Jenkins wins by acclamation

U of A Students' Union president for 1962-63, by acclamation, is David E. Jenkins: native Edmontonian, world traveler, model Conservative, father of two, law student, and Gateway editor-in-chief. The last Students' Union president by acclamation was Lou Hyndman in 1958-59.

Last summer Jenkins was a World University Service scholar to Sweden. While overseas he also saw Moscow, Leningrad, East and West Berlin, Paris, London and New York. In Paris he attended a university North Atlantic Treaty Organization conference at NATO headquarters. His qualifications for the scholarship included an academic average over 80 per cent.

This year he is a member of Students' Council and Gold Key Society.

Jenkins has sat in Model Parliament for five years. A member of the Campus Conservative Club, he was vice-president in charge of policy last term.

He has represented U of A students at several student conferences: the NFCUS seminar in Vancouver, 1960; and Canadian University Press assemblies in Toronto, London, Ontario, Saskatoon and Edmonton.

Until Christmas he was Western Region President of CUP. Since then, he has been on the national executive.

Jenkins is a member of Phi Kappa Pi fraternity.

During his years on campus he has participated in intramural sports such as hockey, golf, curling, and cross-country. His favorite sport is golf.

His first two years on campus, Jenkins covered university sports for the Edmonton Journal. His weekly column was titled "Inside the Bearcage." He has worked at The Journal each summer, and stayed out of school one year to work there.

"I think it should be mandatory for every university student to work a

years," he says. "It jolts any boy." During the 1957-58 term, his second year, he organized and was president of the mixed bowling club.

His main activity has been The Gateway. In the past he has been managing editor, sports editor and advertising manager.

Mrs. Dreena Jenkins is from Wilkie, Saskatchewan. She majored in English at U of A.

Asked for comment, Jenkins urged students to elect hard workers as faculty representatives to Students' Council.

"The friendliest guy is not necessarily the hardest worker. I have a few ideas in mind that will require workers to carry them out, not people along for a free ride."

The incoming president thanks all those who supported him, particularly his campaign manager John Lauder, Eng. 2.

As near as can be determined by searching through dusty Gateway files, only one other Students' Union president has been a Gateway editor: D. J. Wesley Oke was Editor 1926-27, President 1927-28.

Hyndman has own theories on acclamations

The large number of acclamations for Students' Council positions is explained by as many theories as there are persons discussing the topic. However, one thing is clear: the increasing realization of the past few years that several positions—particularly those on the Students' Union executive—are increasingly hard desk work and decreasingly public prestige may dampen the enthusiasm of many. Nonetheless, there were a large number of likely prospects who had been maneuvering to run if they wished; as it turned out, they didn't. This fact points up the need for a long hard look at a week long, exhausting, campus-wide campaign through 7,500 students.



Voting is on Friday, March 2, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. except at SUB where the poll is open from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.



(i) it is desirable that a permanent co-ordinating committee be established; this committee would be composed of representatives from clubs and groups with related interests, and would, thereby, more effectively strengthen the links between the students' union and student activities.

(ii) it is desirable to further develop Freshman Introduction Week in order to better orientate the freshman student to the university community in general, and student activities in particular, and


(iii) it is desirable to schedule social events in conjunction with the week-end athletic program so as to increase student interest and campus participation.

For the support and encouragement I have received, I would like to extend my sincere thanks to the people who nominated me for this position, and also to Bernie Harvard, my campaign manager.



Schepanovich on five point platform

Branny Schepanovich worked this year on the Varsity Guest Weekend Committee. He sat in Model Parliament for two years, this year as a cabinet minister. These, combined with organization and streamlining of The Gateway news department as News Editor, have given him the understanding necessary for the heavy job of co-ordinator of student activities. Here is his platform:

New problems must be faced next year. A rapidly expanding student body will place additional stress on already overtaxed student facilities. Here are some specific issues the co-ordinator and students' council must deal with in the next term.

● Publication of an activities bulletin and revitalization of the Promotions Committee—in order to make information concerning student activities more accessible. This will include increased publicity for athletics.

● Homecoming Weekend should be scheduled much earlier in the fall term, when weather conditions are more favorable. The two held so far have been snowed under.

● Thorough investigation of the proposed semester system and its implications for individual students and all student activities.

● Continued co-operation with the administration, to ensure maximum realization of student potential.

● Ensure fullest possible student benefits from new residences, SUB expansion, and the new education building. For example, adequate lounge, cafeteria and recreation space.

Pre-doc, pre-nurse beginning campaign to pick-up vice-presidential ticket

One of the chief problems facing a student body and its representatives is a lack of good communication with others in the university community.

Because of the vice-president's duties of an executive character and as liaison with a number of important university organizations (notably the World University Service, the Friends of the University, the Wauneita Society and others) she is in a particularly opportune position to promote better communication. 
Vice-presidential candidate, Anne Dodds, will stress continuity, time, and the development of a Student Volunteer Service in the forthcoming campaign.


