worded, I supposed it was so determined by your Department. In connection with the organization of a system for the audit of the Revenue accounts, I have avoided, as far as possible, the disturbance of existing arrangements.

Wharfingers coming under Class B might, I think, be required to render only yearly returns; others half-yearly, as now.

However, notwithstanding that only a yearly return is made, the rule that whenever \$25 or more is on hand it should be deposited or remitted, should still be enforced. See Rule 5, page 5, part IV of Audit Report, 1887.

I find that \$78.85 has come to account for May receipts, but you have not sent any return.

The deposit for each month's receipts is not usually made till towards the middle of the succeeding month, and the receipts for August were not deposited till 12th October following.

Would you please inform me why there are no receipts from any other Shipping Master.

From the reading of the Shipping Act, I judge that the master or owner of the vessel pays these fees in the first instance, and in that case, the system of receipt books with stubs, with printed consecutive numbers should be utilized. I have already sent you a copy.

The returns should be examined in your Department, compared with the stubs of receipts and deposits, and certified by the examining officer. I am returning the statements referred to above.

I observe that the earnings of the Steamer "Lansdowne" are from 15th to 24th Dec. 1887, and of the Steamer "Northern Light" from Dec. 28, 1887, to Jan. 14, 1888, and from April 15 to May 4, 1888, and that the returns of the Steamer "Lansdowne" are not signed by any one, and the returns of Steamer "Northern Light" by the Purser only. All returns should be signed by the Captain and Purser of the vessel, and examined and certified by the Agent of your Department.

I also observe that certain expenses are deducted from the gross earnings, and the balance only deposited. Why are these expenses not paid and charged as are all other expenses in connection with the running of the steamers? In any case the gross receipts should be deposited, see 49 Vic., chap. 29, sec. 27.

At the close of each fiscal year a summary of the receipts of each steamer during the whole year should be prepared and signed by the captain and purser, and it should be examined and certified by the agent of your Department.

The Departmental summary furnished with the returns from the steamers, should have the following certificate attached, viz.: (1) I certify that the above is a correct summary of the returns from the different Dominion steamers during the fiscal year ended ; (2) that these returns have been examined in this Department and are correct, both arithmetically and in every other respect; (3) that the amounts collected are the amounts which appear, after examination in this Department, to be the amounts which should have been collected.

Return of Chas. Wilkins.—A deduction is made of \$2, but no explanation nor voucher is furnished. The gross revenue should in all cases be deposited. (See Chap. 29, Sec. 27, Con. Stat.)

Return of Geo. Rowlings.—The expenses of seizure are deducted but no vouchers furnished. The same remark as above again applies.

Receipt Books—I am returning, as requested, the three you sent me. I was never furnished with a list of the agents to whom receipt books were issued. At the close of each season all receipt books should be returned to Department whether entirely used or not.

In the case of Chas. Bertrand, a deduction of \$10 is made for legal expenses in some suit. An application should be made to credit Fisheries Revenue, and debit the proper vote with the amount.

SIR,—As requested in your letter of March 5 last, on the subject of "Grass-hopper Seed grain Advances," I may explain to you it was not earlier answered, as the Department was about to send an Accountant to Winnipeg to make an audit of the books, accounts and securities relating to such advances, which was a work that took much time.

A list of the debts to individuals for seed grain advances, as furnished by Mr. W. C. B. Grahame at the date of March 19 last, is herewith enclosed; also, list of payments by individuals to the same date.

As respects the regulations to which you refer, I may inform you that the two sums voted by Parliament, viz., \$60,000 and \$25,000 for advances to settlers for relief in the years 1875 and 1876 were placed at the disposal of a local committee of which His Grace Archbishop Taché was Chairman. Mr. Hespeler, the Immigration Agent of the Department at Winnipeg, represented the Department on such Committee. The Committee made advances of supplies purchased by the votes to individuals on application, in virtue of authority conferred by the Minister of Agriculture.

A percentage in advance of the cost of the articles purchased was added by direction of the Minister of Agriculture to the supplies furnished in order to cover expenses, and no interest was charged on the mortgage securities until January 1, 1878. It was also ministerially ordered that all costs of collection should be deducted from the amounts received, in view of the particular nature of the administration through a local committee. The Committee took the security of mortgages on a short form, which was approved, and the Local Government passed a law in order to enable a special registration of such mortgages to be made without any expense, in the Land Office at Winnipeg. Mr. Hespeler was authorized to make the collection and to deduct an amount of \$100 a year for his salary for that special service, and deductions for assistance.

The same arrangement was continued with Mr. Grabame, except that his deduction for salary was limited to \$200 a year, with an assistant the same as Mr. Hespeler.

On 12th November, 1888, the further collection of these mortgages was placed in the hands of Mr. H. H. Smith, Land Commissioner, without any allowance for salary or expenses.

SIR,—I have your letter of the 14th instant, enclosing a list of debits to individuals for seed grain advances, and a list of payments by individuals, both made up to the 15th March last.

According to the public accounts the expenditure in connection with those advances was as follows: In 1875-76, \$83,405.80, and in 1876-77, \$1,978.29, making a total of \$85,384.09.

I have had the list of debits furnished by you added, and I find that it totals \$75,951.59, leaving a balance of \$9,432.50 of the amounts advanced unaccounted for. I have to ask for a statement in detail of the disposition of this balance, plus the percentage which you state was added to cover expenses. I should also like to have a copy of the account of each person to whom an advance was made, showing the date of the advance, the interest charged, the date and amount of the repayment made, and the balance due.

The payments by individuals amounted to \$31,765.16 on the 13th March, as shown by your statement. I have to ask for a statement in detail showing the deposits made to the credit of the Receiver General, and the disposition made of the balance of the amount received.

It would be desirable to carry all the statements asked for up to the date of the transfer of the business to Commissioner Smith in November last. Vouchers should be furnished for all expenditure.

SIR,—In reply to your letter to Mr. Burgess, of the 22nd May last, with reference to the returns of Dominion Lands and Crown Timber Agents, I have the honor, by direction, to make the following observations:—The statement for the month of July last will be sent to you at an early date, and thereafter a statement will be sent to you regularly every month.

With reference to the forms accompanying your letter, the one to be signed by the Deputy Minister will require to be altered in several respects; viz :

Instead of the amount received for each district, the total amount of receipts on account of Dominion Lands, Timber and Mines, &c., will be entered and reference for details will have to be made to a separate schedule, which will have to be certified by the officer in charge of the preparation of the same.

The words "and compared with the stubs of receipts issued" will be struck out, as such comparison can only be made by the Inspector of Dominion Lands Agencies on his tours of inspection, and consequently, cannot be done monthly. The books containing these stubs must remain in the offices of the various agents until such inspection is made, after which they will be forwarded to this Department and transmitted to you.

The words of paragraph No. 4, "that the amounts collected are the amounts which should have been collected" will also be struck out, as the carrying out of this would at times cause great delay in sending the monthly statements from the Department, as the Department is almost continually in correspondence with its agents concerning discrepancies which occur in their returns and which it frequently requires considerable time to adjust. Moreover the fact that these amounts are ultimately checked over and made to agree, renders it unnecessary that the same should be done monthly.

SIR,—Referring to previous correspondence on the subject of the examination and audit of Civil Service Examination Fees, I would now beg to state that the Secretary of the Board, Mr. LeSueur, has sent me a list of the candidates who attended the November examinations. He also sent me the permits which were issued to, and returned by them, and states that 446 Permits were issued and only 384 candidates presented themselves.

For auditing purposes I cannot see that this system of Permits is of any use, there being no means of checking and determining how many candidates attended. Probably they are a convenience to the Board for other reasons; but to enable me to make an efficient audit, it will be necessary to furnish the sub-examiners with books of receipts and stubs, bearing printed consecutive numbers, out of which a receipt should be issued to each candidate present at an examination. These books should be returned after the examination to the Secretary of the Board, and should be by him forwarded to this office with his statement. After being checked here, the books can be returned, and any blank receipts utilized at a future examination.

SIR,—The list of the candidates present at the last Civil Service examination, embraced 384 names, each name being vouched for by a "Permit." When examining the work papers of the candidates, however, we discovered that two men had been admitted for whom "Permits" had not been sent to the office (though the men had been supplied with them), viz.: J. B. Turcotte, Montreal, and W. H. Marrs, Toronto. Upon investigation, I found that the first named man had been a candidate in May, when he failed in one subject only. Under the rules he was entitled to come up for

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that one subject, and was so informed, when he forwarded an application and, in conformity with the old usage, enclosed \$2. The other man was also to be a candidate in May, and presented himself, but was taken suddenly ill and had to be carried home. On the representation of Dr. Thorburn, who was examiner at Toronto, he was allowed to come up in November in virtue of the fee he had paid in May, which, at his request, had been held over for the purpose. This will reconcile the discrepancy noted in your letter of the 2nd—to hand this morning. Considering that this was the first occasion upon which Permits were used, the fact that 2 only out of 384 missed, is, I conceive, good evidence in their favor. I shall recall the permits that were not presented, and if the holders desire to come up in May, will substitute those for that examination. In any case, as the permits are only good for the examination named in them, the outstanding ones have become mere waste papers.

SIR,—I have to inform you that books of receipt lettered have
this day been mailed to your address and you must be guided in the form of receipt
to be given by the nature of the payment made by the payor.

These forms of receipt are to be used on and after the 1st July next; and no
moneys after that date must be paid on Indian account to any person in connection
with Indian Affairs from the money that may pass into your hands, other than an-
nuity or interest payments, but must be remitted to the Department for credit of
Indian Funds, to be paid out, if necessary, as approved of by the Department.

On and after the 1st July next, you must attach to your monthly returns of col-
lections the duplicate receipts marked "For the Auditor General," properly filled in,
and signed by the payor and yourself, and forward the same to the Department with
the moneys collected. Receipts must be issued to all persons from whom moneys are
collected, and all remittances to the Department of whatever nature should be ac-
companied by a detailed return on the forms furnished by the Department, a supply
of which is enclosed herewith.

If from any cause one of the receipts should be spoiled, the number of such re-
ceipt should be written in the monthly statement with the word "spoiled" opposite,
and the form for the Auditor General and for the payee should be sent forward with
the return.

SIR,—Referring to your letter of the 6th instant, on the subject of auditing refunds on account of Mounted Police expenditure.

I enclose herewith statements in detail of the refunds placed to the credit of the Receiver General during the month of January last, which I trust will furnish the information you desire to obtain.

You further wish to be informed on the following matters:—(1) What are the regulations governing sales; (2) by whose authority they are made; (3) if by public auction, tender or otherwise; and (4) what statements are rendered in reference thereto; also the regulations in reference to purchases of discharges and deserters' pay.

I beg to say that when Police Stores become unserviceable, a Board of Officers is held upon them, and such articles as are found to be worthless are sold by public auction.

In the same manner, when horses are reported by the Veterinary Surgeons to be unfit for service, a Board is assembled, and if on examination they are condemned, they are sold by public auction.

Some time ago the Commissioner reported that he did not consider the price obtained at public auction satisfactory, and that he could get much better prices by disposing of the condemned horses to settlers and others by private sale. A number of horses have been sold in this manner and I think the prices realized justify the Commissioner's recommendation, but fearing that the system of selling by private sale would sooner or later result in charges of favoritism to certain purchasers, instructions were recently given that no more cast horses were to be disposed of by private sale.

Copies of the Board proceedings and all papers relating to condemned horses and stores are forwarded to the Department.

With regard to the regulations respecting the discharge by purchase of members of the Mounted Police, I beg to state that by an Order in Council of the 6th

Sept., 1882, the discharge of members of the Mounted Police was authorized on the payment of a sum equal to \$3 per month, for each month of the unexpired portion of the term of engagement, but the amount payable, must in no case, be less than \$50.

With regard to deserters' pay, any pay due at the time of desertion, is confiscated, and after paying mess stoppages and washing bills, the balances together with the proceeds of the sale of the deserter's kit are deposited to the credit of the Receiver General.

If this letter and the statements herewith do not give all the information you desire, I beg that you will let me know on what points you wish to have further particulars.
