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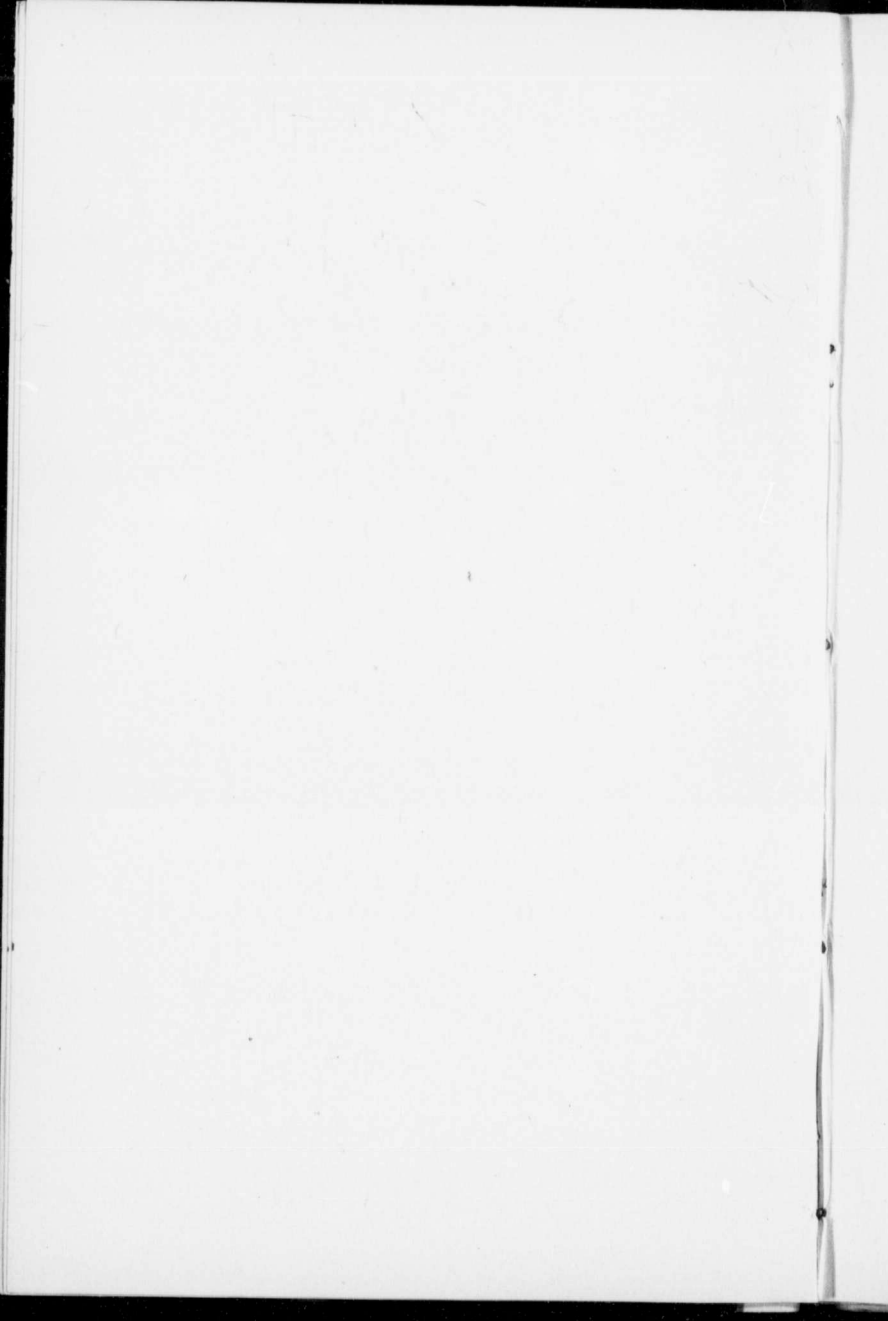

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IN FLANDERS' FIELDS

By LT.-COL. JOHN McCRAE
of Guelph, Canada
Died January 28, 1918
While on Active Service in France

*In Flanders' Fields the poppies blow
Between the crosses, row on row,
That mark our place, and in the sky
The larks still bravely singing fly,
Scarce heard amidst the guns below.
We are the dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved, and now we lie
In Flanders' fields.*

*Take up our quarrel with the foe,
To you from falling hands we throw
The Torch—be yours to hold it high;
If ye break faith with us who die,
We shall not sleep though poppies grow

CHAPTER I

CANADA TO ENGLAND AND FRANCE

In his third dispatch from France, dated May 31st, 1917, Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig, Commander in Chief of the British Armies on the Western front, in referring to the transportation problems stated:

"At the close of the campaign of 1916 the steady growth of our armies and the rapid extension of our material resources had already taxed to the utmost the capacity of the roads and railways then at our disposal. Existing broad and narrow gauge railways were insufficient to deal with the increasing volume of traffic, an undue proportion of which was thrown upon the roads An increase of railway facilities of every type and on a large scale was therefore imperatively and urgently necessary to relieve the roads."

One important development that followed the publication of that dispatch was the formation of the Corps of Canadian Railway Troops, a unified force that numbered, when the Armistice was signed, 15,964 all ranks, under the command of Major General J. W. Stewart, C.B., C.M.G., a well-known Canadian railway construction contractor.

At the end of 1916, there were in France the C.O.R.C.C., or Canadian Overseas Railway Construction Corps, a unit of 500 picked officers and men recruited from the employees of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which went to France in the summer of 1915, and the 1st and 2nd Battalions of Canadian Railway Troops. The 3rd, 4th and 5th C.R.T. battalions were formed in England and sent to France in February, 1917. The 1st Canadian Pioneers' Battalion then in France were to be used for railway construction work, two infantry units in Canada were to be detailed for the same, and authority was given to recruit two new battalions of railway troops in the Dominion. One of these was the 257th Railway Construction Battalion, and on December 16, 1916, L. T. Martin, of Renfrew, was appointed to the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel and named as its commanding officer.

At the time recruiting and organization of Railway Construction battalions was announced by the government, Senator M. J. O'Brien, the well-known railway contractor, in addition to his many other contributions towards winning the war, offered to bear the expense of recruiting the 257th Battalion. His generous offer was gratefully accepted by the Government and enabled the battalion to make a record in the time it was recruited and sailed for France. Many other well-known railway men of Canada contributed to the battalion funds.

The area in which the Battalion was given to recruit was the whole of the Province of Ontario, Quebec, north of the River St. Lawrence, but including Gaspé, and New Brunswick. Headquarters of the unit were established in Ottawa under the direction of Major A. D. Watts, Capt. J. A. Crowe and Lieut. A. C. Blackmore. Recruiting in Ontario was conducted by Major R. B. Herron, Capt. W. J. Egan, Capt. A. L. McAllister, Capt. A. M. Jackson, Lieut. C. D. Brown, Lieut. R. M. Adams, Lieut. F. C.

Jackson, Lieut. J. P. Gillies and Lieut. A. L. Price; in Quebec by Major H. J. Lyons, Major A. L. Thompson and Lieut. P. Baribeau, and in New Brunswick by Major C. F. Hannington and Lieut. A. L. Morton. The first recruit was sworn in in Toronto on January 10, 1917, and a month later the strength of the battalion was 960.

The orders to proceed overseas were received by the Battalion on February 10, 1917, and stated that embarkation was to be made on *H.M.T.S. Missanabie*, at St. John, N.B., six days later. One half the battalion was in Ottawa and the other half in Toronto. Each half entrained on February 12th and was aboard the troopship on the prescribed date at St. John, N.B.

The voyage to Liverpool was made in tolerably good weather and without any unusual incident until the night of February 24th, when the news was received that an enemy submarine was in the immediate neighborhood of the *Missanabie*. The danger was evidently imminent, for later the same night it was learned the troopship *Laconia*, a substantial vessel of the Cunard line, had been sunk by a German submarine not far from the *Missanabie*. However, due to the vigilance of the torpedo boats and destroyers of the British Navy, the battalion arrived safely at Liverpool on February 26th.

Immediately on arrival at Liverpool the battalion was ordered to proceed to Purfleet, Essex, which had been selected as the location for the depot of the Canadian Railway Troops. Soon after reaching there the reorganization of the 257th Railway Construction Battalion was undertaken and while the details of this were being arranged, the rank and file were given several days' leave of absence from camp. During the month of March, the organization was completed and the unit was brought up to regulation strength not only in personnel, but in transport and technical equipment. The 257th Canadian Railway Construction Battalion left Purfleet for France on March 27th as the 7th Battalion, Canadian Railway Troops, with a total strength of 35 officers and 1,005 other ranks.

The officers were: Officer Commanding, Lieut.-Colonel L. T. Martin; Second in Command, Major E. Meredith; Chief Engineer, Major A. D. Watts; Adjutant, Capt. J. A. Crowe; Medical Officer, Capt. V. K. O'Gorman; Paymaster, Capt. E. L. Miller; Quarter Master, Hon. Capt. W. Charles; Technical Stores Officer, Lieut. V. G. Davis; Transport Officer, Lieut. R. M. Adams; Asst. Adjutant, Lieut. A. C. Blackmore; "A" Company, Capt. A. M. Jackson, Lieuts. Healy, Pittam, Wilson, Milne and McDougall; "B" Company, Capt. A. L. McAllister, Capt. W. J. Egan, Lieuts. F. C. Jackson, Jewett, Quinlan and Biggar; "C" Company, Lieut. H. Gall and Lieuts. Brennan, Dohenny, Hall, Jones and White; "D" Company, Major C. F. Hannington, Capt. R. J. Shore and Lieuts. Boys, Brown, Gillies, Morton and Palmer. When the battalion left Purfleet the recommendations for promotions to complete the establishment in Majors and Captains had not been gazetted, hence the omissions in the foregoing list. The official notice appeared soon afterwards.

The battalion sailed from Southampton on the same day that it left Purfleet, and after arrival at Le Havre, France, went under canvas on the outskirts of the town for two days, during which time certain additional equipment was drawn and all ranks fully outfitted for service in the field. On April 1, 1917, the advance guard of the 7th C.R.T. left Le Havre for the Ypres Salient in Belgium. The remainder of the battalion followed in two trains on the two succeeding days. Detraining at Remy Siding, near Poperinghe the complements of the three trains marched to the vicinity of Vlamertinghe, where they encamped at what will be well remembered as "Q" Camp.

CHAPTER II

YPRES SALIENT AND MESSINES, 1917

WHEN the battalion arrived in the Ypres district, already famous in Canadian history by virtue of the notable fighting the 1st Canadian Division did two years before and also in 1916, none of its officers or men knew that it would be kept active there for ten months. Lieut.-Colonel H. L. Bodwell, C.B., D.S.O., the A.D.L.R. for the Second British Army, had formulated a programme of construction of light railways in the Salient which the 7th C.R.T. was to assist in carrying out. Headquarters and "D" Companies of the battalion were located at "Q" Camp; "A" and "B" Companies at Toronto Camp, and "C" at Ouderdom. Attached labor was given the various companies and work began forthwith. "A" and "B" Companies took up the construction of the Busseboom system of light railways destined for the feeding of the heavy gun batteries at Cafe Belge and Brisbane Dump. Several miles of 16 lb. rails were torn up and relaid with 20 lb. rails. "C" Company undertook the Kemmel Hill system, to supply the batteries directly in front of Wytshaete. The construction of the large Hesken yard also fell to this company. Meanwhile, "D" Company was building "B" lines in the vicinity of Vlamertinghe. This work had to be done daily under shell fire and in weather that was too damp to be appreciated by Canadians used to a drier and more exhilarating climate. The first day that the battalion began actual railway construction work in Flanders there were two casualties, Sappers Kemp and Wells receiving severe shrapnel wounds and had to be evacuated to hospital and subsequently to England. Before the fourth of April four men were wounded and two killed, Sapper Douglas on the 14th and Sapper Deachman on the 29th. On the following May 4th, "B" Company lost two very efficient officers by shell fire, Capt. W. J. Egan and Capt. C. R. McDougall. The former was killed instantly and the latter died after lingering a short time after receiving serious and painful wounds received while working near the Ypres Canal. Capt. Egan was buried at Vlamertinghe, and Capt. McDougall at Remy Siding, in the cemetery where more than 8,000 Canadians are laid to rest.

Early in the following month of May construction work began on lines in and about the town of Ypres and northward around St. Jean. "B" Company took charge of this work. Over the Ypres canal a crossing had to be built which involved the shifting of a large amount of earth, while under enemy observation from kite balloons and exposed to direct shell fire. In Ypres the work of grading was impeded by many obstacles, such as tons of brick from collapsed buildings. The town was at that time being very heavily shelled, as many as 5,000 shells per day being thrown into it and the immediate vicinity. For six weeks part of the officers and men of "B" Company used the canal bank as billets. As no railway line was yet running to Ypres, all the track and other

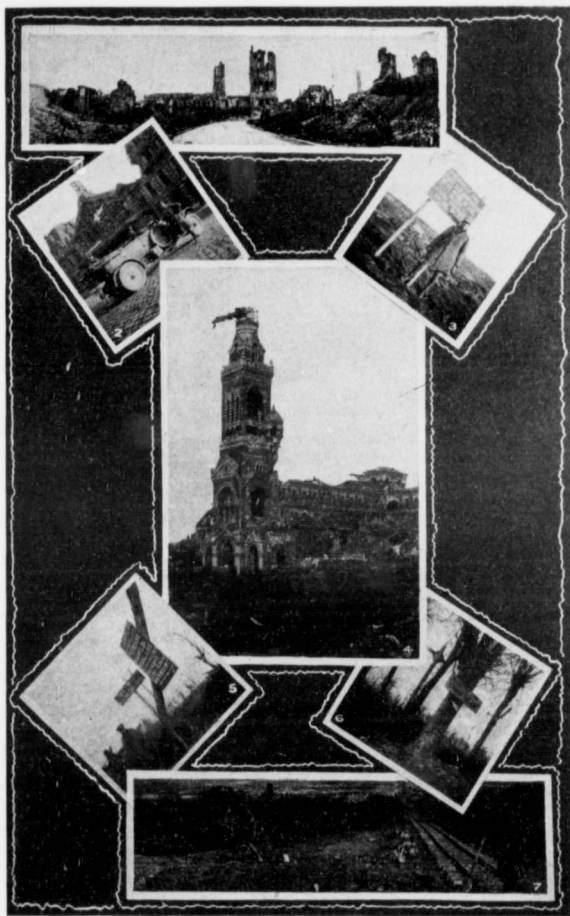
material had to be delivered at night by teams and lorries. This work was efficiently carried out, in spite of almost impassable roads and shell fire, which was invariably heavy at night in this sector, under the direction of Capt. R. M. Adams, O.C., Horse Transport, and Lieut. G. D. Curry, O.C., Mechanical Transport. The work of these officers, and also that of Capt. J. P. Gillies, M.C., who later took over the command of the Horse Transport, was at all times commendable. About the beginning of July, maintenance and further construction on the work in and about Ypres was taken over by the 2nd C.R.T. Meanwhile "D" Company had joined up their "B" lines with the Busseboom system, so that material could be brought up from the A.D.L.R. Second Army Stores. Eastward, the "B" lines were connected with the Ypres system, in order that the heavy artillery in and about Ypres might be served directly from Westenhoek, at which point a large transshipment and locomotive yard was constructed. "C" Company completed this last piece of work.

The battalion was then transferred to what was known as "V" lines and on June 7th, the Second Army captured the Messines Ridge, after a terrible explosion of 19 mines. "D" company went to work the same day on a system of lines forward and south of Voormezele, as the batteries had been advanced some distance. When the extent of the British advance was realized, the other companies were also called upon to share in this operation, alternating on the forward work. Heavy guns were required in advanced positions on the captured slopes, and so lines had to be built to the St. Eloi craters and to Spoilbank. Construction was soon completed to the former enemy front line trenches, and then pushed forward to the Damstrasse within 1,000 yards of the new line. Several trains of heavy guns were thus taken into Spoilbank, as well as ammunition. The work was laborious owing to the number of heavy cuts and fills, and the bridging required. Working under constant balloon and aeroplane observation the men were subjected to particularly heavy shell fire. Thirteen were wounded in May, one of whom, Sapper Woolridge, died; and others, including Lieut. Quinlan, were invalided to England. In June, thirty-one were wounded, two dying as a result, Sappers Wagner and Anderson.

Early in July, "B" Company was given the building of a diversion bridge over the railway at the crossing between Poperinghe and Brandhoek. It was completed in two weeks, and was 1,100 feet long, with long ramps which had to be made by dirt fill. There were 10,200 cubic yards of earth moved in this operation, and six trestle bents built, and steel girders placed. The work was in charge of Capt. F. C. Jackson.

The main offensive before Ypres was arranged for a date in July. Accordingly, plans were made to continue the Voormezele line by way of Zillebeke Lake forward towards Roulers. Lieuts. White and Hall with a party of surveyors were detailed to stake out the new line. Preliminary work was done under very trying conditions, enemy shelling being particularly heavy. In spite of this "D"

Company had the grading done and track laid to Zillebeke Lake before the offensive opened. As it was expected that a rapid advance would be achieved in this part of the front, arrangements were made to push the railway construction as far as possible, so a special instruction camp was established near Watou, for the benefit of the British troops that were attached to the 7th C.R.T. These were two battalions of pioneers of the 11th Leicesters, and four companies of pioneers from four other battalions, who were trained by a number of officers and N.C.O.'s of the 7th C.R.T. in the work of grading and track-laying. "B" Company was eventually moved to Watou to assist in this work. Another phase of the preparatory work was the laying-out of a material yard in an advanced area. Ten miles of assembled steel were stacked in this yard, with culvert, bridging, and crossing material, matched switches and special tools. To facilitate rapid track laying with the cumbersome assembled steel, a pioneer car was designed, and the construction supervised by Major A. D. Watts, and made out of a flat car, which was of immense service. Each company, moreover, was given a special task. "B" had the grading; "D" track-laying; "C" ballasting; and "A" maintenance.

CHAPTER III

PASSCHENDAELE—BEFORE AND AFTER, 1917

ON July 31st, the four companies and attached labor left at an early hour to follow up the advancing troops. The plan to bivouac north of Zillebeke Lake had, however, to be abandoned, as the anticipated gains did not materialize to the extent hoped for, chiefly owing to the heavy rain. But construction was carried on past Zillebeke Lake to Yeomanry Post. A spur was also built on the east side of the lake to Valley Cottage. The battalion suffered comparatively heavily in this operation. From July 1st to August 7th, when they were relieved by the 9th C.R.T., there were 54 casualties. Those killed or who died of wounds were: Lieut. Ball, Lance Corpl. Martin, and Sappers Desjardins, Rice, Adamson, McDowell, Branch, Johnson, Ward and Parry.

After about one month's work on these lines, work carried out under the greatest handicaps owing to the nature of the ground due to the continuous rains and heavy shell fire, the companies were assigned to maintenance work, and though it was strenuous made a change from the continual forward area. It then became necessary to resume operations east of Ypres in the recently acquired area. Construction was commenced on a line running forward through St. Julien, in which work the men came across the graves of the Canadians who fell to save the situation in the Second Battle of Ypres. It was arranged, however, that while two companies did this work and a third looked after maintenance, the fourth would have a rest period of two weeks. A good camp for this purpose was picked out near St. Sixte. For the first time since coming to France the men had a chance for diversion and some recreation. And they needed the rest after five months of such trying and continuous work.

At the beginning of October the headquarters of the battalion were moved from Toronto Camp, where it had been for three months, to St. John's Bridge on the Elverdinghe road. The advance to Passchendaele had been resumed, to be brought to a final glorious if dearly bought victory by the Canadian Corps. The awful condition of the soil, which made so difficult the progress of the infantry, was likewise a very great hindrance in the work of railway construction. The clay turned over so often by shell and shovel was sodden and sticky. Drainage was almost impossible, so that the grading was very difficult. In many places no earth work foundation could be made. Eventually corrugated iron and slabs had to be used to support the track. Then there were sink-holes where ballast was devoured unceasingly. Work under such conditions of soil and weather, with a very long walk to and from work, coupled with the daily bombardment, was a formidable proposition. But the battalion stuck to it and laid railways into St. Julien and Langemarck, which were in full operation in November.

Many heavy batteries were concentrated in the area east of the canal, which demanded a lateral extension of the system in Bochkastle, Kitchener, Admiral and other spurs. Over the Ypres canal and two flooded creeks, the Steenbeeck and the Leckerbockerbeeck bridges were constructed. These bridges and other strategic points, such as yards, loops and junctions, were subjected to particular activity from enemy artillery and aircraft. East of the Steenbeeck the track was torn up along almost its entire length by shell fire. Large emergency repair detachments had to be kept in readiness day and night. Besides such work and general track maintenance, the battalion had to take charge of large ballast dumps, which necessitated much handling. All of this kept the men and the attached labor busy even though forward construction had temporarily ceased. When the offensive was finally suspended the battalion was maintaining 110 miles of track, in addition to other operations, such as the construction of loops, yards and ammunition dumps.

During the month of October, 1917, the battalion located 17.35 miles of light railway, graded 18.14 miles, laid 18.14 miles of steel, ballasted 18.46 miles, surfaced 6.99 miles, unloaded 3,630 tons of ballast from broad or standard gauge cars, hauled 5,630 tons of construction material, besides attending to the daily requirements of the front line and the guns.

From August until the end of the year the battalion suffered eighty casualties. Seventeen of these occurred in the evening of October 27 when a bomb was dropped in the camp of "D" company at Essex Farm. Sappers Cormier and Mooney were killed, Sapper Leahy died of wounds. The following were also killed or died of wounds or gas at various dates: Sergeants Stewart and Hackett; Corporals Chapman, Craven and Eames; Sappers Blackburn, Weir, Cloutier, Terrault, Davidson, Moffat, Darroch; Sappers Gittrill and Lemelin were killed accidentally and Sapper Branchfield died of natural causes.

Before the end of the year 1917 there were many changes in the personnel of the battalion. Lieut.-Col. Martin left for Canada, November 5th, to contest the riding of South Renfrew as Government candidate in the general election. Major Meredith replaced him capably until the arrival one month later of Major (afterwards Lieut.-Col.) J. B. Harstone of the 4th C.R.T. About the same time Major Watts was recalled to England for special work. He had served with the battalion up to this time as Chief Engineer, and his work in this capacity was a significant factor towards the success with which the operations assigned to the battalion were carried out. Major M. A. Burbank, of the 4th C.R.T., took his place. Other officers who left the battalion at various dates were Major Hannington, Capt. Shore, Lieutenants Boys, Brown, Carnegie, Davis, Healy, Jackson, Malhiot, Milne, Moffat, Morton, Oke, Paris, Pittam, Quinlan, Smith, M.C., Stowe, C. O. Wilson, T. H. Wilson. Of these Lieutenants Moffat, Oke and Quinlan were wounded, and Lieut. Stowe shell-shocked, while the others were either

invalided to England through sickness or were attached to other formations. Some of them had come to the battalion after its arrival in France. Those who joined the battalion at various times during the two preceding months were: Major R. B. Herron; Capt. R. H. James, Hon. Capt. J. R. O'Gorman, Chaplain; Lieuts. Bell, Cameron, Cavendish, Duncan, A. Gillies, Judge, Korsright, Lamb, Lindsay, McAndrew, MacDonell, McLaren and Wilcox. Lieuts. Jewett and Hall were wounded but returned to the battalion. The casualties in other ranks was made good by several reinforcements. The effective strength on December 31st was 40 officers and 948 other ranks.

CHAPTER IV

PROMOTIONS AND DECORATIONS IN 1917

During the course of the year 1917 there were a number of promotions in the battalion, and several decorations and honors were awarded. Captains McAllister and A. M. Jackson received their majorities, Lieuts. Adams, Gall, Hall, Jewett and White were made Captains, and Sergt. Paris was granted a commission.

For conspicuous gallantry and distinguished service the Military Cross was awarded to:

Lieut. J. P. Gillies for displaying notable courage and great presence of mind in organizing his platoon at great personal risk and assisting in carrying some wounded soldiers out of an area that was being heavily shelled.

Capt. R. J. Shore for his work in grading a light railway line from Bedford House to Zillebeke Lake, June 21, 1917. He worked almost continuously for 84 hours under heavy shell fire, using three shifts. This line was urgently requested by the Second Corps to deliver food and ammunition to Zillebeke Lake, and it was only by the personal courage and perseverance of Captain Shore that the men were held until the completion of the work.

Capt. A. M. White for work in locating the line from Bedford House to Zillebeke Lake while a heavy barrage was being maintained over that section.

The Military Medal was awarded to:

Sapper R. H. Clarke for taking charge of and moving a train from a shelled area after the engineer and fireman had been wounded.

Sergt. J. M. Manahan, for assisting a wounded N.C.O. to a place of safety; on another occasion assisting several sappers who had been wounded; skill in conducting his section at a point of great danger under a heavy barrage to a place of safety. Sergt. Manahan later received a bar to the M.M. for his courage when an ammunition dump was set afire, he backed his engine into the dump and by skilful use of the water in it, at great personal risk, extinguished the blaze.

Corpl. R. Webster, while a member of a survey party, ran a transit over a projected light railway for a distance of one mile during a heavy barrage.

Sergt. C. W. Del Plaine, while a member of a survey party, ran a level over a projected line during a heavy barrage. This line had to be re-run in order to mark the stakes during a continuation of shelling.

Corpl. K. Armstrong took charge of a motor car and got three badly wounded men out of a particularly heavily shelled area.

Corpl. G. L. Gordon, when two trains, one of ammunition and one of empty cars, were obstructed on the line and deserted by their crews during a heavy bombardment, took charge of the trains; first removed one train to a place of safety, returned and took the other train out, showing throughout great coolness of mind and resource.

Corpl. G. Cuthbert, during a heavy bombardment by the enemy, went to the assistance of a wounded man and helped to carry him to a dug-out.

Lance Corpl. R. W. Sculthorpe, and Sapper E. V. Richards. These two soldiers during a bombardment by the enemy administered first aid to several wounded men, and carried them to a dressing-station.

Sapper W. Jacobs, when a party working on the line at the St. Eloi craters was heavily shelled, resulting in some casualties, immediately carried a wounded man to a crater, then brought stretcher-bearers and had him removed to a place of safety. While working near Damstrasse, observing that a soldier was wounded, carried him to the nearest dug-out, where the wounded man received attention. This act was performed under heavy shelling.

Sapper A. V. Dolam, for gallantry and devotion to duty, October 15, 1917. When returning from work in the forward area, his party was subjected to heavy shelling near St. Julien, which wounded several of the Drake battalion of the Naval Division, and broke the light railway track in front of three returning trains. He dressed the wounds of one of the wounded men, and remained with the repairing gang which had been sent to the scene, assisting in repairing the track and releasing the trains.

Sapper E. J. Reid. This was the first award granted a member of the battalion. The exact nature of the recommendation is not on record, as Sapper Reid earned the award while temporarily attached to the Assistant Director of Light Railways staff for the 2nd Army.

The Meritorious Service Medal was awarded to:

Sergt. W. H. Charlesworth, for his services in charge of construction parties in and about Ypres and at Zillebeke Lake during a long period. Though well over military age, Sergt. Charlesworth displayed much skill and disregard of danger. "The spirit and good work of this N.C.O. are especially commendable, and helped immeasurably in construction of light railways under difficult and dangerous circumstances," stated the official narrative.

Sergt. A. N. McDonald (afterwards commissioned). He had been regularly in charge of track-laying sections and maintenance parties in the construction and repairing of light railways. His duties took him continually under enemy shell fire, where he showed coolness and courage of an exceptionally high degree. His skill and resource were especially commendable in expediting deliveries of ammunition through shelled areas, where by personally conducting trains and repairing broken track, deliveries were not delayed. His splendid example was of constant inspiration to men working with him.

Sapper G. A. Tatum, cook at Headquarters officers' mess, for bravery and gallant conduct, January 19, 1918. An aviator crashed his machine in the camp, falling into the flooded Poperinghe canal. Sapper Tatum immediately rushed to his assistance, jumped into the icy water and supported him until help came.

The aviator, stunned and lashed to the machine, would undoubtedly have drowned but for the prompt and courageous assistance rendered by this soldier, an American colored citizen.

Sergt. J. McNiven was mentioned in dispatches for his work while in charge of engineering and maintenance parties. "His technical knowledge, determination and resource," reads the recommendation, "have been invaluable to his company in the maintenance and construction of light railways. His disregard of personal danger in heavy shelling has been a constant source of inspiration to others."

For work during the same period the following honors were later awarded:

Major A. L. McAllister was mentioned in dispatches, upon a recommendation in these terms: "He was on duty near Transport Farm the night of July 30, at a point on the light railway where an ammunition convoy was crossing his grade, and where a large party of troops was working under his direction. An enemy shell struck the crossing, frightening some of the animals in the convoy out of control. Several splinters from the shell struck him, but he did not wait for first aid. He restored the convoy to order and steadied the men so that the work continued without interruption notwithstanding the continued enemy shelling of the locality. His skill and presence of mind undoubtedly saved the convoy difficulties if not disaster, and avoided delay in urgent construction.

In addition to the foregoing awards several other officers, N.C.O.'s and men were recommended for bravery and good work during 1917. These were Major A. D. Watts, Major R. B. Herron, Capt. H. Gall, Lieuts. F. C. Jackson, T. G. Healey, E. K. Hall, G. W. Jewett, C.S.M. B. D. Free, Sergts. A. A. Gallagher, E. Bennett and L. M. McDonald, Corpls. P. Hunter, T. J. Sinclair, J. Carlton and P. Rolinsky. Furthermore many names almost equally deserving had to be unavoidably omitted from the list of recommendations. Many acts of bravery and much good work could be rewarded only by the personal commendation of the battalion commander in daily orders, as were Lieut. J. A. Brennan, Lieut. H. A. Doheny, Sergt. L. Lessard, Sergt. G. Hancock, Sergt. R. Webster, Corpl. F. Jacobs, Sappers B. Laing, C. Gordon, J. Stalker, C. Sowepby, J. March, R. Lumley, and by the consciousness of duty. Lieut.-Colonel L. T. Martin was awarded the D.S.O. in the New Year, 1918, and was also mentioned in despatches.

The Christmas celebrations were very much enjoyed by all ranks, and were brightened by a period of rest some distance from the front.

When the 2nd and 9th Battalions, C.R.T., returned from a rest early in January, the 7th Battalion was ordered to entrain for Mezerolles, near Doullens, France. The battalion left the Ypres Salient without regret and with no desire to return there. During nearly ten months all ranks had materially helped to prepare the offensives against Messines and Passchendaele, and had followed the advancing troops with railway lines to new gun positions. They had been continually exposed to heavy shelling and bombing,

as the lengthy list of casualties during this period indicates, and especially in the autumn months their work had been carried on under such conditions of weather as rendered the life of one of extreme hardship and discomfort. The rest, therefore, was very welcome.

CHAPTER V

THE ENEMY OFFENSIVE—1918

ON January 18th, all light railway lines, yards, etc., in charge of the battalion were turned over to the 17th Northumberland Fusiliers and the 109th Railway Company of Royal Engineers. Three trains carried the battalion from Perelhoek railhead, on the 20th and 21st, to Doullens. A march of six miles after detraining brought them to the rest-camp in the villages of Mezerolles and Remesnil. The transport and A company occupied the latter hamlet, a mile from the remainder of the battalion. The villages were small but sufficient accommodation was found. Some of the barns were perhaps a trifle too well ventilated, but there was no complaint. It was better than the Salient, even with Nissen huts.

However, it was not to be all rest for an enemy offensive was expected. Heretofore the battalion had been unarmed, but it was now equipped with rifles. A course of training in musketry and drill was arranged, and Major Tytler of the Lines of Communications, headquarters' staff, with a staff of instructors took charge of this work. A rifle range was constructed, and all ranks practiced at short range shooting in deliberate and rapid fire. This and physical training, bayonet fighting, lectures on care of arms and principles of aiming, and some close order drill, occupied the morning hours. The afternoons were allotted to parade sports. A schedule of baseball and football games was drawn up, and these were played out and keenly enjoyed. It had been intended to hold a battalion field day with track events, etc., but this had to be abandoned, owing to unexpected orders to move. The Y.M.C.A. entertained with a cinema show daily, and one evening "The Private Secretary" was played before a very appreciative audience by the "Y Emma" concert party of the Canadian Corps. The band of the 58th Canadian Infantry battalion played selections of music in the intervals.

By February 12th the training had progressed so well that the battalion acquitted itself creditably at an inspection by Brig.-Gen. S. D. L. Crookshank, Director General of Transport. The battalion, including the animal transport, was inspected in mass formation, after which the unit was congratulated by the inspecting officer, who then took the salute at the march past in column of route. General Crookshank was so well pleased with the condition of the animal transport that he gave a prize of fifty francs to the best turn-out. In view of the difficult circumstances under which the transport was billeted this was particularly gratifying.

On February 13th, the anniversary of the departure from Ottawa, the battalion was ordered to the Fifth Army area at Peronne on the Somme. The news of a change of location was well received. Next day headquarters was established in the half-demolished college in Peronne. The companies went into tents; "A" at Clergy; "B" at Mt. St. Quentin; "C" at Doingt and "D" at Tin-court. In view of an expected enemy offensive in this sector, it

had been decided to construct a light railway system to connect the forward area light railways with the French light railways in the rear areas. Later this intermediate system was to be developed southward to connect Chaulnes back system with Vraignes forward railways. Large yards were to be built at Misery and Marchlepot, west of the Somme, and bridges thrown across the river at St. Christ and Brie.

Construction of the Quinconce-Clery line, a distance companies of 3.4 miles, was commenced on February 16th by "A" and "B" companies. Grading was completed by the 24th and 95 per cent of the track laid. Orders to double track were then received. By the 28th, 38 per cent of this was done. At the same time "C" and "D" companies were at work on the Quinconce-Tincourt line of about the same length. The track was all laid by the end of the month and 23 per cent ballasted. A line from Haute Allaine to Quinconce, two miles long, was undertaken by "B" Company, and on the 28th, 58 per cent of the grading and 33 per cent of the track laying was reported completed. "C" Company also graded the Bussu branch of a half mile and a ballast pit spur of half that length. In all during these thirteen days' work the battalion graded five miles, laid 8 miles and ballasted 2 miles. The work was easy, there was no shelling, and the weather was excellent. Good progress was made and the troops were happy. A great contrast to Belgium.

New work was laid out early in March. Orders were received to build a line from Brie to Marchlepot, 4.5 miles long, and a line of equal length from St. Christ to Athies, both of which were undertaken by "C" Company. "B" Company took over part of the former, March 16th. "D" Company on the 18th began a revision of the Flamicourt light railway yard, entailing a large amount of additional trackage. On the 20th, "A" Company received orders to work on a marshalling yard at Lemesnil, and the same day moved to Villers Carbonnel.

On March 21st the long-threatened German offensive began. It was favoured by a dense fog in the morning. Towards evening news of the enemy success came, but all ranks of the 7th Battalion kept at their allotted tasks until the end of the following day. That day "C" Company constructed two bridges of cribwork and stringers over the Somme at Brie doing the work in ten hours. Over these, light railway rolling stock and much other material east of the Somme was transported to the Brie-Estrees line. "A" and "D" companies worked to put the skeleton track in condition, and all day of the 22nd had to cope with many difficulties, including over 100 derailments, in salvaging the rolling stock.

At midnight word was received from the 19th British Corps that the battalion was to withdraw. By dawn the advance party of headquarters was at Estrees, five miles back. During the 23rd the congested roads were repeatedly attacked by enemy aircraft. For his courage and devotion to duty during one of these raids, Spr. W. A. Warwick, a dispatch-rider, was given the M.M. Several

bullets struck his motor-cycle as he was carrying urgent dispatches to battalion headquarters. Notwithstanding he proceeded and delivered his messages.

All this day the companies continued work on the lines west of the Somme, but after all their efforts much of the salvaged material had to be abandoned. The enemy forces were now on the east bank of the Somme and their shells were falling on the Amiens road. The entire battalion converged on Chuignes. The next day, Palm Sunday, the withdrawal continued, orders having come to work on a defensive line of trenches in front of Villers Bretonneux. Surplus stores had to be dumped at Chuignes. Fortunately little of value had to be left due to the battalion's splendid equipment in transport and the good use made of it.

At Lamotte-Warfusee that night, after a long day's march, the camp was alarmed by a rumour that the German cavalry had broken through. Investigation showed that stragglers from the front, small bodies of disorganized troops, refugees and civilians of the town, were flying towards Amiens in panic. It seemed improbable. The Canadian Motor Machine Gun Brigade had passed up the road that morning. And yet it was possible. The 7th battalion C.R.T. was probably the only organized unit between the enemy and Amiens, if the report were true. The battalion was aroused and stood-to for an hour or more. Then Major Burbank returned from a trip eastward with the information that the earlier report was a false alarm. For this reconnaissance and his share in the construction of the Brie bridges, he was later awarded the D.S.O.

The following Monday morning, the battalion began trench-digging, and continued at it until Tuesday noon. These trenches were used by the famous "Carey's Force" to check the German advance. The 7th battalion narrowly escaped being incorporated in it as the 2nd C.R.T. were. Previous orders, however, came to march to Flesselles and Vignacourt to begin work on the Pas-Condé defense line of trenches between Valheureux and Wargnies. In this area 1.34 miles of trench and 58 miles of wire entanglement were constructed by the battalion between March 28th and April 7th. Easter Sunday was spent hard at work, for the trenches, though destined to be never used, were considered urgent.

However, the battalion thought itself lucky to have come through the retreat with so little difficulty, without a single casualty and with very little loss of equipment. A strong spirit of optimism prevailed in spite of the reverse. Chief of the optimists was Major Herron. It was at this time he wagered that the Germans would sue for an armistice before the end of the year. Later he went so far as to predict that Marshal Foch would counter-attack before July 20th. And finally he prophesied that Bulgaria would be out of the war before October 1st; Turkey before November 1st; Austria before December 1st; and Germany by the last of the year. He won considerable money accordingly.

CHAPTER VI

ARRAS—ALLOUAGNE—NIEPPE FOREST

IN accordance with operation orders the battalion marched on April 8, 1918, to the vicinity of Arras, where a ten-mile stretch of light railway was to be constructed between Fosseux and Savy. The battalion marched 30 miles in a day and a half. The leading company "A" in a day, and went to work in the afternoon of April 9th. The grading of this line occupied the men until noon of Saturday 13th, when orders came to proceed to Allouagne. The reason for this unexpected move was the German offensive on the Lys, April 9th.

It had been decided to form a C.R.T. brigade in the First Army composed of the 5th, 7th and 11th C.R.T. The battalion was moved by light railway to Chocques, near Bethune. Five trains conveyed it. The last, which left Savy at 7.30 p.m., took about 100 men of the battalion returning from leave. They had been trying to catch up with their unit for several days often getting to a camp to find it deserted, and they nearly missed it again at Savy. Lorries of the 5th and 11th C.R.T. conveyed the troops from Chocques to Haut Rieux, between Allouagne and Lillers, where they arrived during the night and bivouacked in barns and fields. The transport sections came by road. Camp was pitched there Sunday morning, alongside the 11th Battalion, C.R.T. Lieut.-Col. Bell, of the 30th Canadian infantry battalion, had come to act as Brigadier of the new C.R.T. formation. Preparations were made to undergo a short period of training in machine gunnery, musketry and bayonet fighting. Some officers and N.C.O's. of the Canadian Corps School were detailed to give this instruction. All technical equipment and surplus baggage was sent to a back area, with a view to the battalion going into the line on this sector. A half day only had been spent on the programme laid out, when orders came to move forward to the vicinity of Belinghem with entrenching tools. The transport was left at Haut Rieux, while the remainder of the battalion went into camp at Abbaye. The two following days were spent digging trenches near Hinges on the Merville canal. Each man was allotted 150 cubic feet of digging per day.

New orders came to return to Haut Rieux, April 8th. But camp had to be broken sooner than intended. About 2.30 a.m. a shell fell in the lines of "A" Company, killing Sergt. Blenkin and seriously wounding Sergt. McNevin. At 3 a.m. it was decided to withdraw. This was done under heavy shellfire in excellent order. On the way out Corpl. Jackes was killed by a shell splinter, but no other casualty occurred. For good work during this operation, Lance Corpl. D. J. McDougall was awarded the M.M. In charge of a section of transport caught in the barrage, with teams scattered and two mules wounded, he kept his head, assembled his teams and rejoined the column. His splendid example preserved order and steadied the men. A rear party under Lieut. W. W. Duncan

remained behind to strike camp, and was brought back by lorry after daylight during a lull in the bombardment.

April 19th, the battalion moved by London omnibuses to Thiennes, to work for the Foreways Officers of the First Army, in the Foret de Nieppe. During the six succeeding days an eight-mile system of light railways was constructed in this forest and a bridge erected over the Thiennes canal. A firm bed for the track was almost impossible, as the ground was low and wet, and there was no ballast available. Finally, fascines and brush were used. Material was supplied from Berguette. Dumps were made at Thiennes bridge and Steenbecque station. The steel and ties were hauled by lorries from the train to the assembling points, each company being responsible for its own section. This road proved of great service to the 5th Imperial Division in bringing up supplies and evacuating wounded. The forest was bombarded frequently with high explosive and gas shells. During the week, Sappers Shields and Alexander were killed by shell splinters, and Sapper McLennan was gassed. These were the last deaths in the battalion while on active service. Sapper Brassard had been accidentally killed March 21st, making a total of five deaths in 1918.

The Foreways Officer, Lieut.-Col. W. H. Leane, in his report on this operation to the Chief Engineer, First Army, paid the following tribute to the 7th C.R.T. "In order to accomplish the work of opening to traffic a length of eight miles of line in four days, every possible energy and co-operation has been given by the officer commanding the battalion, the Chief Engineer of the battalion, and, I think I may say, every individual officer and man in the battalion."

While in the Nieppe forest the battalion was allotted by the G.O.C., 5th Division, a fighting position defending a bridgehead on the canal. But the enemy made no further advance on this sector.

CHAPTER VII

THE WORK AT CONCHIL

ON April 25th, the 7th C.R.T. entrained for the neighborhood of Conchil-le-Temple, in which locality it was to spend several quiet months. After fifteen moves and five weeks of extremely heavy toil under the most trying conditions, the troops were almost exhausted and welcomed the change.

The new work consisted of building a section of a broad gauge line to run from Conchil on the Boulogne-Abbeville main line to Conteville, as a means of supply for the Third Army. Several other C.R.T. units were already engaged on it. Lorries of the 12th and 13th C.R.T. moved the 7th from Conchil to the vicinity of Crecy. Headquarters encamped on the famous battleground of 1346, and the companies within a short distance, about Vironchaux, Ligescourt, Wadicourt and Estress-le-Crecy. The section allotted the battalion was approximately seven miles. Scrapers were used to great advantage. Up to May 11, 27,710 cubic yards of earth were handled on the grade.

Shooting practice on the Estress range was now begun, and each company was given one afternoon a week for this purpose. The practice consisted of five rounds grouping and ten rounds application at 100 yards. A team of officers of the battalion won by a score of 157 (note that figure) to 237 in a competition with a team of officers of the 47th Division Wing. Sunday, May 12th, a successful field day was held at Ligescourt on "C" Company grounds. There was keen competition among the teamsters for the best "G.S." wagon and team. Other events were baseball and football games, tug-of-war, potato and sack races. The band of the 47th Division Wing enlivened the sports.

Arrangements were made about May 14, 1918, to move the battalion to Conchil to operate a pit for ballasting the line and for other work in that area. "D" Company moved to the pit, May 15th, and headquarters followed on May 23rd. Lieut.-Colonel Martin returned to the battalion May 18th, when Lieut.-Colonel Harstone was recalled to the 4th C.R.T.

Shortly afterwards by exchange with the 4th C.R.T., Major E. J. Bolger came to the 7th as Chief Engineer. In the meantime the following warrant officers and sergeants had received commissions: J. C. Anderson, J. A. Burns, G. B. Christison, G. D. Curry, A. A. Gallagher, H. Grayston, H. Lester, A. N. McDonald, and E. P. Whaley, B.S.M., D. B. Free was promoted later. Lieut. T. Watt came to the battalion in March, while Lieuts. Biggar and Grayston were transferred and Lieuts. Cavendish, Kortright, Bell and Christison were evacuated to England during the summer. A dental officer, Capt. G. B. Marlatt, was sent to the unit at Conchil, and was succeeded in September by Capt. E. H. Campbell. The Medical Officer, Capt. V. K. O'Gorman, was replaced by Capt. S. L. Walker in September, to whom Capt. F. E. Rogers succeeded in November and until Capt. O'Gorman's return in December.

Hon. Capt. M. J. O'Gorman replaced his brother as Chaplain during November. Capt. R. M. Adams, Lieut. J. A. Brennan and Lieut. H. A. Doheny were granted leave to Canada. Lieut. J. P. Gillies, promoted Captain, replaced Capt. Adams as R.T.O. Capt. J. A. Crowe became Major and O.C. of "D" Company. Capt. G. W. Jewett and Lieut. J. W. Judge for several months were acting Major and Capt. in "B" Company in the absence, due to illness, of Major McAllister. Headquarters remained at Conchil until October 15th. Through the kindness of Baron de Torey, the camp was located in the grove beside his chateau and a memorable acquaintance was formed with him and his charming family.

The river Authie was a few rods away, pouring its waters into the Channel between the two picturesque seaside resorts of Fort Mahon and Berck Plage. The proximity of the splendid bathing beach at Fort Mahon provided a healthful recreation for the troops in the limited leisure time it had. Other forms of amusement were not lacking. A baseball schedule was drawn up among the 4th, 6th, 7th, 11th, 12th and 13th battalions, C.R.T., and games were played when time permitted. The 7th team did well but had to be content with second place. The winners, the 6th, also defeated the other C.R.T. champions.

The absence of enemy activity made this period a decided contrast to the months spent in Belgium. Only a few air raids disturbed the quiet and these did no material damage. On the night of May 19th, an enemy bombing plane was forced to descend, through engine trouble, near "C" company lines. Three officers were captured by a party of "C" Company men, but not before the aviators had succeeded in destroying their machine. A bomb fell in Conchil yard the night of August 10th and broke a stained glass window in the village church. This has been replaced by another, of which St. Lawrence is the central figure, with an inscription recalling the stay of the 7th C.R.T. at Conchil. It thus happily commemorates the dates of the raid and of the discovery of Canada by men from this very district of France, August 10, 1534-1918, as well as the name of the O.C. of the battalion.

The chief work done at Conchil was ballasting. Three steam shovels, a Ruston, a Bucyrus and a Marion were installed. These removed 276,283 cubic yards of ballast and train fill for the line and various other works. By means of the slip and wheeled scrapers 100,000 cubic yards of earth were moved a certain distance. The total yardage moved up to October 15th was 421,117 cubic yards. In the ballasting of the line, 52 miles of track were given a first lift; 37 miles a second lift, and 13 miles a third lift. Culvert pipe to the extent of 1,730 feet was laid in place. Two complete water systems were installed with lifting engines, which involved the laying of several miles of water pipe, the erection of tanks, etc. Incidental work was undertaken in connection with the establishment of No. 2 Aircraft Depot at Vron, where ground had to be levelled, runways excavated and ramps constructed. In the construction of the double track and R.O.D. yard near Villers-sur-

Authic, a large amount of filling by train had to be done. To reduce the handling of earth, a special spreader after the pattern of the well-known Jordon spreader of American make, was built under the supervision of the Chief Engineer. The spreader was erected on a flat car, weighted, with wings of timber to spread the dirt. It saved a great deal of labor and its work was much appreciated by the visiting inspecting generals.

Sunday, June 30th, the battalion was honored by a visit from Sir R. L. Borden, P.C., C.M.G., who was Premier of Canada at that time. He was accompanied by Major-General J. W. Stewart, C.B., C.M.G., the G.O.C. of the C.R.T. A parade was called of all available officers and men to welcome the Premier, who complimented the battalion on the work it had done and conveyed a very encouraging message from the people of Canada.

On August 7th, His Majesty King George V, and staff, accompanied by the D.G.T. Brig.-Gen. Crookshank and staff, made a trip over the line from Conchil to Ligescourt. Steam shovels, ballast spreader, and some 90 teams with slushers and wheel scrapers were seen in operation by the visitors. The D.G.T. afterwards expressed by letter the appreciation of the visitors. "I have to congratulate you for the very excellent arrangements which you made for the inspection trip from Conchil to Ligescourt, which His Majesty made this afternoon," his letter stated. "The King was most interested in the works and in the construction methods which he saw and commanded me to express his appreciation and satisfaction. I take the opportunity to give my thanks to all concerned."

September 11th, the lines were inspected by the French Minister of Public Works and party, accompanied by the D.G.T. They were particularly interested in the operations between Conchil and Etaples, on the main line, where the work of quadrupling begun by the 11th and 12th C.R.T. had now fallen to the 7th. Very short notice was given the battalion in connection with these important visits as temporary grades had to be made on account of shortage of ballast in certain places. This work was, however, completed in the required time under the direction of Major E. J. Bolger, Chief Engineer, whose practical railway engineering experience in Canada was again ingeniously applied.

CHAPTER VIII

CAMBRAI AND THE ARMISTICE

THE battalion was now beginning to hope for a move to the front where the advance of the Allies was proceeding so favourably, but Major Wesley seemed to think so highly of the battalion that he wished to retain their service as long as possible on this line. There was no doubt that the call might come any day, though it was in fact delayed longer than was liked. Before leaving, it was thought well to have a grand Field Day. This was held at Ligescourt, August 25th when a lengthy programme of field sports was run off. A very successful and enjoyable day was brought to a close by a concert in a hangar at Vron.

On October 15th, the 7th battalion C.R.T. moved to Marcoing in the forward area. The journey was made over the new line as far as Conteville. Headquarters was quartered in the Marcoing yard, partly in tents and partly in a train that had been "wangled" somehow at Conchil. Captured German coaches and camouflaged box cars, with flats that had been transformed into diners and sleepers, made quick moves no longer a worry to the Q.M. The companies were camped along the five miles stretch between Marcoing and the recently captured city of Cambrai.

In their retreat the Germans were demolishing bridges and railway lines to a large extent. To repair the most important of these kept all the C.R.T. battalions steadily employed until long after the Armistice. The C.O.R. C.C. had already put a single line into shape between Marcoing and Cambrai, but with only two sidings and no yarding. The 7th battalion had to put down a second track and refit the Marcoing and Rumilly yards, while several bridges had to be repaired. The enemy had left delayed action mines under the roadbed and in the railway yards, which caused additional delay and much damage, besides being of great danger to the troops. Fortunately the battalion suffered no casualties from these. October 24th one of them exploded near the bridge of Cambrai Junction, making a large crater and damaging the track and switches for about six rail-lengths. The line was cleared for traffic in three hours.

One of the most important operations of the battalion was on the Escaut bridge at Marcoing. This had been completely demolished. It originally consisted of one 77-foot steel span on stone abutments, and two 56-foot steel girders on wooden towers and piles. In constructing a temporary bridge before the arrival of the 7th battalion, time had not allowed the clearance of the steel debris, which hung suspended in huge shattered masses over the old spans (see picture No. 2 on page 27); and in such proximity to the temporary bridge that great care had to be taken in its removal lest traffic would be interrupted. It was necessary to build cribs under the 77-foot span to support it, before it could be cut and removed. Oxy-acetylene burners were used to cut the steel. The debris was removed by a derrick, which also removed the smaller spans bodily. The un-

damaged steel was used in the construction of new bridges. Owing to the extent of traffic over the existing bridge the crane and derrick could not be worked upon it, in removing debris and driving piles. Three other bridges of smaller size, also badly damaged, were similarly reconstructed without any loss of time for traffic. Sixty trains a day were at that time being worked over the line. For two weeks the line was operated by the battalion. The water stand-pipe in Marcoing yard was connected with the existing water tower, which necessitated the laying of 1,800 feet of pipe and the erection of a new water tank of a capacity of 8,000 gallons. Much of all this work had to be done by using night as well as day gangs.

November 5th, the battalion was moved to Honnechy near Le Cateau, and were allotted the construction of a diversion line between these two places. On November 11th at 7.35 a.m. the following joyful message was received from Advanced Headquarters, Fourth Army "Hostilities will cease at 11 hours today, November 11th. Troops will stand fast on line reached at that hour which will be reported by wire to Advance Headquarters as soon as possible. Defensive precautions will be maintained. There will be no intercourse of any description with the enemy until receipt of instructions from Army headquarters. Further instructions follow." But there was to be no immediate slackening of work for the railway troops. Work had to be carried on as usual in view of further advances. There was, too, great danger still attending their labours, from hidden mines, booby-traps, etc. Two sappers had already been injured, October 21st, by enemy bombs. In the same way twelve more were wounded November 17th, but six of these were able to remain at duty.

The Honnechy operation was discontinued on November 13th, and the battalion proceeded to Solesmes. There was urgent need of the completion of the Solesmes-Le Quesnoy line, to supply the troops in this area. Track-laying gangs were organized to work in three shifts. Seven 1,000 candle power acetylene reflector lamps and an anti-aircraft searchlight were used at night with complete success. A pioneer track-laying car was also used to hasten completion. With 1,200 attached troops the battalion in two weeks cleared debris from and repaired twelve miles of grade, laid nearly fourteen miles of track and ballasted eight miles. In addition to this five bridges were constructed and a water supply at Le Quesnoy installed. By employing an oxy-acetylene burner to cut the damaged ends off rails, and re-drilling these rails, a considerable length of line was laid from Le Quesnoy, thus saving much time. The battalion was responsible for the operation of this section of the line and was prepared to accept trains at Le Quesnoy, November 24th. Thereafter the work of the 7th consisted almost entirely of maintenance and operation of this line. The R.O.D. took over the operation December 9th. The 234th Royal Engineers were made responsible for maintenance, December 24th. "C" of the 7th Battalion, C.R.T. Company was ordered to Solre-sur-Sambre, December 14th, to carry out repairs on the line between Maubeuge

and Charleroi. The principal operation was the construction of a temporary and deviation bridge over the Sambre. But after a week they were relieved by the 262nd R.E.'s.

CHAPTER IX

ENGLAND, CANADA AND HOME

WITH the fighting over all the troops were free to celebrate and really enjoy Christmas, 1918. The holiday was certainly more pleasant for the battalion than the previous Christmas in Belgium. Then there were anticipations of a short rest. Now there was the certainty of a trip home very soon. All four companies were billeted in Solesmes-St. Python after December 26th. Preparations began for the return. Tools, plant and equipment were disposed of. Awaiting further orders the troops drilled and went on route marches. The weather was unfortunately not suitable for outdoor sports. Nor had the libraries lost in the retreat been replaced. But a concert hall was secured in the town and entertainments of various kinds were provided for in the evenings. A battalion orchestra of several pieces had been formed, and it helped out in the sing-songs. Several very good entertainers were discovered in the ranks. January 3rd, Hon. Capt. Cooksey, an English chaplain at the 4th C.C.S., gave an interesting lecture on Salonika. January 7th, the battalion Chaplain spoke on the History of France. The C.R.T. concert party of five members gave a very enjoyable entertainment on January 14th. The officers of the battalion gave a dance in Solesmes Town Hall, January 6th, at which about sixty officers and thirty nursing sisters were present.

A Requiem Mass for the battalion dead was chanted by the Chaplain, December 29th, in the church of St. Python, which was attended by large detachments from all the companies. The Mayor and Councillors of the town and a number of French soldiers also came, to offer their sympathy to their Canadian Allies.

The O.C., on January 21st, held a final inspection of the battalion and took the opportunity at that time to remark that although the headquarters' staff was not perhaps at times during the war as actively engaged in actual construction work as the companies, yet he maintained that the success the battalion had met with in its work, was equally due to Major E. Meredith, second in command, who had charge of the battalion administration, assisted by his immediate staff, Captain R. H. James, Adjutant, and Captain W. Charles, Quartermaster. In their respective capacities, too, the Paymaster, Captain E. L. Miller; the medical officers, Captain V. K. O'Gorman, Captain S. L. Walker and Captain F. E. Rogers; the Chaplains, Captain Rev. J. R. O'Gorman and Captain Rev. M. J. O'Gorman displayed an enthusiastic zeal and interest in the battalion and all that pertained to its success and welfare, qualities that were at times of equal importance as the actual construction operations in the respective areas.

Next day the 7th Battalion entrained for Etapes, the first step towards demobilization. After a short stay there it was sent to Le Havre and spent a few days in the Canadian Embarkation Camp. The greater part of the battalion embarked for Southampton

January 30th, and were followed a few days later by the remainder. They were taken to Knotty Ash Camp near Liverpool.

To this depot came 33 officers and 811 other ranks. Of the 79 officers who served in France with the battalion, three had been killed, eight had returned to Canada, and thirty-five had been sent to hospitals or other services or units. In all, 1,942 other ranks had been on the nominal roll, thirty-two had been killed; four had died of other causes; the remainder had been otherwise disposed of. There were six officers and 170 other ranks wounded during operations. Forty other ranks had received commissions, twenty-eight of these in the R.A.F. Of the latter, Flight Lieut. E. Morrison was killed in action, July, 1918, and Flight Lieut. J. O'Grady was accidentally killed while flying, December 24, 1918. Lieut. H. J. Boys, who transferred to a Canadian infantry battalion, was also killed in action. The battalion was awarded 25 decorations and 3 mentions. Besides these already recorded, Sappers H. Yurchenko and P. Krawehuck were awarded the Russian Cross of St. George.

Of the 22 months spent in France and Belgium all ranks of the 7th C.R.T. will have many souvenirs. Some leaving Le Havre were laden with material mementoes. Others preferred to do without these. But all will, their lives long, remember the varied incidents of their service. The battalion took part in the chief offensive of 1917 in the Ypres Salient. This was without doubt the hardest period in their history, working daily under shellfire, subjected to air-raids at night, and with very little rest. In 1918 the battalion assisted considerably in holding back the German offensives on the Somme and on the Lys. And after doing record work in completing a long stretch of broad gauge railway, it played a part in the final Allied advance, which for the unit did not cease until more than a month after the Armistice. During the two campaigns, the 7th was attached to each of the British Armies at one or another time, and worked under a majority of the British Corps. It was assisted at all times by attached labor, numbering as many as 5,000 occasionally, consisting of English, Irish, Scottish, Welsh, South African, West Indian, Hindoo, Italian, Portugese and American soldiers; Chinese laborers and German prisoners; and it was constantly in touch with the French and Belgians—both military and civilians. Accordingly the recollections of the members of the 7th C.R.T. will be of a very kaleidoscopic character, and their experiences have been more cosmopolitan than men of much travel often obtain. With all this they have the satisfaction of knowing that they "did their bit" manfully, bringing credit to themselves and to Canada.

Of the lighter side of those days spent on active service there will also be many pleasant and amusing remembrances. The Field Days' baseball and football games, and the various indoor entertainments, were occasions of much keen enjoyment when all became boys again. In days to come how much more often will the lighter incidents, rather than the tragic, of those times be recounted.

The troops were not kept long at Knotty Ash. Transferred to Rhyl after a few weeks, most of them were at home in Canada by April. Demobilized, they will only have to exhibit in civilian life the same qualities of courage, energy and resource, which served them so well at the front, to do much for themselves and for their native land.

I feel sure it will be a source of great satisfaction to all ranks, on returning to Canada, to feel that they have so largely contributed to the success of transportation, which was one of the dominant factors in bringing the war to a satisfactory end. The nation owes much to your grand work and to the fine results achieved.
