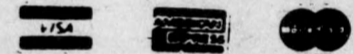

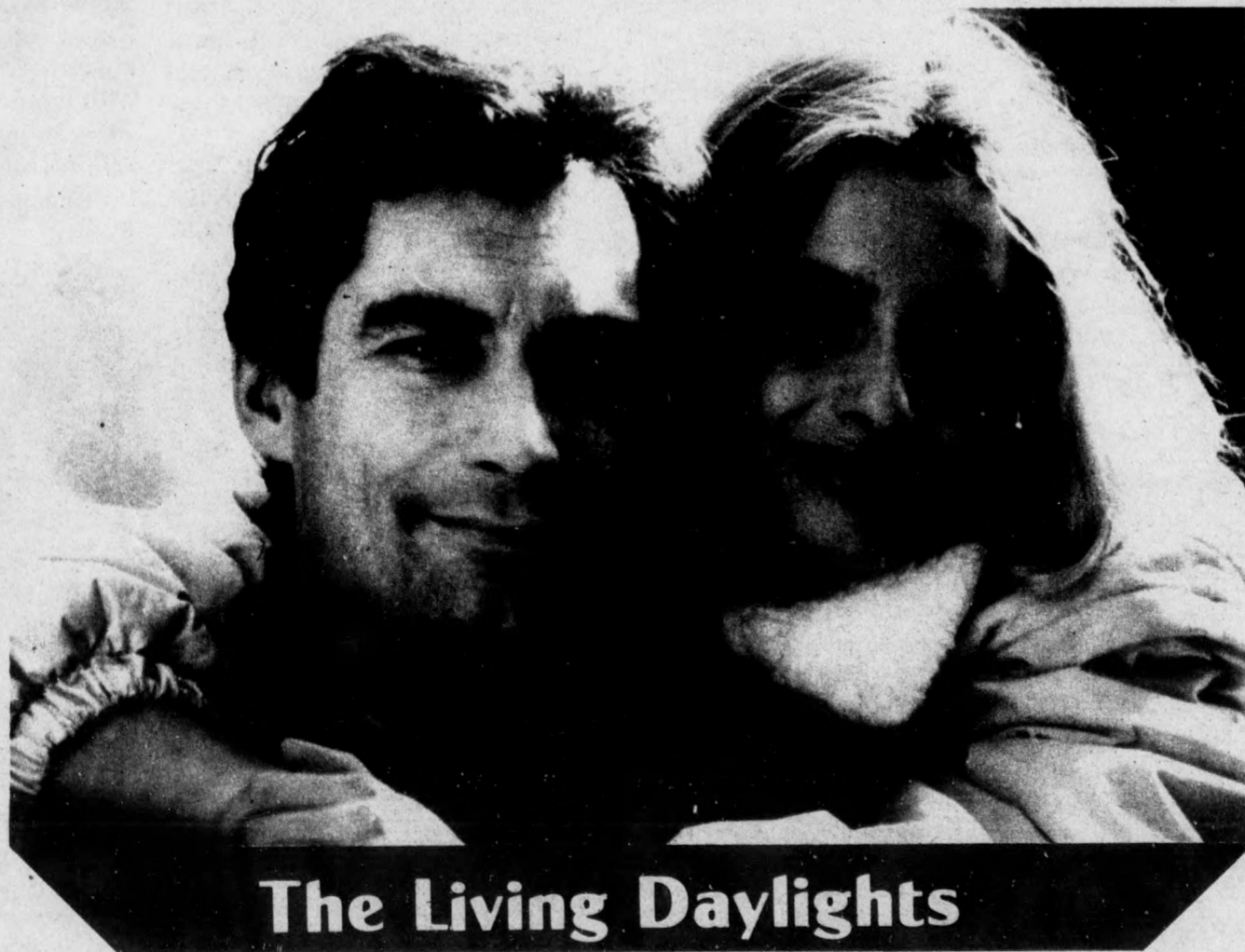

Gleaner misrepresents case

Could you imagine what it would be like if there were two John Bosnitches? When Anthony English had his complaints against *The Fredericton Daily Gleaner*, and the *Saint John Telegraph Journal* brought before a three person panel of the Atlantic Press Council, the text of the decision mentioned that English was "assisted by one John Bosnitch."

English filed three complaints against each *the Gleaner* and *the Telegraph Journal*, and although the Press Council ruled in favor of English for only the first of the three complaints against each paper, English was "very pleased" with the results.

"Childish Law Suit Dismissed"

English filed three identical complaints against each paper, alleging:

(1) *the Gleaner* and *the Telegraph* "published false and misleading statements which have harmed my reputation and have held me up to contempt and ridicule. In this sense, they are an example of libel and defamation. . ."

(2) the two papers "did not publish or acknowledge my hand-delivered letters of rebuttal."

(3) the two papers "did not

publish a correction or a retraction or an apology."

These three complaints came after *the Gleaner* published on May 15, 1987 a story entitled "Court Reserves Decision", written by Richard Duplain and a May 25, 1987 story in *the Telegraph* entitled "Childish Law Suit Dismissed" written by Stephen Ewart.

Mr. Tom Crowther, President and Publisher of *the Gleaner*, said that part of the problem was the uniqueness of the court proceedings. Mr. Crowther also said he feels badly about having the article judged unbalanced, but this should be considered with respect to the weight and number of articles printed by *the Gleaner*.

The Gleaner's story was judged unbalanced, stemming from the fact that while the plaintiff's (i.e. English) lawyer's argument was summarized in only two paragraphs, the defendants received nineteen paragraphs.

The Telegraph, however, was judged to be inaccurate since they attempted to attribute a deficit of \$174,000.00 to Mike Bennet, Tony English, Hugh Brown, and John Bosnitch.

Since the Press Council is not mandated with the power to punish the papers, English feels

that while he has "finally got some justice," he is considering on his own of taking further court action against *the Telegraph*.

English feels that while the Press Council's decision was a "clean cut victory," he is still feeling repercussions from *the Telegraph's* story in that he says some potential employers have expressed reluctance to hire him based on the press coverage.

According to Bosnitch, the Press Council decision was a "complete victory for the Student Union, Inc." and that he wanted to prove from the beginning that the press was setting an "improper tone to the Student Union dispute." Also, he said that the "only recourse for tangible punishment is to take the papers to court."

And so it goes. . .

Air Canada on strike

Flying Home with Air Canada for the holiday season? Visions of long lines, lost luggage and no seats dancing in your head? Since an end to Air Canada ground workers strike is nowhere in sight, students and faculty are encouraged to consult with Air Canada or their travel agents for further arrangements. Cancelling your seats now, with the strike in progress, will allow you to get your money back from Air Canada. Travellers will be protected from penalties if they inform Air Canada five days prior to their flight. Air Canada will try to reroute passengers on other airlines, in order to deal with the problems caused

by the strike. If Air Canada is notified two days beforehand, they will try to reroute the passengers as if they had stand-by status. Air Canada has been servicing stand-by passengers since the strike began. In Fredericton, passengers have been reseated on the 3:30 pm Canadian Airlines flights.

For peace of mind, Maritime Travel has been helping students change their flights to other airlines, such as CP Air. However, the changes may cost up to \$30, and certain class seats may not be available on certain airlines.

"Some people think its worth the cost, to avoid the complication," said a travel agent at Maritime Travel's UNB Branch.

Ski time at Crabbe Mountain

The Maritime ski industry is booming and Crabbe Mountain Winter Park is growing to meet the needs of winter sports enthusiasts. Incorporated 26 years ago, Crabbe Mountain provides alpine facilities servicing skiers from northern Maine, Quebec and the Maritimes. Situated on the north face of New Brunswick's highest groomed vertical (260 m or 853' elevation), fourteen trails provide varied terrain from easy beginner to challenging expert runs.

A new Doppelmayr quadruple chair lift has been installed this past year, increasing the previous uphill capacity by 120%. There are 134 chairs on the new lift and skiers will reach the top of the mountain in seven minutes. The new chair will operate as the primary lift and two t-bars will be operated when crowds warrant. The pony lift will continue to operate free of charge on the beginners hill.

In the past, when the sun set, Crabbe Mountain said good-bye to all the skiers for the day. That is no more!

Skiers are invited to enjoy the excitement of skiing under the stars. Four of the best trails have been installed with high pressure sodium lights and Crabbe Mountain will have extended operating hours beginning December 26, 1987. Plans are to operate the new quadruple chair lift every evening from December 26 to January 2nd until 9:30 p.m. For the remainder of the season, regular hours will be observed (Sunday to Tuesday - 9:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. and Wednesday through Saturday 9:30 a.m. - 9:30 p.m.).

A large portion of the \$2.5 million development was spent on snowmaking installation. A unique air-wave system is now operational on five (5) of the most popular trails. The only system of its kind in New Brunswick, the air-water snowmaking equipment makes snow production possible at warmer temperatures than the airless systems now in place at other Maritime ski resorts. Crabbe Mountain opted for the superior air-water method to

make early December start-up and extended spring skiing possible annually. Crabbe started making snow on November 24th and will be making snow continuously, as weather permits, in order to provide a reliable base for the

entire ski season.

Crabbe Mountain Winter Park will open for the 1987-88 ski season on Saturday, December 5th, from 9:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m.

Grand opening ceremonies are scheduled for Saturday,

December 19th. Distinguished representatives from federal, provincial and civic governments will be on hand to officially open the facilities in the \$2.5 million expansion project.

Investigation to follow

One of the Vice-Presidents of the Student Union is requesting that the Union initiate an investigation into the operation of the University's Student newspaper.

"There has been an allegation made that the newspaper's offices are an unhealthy and hostile environment, and that the rights of one staff member have been violated", states Lawrence Hansen, Vice President (Internal).

He mentions that "It is incumbent upon the Student Union, as the paper's publisher, to investigate this allegation and either satisfy ourselves that it is ill-founded, or if there does exist a problem, to do something to correct it."

Hansen intends to bring the matter to the attention of the Student Union Executive and to Council.

Share the flame

Last Sunday morning the Olympic torch arrived in Fredericton on its cross country odyssey.

Hundreds of people lined the streets of downtown Fredericton, despite the sub zero temperatures, to catch a view of the flame as it made its way along to a ceremony at City Hall around 10 o'clock.

Amid cheers, Alden Briggs, a Fredericton native, carried the torch to City Hall. Local people packed Phoenix Square. Ceremony host, Jim Hunter, a former Olympic alpine skier, declared that "Fredericton is now part of Olympic history." Premier Frank McKenna and Mayor Brad Woodside, on behalf of the province and city, also made statements saying they were proud to have the flame in the area.

Heidi and Howdy, the official Olympic mascots, were also

on hand helping to spread the joy. The two were pictured with children who held candles symbolizing the

After the ceremony Cecile Babineau took the torch to get it restarted on its journey to the 88 Winter Olympic game in Calgary.

A mammoth undertaking, the torch relay will go through all ten provinces while on its 88 day, 18,000 kilometre trek. Several thousand proud Canadians will be required to carry the torch, before it reaches McMahon Stadium in Calgary on February 13.

I regret to inform you that AIESEC-UNB has lost the game of "musical offices." As of Nov. 30, AIESEC no longer has an office. For the first time in five years, AIESEC not only doesn't have an office in the SUB, but we have no office at all, anywhere. After the recent Student Union shuffle of office allocations in the SUB, AIESEC is the odd man out.

The last two student governments have in the last two years moved us around the SUB three times. Our telephone number was changed twice in the last two months. This is a grave problem for us because we are part of an international student organization. As our full name states, we are the International Association of Students in Economics, Business and Computer Science. We have to maintain contact with 36 AIESEC local committees like ours across Canada, plus over 500 others in 63 countries. It drastically affects our day to day activities, particularly the organization of our many projects.

The *Brunswickan* feature of

two weeks ago gave a very good summary of what AIESEC is. We are here for all students. Our annual Career Day is organized for the benefit of all students on campus. From time to time we also organize seminars, guest speakers and business luncheons. We try to offer a link between the "student world" and the "real world." Our membership is open to all faculties. Unfortunately, only students of Economics, Business and Computer Science are eligible to take part in our International Traineeship Program.

When someone says the name Bryan Ferry the first thing that comes to mind should be the name Roxy Music. Ferry was the singer, song writer and driving force behind the band that Rolling Stone named the most progressive rock band of the 70's and 80's.

Ferry's latest release sounds quite different than Boys and Girls but the style from his last release is still there. The main difference is that he has picked up the tempo which makes this album much more danceable.

Look out for this album at the record shop. Top forty teeny boppers would not like this album, therefore don't get it for your little brothers or sisters for xmas. But for any serious music lover it is a good buy. For any serious music lover get Bryan Ferry's "Boys and Girls", it is a must for any collection.

A long time ago when I was but a mere stripling in grade six, I can remember my kid brother rushing home rather excitedly with one of those 'Great Mysteries Of Our Times' type magazines where you get issue two free as well as some tacky gift. Of course I called him an idiot for buying it but, sure enough, when he was safely tucked in bed I snuck in and grabbed the free gift. Why? It was a flexi-disc thing (ie. one of those records printed on cellophane that occasionally pop up in periodicals everywhere) that purported to contain messages 'from beyond the grave' recorded from some special area of the short wave radio band. This I couldn't resist - what a bloody laugh! Captured souls indeed! So I put the object in question on the turntable of my little mono player and proceeded to listen dumb-stuck to

Strangely enough I nearly shit myself in total terror. It was obviously fake but sounded really evil.

So it was this little vignette that immediately flashed across my mind after listening to the latest opus from self confessed necrophiles, Skinny Puppy. Rather than carefully collecting a range of sound effects to spice up dour walling synths and ultra static percussion it seems as if after some fetid deal with Old Nick, the pups have been allowed to tune into the exclusive wavelengths of suffering and pain. MOD (METHOD OF DESTRUCTION) - "USA for M.O.D." (Megaforce Records)

Hardcore and speedmetal band. I'd love to tell you this is pure crap, but unfortunately, I can't. They play well together, know how to handle their instruments, and the album has good sound quality. Heavy on guitars and bass. That's where any form of praise stops. If I believed in record-burning, this album would be the first on the pile. Assuming all of the band men contributed to the lyrics, I can safely say these fellows are socially underdeveloped idiots. I didn't think this type of mentality still existed, eg. From "Aren't You Hungry". "America" has its own problems, that's what should come first, so fuck those nigger's charity, and let them die of thirst". MICHELE AGE OF CHANCE 1000 Years of Trouble (Virgin)

Plagiarism is the name of the disease in Blighty at the moment - steal it, lift it, rip it off ... call it what you want it's going on at a tremendous rate. The crowning glory of this particular art form was eventually manifested just recently by a massive number one smash in the form of *Pump Up The Volume* by MARRS (4 AD Records) which was a collection of about 15 separate dance records hit with a sledgehammer and mixed together with a stumbling electrobeat - the kids loved it. Witness also the Scottish yolks the Justified Ancients of Mu-Mu who on their album 1987 - What

the Fuck is Going On? pinch huge great sections of records such as Abba's *Dancing Queen*, the Beatles' *Let It Be*, etc. and paste them into scrapbook of aural depravation. Abba have actually demanded that all copies be recalled and destroyed (- what sour bastards they are-Ed.) or face HUGE legal consequences. From Leeds in England the Age of Chance are just one of the number of the clever-pending-to-the-left young herberts that have taken this brand of musical statement to heart and a pretty good example of my last little blurb can be found in *1000 Years of Trouble*.

Of course it's basically a rock hard rhythm coloured with 'found' noises, phrases and sounds: a system employed primarily by the B-boys and Yo-kids off the streets of the Great American Metropolis armed only with a ghetto blaster, beat box and a shoulder full of sharp pointy chips. In this department Age of Chance, who are conspicuously pasty, employ the beat blooded talents of the Almighty Power Cut who wields, scratches, mixes and programmes remarkably well.

You have two choices of style on this album: a) songs that feature the massed ranks of the red army stomping up and down on your turntable while everybody shouts in the background and b) songs that attempt to be multi-textured hip hop songs while everybody shouts in the background. Taken one at a time the individual pieces can rest on their own laurels as noisy little buggars that tend to bite when excited. Favourites of mine include *Take It!* and *This is Crush Collision* which are real industrial rhythm pieces that make your groin ache rather violently. Unfortunately all tracks feature the intensely irritating nasal brat-whine of Steven E. Steven - take a break for a while and let somebody else have a go, alright?

Certainly far better than the last album (*Crush Collision*), this latest release might well be enjoyed by people that periodically enjoy locking themselves in the spin dryer with thirteen radios, various noisy kitchen appliances and a drum machine. Take it!

No Means No kicked things off with an hour of their quirky, hard-hitting rock 'n' roll. For a fairly young band

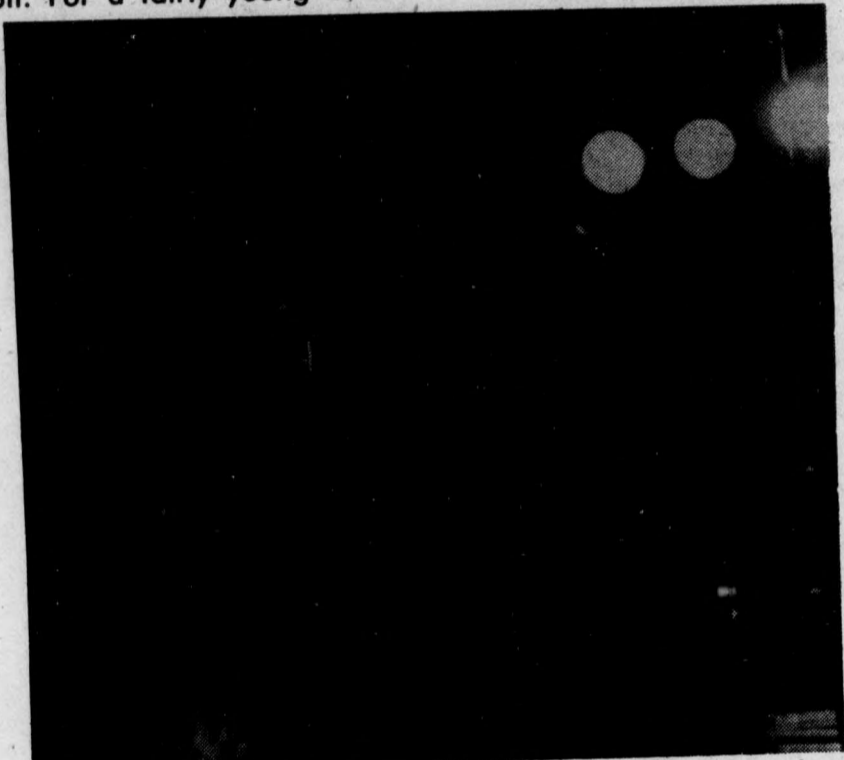

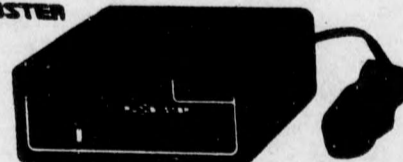

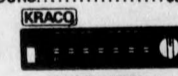

UNB Film Society special presentation
TRIUMPH OF THE WILL

In September, 1934, a month after Adolf Hitler's emergence as Fuhrer, the Nazi Party staged a spectacular rally in Nuremberg. Actress, director and Party favourite Leni Riefenstahl was personally commissioned to film the event by one of her biggest fans-- Hitler himself. The product was the infamous and powerful Nazi propaganda film *Triumph of the Will*.

Banned in Britain, Canada and the USA during the war, and in both Germanies since, *Triumph of the Will* is the source of many of the images of Nazi Germany that have come to us through other movies: ranks of Hitler Youth gazing worshipfully up at the Fuhrer; Deputy Fuhrer Rudolf Hess bawling "Heil Hitler! sieg

heil! seig heil!;" Hitler galvanizing the masses with rehearsed hysteria. Now the UNB Film Society is offering the campus community the chance to view and assess at first-hand this notorious cultural artifact of the Third Reich.

No less problematic than the film (Is it in any sense, as Riefenstahl maintained, a documentary, "a purely historical film?" Can a work of art that openly promotes fascism be considered great, or even art?) is the figure of Riefenstahl herself. Before directing *Triumph of the Will*, she played the lead in such forgettable searching-for-death-and-truth-in-the-Alps flicks as *The Holy Mountain* (1926) and *Avalanche* (1928),

films Susan Sontag characterizes as "pop-Wagnerian vehicles... of proto-Nazi sentiments." Before and during the war Riefenstahl was a close friend of Hitler's and an associate of Goebbels and other worthies. Subsequent to her 1952 court acquittal (verdict: "No political activity in support of the Nazi regime which would warrant punishment") the particulars of her involvement with the Nazi Party have often been obscured or re-invented, and on the basis of *Triumph of the Will* and *Olympia*, her commissioned record of the 1936 Berlin Olympics, she has been acclaimed an important documentary and woman filmmaker.

Triumph of the Will is not available (interestingly) with English subtitles. Though the visuals are far more meaningful than the rhetoric, translations of the major speeches will be available, free of charge, at the door. Exhibition at
Beaverbrook
this week**

The Joyce Wieland retrospective exhibition, comprising approximately 100 works ranging from quilts to storyboards and organized for circulation to four major Canadian art galleries by Philip Monk, Curator of Contemporary Art at The Gallery of Ontario, will be shown at The Beaverbrook Art Gallery from December 4, 1987 to January 30, 1988.

Born in Toronto in 1931 of British immigrant parents, Joyce Wieland is the first living Canadian woman to be granted a retrospective exhibition by the Art Gallery of Ontario.

Wieland consistently imbues her work with strong personal statements. These often deal with issues such as nationalism, ecology and feminism. A harbinger of the feminist aesthetic, her work often addresses women's roles in terms traditionally identified with them. "The cloth assemblages also became a platform (along with cartoons) for her concerns about Canada (its history and its political, economic, and cultural independence) and the environment," says Marie Fleming.

On December 4, 1987, Joyce Wieland will be at The Beaverbrook Art Gallery to give an illustrated slide presentation of her work. Six of her films will be shown: *Reason Over Passion*, 1968-1969, on December 3rd; *The Far Shore*, 1976, on December 10th, and *Rat Life and Diet in North America*, 1973, *Pierre Vallieres*, 1972, *A and B in Ontario*, 1984, *Birds at Sunrise*, 1986, on December 17th. Hatherly, Duncan dominate AUAA meet

At the Sir Max Aitken pool over the weekend, UNB hosted the second invitational swim meet in this year's AUAA swimming schedule. Besides the host Beavers, teams from Dalhousie, Acadia, Memorial, and Mount Allison also participated. UNB put out its best effort of the season on the way to second place finishes in both the men's and women's standings.

Continuing to dominate her specialties, Jackie Hatherly

charged to first place finishes in the 100m and 200m backstrokes and 400IM. She set a school record in the 200m back and qualified for CIAU's in this event as well as the 400IM. This was sufficient to earn her CIAU female athlete of the week's honours as well as UNB female athlete of the week for the 2nd time this year. But it was the excellent showing put in by 4th year and 2nd year sprinters Marie Yelle and Kathleen Naylor that lifted the team into second

place. Marie picked up 2nd place finishes in the 50 freestyle, 100m freestyle, and 100m backstroke and continues to improve at every meet. Kathleen picked up a 3rd in the 100m freestyle and a 4th in the 50m freestyle, posting lifetime personal bests in both and in doing so, places herself in strong contention for a medal at AUAA's in February. Both girls are starting to show the rest of the conference that they are two swimmers not to be taken lightly in the sprint freestyles. As a result of strong swims by both Marie and Kathleen, the 4 x 100m freestyle relay team finished second behind Dal to end the

meet on a high note for the women.

On the men's side, it was rookie John Duncan who dominated the pool for the Beavers. The Dartmouth-native proved he can swim anything this weekend, by taking first in the 200m freestyle, 200m butterfly, 200m Individual Medley and by leading off the backstroke leg of the Men's 2nd place medley relay. Coach Bruce Fisher commented that, "right now, John is the dominant swimmer in the AUAA conference, no one can touch him."

This weekend also saw the return of Jeff Barkhouse to the top ranks of the sprint

freestyles. He picked up a 2nd in the 50m freestyle and put in a strong split on the 3rd leg of the 4 x 100m free relay to boost UNB into 2nd place, just 9-100th of a second behind Dal. Another bright spot for the men was the emergence of freshman David Wright who is beginning to show that he can race with anyone in the conference in the backstrokes.

The Beavers are off now until the 9th of January when they host Mt. A here at the SMA pool. Over the holidays they'll be training hard in the tropical surrounding of Ft. Lauderdale, so expect bigger and better things after Christmas.

Norris honoured by peers

The season is over, but the accolades keep heaping up on Fredericton rowers.

Recently, at the annual general meeting of the Canadian Amateur Rowing Association, UNB/Fredericton Head Coach Kim Norris was named by his peers as the Canadian Coach of the Year. The honour comes after ten years of tireless dedication to the development of the sport in New Brunswick and a phenomenal record on the race-course. During the summer of 1987, Norris coached Canadian oarsmen and women at the Pan-American Games in Indianapolis and at the World University Games in Yugoslavia.

As a student at UNB in 1976, Norris tried rowing for the first time. The next year, he became head coach of the Fredericton team. Since then, he has been the driving force behind the club, and its succession on the national and international scene are testimony to the hardwork and sacrifice involved.

Norris is quick to point out that "You can be the best coach in the world, but if you don't have the athletes, you'll go nowhere." The rowers he works with are a special lot, he believes, and he says "Their dedication and sacrifice keep me going."

Modest though, he is, it angers Norris that the media

does not pay more attention to the rowers. New Brunswick oarsmen and women are the most successful athletes in the province, but they received virtually no press. Other less competitive sports teams fill up the pages and therefore get all important sponsorship funds. "We have no money, little equipment, but we do it. We win. We beat everybody."

The media may have not yet recognized the calibre of the athletes here, but the Canadian rowing community has. The Fredericton lightweight women's four of Leslie Eglington, Jackie, Joanne, and Jill

Blois; coached by Matthias Uhlenbruck, was awarded the title of Crew of the Year by C.A.R.A. after an undefeated season.

Unfortunately, this crew will disband and the Fredericton club will lose two key members of its coaching staff when Eglington and Uhlenbruck leave for Switzerland in the spring.

Meanwhile, Norris is setting his sights on coaching the Canadian women's eight to a gold medal at the 1992 Olympics in Spain. That should be about par for the course.

Volleyball Reds at Moncton Invitational

UNB's volleyball Reds travelled to Moncton last weekend to take part in UdeM's invitational tournament, along with seven other teams.

Despite the fact that the team was without the aid of starters Sigi Schatterlay and Elaine Buck, the women played very well, but unfortunately lost in a few close matches and placed seventh out of eight.

Each match was a best of

five affair, and the girls held out very well for the most part. The scores for UNB was as follows: Game 1: Moncton Seniors 3, Reds 2; Game 2: UdeM 3, Reds 0; Game 3: Acadia 3, Reds 2; Game 4: Brock 2, Reds 3; and Game 5: Reds 3, Acadia 0.

The Reds will play a difficult schedule next term, travelling for 7 out of 9 games, but should be well prepared for the AUAA's in late February.

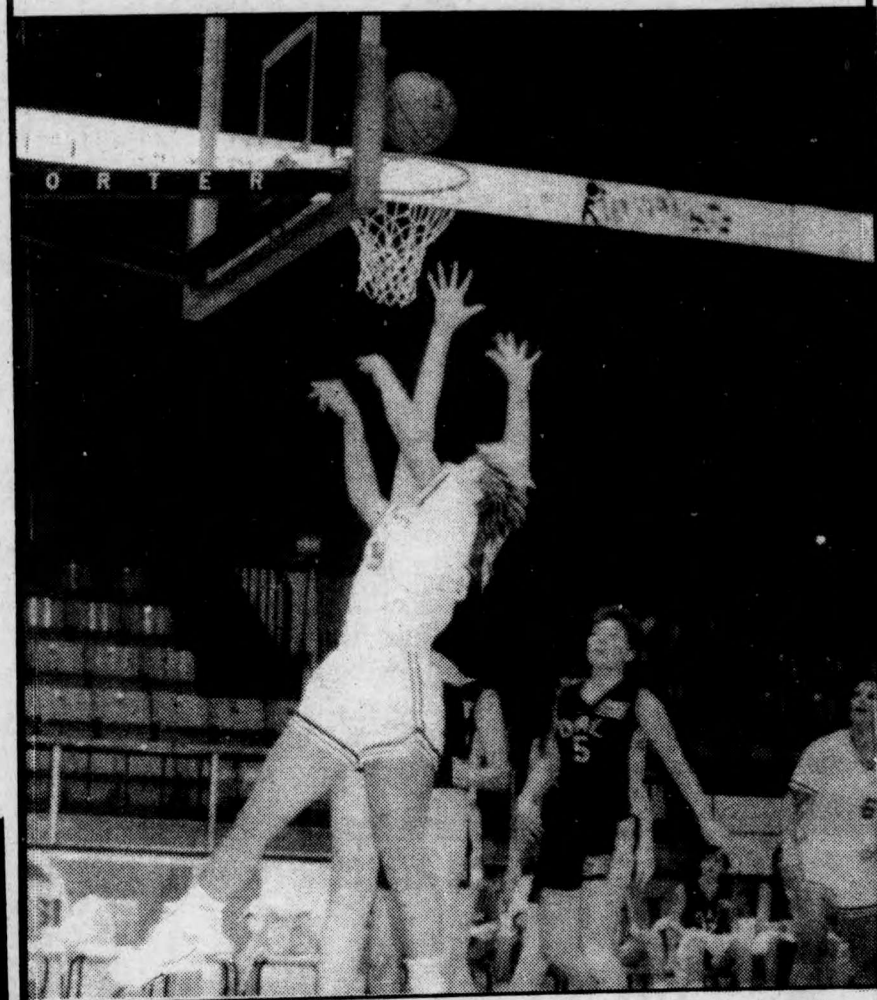

Coach Nickelchok speaks

This is a verbatim interview with Red Devils' Coach Rick Nickelchok. This interview was performed to shed some light on the Devils' present predicament.

BRUNS
What are your main goals now?

Our main goal now is to make the playoffs.

BRUNS
Why did the players leave?

Why did the players leave? I think that you would have to look at each one individually. From my side the players that did leave were presented with a challenge of leading the team which had become quite young due to academic casualties, etc. The players were to provide the leadership necessary for the new players coming in to be successful. The players that did leave, did not accept that challenge and could not provide the leadership both on and off ice. There was some pressure applied to these players at the beginning of the year. This and various other reasons led to the departure of the players, such as they thought they were losing, etc. Certain players have performed well such as Dean Frost. Jamie Leaman on defense - gets

banged around a lot because he's small, but he's always there. On offense Hugh Hospodar has stood out. Renato Marino, captain, has stood by the team. These players accepted the challenge of a young team.

BRUNS
Are you satisfied with the goalie you have?

Our top goalie, Dean Frost, is injured. Dean is perhaps one of the better goaltenders in the league and I am very satisfied with him. Our other two goalies, Rob Jeffries and Chris Bailey, are both rookies and have done very well to perform as they have.

BRUNS
What are your chances of making playoffs?

We have a very good chance of making the playoffs as STU has a 1 and 12 record and the 3rd place team has 4 more points than we do. So we can't just write off the season plus we will be playing the third place team twice more at home.

BRUNS
What are your chances if you make playoffs?

In the playoffs it will be tighter checking, however not clutch and grab as in the NHL. Goaltending is important and I feel that we have the goalie

that can make the difference and can win games for us.

BRUNS
What changes may be necessary?

I'm heading out Tuesday for 21 days in hopes of bringing in some quality student athletes. I'll be going to different colleges in Quebec, in Sherbrooke, and Montreal and then I'll be spending most of my time in Ontario. There are two purposes for this which are bringing back players for January and to identify players for next year. One shouldn't expect a massive turnover in players in January as there are a limited number of players available and I won't be taking committed players. I will be bringing in players who are not playing or have just graduated from high school or college.

BRUNS
Any recruiting going on? Where?

Recruiting is a 12-month job: it does not stop. Maritimes. I spend the second term in the Maritimes. Locally I have watched the Junior B team and the High School. I am going to be concentrating on the Metro Junior "A" league and the PEI Junior "A" league.

BRUNS
Has the Athletic Department given you any aid for recruiting, infor, etc.?

Yes, the Athletic Department has been very helpful. There's a budget designated for recruiting to allow me to go to these places and make contacts. Our dean of P.E., Dr. MacG is very active in hockey presently and has also aided me with names and contacts, etc. This past fall I coordinated an Alumni weekend which consisted of former Red Devils participating in an intersquad game as well as against STU alumni. The purpose behind this was to get the alumni involved in the program again, as well as to use Alumni for recruiting purposes and potential job contacts for graduating Red Devils. Hopefully, this will assist me in recruiting.

BRUNS
Will you be resuming the tradition of playing the Maine Black Bears?

Yes, we will. We have been invited to the '88 Maine Xmas Tourney which takes place next December. We had a game scheduled for this year but unfortunately it was cancelled at the last minute. Maine cancelled.

I think that it would help the team out to play a team of this calibre.

BRUNS
Do the Red Devil's problems stem from personality conflicts or is there another

reason such as discipline? (Both on and off ice)

In any team whether it be hockey or another sport you will always find personality conflicts between players and also some players and the coach, however personality conflicts are not the problem that we are facing. Frustration, perhaps, is the best word to describe the predicament that we are in. The majority of our players are first year players and there is a major adjustment necessary to play at the university level. This adjustment has to be made by all players whether they be major junior "A" or high school. This adjustment takes time. Some players need a whole year to adjust while others need half a year. My guess is that the majority of our players will have made this adjustment by the time we get back on the ice in January.
